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Hyderabad Metro Rail announces 10 per cent discount on new revised fares

Hyderabad: L&T Metro Rail (Hyderabad) Limited (L&TMRHL) has announced a 10% discount on the newly revised fares, across all fare zones in all the three metro corridors, which will come into effect from May 24. The fare revision was introduced based on the recommendations of the Fare Fixation Committee (FFC) and as part of a comprehensive strategy to ensure the long-term sustainability of metro operations and maintenance, a press release said. This decision has been taken after carefully considering passenger feedback and reflecting the organization's commitment to enhancing commuter affordability while maintaining financial prudence.

Mullanpur, Ahmedabad set to host IPL play-offs

New Delhi: Ahmedabad has been shortlisted to host the Indian Premier League's final on June 3 along with Qualifier 2, while Mullanpur is likely to be the venue of the first two play-off games this month. Considering the monsoon, the BCCI has also shifted the May 23 fixture between Royal Challengers Bengaluru and SunRisers Hyderabad in Bengaluru to Lucknow. The last match at the Chinnaswamy Stadium was washed out. Hyderabad and Kolkata were supposed to host the play-offs as per the original dates but the IPL schedule had to be revised in the wake of the India-Pakistan military conflict that halted the event for a week.

Four killed, 17 injured in road crash in Vikarabad

Hyderabad: In a fatal incident, four persons died and at least 17 others were injured after a private bus

carrying a marriage party went out of control and crashed into a truck ahead at Rangapur village in Pargi mandal of Vikarabad district on Tuesday. The victims were identified as Balamma (60), Sandeep (26), Mallesh (30) and Ashwini (30), all relatives from different villages in Shabad mandal. According to the police, the incident occurred when the private bus was which was carrying about 50 persons was proceeding from Pargi towards Shabad. The victims who had attended a wedding in Pargi on May 16 were returning after the formal dinner at the bride's residence on Monday night. When the marriage party bus reached Rangapur outskirts around 2am on Tuesday, the driver is suspected to have lost control of the steering wheel and crashed into the truck ahead. The victims who were seated in the front part of the bus suffered grievous bleeding injuries and died on the spot and 17 others escaped with minor and medium injuries. The Pargi police are investigating.

They visited Pochampally village, which won the United Nations World Tourism Organisation's "Best World Tourism Village" award in November 2021 under the BRS government. This was followed by visits to the Integrated Command and Control Centre and Secretariat. At the ICCC, the contestants were briefed about the advanced surveillance system, the real-time policing and urban management and other facilities. At the Secretariat, the contestants were briefed about the administrative nerve centre of the State, besides the architectural significance of the structure. All these structures were constructed by the previous BRS government.



On Sunday, when they visited the Secretariat, a drone show was conducted on the premises. This show was also introduced in the State by the previous government. Interestingly, Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy had found fault with the presence of the Charminar and Kakatiya Thoranam in the State emblem, stating that they were representations of past dictatorships. He had also planned to make changes to the emblem. However, the Miss World contestants were taken to Charminar for a heritage walk. Likewise, they were taken to Rammappa Temple, which was inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list on July 25, 2021.On Tuesday, the Head to Head challenge of the 72nd Miss World festival kicked off at T-Hub, Hyderabad's innovation and entrepreneurship hub. This structure was also constructed by the previous government. Save for PowerPoint presentations on a few welfare and development initiatives which are in progress, the Congress government did not have much to show as its own, even after 18 months in power and has therefore conveniently forgotten what it said about the previous BRS government.

Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams to use anti-drone tech; approves transfer of non-Hindus

Hyderabad: The Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams (TTD) Board has decided to use anti-drone technology considering the security aspects at Lord Sri Venkateswara Swamy Temple, Tirumala. It also gave the nod for transfer of non-Hindu employees working in the TTD through alternative ways or by offering them Voluntary Retirement Scheme.

These decisions were taken during the TTD Board meeting held under the Chairmanship of TTD Trust Board Chairman BR Naidu at Tirumala on Tuesday. After the board meeting, TTD EO J Syamala Rao briefed media on the resolutions passed during the board meeting. The TTD Board has decided to take legal action against the DD Next Level film crew for remixing the "Govinda Namavali" mantra and hurting the sentiments of the devotees. It was also decided to receive technical and financial proposals from architects (consultants) to prepare a comprehensive master plan for development of Tiruchanoor, Amaravati, Narayanavanam, Kapilatheertham, Nagalapuram and Vontimitta temples. With devotees visiting Akashaganga and Papavinasanam areas in large numbers, it was decided to formulate a plan to further enhance the spiritual, environmental and infrastructure facilities here. This apart, measures to enhance Annaprasadam services to devotees at Vontimitta were



also approved. All the rest houses in Tirumala have been renamed after the deities except for two as the respective donors had not responded so far. The Board has decided that the names of these rest houses would be changed by the TTD itself, while with respect to the Sainik Niwas (Indian Army) rest house, negotiations would be held with the concerned regarding a name change. Following instructions of Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, the Board also decided to increase the green cover in the Tirumala Hills from the existing 68.14 percent to 80 percent through the Forest Department.

Kaleshwaram probe: Ghose Commission summons KCR, ex-ministers

Hyderabad: Justice P.C. Ghose Commission, which is probing irregularities in the execution of the Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation project, has summoned former chief minister and BRS president K. Chandrasekhar Rao. The Commission has also issued notices to former Minister T. Harish Rao and BJP MP Eatala Rajender. While K. Chandrasekhar Rao (KCR) has been asked to appear on June 5, BRS leader Harish Rao has been summoned on June 6. Rajender has been directed to appear before the Commission on June 9. During KCR's first term as the chief minister between 2014 and 2018, Harish Rao was the irrigation minister while Rajender held the finance portfolio. During KCR's second term from 2018 to 2023, Harish Rao was the finance minis-

ter, while the irrigation portfolio was with KCR. The Commission, headed by retired Supreme Court judge Pinaki Chandra Ghose, is probing the alleged irregularities in planning, design, construction, quality control, operation and maintenance of Medigadda, Annaram and Sundilla Barrages of the Kaleshwaram project. The one-man Commission was constituted in March 2024, a few months after some piers of the Medigadda Barrage caved in. The term of the Commission has been extended repeatedly for seven times so far after its initial term ended on June 30, 2024. Notices to KCR, Harish Rao and Rajender were issued a day after the state government extended the Commission's term for two more months, till July 31, to enable it to complete the examination of all those involved.

WHO Pandemic treaty: A shared commitment, need greater global cooperation, says PM Modi

New Delhi: The historic WHO Pandemic Treaty adopted today is a shared commitment that requires greater global cooperation, said Prime Minister Narendra Modi, while addressing the 78th Session of the World Health Assembly in Geneva on Tuesday. Addressing the gathering, via videoconferencing, he highlighted that this year's theme, 'One World for Health,' aligns with India's vision for global health. After three years of negotiations, the Agreement was adopted by consensus by member countries of the WHO at the ongoing 78th World Health Assembly. India is also a signatory to this treaty, which has been in talks since the Covid-19 outbreak, which killed millions of people worldwide. The treaty aims to bridge global healthcare gaps and inequities in case of future pandemics. "The WHO Pandemic Treaty is a shared commitment to fighting future pandemics through greater global cooperation," said PM Modi, while extending his congratulations on the successful negotiations of the treaty

While the Global South is particularly impacted by several health challenges, PM Modi stated that "India's approach provides replicable, scalable, and sustainable models". He also expressed India's willingness to share its learnings and best practices with the world, especially with the Global South. The Prime Minister emphasised the importance of building a healthy planet while ensuring that no one is left behind. "The future of a healthy world depends on inclusion,



an integrated vision, and collaboration," he said.Further, PM Modi also highlighted India's health reforms ranging from Ayushman Bharat -- the world's largest health insurance scheme, which covers 580 million people and provides free treatment -- to the increased role of technology in improving health outcomes, as well as the rise in Government Health Expenditure, leading to a significant decline in Out-of-Pocket Expenditure of the citizens. "The health of the world depends on how well we care for the most vulnerable", underlined the Prime Minister. Emphasising India's role as the birthplace of Yoga, the Prime Minister also extended an invitation to all countries for the upcoming 11th International Day of Yoga in June. The theme this year is 'Yoga for One Earth, One Health'

Operation Sindoor was a 'small act of war', says Congress President Kharge

Vijayanagara: Congress President and Leader of the Opposition in the Rajya Sabha, Mallikarjun Kharge, on Tuesday, described Operation Sindoor as a "small act of war." "Prime Minister Narendra Modi was supposed to visit Kashmir on the 17th. The intelligence agencies informed him not to visit the Valley, and he got the programme cancelled. If he (PM Modi) knew this, why didn't he inform the tourists through the police when he cancelled the programme scheduled for the 17th?" said the Congress President while addressing Samarpane Sankalpa rally in Hospet town, held to mark the completion of two years of the Congress-led government in the state.

"Had you informed the public about it, these small incidents of war or the ongoing conflict with Pakistan, this could have been prevented," said Kharge about Operation Sindoor.Kharge further alleged that Prime Minister Narendra Modi did not utter a single word about the Pahalgam incident. "This cannot be tolerated. We are united as a nation. Caste and religion come later," he said. He alleged that PM Modi is being treated as more important than the nation. There was information of threats in Kashmir, but he did not share information with the poor," he added. Not only PM Modi, the Congress President said that the Opposition also stands with the nation. "PM Modi cannot take the credit for representing patriotism alone. Indira Gandhi and Rajiv Gandhi sacrificed their lives for this country. Mahatma Gandhi gave us independence and laid down his life. This is the legacy of the Congress. And you (PM Modi) want to blame us. You file cases against us. You served notices in



the National Herald case through the ED, CBI, and Income Tax departments. You want to bring us down. That will not happen," Kharge claimed. On the issue of representing the country abroad on matters of terrorism, Kharge said, "Even though the delegation was selected without informing Congress, we agreed without raising objections. This is how we stand with the nation."He added that Congress got the Constitution under the leadership of Ambedkar and Nehru. "Congress must protect it. Mere words are not enough. Everyone must be included," he said.Kharge also referred to a BJP minister targeting Colonel Sofiya Qureshi, a defence spokesperson, and alleging links to Pakistan. "What punishment should be given to that minister? She is being targeted just because her name is Qureshi. PM Modi should first seek their resignation. They should be removed from their positions," said the Congress President.

Telangana to reduce academic load on degree students with new syllabus, fewer credits

Hyderabad: The academic load on Telangana degree students is expected to come down as new syllabus for undergraduate programmes will be rolled out from the forthcoming academic year i.e., 2025-26. The Telangana Council of Higher Education is working on introducing a new syllabus for degree courses with fewer credits, which means less syllabus and academic burden on students. If the proposal fructifies, students who secure 120 credits will be awarded their degrees. Presently, for degrees to be granted, students need to earn 150 credits in the three years of the course work. As part of the syllabus revision, major reshuffling is being done on how credits are distributed among different subjects. The number of credits allotted for the languages, first language English and second language (Telugu/Hindi), are expected to come down from 20 to 12. Similarly, the credits for electives are likely to be reduced from 30 to 22. The TGCHE is making these changes as per the recommendations of the University Grants Commission, which set uniform credits of 120 for degree programmes offered by higher educational institutions across the country. The Council, which has already begun the syllabus revision exercise, is holding consultations with universities officials and boards of studies on proposed changes in the credits system. A meeting with universities vice chancellors will be conducted shortly during which a final decision will be arrived at. Meanwhile, the proposal to reduce credits in English language did not go down well with Osmania University's English department. During an emergency annual departmental meeting with all the campus, constituent, government, private and autonomous colleges on Monday, English professors and lecturers strongly pitched for retaining the existing 20 credits for English language in degree programmes.

Minister Should Intervene in the RTC Hired Bus Drivers' Strike: CITU District Committee Member Budida Ganesh"





Gangadhar attempted to flee the scene, but was chased down by locals and restrained until the police arrived.

Hyderabad's new skywalk at Mehdipatnam likely to operate from July

Hyderabad: Work on the city's newest iconic skywalk at the busy Mehdipatnam junction is progressing briskly, and the Hyderabad Metropolitan Development Authority (HMDA) plans to complete the work within three months.

The fabrication of steel pedestrian skywalks between Humayun Nagar Police Station and Rythu Bazar and from Gudimalkapur Traffic Junction to Mehdipatnam bus bay has been completed, and lifts are under way. Work on a footover-bridge connecting Mehdipatnam Rythu Bazar and the bus bay (Defence area) towards Sarojini Devi Eye Hospital, are in progress. The Ministry of Defence gave its nod in 2024 January to build the skywalk on its 2,500 sq yards of land at Mehdipatnam. As per the schedule, the proposed skywalk was supposed to be completed in March 2023, but the same got delayed.

The 390-metre long elevated skywalk has five entry and exit points at Rythu Bazar, Defence compound wall (Military Garrison), bus bay area (Mehdipatnam), near Humayun Nagar Police Station, and at Gudimalkapur Junction. "The cost of the skywalk project is Rs 38 crore and it is scheduled to be completed by August," said an HMDA official. Officials said the skywalk also has 21,061sft of commercial space and coffee shops, gateway corners, and lounge snacks are planned on the proposed skywalk. The swanky skywalk has 13 elevators, two intermediate tunnel walks, and stretches. It is expected to cater a heavy footfall of 30,000 in a day and ensure pedestrian safety in addition to easing traffic congestion at Mehdipatnam junction.

The skywalk is built in glass and steel, and hosts a range of facilities, including six access points at a height of 6.15 metres from the ground, officials said. The 380-metre bridge will be supported by suspension cords and has 13 elevators with a combined capacity of 450 passengers. An exclusive elevator chair is proposed for the physically challenged. Drying paddy on roads turn into death traps for motorcyclists in Telangana's Karimnagar

Karimnagar: The practice of drying paddy on roads is turning into a life threat for people moving on motorcycles, with many hitting paddy heaps without noticing them. While three persons died, many were injured within a span of 10 days in such incidents in the erstwhile Karimnagar district. A 32-year-old person, Nerella Ranjith Kiran, died when the bike he was riding hit a paddy heap near Mallapur of Thimmapur mandal on Saturday night. A native of Mugdumpur, Ranjith met with the accident while returning from Mallapur along with his friend Sadij. While Ranjith died on the spot, Sadij sustained injuries.

Another youth died in a similar incident at Mallareddypet, Ghambiraopet mandal of Rajanna-Sircilla district on May 14. Sheik Khaleel and his friend Shekhar met with an accident while riding a bike from Lingannapet to Mallannapet. While Khaleel died on the spot, Shekhar sustained serious injuries. Ten days ago, a couple, Sammi Reddy and Manemma, sustained serious injuries when the bike they were travelling on hit a paddy heap between Mamidalapalli and Pachunur. Though Sammi Reddy recovered from the injuries, Manemma died after four days while undergoing treatment in a hospital in Hyderabad.

In the latest incident, three persons Kancha Kumar, wife Pavani and their son Raghava, sustained injuries

Harish Rao asks Congress Govt to release hiked salaries to mini Anganwadi workers in Telangana

Hyderabad: Former Minister and senior BRS MLA T Harish Rao criticised the Congress government for its unjust treatment of mini Anganwadi workers and for depriving them of their hiked salaries for the last year. He demanded that the government pay salaries as per the increased pay grade and also credit the arrears into their accounts immediately. Harish Rao shot a missive to Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, charging the Congress government with political opportunism. He pointed out that 3,989 mini Anganwadi workers who were serving in the most remote rural and tribal belts were subjected to financial and emotional hardship due to erratic policy implementation. He reminded that the previous BRS government had issued orders upgrading mini Anganwadis to Anganwadi status in September 2023, but implementation was stalled due to the election code. The former Minister said the Congress government merely reissued the same order in December 2023 for political mileage. After briefly paying a hiked salary of Rs 13,650 for three months, the government reverted to the old mini Anganwadi pay scale of Rs 7,800 from April

Yet, the enhanced salaries were disbursed only in eight districts this May. "Mini Anganwadi workers are not campaign tools. They are grassroots workers serving the poorest. He demanded that increased salaries to mini Anganwadi workers be paid retrospectively from January 2024, with helpers appointed immediately wherever needed.

Lakshadweep atolls shaped and reshaped by natural phenomena, biological and human activity: IITGN study

Lakshadweep sediment study, IIT Gandhinagar coral research, Agatti Kavaratti lagoon sediments, The study paints a detailed picture of how these islands are being shaped and reshaped by natural phenomena. Researchers from the REEFS Lab at the Indian Institute of Technology, Gandhinagar (IITGN), who studied the processes, which form and maintain two of Lakshadweep's atolls -Agatti and Kavaratti — in Kavaratti, particularly near a dredging channel, observed a noticeable shift in sediment composition. The shift is marked by a decline in coral clasts and an increase in contributions from Halimeda and molluscs, concluding that human activity has left its mark on these delicate systems. The researchers, through fieldwork and analysis, found that more than 95 per cent of the lagoon sediments in Agatti and Kavaratti consist of biogenic material, composed mainly of coral, mollusc, and foraminiferal fragments, which are less than 2 mm in size. These sediments, known as biodetrital grainstone, reflect a system primarily driven by biological productivity rather than inorganic processes. Interestingly, unlike these atolls, the ones in the Maldives show a greater contribution from calcareous algae such as Halimeda, marking a distinct difference in sediment sources across the atolls

Deprived teachers move Calcutta HC against CM's relief for Group C and D staff

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee had announced a monthly ex gratia allowance for Group C and Group D staff from the 2016 School Service Commission (SSC) panel who lost their jobs, following a Supreme Court order last month. On Tuesday, teachers deprived of a salary approached the Calcutta High Court, challenging this decision. The matter was mentioned before Justice Amrita Sinha, who granted permission to file the case. Speaking to The Indian Express, counsel Sudipto Dasgupta, who mentioned the matter, said, "(The ex gratia payment) is unconstitutional and violates the right to equality and the right to life. It goes against the Supreme Court order."

The state government had announced the ex gratia decision following a cabinet meeting. Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee had stated from Nabanna, "Under a scheme of the West Bengal Labour Department, Group C will receive Rs 25,000 and Group D will receive Rs 20,000, effective from April 1, 2025." The families who have lost their jobs are in great difficulty. The matter is currently sub-judice. We will file a review petition before the Supreme Court on its previous verdict and await its order, with which we will surely abide. But until that verdict is received, they will get this allowance," Banerjee told reporters.

