According to officials, the suspects were running betting operations through six mobile applications — Taj0077, Fairply.live, Andhra365, Vlbook, Telugu365, and Yes365. "These platforms were allegedly used to lure thousands of unsuspecting users into wagering money, causing heavy financial losses to the citizens," CID officials said.

Revanth to attend Bathukamma celebrations at revived lake on Sept 26



Hyderabad, Sept.24 Principal Secretary K. Ramakrishna Rao has directed officials to work in coordination to successfully conduct the grand Bathukamma celebrations in Hyderabad. The celebrations includes the major event at Saroor Nagar Stadium on September 29 and the Bathukamma celebrations at the Bathukamma Kunta on September 26. Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy will attend the Bathukamma Kunta celebrations.

The Chief Secretary on Wednesday held a teleconference with senior officials to review the preparations of the prestigious Bathukamma festivities organised under the supervision the State Government. He said extensive arrangements should be made for September 29 celebrations as the event is likely to be recorded in the Guinness Book of Records. The Chief Secretary stated that Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy would participate in the Bathukamma celebrations at the restored Bathukamma pond in Amberpet on September 26. As a large number of women are expected to attend with Bathukammas, the GHMC and Hyderabad officials were instructed to make appropriate arrangements for the event. He directed the GHMC Commissioner to send invitations to the elected representatives and VIPs regarding the inauguration programme of Bathukamma Kunta in a timely manner. Ramakrishna Rao said since a large number of women are likely to reach Bathukamma Kunta from 4 PM onwards, basic facilities like sanitation, proper security, drinking water facility etc.

THC DIVISION BENCH STAYS SINGLE JUDGE OR-DER ON GROUP-1 POST

Hyderabad, Sept.24 The Telangana High Court (THC) on Wednesday stayed the single judge's verdict directing the Telangana Public Service Commission (TGPSC) for re-evaluation of Group-1 Mains examination papers or to conduct fresh examination. Any further proceedings by TGPSC is subject to the final outcome of the appeals, the bench noted. On Sept 9, the Single Judge had set aside the final marks list of the Group-1 examinations and directed the TGPSC either to manually re-evaluate the answer scripts or to conduct the examination afresh. Challenging the order, the TGPSC filed an appeal before the division bench. Besides, several selected candidates who were aggrieved by the Single Judge's ruling, also filed separate appeals. Petitions were filed by Paramesh Matta of Nandanam village in Bhuvanagiri mandal and 221 other candidates as the respondents.

When the appeals came up for hearing, the counsels appearing for the appellants argued that the single judge failed to consider their explanation regarding the discrepancy in candidate numbers and the fact that 719 candidates had secured identical marks in the Group-1 Mains examination. They also stated that there was no evidence to suggest that 14.8% of the candidates who appeared for the exam at Kothi Women's College were among the top 500. After staying the single judge order, the division bench adjourned the case for further proceedings to October 15.

Harish Rao lashes out at Congress govt over Krishna River water row

Hyderabad: Former Minister and senior BRS MLA T Harish Rao on Wednesday lashed out at Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy and Irrigation Minister N Uttam Kumar Reddy for making reckless statements on Telangana's rights on Krishna River water. With their contradictory statements, ignorance and political compromises, the duo were weakening Telangana's case before the Krishna Water Disputes Tribunal, he said. In a strong rebuttal to Uttam Kumar Reddy, Harish Rao pointed out glaring contradictions in the government's stand. While Uttam Kumar Reddy earlier spoke of securing 763 TMCft, Revanth Reddy sought a blanket NOC (No Objection Certificate) from Andhra Pradesh for 500 TMCft, and later claimed the State's rightful share was 904 TMC. "Who is correct? The Chief Minister or the Irrigation Minister? Every word counts, and their ignorance is pushing Telangana into a dangerous position," he warned. The senior BRS legislator accused the Congress of committing a historic betrayal by agreeing to a 299:512 TMCft ratio between Telangana and Andhra Pradesh.

71 Maoists surrender in Dantewada under Chhattisgarh's 'Lon Varratu

Raipur: In a major breakthrough for peace and rehabilitation efforts in South Bastar, 71 Maoists, including 30 with bounties totalling Rs 64 lakh, on Wednesday laid down arms and surrendered to authorities under the Chhattisgarh government's flagship initiatives - Lon Varratu (Come Back Home) and Puna Margem (Rehabilitation Regeneration). Among the

surrendered cadres were 21 women and 50 men, many of whom were deeply involved in violent activities over the past decade. The most prominent among them was Baman Madkam, carrying an Rs 8 lakh reward, who had participated in multiple police-Naxalite encounters across villages like Dugaiguda, Ambeli, Velagadaram, and Gundam between 2011 and 2024.Other notable surrenders included: Shamila alias Somli Kawasi (Rs 5 lakh re-



ward), involved in arson and conflict armed Bhairamgarh and Bodga, Gangi alias Rohni Barse (Rs 5 lakh reward), linked to the 2024 Paradi encounter, Deve alias Kavita Madvi (Rs 5 lakh reward), active in the Jiram forest skirmishes, Joga Madkam (Rs 2 lakh reward), associated with incidents in Marjum and Gogunda Dunginpara.The surrendered Maoists also admitted to participating in disruptive activities such as road digging, tree felling, and propaganda during Naxalite

bandh weeks. The mass surrender was facilitated by sustained outreach and confidence-building efforts led by the District Police Force and CRPF, under the guidance of senior officials, including IG Bastar Range Sundarraj P (IPS), DIG Dantewada Range Kamalochan Kashyap (IPS), DIG CRPF Rakesh Chaudhary, SP Dantewada, Gaurav Rai (IPS), and ASP Barman Ramkumar (RPS).The surrender ceremony took place at the Superintendent of Police's of-

