#### Maha Kumbh stampede: PIL in SC seeks action against officials

New Delhi: Following the tragic stampede at the Maha Kumbh in which at least 30 people were killed and around 60 others injured, a public interest litigation (PIL) has been filed before the Supreme Court seeking legal action against authorities and officials for their "negligent conduct". The petition said the incident depicts the drastic condition and fate of people due to the lapses, negligence and utter failure of administration purported by the government authorities. Apart from the "failure of maintaining and administering the supervision", the plea alleged that the authorities had also failed in controlling the crowd gathered for the event.

"From the 1954 Kumbh Mela stampede accident to

the Maha Kumbh 2025 stampede in Uttar Pradesh which took around 30 lives and left several injured, it is clear and visible to mention that nothing in the administration activity of our country has changed wherein such actions could have been avoided by showing reasonable duty of care and upfront repair and development activity," stated the petition.Quite often there are reports of casualties occurring due to overcrowding and lack of management by the administration and its municipal bodies, it highlighted, adding that every time such incidents take place "we have not learnt anything from the past". As per the petition, the event of Kumbh is one of the biggest and leading religious events of the nation, and hence, it becomes the collective responsibility of all states to ensure the safety and secure visit of its respective residents. "All states shall have to come forward for proper facilitation, security, medical facility, transportation and other facilities for their respective residents who are going to Maha Kumbh. Whenever such incidents happen, mostly the common and poor people become victims," the petition said. "There are several questions which are brewing up from this horrific incident of stampede thereby questioning the duty and lapse of State Government and Municipal Corporations," it added. Similar incidents of stampede had also taken place earlier in religious festivals, ceremonies and events, the petition said. It prayed that the Uttar Pradesh government be directed to file a status report on the Maha Kumbh 2025 stampede incident and initiate legal action against the authorities and officials for their

#### Washington plane crash: 18 bodies pulled out from Potomac River

Washington: A mid-air collision over the Potomac River near Washington's Reagan National Airport has claimed at least 18 lives, as rescue teams continue to search for survivors, according to local media reports. The crash involved American Airlines Flight 5342 and a Black Hawk military helicopter. The military helicopter was carrying three soldiers when it collided with the regional passenger jet, which had 60 passengers and four crew members on board while approaching the airport for landing. No survivors have been found so far, CNN reported.

The US Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) confirmed that the collision occurred around 9 pm local time on Wednesday. As a result, all takeoffs and landings at the airport were temporarily halted while emergency teams worked at the crash site. The Pentagon and the Army are investigating the crash, said Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth. He wrote that the investigation was "launched immediately." "Absolutely tragic. Search and rescue efforts still ongoing. Prayers for all impacted souls, and their families," Hegseth added.President Donald Trump issued a statement expressing his concern over the tragic accident. "I have been fully briefed on the terrible accident which just took place at Reagan National Airport. May God bless their souls. Thank you for the incredible work being done by our first respond-



ers. I am monitoring the situation and will provide more details as they arise," the statement read. The FAA confirmed that a PSA Airlines Bombardier CRJ700 regional jet, operating as Flight 5342 for American Airlines, was on approach to Runway 33 when it collided midair with a Sikorsky H-60 Black Hawk helicopter. The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) will lead the investigation into the cause of the accident. Emergency response teams, including the Metropolitan Police Department and the District of Columbia Fire and Emergency Medical Services Department, were deployed swiftly to conduct search and rescue operations. Boats are actively scanning the Potomac River, searching for potential survivors.


#### **KTR slams Congress for keeping** farmers in Telangana waiting for support

Hyderabad: Meritorious students from Telangana are set to lose their domicile-based reservations in Post Graduate (PG) medical seats from the next academic year. The change will allow students from other States who have completed MBBS in Telangana to compete for super-specialty medical seats under the Competent Authority in Telangana.

The Supreme Court's judgment on Wednesday declaring domicile-based reservations in PG medical seats as 'impermissible' also means that students from Telangana will lose all such reservations within the State.

A large number of students, public health experts and individuals closely following medical education said the apex court's judgment would be unfair to native students, who have pursued MBBS elsewhere, while others argue that this will only open up opportunities for meritorious students from across India. The Supreme Court's judgment has also elicited arguments that South Indian States, with highly evolved medical education and a higher number of PG medical seats, will struggle to maintain quality healthcare

"Isn't it unfair to deny a candidate an opportunity in their native State, where they were born and raised, just because they completed their MBBS in another State? How is it equitable to grant State quota benefits to students who have resided in the State only for 5 years and at the same time deny benefits to domiciled students?" asks Dr Sunil T, a Nalgonda native who did his MBBS in Karnataka. Aravind Varier, well-known for his data analysis on platform X (@VarierAravind) said: "It would be difficult for the South Indian States to maintain the quality of healthcare without

A great tragedy has cast a shadow on the Maha Cumbh festival, the most magnificent spectacle India presents to the world every 12 years. Better crowd managenent could have prevented the stampede that took place n the Sangam area as crores of pilgrims jostled to take a noly dip on the auspicious occasion of Mauni Amavasya n the wee hours of Wednesday. Ensuring a safe pilgrimage was an enormous challenge from the outset, and it is apparent that some lapses led to the pre-dawn melee. Anticipating a huge congregation, the mela authorities had ssued an advisory on Tuesday, urging devotees to folow safety guidelines. However, the organisers and security personnel were caught off guard when some pilgrims climbed over the barricades at Akhara Marg.

The Uttar Pradesh Government has tried to lownplay the incident, probably with the intention of avertng panic and avoiding negative publicity, even as Prime Minister Narendra Modi offered condolences to the devoees who lost their family members. A thorough probe is must to find out how the situation spun out of control and who all were guilty of dereliction of duty. Creating a reil of secrecy will only fuel rumours and misinformation. he administration did appeal to devotees to bathe at the irst ghat they reached so as to prevent overcrowding, vhile emphasising that all ghats at Sangam were equally acred. However, this appeal should have been backed y proactive steps to make pilgrims move ahead in a disciplined way.The Sangam stampede should prompt he mela organisers to review security arrangements and to course correction. Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has aid that the government's first priority is to ensure the afety of devotees. This should be the way forward durng the remaining four weeks of the Maha Kumbh. The spectre of death should not be allowed to mar a festival hat proudly showcases India's spiritual grandeur.

# Pune on my plate: SPPU's eateries are bound to satiate your hunger, without pinching your pocket

The sprawling campus of Savitribai Phule Pune University has its three prominent eateries, which help students and visitors assuage their hunger pangs. The open air canteen near the Department of English was once one of the most popular joints which drew a large crowd. But, now the refurbished canteens and other eateries have taken their place.Located under a banyan tree, Adarsh Canteen is one of the most popular eating spots on the campus. Located near the Jaykar Library, this canteen was recently refurbished in terms of management and transport. Lea is the most ordered beverage here as it is priced at Rs 10 a cup and coffee at Rs 20. The receptionist mentioned the canteen was on the verge of a makeover and a new menu will be unveiled soon. Shilpa Sanap, a student from the department of sociology, frequents the canteen as it is affordable. "I do like the tea served here," she said. Adarsh canteen is expected to run full swing with a complete menu in a fortnight.Like the Adarsh canteen, the food court has also undergone an infrastructure upgrade with new tables and wall fans fitted around the corners. The food court, located in front of the PUMBA (Pune University Masters of Business Administration) department, is a popular destination among foodies as it hosts multiple food outlets in a single area. Visitors here can get snacks, lunch (veg and non veg), beverages and desserts. Eateries at the food court are just as considerate about the taste as they are about distinct choices of visitors. There are a total of seven food outlets in the food court that present varieties of Indian and Chinese

Ranjit Group and Adarsh, two of the outlets at the food court, provide affordable breakfast varieties like poha, samosas, vada pav, sheera as well as idli and sambhar vada for south Indian breakfast. The most costly breakfast options are sambhar vada for Rs 35 a plate at Ranjit and pav bhaji at Rs 40 from Adarsh outlet. Poha with tea remains the most popular choice among visitors for being the cheapest at Rs 22 at Ranjit and Rs 20 at Adarsh Group. The veg thali from Aniket, priced at a reasonable Rs 80, comes with rice, chapati and two sabzis, making for a filling meal. Usually the outlets at the food court run from 7 am till 10pm.Route 93 dishes out chinese fast food and beverages which are affordable and tasty. The outlet has ample varieties of food like manchurian, noodles and schezwan rice, both veg and non veg. The most preferred meal here is chicken fried rice which comes at Rs 90 for a half plate, Rs 120 for a full one and thick chocolate shake, which comes at Rs 80, on the side. The food court is bustling during the wee hours as apart from the students of SPPU, students from a nearby college flock to the food court to assuage their hunger. A group of students from Modern College said they regularly visit the food court as it is accessible and comparatively affordable as compared to nearby food outlets. They also highlighted the hygiene here. "I come regularly here, but only two places provide hygienic food. One is Aniket outlet and the other is route 93," said Vikas Dengale, a student at Modern college.

Guest house canteenThere is one more eatery located on campus in an inconspicuous spot. Guest House Canteen, adjacent to the Department of Education, provides breakfast items like poha, samosa and bread patties.

The price range here is identical to the other two canteens. The visitors here are very few and usually are the ones who occasionally visit here for a cup of tea. "I came here after a year. It remains open till 3pm and they do provide lunch here, but the students prefer the food court because of the variety of food items it provides," said a faculty member at the technology department. The food facilities in the campus have kept pace with the change in food habits and taste buds of the students and others.

## Airport Customs arrest Tanzania national for smuggling cocaine worth Rs 7.5 crore

Mumbai Customs on Friday arrested a 47-year-old Tanzanian national, who was detained at the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport on January 19 for allegedly trying to smuggle cocaine worth Rs 7.5 crore into India by concealing the contraband inside his body. Lukhumani Fahadi Mawaki was detained by Customs on the basis of passenger profiling. According to Customs officers, Mawaki gorged out around 17 capsules in pallet form at the airport's washroom. Later at the Sir JJ Hospital, 38 more capsules were recovered from him over January

20-23. According to the Customs officers, 55 capsules containing a white-coloured crumbled substance (cocaine) weighing 751 grams and priced at Rs 7.51 crore was recovered from the Tanzanian.

The accused had hidden the capsules inside his body as well as ingested them, the Customs officers said. The accused was subsequently arrested under relevant sections of the Narcotics Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act. Meanwhile, Customs officers at the airport also seized smuggled gold and foreign currencies. During January 24-25, officers at Airport Commissionerate, Mumbai, Zone-III, seized 1.16 kg gold valued at Rs 86.68 lakh in two separate cases and foreign currency equivalent to Rs 22.40 lakh in one case. Two passengers arriving from Baku and Jeddah were intercepted by Customs and 24-karat gold dust in wax form weighing 1,010 grams and valued at Rs 75.47 lakh, and 24-karat gold bars weighing 150 grams and valued at Rs 11.20 lakh were seized. The gold was concealed inside their bodies and shoes of the passengers, Air Intelligence Unit (AIU) officers said. One of the passengers was arrested under the provisions of the Customs Act, 1962. The AIU also intercepted a passenger departing from Mumbai to Dubai and recovered foreign currency (one lakh Saudi Riyal), equivalent to Rs 22.40 lakh. The currency was concealed inside clothes, the agency said.

## Upset over pay, Punjab NHM employees to march to poll-bound Delhi to 'expose' AAP governance

On February 1, employees under the National Health Mission (NHM) in Punjab will be marching towards the poll-bound New Delhi "to expose" Aam Adami Party and its leader Arvind Kejriwal.Dr Wahid Malerkotla, state president of NHM employees union, Punjab, said, the contractual employees will distribute pamphlets in the markets of Delhi to highlight AAP government's breach of promises in Punjab. "The 28 meetings held with the current Punjab government after coming to power have only proven to be hollow assurances," Dr Malerkotla said.

Punjab has approximately 9,200 medical, paramedical, and clerical health employees recruited by the state government under the National Health Mission for the past 18 years on "meagre" salaries. Employees are hired under National Health Mission, a Central Government programme to ensure quality and affordable healthcare services, on contract basis on a 60:40 pay ratio to be borne by the Central and State governments respectively. The Centre has also given the states the option to regularise the employees or hike the wages.