She added that a special fund, the West Bengal Livelihood and Social Security Fund, had been created. A few weeks ago, Chief Secretary Manoj Pant held a meeting with



representatives of Group C and D employees, during which the Chief Minister also addressed them virtually and assured them of the allowance. On April 3, a Supreme Court division bench comprising Chief Justice of India Sanjiv Khanna and Justice Sanjay Kumar dismissed 25,753 teaching and non-teaching staff employed in state-run and stateaided schools, upholding a Calcutta High Court order. Two weeks later, the Supreme Court allowed teachers of Classes IX to XII to return to their posts and instructed the state government to restart the recruitment process, to be completed by December 31. However, no such relief was extended to the Group C and D staff.

MMRDA gets Rs 1,500-crore for Ramabai Nagar slum redevelopment

Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA) has secured a Rs 1,500 crore loan sanction from Bank of Maharashtra to being redeveloping Kamraj Nagar and Ramabai Ambedkar Nagar in Ghatkopar. This will be the first phase of the Rs 8,498-crore Slum Rehabilitation Authority (SRA) project. The project, which aims to rehabilitate about 17,000 slum dwellers with free 1 BHK houses of 300 sq ft, is MMRDA's first initiative in slum redevelopment. The project involves constructing residential units, in addition to creating necessary amenities like gardens, health centres, and educational facilities.

The redevelopment of Ramabai Nagar is one of the largest urban rejuvenation projects ever carried out in Mumbai and seeks to turn densely populated slums into structured, secure and dignified housing clusters. According to MMRDA officials, the initiative marks a change in attitude from short-term relief to long-term community development with improved infrastructure and higher living standards at its core.

"This redevelopment scheme is a shining example of our government's vision of developing an equitable, futureready Mumbai where every citizen has a right opportunity to thrive," Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis said, underlining the state's determination to solve long-pending slum issues through active governance and sustainable funding mechanisms. "Our vision is to uplift communities by pro-



viding not just housing, but dignity and security. It reflects our resolve to drive inclusive urban growth that leaves no community behind," he added. Groundwork for this redevlopment was conducted during the Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government's tenure, which had suggested redeveloping Ramabai Ambedkar Nagar as part of a larger scheme to engage different government agencies in making Mumbai slum-free. The plan was brought up by CEO of the SRA and approved later by then Chief Minister Eknath Shinde. Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde, who also heads MMRDA, said the funding will bring transformative change to thousands of families in slum pockets. "The Rs 1,500-crore loan approval is a strong endorsement of the Government of Maharashtra and MMRDA's shared vision for transforming lives through infrastructure." he said, highlighting the effect of improved housing on well being in the community.

Show cause notice to contractor at Kala Ghoda parking lot for charging double from four-wheeler owners

The Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) on Tuesday issued showcause notices and lodged a complaint against a contractor responsible for maintaining the civic body's public parking lot at Kala Ghoda in front of the Jehangir Art Gallery. Issuing a statement, civic authorities said the contractor was charging double the specified rate of park-

ing charges from owners of four-wheelers. According to the BMC's tariff, parking a two-wheeler in a civic-body owned parking lot costs Rs 20 per hour, while the cost of parking a four-wheeler is Rs 70 for an hour. "During our inspection, we discovered that the contractor was charging four wheeler owners Rs 150 for every hour, which was more than double the amount as mentioned in our tariff. We also noticed that the contractors were allowing parking at areas where 'No Parking' boards were displayed and the marshals employed there were not wearing uniforms as well," said a civic official on Tuesday. Civic officials said they carried out a 'sting operation' after they received multiple complaints of the parking contractors charging exorbitantly.

Civic officials said besides lodging police complaints, a penalty of Rs 10,000 has been imposed on the contractor for fleecing citizens. In addition to this, a separate penalty of Rs 4,000 was also imposed on the contractor for allowing parking of vehicles at the 'no parking' site. Another penalty of Rs 1,000 was imposed on the marshals since they were not wearing uniforms.

Shivraj Thakur, a Science student, has his eyes set on Delhi, the national capital. "It's not just about the college, but it's the exposure too. I want to attend events, workshops, and meet professionals. Metro cities just offer more beyond textbooks," he says. The energy and resources available in cities like Delhi, Mumbai, and Bangalore are seen as catalysts for both academic and extracurricular growth. Beyond academics and geography, campus culture is emerging as a strong influence. Students nowadays are seeking an environment that supports personal development and offers a vibrant student life. Grishma Kadam, a student from Versatile School and Junior College, highlights the importance of campus ambience.

"It is important to have a good environment along with education. This time is crucial and cannot be gained back. It's not just education, I want experiences too," she says. "Colleges come with more networking opportunities and internships. That matters as much as classroom teaching,"



she adds, pointing to the growing importance of soft skills, peer learning, and co-curricular engagement. Masum Agarwal, another student preparing for graduation, places equal weight on ambience, reputation, and placements. "For me, along with the curriculum, the college should have a good reputation and provide good placements. Even the events play a major role as they give practical exposure to students," he says. Anita Anand sworn in as Canada's first Hindu Foreign Minister

In a landmark moment for Canada's Indo-Canadian community, Anita Anand, Member of Parliament (MP) from Oakville East, has been appointed Canada's Minister of Foreign Affairs, becoming the first woman of Hindu heritage to hold this prestigious portfolio. Sworn in on May 13, with her hand on the Bhagavad Gita, Anand headlines a diverse cabinet under Prime Minister Mark Carney, which includes three other Indian-origin leaders: Maninder Sidhu as Minister of International Trade, and Ruby Sahota and Randeep Sarai as Secretaries of State. Anita Anand, 58, born to Indian immigrant parents — a Tamil mother, Saroj, and a Punjabi father, S V Anand, both physicians — has shattered glass ceilings throughout her career. Raised in Kentville, Nova Scotia, Anand's academic journey took her to Queen's University, Oxford, and the University of Toronto, where she earned a law degree and later became a distinguished professor. Her political ascent began in 2019 when she was elected MP for Oakville, becoming the first Hindu woman in Canada's House of Commons.

Anand's ministerial record is formidable. As Minister of Public Services and Procurement (2019-2021), she spearheaded Canada's Covid-19 vaccine procurement, earning global praise for securing millions of doses. She later served as Minister of National Defence (2021–2024), overseeing military modernization and Canada's support for Ukraine. Her appointment as Foreign Minister, replacing Mélanie Joly, positions her as a key architect of Canada's global diplomacy amid tensions with the US over trade and security.Maninder Sidhu: Trade Champion from Brampton? Maninder Sidhu, 42, MP for Brampton East, steps into the role of Minister of International Trade, a critical portfolio as Canada navigates US tariff threats under President Donald Trump. Born in Punjab, India, Sidhu immigrated to Canada as a child, growing up in Brampton's vibrant Punjabi community. A business graduate from the University of Toronto, he worked as a real estate professional and community organizer before entering politics.

Elected in 2019, Sidhu has been a vocal advocate for small businesses and trade diversification, particularly with India and the Indo-Pacific. His Punjabi heritage and fluency in Punjabi have strengthened ties with Brampton's South Asian electorate. As a Liberal MP, he served on the Standing Committee on International Trade, preparing him to lead Canada's trade strategy. "Maninder's grassroots connection and trade expertise will drive economic growth," said Brampton Mayor Patrick Brown.Ruby Sahota: Tackling Crime in Brampton?Ruby Sahota, 44, MP for Brampton North—Caledon, has been named Secretary of State for

Combatting Crime, a role supporting the Minister of Public Safety. Born in Toronto to Punjabi parents who immigrated from Punjab, Sahota's Indian heritage shapes her community-focused approach. Elected in 2015, Sahota became one of the first Indo-Canadian women MPs. Known for her work on youth engagement and public safety, she chaired the Standing Committee on Procedure and House Affairs. Her new role addresses rising concerns about gang violence and organized crime in Brampton, a priority for her constituents. "Ruby's legal background and community ties make her ideal to tackle crime," said a local community leader.Randeep Sarai: Advancing Global Development? Randeep Sarai, 50, MP for Surrey Centre, assumes the role of Secretary of State for International Development, supporting Canada's foreign aid and global partnerships. Born in Punjab, India, Sarai immigrated to Canada at age 11, settling in British Columbia's Sikh heartland. A lawyer by training, he founded a successful legal practice in Surrey, focusing on real estate and immigration law. Elected in 2015, Sarai has championed multiculturalism and economic opportunities for Surrey's diverse communities. His work on the Standing Committee on Citizenship and Immigration informs his new role, where he will oversee Canada's development aid, including programs in South Asia. "Randeep's journey from Punjab to Parliament embodies the Canadian dream," said Surrey Councillor Mandeep Nagra. The 2025 Canadian federal election saw a record 22 Indian-origin candidates elected to the House of Commons, with 65 candidates of Indian descent contesting across parties.

Haryana to probe all abortions of more than 12-week pregnancies

Battling declining sex ratio and amid concerns over illegal pre-natal sex determination and abortions, Haryana's health authorities have now decided to scrutinize all abortions beyond 12 weeks to ensure compliance with legal provisionsThe decision follows alarming statistics — in 2024, the state's sex ratio fell to 910 girls per 1,000 boys, the lowest in eight years.

The Haryana Director General of Health Services issued a directive Tuesday, instructing all civil surgeons to maintain records of abortions beyond 12 weeks and conduct thorough investigations to verify compliance with legal provisions. The directive is part of preparations for a video conference scheduled Wednesday, to be chaired by Additional Chief Secretary (Health) Sudhir Rajpal, where officials will discuss efforts to combat illegal pre-natal sex determination and abortions. A senior official involved in the ongoing crackdown stated that investigations aim to assess whether abortions were legally and medically justified. Under the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (MTP) Act, abortions up to 20 weeks require approval from one doctor. Between 20 and 24 weeks, opinions from two doctors are required, with terminations permitted only for specific categories, including survivors of sexual assault and women with physical disabilities. "There are concerns that some of these abortions could be driven by the desire for gender selection. Hence we have ordered an investigation by CMOs of such abortions in their respective districts," said Sudhir Rajpal. A Special Task Force (STF) recently uncovered widespread use of illegally procured MTP kits from Goa, Bihar, and Uttar Pradesh, used by couples seeking sex-selective abortions despite strict bans. To curb such practices, authorities will assign Asha or Anganwadi workers as "Saheli" (female companions) to counsel pregnant women with one or more female children. The Haryana government has identified 62,000 such women and is urging them to avoid illegal gender determination tests, which are punishable offenses. Health authorities are also targeting illegal abortions performed by BAMS and BHMS doctors, particularly female practitioners. Civil surgeons have been directed to maintain a list of such doctors engaged in private practice. In the video conference, the officials will also discuss decoy operations aimed at enforcing the MTP Act, the PNDT Act (which bans sex determination) and the As-

sisted Reproductive Technology (Regulation) Act
Between May 6 and May 12. Haryana authorities con-

ducted 19 raids had been conducted across the state over the illegal sale of MTP kits and registered 17 FIRs were registered. In addition, 13 shops had been sealed for illegal practices and 145 MTP kits were seized. After the formation of the State Task Force (STF), 43 FIRs have been registered, 21 shops have been sealed and 6,200 MTP kits have been seized in Haryana. In Panipat, a traditional birth attendant (Dai) sold an MTP kit for Rs 2,000, leading authorities to seize the kit along with additional medicines. Legal action was initiated under the MTP Act. Meanwhile, in Rohtak, a chemist shop was raided after a salesman sold an MTP kit for Rs 1,000—officials confiscated 18 kits, and the shop was sealed. In Manesar, a chemist was booked for supplying an MTP kit illegally, adding to the growing crackdown on unauthorized abortion procedures. In Panchkula, a woman was admitted to a civil hospital in critical condition after taking abortion pills provided by a quack known as "Bengali Baba", prompting immediate police in-

PWD plans to build 21 new foot over bridges across Capital

The Delhi Public Works Department (PWD) is planning to construct 21 foot over bridges (FOB) across the Capital, especially at critical locations that are prone to accidents, officials said on Tuesday. Chief Minister Rekha Gupta had last month discussed the matter in a review meeting held with PWD officials, they added. A senior department official said that the PWD has received a list of 21 locations from the Delhi Traffic Police for the construction of new FOBs.

"It has mentioned why there is a need for new pedestrian infrastructure in these locations... Considering the proposal, the PWD has started a ground survey of these locations. Once completed, a proposal will be made and tenders floated for the construction of the FOBs," the official added. "The 21 locations include stretches where accidents have taken place due to a lack of safe pedestrian crossing, such as the stretch from Karkardooma Court red light to

Vivek Vihar underpass... There are plans to construct two FOBs here... Besides, PWD has already sent a proposal to construct one FOB at ITO park U-turn...," said the official.Officials said that of the 21 probable locations, some stretches fall under agencies like the Delhi Development Authority and the National Highways Authority of India. "At some locations, work on Metro projects is going on. In such locations, the PWD will either develop the FOB along with the department concerned or the department will provide funds to the PWD to build the FOB," an official said. As part of this plan, the PWD is working on replacing the existing FOB at Majnu Ka Tila, which is in poor condition, with a new one. "Work has already started in this regard," said the official.

Asked about several existing FOBs not being used by pedestrians, an official said, "Many FOBs are not used by pedestrians. They instead prefer to cross the road, taking risks. We have observed that such FOBs are located far away from bus stops or Metro stations... many of these FOBs also do not have lifts and are not disabled friendly..."As per a study conducted by the Planning department in 2018, of the 74 FOBs that existed in Delhi at that time, 77% lacked lifts, only 23% had escalators, and around 70% did not have a security guard. The study also highlighted that there were too many staircases at some FOBs. According to officials, Delhi at present has 115 FOBs. "Tender for maintenance, operation and upkeep of the 115 FOBs is under process.... Tenders will be invited soon," said an official. According to the Delhi Road Crash Fatalities Report 2022, issued by the Transport department, of the 1,517 fatal crashes that had taken place in 2022, 50% of the victims were pedestrians.

Fee hike row erupts at DPS Dwarka again: School expels 29 students, angry parents stage protest

Chaotic scenes were witnessed outside Delhi Public School (DPS) Dwarka on Tuesday morning after several students were denied entry into the premises — once again, over non-payment of fees — and angry parents protested at the gates. These students were among 29 expelled by the school, which cited legal provisions, with "immediate effect" on May 9. Parents, however, accused the school of allegedly "mishandling children" and flouting a Delhi High Court order issued last month.

They also claimed bouncers were stationed at the gate Parents also alleged that several students were reportedly sent back home in school buses without prior intimation. A parent of a Class XI student described the scene as traumatic. "... We were shocked when the school forcefully boarded our children into buses and sent them back home without any communication. We didn't know their whereabouts for a while. There was no sensitivity shown at all," the parent claimed. In recent weeks, hundreds of parents took to Delhi's streets to protest against fee hikes at several private schools. At DPS Dwarka, the fee hike issue has been raging for several years. In April, an eight-member inspection committee led by District Magistrate (Southwest) Lakshay Singhal had flagged discriminatory practices against students at the schools: they were barred from attending regular classes and confined to the library, had restricted access to the canteen, were isolated from peers, and closely monitored by guards during restroom visits. The Delhi Cabinet then approved a draft Bill — the Delhi School Education (Transparency in Fixation & Regulation of Fees) Bill, 2025. Chief Minister Rekha Gupta announced that it will apply to all private schools in the city and ensure "transparent, strict and clear provisions regarding school fee determination". In emails sent to affected families last Fri-Act and Rules (DSEAR), 1973, to justify the expulsions, stating that the students' names were being struck off the rolls due to "non-payment of school fee" despite "various reminders through monthly SMS, emails, telephonic calls and final reminder/show cause notice". Rule 35 states that schools can expel students on the grounds of non-payment of fees and other dues for 20 days after the last day for payment, or continued absence without leave for six consecutive days. It is also compulsory to issue a showcause notice to the guardian or parent before such an action. The school's email also said, "You are advised not to send your ward to the school. He/she shall not be permitted to enter the school premises. The RFID card of your ward has also been disabled and, if you send your ward to school despite his/her name being struck off from the school rolls, it shall be at your risk and consequence. It asked the parents to



collect the transfer certificate of their wards from the administration department on Tuesday, between 2.30 and 3 pm. The Indian Express sent an email to the school principal for comments, but it did not elicit a response. A source in the school said, "A show cause notice was issued to the parents last December. A total of more than Rs 1 lakh is outstanding from 130 students, and there has already been a loss of Rs 6 crore because certain students have completed Class 12. How can we recover the money in such cases?"Reacting to the parents' claims, the source blamed them for misrepresenting the HC order. "The order is about how students are to be treated once inside the school — it doesn't stop us from expelling defaulters. Once a child is struck off the rolls, denying entry is not a violation," the source added."The children are suffering because of their parents and the politics around it. We will not tolerate demonstrations outside the school gate."In its April 16 order, the HC had termed DPS Dwarka's action against students "a very alarming state of affairs" and chastised the school for using the institution as a "money-making machine". Justice Sachin Datta restrained DPS Dwarka from engaging in any discriminatory practices against students over non-payment of fees. It also directed the school not to prevent such students from interacting with others or subject them to any form of prejudice or humiliation. The court further said in its order that "any issue that the school may have as regards non-payment/deficit payment of fees, has to be addressed in the framework of the provisions of the Delhi School Education Act, 1973, the rules framed thereunder and in terms of direction/s that may be issued in the pending judicial proceedings as regards thereto". Parents also claimed they had alerted the Directorate of Education earlier about the possibility of mass expulsions, and said they would seek a legal remedy. Earlier, DPS Dwarka, in a statement, had rejected allegations against the school and said, "any information being disseminated in the public domain against the school in this regard is false and frivo-

Two youths make it to IIM, script stories of defying difficulties with hardwork

From working at a wholesale footwear shop at the age of 14 at a monthly allowance of Rs 1,500 to a job of a 'chowkidar' in the Ahmedabad cantonment area for a salary of around Rs 19,000 to cracking the Common Admission Test (CAT) and confirming a seat for himself in Indian Institute of Management (IIM)-Shillong — 27-year-old Dipesh Kewlani, a resident of the city, has come a long way. The story is similar for 21-year-old Suraj Soni from Chaloda village in Dholka, as financial constraints could not stop or break either of them.

After Dipesh's father died when he was 11 and his younger brother Dinesh six, the family shifted to Ahmedabad from Jaipur in 2009 with the help of Dipesh's maternal uncle. A postgraduate in commerce from HL Commerce College in Ahmedabad, Dipesh still works at the Army station. He says he could not afford to quit the job. "Me and my brother completed our education on scholarships and with the help from community-run trusts. My mother would also do small embroidery works from home. When in Class XII, I learnt about a vacancy for a chowkidar at the Army hospital. I took the exam and got the job even before my Class XII

results were out in 2017," Dipesh told this paper. Dipesh, who has secured a seat in IIM-Shillong, has his fingers crossed as he awaits a call from IIM-Lucknow too. The turnaround, he says, came when his younger brother Dinesh completed his MBA from IIM-Lucknow and got placed in Hyderabad."I was aware about MBA and IIMs after I completed Class XII as many of my friends enrolled for coaching classes. But I had to work to sustain my family and fund my brother's education. After he got through IIM-Lucknow and got placed, I started preparing for CAT alongside my job," he said. Meanwhile, Suraj, a first-generation graduate whose mother works as a domestic help and father as a peon, would commute 80 km in public transport and walk over 4 km every day to HL College of Commerce in Ahmedabad. "There was no one in the family to guide or help me with my preparations. My father has studied only till Class VII and works as a peon at a residential society at a salary of Rs 10,000-11,000, while my mother, who studied till Class II, works as a domestic help in Makarba area, along with farming. With limited employment opportunities in the village, all three of us take the bus to commute from our village to Ahmedabad. Due to financial constraints my elder brother had to quit studies and take up a job at a factory in Bavla," Suraj told this paper. Suraj, who studied in a Gujarati-medium government school in the village, says it was initially very difficult for him to cope up in an English medium college. However, he did not give up and read translation books, English newspapers and practiced with friends. "During my college days, I had attended a free session where I learnt how MBA could help. I enrolled into a coaching institute, which even slashed the fee for me looking at my financial condition and allowed me to pay in installments. I paid the token amount of Rs 90,000 on Sunday to get my admission at IIM-Shillong confirmed. My father collected the money from the members of our community," he says."I

Abortion plea of woman accused of kidnapping student gets court nod

A special POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences) court in Surat on Tuesday granted the permission to terminate a 22-week-old pregnancy of a 23-year-old female teacher days after police arrested her and rescued her 13-year-old student after intercepting them in a bus at Shamlaji on Gujarat-Rajasthan border. The teacher has been charged under BNS Act Sections 137(2) (Kidnapping), 127(3) (Punishment for wrongful confinement). The medical termination of pregnancy of the accused woman will be done at Surat Municipal Corporation-run SMIMER hospital in a week, and the foetus should be preserved for a DNA test, the order stated.

The woman had on Friday moved the special POCSO court, seeking permission for abortion under the Medical Termination of Pregnancy Act. Based on the application, the court instructed Punagam police to seek expert advice from the medical fraternity. Police took her to SMIMER hospital for a medical examination, after which the hospital authorities submitted a report to police, stating that "the termination of pregnancy is advised considering the risk factor". Police submitted the report to the court on Tuesday. The report, signed by professor Dr Archish Desai, Assistant professor Dr Sonam Parikh and Senior Resident Dr Thumar, stated, "As the accused is unmarried and 23 years old, continuation of pregnancy may be harmful for her psychologically and socially. According to the MTP Act, Medical Termination of Pregnancy can be done up to 24 weeks of gestation, and the accused wants termination of pregnancy at present. The risk of complications of Second Trimester Medical Termination of Pregnancy includes incomplete abortion, retained products of conception, bleeding, infection, uterine rupture, failure of termination of pregnancy and may need surgical intervention (hysterotomy) and psychological complications. The mortality (death) risk is 0.6/ 100000. Considering the risk-benefit ratio, termination of pregnancy is advised from our side with an explanation of the risks. Kindly permit Termination of Pregnancy."On April 26, the boy's father had lodged a complaint of kidnapping against the teacher following which police had started a probe in the matter. Later, police received information that the teacher and the student were returning to Gujarat in a private luxury bus from Jaipur, Rajasthan. A team of Surat police intercepted the bus and brought the teacher and the boy back to the city. After primary interrogation, police said they learnt that the woman had allegedly confessed to establishing physical relations with the boy following which POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences) Act's Sections 8, 4 and 12 were added in the existing kidnapping complaint against the teacher.

After the police remand, the accused teacher was sent to judicial custody at Surat Central Jail. The court order on Tuesday stated: "The Medical Superintendent of SMIMER Hospital, Surat, is directed to conduct medical termination of pregnancy of the accused girl who has been charged with the offence punishable under section BNS Act, 137(2), 127(3) and POCSO Act sections. 4, 6, 8 and 12 with two (or more than that) qualified surgeons, including a gynaecologist and an obstetrician, in the presence of a qualified physician, with due care and precaution, to avoid any likelihood of untoward harm to the physical or mental health of the accused girl after carrying out a necessary medical check-up forthwith. The foetus should be preserved to enable the investigating agency to send it for a DNA test. The accused girl should be discharged from the hospital after termination of pregnancy only, if she is found to be medically fit. The Medical Superintendent of SMIMER Hospital, Surat should submit report with regards to the termination of pregnancy to this court within a week. The Investigating Officer should take custody of the accused and send her to jail after she is discharged from the hospital."The court also observed, "The continuance of the pregnancy would involve a risk to the life of the pregnant woman or of grave injury on physical and mental health, or there is a substantial risk that if the child were born, it would suffer from such physical or mental abnormalities...

Patna medical college supply 'scam': ED attaches assets worth Rs 3 crore

With the latest order, the total value of assets attached in now stands at `6.15 crore.The ED has provisionally attached 10 properties valued at around Rs 3.01 crore in Greater Noida, Patna, and Darbhanga, as part of its probe into the alleged Patna Medical College and Hospital (PMCH) medical supply scam.

The attachments were made under PMLA in connection with allegations that PMCH officials, in collusion with various suppliers, procured medicines and equipment at exorbitant rates and in much higher quantities, causing a loss of "approximately Rs 12.63 crore" to the exchequer. The ED initiated its investigation based on an FIR and chargesheet filed before the Special Vigilance Court in Patna, under various sections of IPC and Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988. The case, originally registered by the Bihar Vigilance Investigation Bureau, named the then PMCH superintendent, Dr Om Prakash Choudhary, among the accused. According to officials, alleged irregularities occurred during the financial years 2008-09 and 2009-10, when hospital authorities, "in connivance with various suppliers, purchased medicines, chemical reagents, machines, and



medical equipment" at inflated prices and in quantities far above actual requirements. Earlier, in November 2020, the ED had attached movable and immovable assets worth Rs 3.14 crore belonging to "Dr Om Prakash Choudhary, Dr Vinod Kumar Singh, Dr Ganesh Prasad Singh, Amit Kumar Dhandhania, Bimal Dalmia, and their family members". These assets, including flats, land, luxury vehicles, and bank deposits, allegedly represented proceeds of crime, as per ED officials, who said provisional attachment was confirmed by Adjudicating Authority under PMLA in New Delhi in April 2021. A prosecution complaint was filed before Special Court (PMLA) in Patna, which took cognisance of money laundering offence in April 2022. Mumbai police station head caught red-handed while accepting bribe for providing protection to a school's trustee



MUMBAI policeSenior police inspector Bapurao Madhukar Deshmukh, 57, was caught red-handed on Tuesday night at his own police stationThe anti-corruption bureau (ACB), Mumbai, has arrested the head of the Shivaji Nagar police station, Mumbai, red-handed on Tuesday night while allegedly accepting a Rs 1 lakh of the total bribe of Rs 2.5 lakh that he had allegedly demanded from a school's trustee in lieu of providing police services for helping him in a legal matter. Senior police inspector Bapurao Madhukar Deshmukh, 57, was caught red-handed on Tuesday night at his own police station. According to the ACB, the complainant in the case is a 41-year-old trustee of a trust that runs a school in the Shivaji Nagar area.

On August 15, 2024, some people had broken the lock of the gate of the said school and forcibly entered the premises over some dispute. The complainant trustee had filed a complaint with the Shivajinagar Police Station regarding the dispute and also with the Charity Commissioner. The complainant had sought police action from Deshmukh and also requested him to provide police protection from the opponents. In order to help the complainant and to prevent the opponents from entering the school premises of the said trust until the final order from the Charity Commissioner's office came and also in lieu of providing police protection, Deshmukh demanded a bribe of Rs 3,00,000 from the complainant, the ACB stated. After mutual discussion the bribe amount was finalised to Rs 2.5 lakh. But, as the complainant was against giving any bribe for legitimate police work, he approached the ACB and filed a complaint. After due verification the ACB initiated a bribe trap proceeding and on Tuesday night caught Deshmukh red-handed while accepting Rs 1 lakh as the first instalment of the bribe amount from the complainant trustee at his own police station, an ACB officer said. Deshmukh, a Class 1 officer, was due for his retirement in a year. He has been arrested under relevant sections of the Prevention of Correction Act. Under the guidance of ACB additional commissioner Sandeep Diwan, additional DCPs Anil Gherdikar and Rajendra Sangale supervised the trap. ACB may soon also initiate a procedure to look into the properties of Deshmukh to check if he has amassed properties disproportionate to his known

Pakistan High Commission official expelled for espionage, linked to case on leak of Army movements

Amid continuing tensions between India and Pakistan, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) declared an official of the Pakistan High Commission "persona non grata" (PNG), expelling him for espionage. The decision concerning the official, who was not named by either side, was conveyed to Pakistan Charge d'Affaires Saad Warraich, who was issued a demarche, asking the staffer to leave India within 24 hours. "The Government of India has declared a Pakistani official, working at the Pakistan High Commission in New Delhi, persona non grata for indulging in activities not in keeping with his official status in India," the MEA statement said, without providing any details of what the staffer is believed to have done

"Pakistan totally rejects this assertion," the Pakistan Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a statement, adding that the norm would be the U.N. Charter, and said Pakistan would "closely monitor India's actions and behaviour in this regard", calling on the international community to do the same. Reacting to the statement, the MEA said that Pakistan had "nurtured terrorism on an industrial scale", and could not "escape the consequences" of its actions. "There is now a new normal. The sooner Pakistan gets used to it, the better," the Ministry's spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said in response to a question.

Zelenskyy urges Trump to make Putin meeting happen

Mr. Zelenskyy said in Kyiv that the West should impose massive sanctions if Mr. Putin skips the meeting, emphasising that he would do "everything" possible to make it happen and secure a ceasefire.U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio will be in the US delegation at the talks in Istanbul which "could be some pretty good results," Mr. Trump said in Riyadh as he started a four-day Middle East trip. The Kremlin has refused to say whether Mr. Putin will travel to Turkiye, after he himself proposed Russia-Ukraine talks in a weekend Kremlin address. "This is his war," Mr. Zelenskyy said, "therefore, the negotiations should be with him". Any meeting between Russian and Ukrainian officials would be the first direct negotiations since the early months of Moscow's February 2022 invasion.Mr. Trump came to office in January promising a swift end to the war, but has become increasingly frustrated at what he sees as the failure of Kyiv and Moscow to compromise over the bloodshed.Mr. Trump said Monday (May 12, 2025) that he was "thinking" about going to the talks. "I do not know the U.S. President's decision, but if he confirms his participation, I think it would give additional impetus for Mr. Putin to come," Mr. Zelenskyy told a press conference.

"Putin does not want the war to end, does not want a ceasefire, does not want any negotiations," Mr. Zelenskyy said, adding however that he "will do everything to ensure that this meeting takes place". Russian airstrikes killed two people in Ukraine's eastern region of Kharkiv, which is on the border with Russia, authorities said.Mr. Zelenskyy urged the United States to hit Russia with its "strongest" ever sanctions should Mr. Putin not turn up — saying a refusal would be "a clear signal that they do not want and are not going to end the war". Mr. Putin's spokesman refused to say who Moscow would send to the talks.Russia's Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said that Russia would use the talks to address its key aims and the "root causes" of the conflict — the "de-Nazification" of Ukraine and the "incorporation of new territories into the Russian Federation". Kyiv and the West reject those narratives, calling Russia's invasion an imperial-style land grab. Tens of thousands have been killed and millions forced to flee their homes since Russia invaded Ukraine, while Moscow's army now controls around one-fifth of the country — including the Crimean



peninsula, annexed in 2014. Putin doesn't 'dare' meet Russia did not explicitly respond to Ukraine and the leaders of France, Britain, Germany and Poland calling for Moscow to agree a 30-day ceasefire, though the Kremlin blasted European "ultimatums" in an apparent rejection.German Chancellor Friedrich Merz warned Russia on Tuesday (May 13, 2025) that it would face fresh European sanctions if there was no "real progress" this week towards peace in Ukraine, as he urged Mr. Putin to meet Mr. Zelenskyy. French President Emmanuel Macron said that Europe would impose new sanctions if Moscow did not agree to the 30-day ceasefire. The European Union has already imposed 16 rounds of sanctions on Russia since Mr. Putin invaded Ukraine in February 2022.Mr. Macron, who has developed a warm working relationship with Mr. Zelenskyy, said that "Ukrainians have the clear-sightedness to say they do not have the capacity to retake everything that has been taken since 2014."The EU's top diplomat Kaja Kallas questioned whether Mr. Putin had the nerve to show up."I think it's a good move if they sit down," Kallas told a democracy conference in Copenhagen. "But I don't think he dares, Putin."Mr. Zelenskyy said he would meet Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan in Ankara on Wednesday (May 14, 2025) or Thursday (May 15, 2025) and was ready to meet Mr. Putin either there or in Istanbul. Russian and Ukrainian officials held talks in Istanbul in March 2022 aimed at halting the conflict but did not strike a deal. Contact between the warring sides has been extremely limited since, mainly dedicated to humanitarian issues like prisoner-of-war exchanges and the return of killed soldiers' bodies.

Justice comes closer to Rayalaseema

The Andhra Pradesh government has expedited the process of setting up the High Court Bench in Kurnool and has identified buildings to accommodate 15 judges. It may be recalled that the State Assembly had passed a unanimous resolution for the setting up of a High Court Bench in Kurnool in November 2024. The government's decision to set up a Bench in Kurnool has been welcomed by everyone in the Rayalaseema region, particularly those from the legal fraternity, especially given that the previous YSR Congress Party government, which had proposed Kurnool as the judicial capital, had failed to keep this promise due to various legal issues.

Discontented with the YSRCP government, the legal fraternity had viewed its three-capital proposal as a political move to derail the grand project of Amaravati, the capital city mooted by N. Chandrababu Naidu when he was in power between 2014 to 2019. While former Chief Minister Jagan Mohan Reddy had promised that the three capitals proposal would decentralise development, he was unable to implement it. Now, a High Court Bench in Kurnool will decentralise judicial administration since cases from Rayalaseema constitute an estimated 33% of all cases in the Andhra Pradesh High Court. Unlike shifting the entire High Court from Amaravati to Kurnool, setting up a Bench is a relatively easy process. Though a virtual mode of hearing had been made available earlier, lawyers from Rayalaseema still had to travel for more than 8-9 hours to file mandatory petitions and regular appeals. Now, petitioners from the four undivided Rayalaseema districts of Kurnool, Kadapa, Anantapur and Chittoor will be able to approach the Bench easily, instead of travelling to Amaravati. The Bench will serve other purposes too. As there will be cases pertaining to service matters and labour laws, branches of government departments too will soon come up in Kurnool, taking administration nearer to the people. As a senior High Court lawyer explained, both justice and

administration will be brought closer to the people.

The setting up of a Bench is also expected to spur

commercial activity in the region. Kurnool is connected to other regions by road, rail, and air. The presence of judges and government officials, and visits by senior lawyers from various parts of the country, will propel the growth of the region. The hospitality sector is expected to flourish in the region and add to the potential of the tourism sector in and around Kurnool. Meanwhile, advocates from Visakhapatnam have also brought to the fore the demand for a Bench in Visakhapatnam. Advocates from north Andhra say that this demand has persisted since 1993 and that they too will raise their pitch for a Bench. They argue that Visakhapatnam houses several educational institutions for the legal fraternity, such as the Damodaram Sanjivayya National Law University, the Andhra University College of Law, and the GITAM School of Law, and therefore merits a Bench. The Visakhapatnam Bar Association has more than 5,000 advocates, including 1,200 women.

Whether the government considers the demand or not, the proposal is unlikely to be opposed by the legal fraternity from other regions. This is because there are States which have multiple Benches of the High Court. In Karnataka, the principal seat is located in Bengaluru, while additional Benches can be found in Dharwad and Gulbarga. In Madhya Pradesh, the principal seat of the High Court is in Jabalpur while additional Benches are located in Gwalior and Indore. The NDA government will find itself in an advantageous position if it completes the process of setting up the Kurnool Bench. The previous government's announcement that the High Court and other judicial institutions will be shifted to Kurnool had raised the hopes of the people, but nothing finally came of it. This could also be one of the reasons why last year, in the Assembly elections, the voters of Rayalaseema gave the NDA a clear mandate. The Telugu Desam Party (TDP) alone clinched 42 Assembly seats in the region that had, until then, been a stronghold of the Congress and later the YSRCP. The TDP and its allies can now further cement their position in the region by developing it in various ways. The setting up of the High Court Bench is a crucial first step towards this aim.

With a new Pope, an understanding of Catholicism in India



The conclave to elect the new pontiff began on May 7. The election of the Pope takes place through an electoral college composed of Cardinals from around the world. This time, the electoral college included 135 Cardinals from 70 countries, with four Cardinals from India, the country's highest-ever tally. Among all Christian denominations, Catholics comprise the largest population, forming 15.9% of the global population and a large share of the Indian Christian population as well. The Vatican is a spiritual symbol for this denomination. In this context, this is an analysis of the Catholic denomination, its religious behaviour, and its demographic share among Indian Christians. Chart 1 shows the denomination-wise share of Christians in IndiaAccording to data from the PEW Research Center, about 37% of Christians in India are Catholic, 17.9% are Baptist, 9.5% are Presbyterian, and 24.3% belong to other denominations. About 10% of Christians do not affiliate with any denomination. It shows that nearly 75% of general category Christians, 16.8% of Scheduled Caste Christians, 23.7% of Christian tribal people, 55.5% of Other Backward Classes Christians, and 23.5% of Christians from the Most Backward Classes

Though the majority of Indian Catholics belong to upper castes, for the first time, a Dalit, Anthony Poola, the

Archbishop of Hyderabad, was among the four Indian cardinals who voted for the new Pope. He was appointed as a cardinal in 2022 by Pope Francis. Map 3 shows the Statewise share of Catholics within the total Christian population of each State. A State marked as zero indicates that it has Christians, but no Catholics. A majority of the Christian population in Nagaland and Mizoram is Catholic. In Meghalaya, it is 90.8% and in Goa, it is 58.7%. To measure aggregate religiosity in India, I developed an Aggregate Religiosity Index that captures the religiosity of all major religious groups in India from 1989 to 2023, based on 15 indicators. The findings reveal that all religious groups in India exhibit high levels of religiosity. Tables 4 and 5 provide a breakdown of the most recent religiosity levels (in % terms) among Christian denominations across selected indicators. Table 4 presents the religious behaviour of Christian denominations in India. Figures in %More than 90% of Catholic respondents consider religion important, believe in God and participate in religious festivals. Public expressions of faith, such as wearing a religious pendant (74.6%) and attending services (59.9%), are also common. However, only a small proportion (11.2%) actively follows religious leaders. This suggests that while personal religiosity remains high, institutional influence may be limited.