"However, the 28 meetings held between the Punjab government and the NHM Employees Union Punjab's state committee over the last three years have only resulted in verbal assurances. When AAP was campaigning ahead of 2022 polls in Punjab, they used to assure us of regular jobs and rationalisation of salaries on a par with regular employees but nothing has been done till date. Hence, we will be going in the streets of Delhi to tell the truth to Delhi voters as what AAP is doing in Punjab," said Avtar Singh, from NHM employees association's Mansa unit.NHM was earlier National Rural Health Mission when it was launched in 2008 with an aim to strengthen the rural health facilities. After five years, it was renamed NHM.Initially, the salary was decided to be split between the Central and state governments on a 3:1 ratio. After few years, this state's share was raised to 40 per cent and Centre's share reduced to 60 per cent. In 2008, a staff nurse used to be paid Rs 8,500 per month, a computer operator Rs 6,500, auxiliary nursing midwife (ANM) Rs 6,000, while the rest of the staff got Rs 10,000 per month. The pay of the same staff after working for 17 years have been hiked to Rs 27,000 (staff nurse), Rs 24,000 (computer operator), Rs 23,000 (ANM), and Rs 30,000 for other clerical staff, which is too low," said Avtar Singh. The new recruits now get a monthly salary of Rs



10,000 each for ANM and computer operators, Rs 12,000 for staff nurse, community health officer and ayurvedic doctor get Rs 20,000 each on monthly basis.

"However the salary structure is decided by the state government and if the state will increase the package...the Centre will add 60 per cent of their share and state will have to add 40 per cent in that.. But just because the state doesn't want to shell out larger share of 40 per cent they continue to give meagre salaries to NHM staff," Avtar Singh explained."After an online meeting of the union held on Monday, all the employees in Punjab unanimously decided that during the Delhi Assembly elections in February, they would protest against the Punjab government by organising exposé rallies and distributing pamphlets," said Kiranjit Kaur, NHM Employees Union state committee member. As a first step, on February 1, 2025, the 'pol khol' campaign will be launched in New Delhi constituency of AAP supremo Arvind Kejriwal, said state general secretary Gulshan Sharma from Faridkot.NHM Employees Union state committee pointed out that since 2017, neighbouring state of Haryana has been regularising NHM employees by enacting service laws and providing benefits such as regular pay scales, pay commission benefits, DA, and medical reimbursements and their salaries are at par with regular employeesThe main demands of NHM employees include regularization, adoption of service laws like Haryana, an increase in current salaries, loyalty bonuses, a leave policy with paid leaves, gratuity, etc. Avtar Singh mentioned that with the announcement of protest in Delhi, the Punjab government has called them for a meeting on February 5, "but we have not postponed our protest plan".

#### CM Siddaramaiah's plea against MUDA 'scam' probe: Karnataka High Court adjourns hearing to March 22

MUDA scamSiddaramaiah and a former land owner J Devaraju are appealing against the September 24, 2024, order of Justice M Nagaprasanna facilitating the investigation into the MUDA land grant. A division bench of the Karnataka High Court on Saturday adjourned to March 22 the hearing into appeals filed by Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and a former Mysuru landowner against a single judge's order facilitating an investigation into alleged illegalities in the allotment of 14 MUDA housing sites to the CM's wife.

A bench comprising Chief Justice N V Anjaria and Justice M I Arun adjourned the matter after the counsel for Siddaramaiah sought time to facilitate the appearance of senior counsel Abhishek Manu Singhvi on his behalf. Siddaramaiah and a former land owner J Devaraju are appealing against the September 24, 2024, order of Justice M Nagaprasanna facilitating the investigation into the MUDA land grant.

Earlier on December 5, the division bench had adjourned the appeals to January 25 by noting that they would require a lengthy hearing. The high court, however, refused to stay proceedings in a petition before a single judge filed by the RTI activist Snehamayi Krishna seeking a CBI probe against Siddaramaiah in the alleged MUDA land scam case



from 2021. The Lokayukta police is likely to give a clean chit to the Karnataka chief minister considering the lack of evidence of any wrongdoing in the allotment of 14 housing sites to Siddaramaiah's wife during the tenure of the BJP. The 14 sites — which were given by the Mysuru Urban Development Authority (MUDA) to Siddaramaiah's wife as compensation for alleged wrongful acquisition of 3.16 acres of land gifted by her brother — have been returned to MUDA by the chief minister's family following allegations of profiting to the tune of Rs 56 crore in the deal. The Opposition BJP has, meanwhile, threatened to launch a fresh protest against Siddaramaiah if the Lokayukta police issues a clean chit to him

# North winds to bring cold back to Bengal, foggy conditions to continue

# MSEDCL proposes tariffreduction, Maharashtra Electricity Regulatory Commission to take final decision

The Maharashtra Government's decision to shift agriculture grids to solar energy will help reduce the cross-subsidy burden on domestic and industrial consumers, said Vishwas Pathak, Senior Independent Director, Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Company Limited (MSEDCL),

Addressing a press conference in Mumbai, Pathak said, "The CM Solar Energy Scheme 2.0 generating 16,000 megawatt is a reality. The entire agriculture sector will operate on solar power. This will ensure economically feasible power rates as solar power is cheaper in the long run. Secondly, farmers will get continuous power during the day time.""Today, power is highly subsidised for farmers. Apart from the state government, cross-subsidy is borne by domestic consumers and industries. Annual cross-subsidy for the agriculture sector allocated by the government works out to Rs 10,000 crore," he added. "Domestic consumers in the next five years may have to pay a reduced power tariff of Rs 5.87 per unit. This will be applicable for those consuming power up to 100 units per month. For those using 101 to 300 units, the tariff will be Rs 11.82 per unit," the MSEDCL officer said, adding that they have proposed tariff reductions to the State Electricity Regulatory Commission to ease the financial burden on consumers. MSEDCL customers consuming up to 100 units per month currently pay Rs 7.65 per unit. Whereas domestic consumers in the 101-300 unit category pay Rs 13.49 per unit.

## In a first, Safdarjung Hospital uses CAR T-cell therapy to treat cancer patient

In a first, Safdarjung Hospital in Delhi has carried out the Chimeric Antigen Receptor T-cell (CAR T-cell) procedure on a 48-year-old patient suffering from Non-Hodgkin lymphoma. This is the first time a central government hospital has used this therapy to treat a cancer patient who did not respond to conventional treatments.

CAR T-cell therapy is an advanced immunotherapy that harnesses the power of a patient's own immune cells, specifically T-cells, to fight cancer. The T-cells are genetically modified to target and destroy cancerous cells more effectively than the body's natural immune response. This treatment has proven to be a game-changer for patients with cancers such as Non-Hodgkin lymphoma, especially those with refractory or relapsed disease that has not responded to traditional treatments.

The procedure was conducted using indigenously developed CAR T-cell therapy by a company named ImmunoACT.

According to Dr Kaushal Kalra, head of the Medical Oncology department at Safdarjung, the patient was suffering from Non-Hodgkin lymphoma, a type of blood cancer in which malignant cells form in the lymph system. It is resistant to conventional treatments.Dr Kalra said the patient was admitted to the hospital in the last week of December and is recovering well. "She has tolerated the treatment well, which is an encouraging outcome for both the patient and the medical team," he said.

#### BBMP invites DPR bids for KR Puram-Nayandahalli tunnel and 10 elevated corridors

bbmp, elevated corridor, bengaluru, bbmp dpr bids, bengaluru news, The invitation of bids for DPR for the second tunnel comes at a time when there is already a strong backlash from environmentalists, urban mobility experts, and civic groups against a proposed 18km twin tube tunnel road. The Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) has set the ball rolling and has invited bids for the preparation of a Detailed Project Report (DPR) for the proposed second tunnel road project between KR Puram and Nayandahalli (28 km). The second tunnel road has been proposed even as there is already a Purple metro line along the same stretch (Whitefield-Challaghatta via KR Puram and Nayandahalli) connecting the east and west of Bengaluru.

Additionally, the civic body has also invited bids for DPR preparation of several elevated corridors, including split flyover at the MEI junction and elevated corridors between KR Puram and Yeshwantpur, Konanakunte Cross and Banashankari, Ragigudda and Thalaghattapura, Old Madras Road and Madiwala, Ngawara and Bagalur, Hennur and Bagalur, Tannery Road and Nagawara, West of Chord Road and Nandini Layout and an additional link road to Kempegowda International Airport (KIA). The civic agency has invited DPR bids for the second tunnel and the elevated corridor projects based on the final feasibility report on the Comprehensive Bengaluru City Traffic Management Infrastructure Plan, prepared by Altinok Consulting Engineering. The report consists of a detailed feasibility study and proposes a 170-km network of tunnels, double-decker tunnels, elevated corridors and underpasses to streamline mobility and decongest Bengaluru traffic.

The study proposes traffic management and road infrastructure solutions in terms of vehicular tunnel, grade separators and road widening in selected corridors. As part of the plan, 16 elevated corridors and two tunnels have been proposed. The total length of elevated corridors/ double deckers/ underpasses amount to 124.7km. Meanwhile, the total length of tunnels (North-South and East-West) amount to 46km. The report estimates the road infrastructure projects to cost Rs 54,964 crore. The invitation of bids for DPR for the second tunnel comes at a time when there is already a strong backlash from environmentalists, urban mobility experts, and civic groups against the proposed 18km twin tube tunnel road from Hebbal and Silk Board. The DPR for the same was awarded to Rodic Consultants at a cost of



Rs 9.5 crore. The DPR drew strong criticism from a section of society for the alleged "copy-paste" job after several flaws and discrepancies were flagged in the report.

The final feasibility report highlights the proposal of a double-decker tunnel with three lanes at the lower deck and two lanes at the upper deck connecting KR Puram and Nayandahalli. The total length of the East-West corridor of the project is 28km. The two-deck system consists of the upper deck connecting KR Puram to Nayandahalli circle and lower deck connecting Navandahalli circle to KR Puram. The tunnel corridor also consists of an important intersection at the Lalbagh Botanical Garden where the metro line, East-West and North South tunnel corridors converge. The total cost for this tunnel corridor is estimated at around Rs 8,913 crore. Mobility experts and civic groups have been arguing that the proposed tunnel roads and elevated corridors are not part of original CMP (Comprehensive Mobility Plan) report 2020 and it is imperative for the government to focus on sustainable and public transport options rather than big ticket road infrastructure projects. Urban mobility expert Satya Arikutharam said, "The 4.5 crore Feasibility Report of the BBMP is of a very poor standard. Now, based on the unreliable Feasibility Report, the BBMP has called for a DPR work on other corridors. Note that the Purple Line already serves the east-west corridor and it is incredulous that the BBMP is proposing a double-decker tunnel road on the same corridor." Arikutharam added, "The BBMP has gone roque with no accountability. Urban mobility governance in Bengaluru is in a state of comatose as the DULT (Directorate of Urban Land Transport) has become completely silent. I urge the Chief Minister to stop the BBMP DPR tenders immediately, order DULT to publish its review of the Feasibility Report outputs and fully establish the BMLTA."

#### Jailed ex-West Bengal minister Partha Chatterjee admitted to ICCU as health worsens

partha chatterjeePartha Chatterjee was arrested on July 23, 2022, after ?21 crore in cash and jewellery worth above ?1 crore was recovered from the Kolkata residence of his close aide, Arpita Mukherjee. Former Education Minister Partha Chatterjee, prime accused in the cash-for-job scam in the education department, was admitted to the Intensive Cardiac Care Unit (ICCU) of the SSKM Medical College and Hospital, Kolkata, on Thursday night after his health deteriorated. A medical team has been formed to monitor his condition and to take decision for the next course of treatment. According to hospital sources, the former minister was shifted to the ICCU of cardiology department from the emergency observation ward following complications in the heart functioning, which worsened.