Table 5 presents the social, democratic, and economic behaviour of Indian Christians. The first column corresponds to Catholics. Within Christianity, Catholics exhibit a comparatively softer attitude towards religion than Presbyterians and Christians who do not affiliate with any denomination. Even Baptists and Christians from other denominations are stricter than Catholics when it comes to opposing inter-religious marriages. Catholics tend to have higher literacy levels compared to members of all other Christian denominations except Presbyterians. Judgment day in EU chief's Covid vaccine texts case

A top court is to rule on Wednesday (May 14, 2025) on whether the EU failed the transparency test by declining to release text messages sent by Ursula von der Leyen to the head of Pfizer as the bloc tried to secure Covid vaccines. The case before the Court of Justice of the European Union (EUCJ) is seen as a test for the EU Commission president, whose governance has at times been accused of centralised and opaque decision-making. At its centre are elusive exchanges between Ms. von der Leyen and Albert Bourla, chief executive of Pfizer — which was chosen by the bloc as its main vaccine supplier at the height of the pandemic.

The New York Times, which revealed the existence of the messages, sued the commission in 2023 after Brussels declined to produce them following a freedom of information request. The commission argued it could not find the texts because they had not been recorded and archived — something it says is done only when the content is deemed "substantive". "The commission never denied the existence of text message exchanges," an EU official said. "What it was argued... is that these exchanges did not contain important information". The New York Times has asked the lower chamber of the Luxembourg-based EUCJ to quash the commission's decision not to hand it the messages. The verdict can be appealed.

Maladministration'The EU moved swiftly after the Covid pandemic emerged in 2020 to secure vaccines for member countries to buy for their citizens and residents at a time of massive global demand for the shots. But many aspects of the procurement from Pfizer have been kept confidential, leading to claims of a lack of transparency — and several legal proceedings in Belgium and with EU courts. "This case presents a very important issue: whether officials may evade public transparency by communicating via text messages rather than more traditional means,"



a lawyer for The Times, Bondine Kloostra, said in her opening arguments in November. Lawyers for the 27-nation bloc have argued the private messages did not constitute part of the vaccine negotiation. They might have involved side issues, such as Ms. von der Leyen and Bourla agreeing to speak on a certain day, at a certain time, they suggested. Commission workers, including its chief, do not have an obligation to record all their emails, texts and instant messaging chats, as this would be "materially impossible", an EU official said. Emails are automatically deleted after six months, he noted. A duty to archive arises only when such messages contain important information that is not "short-lived" and relates to the commission's policies, activities and decisions. Such assessment is done in the first instance by the person receiving or sending the texts. so in the case before the court by Ms. von der Leyen. The commission's lawyer. Paolo Stancanelli, said in November that its services asked to track down the messages after The Times reached out to the EU chief's cabinet, which replied it was unable to find them. In January 2022, the EU's ombudsman described this as "maladministration", saying the messages should have been subject to the EU's public transparency rules for official documents.

Israel hits Gaza hospital in raid Hamas says killed journalist

Israel's military said it struck a Gaza hospital housing militants in a raid that, according to Hamas, killed a journalist being treated after an Israeli attack last month. The strike, which Hamas said happened at dawn, ended a brief pause in fighting to allow the release of a U.S.-Israeli hostage. The military said in a Telegram post that "significant Hamas terrorists" had been "operating from within a command and control centre" at Nasser Hospital in Khan Yunis, southern Gaza's main city. "The compound was used by the terrorists to plan and execute terrorist attacks against Israeli civilians and IDF (army) troops," it said.

The Health Ministry in Hamas-run Gaza said the strike killed two people and wounded several others, while the Hamas government media office said journalist Hassan Aslih was "assassinated". Mahmud Bassal, spokesman for the Gaza civil defence agency, said that "the Israeli army bombed the surgery building at Nasser Hospital in Khan Yunis at dawn on Tuesday, killing journalist Hassan Aslih". Aslih, head of the Alam24 news outlet, had been at the hospital for treatment after being wounded in a strike on April 7, according to Ismail al-Thawabtah, director general of the Hamas media office. Two other journalists, Ahmed Mansur and Hilmi al-Faqaawi, were killed in that bombing that hit a media tent, it was reported at the time. The Israeli military said the April strike had targeted Aslih, alleging he operated for Hamas "under the guise of a journalist".

The Committee to Protect Journalists had condemned the attack.AFP footage from Nasser Hospital after Tuesday's strike showed smoke rising from the facility as rescuers searched through the rubble to the light of torches. A hospital worker who gave his name as Abu Ghali said the Israeli bombardment "does not differentiate between civilians and military targets". "This is a civilian hospital that receives injured people around the clock," he told AFP.Israel had paused military operations in Gaza to allow for the release of Edan Alexander, a 21-year-old US-Israeli soldier who had been held hostage since October 2023. Alexander, believed to be the last surviving hostage with US citizenship, was released Monday ahead of a Middle East visit by US President Donald Trump. Israel resumed its military offensive in Gaza on March 18 after a two-month truce in its war against Hamas, which was triggered by the Palestinian group's October 7 attack. The attack on southern Israel resulted in the deaths of 1,218 people, mostly civilians. .The



Health Ministry in Hamas-run Gaza said Monday at least 2,749 people have been killed since Israel resumed its campaign, bringing the overall death toll since the war broke out to 52,862

Why do birds fly in V shape?

Just like how takeoff and landing are crucial for an airplane, the same applies to birds. Migratory birds often fly in a V-shape, a process known as bird flight. This unique movement is guided by the principles of aerodynamics, specifically lift and drag, helping them travel efficiently over long distances. Birds like geese and pelicans fly in a V-shape to conserve energy during long migrations. The lead bird works the hardest, facing the most wind resistance, while the ones behind take advantage of the airflow it creates.A study on ibises revealed that these birds follow precise flight patterns, just as scientists predicted! Researchers fitted ibises with trackers and found that they fly about a metre behind and to the side of the bird in front-exactly where the upwash gives them the most lift. Interestingly, the birds don't stick to one position—some prefer the right, others the left, and they regularly swap places. Unlike airplanes with fixed pilots, these flocks have no single leader! As a bird flaps its wings, the air behind it moves in two ways: some is pushed downward (downwash), while some at the sides is pushed upward (upwash). Birds flying slightly behind and to the side position themselves in this upwash zone, where the rising air gives them a small lift. This reduces their effort, allowing them to fly longer distances with less energy—almost like catching a free ride on the air currents created by their flock-mates!

U.S. agrees to sell Saudi Arabia \$142 billion arms package

The U.S. agreed on Tuesday (May 13, 2025) to sell Saudi Arabia an arms package worth nearly \$142 billion, according to a White House fact sheet that called it "the largest defense cooperation agreement" Washington has ever done. The agreement, signed during U.S. President Donald Trump's visit to the Saudi capital Riyadh, covers deals with more than a dozen U.S. defence companies in areas including air and missile defence, air force and space advancement, maritime security and communications, the fact sheet said. "The package signed today, the largest de-

fence cooperation deal in U.S. history, is a clear demonstration of our commitment to strengthening our partner-ship," the fact sheet said.Reuters first reported last month that the arms package would be worth well over \$100 billion. Saudi Arabia is the largest customer for U.S. arms.Former President Joe Biden's administration tried unsuccessfully to finalise a defence pact with Riyadh as part of a broad deal that envisioned Saudi Arabia normalizing ties with Israel.

The White House fact sheet did not mention if Riyadh would be permitted to purchase Lockheed's F-35 jets, the military aircraft that the kingdom has reportedly been interested in for years. The two countries had discussed Riyadh's potential purchase of Lockheed's F-35 jets, two sources briefed on discussions told Reuters. However, it was not clear if Washington would permit the kingdom to move forward with a purchase that would give Saudi Arabia an advanced weapon used by close U.S. ally Israel, one of the sources said. The second source said the qualitative military edge, or U.S. guarantees that Israel receives more advanced American weapons than Arab states, is an issue that "has come up. Governments in the Gulf have long sought the most advanced fighter jet, built with stealth technology allowing it to evade enemy detection. If the U.S. did approve the transfer, Saudi Arabia would be only the second Middle East state after Israel to operate F-35 fighters.

UN humanitarian chief blasts Israel for 'deliberately' blocking aid to Gaza

The United Nations' top humanitarian official blasted Israel on Tuesday (May 13, 2025) for "deliberately and unashamedly" imposing inhumane conditions on Palestinians, including the risk of famine — one of the strongest condemnations by a high-ranking U.N. official during the war in Gaza. Tom Fletcher, head of the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, briefed the Security Council, describing this work as a "grim undertaking" since Israel began blocking all humanitarian aid from entering Gaza more than 10 weeks ago.

He went as far as saying that the council must "act now" to "prevent genocide," a claim that Israel vehemently denied."I ask you to reflect — for a moment — on what action we will tell future generations we each took to stop the 21st century atrocity to which we bear daily witness in Gaza," said Mr. Fletcher, a longtime British diplomat who took up the U.N. post in November. "It is a question we will hear, sometimes incredulous, sometimes furious — but always there — for the rest of our lives."In response to Mr. Fletcher's remarks, the Israeli mission to the U.N. said that "Israel will not accept a humanitarian mechanism that props up the Hamas terror organisation that butchered our people in their homes and communities." Before the blockade, the U.N. and other international aid agencies handled moving aid into the enclave. The U.N. World Food Program's director for Gaza, Antoine Renard, told The Associated Press that a quarter of Gaza's population is at risk of famine. That's despite all the food needed to feed the territory's population sitting in warehouses in Israel, Egypt, and Jordan — and most of it is not even 25 miles (40 kilometres) away, he said.Mr. Renard said WFP warehouses in Gaza are empty, and the agency has gone from providing meals for 1 million people at the end of April to producing only 250,000 meals daily. The meals they can serve are "meaningless, compared to people's requirements," he said. "Soon, we're going to speak about the fact that people don't even have access to a meal," Mr. Renard warned. "Is that where we need to go to actually raise the alarm? It's now that we need to

The warnings come after food security experts said Monday that Gaza will likely fall into famine if Israel doesn't lift its blockade and stop its military campaign. Nearly half a million Palestinians are facing possible starvation, living in "catastrophic" levels of hunger, and 1 million others can barely get enough food, according to findings by the Integrated Food Security Phase Classification, a leading international authority on the severity of hunger crises. "Israel has been openly and brazenly blocking humanitarian aid for over two months now — this is engineered starvation,"



Riyad Mansour, the Palestinian U.N. ambassador, told the Security Council. "It is the most inhumane form of torture and killing." Amid Israel's blockade, AP obtained a proposal from a newly created group backed by the U.S., the Gaza Humanitarian Foundation, to implement a new aid distribution system based on plans similar to those designed by Israel.

Israel has cited aid diversions by Hamas as reason for a new plan. The U.N. and aid groups have rejected Israel's moves to control aid distribution. "It is a cynical sideshow. A deliberate distraction. A fig leaf for further violence and displacement," Mr. Fletcher said about the proposal, adding that it would exclude the disabled, women, children and the elderly. Asked Tuesday when aid would get into Gaza, a spokesperson for the State Department repeated Israeli rhetoric that Hamas "bears responsibility" for the humanitarian conditions in Gaza. It's a claim that aid officials have continuously disputed."I will reiterate that we are supportive of creative solutions to get aid in there but also in a way that the aid is not falling into the hands of Hamas, that it actually reaches the people that need it," deputy spokesman Tommy Pigott told reporters.Mr. Renard said "criminal gangs," not Hamas, had stripped WFP trucks of supplies between October and early January. He said some taking of food recently was not by gangs but people with nothing to eat. Hamas-led militants killed 1,200 people in a surprise Oct. 7, 2023, attack in southern Israel. Israel's retaliatory offensive has killed over 52,800 Palestinians, many Ministry, which does not say how many of the dead were combatants or civilians. Putin skipping talks would signal Moscow not seeking peace: Kyiv

Ukraine said that if Vladimir Putin skips talks in Turkey, it would be a "clear sign" to the world that the Russian leader is not serious about peace, and the West should reply with boosted military support to Kyiv. The meeting set for Thursday in Istanbul would be the first direct negotiations between Ukrainian and Russian officials since the early months of Moscow's invasion in 2022.Mr. Zelenskyy has called on Mr. Putin to personally attend the talks that the Kremlin leader himself suggested, but Moscow on Tuesday declined for the second day running to respond to that invitation."If Vladimir Putin refuses to come to Turkey, it will be the final signal that Russia does not want to end this war, that Russia is not willing and not ready for any negotiations," Mr. Zelenskyy's chief of staff, Andriy Yermak, said in a statement published by the Ukrainian presidency. U.S. President Donald Trump on Monday (May 12) urged both leaders to attend and said he was "thinking" about going to the talks as well. But Mr. Putin's spokesman on Tuesday refused to say who Russia would send to Istanbul."The Russian side continues to prepare for the talks scheduled for Thursday. That is all we can say at this point. We do not intend to comment further at this time," spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

Asked if he could name Russia's negotiating team, Mr. Peskov said: "No... as soon as the President deems it necessary, we will announce it."Putin proposed negotiations in a late-night statement over the weekend -- a counteroffer after Kyiv and European countries urged Moscow to agree to a full and unconditional 30-day ceasefire starting Monday. Tens of thousands have been killed and millions forced to flee their homes since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, while Moscow's army now controls around one-fifth of the country -- including the Crimean peninsula, annexed in 2014. Russia did not explicitly respond to Ukraine and the leaders of France, Britain, Germany and Poland calling for Moscow to agree a 30-day ceasefire from Monday, though the Kremlin blasted European "ultimatums" in an apparent rejection.

Kyiv on Tuesday urged fresh support from its Western backers if Mr. Putin refused to talk to Mr. Zelenskyy in Istanbul."If Russia refuses to negotiate, there must be a strong response from the United States and the entire world:

new sanctions against Russia and increased military aid to Ukraine. "Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has said he is ready to host and urged the warring sides on Monday to seize the "window of opportunity" to reach a peace settlement. Mr. Trump told reporters on Monday he would attend talks if he "thought it would be helpful".

"I was thinking about actually flying over there. There's a possibility of it, I guess, if I think things can happen," Mr. Trump told journalists at the White House prior to departing for a trip to the Middle East.Mr. Putin has said any direct talks with Ukraine should focus on the "root causes" of the conflict, and did not "exclude" a possible ceasefire coming out of any talks in Istanbul. Russia's references to the "root causes" of the conflict typically refer to alleged grievances with Kyiv and the West that Moscow has put forward as justification for its invasion. They include pledges to "de-Nazify" and de-militarise Ukraine, protect Russian speakers in the country's east and push back against NATO expansion. Kyiv and the West have rejected all of them, saying Russia's invasion is nothing more than an imperialstyle land grab. Russian and Ukrainian officials held talks in Istanbul in March 2022 aimed at halting the conflict but did not strike a deal. Contact between the warring sides has been extremely limited since, mainly dedicated to humanitarian issues like prisoner-of-war exchanges and the return of killed soldiers' bodies.

Let's trade goods, not nukes: Trump tells India and Pakistan



Washington: US President Donald Trump, on Tuesday, reiterated the US' role in brokering peace between India and Pakistan, saying he told the two sides to "not trade nuclear missiles (and) trade the things that you make so beautifully". President Trump is in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, on his first leg of a three-leg tour of West Asia, on his first major foreign policy visit abroad after returning to the White House for a non-consecutive second term. "Fellas, come on," Trump said as he told India and Pakistan, "Let's make a deal. Let's do some trading. Let's not trade nuclear missiles. Let's trade the things that you make so beautifully."

"Just days ago, my administration successfully brokered a historic ceasefire to stop the escalating violence between India and Pakistan, and I used trade to a large extent to do it," he said in a major foreign policy speech with the Saudi Crown Prince Mohammad bin Salman in the audience. He added: "And they both have very powerful leaders, very strong leaders, good leaders, smart leaders. And it all stopped."The American President singled out the Secretary of State Marco Rubio for leading US efforts in the India-Pakistan situation, saying "millions of people could have died from that conflict that started off small and was getting bigger and bigger and bigger by the day". Trump referred to the India-Pakistan conflict essaying his role as a peacemaker who is committed to resolving conflicts in the world. He next spoke of his efforts to resolve the Russia-Ukraine conflict.

President Trump has trumpeted the US role in ending the India-Pakistan conflict almost every day since the Truth Social post that was the first announcement of the cessation of hostilities triggered by the terrorist attack by a Pakistan-backed terror group in Pahalgam, Jammu and Kashmir, on April 22.He used the word "ceasefire" and claimed it was the result of US mediation.India has said the conflict was resolved as a result of an "understanding" reached between India and Pakistan.

Houthi ceasefire followed US intel showing militants sought off-ramp

WASHINGTON, GNS News Agency, May 20 Days before a surprise U.S. ceasefire agreement with Houthis, U.S. intelligence started picking up indications the Yemeni fighters were looking for an exit after seven weeks of relentless U.S. bombings, four U.S. officials said. Houthi leaders began reaching out sometime around the first weekend in May to U.S. allies in the Middle East, two of the officials said.

"We started getting intel that the Houthis had had enough," one of the sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity to recount the internal discussions about the intelligence, which haven't been previously reported.