Chatterjee, who has been in jail for almost three years, was brought to the hospital from Presidency Correctional Home on Monday after he experienced breathing issues. Further, doctors have reported that there are issues with Chatterjee's lungs and kidney and his sodium, potassium and creatinine levels are fluctuating, causing further complications. When Chatterjee was admitted he was administered nebuliser and then admitted to the cardiology

department and several tests were performed, hospital sources said. It was during Chatterjee's tenure as the state education minister during 2014-2021 that the alleged teacher recruitment scam took place in the SSC and the Primary Education Board. The Supreme Court on December 13 granted conditional bail to Chatterjee, stating that he can be released on bail on February 1, 2025 subject to his furnishing bail bonds to the satisfaction of the trial court. The Enforcement Directorate had arrested the senior Trinamool Congress leader in July 2022 in connection with irregularities in recruitment to the West Bengal School Service Commission during his tenure as the Minister of State Education Department.

### Missing Hyderabad trader found dead in Khammam chilli field

## Bengaluru Palace land takeover: Karnataka clears ordinance to withdraw TDR offer to avoid paying Rs 3,014 crore to Mysuru royal family

Facing the prospects of having to pay a compensation of Rs 3,014 crore in the form of Transferable Development Rights (TDR) to the erstwhile royal family of Mysuru for acquiring 15 acres of land for road development from the Bangalore Palace Grounds, the Congress government in Karnataka has decided to introduce an ordinance to withdraw the TDR offer for the acquisition of the Bengaluru Palace land."The state government has decided to issue an ordinance for the use and control of the Bangalore Palace Grounds. The allotment of TDR for Bangalore Palace grounds is against the state's interest," Law Minister H K Patil said after a special Cabinet meeting on Friday. The Bengaluru Palace Grounds spread over 472 acres of land was acquired by the Karnataka government through the passage of the Mysore Palace Transfer and Acquisition Act of 1996 which received the assent of the President and came into force on November 18, 1996. The state was to pay Rs 11 crore as compensation for the land at the rate of Rs 2.30 lakh per acre. However, the acquisition by the state has remained in limbo since the royal family challenged validity of the acquisition law in the Supreme Court after the Karnataka HC upheld the law on March 31, 1997.Subsequently, the Karnataka government acquired 15.36 acres of the palace land for widening of the Jayamahal Road and the Palace Road over a stretch of 2 km and a TDR compensation provision was provided.

The Supreme Court, in an order dated December 10, 2024, — in a contempt plea filed by the royal family — directed the Karnataka government to pay the transferable development rights or TDR for the palace land acquired for road widening — as per the prevailing guideline values for the areas adjacent to the Bangalore Palace grounds. The TDR that has to be paid to the royal family for acquisition of 15.36 acres of land or 13,91,742 sq ft of land at the prevailing guidance value of Rs 2.70 lakh per sq metre would amount to Rs 200 crore for every acre and a total of Rs 3,014 crore, the law minister said. "Even today the litigation is pending and there is no stay and if the development work costs Rs 3,014 crore then Karnataka will be in danger as far as development is concerned," Patil said.

"Once TDR is paid it cannot be regained. It would affect the state's economy. We have decided not to pay the TDR. Since it is under litigation there are a lot of complications. The ordinance will empower us to keep control over the land. The appropriate decision on compensation will be taken at the right time," the law minister said. The Karnataka government will file an affidavit in the Supreme Court during the next hearing of the Palace Grounds matter indicating the decision to issue an ordinance to keep the Palace Grounds under the control of the state which would negate the TDR compensation demands. "If Rs 3,014 crore i.e. Rs.200 crores per acre is given for the development of only 2 km of road in the state, the economic situation of the state will be wrecked," Patil said. He said the ordinance would supplement the 1996 Palace Land Acquisition Act. "Promulgation of the ordinance empowers the state government to use as much space as required and abandon the other proposals. The Minister explained that the Ordinance would allow partial or complete withdrawal from any infrastructure project based on any court order or any

There were no sewer lines; it would flow in drains and onto the roads. In 10 years, we have put in new sewer pipelines in most colonies. We are now connecting houses to the line," Kejriwal said in a video address on



Saturday. He added that in many places where sewer lines were already laid, the network is old and crumbling. "I get complaints that sewers here are overflowing, leaking or are jammed, and that sewage is mixing with drinking water. I have decided that as soon as the AAP government is formed, faulty sewers will be replaced on a war footing. Don't worry, if there are sewer related issues in your area, as soon as we form the government, we will get sewers cleaned or replaced, where pecessary," he added

#### Geo-tagged digital identity helps Kashmir's famous chinar trees stand tall

Facing destruction due to rapid urbanisation and infrastructure projects, a geo-tagged digital identity on the lines of the Aadhar card has been introduced this week to monitor the health of every chinar tree standing in the Kashmir Valley. The J&K Forest Research Institute's (JKFRI) 'Digital Tree Aadhar' initiative provides a unique number for each tree. For example, the chinar in the city centre of Lal Chowk is CG-JK010088. Metal cards featuring barcodes provide information, including the tree's location, height, and health. "Around 10,000 trees are being metal card-tagged as of now. It will help in the management of trees, and tourists will get to know how old a tree is by scanning the barcodes," Syed Tariq, project coordinator at the JKFRI, said. The JKRFI began a chinar census in the Union Territory in 2021. According to data from the JKFRI, Kashmir was home to around 40,000 chinar trees but the numbers are falling steadily. The widening of highways has also taken a toll on many chinar trees.

"The aim of the JKFRI is to establish a detailed database of chinar trees using the Geographic Information System (GIS)-based, quick response (QR) code-enabled surveys," Mr. Tariq said Around 28,560 chinar trees have been geo-tagged across the region, with fresh plantations covered in recent years. Chinars grow in Jammu's Chenab Valley, and in the Pir Panjal Valley. They too will be covered under the digital initiative. Ganderbal district has the highest number of chinar trees, including the world's third-largest chinar, with a girth of 74 feet. "We will record the top 20 chinars of Kashmir, with girth between 60 ft. to 74 ft.," Dr. Tariq said. "We plan to create a chinar atlas of J&K. We treat them as collective heritage. This initiative will help create digital data," he added.

The JKRFI said chinars protect biodiversity as they are a favourite with avian species, especially crows and kites in Kashmir. They also absorb carbon. Kashmir is home

to multiple chinar groves. Geotagging has rescued the trees from illegal felling. The 'majestic chinar' or Platanus orientalis (oriental plane) grows to a height of 30 metres with a girth of 10 to 15 metres at the ground level. The tree features prominently in Kashmiri folklore, literature, politics, religious practices, and even romance.

Locally known as buen, Islamic preachers who travelled to Kashmir four centuries ago from Central Asia and Persia introduced the oriental plane to the region. The 700-year-old tree that rises to 14.78 metres and was planted by Sufi saint Syed Qasim Shah in Chattergam in central Kashmir's Budgam district is the oldest among them. In the 16th century, Mughal rulers planted chinar trees in the fabled Naseem Bagh, Nishat Bagh, Shalimar garden and Harwan in Srinagar. Several Bollywood blockbusters have been filmed with chinar trees as the backdrop. The tree is revered by both Muslims and Hindus, with shrines and temples sheltering it. From the Hazratbal shrine to the Kheer Bhawani temple, chinar trees are an intrinsic part of the setting of these religious places. With 'Digital Tree Aadhar', majestic chinar trees can now safely stand taller and longer in Kash-

#### Bangladeshi woman found murdered near Bengaluru lake, was residing 'illegally' in city

A Bangladeshi woman, who was allegedly staying in the city without valid documents, was found murdered in East Bengaluru, the police said Friday, adding that she may have been sexually assaulted. The body of the victim, identified as Najma, 28, was discovered near the Kalkere Lake in Ramamurthy Nagar in the morning with multiple injuries. According to police sources, preliminary investigations based on her husband's statement revealed that Najma did not possess a valid passport or any legal documentation to reside in India. Her brother has reportedly confirmed this claim. Najma's husband Suman has been working as a garbage segregator for the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP). Unlike her, Suman legally entered India with a valid Bangladeshi passport six years ago, the police said. The couple's three children currently live with relatives in Bangladesh. Employed as a domestic worker at an apartment complex in Kalkere, Najma lived with her husband in Ramakrishna Layout, Kothanur. Ms. Bora found herself attracted to Mr. Goala's voice and the two eventually discovered they liked each other's company. A few days ago, they decided to be united for life.

"When word spread that the two wanted to get married, people donated in cash and kind. The crowdfunding helped us prepare for the traditional wedding," Utpal Harshavardhan, the secretary of the old age home, said. "About 4,000 guests turned up for the marriage. Each was treated to a sumptuous meal," he said. Ms. Bora was shifted to Matri Niwas (Mothers' Home) in the city's Mathgharia area a few days before her marriage. Also a home for the elderly, Matri Niwas is about 8 km from the Beltola home — both run by Monalisha Society, an NGO.A group of women helped Ms. Bora get ready for the wedding. #### Time to seize the promise of the U.S.-India nuclear deal

Sixteen years ago, this writer and other organisers of the Coalition for Partnership with India rejoiced at the final approval of the United States-India civil nuclear deal through the U.S. Congress. The long struggle for passage of the necessary U.S. legislation began in 2005, and it was only in late 2008 that the Coalition succeeded in working with the George W. Bush administration and U.S. Congressional leaders to make the deal legal under U.S. law. The Coalition for Partnership with India was a loose association of businesses, Indian-Americans, and academics that supported U.S. approval of the deal in the face of fierce opposition that stipulated that the deal would promote the proliferation of nuclear weapons. As a consultant to the U.S.-India Business Council, this writer was privileged to recruit and act as a liaison among Coalition components, plan strategy, and advocate before the Congress.

A game-changing deal

The U.S.-India civil nuclear deal was a watershed moment and opened a whole new era in defence and strategic cooperation for the two democracies that had become estranged during the Cold War. Without the trust engendered by the willingness to cooperate in dealing with the most powerful and potentially most destructive technology ever seen, the present level of U.S.-India interaction on defence purchases and manufacturing, military exercises, technology transfer, intelligence sharing, and crisis management would never have occurred.

And yet, the energy and commercial promises of the U.S.-India deal have never been fulfilled. Those of us who supported and advocated for the deal envisaged the augmentation of the Indian civil nuclear sector with many plants being built using U.S. equipment, technology, and allied services. Employment would be created both in the U.S. and India. More electricity would be generated by plants to fuel Indian industry and benefit the average Indian. This energy would not generate greenhouse gases and help wean India away from an over-reliance on climate changing, and often toxic, fossil fuels. Even though U.S. President Barack Obama announced in 2016 that Westinghouse would build six new nuclear plants in India, this has not hap-

Jake Sullivan, in his last trip to India as U.S. President Joe Biden's National Security Adviser, announced, "... the United States is now finalizing the necessary steps to remove long-standing regulations that have prevented civil nuclear cooperation between India's leading nuclear entities and U.S. companies." Will this development be the mechanism that breaks the logjam that has prevented the U.S.-India deal from fulfilling its true potential? If only it were so simple. At the conclusion of the civil nuclear deal in 2008. there were approximately 200 Indian entities on the so-called "Entity List" kept by the U.S. Department of Commerce. In general terms, U.S. companies are prohibited from doing business with companies on this list unless a special licence is granted. In practice, such licences are seldom granted. After the U.S.-India civil nuclear deal, all but a handful of Indian companies dealing with nuclear matters were removed from the list. This was one of the benefits of the deal. Among those remaining, were those that were mainly involved in research and development and thought to involve the risk of nuclear technology leakage into military uses and other security issues, including leakage to Russia and other adversaries of the U.S. Mr. Sullivan, in his speech in New Delhi, made oblique reference to this concern when he said. "As we see more and more new technologies diverted to unfriendly actors, the United States and India will also need to ensure that valuable dual-use technologies don't fall into the wrong hands. This means aligning our export control systems...."Apparently, the Biden Administration decided that the few remaining Indian nuclear entities on the U.S. Entity list no longer present the kind of security concerns that landed them on that list in the first place. This is all well and good and can be considered progress, although it remains to be seen whether the security and foreign policy agencies under Mr. Trump will agree with that assessment. However, this is not the heart of the problem preventing the U.S.-India civil nuclear deal from reaching its full potential. The liability risk issue

In 2010, India enacted the Civil Liability for Nuclear Damage Act. This Act was fuelled in Parliament by those who had lost the attempt to block the deal and their antiforeigner rhetoric, including invocation of the infamous Bhopal/Union Carbide tragedy. The result was India departing from international civil nuclear liability norms and placing major liability obligations not on the operators of a civil nuclear facility but on the suppliers. Neither of the major U.S. suppliers — GE and Westinghouse — was willing to assume these liability risks, and neither the U.S. nor India was willing at that time to step in to ameliorate these liability

The Indian Government did attempt later to provide some relief from liability risks in conjunction with the resumption of Russian participation in the Indian civil nuclear expansion. Through India's public sector General Insurance Corporation, and four other government companies, a 20year insurance premium would be charged to cover the supplier's liability for an accident. The Russians accepted this risk amelioration in large part because their overseas



civil nuclear entities are government owned, will have a defence of sovereign immunity, and in any case will be protected by the Russian government from liability that might otherwise put them out of business. And the Russians saw their increased participation in Indian civil nuclear development as bearing significant geopolitical dividends. The Russians are now moving forward with India on civil nuclear expansion. The U.S. companies have been unwilling so far to accept this insurance amelioration. Thus, the Trump administration will have to find means to cut the Gordian knot of liability before there will be significant U.S. company involvement in Indian civil nuclear expansion.