Interviews with current and former U.S. officials, diplomatic sources and other experts show how a campaign that the U.S. military's Central Command once envisioned might stretch through most of this year came to abrupt halt on May 6 after 52 days, allowing President Donald Trump to declare victory before heading to the Middle East this week. Since November 2023, the Houthis have disrupted commerce by launching hundreds of drone and missile attacks on vessels in the Red Sea, saying they were targeting ships linked to Israel in solidarity with Palestinians over the war in Gaza. Two sources said Iran played an important role in encouraging the Iran-aligned Houthis to negotiate, as Tehran pursues its own talks with the United States over its nuclear program aimed at ending crippling U.S. sanctions and preventing a military strike by the U.S. or Israel.

But the culmination of the ceasefire accord underscored how quickly the Trump administration moved on initial intelligence to secure what in March seemed unthinkable to many experts in the short term: a Houthi declaration it would stop striking U.S. ships. Trump's unconventional approach included bypassing close U.S. ally Israel, which is not covered by the agreement, and which was not told ahead of time, an Israeli official and a person familiar with the matter said. The Houthis weren't the only ones feeling pressure. The bombing campaign has also been costly to the United States, which has burned through munitions and lost two aircraft and multiple drones. After the early May tips on the Houthis, Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth initiated a series of meetings at the White House on Monday morning, and concluded there was a window of opportunity with the Iran-aligned fighters, one of the officials said. Trump's Middle East envoy Steve Witkoff, who was already leading U.S. negotiations on Iran's nuclear program, worked through Omani mediators and held indirect talks with the chief Houthi negotiator and spokesperson, Mohammed Abdulsalam, two U.S. officials told Reuters.

Abdulsalam was in turn in contact with the Houthis' top leader, Abdul Malik al-Houthi, one of the officials said.A framework agreement was reached later on Monday, one of the officials said. By Tuesday, May 6, Trump was ready to announce an accord, declaring the Houthis had capitulated. "They said please don't bomb us any more and we're not going to attack your ships," he told reporters. Asked about Reuters' findings, the Houthis' Abdulsalam said the group communicated only via Oman and agreed to the ceasefire because the Houthis had been responding to the United States defensively. "So if they stopped their aggression, we stopped our response," Abdusalam told Reuters, declining further comment. A spokesperson for Witkoff did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Each side saw some benefit to striking a deal. For the Houthis, it offered an off-ramp that could allow them to rebuild and relieve pressure that, over months or years, could have strategically put them at risk. U.S. officials and experts say. Washington's allies in the region also wanted out, one source said."Because if the Houthis were under more pressure, their response was going to be to fire on the Saudis or the Emiratis," one person familiar with the matter said.

At the start of the U.S. campaign on March 15, al-Houthi was defiant, saying in a televised address that his fighters would target U.S. ships in the Red Sea as long as the U.S. continued its attacks on Yemen. At the time, it appeared the United States might be locked in a costly stand-off with a group known for its resiliency, as U.S. forces used up munitions during more than 1,100 strikes. Hegseth said the U.S. would only halt its bombings once the Houthis agreed to stop striking U.S. ships and drones. The Houthis shot down seven U.S. MQ-9 drones -- each worth tens of millions of dollars -- since Trump took office. The Harry S. Truman aircraft carrier, whose deployment in the Middle East was extended by Hegseth, lost two fighter jets, including one falling from the deck of the ship after the massive vessel was forced to make a hard turn because of a Houthi attack in the area.

Some analysts questioned the wisdom of the U.S. strategy. The Houthis had already endured nearly a decade of heavy strikes launched by a Saudi-led military coalition, but were able to rebuild to the point where they could threaten the U.S. Navy and Israel. One of the U.S. officials said a turning point for the Houthis came on April 17, when the United States targeted the Houthi-controlled Ras Isa fuel terminal on the Red Sea coast. It was the deadliest strike to that point, with the Houthi-run Health Ministry saying 74 people were killed. The Pentagon has not commented on specific numbers of people killed in individual strikes. "That (damaged) their ability to conduct operations and generate revenue," the official said, describing efforts to squeeze the group economically.



Asked for comment, White House Deputy Press Secretary Anna Kelly told Reuters Trump's ceasefire was "another good deal for America and our security.""The objective at the outset was securing the freedom of navigation, and that was achieved through the restoration of American deterrence."

Pentagon spokesperson Marine Colonel Chris Devine said in response to Reuters' findings that the U.S. military campaign successfully degraded Houthi capabilities and "set the stage for the President to achieve a ceasefire agreement. Trump's campaign to weaken the Houthis came after failed attempts to deter and degrade the group during the Biden administration. The U.S. military's Central Command recommended a campaign, lasting at least eight months, that would include a gradual shift to more targeted strikes from the broader ones that took place in the first few weeks, the official added. The bombings cost well over \$1 billion, officials say, and killed a significant number of midtier Houthi fighters who trained lower-level forces, as well as destroyed multiple command facilities, air defense systems, weapons manufacturing and storage facilities.

They also destroyed stocks of anti-ship ballistic missiles and cruise missiles, aerial drones and drone ships. But the strikes didn't cut Houthi supply lines or fray higher level idly recover. The group's persistent attacks on Israel also demonstrate that it retains significant capability, despite the U.S. campaign. Those have continued after the May 6 ceasefire announcement.U.S. officials and other sources also caution that it is unclear how long the ceasefire will hold, and if the Houthis will continue to see the United States and Israel as separate threats, especially as Israel retaliates against Yemen. "Proxies of Iran and Iran don't distinguish between what is Israel and what is the United States." one person familiar with the situation said. "Their view is that anything Israel does is enabled by the United States. So at some point, I think the Houthis will see themselves as trying to hold the United States accountable. Ecology is the world's permanent economy



The phrase, "Ecology is the permanent economy", made popular by environmentalist Sunderlal Bahuguna, is much more than a slogan. It is a profound reminder of the foundational truth that human prosperity is inextricably linked to ecological health. It is true that economic development without exploiting natural resources and economic stability without conserving them are impossible. As we face serious challenges such as climate change and the rapid loss of biodiversity, we must ask ourselves whether we have truly understood and embraced this idea.

Striking the right balanceUnderstanding nature's complexity is at the heart of science. In this pursuit, humans have made tremendous efforts through observation, experimentation, and modelling, as this understanding is crucial for addressing environmental challenges such as climate change and for informing sustainable practices. While these scientific discussions are valuable, there is an even more urgent and fundamental truth we need to focus on: ecology is the real economy — our survival, security and progress depend on it. In simple terms, this might be the clearest way to define sustainability — finding the right balance between protecting the environment and supporting economic development. Without this balance, neither the environment nor the economy can thrive in the long run.

Despite being part of the animal kingdom, human evolution, through the course of civilisation, has led to a growing disconnection from nature. This disconnection with nature has been identified as a reason for the ongoing biodiversity loss (the recent Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services or IPBES Transformative Change report). In the early stages of human history, a nomadic lifestyle compelled individuals to rely on and exploit natural resources solely for their basic, day-to-day survival needs. Over time, this individualcentric resource use evolved into collective consumption aimed at meeting the needs of growing communities. As human societies expanded and organised themselves into nations, this demand scaled further to cater to the needs of entire countries. Eventually, this progression gave rise to global competition, where nations began to exploit nature not only to satisfy present demands but also to secure resources for future development. Unlike humans, no other species in the animal kingdom exhibits this pattern of largescale, anticipatory exploitation of natural resources. Other

animals live in harmony with their environments, taking only what they need for immediate survival, without disturbing the long-term balance of the ecosystems they inhabit.

The ever-intensifying cycle of human consumption and global competition has placed an unprecedented strain on the planet's ecosystems and significantly accelerated the pace of climate change — a natural phenomenon now dangerously amplified by human activities. In response to these growing environmental challenges, nature-based solutions have been widely advocated in global conservation efforts. These approaches aim to leverage the inherent resilience of ecosystems to mitigate climate impacts, restore biodiversity, and support sustainable development. However, a paradox emerges: we continue to exploit nature to satisfy our needs and greed, while simultaneously relying on the same natural systems to act as a buffer against the consequences of such exploitation. This dual dependence risks creating deeper ecological imbalances and may further complicate the ability to address the climate crisis effectively. In this context, rather than merely attempting to understand the intricate complexity of ecological systems from a scientific standpoint, it is far more critical to recognise a fundamental truth — that ecology is the permanent economy. Acknowledging this principle shifts our perspective from short-term exploitation to long-term stewardship, positioning ecological health not as a constraint, but as the very foundation of human survival, economic stability, and climate resilience. This realisation is not just timely — it is essential to confronting the ongoing environmental crisis and shaping a sustainable future. It is only through this reframing that humanity can move from reactive conservation to proactive planetary sustainability. The climate crisis is not just a scientific challenge. It is a moral and existential reckoning with the ecological foundations of our existence. The need to reconnect with nature

Climate change and change in distribution patterns of biological diversity are not new for planet earth. However, the rate at which it is now occurring is detrimental to the planet's biological diversity, including people, due to past unsustainable developmental activities by humans. Therefore, the change we need must come from within. Since all developmental activities across the globe are aimed at fulfilling human needs, adopting a sustainable lifestyle is every individual's responsibility in order to ensure the success of global sustainability initiatives. To achieve this, we must realise that humans are an integral part of nature. Though technological advancements have distanced modern lifestyles from nature, one unique natural trait that humans possess is the power to reconnect with nature using emotion (which still lives within us). Thus, future conservation efforts should be designed to strengthen our emotional bond with nature. To ignite this, a realisation that "ecology is the permanent economy", is more imperative than merely understanding the ecological complexity that exists in nature.P. Boom in foreign university branch campuses: Can they deliver quality education?



There has been much debate in India about attracting foreign universities to set up branch campuses in India since the University Grants Commission (UGC) established regulations in 2023. A few have set up shop: two Australian universities — Deakin University and the University of Wollongong — in Gujarat's GIFT City, and the U.K.'s University of Southampton in Gurugram, near Delhi. The momentum has continued to grow in recent months, with institutions such as the University of Surrey, Queen's University Belfast, and Coventry University announcing plans to establish campuses. Australia's Western Sydney University is reportedly exploring a presence in Noida, near Delhi.

In another landmark move, the Illinois Institute of Technology recently received formal approval from the UGC to establish a campus in Mumbai, making it the first U.S. university to receive such authorisation. The University of Western Australia has also signalled its intention to open campuses in Tamil Nadu as well as Maharashtra. All these developments mark a significant turning point in India's higher education sector. Deakin and Wollongong, which already began classes last year, and the University of Southampton, which is going to welcome its first batch of students this academic year, have moved ahead quickly, too quick perhaps. While this rapid pace may signal strong intent and enthusiasm, it also raises many concerns. Challenges to the 'branch' idea

Globally, transnational education is navigating an increasingly uncertain landscape. This may be one of the most difficult global environments for universities to establish branches. The country with the largest number of overseas university branches globally, the U.S., is in complete disarray due to the attacks on higher education from the Trump administration. The last thing on the minds of most American university leaders are foreign initiatives. Therefore, the Illinois Institute of Technology's decision to establish a campus in India should be seen only as a rare exception in the current landscape. The other major English-speaking countries—the UK, Australia, and Canada—all face severe financial challenges. European universities may be more interested

Even institutions willing to enter the Indian market will have to overcome numerous domestic challenges. A major issue for foreign university branch campuses entering India is navigating India's highly competitive higher educa-

tion landscape. While foreign branch campuses may carry significant prestige in their home countries, most of the foreign institutions seeking to enter the Indian market are not top schools in their own countries. In India, they risk being seen as just one among several "elite" options available to students. These branch campuses follow a market-driven model, offering programmes in high-demand fields such as Business, Computer Science, and Data Analytics. While this approach may be financially strategic, the narrow academic focus risks making them indistinguishable from India's better-performing private colleges and universities, which already offer similar programmes. Therefore, the real challenge is not merely to meet demand, but to establish a clear academic identity. Without this, they risk being perceived as little more than diploma mills, ultimately undermining the reputation of the very universities they represent. It is also relevant that most of the branches already established or planning to be established are not comprehensive universities with diverse offerings and research focus, but rather are small specialised schools.

India already boasts renowned public institutions such as the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) and Indian Institutes of Management (IIMs), which are actively expanding their global engagement and research capabilities. Notable collaborations—like IIT Delhi with the University of Queensland and IIT Bombay with Monash University—have set strong precedents for international research partnerships. Furthermore, a growing number of elite and semi-elite private universities in India now offer joint and double degree programs in collaboration with foreign institutions. In this dynamic environment, foreign branch campuses cannot rely solely on the strength of their international brand.

No substitute for substanceA concerning trend among some international branch campuses already established in India is their disproportionate reliance on marketing strategies—digital campaigns and branding exercises—often at the expense of academic investment. While marketing has its place, it cannot substitute for substance. Today's students and parents are increasingly discerning. They closely examine publicly available information on faculty credentials, curriculum design, industry relevance, and student support systems. Flashy campaigns without academic depth or meaningful student engagement will not build lasting trust.

In India, education without employment



In defending the educational policies of the present government, it has been claimed that education has been freed from the shackles of previous governments: Atal Tinkering Labs, coding right from middle school, the recruitment of Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe teachers, and the empowerment of Muslim girl students. But primarily, it is stated that the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 "will enable an educational renaissance".In all these utterances, the seminal point that is forgotten is that our educational system remains clueless about the shape-shifting marketplace — namely, the employability of our graduates as a workforce.

Education has many purposes. It enables, it enervates and elevates. As Vivekananda said, education empowers one to stand on one's own feet. After 75 years of foolishly gambling excellence for equity, India has squandered both. Young people are unable to find meaningful employment that is commensurate with any training that they may have received. The degrees they have are not worth the paper on which they are printed. It is irrelevant that these problems were created or ignored by the Congress pot or the Bharatiya Janata Party kettle. The present lawfully elected government has the responsibility to cleanse these Augean stables. Never mind that the NEP 2000 is the fourth such document that was supposed to do this after the Radhakrishnan Commission (1948); the Kothari Commission (1966) and the Officers' Commission (1985). A good education is one with an optimum of depth and breadth. Depth alone imparts the technical expertise for employability. Breadth provides flexibility in a rapidly changing Artificial Intelligence-driven ecosystem, where those in the job market need to constantly re-train themselves to avoid ex-

A high rate of educated unemploymentThere is barely any evidence, four years on, that any of the NEP recommendations have been put into effect. In 2025, India's overall graduate employability rate is 42.6%, which is practically the same as the 44.3% of 2023. Similarly, knowledge-intensive employment in the year 2023 only stands at 11.72%. Multiple entries and exits, a hallmark of NEP, have only created low-quality and poorly paying e-commerce jobs.

The high rate of educated unemployment today shows that education in India is actually disempowering students. The NEP is a retreat to the Vannevar Bush model of the mid-20th century U.S. without its financial cushioning. The NEP is outdated and financially unviable in the India of 2025. With lip service paid to 'new' ideas such as Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS), mother tongue learning, changing history textbooks, flexible curricula and a complete absence of methodology to effect its recommendations, the NEP is a dead fish in the water. It depends on course choice alone to correct imbalances, notwithstanding that the course content itself may be unworkable. It is noteworthy that there was not a single member from industry or the business sectors in the committee that drafted the NEP.A good university seamlessly integrates breadth with depth. It is claimed that there has been a remarkable improvement from the past in that 11 Indian universities are ranked in the top QS World University Rankings (WUR) 500, clearly echoing the selective narrative of Nunzio Quacquarelli, CEO of QS, who was generous in his praise of India, while releasing WUR 25. Mr. Quacquarelli quoted the 318% increase in the performance of Indian universities, as the highest growth among the G-20 nations, quietly avoiding mention of both To wit, India's Category Normalized Citation Impact (CNCI) rank (an indicator of publications quality) during 2008-19 which was 17th among 19 countries in the G-20, inched up admirably to 16th position in 2024. Such 'increases' have been touted by the Ministry in its Press Information Bureau press release of February 13, 2025. It has also been claimed that this is the year when Indian universities showcased the highest performance improvement among all G-20 nations. It is unbelievable that in this digital era, the government has failed to recognise and understand the commercial implications of QS, THE and similar agencies and the reasons for their skewed and deceptive analyses.

A missing transparency on projects

Mega research projects were carried out with great fanfare and amidst a media blitz in the past. These included the New Millennium project (CSIR-NMITLI), the \$10 Akash tablet project, and the IMPRINT (IMPacting Research INnovation and Technology) project (MHRD).

These projects were in the limelight for years, but the public is not aware of the emergence of the intended products or processes from these projects, on which hundreds of crores of taxpayer money has been spent. It does not matter whether these projects were initiated or shut down by the Congress or the BJP. What we, as taxpayers, want to know is if these projects were value for money.

India's Global Innovation Index (GII) represents the innovation capabilities of India. Our ranks in 2014, 2015 and 2024 were 76, 81, and 39. Malaysia and Türkiye lead India in GII with ranks of 33 and 37, respectively. The GII reveals the world's top S&T clusters in two innovation metrics: published patent applications and published scientific articles. India has four clusters with ranks of 56 (Bengaluru), 63 (Delhi), 82 (Chennai) and 84 (Mumbai). The Bengaluru cluster is often touted as an unparalleled rival to Silicon Valley, particularly with respect to the numbers of startups and Unicorns. However, its 56th rank needs to be compared to the sixth-ranked Silicon Valley cluster. In terms of cluster intensity of the top 100, Bengaluru at 94 followed by Chennai at 96, Delhi at 98, and Mumbai at 99 pale in comparison to San Jose-San Francisco (Silicon Valley) at 2 and Cambridge at 1. The number of Patent Cooperation Treaty (PCT) applications per capita and scientific publications per capita for the Silicon Valley cluster are 7885 and 9211, respectively. The corresponding numbers for the Bengaluru cluster are 313 and 1077. Samsung Electronics (South Korean) is the leading patentee in Bengaluru. No further comment is

The subject of start-upsThere is no point talking about start-ups, when we do not know what they mean. Start-ups in China, the U.S. and Israel tackle semiconductor technology, how to refine rare earth elements with ecological sensitivity and how to make metformin cheaper. In contrast, our government lauds new apps that hawk food products. India cannot have start-ups without indigenous technology. It cannot have indigenous technology without indigenous science. It cannot have indigenous science without indigenous quality education, sans political agendas. Two-wheeler kiranas are not startups.