Hurdles such as technology, consumer costs

There are other significant barriers to the full involvement of U.S. companies in Indian civil nuclear expansion that have arisen since the 2008 conclusion of the U.S.-India civil nuclear deal. Civil nuclear technology has evolved rapidly. For U.S. companies to be fully involved, they must show that they can offer the latest technology. Most importantly, this technology and its implementing equipment must be offered at a reasonable price that will not increase electricity costs to the Indian consumer. Indian civil nuclear officials are acutely aware of the disastrous cost overruns that have doomed the latest civil nuclear facilities in the U.S. and left ratepayers to shoulder unwelcome costs without improvements in either quantity or quality of services.

these challenges limit the full fruition of the U India civil nuclear deal. But they cannot be met by U.S. companies acting alone. The Trump administration can work with Indian and U.S. nuclear companies not just on regulatory issues but also those involving liability, technology, and cost as well. The hour is late, but the benefits to seizing the full promise of the U.S.-India civil nuclear deal will be tremendous.Raymond E. #### Need to tackle social media pollution: CEC

Observing that social media platforms were not blocking or labelling easily detectable fakes, Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Rajiv Kumar on Friday (January 24, 2025) said that there was a need for Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) to curb "social media pollution" just like in case

"The entire social media space is polluted. If we have environmental pollution outside, equally serious social media pollution we have inside. It needs anti-pollution measures," Mr. Kumar said in his valedictory address at an international conference of Election Management Bodies (EBM) of 13 countries which also adopted a resolution the "Delhi Declaration 2025" reflecting collective commitment to uphold principles of free, fair, and inclusive elections. The CEC said that business interest appears to be at work here (social media). It is like first spreading the disease and then selling medicines. The casualty is a fair election process and purity of democracy.

Asserting that social media companies need to introspect before it is "too late", Mr. Kumar said: "Let the social media platforms, which have been instrumental in providing a critical space for free expression, especially to voices not heard, not be clouded by the shadows of fake, unverified and misleading narratives, disruptive by design". He said that social media algorithms are designed in a way that repeatedly presents content aligned with existing views, reinforcing a perspective without exposing the person to the other side of the argument. Algorithms can certainly prevent do that especially in case of detectable fakes."It is not enough to leave it to fact checkers to detect it. It is like allowing easily detectable fake to pass through and then leave it to organisations at receiving end, like the EMBs, to engage fact checkers and rescue themselves and the electoral process", Mr. Kumar said. The participating EMBs expressed shared concern over false narratives and misinformation on social media and resolved to form a working group to tackle it collectively.

#### A surge in radical governments, the hope of democracy

One thing seems fairly certain now. If an Islamic radical group were to seize power by force, then the world will be willing to legitimise it and forgive its past deeds. But till the time such a group does not capture power, it will either be fought tooth and nail and/or treated like an enemy. We had Afghanistan in 2021. We now have Syria in 2024. When the Taliban captured power on August 15, 2021, 13 members of the United States troops were killed in an Islamic State (IS) suicide attack, and \$7.1 billion worth of U.S. weaponry was left behind in Afghanistan. However, the U.S. and the West as well as China and Russia bent backwards to work with the Taliban. The West justified this by saying that this would wean the Taliban away from supporting terrorism and help in the protection of women's and minorities' rights. They talked about "inclusive government" but democracy was not uppermost in their minds. The then UN Special Representative to Afghanistan, Deborah Lyons, even told the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) that the Taliban was 'misunderstood'.

Treated with kid glovesThe ultimate irony was how "karma" had come full circle. In the days preceding the Taliban's capture of Afghanistan, the "Troika Plus", of the U.S., China and Russia with Pakistan, had tried to coordinate their efforts in Afghanistan to keep India completely out and ignore our vital interests. In the UNSC, even an innocuous reference to the Heart of Asia Conference on Afghanistan was deleted from the draft statement because India was one of the countries attending it. But when the events of August 2021 unfolded, India was the president of UNSC that month. Any text or resolution required India's concurrence. When UNSC Resolution 2593, after the Taliban takeover, was passed on August 30, India left its imprint particularly in the paragraph relating to Afghan soil not being used for terrorist activities. The express reference to terrorists and terrorist organisations in the UNSC Resolution 1267 sanctions list was inserted at India's behest, where it coordinated closely with the U.S. side. This was necessary to remove any ambiguity about Pakistani terrorist organisations associated with the ISIL (Daesh) and al-Qaeda, including the Lashkar-e-Taiba and the Jaish-e-Mohammed — listed in 1267 — from using Afghan soil to launch terrorist attacks on India

In December 2021, the UNSC allowed the Taliban to get donor money directly into its coffers. With no political will among the P-5 or the West to demand accountability for implementing UNSCR 2593, the Taliban soon denied girls school education, imposed restrictions on women, and stopped all moves for an inclusive government. Now, the world looks the other way.

Now, Syria and BangladeshAnd now Syria in 2024. We have just witnessed a radical Islamic leader Abu Muhammad al-Jolani or Ahmed al-Shaara of the Hay'at Tahrir Al-Sham (HTS) seize power, culminating in the toppling of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad. Al-Jolani was earlier leader of the al Qaeda in the region, with links to international terror groups. His radical outfit, the HTS, which was earlier an al Qaeda wing in Syria called the Jabhat al-Nusra, still features in the U.S. State Department list of terror groups. Mirroring what they did with the Taliban, the U.S. and the West have lined up behind the HTS and its leader. The first move of the U.S. was to remove the bounty of \$10 million on al-Jolani's head for his capture. Capturing power can help evade capture also

This is wonderful news for Islamic terrorists and extremist groups gaining ground, especially in Africa such as in Mali, and adopting IS and al Qaeda techniques to topple governments. But the world is preoccupied with Ukraine and West Asia. Now, India has a situation brewing closer to home, in Bangladesh. Even if the collapse of the elected government in Bangladesh has been largely due to an autocratic government stifling democratic forces and losing the plot, under the guise of supporting regime change, the U.S. clearly downplayed the interests of its "strategic" partner India. It is propping up the interim military-led government of Muhammad Yunus, which is seen as tolerating, even encouraging, Islamic radical groups in Bangladesh and is a threat to its minorities. The last thing India needs is the revival of Islamic radicalism in Bangladesh, where the last 16 years have seen the two countries and its peoples come closer in a variety of ways for mutual benefit.

When Sheikh Hasina and the Awami League came to power in 2008, it was seen as free and fair elections with a cleaned-up electoral list and the Bangladesh Army staying on the sidelines. The people overwhelmingly rejected the violent past of the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) of Khaleda Zia and their Islamic radical partners such as the Jamaat-e-Islami. Just when one thought that the Jamaate-Islami stood discredited for siding with Pakistan in the 1971 war and rejected by the people of Bangladesh for causing mayhem and disrupting lives, the popular student protests of 2024 and the ensuing military coup have given them

While there is no doubt that the Ansarullah Bangla Team (ABT) — affiliated to the Al Qaeda in the Indian Subcontinent (AQIS), the Jamaat-e-Islami and its student wing, the Islami Chhatra Shibir, the Hefazat-e-Islam, the Jagrata Muslim Janata Bangladesh (JMJB) and the Islamic State-Khorasan Province (ISKP) have taken advantage of the situation, it is not as if the people of Bangladesh have embraced them wholeheartedly. Consequently, these radical groups have tried to shore up support for their extremist ideologies by attacking the minority communities, forcing the interim government to release Islamic extremists from prison (such as like Jashimuddin Rahmani, head of the ABT), and adopting shrill anti-India rhetoric, conflating the dismantling of Sheikh Hasina's legacy with attacks on India. India should be careful not to fall into this trap.

Religious hate has been on the rise around the world It was when this writer was India's Permanent Representative to the UN that India brought up, for the first time, in 2021-2022, the rise of religiophobia against non-Abrahamic religions, including against Hindus, Sikhs and Buddhists. India condemned all forms of religious hate, whether in the U.S. and the West or in Bangladesh and the neighbourhood. While India may have taken its eye off the ball when it came to the Sheikh Hasina government, it cannot ignore Islamic extremism again rearing its head in Bangladesh and posing renewed danger to India's national security - something which New Delhi successfully prevented over the last 16 years. The larger picture

However, for both sides to view the unfolding events purely through a religious lens — be it an Islamic lens or Hindu lens — would be a mistake. This has been counterproductive before and will be so now. In fact, Islamic radicals are baiting India, and, unfortunately, so are the officials who have been appointed as advisers to Mr. Yunus, precisely to polarise forces within their own country. On the other hand, India has the larger perspective in mind to protect its bilateral relations from damage. It has reiterated its readiness to do business with the interim government. India has removed most irritants in its bilateral relations in the last two decades, except maybe for the sharing of Teesta river waters. What is forgotten is that when Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) revolted in February 2009, just after the first clean elections of Bangladesh in December 2008, it was India which gave its rock solid support to the newly-elected government and helped save democracy. It is in Bangladesh's own interest that this military coup does not translate into an Islamic coup and goes the way of Syria or Afghanistan. The silver lining is that, having tasted the power of democracy in 2008, and now in 2024, it will be difficult to

#### The Vengaivayal case: Explained

The story so far: In a revolting incident that sent shock waves across Tamil Nadu, human faeces was found dumped in an overhead tank that supplied drinking water to the 20-odd Scheduled Caste (SC) families at Vengaivaval village in Pudukottai district on December 26, 2022. Soon, the State government transferred the case to its premier investigation agency, the Crime Branch-Criminal Investigation Department (CB-CID).

A couple of public interest litigations were filed before the Madras High Court seeking the transfer of the case to the CBI and the court had appointed a one-man commission headed by a retired High Court Judge to probe the incident. On January 24, 2025, the CB-CID informed the court that it has cracked the case and a "final report" has been filed before the Special Court against three persons, all belonging to Scheduled Castes, on January 20, 2025.

How the crime came to light?

Some village youngsters found the faeces floating in the tank when they checked it suspecting water contamination after some of the residents of Vengaivayal, including children fell ill around Christmas in 2022. The then Pudukottai Collector Kavitha Ramu, who visited the village a day after the incident came to light, found the prevalence of the 'twotumbler' system with separate glass tumblers being used to serve tea to Dalits. She also led a group of Dalits into the Sri Avvanar temple, where they had been worshipping the deity only from outside, at the adjacent hamlet of Eraiyur, dominated by intermediate caste residents.

What was the state response?

Based on a complaint from the parent of an affected child, a case was booked at the Vellanur Police Station under Sections 3 (1) (b) and 3 (1) (x) and 3 (2) (va) of The SC and ST (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989 and IPC Sections 277 (fouling water of public spring or reservoir) and 328 (causing hurt by means of poison with intent to commit an offence) and formed multiple teams to probe the case. But as weeks passed by, activists and political parties, especially the Viduthalai Chiruthaigal Katchi and the Left parties, grew restive over the delay in arresting the perpetrators of the crime. Chief Minister M.K. Stalin promised in the Assembly that the government will act firmly against those indulging in such demeaning acts. Considering the sensitiveness of the case, the investigation was transferred to the CB-CID.

How was the probe conducted?

In the absence of eyewitnesses to the crime or surveillance cameras in the hamlet, the investigators have had



to largely depend on circumstantial evidence and scientific corroboration. The agency had sought to conduct DNA tests, with the approval of the Special Court for Exclusive Trial of Cases under the SC/ST (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, on suspects from both communities in an attempt to try and match them with samples of faecal matter found in the water tank. It sought to conduct polygraph test on some persons, including some Dalits, as part of the investigation. However, the court rejected the request to conduct the tests on 10 persons who had objected to it. Meanwhile, in September 2023, the HC said that the one-man commission headed by retired HC Judge Justice M.Sathyanarayanan, appointed by it, had in an interim report highlighted tardy progress in the investigation by the CB-CID. The Director of National Commission for Scheduled Castes S.Ravivaraman also conducted a spot inquiry in February 2024

What is the outcome of CB-CID probe?

The status report filed by the investigation officer before the HC on January 24 identified J.Muraliraja, a Police Constable, B.Sudharshan and K.Muthukrishnan, all from Vengaivayal, as the accused in the case. According to the CB-CID, the Muthukadu Village Panchayat president Padma Muthaiah had terminated Shanmugam, the tank operator, but Vengaivayal residents wanted him to continue. Dissatisfaction over the maintenance of the overhead tank among Vengaivayal villagers had led to a dispute between Jeevanantham, father of Muraliraja, and Muthaiya, husband of Padma, during a Gram Sabha meeting held two months prior to the incident. In an act of revenge against Muthaiya, Muraliraja had falsely claimed that the water from the tank was turbid and emanated bad odour and along with two villagers, Muthkrishnan and Sudharshan, had climbed up the water tank and committed the offence, it was alleged. The CB-CID said 397 witnesses were examined in the case and 196 mobile phone numbers and 87 (mobile phone) tower data were analysed as part of the investigation.

#### Hamas hands over four Israeli women hostages to Red Cross in Gaza

Hamas militants handed over four Israeli women hostages to the Red Cross in a Saturday (January 25, 2025) swap after parading them on a stage at a square in Gaza, an AFP journalist reported. The four, all Israeli soldiers dressed in military fatigues, had been held captive in the Palestinian territory since Hamas seized them during their attack on Israel on October 7, 2023. Palestinian militant group Hamas on Friday (January 24, 2025) announced the names of four Israeli women soldiers to be released in exchange for Palestinian prisoners in the second swap under the ceasefire deal. Hamas has said to release Karina Ariev, Daniella Gilboa, Naama Levy and Liri Albag

Israel on return of Palestinians to northern Gazalsrael says it will not allow Palestinians to return to northern Gaza until Arbel Yehoud, one of the dozens of hostages held by Hamas, is released. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office said Yehoud was supposed to have been released Saturday as part of the Gaza ceasefire agreement. Hamas had earlier released four female Israeli soldiers The exchange follows the release on the ceasefire's first day last Sunday of three Israeli women and 90 Palestinian prisoners, the first such exchange for more than a year. In the sixweek first phase of the Gaza ceasefire, Israel has agreed to release 50 Palestinian prisoners for every female soldier released, officials have said. That suggests that 200 Pales-



tinian prisoners would be released in return for the four. Phased ceasefire The ceasefire agreement, worked out after months of on-off negotiations brokered by Qatar and Egypt and backed by the United States, halted the fighting for the first time since a truce that lasted just a week in Nov. 2023.

In the first phase, Hamas has agreed to release 33 hostages in exchange for hundreds of Palestinian prisoners held in Israeli jails. In a subsequent phase, the two sides would negotiate the exchange of the remaining hostages and the withdrawal of Israeli forces from Gaza, which lies largely in ruins after 15 months of fighting and Israeli bombardment.

#### U.S.' China policy to put America first: Rubio tells Wang Yi

The Trump administration will pursue a relationship with China that advances U.S. interests and puts the American people first, Secretary of State Marco Rubio told his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi.Mr. Rubio on Friday (January 25, 2024) spoke today with Chinese Foreign Minister Wang, the first call between the two diplomats since President Donald Trump's administration took office on January 20. "Secretary Rubio emphasised that the Trump administration will pursue a US-PRC (People's Republic of China) relationship that advances US interests and puts the American people first," said the State Department Spokesperson Tammy Bruce.

"The Secretary also stressed the United States' commitment to our allies in the region and serious concern over China's coercive actions against Taiwan and in the South China Sea," Ms. Bruce said. China claims most of the South China Sea. Vietnam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan have counter claims. Rubio also discussed other issues of bilateral, regional, and global importance with Mr. Wang. In the first year of Trump's first term, the U.S.-China ties deteriorated amid a trade war that unleashed a series of tit-for-tat tariffs.Meanwhile, Congressman John Moolenaar, Chairman of the House Select Committee on the Chinese Communist Party and Congressman Tom Suozzi introduced the Restoring Trade Fairness Act, the first bipartisan bill that would revoke China's Permanent Normal Trade Relations (PNTR). A companion bill has been introduced in the Senate by Senators Tom Cotton and Jim Banks. This comes following President Trump's new executive order, directing the Secretary of Commerce and the United States Trade Representative to assess legislative proposals regarding Permanent Normal Trade Relations with China. In 2000, as China prepared to enter the World Trade Organisation, Congress voted to extend PNTR status to the People's Republic of China (PRC), hoping the Chinese Communist Party would liberalise and adopt fair



trading practices. In another development, Senator Ted Cruz introduced the Protecting Military Installations and Ranges Act to protect Department of Defence installations and training areas from American adversaries.

The bill restricts the purchase of certain property by a foreign person acting for or on behalf of Russia, China, Iran, or North Korea. "Foreign adversaries are exploiting loopholes to acquire land near our military bases and training routes, jeopardising the safety of our troops and the integrity of our operations," Cruz said. Congressman Dan Meuser has reintroduced the China Exchange Rate Transparency Act, legislation aimed at addressing China's opaque and manipulative currency practices that undermine fair trade and global economic stability. "China's long-standing disregard for financial transparency and its manipulation of foreign exchange markets have tilted the playing field against US businesses and disrupted global economic norms," said Meuser. "This legislation demands accountability and insists on adherence to international standards of transparency and fairness," he added. The China Exchange Rate Transparency Act (CERT Act) directs the United States Executive Director at the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to advocate for enhanced transparency in China's exchange rate

## China tells Rubio to behave himself in veiled warning



China's veteran foreign minister has issued a veiled warning to America's new secretary of state: Behave yourself. Foreign Minister Wang Yi conveyed the message in a phone call on Friday (January 24, 2025), their first conversation since Marco Rubio's confirmation as President Donald Trump's top diplomat four days earlier."I hope you will act accordingly," Mr. Wang told Rubio, according to a Foreign Ministry statement, employing a Chinese phrase typically used by a teacher or a boss warning a student or employee to behave and be responsible for their actions. The short phrase seemed aimed at Rubio's vocal criticism of China and its human rights record when he was a U.S. senator, which prompted the Chinese government to put sanctions on him twice in 2020. It can be translated in various ways — in the past, the Foreign Ministry has used "make the right choice" and "be very prudent about what they say or do" rather than "act accordingly."

The vagueness allows the phrase to express an expectation and deliver a veiled warning, while also maintaining the courtesy necessary for further diplomatic engagement, said Zichen Wang, a research fellow at the Center for China and Globalization, a Chinese think tank. "What could appear to be confusing is thus an intended effect originating from Chinese traditional wisdom and classic practice of speech," said Wang, who is currently in a mid-career master's program at Princeton University. China's sanctions on Rubio in pastMr. Rubio, during his confirmation hearing, cited the importance of referring to the original Chinese to understand the words of China's leader Xi Jinping.

"Don't read the English translation that they put out because the English translation is never right," he said.A U.S. statement on the phone call didn't mention the phrase. It said Rubio told Wang that the Trump administration would advance U.S. interests in its relationship with China and expressed "serious concern over China's coercive actions against Taiwan and in the South China Sea."Mr. Wang was foreign minister in 2020 when China slapped sanctions on Rubio in July and August, first in response to U.S. sanctions on Chinese officials for a crackdown on the Uyghur minority in the Xinjiang region and then over what it regarded as outside interference in Hong Kong. The sanctions include a ban on travel to China, and while the Chinese government has indicated it will engage with Rubio as secretary of state, it has not explicitly said whether it would allow him to visit the country for talks.

## India reiterates readiness to take back nationals 'overstaying' in U.S., other parts of the world

Amid the "massive deportation operation" in the U.S., India on Friday (January 24, 2025) reiterated its stance against illegal immigration, with the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) stating it will facilitate the return of Indian nationals "overstaying" or residing without proper documentation in the United States or "anywhere in the world." Official spokesperson of the Ministry of External Affairs Randhir Jaiswal addresses the media.

During a weekly press briefing in New Delhi, MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said, "We are against illegal immigration, especially because it is linked to several forms of organised crime. "He added, "For Indians not just in the United States, but anywhere in the world, if they are Indian nationals and they are overstaying, or they are in a particular country without proper documentation, we will take them back, provided documents are shared with us so that we can verify their nationality and that they are indeed Indians. If that happens to be the case, we will take things forward and facilitate their return to India. "Mr. Jaiswal also informed that External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar during his visit to the U.S. for Trump's inauguration also raised the issue of visas with Secretary of State Marco Rubio. "We have been continuously raising the issue (with the concerning countries) of the delay in issuing visas. If visas are conveniently issued, the people-to-people and economic ties between the two countries will improve

## China and U.S. partners are moving closer as Trump returns to the White House

China's relations with Japan, India and other countries are improving as former U.S. President Joe Biden courted, just as Donald Trump brings his more unilateralist approach back to the White House. The change of leadership in Washington on Monday could be an opportunity for China, which has long railed against Biden's strategy of building partnerships with "like-minded countries" to counter its growing influence.

Mr. Biden reinvigorated a grouping known as the Quad—the United States, India, Japan and Australia. China's relations with all three of those U.S. partners are improving, as are its ties with Britain. The durability of Biden's legacy is now in question. During his first term, Mr. Trump didn't hesitate to challenge traditional U.S. partners. "It is possible that Trump may drift away from U.S. allies, making them pay more attention to China's role, and in fact it has provided a chance for China's diplomacy," said Wu Xinbo, dean of the Institute of International Studies at Fudan University in Shanghai. "I think we should grasp the chance."

But U.S. National Security Council spokesperson Brian Hughes said that Trump "has a record of rallying the world toward a more competitive stance with China." Trump agreed to a Free and Open Indo-Pacific strategy that Japan introduced during his first term and he backed excluding Chinese companies from telecom networks in the U.S. and many of its partners. On Tuesday, Secretary of State Marco Rubio — hours after he was sworn in — met with the Foreign Ministers of Australia, India and Japan in Washington, a move that suggested engaging the Quad countries and countering China's influence will remain a priority for Trump.Beijing's rapprochement with the U.K. and Japan is in its early stages, and major differences remain that limit and could derail it. India turned the page with China on a bitter border dispute last October but protested when Beijing created two new counties in an area claimed by both nations.Still, new leaders in Australia, the U.K. and Japan have shown a desire to warm relations with China, the world's largest manufacturer and a source of strategic minerals. The government in Beijing has reciprocated in part because it wants foreign investment to help revive its economy, which could be set back if Trump follows through on a threat to impose higher tariffs. Chinese President Xi Jinping told European Council President Antonio Costa in a phone conversation last week that both sides could bring more "stability and certainty" to the turbulent global situation. China and Britain restarted economic and financial talks after a six-year hiatus when the U.K. Treasury chief visited Beijing this month.