Contrary to the thinking of the Education Ministry, the University Grants Commission (UGC) remains an instrument of control. It always has been and there is no justification for this antediluvian organisation to have both regulatory and financial control over universities. Can the UGC present a single piece of hard data showing that changes in pedagogy and syllabus have had a positive effect? In other words, how relevant are these changes, if any, to industry skilling, and employability? India would probably be better off if the UGC was shut down. Sitting UGC chairs, vicechancellors, directors and ministers need not appear in national dailies peddling their policies and propaganda ad nauseam. A death that spotlights irrigation problems

On March 13, 2025, Kailash Arjun Nagare, a 2020 Young Farmer Award recipient, from Maharashtra, died by suicide, citing unaddressed irrigation demands. While India reports the highest water usage in agriculture globally, access to water for irrigation remains a contentious issue. Nagare's death points towards the inequity in distribution, with social inequalities, water governance mechanisms, and policies determining the contours of allocation. The problem of water scarcity in India is thus multifaceted, indicating the co-existence of actual physical shortage with economic scarcity due to inequitable access and management.

Untenable expansionThe agricultural sector accounts for almost 80% of the water withdrawal in India. Every year, 688 billion cubic metres of water is consumed by the farm sector, the highest in the world. Irrigation is an inevitable input for increasing agricultural production. However, its expansion has been highly untenable. The majority of the area under water-guzzling crops such as rice, wheat, and sugarcane is currently in the water-scarce north-west and subtropical belts of the country. According to a study published in Nature Water (2024), India alone accounted for 36% of global unsustainable irrigation expansion that happened between 2000 and 2015, with environmental and socio-economic implications.

Even as irrigation has been proven to drive economic prosperity, various studies have reported that uneven progress has reinforced existing inequalities, between and within States. Considering that ground water is the dominant water source for irrigation in India, property rights, energy pricing policy, and the existence of well-functioning water markets have remained critical in determining water access to farms. Accordingly, while inequity has declined in canal, tank, and well irrigated systems, it has increased in the tube well irrigated system. Marginalised groups, especially women, are also disproportionately affected by increasing deprivation and decline of water tables with climate change intensifying disparities. The environmental and financial consequences of aggressive groundwater extraction have also been profound. Due to over extraction, almost 17% of India's groundwater assessment units are deemed 'over-exploited' while 3.9% are in a 'critical' state. Intensive pumping has also resulted in massive energy consumption resulting in excessive carbon emissions. As per the latest data, 45.3-62.3 MMT of annual carbon emissions is attributed to groundwater irrigation, which constitutes 8-11% of India's total carbon emissions. The operat-



ing efficiency and water use efficiency has also remained sub-optimal in Indian agriculture. While irrigation systems in India report an operating efficiency of 38%, in developed countries it is 55%. Coupled with misaligned cropping patterns and inefficient water use practices, irrigation water productivity (IWP) has also remained low in the major irrigation belts of the country. For example, Punjab, which claims the highest land productivity in rice, has one of the lowest IWPs for the crop. Similarly, in sugar cane, Tamil Nadu records the highest land productivity with IWP being dismally low. Besides water wastage, the adoption of nonoptimal water management practices have been causing other negative externalities such as high GHG emissions as well. For example, with continuous flooding of rice as the major water management practice, paddy rice is the biggest contributor to global cropland emissions.

Considering the over-exploitation of ground water resources, impending water scarcity and environmental externalities, further attempts to improve the irrigation system of the country should be built on efficient water-saving technologies, improved irrigation efficiency, and alternative sources of irrigation. While change in cropping patterns and ground water usage regulations through policy decisions should also be aimed at in the medium and long term, advancing irrigation technologies and practices based on sustainable intensification should be prioritised. Better irrigation efficiency may be aimed through the improvement of conveyance and application efficiency of irrigation systems. In geographies where water withdrawals and GHG emissions have been highest, alternative water management technologies such as alternate wetting and drying, which can result in significant water saving and reduced emissions, may be popularised.

The Teesta dam and the long shadow of climate change



2025, an expert committee constituted by the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change recommended a proposal to rebuild the Teesta-3 dam on the Teesta river in Sikkim. In October 2023, a powerful glacial lake outburst flood (GLOF) from the South Lhonak lake had decimated the dam and its hydroelectric power generation facility. The waters also carried debris from the dam forward like a fluid battering ram, heightening the damage further downstream. In all, over 100 people were killed while more than 80,000 people in four districts were affected.It became clear later that a moraine on the South Lhonak lake's flank suffered a slope failure, weakening the terminus. The failure also sent rocks tumbling into the lake, generating a strong ripple. The outlet subsequently gave way, with satellite data indicating that around 50 billion litres of water had spilled into the valley. The event also set off multiple landslides about 30 to 40 kilometres downstream. Experts who have since been monitoring the lake also said the moraine has remained unstable. The link with global warming

As global warming and particulate matter — especially black carbon, also known as soot — accelerate the melting of Himalayan glaciers, more runoff is pooling into new lakes or adding to the existing ones. The rate of melting is inversely proportional to the volume, so, as glaciers shrink, they melt faster. A report by the Central Water Commission of last year found that the number of "glacial lakes and other water bodies" in the Himalayan region had become 10.8% more numerous between 2011 and 2024 and that their combined surface area had increased by 33.7% in the same period. The South Lhonak lake itself was formed in the early 1960s and grew to 167 hectares by 2023. Glacial retreat has also been known to destabilise extant geological formations and create new sources of risk. Against this background, the expert committee's decision to recommend the rebuilding of the Teesta-3 dam is worrisome.

As The Hindu has reported, the committee's decision was motivated by the fact that Teesta-3 was "successful" and "commercially viable" and that its power-generating equipment "was largely intact" following the GLOF. Environmental activists and hydrogeology experts alike have expressed misgivings about large hydroelectric power projects in the Himalaya and have questioned the new design's green clearance. Teesta-3 has also been the subject of several public interest litigations asking for it be scrapped: because of its location (in an earthquake- and landslide-prone area); issues in its techno-economic clearance; its non-compliance with a 1996 notification to have Sikkim hold 51% equity; and alleged corruption. According to the committee, Teesta-3 2.0 is to be built with concrete alone rather than concrete and rocks as before: to have a spillway nearly three-times more voluminous; and to have an early-warning system for flooding. The facility's new design is reportedly based on a "worst-case scenario" modelled by the India Meteorological Department, with the "maximum possible rain" in the next century in the region.But one of the hallmarks of climate change is that it is a riskmultiplier. If the slope failure off the South Lhonak lake had occurred without there being a lake, there is unlikely to have been a flood. Likewise, if the moraine had not collapsed, the gradual accumulation of water may have caused the overtopping to flow into the valley less violently than during a GLOF.

The proliferation of glacial lakes, geological instability, dynamics of transient landscape features, and even the flux of atmospheric soot blowing in from industrial centres in the Gangetic plains all increase risks in a way that cannot reasonably be captured by a rainfall-centric model, however. Experts had already doubted whether the 2023 GLOF was triggered by heavy rain because local weather stations recorded only moderate rainfall or less in the area around the time. Professor Raghu Murtugudde has also written in The Hindu ("The value of attributing extreme events to climate change | Explained", May 24, 2024) that the relationships between climate change and local rainfall are hard to characterise because the data for modelling is seldom sufficient. In his words, climate models are "notoriously bad at properly capturing normal rainfall and worse at extreme ones". On January 30, 2025, an international team including experts from the Indian Institute of Technology Bhubaneswar, the Indian Institute of Science Bengaluru, the Indo Tibetan Border Police, and the Government of Sikkim published a comprehensive assessment of the GLOF ("The Sikkim flood of October 2023: Drivers, causes and impacts of a multihazard cascade"). Among other things, they wrote: "Prevailing GLOF modeling and assessment approaches insufficiently account for processes of erosion and sediment transport, as well as hillslope-channel interactions such as riverbank collapses and landslides triggered by toe-undercutting as well as the impact of sediment transport on local bed elevations and hence water levels. The latter is of particular importance in large river basins because water waves move faster than sediment waves..."

The commercial viability of Teesta-3, pre-GLOF, speaks to India's soaring power demand and the pressing need to produce it somewhere. But since climate change multiplies risk everywhere, production in specific locales should be weighed against the consequences. Property and livelihoods downstream of Teesta-3 1.0 suffered greater damage due to the dam being in the swelling river's way. If the new design holds, Teesta-3 2.0 may be able to reduce the downstream damage due to a (hypothetically) identical flood. But if a stronger and/or significantly different flood occurs, the damage could be even greater. A new facility with more moving parts will also create both new success and failure modes. The social security of the region's residents will have to be improved accordingly so that, in the event of a disaster, they are able to piece their lives back together without slipping on any social, health, and/or economic indicators. Brian Stone, Jr., a professor in the School of City and Regional Planning at the Georgia Institute of Technology, U.S., wrote in a 2024 article ("The lunacy of rebuilding in disaster-prone areas"), "We cannot engineer our way out of climate change; retreat is inevitable." That is, if the climate-change-induced risk to X in an area is to be kept constant, in time either the area will shrink or the costs of maintaining X will increase. X could be property, livelihoods, even human lives

That the facility was commercially viable is an insufficient excuse to restore it. Instead, the decision should be made within a framework of priorities led by the need to minimise risk to locals, their property, and their livelihoods and maximise their socio-economic resilience. The framework should also include a risk determination matrix with a response plan and a hard 'unacceptable risk' level. The cost of these measures should be included in the dam's hydroelectric power tariff rather than externalising it in the determination of commercial viability. Anything else would be unsustainable by definition.

Addressing the growing threat of forest fires

As wildfires swept throughout Los Angeles last month, destroying homes and causing casualties and displacements, the urgency of addressing and preventing forest fires took centre stage once again. Unfortunately, forest fires become a point of conversation only when some major incident causes irrevocable damage and captures media and public attention. The fires are a stark reminder that no place is immune from their impacts and that we need a clear pathway to prevent and manage them as their frequency increases. In India, the situation is equally alarming. According to the Forest Survey of India, more than 36% of the country's forest cover is prone to fire. An analysis by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water states that there has been a 10-fold increase in forest fire incidences in the last two decades, whereas the total forest cover has increased by merely 1.12%.

Living on the fringes of the Corbett Tiger Reserve in Uttarakhand, I see the immense value of India's forests, not just as critical enablers of wildlife conservation and sources of biodiversity, but as lifelines for local communities that live around them. While Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh often capture headlines for forest fires, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha, and Karnataka, among others, are also grappling with the frequency and intensity of forest fires. According to various reports, nearly 90% of these fires are caused by human activities such as deliberate land clearing, slash-and-burn agriculture, and unattended campfires. These factors, coupled with climate change-driven factors such as rising temperatures and extended dry spells, intensify the risk of forest fires. Forest fires have widespread consequences — natural, social, and economic — that are all interconnected. Besides the direct loss of trees, wildlife, and biodiversity, they contribute significantly to carbon emissions. A report by the World Resources Institute estimates that Indian forest fires emit approximately 69 million tonnes of CO2 annually. Forest fires result in the loss of timber and non-timber forest products, essential for forestdependent communities, contributing to direct economic losses. A 2018 report by the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change estimated that forest degradation (including forest fires) results in an annual economic loss of approximately ?1.74 lakh crore. Forest fires also disrupt the water cycle, cause soil fertility degradation, and worsen human-wildlife conflict as animals seek refuge in human settlements.India has put in place several policies and schemes to address forest fire management, such as the National Action Plan on Forest Fires and the Forest Fire Prevention and Management Scheme (FFPMS). The centrally sponsored FFPMS assists State governments in strengthening their forest fire prevention and management

A more robust responseHowever, given the growing intensity of forest fires in India, much more remains to be done. First, Budget constraints have proven to be an obstacle. For example, the FFPMS's funding allotment has



fluctuated over time. In 2019-2020, it received ?46.40 crore, followed by ?32.47 crore in 2020-2021, ?34.26 crore in 2021-2022, and ?28.25 crore in 2022-2023. The budget projection for 2023-2024 was ?51 crore, which was revised to ?40 crore. The planned allocation for 2024-2025 is ?50 crore. This shows the need for more steady support. On the technology front, the existing Forest Fire Alert System cannot distinguish between forest fires and other types of fires, delaying ground-level validation and response. India could use advanced predictive modelling to help identify high-risk areas based on climatic and geographic data. This must be supplemented by using drones equipped with thermal imaging cameras to monitor fire-prone areas, assess damage, and guide firefighting efforts. States such as Tamil Nadu and Odisha have already piloted such initiatives, which could be scaled nationally. In addition, there is merit in also exploring how relevant and existing data from the Forest Survey of India, the India Meteorological Department, and the Indian Space Research Organisation can be integrated and analysed for better forest fire management.

Equipping more and more local communities to collect and share real-time data to report fires as soon as they are sighted through mobile applications, toll-free helplines, and SMS-based systems can strengthen early warning systems and ensure rapid, localised response. In Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh, self-help groups, primarily women, collect pine needles to blunt future fires. India can also draw from Nepal's Community Forest User Groups and Indonesia's Fire-Free Village Program to strengthen community forest fire management. Empowering communities with awareness, training, and resources and engaging youth as 'forest fire scouts' can foster stewardship, combining local knowledge with modern tools like fire risk mapping and controlled burns. Forest fires are not just an environmental issue — they are societal and economic, affecting livelihoods, health, and the foundation of our ecosystems. Addressing this challenge requires the collaboration of policymakers, scientists, civil society groups, and communities. From creating supporting infrastructure through policy intervention, improved budgeting, technology adoption, and building a cadre of trained personnel to empowering communities — all measures must go hand-in-hand to turn the tide.

So far, 65 awareness camps and drives have been conducted in a bid to curb the outbreak of fires, which are a major concern in Bandipur during the dry season. The tiger reserve has a history of devastating fires that have previously ravaged vast stretches of forest.S. Prabhakaran, director of Bandipur Tiger Reserve, told The Hindu that the awareness drive will continue until nearly all the hamlets and villages bordering the forests are covered. "This is a proactive measure to build goodwill and gain the trust of the local community in protecting the fragile ecosystem, which is highly vulnerable to fire," he said. The importance of this initiative stems from the need to enlist local cooperation in the early detection of fires. Also, fire prevention is most effective when the community is involved and feels a sense

of ownership over the forest. Spread over 912 sq.km., Bandipur had more than 150 tigers as per the Status of Tigers and Co-predators – 2022, published by the National Tiger Conservation Authority. It also has over 1,100 elephants and harbours leopards, dholes, and a healthy prey density to support the carnivore population. Hence fire protection is taken seriously as the outbreak of any conflagration could mar the quality of the habit which is already under threat from weeds like lantana. Though forest fires are considered a natural part of the ecosystem, it tends to be uncontrolled and devastating when aggravated by human activity such as agricultural burning, or careless disposal of cigarette butts.

There have also been instances of deliberate stoking of fire to get even with the Forest Department when it files cases against the locals on charges of trespassing, timber logging, or any other offence. The Bandipur Yuva Mitra outreach programme, which is an ongoing project that conducts educational workshops for local students, is also paying dividends and has created a batch of eco-volunteers who will keep a watch on outbreaks of fire if any. The outreach programme has targeted students who have been apprised of the long-term consequences of fires in the forest and how it not only affects wildlife but also have a negative bearing on the livelihood of people surrounding the forests. In addition to the above, the customary burning of fire lines has been completed by clearing vegetation, said Mr. Prabhakaran. Nearly 2,900 km of fire line has been created, he added. Creating firelines is one of the fire management techniques adopted in India wherein vegetation is removed through controlled burning to create a bald patch of land along the boundaries of different compartments in the forest. If a fire breaks out in one compartment, the bald strip of land or firelines will prevent its spread to other compartments. Mr. Prabhakaran said the major hotspots for fire in Bandipur are the Kundukere range, G.S. Betta, and Maddur ranges which are also surrounded by a lot of villages thus

The two sides of the rising phenomenon of internet-based self-diagnosis of mental health disorders

It turns out that many people especially youngsters, have begun diagnosing themselves with mental health disorders after checking out symptoms on social media or through internet search engines.

Both psychologists and psychiatrists in Bengaluru say they have noticed an increase in the number of patients who walk into their clinics with such diagnoses. Anxiety, depression and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) are some commonly self-diagnoses in such patients. "We see many young adults, specifically in their 20s or early 30s, coming in with information they have derived from social media. For instance, they say things like, "I procrastinate, so I have ADHD. Medical terms are very loosely used on the internet and people see these broad, vague, non-specific criteria and diagnose themselves," said Arohi Vardhan Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist at Cadabams Hospitals. In a country like India, where speaking about, or seeking help for mental health issues has been taboo and stigmatised for a long time, doctors believe that celebrities coming out and speaking about their mental health issues has led to greater awareness and openness, and may have led to more people trying to identify their own issues. "People, in general, are more aware now in terms of both physical and mental health due to the widespread dissemination of information on the internet. One in five persons usually suffers from either anxiety or depression and while these problems existed in society for a long time, there was a lot of stigma around it. It is evident in literature that when there is more awareness in the community, people reach out for help more and that leads to better outcomes," says Senthi Reddi, professor of psychiatry at NIMHANS. He added, "A lot of famous people have spoken about their disorders, including learning disabilities and this has been helpful in starting a conversation around mental health. The fact that people are coming in and seeking help is a good thing, as there have been some changes even in the classification of diseases recently. It has been recognised that there is



an overlap of disorders and when it comes to ADHD, autism and similar diseases, it is difficult to compartmentalise, and it is important to identify those who are struggling across the spectrum and not just the ones struggling with severe symptoms."

While being largely appreciative of the fact that people are seeking help, doctors have also noticed that a chunk of such patients tend to convince themselves that they have a specific disorder or that medicines have side effects. This sometimes leads to the development of the infamous Internet Derived Information Obstructing Treatment (IDIOT) syndrome, doctors have observed. "While patients may have some features of a disorder, it should be decided by a professional as to whether they actually have that disorder. But some patients decide that they have a specific disorder and seek specific treatment. It is very difficult to convince them that their symptoms indicate a different disorder. We usually evaluate them in the first few sessions and then tell them what the core disorder is. Then, most people are very understanding," Dr. Vardhan said, Similar issues were also flagged by Shashidhar Bilagi, a practising psychiatrist in Bengaluru. "Most people seek information on the internet and just go to a therapist. However, for severe disorders, it is very important to consult psychiatrists. When it comes to medicines especially, there is a lot of misconception and wrong information on the internet about side effects. Patients refuse to take these medicines and suffer from severe disorders. To reduce the stigma, they go on the internet, but fail to seek the right kind of treatment. It is important that patients do not rely on the internet for help," he said.

Retail inflation rate eases to near six-year low of 3.16% in April



Retail inflation rate slipped to a 69-month or near sixyear low of 3.16 per cent in April, primarily due to moderation in prices of food items including vegetables, pulses, cereals, meat and fish, data released by the National Statistics Office (NSO) showed. This marked the sixth month of a downward trajectory in retail inflation, the lowest inflation level after July 2019 and the third successive month of inflation rate remaining below the Reserve Bank of India's band of 4+/- 2 per cent for medium-term inflation targeting.

Food inflation, based on the Consumer Food Price Index (CFPI), moderated for the sixth consecutive month, easing to a 42-month low of 1.78 per cent in April from 2.69 per cent a month ago and 8.7 per cent in April 2024. Vegetables recorded a deflation of 10.98 per cent in April, the sharpest pace of decline since February 2023, while pulses also recorded a deflation of 5.23 per cent in April as against a deflation of 2.73 per cent in the previous month, marking the fastest fall in prices over six years.

The meat and fish segment registered a fall in prices to (-) 0.35 per cent after a gap of 22 months in April 2025, while the cereals inflation slipped to a 35-month low of 5.3 per cent due to better kharif output. "The easing of food inflation would help in bringing relief to households and the consumption demand as we begin the new fiscal," Paras Jasrai, Associate Director, India Ratings and Research said.

Going ahead, a favourable monsoon should help keep inflation in control, raising expectations of a rate cut by the

RBi in the upcoming June monetary policy review meeting. "A record rabi harvest and robust pulses output indicated by the Union Ministry of Agriculture's Second Advance Estimates, and the forecast of a favourable monsoon for the upcoming kharif season should keep food inflation in check this fiscal. Given the current inflation trajectory, a further 25-basis point rate cut is expected in the Reserve Bank of India's monetary policy review in June," a CRISIL report said. While the overall inflation in FY26 is seen below 4 per cent, the cumulative rate cut in FY26 would depend on the pace of decline in inflation and evolving inflation-growth dynamics, economists said.

The decline in retail inflation was sharper in rural areas than urban areas, which is expected to increase the recovering rural demand. Rural retail inflation was recorded at 2.92 per cent in April as against 3.25 per cent in March, while urban inflation declined to 3.36 per cent in April from 3.43 per cent in March. Food inflation in rural areas eased to 1.85 per cent in April from 2.82 per cent in March, while that in urban areas moderated to 1.64 per cent in April from 2.48 per cent in March. The declining trend, however, was not uniform as fuel and light and core inflation saw an uptick. Fuel and light inflation rate rose to 2.92 per cent in April from 1.48 per cent in the previous month.

Core inflation — the non-food, non-fuel segment of inflation — remained firm at 4.1 per cent in April, the highest level since November 2023, indicating signs of demand being steady, Jasrai said. Retail inflation (excluding vegetables and pulses) shot up to an 18-month high of 4.4 per cent in April, he said. Some economists differed on the view that the lower inflation print will lead to a rate cut, saying that while the headline inflation print is within RBI's forecast for Q1, it will take note of the fact that the decline is mainly due to lower food prices. "While 3.2% is within RBI's forecast of 3.6% for Q1, the central bank will be cognizant of the fact that the number has come down mainly due to vegetables which have a weight of 6 per cent in the index. Excluding this component keeps inflation at the target rate. Therefore, this factor will be kept in mind. It does look like that this number may not trigger a rate cut given that there would be time to evaluate both the monsoon and tariff issues before taking a final call in August. Inflation would likely be low in May and June too due to the base effect," Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda said.

Chegg to lay off 22% of workforce as AI tools shake up edtech industry

Chegg said on Monday it would lay off about 22% of its workforce, or 248 employees, to cut costs and streamline its operations as students increasingly turn to Al-powered tools such as ChatGPT over traditional edtech platforms. The company, an online education firm that offers textbook rentals, homework help and tutoring, has been grappling with a decline in web traffic for months and warned that the trend would likely worsen before improving.

Google's expansion of AI Overviews is keeping web traffic confined within its search ecosystem while gradually shifting searches to its Gemini AI platform, Chegg said, adding that other AI companies including OpenAI and Anthropic were courting academics with free access to subscriptions. As part of the restructuring announced on Monday, Chegg will also shut its U.S. and Canada offices by the end of the year and aim to reduce its marketing, product development efforts and general and administrative expenses.

The majority of the resulting charges of \$34 million to \$38 million are expected to be incurred in the second and third quarters. Chegg expects cost savings of between \$45 and \$55 million in 2025 and \$100 to \$110 million in 2026



due to the restructuring. It also reported first-quarter results on Monday, saying subscribers declined 31% in the period to 3.2 million. Revenue declined 30% to \$121 million, as its subscription services revenue fell by nearly a third to \$108 million. In February, Chegg sued Google saying Google's internet search engine was eroding demand for original content and undermining publishers' ability to compete with its artificial intelligence-generated overviews, thereby causing a drop in visitors and subscribers.

The right to repair movement in India



What is the Repairability Index? What does 'planned obsolescence' with respect to electronics mean? How different is the right to repair movement in the U.S. as compared to India? How are consumer advocates and electronic manufacturers responding to the Index?

The story so far: The Department of Consumer Affairs (DoCA) last week announced that a report for a "Framework on Repairability Index (RI) in Mobile and Electronic Sector" had been submitted to the government. Under the RI, consumer electronics and electronic appliances would be assigned a score depending on how easy they are to repair by evaluating products under criteria like availability of spare parts, cost of repair, software updates, and availability of information.

Why is there a focus on repairing products?

The home appliance industry is full of examples of products like washing machines and air conditioners which if purchased several years ago work for a long time without any problems, while the newer ones face frequent failures. While "planned obsolescence" — selling consumers less durable products intentionally so that they come back to buy a newer model — is often cited as a reason for this, there is often a simpler reason: companies are cutting corners on raw materials and manufacturing, under the strain of increasing metal costs and price competition. Attero Recycling CEO Nitin Gupta said in an interaction with The Hindu in 2023 that the "amount of metal content on [appliance] units" had come down, and that shortages in materials like copper have led to leaner engineering choices. India is a net importer of metals, Mr. Gupta said, increasing pressures to maintain existing electronic products.

These developments have made repair a much bigger issue in many electronics, and a looming factor for consumers to consider when purchasing a product. This isn't a uniquely Indian problem. U.S. lawmaker Marie Gluesenkamp Perez recently described a draft law she had introduced requiring appliance makers to display average annual maintenance and repair costs alongside the price of a product, and said that longer-lasting older appliances (and

potentially newer ones built to last) like washing machines were a form of "durable wealth" as they last longer. Prolonging the life of an appliance ties into other priorities, like promoting e-waste recycling (part of what Indian officials have described as a "circular economy," where parts and metals go back into a value chain, a long-held but inadequately achieved aim), and regulating the demand for "virgin" metals that have been freshly mined. The main impetus, however, is likely the end-consumer benefit of having longer-lasting products. Since the processing power of smartphones and computers in particular have not grown as much in recent years as in the 2010s, ecological and economic imperatives align on making sure that consumers have products that last, or at least products that can be repaired cheaply and quickly.

What is the right to repair?

Consumer groups around the world have been fighting for the right to repair, a broad umbrella term referring to greater flexibility for a consumer in terms of how they can get their products repaired. In India, the DoCA has launched a right to repair portal, which lists the authorised service centres of various manufacturers and repair literature published by them. This is a non-confrontational interpretation of the right to repair. In the U.S., consumer groups have rallied around the term to resist companies that seek to monopolise the repair of their products, such as by restricting access to spare parts, and penalising customers who choose third party repair services. Protections for such customers have emerged from the American right to repair movement, but the Indian interpretation aligns closely with equipment manufacturers' insistence that the availability of authorised service channels are sufficient. With the RI framework, the government indicated that it would work to pursue such scoring "without causing any impediment to the industry with regard to innovation and ease of doing business". Electronics makers have strenuously fought some right to repair legislations in the U.S., cautious of the business impact of losing repair revenue, which has emerged as a key revenue stream in some sectors. McDonald's ice cream machines are a commonly cited example, as they break down frequently and franchisees have only been permitted to have them repaired by technicians of the Taylor Company, which makes the machines.

The committee that drafted the RI framework was dominated in membership by industry groups and electronics manufacturers. However, that does not mean that the deliberations and the report's outcome will completely favour them, like the right-to-repair portal did. Pushpa Girimaji, a consumer rights advocate and lawyer who has closely tracked the intricacies of the right to repair, was part of the committee; Ms. Girimaji recently described a manufacturer's refusal to offer repair on an aging lift as "highly exploitative and a violation of the consumers' right to choice," and hit many of the key notes that consumer advocates elsewhere have advocated for, including accommodation of third party repair services.

Two effective hacks to get rid of cockroaches from your kitchen: 'They are unhygienic and spread diseases'



On social media, MasterChef Pankaj Bhadouria often shares tips and tricks from her kitchen to help us navigate the culinary world. However, the kitchen isn't just about the food. A lot more goes into its maintenance and upkeep, which adds to the cooking experience. Hygiene is a top priority, and preventing food contamination from cockroaches becomes essential to keeping your kitchen clean and tidy. "Cockroaches are a big menace in the kitchen! They are unhygienic and spread diseases," Bhadouria stated on Instagram, before sharing two handy tips to keep these pests at bay.

According to her, the most effective way to get rid of cockroaches is to use boric powder. "In a small bowl, take equal quantities of boric powder and powdered sugar. Sprinkle this mixture in specific corners around the kitchen that are infested by cockroaches," said the chef, explaining that the temptation of sugar would lure in insects, and the boric acid would kill them.

She recommended taking baking soda and powdered sugar and repeating the process above.Let's understand

why these hacks can come in handyDeepak Sharma from the India Pest Control Company told indianexpress.com that boric acid, which comes in gel and powder forms, is the most common ingredient for pest control. "Since boric acid has an electrostatic charge, it clings to a cockroach's body as the insect walks through a treated area. While grooming itself, the pest ingests this powder, which attacks its nervous system," he clarified.However, boric powder's effectiveness depends on its correct application. "Homeowners must track the pests' activity to find the right spots to lay down a layer of dust. Hence, knowledge of the pests' signs and habits makes treatments more likely to succeed," said Sharma.

It is essential to remember that boric acid does not affect cockroach eggs. "Even though adult roaches may respond to treatments, their young often remain safe in hardto-reach spaces to grow and multiply," said the expert. However, he emphasised that boric acid alone won't stop the pests. "Practice exclusion tactics to keep more of the insects from moving in. Cleaning drains and sealing cracks that the pests use for hiding places or to obtain entrance into the home helps prevent new infestations," he added. Previously, celebrity chef Ananya Banerjee shared that food contamination caused by cockroaches can lead to stomach issues, digestive discomfort, and even infections. Getting rid of them requires a combination of cleanliness, natural repellents, and preventive measures. "Wipe drawers regularly with a vinegar and water solution (1:1 ratio). This is to remove food particles and odours. Avoid leaving food crumbs or spills inside drawers. Store food in airtight containers to prevent attracting roaches," the culinary expert had shared. "You can also try some natural DIY hacks to keep cockroaches at bay, such as placing dried bay leaves across your kitchen since their strong smell keeps roaches away. Cloves, cinnamon, and neem leaves also do the trick. Mix a couple of drops of neem oil in water and spray it in the room for added effect," shared Banerjee.

'They were almost starving themselves': Gautami Kapoor on how the entire family joined husband Ram's weight loss journey; impact of collective dieting on emotional health



Dramatic weight loss stories often draw admiration, but the emotional and behavioral toll they take on individuals and families is rarely spoken about. Actor Ram Kapoor's recent transformation, from 140 kg to 85 kg in a year, has stirred conversation not just for the numbers, but also for what it took behind the scenes. His wife, actor Gautami Kapoor, spoke about their family's sacrifices during this period. "We have been in the midst of some crazy controversies this year. But let me tell you, it's been really, really hard. It's been a journey not just for Ram, but for all of us as a family. We stopped socialising, stopped going out, and stopped ordering food from outside — something we used to love." she said in a chat with Hautterfly.

Gautami revealed that their daughter Sia lost 38 kilos before Ram began his intense weight loss plan, which included extreme measures like 24-hour and 48-hour fasts. "But what really pushed him was Sia. She started her weight loss journey before Ram, and I think that motivated him deeply," she said. Their son also lost ten kilos during the same period. While acknowledging the collective motivation, she admitted, "My daughter warned me not to say anything. But they were almost starving themselves — Sia, Ram... they were determined."

When a family embarks on weight loss, how can they maintain a healthy emotional balance and relationship with food?

Dr Sapare Rohit, consultant psychiatrist at Maarga Mind Care, tells indianexpress.com, "When an entire family undertakes lifestyle changes like weight loss, it can foster strong support and shared motivation. However, the challenge lies in ensuring these changes don't compromise their emotional well-being or relationship with food. Food is not just fuel; it's deeply tied to culture, emotion, and connection. Eliminating social outings or food-related rituals can unintentionally create a sense of isolation or even guilt around enjoyment."He adds that the key is balance. Families can intentionally introduce new food traditions that are both health-conscious and joyful, like cooking together, exploring healthier versions of favorite dishes, or designating certain days for mindful indulgence.

How risky are extreme fasting methods like 24-hour or 48-hour fasts when done frequently?

Ashlesha Joshi, senior nutritionist at Tone 30 Pilates, tells indian express.com, "While intermittent fasting can offer certain metabolic benefits when practiced in moderation and under guidance, extended fasts for the sake of rapid weight loss can lead to issues like electrolyte imbalance, fatigue, muscle loss, and a slowed metabolism." From a nutritional standpoint, she says, the body requires a steady supply of nutrients to support brain function, hormonal balance, and energy levels. "Frequent extreme fasting can disrupt these processes and trigger binge-eating cycles, poor mood regulation, or even disordered eating patterns in the long run."What's especially concerning is the social mediafueled pressure to achieve dramatic results in short periods. "Quick fixes rarely address the underlying habits that contribute to long-term health. Sustainable weight loss requires a more balanced approach that prioritises nourishment, consistency, and mental well-being over extremes,"

Ruben Amorim pays for friends, family of 30 Manchester United backroom staff to watch Europa League final after club refuses to



With Manchester United reportedly refusing to pay for the costs of club staff members' friends and family to attend the Europa League final against Tottenham Hotspur, club manager Ruben Amorim has stepped in and offered to bear the costs of 30 members of the backroom staff. Football clubs usually offer to pay for friends and family members of the backroom staff to attend big-ticket finals. But with United currently undertaking a raft of severe cost-cutting measures, the club have allegedly told their coaches, physios and support staff that there will be no complimentary tickets for next week's final at Estadio San Mamés. Instead, staff members were told they could purchase up to two tickets from the club's allocation of 15,000 seats for the game.

The New York Times reported that even Manchester

United's players have only been granted two complimen tary tickets for their family members to attend the final.ESPN reported that in contrast to United's approach, Paris Saint-Germain, who will play in the UEFA Champions League final, have confirmed that they will foot the bill for 600 members of staff to attend their final against Inter Milan in Munich on May 31. Earlier in the year, Manchester United had cut jobs and had closed the staff canteen at Old Trafford. It had also stopped the free lunches being offered to staff and instead offered them fruit. At Manchester United's Carrington training base, players receive lunch as gratis while staff members are now offered soup and bread. Manchester United's drastic financial belt-tightening measures come after five straight years of financial losses for the club. Both United and Tottenham are looking at the Europa League final as a face-saver for a season of woe where they are currently in 16th and 17th spots in the Premier League, just above the relegation spots.

Amorim had gone as far as saying that he felt "embarrassed" by United's results on the football pitch this
season. The United head coach said it was "hard to accept"
the team's woeful domestic campaign. "It's my fault, I'm responsible. If we cannot change that really fast, we should
give our place to different people," he said. United has suffered more defeats this season than in any campaign since
the Premier League was launched in 1992. The joint-record
20-time English champion is also certain to record its worstever points total in that period, as well as its lowest finish.

How Carlo Ancelotti's move from Real Madrid to Brazil got awkward

Carlo Ancelotti is swapping Real Madrid for Brazil in one of the biggest moves in world football. The problem is, neither he, nor Madrid, want to talk about it. As coaching switches go, they don't come any bigger than this. But when news broke on Monday that Ancelotti was leaving the sport's most successful and iconic club team to take charge of its most successful and iconic national team, there was an awkward silence.

Madrid chose to ignore the announcement by the Brazilian soccer federation and was still to publicly acknowledge it 24 hours later. There was silence, too, from Ancelotti, who didn't even provide a quote for his new employer when it published its official statement. That left an uncomfortable vacuum until Ancelotti finally confirmed his departure during a scheduled news conference on Tuesday, which he only took part in because he was supposed to preview Madrid's upcoming match against Mallorca. "If I didn't have this news conference today it would have been a fantastic day. But in this news conference I have to explain things that I don't want to explain," the Italian coach said. Becoming coach of record five-time world champion Brazil should be among the proudest moments of Ancelotti's career. He will be the first foreign coach of Brazil at a World Cup — taking charge of the team of Pele, Ronaldo and Neymar; and the most iconic yellow jersey in soccer. But even for Ancelotti - who is famed for his cool demeanor on the sideline, cigar smoking and the odd raised eyebrow — his reaction has been understated. The 65-year-old Ancelotti — who has won a record five Champions League titles as a coach begins his new job later this month with a view to leading Brazil to next year's World Cup. With three more rounds of the Spanish season to go, Ancelotti said he did not want "anybody asking me about other things, because I respect



this jersey a lot and I want to respect it until the last day."The announcement came after Madrid's 4-3 loss to Barcelona over the weekend all but confirmed the defending Spanish champion would surrender its league title.

Barcelona needs just two points to be crowned champion and can complete the job against Espanyol on Thursday. Ancelotti's exit has been long-trailed, with departing Bayer Leverkusen coach Xabi Alonso widely expected to replace him. So news of the deal will not have come as a surprise to Madrid, which was involved in the negotiations to release Ancelotti early from a contract that had another year to run. But its silence has been notable, with no messages of congratulations or thanks to a coach that won two Champions League titles and the Spanish title in his second spell at the club. Ancelotti also coached Madrid from 2013-15, which saw him win another Champions League. Despite Ancelotti's future being confirmed, Madrid has not been pushed into responding with an announcement of its own succession plans. "Real Madrid will release the statement when they want. There's no problem whatsoever. They'll do it at the appropriate time for Real Madrid and there's nothing further to add," Ancelotti said.