"From China's point of view, improving relations with American allies and increasing economic cooperation will offset the shock to China-U.S. economic relations," Wu said. In Washington, there's a strong bipartisan consensus that the U.S. must prevail in its economic and tech rivalry with China to maintain its global leadership. During his confirmation hearing, Rubio called China "the most potent and dangerous near-peer adversary this nation has ever confronted." Biden kept the tariffs Trump levied on China and imposed more on Chinese electric cars and solar cells.

But unlike Biden, Trump has irked U.S. allies and partners with his recent remarks on possibly annexing Greenland, an autonomous territory of NATO ally Denmark, and making Canada the 51st American state. Hal Brands,



senior fellow at the Washington-based think tank American Enterprise Institute, said he believes some top strategists in Beijing are "salivating at the damage they think Trump is going to do to U.S. alliances and the opportunities this creates for Beijing to resurrect some of its relationships with ... Japan and Europe that had moved in a very sharply anti-China direction since COVID."Trump's rhetoric and attempts by adviser Elon Musk to interfere in British and German politics, "are certain to have a ripple effect," said Sun Yun, director of the China program at the Stimson Center in Washington. "Countries want to at the minimum keep their options open," she said. "China is unlikely to be a better choice than the U.S., even under Trump, but it is important to find some counterbalance."

China's relations aren't improving with every U.S partner. The Philippines complained recently about what it called a "monster" Chinese coast guard ship in nearby waters, and the foreign ministers of Japan and the Philippines said last week they would convey to Trump the urgent need for the U.S. to remain engaged in the region. China and the Philippines did reach a temporary deal last July that has prevented further violent confrontations around Second Thomas Shoal, one of several outcroppings that both countries claim in the South China Sea. Uncertainty about Trump's policies is prompting both China and Japan to seek a stable relationship, said Taizo Miyagi, an expert on Japanese diplomacy at Chuo University in Tokyo. A Japanese foreign minister has visited Beijing for the first time in seven years, and Chinese military officials were in Tokyo last week to resume defense exchanges after a five-year hiatus."In a way it is a Trump effect," Miyagi said. "Many other countries are likely thinking the same and this could invigorate their diplomatic activities." British Prime Minister Keir Starmer has sought to rebuild ties with Beijing since his Labour Party's election victory last summer. It's a marked shift from predecessor Rishi Sunak, who in 2022 declared an end to his country's "golden era" of friendship with China.In Britain's case, Trump's return may not be driving the rapprochement. Many European leaders may not welcome Trump's America-first agenda, "but the idea that as a result they will all kowtow to Beijing for more trade is fanciful thinking on the part of some of our Chinese friends," said Steve Tsang, director of the SOAS China Institute at the University of London. Most would prefer to remain partners with Washington. French President Emmanuel Macron, outlining his vision for global diplomacy in a New Year's speech, declared that his country was "a solid ally" of Trump. He and others hope that Trump will respond positively to their outreach. Much will depend on what path the returning U.S. president takes, and how the rest of the world

#### Rubio chooses Central America for first trip amid Panama Canal pressure

Marco Rubio will pay his first trip as U.S. secretary of state to Central American nations including Panama, where President Donald Trump has threatened to seize the Panama Canal, a spokeswoman said Thursday (January 23, 2025).Mr. Rubio, who is the first Hispanic and first fluent Spanish speaker to serve as the top U.S. diplomat, has vowed to put a top priority on Mr. Trump's goal of curbing migration from Central American nations. State Department spokeswoman Tammy Bruce said Mr. Rubio would travel starting late next week to Panama as well as Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala and the Dominican Republic.

"It's about making sure that if we're going to be safe and prosperous and in good shape, we've got to have an interest in our neighbors — and in today's world, it's certainly South and Central America," Mr. Bruce said."There's a reason why this is the first trip. It signals how seriously he takes it," she said.Mr. Bruce did not describe the details of any expected conversations on the Panama Canal. Mr. Trump in his inaugural address Monday (January 20, 2025) vowed that the United States would be "taking it back."Mr. Rubio in his confirmation hearing did not suggest military force but said the United States needed to address serious concerns about Chinese influence near the vital waterway between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.Panama, which has long been friendly to the United States, complained to the United Nations over Mr. Trump's threat.

President Jose Raul Mulino, during a panel at the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, said that the canal "belongs to Panama and will continue to belong to Panama." Enforcement against migration Mr. Trump — who during his campaign said that immigrants were "poisoning the blood of our country" — has put a top priority on halting undocumented migration into the United States. The Central American nations of El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras - torn by endemic violence, poverty and natural disasters exacerbated by climate change — have been among the top sources of migration. Mr. Trump's predecessor Joe Biden vowed to look at the root causes of migration. Mr. Trump has quickly put an emphasis on enforcement, suspending a Biden program that gives asylum seekers a chance to make their case in an orderly way and threatening to use the military to help secure the U.S.-Mexico

El Salvador's president, Nayib Bukele, has been a favorite of Mr. Trump supporters for his lethal and ruthless crackdown on crime. The president's son Donald Trump Jr. attended Bukele's second inauguration last year. The Biden administration had a more distant relationship with Bukele, amid concerns over human rights, although it also largely worked with him as it sought to address migration.Mr. Rubio's decision to visit Guatemala likely marks a continuation of U.S. support for President Bernardo Arevalo, a onceobscure anti-corruption advocate who pulled off an upset election victory in 2023. The Biden administration hailed Mr. Arevalo's victory and quickly moved to work with him as he pushed back against an entrenched elite that sought to stop him from taking office.Mr. Arevalo has enjoyed some bipartisan support in Washington but his opponents have sought an alliance with fringe movements that refused to recognize Biden's 2020 victory over Mr. Trump.Mr. Rubio, the son of Cuban immigrants, on taking office said he would



stop State Department work that seeks to "facilitate or encourage mass migration," vowing to pursue Mr. Trump's goal of enforcement.

### Myanmar conflict to feature in India-Indonesia talks

The raging conflict in Myanmar will feature prominently in discussions between visiting Indonesian President Prabowo Subianto and Prime Minister Narendra Modi during the weekend, sources said. Mr. Subianto, who will be the chief guest at the Republic Day celebrations, began his official meetings by calling on External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar and meeting industry bigwigs on Friday (January 24, 2025).

The inclusion of the prevailing scenario in Myanmar in the official agenda is significant as both India and Indonesia have been trying to stitch up a dialogue process among various domestic stakeholders in the conflict-torn southeast Asian country. Sources further mentioned that the two sides will discuss several "regional issues including the tension around the South China Sea" during the official talks that will be held in Hyderabad House on Saturday.

India recently hosted a number of ethnic armed organisations from Myanmar as well as members of the exiled National Unity Government at the Indian Council of World Affairs, soon after Indonesia also hosted such groups. The chain of engagements indicated that both the countries are trying to establish dialogue between the military junta in Nay Pyi Taw and the ethnic armed organisations that have captured large amounts of territory of Myanmar, including vast tracts of land near its borders with India's northeastern

The situation in Myanmar has escalated over the last year, with the military junta losing control over areas in Chin state, Rakhine, and the Sagaing region. Maungdaw near the Indo-Bangladesh frontier was the latest town to fall to the Arakan Army in December 2024. The Myanmar issue has been on the table of the ASEAN since the military coup of February 2021 and it is understood that the Indonesian president will continue the discussion on "regional issues" in Malaysia, which is his next destination after India. "Close cooperation with friendly countries has always been our priority to build a stronger and more prosperous region together," Mr. Subianto said,

## All states/UTs expected to complete draft labour code rules by March

the labour ministry has said that all states and UTs are expected to complete draft labour code,including code on wagesA collaborative study is also being undertaken with the International Labour Organization to comprehensively assess various factors related to platform workers. All 36 states and Union territories (UTs) are expected to complete "harmonisation and pre-publication" of draft rules under the four labour codes by March 31, 2025, a release by the Labour Ministry said on Saturday. So far, barring five states and UTs, all others have pre-published the rules, setting the stage for the much-awaited rollout of the four codes — Code on Wages, Code on Social Security, Code on Industrial Relations, and Code on Occupational Health & Safety — by next year. The Labour Ministry has been consistently working for harmonisation of rules under the four codes across the states, said the release. This year, six regional meetings were held between August and October to facilitate the states and Union territories for framing the rules.Labour laws fall under the concurrent list of the Constitution. Hence, both the Centre and states are empowered to make rules. But in the event of a conflict beween state and central laws, central legislation generally takes precedence, unless the state's law has obtained presidential assent. The four labour codes are a judicious combination of reforms aimed at easing labour market rigidities, and reinforcing workers' rights and welfare. As many as 44 labour related Acts were consolidated into the four codes in 2019-2020 with the objective of reinforcing trade and investment, facilitating ease of doing business and easing compliance. Several minor offences were decriminalised via the codes, while skill development and dispute resolution have been accorded due priority. Meanwhile, the ministry also is working towards development of a framework for social security coverage to gig and platform workers, said the re-

Extensive stakeholder consultations were conducted with aggregators, knowledge partners, platform worker organisations, and state/UTs this year to ensure a comprehensive understanding of the Social Security Code, 2020, and to develop collaborative approaches for a social security framework tailored to gig and platform workers, it said. Also, a collaborative study is being undertaken with the International Labour Organization to comprehensively assess various factors related to platform workers. "These include the number of platform workers, prevalent business models, potential schemes, financial implications (such as aggregator turnover and contributions), and a roadmap for implementing a social security scheme for platform workers," the release said.

## West Bengal & Rajasthan new migrant destination hotspots; Uttar Pradesh tops

West Bengal and Rajasthan are the new centres of migrants movement from across the country and have found place in the list of top five states where maximum numbers of general or second class passengers travelled to by the Indian Railways, shows the latest working paper of the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister (EAC-PM) on migration trends. Other three states in the top five are Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh. According to the analysis of data from the Indian Railways on unreserved tickets of non-suburban passengers (150+ kms journey), the council has concluded that while most of the states showed reduction in the passenger headed to them from outside, possibly as a result of an overall reduction in migration, West Bengal, Rajasthan and Karnataka are the states that showed the maximum amount of growth in percentage share of the arriving passengers.

Compared to 2012 data, Andhra Pradesh and Bihar are now ranked a notch lower. Titled as "400 Million Dreams!", the PM advisory body in its report said that the overall number of migrants in the country has reduced by 11.78 per cent as compared to the 2011 census. The paper hypothesised that improved economic opportunities in smaller cities are among the reasons for the slowing migration in India.

Apart from ticket bookings data from Indian Railway Unreserved Ticketing System (UTS) for year 2023 and 2012, EAC-PM used mobile telephone subscribers' roaming data and district level banking data on remittances to come up with the figure of 40.20 crore migrant, as of 2023, in the country. The total number of migrants in Census 2011 were 45.57 crore. According to its analysis, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Karnataka and Telangana are the major origin states for arrivals into Maharashtra. Similarly, for Delhi, the major origin states are Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Rajasthan, Haryana and Madhya Pradesh. Apart from this, the major destinations for general class travellers heading out from Uttar Pradesh are Delhi, Bihar, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh and Haryana. Similarly, major Destinations for passengers heading out from Bihar are Delhi, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh. Maharashtra and Jharkhand.

The report, which has been authored by economist Bibek Debroy, who passed away last month and was Chairman of EAC-PM, and Devi Prasad Misra, an IRS officer posted as Director in the council, showed that Uttar Pradesh to Delhi was the most popular state-to-state route in the country traversed by migrants using the Railways. Gujarat-Maharashtra was second, Telangana-Andhra Pradesh in third place, Bihar-Delhi was in fourth slot and Bihar-West Bengal in the fifth position. The paper goes on to provide district-level passengers movement data also. It shows that Mumbai remained on top position of destination district (inmigration) for non-suburban general class passengers.