Also an impact knock in the second innings.. we lost that game closely.. but apart from his knocks what I remember was the bowling in the first innings. Joe Root was batting superbly. Virat ran back from short midwicket frantically - there was a fielder at cow corner – and he actually fell down while retrieving and throwing the ball. The ball would fall on the stumps and Root was run out. Sorry if am mistaken about the batsman if it was Root or Bairstow (it was Root, indeed runout by Kohli on 80). He would gesture a mic-drop mo-

I don't intend this as derogatory but the thought that ran in my head: "the ball didn't have momentum. Perhaps a second run wasn't there or it could have been run but in a Test match to show this kind of intensity to pull off a gamebreaking moment, I wanted to ask him: who are you man..who are you? England would do the same. With all these formats, I don't know if anyone can match his longevity performance. It's an extraordinary feat and a feat that Virat Kohli should really be proud of. He just didn't promote Test cricket but brought the intensity and changed work ethics. For that, I have to offer a big salaam to him. Two of my personal favourite knocks was his 235 against England in Mumbai, where we gave them an innings defeat. A fabulous knock. Another one was at Centurion in South Africa in 2018. England fast bowling great James Anderson has hailed Virat Kohli, with whom he shared a storied rivalry, as one of the greatest batters to ever play Test cricket. The 42-year-old however feels that India have the pool of talent that can fill up the gap left by even someone of Kohli's stature.

Kohli retired from Test cricket on Monday, bringing the curtains down on a glorious career in which he finished as India's fourth highest run scorer of all time in the format. His decision came just days after longtime teammate and captain Rohit Sharma also retired from the format. "Great players. There will be a new captain because Sharma has re-

tired. Kohli, one of the greatest Test batters that's ever been. There's big shoes to fill there but they've got a huge amount of talent in their squad," said Anderson on TalkSport. "You just have to watch the IPL. They are bringing players into Test cricket from the IPL now who are just so attacking, aggressive, and fearless."

The rivalry between Anderson and Kohli often took centre stage during Test series between India and England for more than a decade, particularly when the former play at the latter's home. Anderson's devastating spells had resulted in Kohli having one of his worst series of all time in England in 2014 and the former India captain then hit back by scoring nearly 600 runs the next time India played in the country in 2018.FILE: Virat Kohli in action for India. Kohli and Rohit's retirements come with just over a month remaining for India's five-Test tour of England. Anderson stated that England should be wary of underestimating India and focusing on the Ashes that is coming later this year. "It's a huge year with the Ashes coming but it is important to get some momentum going. "If I'm being honest, looking back at my career, that happened too much where, 18 months out from an Ashes the management and even the players starting to look towards that and actually forgetting what's in front of you. India is going to be such a tough challenge even at home. They are a strong side," said Ander-

'Move we'll question for ages': How one move from Gukesh forced him to lose from a drawn position vs Alireza Firoujza

Of all the words in the chess vocabulary, zugzwang is probably the one that chess players find the most irritating (Or the most pleasing). The word is a gift to the sport from the Germans, and refers to a situation in a chess battle where you get arm-twisted into making a bad move — because no good ones are possible. It's one of those excruciating moments in chess where you wish you could be allowed to pass on a move because the only moves you can make significantly weaken your chances. Reigning world champion Gukesh Dommaraju lost his round 6 clash against Alireza Firoujza at the Superbet Chess Classic 2025 in Bucharest late on Tuesday after a blunder on move 53 with his dark-squared bishop, which allowed the French-Iranian grandmaster to arm-twist him into a zugzwang which then led to a resignation with checkmate unavoidable. Defeat to Alireza in round 6 means that Gukesh is still without a win in the entire tournament in Bucharest. The world champion has lost twice now at the event, and is currently 10th in the 10-player standings. Since he became the youngest world champion in the history of the sport at the age of 18 last year, Gukesh has had limited success on the chess board. He did almost win the title at Tata Steel Chess in Wijk aan Zee at the start of the year. He was denied there after losing the final game to Arjun Erigaisi, and then losing to Pragg in a tie-break. Since then, he's played in two Freestyle Chess events where there has been little reason to celebrate. But those were freestyle chess events — a variant of the sport that players have called a completely different sport altogether.


In fact, on the live broadcast of the game on the Saint Louis Chess Club YouTube page, grandmaster Peter Svidler who was analysing games, had declared, "This is not going to go anywhere for a while". He had just signalled to the broadcast team behind the scenes to switch the



graphics to the game between Fabiano Caruana and Bogdan-Daniel Deac. And then, Gukesh shifted his bishop to g5, and changed the contours of the game. "Sir, what are you doing, sir?" said a stunned Svidler, who has been working as a trainer for another member of India's golden generation, Praggnanandhaa, since last year. "Why would you (do that), why would you remove it from the long diagonal? Why isn't the bishop on the long diagonal? I do not understand," he shrugged. "That bishop to g5 is a move we will question for the ages," said Seirawan. "The bishop was on a magnificent square. This is the world champion we are talking about, walking into an obvious zugzwang. Bishop to g5 was totally uncalled for. That's it! That blunders the pawn!"

What Seirawan meant was, as soon as Gukesh had shifted his bishop to g5 rather than putting it on e5, or even c3, it allowed Alireza to plant his rook on b7, threatening Gukesh's only remaining pawn on f7. Gukesh moved his pawn forward by a square, which allowed his rival to slide his rook behind the pawn. Now, Gukesh had no option but to move his bishop away from protecting his pawn, and as soon as he did, Alireza rook gobbled it up while also delivering a check on Gukesh's king. After some desperate dodging, Gukesh surrendered 13 moves later. Before that error from Gukesh, he and Alireza had played out a rollercoaster middlegame that saw the Frenchman, playing with white pieces, hold an edge as early as the 18th move after the world champion opted not to castle his king to safety and tuck it away behind a column of two doubled pawns. But Gukesh had managed to maneuver his way out of trouble as his opponent had courted time trouble by the 23rd move and then squander his edge right around the 30th move, when Gukesh spent his time well to find moves that

Regina Cassandra wants to play more North Indian characters: 'Not knowing the language is an excuse, Bollywood has bigger issues to deal with'



Regina Cassandra has been working in the Tamil film industry for 20 years. She's also appeared in Telugu films, but made her Hindi film debut only five years ago in Shelly Chopra Dhar's Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga (2019). Since then, she's made a mark with shows like Rocket Boys, Shoorveer, Farzi, and Jaanbaaz Hindustan Ke, and more recently this year, with films like Jaat and Kesari 2: The Untold Story of Jallianwala Bagh, where she played the wife of Akshay Kumar. In an exclusive interview with SCREEN, Regina talks about making inroads into Bollywood, whether she's equipped to do North Indian characters, and starting her Bollywood journey with a queer character.

This year, we've seen you play the villain in Vidaamuyarchi and Jaat. Would you say you're in your evil era?

(Laughs) I don't think I'm in my evil era. I've always been about balancing, and Kesari 2 would also prove that. Back in 2022, when I was doing Rocket Boys, I also did an item song ("Saana Kastham" in Telugu film Acharya). I've always wanted to be a versatile actor. Proving yourself in this industry is not very easy, unless you get the opportunity to. And I've only been blessed enough to get the opportunity to play different roles. To my luck, the industry is constantly changing in favour of women doing different kinds of roles.

Balancing is great, but how do you make limited screentime roles like the ones in Kesari 2 or Farzi your own?

At the end of the day, you're expected to do the job you're assigned to the fullest. The audience has also become really smart and sensitive. Thanks to social media, Instagram, Twitter or Reddit, people have become very aware of what's going on, whether it's how much a film has made to where an actor is from. Sometimes, people within the industry don't know a South actor or from any other language. But the audience does! At the end of the day, you make films for the audience. I think it's a compliment when the audience or the reviewers say they wanted to see more of me. That's a big win. It's something I'll take home happily. And that's been a unanimous case with my films where my role is smaller than other actors. It's not even a moment of pride for me. I just feel blessed that people are so accepting of my work. When they talk about my screen presence, I feel like I'm on the right path.

In Kesari 2, we see you as the partner of a complex man. In the scene when Akshay Kumar's character says, "Let's go home," you don't oppose it, but just quietly support his decision. How did you crack that chemistry with him?

She was a support system at the end of the day. There's a lot of power in silence, and in silently supporting the people you love. It's sometimes the only way you can be there. You can't change anything or make the person feel a different way.

From Rocket Boys to Kesari 2, you've often been cast as a South Indian character. Do you think the Hindi film industry will ever cast South Indian actors like you as North Indian characters?

Will they, I don't know. Should they, yes. Because Bollywood is pretty unpredictable. In fact, I'd love for them to cast me as a Punjabi. The South has always been welcoming of North Indians, especially female actors. In Bollywood, technicians have been from the South.

But that's more to do with skill. Do you think language becomes a hurdle?

I feel that's just an excuse. It's something we can work on. We've got bigger issues to deal with. You're telling me dubbing for an actor or getting them to go through classes isn't possible? It's not about the lack of an actor wanting to put in the effort. I know I can look like a North Indian as well. It's not that I'm not trying. I've auditioned for North Indian characters. You did play a North Indian character, Kuhu, in your debut Hindi film, Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga. Right?

Yes, in fact, those are the kind of directors I really admire because she wanted to work with me just because of my work. She didn't think how I'd figure out the accent. And I dubbed for myself! I'm a big ally of the LGBTQ+ community. I'd do anything to shout out my support. So that film really spoke to me. Sonam Kapoor and Regina Cassandra in Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga. But do you think there were any queer parts in South Indian films five years ago? Although Hindi cinema is considered huge and rational, South Indian films touch a chord because the audience is very accepting here. There's not just the run-of-the-mill stuff. We love our commercial films, and have enough of them here, but we have a great balance too. The South has done it way before. In fact, there was a film of mine in the South in which I played a lesbian, much before I did Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga. It was directed by Venkat Prabhu, but it didn't happen. I hope it sees light of the day. We've worked really hard to put it out. Nawazuddin Siddiqui is an actor all of us unanimously look up to. Having him in a film makes you instantly intrigued about what it's about. Again, I'm very blessed to be a part of such cinema.

You're also a part of Mookuthi Amman 2 with Nayanthara. Are you looking forward to that?

Yes, we're starting in June. We've just one day's shoot of look tests and promotional stills. The whole canvas is very appealing. It's a Sundar C film, he's all about fantasy. My role in it is pretty crazy! It's something I've never done before at all. I love that 20 years into my career, I can say it's something I've not done before.

'Aishwarya Rai's lookalike Sneha Ullal was recommended by Salman Khan's sister Arpita': Directors deny there was any ulterior motive



Filmmakers Radhika Rao and Vinay Sapru, who worked with Salman Khan on the film Lucky: No Time for Love, recalled how newcomer Sneha Ullal was cast in the film. At the time, comparisons were made between Sneha and actor Aishwarya Rai. These comparisons hounded Sneha for the remainder of her short-lived career in the film industry. In an interview, the filmmakers said that it wasn't a conscious decision to cast someone who looks like Aishwarya in the film. Salman and Aishwarya were rumoured to have dated just before the film's release.

In an interview with Hindi Rush, the filmmakers were asked about Sneha's uncanny resemblance to Aishwarya, and if casting her was deliberate strategy. They said, "It wasn't a strategy. We wanted to cast a newcomer, and Arpita (Khan, Salman's sister) said that there is a very pretty girl at her college, and asked if we'd want to audition her. The role was of a schoolgirl whose parents are working in an embassy. She needed to have the vibe of someone who has lived in Europe. She suited the role."

They said that they realised how the narrative was shaping up gradually, but emphasised that they cannot compare anyone to someone as beautiful as Aishwarya. Radhika added, "We would notice a resemblance sometimes while shooting, but there are so many people who look like others. We never thought that the similarity was all that striking, but when the campaign started and people started pointing it out, that's when we noticed. It would be a lie to say that we didn't think about it, but we it wasn't a big deal. It's a good thing to be compared to Aishwarya!"In the past, Sneha has said that the narrative around her appearance was spun by publicists. "I am so comfortable in my own skin and all those comparisons didn't bother me. Also, that was also their PR strategy on how to describe me. That thing actually emphasised the entire comparison. Otherwise, it may not have been such a big deal," she claimed in an interview with agency IANS. Incidentally, another actor launched in a Salman Khan film had to contend with comparisons to someone he was said to have dated and broken up with. Actor Zarine Khan has been fielding com-

parisons to Katrina Kaif for years. Appearing on Bharti Singh's podcast, Zarine said last year, "Life after Veer was very bad for me, I got a lot of criticism. The film was a life-changing moment for me. Initially, I felt very happy that I was being compared to Katrina Kaif, but within the industry, things kept getting worse. For me, who used to be overweight, being compared to Katrina was huge, but it all backfired. I felt like a lost child in the industry, plus there was hesitation. I didn't know most people here but they started to feel I was arrogant because Salman Khan launched me."

The bouncing boards of the protagonist are the same too — his friend and his mother — but his wife (played by Genelia D'Souza in Sitaare Zameen Par) - doesn't feature in the trailer of the Spanish original."After the Forest Gump fiasco, he should have stayed away from remakes or adaptations," commented another Redditor, referring to Aamir's last film, Advait Chandan's Laal Singh Chaddha (2022), the official Hindi remake of Robert Zemeckis' 1994 cult film Forrest Gump, starring Tom Hanks. Laal Singh Chaddha didn't work at the box office. "Perfectionist in copying the film frame by frame," claimed a Redditor, while another one pointed out, "Look at his filmography again. He has remade the godfather, kramer vs kramer, on the waterfront, forrest gump.

Ex-girlfriend Cassie Ventura makes 5 disturbing claims about escorts, abuse, drugs; says, 'I was humiliated, beaten'

Sean 'Diddy' Combs, the disgraced American music mogul, had his first encounter with his ex, Cassie Ventura, months after a CNN video showed him beating and abusing her. Diddy's sex trafficking trial that began earlier this week saw Cassie take the stand on May 13 and give an emotional, tear-filled testimony against the rapper, sitting behind the Brooklyn bars on accusations of trafficking, racketeering, and other abuse-related crimes. The investigation into his alleged 'freak-off parties', accused of coercing both men and women into nonconsensual sex, is still ongoing. During her testimony, Cassie, who is pregnant with her current husband's child, made startling claims, including how her ex-boyfriend Diddy abused her, controlled every part of her life, and forced her into disturbing sex acts during their long relationship.Back in December 2023, Cassie was the first to come up with the abuse complaint against the Bad Boy record producer but settled the case outside the court just a day later, but that move opened a floodgate of accusations against the rapper one after another, and now hundreds of cases have been filed against him, followed by a Homeland Security raid at his Miami and L.A. houses.

Cassandra Ventura, better known as singer Cassie who dated Combs for a long time, said she first met Diddy when she was 19. At the time, Cassie was still trying her luck in the world of music, and Diddy was already a big music mogul in his 30s. After they met, he signed her to his record label, and their romantic relationship soon began. According to the BBC, Cassie misunderstood the situation, thinking she was the only one, but later came to know that Diddy was dating other women too. The 38-year-old, who is pregnant with her third child, told the court that the rapper covered all her expenses, including her house, her cars, her phones—but all of it came with a cost. Once he lost his anger control, he would seize every device. "Control was everything," Cassie said. "From the way I looked... to what I was working on." And soon, the control took a physical abuse form, and she alleged that the mogul would "bash on my head, knock me over, drag me, and kick me.

There have been long-standing rumours about Sean 'Diddy' Combs' alleged parties that used to run all illegal things-from drugs to trafficking-under the disguise of high-profile parties attended by various Hollywood A-listers as well. During the trial, Cassie detailed those parties, saying Diddy would make her sleep with male escorts or strippers while he watched. According to her, the first time she was forced into this act was within a year of their relationship starting, but she went along as she had earlier revealed "falling in love" and didn't want to upset him. But she added how the act left her feeling humiliated. Some of these sessions lasted days. "I felt pretty horrible about myself," she said, "It made me feel worthless." Cassie admitted to taking drugs to cope with the situation. "The drugs were a way to not feel it for what it really was," she said. "Having sex with a stranger I didn't want to be having sex with.'

According to Cassie, Diddy would sometimes call escorts from New York, LA, Vegas, even Ibiza, and used to pay them in cash depending on their performance. Cash prizes ranged from \$1,500 to \$6,000 and more. They found these escorts through stripper agencies and Craigslist. Not only this, but the disgraced rapper would also instruct her to choose the man sometimes, order her to dress according to his choice, and decide the lighting, everything. "If Sean wanted something to happen, that was what was going to happen," she told the court. "I couldn't say no."


Earlier, Diddy's attorney tried to paint Cassie in a mutually violent light while clarifying the CCTV footage where the rapper was seen brutally beating his then-girlfriend. Speaking about the same, Cassie revealed that the incident captured on the camera was during one of the times the couple was having one of those 'freak-offs', and she decided to leave because she had a movie premiere scheduled that week and didn't want to have sex with an escort, and that didn't sit well with Combs who started abusing her physically. When asked by the court exactly how many times he slapped her to the ground, she said, "too many times to count..." Among the hundreds of lawsuits filed against Diddy, few mention the involvement of former record



executive, former NFL player, and convicted felon Suge Knight. The Death Row record founder was also one of Diddy's biggest rivals in the music industry. Describing one of the alleged incidents, Cassie told the court how she was asked to handle a gun after Diddy suddenly left in the middle of a freak-off when his bodyguard tipped him about Suge Knight hanging out at a nearby diner. She begged him, "Please don't do anything stupid," crying and screaming in

The court asked Cassie why she ever agreed to take part in these acts, to which, according to BBC, she paused for a moment and then whispered, "I wanted to make him happy." She described her first freak-off, where Diddy called a LA-based stripper and gave her ecstasy and alcohol to get through it. Afterwards, she said she felt "dirty and confused," but also told herself, "OK, he's really happy with me, so I guess I did something right." The freak-offs started happening almost weekly. She added, "I just didn't want to make him upset. I just didn't want to make him angry and regret telling me about this experience that was so personal." The last one, she said, happened between 2017 and 2018. By then, she was relying on MDMA and cocaine just to stay awake and get through it. Cassie's testimony is expected to continue. She might be cross-examined by Diddy's legal team next. Meanwhile, Diddy has pleaded not guilty to the charges.