Bengaluru Urban was at the second position, Howrah was third, Central Delhi was fourth and Hyderabad was at the fifth position. When compared with 2012 data, the order of districts have changed, but the composition of the top ten stays constant. However, if we look at the top originating districts of non-suburban (150+ km) passengers, it shows some new source districts in 2023 that were not there in 2012. While Valsad remains on the top, which is 193 kms from Mumbai, Villupuram (Tamil Nadu), Saharsa (Bihar), Moradabad (UP) and Murshidabad (West Bengal) are the new entrants in the top-10 originating district list. The trend could be reflective of daily commuters travelling up and down for work from Valsad to Mumbai in the first case, using the suburban railway service. The report says that the top origin districts are coalesced around major urban agglomerations viz. Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai, Bangalore, Kolkata etc. The analysis further shows that at district level, Murshidabad to Kolkata was the top route of general class passengers movement.Paschim Bardhaman to Howrah, Valsad to Mumbai, Chittoor to Bengaluru Urban and Surat to Mumbai were in second, third, fourth and fifth position respectively

The report also provides an answer to the question of who are the major migrants to cities like Delhi and Mumbai. While Agra, Patna, Kanpur Nagar, Jhansi and Bareilly are on the top source district for general class passengers to Delhi, Dausa and Ludhiana are the new districts in the top-10 list of origin districts to Delhi. In the case of Mumbai, while the number of passengers from the origin districts have changed, there is just one new entrant Sindhudurg in the top 10 list. Valsad, Surat, Nashik, Ratnagiri and Varanasi are top-5 origin districts of the passengers to Mumbai. EAC-PM used unreserved second class (Mail & Express/Ordinary) ticket data as it is the cheapest class of tickets on railways. which is used by blue collar migrants (working class people). While the railways data shows the trends in the movement, it has some limitations also as it this data does not capture details such as age, gender, reasons for migrating etc. Also, all railway data is recorded from Station to Station, therefore the actual origin and destinations may not always be captured accurately. The similar exercise was undertaken in Economic Survey 2016-17, when Arvind Subramanian was Chief Economic Advisor, for calculating the migration trends.

### As tech firms look to translate the promise of AI in 2025, 3 clear templates emerge

If the year 2024 started with the promise of generational AI, 2025 could be more about testing out the use cases of some of these Al tools. And finding answers to the quintessential question of monetising Al.Going forward, there could be three board templates for the most compelling use cases yet.One, is this clear focus on Al agents — artificial intelligence tools that can handle multi step chores like onboarding clients, approving expenses and not just routing, but actually responding to customer-service requests, all with minimal human intervention. While OpenAl Chief Executive Officer Sam Altman termed Al agents "the next giant breakthrough", San Francisco-based Salesforce Inc. has already started inking deals with some 200-odd companies to install its workplace Al agent called Agentforce. "We're really at the edge of a revolutionary transformation... This is really the rise of digital labor.

Salesforce CEO Marc Benioff said on the software company's most recent earnings call. While Salesforce launched Agentforce in September, San Francisco-based Anthropic launched its own product a month later, followed by a Microsoft launch in November. OpenAl is set to unveil an agent at a research preview in January. Agentic AI is clearly projected to become more widespread in 2025. Second, if monetising AI is a big question, San Francisco-based Perplexity AI has some answers. In November, Perplexity - a conversational 'answer engine' that uses large language models (LLMs) to answer queries using sources from the web and citing links within the text response - launched a user-focused shopping hub in a bid to beef up its platform as it attempts to take on Google's dominance in the search engine space. The idea is simple, but functional. For instance, a user can take out her phone, point it at a product that she wants to get, and just ask the Perplexity Al bot:

where can I buy this? The answer is generated right there, alongside options to buy the product and the different price at which it's offered on shopping websites. Or if a user were to ask Perplexity to help build her a library, or help her buy all the items needed to host a party, the AI bot will list out all the product options right there, alongside reviews hoovered up from different parts of the web. And the user can go further and fulfill the transaction to purchase the products, all on the Perplexity app. Backed by Amazon founder Jeff Bezos and chipmaker Nvidia, Perplexity plans to double down on its shopping feature by giving users product cards showing relevant items in response to guestions related to shopping, with each card providing product details in a visual format. The fact that the Amazon founder is a backer only helps the start-up as it works to monetise the Al-curated shopping experience. Third, is a doubling down on improving the AI interface by the segment leaders – a handful of companies such as OpenAl, Google, Meta, xAl and Anthropic that have converged at the top of the current generation of LLM models. In early December, OpenAl announced the full availability of its Canvas tool, a day after it launched its Al video generator Sora. Canvas was introduced by OpenAI in October as an editing tool for writing and coding. It's a notebook interface that sits beside the user's ChatGPT chatbot conversation, which allows users to edit responses and "collaborate" with ChatGPT. New to Canvas is the ability to get feedback and edits in the form of comments. From here, users can make changes based on ChatGPT's suggestions. Google too has a pitch in this segment, with the promise to launch Gemini 2.0, its most capable model that it says is built for the 'new agentic era'. With new advances in multimodality — like native image and audio output — and native tool use, Google said the new launch "will enable us to build new Al agents that bring us closer to our vision of a universal assistant".

## Does your sunscreen irritate your eyes? Here's a guide

If it stings more than once, stop using the product immediately," she saidSunscreen can get into your eyes from various sources, even through sweat or when rubbing it in your face.

This pain is primarily due to prostaglandins, hormones that trigger uterine contractions to shed the uterine lining, which can radiate to the lower back," shared Dr Gandhali Deorkhkhar, Gynecologist & Obstetrics, Wockhardt Hospitals, Mumbai Central. According to her, conditions like endometriosis, fibroids, ectopic pregnancy, PID, and pelvic cysts can also cause severe pain.

"Fluctuations in hormones like prostaglandins can cause muscle contractions, leading to pain. The uterus contracts to shed its lining, which can radiate pain to the lower back. Besides increased inflammation during menstruation, stress and tension in the pelvic muscles can lead to referred pain in the back," shared Dr Hansaji Yogendra – Director, The Yoga Institute, Yoga Guru & Author. Deorkhkhar shared that home remedies to alleviate lower back pain may include massage, heat therapy, exercise, and dietary changes, such as reducing processed foods and sugar. Herbal remedies like basil, chamomile, and ginger root may provide relief. "Nonsteroidal Anti-Inflammatory Drugs (NSAID) are commonly recommended by doctors, and some women find hormonal birth control helpful in managing the pain. Regular stretching and walking breaks can also



alleviate discomfort," she added.

How can you reduce this pain?

Dr Yogendra shared that taking the following proactive measures can help alleviate or prevent lower back pain during menstruation.

- 1. Engage in regular physical activity to strengthen core muscles and improve flexibility.
- 2. Incorporate meditation, deep breathing exercises & gentle stretches in your daily routine.
- 3. Including Asanas like Bhujangasana, Ushtrasana, Viparita Karani and Supta Vakrasana in your Yoga practice strengthens the lower back.
- 4. Limit intake of caffeine and salty foods to prevent water retention and lessen bloating.

### Dietitian says even wooden chopping boards aren't safe – we find out what can you use instead

Wooden chopping boards, with their timeless appeal, are often a staple in these kitchens. However, as convenient as they are, these boards come with hidden risks that could affect your family's health if not handled properly.

Varsha Gorey, Senior Clinical Dietitian, Apollo Hospitals Navi Mumbai said that wood, by its very nature, is porous, which means it readily absorbs moisture from the foods we cut on it—be it the juices of fresh tomatoes, the residue of raw chicken, or the oils from ginger and garlic. In a tropical country like India, where high humidity levels prevail for much of the year, this moisture creates an environment perfect for bacteria, mould, and fungi to thrive. "Over time, regular wear and tear leave tiny grooves and scratches on the surface of wooden chopping boards. These small crevices are difficult to clean thoroughly, allowing harmful pathogens like Salmonella, E. coli, and Listeria to lodge themselves. These bacteria can contaminate the food we prepare, increasing the risk of foodborne illnesses," she said. Moreover, as wooden boards age, she added that they may begin to splinter, shedding tiny wood particles into your

food. Consuming these particles might seem harmless, but they can irritate the digestive tract or, worse, introduce toxic chemicals if the board has been treated or varnished. Health risks associated with using wooden boards1. Stomach flu: Pathogens such as E. coli and Salmonella from improperly sanitized wooden boards can lead to foodborne illnesses. Due to the gastrointestinal infection, people experience symptoms like fever, diarrhoea, vomiting, and dehydration, nausea, and fever. Young children and elderly family members are especially vulnerable to these infections.2. Fungal Contamination: In damp kitchens, wooden boards can develop mold. This is not just a hygiene issue—it can result in the formation of mycotoxins, which are harmful compounds linked to respiratory issues and allergic reactions.3. Gastrointestinal Irritation: Tiny wood splinters or particles shed from old boards can irritate the stomach lining, potentially causing discomfort or, in rare cases, intestinal injuries.4. Cross-Contamination: Indian kitchens often see the same chopping board being used for raw meat, fish, and vegetables without proper sanitization between uses.

### Abhishek Bachchan escapes unhurt, but did Shoojit Sircar slaughter his own film on the edit table?



Painful as it is to admit, director Shoojit Sircar's incredible hot-streak has now come to an end. It was perhaps the single greatest run in contemporary Hindi cinema, and we're fortunate to have lived through it. But it was also too good to last. In the last decade or so, Sircar directed films as diverse as the screwball comedy Piku, the achingly romantic October, the harrowing historical Sardar Udham, and the subversive satire Gulabo Sitabo. But the dream run has ended with I Want to Talk – a bittersweet comedy about a terminally ill man, played by Abhishek Bachchan. The movie debuted on Amazon Prime Video recently, after a token theatrical release some weeks ago.

I Want to Talk begins agreeably enough, and during the first act, seems to mimic the quietly observational style that made October such a masterpiece. But it goes entirely off the rails the minute it turns into a sort of Piku prequel. Ironically enough, I Want to Talk doesn't seem to know what it wants to say. Is it an inspiring tale of one man's will to live? Does it want to examine the thorny relationship that he shares with his daughter? Is it a character study? Or is it a dark comedy about his compulsive obsession with surgeries? It's unclear. And by the 30-minute mark, you'll likely be struck by the creeping realisation that the movie has slipped completely out of Sircar's hand. The messiness becomes so magnified that you're left with only one conclusion: I Want to Talk was slaughtered on the edit table.

Or — and this is a much worse hypothesis — Sircar went to the United States, and returned with a half-shot film. A version of this happened to Hansal Mehta, who will never be able to live down the fact that he worked with Kangana Ranaut in her post-bigot era, no matter how many Faraazes he makes. I Want to Talk first inspires such conspiracy theories when, seemingly out of the blue, the protagonist's parents show up without a proper introduction, and behave as if they've been a part of the movie all along. The protagonist is a man named Arjun Das, who is introduced to us as a cold-blooded marketeer of some kind.

Arjun's worldview is so nihilistic, he makes Jordan Belfort and Gordon Gekko look like Red Cross emissaries. Within the first 10 minutes, he is diagnosed with cancer, and given just 100 days to live. He has a young daughter with his ex-wife, but he doesn't seem to be too bothered about her. Sitting on the porch after having undergone a round of chemotherapy, his daughter Reya innocently asks him if he'll dance on her wedding day. He says that he will. This exchange is clearly supposed to incite a change of heart, or at least foreshadow it. But either because of

Bachchan's flat line delivery or Sircar's confused direction, the moment barely registers. And so, when Arjun refers to it as a 'promise' that he made to Reya later on in the film, the declaration comes across as unearned.

For one, you never quite see his relationship with Reya evolve. She seemingly finds out about his dozens of surgeries years after he's had them. But she was with him the entire time. How did she not know what he was going through? Arjun would also make special videos for her from his hospital bed; did she never watch them? Did he not send them to her? It makes very little sense. But what's even more confusing is the suddenness with which they appear to bond. This evolution might have even worked, but as experienced in the film, it's like jumping from point A to point C without going through point B first.In one scene, Reya doesn't mince her words as she tells Arjun about the childhood trauma that his actions have inflicted upon her. And in the very next scene, he's admitting to his poor parenting. Wasn't there a more organic way to bridge this gap? There probably was, but I Want to Talk is the kind of movie that reveals the existence of Arjun's blood-brother after an hour has already passed, via a voiceover that was clearly added in post-production. "This is my brother," Arjun says, almost satirically. Bro is never seen again. Or even spoken about. Even Arjun's ex-wife has no role to play in the movie, beyond a single scene. Granted, she isn't an important character, but the movie barely respects those who are. For instance, the kind nurse who develops a bond with Arjun during his illness, and remains in touch with him through

Normally, a movie like this would examine the impact that life-threatening circumstances can have on people. And to a degree, I Want to Talk wants us to believe that Arjun has become a more empathetic man over the years. But aside from his accent, little about him changes. He remains just as self-centred as he was in the first scene, but for some reason, develops an uncle accent as he grows older. I Want to Talk lacks the grace of Sircar's previous work, and while the film isn't as inept as 90% of the output his contemporaries produce, the bar is simply too high with him. Even the final act, which suddenly introduces a marathon angle, feels like it's missing key pieces. Going by the version presented to us, it seems like Arjun is simply trying to get fit when he begins training under an instructor. But it is eventually revealed that he wants to participate in an endurance event in a faraway state. When did this happen? This development is presented to us like something that Arjun had been building towards this whole time. But it never came up. Things become weirder when he leaves Reya in their hotel room and goes to the marathon by himself. She catches up with him, and promises to accompany him to the finish line. It's a touching moment, wrapping their shared arc in a neat little bow. But in the very next moment, Reya runs off by herself, leaving Arjun all alone once again. "Drama begins where logic ends," a wise man once said. But you only begin questioning the logic when there is no drama. 
#### 'Amitabh Bachchan put his reputation at stake and RGV Ki Aag became a laughing stock,' says Ram Gopal Varma

The third T20I will be played in Rajkot on Tuesday, with the fourth match scheduled on Friday in Pune. The fifth and final T20I will be played in Mumbai on Sunday, February 2.

## What's troubling Lakshya Sen? From the Viktor Axelsen challenge to finishing woes in matches

Lakshya Sen's re-entry into Top 10 of the world rankings this past week, might have come about, thanks to indifferent results of other contenders. But some patterns in his losses remain pervasive. For a Top 4 finisher at the Olympics, it remains surprising that he has never made finals of a Super 750 tournament, while the All England Super 1000 final of 2022 is a one-off on the Tour. But even factoring in that Sen will be choosy and peak for big tournaments, owing to a defensively body-battering game style needing rationing of energies, his history of scalping marquee names at will, is rather sparse.

Sen aces a few match-ups, like he knows he can get the better of Anthony Ginting 3-0 (Head 2 Head), Li Shi Feng (7-4), Lee Zii Jia (5-2) and Loh Kean Yew (6-3). But he has also lost the Youth Olympics gold to Shi Feng and Paris Olympics bronze to Zii Jia. But he's compiling some repetitive H2Hs against Viktor Axelsen (1-8 win loss), Anders Antonsen (2-5) and Kunlavut Vitidsarn (3-6), which can chip at his confidence if not corrected intermittently. Still, his win against Jonatan Christie to get out of the group despite trailing him 2-4 in career scores, offer hope.

Viktor: Points differential

According to Badminton World Federation records, Viktor Axelsen has scored a massive 110 points more than Sen in their 9 matches (Sen has 297 points, Axelsen has 407, 1-8 H2H). Though the double Olympic champ, has an over 100-point differential against every player except Antonsen (4-6 H2H), Lee Zii Jia (3-7) and Li Shi Feng (1-0), there is a direct correlation between the wins teased out of the towering Dane and the number of points he's allowed to fleece. Not only does Sen need to defend well against him, he needs a far larger number of winners. The endgame from 18th point onwards is when Axelsen can swamp - or be swamped right back. Sen's point differential against his Thai contemporary Kunlavut Vitidsarn (points differential of -48) is particularly pesky to score off. Sen has 3 wins and 6 losses against the monkishly steady player with variety in stroke play. Sen has 2 wins, 4 losses against Christie (point differential of -5), Kodai Naraoka (-25) and Chou Tien Chen (Sen scored 316 points, ceded 315), all pointing to him staying in contention in the game, but not finishing well enough. Sen has a steady grip on Li Shi Feng, the Chinese heir apparent, with a 7-4 H2H, and a healthy +60 points differential. Sen will not balk at the prospect of facing him will be tested as time goes by. Finishing woesWhile losing 16-21, 21-12, 23-21 to Kenta Nishimoto at Indonesia Masters in Round 1, could be down to sub-par sharpness in the 73 minute battle, Sen has clearly struggled to summon his clutch play, evident in both Paris Olympic losses. At Jakarta,




he did well to come back from 16-19 down in decider to 19-all, but his shot selection and strategy got muddled as he navigated those 20-20, 21-21 situations in stringing those 2-3 points together.

Against Lu Guang Zu at Denmark, another three setter, Sen was 21-12, 16-11 up, but utterly botched it from 17-17.

Like the Olympics bronze playoff, losing these leads when being moments away from winning, completely deflates him in the third. Against Axelsen at Paris, Sen led 15-9 and 20-17, but couldn't convert. Against Anders Antonsen at the Indonesia Open, he had two leads, 20-18 in the first, and 16-14 in second, and lost in straight sets. The shock of holding the lead, then losing it, paralyses Sen completely at the crunch as he approaches the finish line as if it was a barbed wire.

Slabs of blanknessA 'wodge' is a good word to describe the inexplicable bands or blocks of time-passages in a Lakshya Sen match when things go south. The youngster is not mentally brittle by any measure, he has in fact scored famous wins nicking them at crucial times. But midway through a set, with no warning whatsoever, Sen can suddenly slump. Whether it's a dip in concentration or trying too hard, or simply letting the opponent do his thing as he phlegmatically watches, only his team can figure. But Sen is notorious for losing points in a chunk. Against Axelsen, Sen has suddenly conceded 6 points or more (once, even 10 in a row), a whole 9 times, leaving the door ajar, and unable to stem the flood. Zii Jia famously collected 9 in a row, when he took Paris bronze. He probably needs the good ol' slowing-down tricks to not get blown away like this. But just when he managed to restrict the likes of Antonser and kept it tight, Sen bungles a finish. Thrice now though, Sen has gone on a 6+ point run of his own against Axelsen and still lost the match. These up and down bursts and caveins of energy perhaps need a median point, or staying in the present, as Kunlavut has mastered.

He has won this tournament with an abdominal tear, won this tournament with a hamstring injury. So please show some respect."Zverev on Friday had said he was also surprised by Djokovic's retirement but noted the Serb's movement had fallen away in the tiebreak. "I thought it was a high-level first set," the world No 2 added. "Of course there are some difficulties ... in the tiebreak he was not moving. I did see him struggle a bit more.'

#### 'Complete hors\*\*\*\*t': FIDE vs players war heats up as Hikaru Nakamura hits out at CEO Emil Sutovsky

World No 2 Hikaru Nakamura has lashed out at FIDE CEO Emil Sutovsky for "personal insults" aimed at him in a long tweet posted on X by Sutovsky recently. In a video posted on his YouTube handle, Hikaru Nakamura called out Sutovsky's long tweet where the FIDE official took potshots at the American GM. Some of the world's most prominent players and FIDE have recently argued over the upcoming Freestyle Chess Grand Slam tour, with players like Magnus Carlsen and Nakamura even contemplating pulling out of the FIDE World Rapid and Blitz Championship in New York.

"I'm not the one creating this (the Freestyle Chess Grand Slam tour). So I find this really bizarre that I am the one he chooses to attack. I'm not spearheading this. This is being spearheaded by Magnus Carlsen and Jan Henric Buettner. This is a personal insult," Hikaru Nakamura said in the video. "I don't know why he has to try and attack me. I can also make personal attacks but I choose not to. I have no equity in Freestyle Chess. I don't have any contract with them that I'm going to play every tournament or anything along those lines. So, it's kind of weird to try and make this in some way about me. It's funny that I'm apparently the bad guy."

In 2025, the Freestyle Chess Grand Slam Tour will be a series of five chess events in cities like Weissenhaus, Paris, New York, New Delhi, and Cape Town. FIDE's top management has been at loggerheads with the organisers of the Freestyle Grand Slam Tour and the Freestyle Players Club, which includes Magnus Carlsen, over the upcoming tour. The bone of contention has been the organizers of the Freestyle event wanting to call their event a "World Championship". FIDE has objected to this, stating that as global governing body of chess, they alone hold the rights to decide which event can be called a "World Championship".

Hikaru Nakamura slammed Sutovsky for claiming that FIDE creates a lot of money for players. Sutovsky had posted on X: "FIDE does provide a lot of income for top players. Hikaru may not have won any amount significant enough for a top streamer - but here are the prize funds: World Championship Match: 2.5M USD, World Cup 2M+, Rapid and Blitz 1.428M, Grand Swiss is about to have almost 1M, etc."At this, Hikaru Nakamura clapped back saying: "This is complete horses\*\*t. This is complete horses\*\*t. The players are not making 2.5 million dollars." Nakamura pointed out that all the sums quoted by FIDE CEO were overall prize funds for the entire field competing, besides the World Championship, where the prize money was split between two "lucky players". He said that while FIDE CEO was trying to "make it look impressive", the money was actually being split among the whole field."All this money gets watered down and players are not making that much money. The top players make most of their money from other events like Norway Chess, Grand Chess Tour and German Bundesliga," Hikaru Nakamura said.

## Harbhajan Singh questions absence of Sanju Samson and Yuzvendra Chahal from India's Champions Trophy squad

Former India cricketer Harbhajan Singh has raised questions over the absence of wicketkeeper-batter Sanju Samson and leg-spinner Yuzvendra Chahal from India's Champions Trophy squad. "Truly, I feel bad for him (Sanju)," Harbhajan told Switch. "He scores runs but he is dropped. I know you can only select 15, but I feel his batting suits the format. "He has an average of 55-56, but he isn't even there as a second wicketkeeper. When we talk about selecting him, people ask, in whose place? Places can be made," he said. Samson has scored a brilliant century in his last ODI outing against South Africa in December 2023. In the 14 outings, 30-year has batting average of 56.66 in ODI cricket. Harbhajan also lambasted selectors for not picking variety in the spin department. India have picked Ravindra Jadeja, Axar Patel, Washington Sundar and Kuldeep Yadav in their 15-member squad but the former India spinner feels the selectors missed a trick by not picking Yuzvendra Chahal.In 72 ODI matches played in his career so far, Chahal has picked 121 wickets at an average of 27.13 and an economy of 5.26 with two five-wicket hauls to his name. "Sanju isn't there. Yuzvendra Chahal isn't there, too,"

"You could've included a leg-spinner for variation, too. Chahal is a superb bowler. "I don't know what wrong he did, that he doesn't fit in this team," Harbhajan said. India are in Group A in the Champions Trophy and begin their campaign against Bangladesh on February 20, after which they play Pakistan on February 23, and New Zealand on March 2.

## Australian Open final, Aryna Sabalenka vs Madison Keys: Head-to-head, key facts, when and where to watch

Defending champion Aryna Sabalenka will battle American 19th seed Madison Keys in the final on Saturday looking to become the first woman since Martina Hingis from 1997-99 to win the Australian Open title three times in a row. Victory on Saturday would see the world No 1 become the sixth woman to win three straight Australian Open titles, joining Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, Steffi Graf, Monica Seles, and Hingis. It's a feat that has not been achieved in 25 years. At the other end of the spectrum is 29-year-old Keys, looking for that elusive first Major. Despite an impressive start to 2025, few would have expected Keys to get this far but the 29-year-old is a worthy finalist having beaten world No 2 Iga Swiatek in the last four. Swiatek was the third top 10 seed to lose to Keys after the American defeated sixth seed Elena Rybakina in the last 16 and 10th seed Danielle Collins in the third round. Keys lost to compatriot Sloane Stephens in her only previous trip to a Grand Slam final at the 2017 U.S. Open

Two of those clashes came at the Grand Slam level, with Sabalenka prevailing at the US Open semifinal as well as the Wimbledon quarterfinal in 2023. The US Open semifinal defeat was particularly tough on Keys, as she lost the match after blanking Sabalenka 0-6 in the first set. Keys' solitary win against Sabalenka came in Berlin in 2021, a three-set victory. The big thing for me has just been knowing that there are going to be a lot of moments where I'm uncomfortable in the match.

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