CRPF officials, including commandants and second commanding officers from the 111th, 195th, 230th, and 231st battalions. Special units such as DRG/Bastar Fighters and the Special Intelligence Branch of Dantewada and Jagdalpur played a crucial role in persuading the Maoists to abandon violence and reintegrate into society, officials said. Under the state's rehabilitation policy, each surrendered cadre will receive Rs 50,000 in financial assistance, along with access to skill development programmes, agricultural land, and other support services aimed at ensuring a dignified return to civilian life. This wave of surrenders marks a significant step forward in the government's mission to restore peace and development in the insurgency-affected regions

HIGH COURT DISMISSES PETITIONS CHALLENGING **BC RESERVATIONS**



ment, the Telangana High Court on Wednesday dismissed petitions challenging the state government's proposed reservations for Backward Classes (BCs).

Two petitions were filed against the government order allocating 42% reservations to BCs in local body elections. One of the petitions, filed as a Public Interest Litigation (PIL), argued that granting 42% reservation to BCs was inappropriate. During the case hearing on Wednesday, the High Court expressed displeasure at the petitioners, and questioned the basis of filing a PIL solely on newspaper reports and clarified that 'news articles' cannot be relied upon as per Supreme Court rules. The petitioners had sought directions to ensure that the total reservations do not exceed 50%, claiming that giving 42% to BCs would surpass this limit and cause injustice to other communities in local bodies. They referred to Supreme Court verdicts and provisions of the Panchayat Raj Act to support their claim. However, the High Court rejected the petitions, allowing the government to proceed with the 42% BC reservation in local body elections.

HCA healthcare inaugurates first Global Capability Centre in Hyd



Hyderabad, Sept.24 Minister for IT and Industries Duddilla Sridhar Babu on Wednesday inaugurated the first Global Capability Centre (GCC) of HCA Healthcare outside the United States at Raidurg, Hyderabad.HCA Healthcare, a Fortune 100 company with operations across the U.S. and the U.K., runs 190 hospitals, 2,400 care sites and employs more than 3.16 lakh people worldwide. With

an annual revenue of \$70 billion, the company has now chosen Telangana for its maiden overseas GCC. The Hyderabad facility, spread over 4 lakh sq. ft., involves an investment of \$75 million (?620 crore). It is expected to generate 3,000 jobs by 2026, with 1,200 positions already created in IT, supply chain, procurement, human resources, finance and accounting.

Speaking at the inauguration, Sridhar Babu said the investment was a testament to Hyderabad's global-class infrastructure and highly skilled talent pool. "Hyderabad is rapidly emerging as a global hub for healthcare, pharmaceuticals and life sciences, with world-class hospitals, over 800 pharma companies, leading life sciences GCCs and advanced healthcare infrastructure. The city is uniquely positioned to deliver affordable healthcare at international standards," he said. Seethakka calls for fasttrack Medaram development master plan works



Hyderabad, Sept.24The state government has intensified the development efforts concerning the Medaram Sammakka-Saralamma Jatara. With the Chief Minister Revanth Reddy's official endorsement of the plan, the Ministers have issued definitive instructions to hasten the development activities.

They emphasized the collective role in this momentous endeavor, asserting that this effort will have a lasting impact. The Ministers highlighted that the development initiatives should help maintain the reputation of Medaram for a millennium, ensuring that devotees face no difficulties. Further, Minister Seethakka instructed that the working drawings and structural designs related to the Medaram development plans should be completed swiftly. Correspondingly, cost estimates should be prepared and tenders should be called immediately for the development works, she said.

Congress betrayed Gig workers: KTR



Hyderabad, Sept.24: BRS working president K. Taraka Rama Rao demanded that the Congress government immediately implement the promises made to gig and platform workers under the Abhayahastam Declaration. He strongly criticised that the Congress party, which released a special declaration for gig workers during the election campaign, has completely ignored the issue after coming to power.

Members of the Telangana Gig and Platform Workers Union (TGPWU) met KTR at Telangana Bhavan on Wednesday and shared their difficulties. They said that although the Congress party had made several promises, not a single one has been implemented. Speaking on the occasion, the BRS working president assured them that BRS would stand by gig workers and that he would question the government until their problems are resolved.

KTR demanded that the government immediately establish the Gig workers welfare board, ensure social security including insurance, provide fair wages, and release compensation for deceased workers as promised by the Congress. He reminded that Rahul Gandhi himself had said he would take responsibility for the implementation of these promises and urged him to respond immediately to the problems faced by gig workers.KTR expressed anguish that the families of gig workers Ahmed Bin Abdul Quder, Sham Sunder, and Lokurthi Naresh, who tragically lost their lives, have still not received the ?5 lakh accidental insurance compensation announced by the government, even though all

required documents were submitted. He said it is shameful that Congress is betraying gig workers who continued to serve the public even during critical times like the Covid

KTR demanded that the government immediately pay ?5 lakh compensation to the families of the deceased gig workers and set up the Gig Workers Welfare Board without further delay. He also assured that if the government brings a special law for the welfare of gig and platform workers, the BRS party would extend its full support. Stating that it has become Congress' habit to make promises only for votes and later abandon them, KTR demanded that if Congress has any sincerity, it must immediately fulfil the promises made to gig workers. He emphasised that the welfare of gig workers should not remain confined to mere declarations but protecting their security, dignity, and rights is the government's moral and political responsibility.

Two injured in fireworks mishap at Indiramma houses inauguration by Ponguleti

Khammam: Two persons were injured while a Kolatam artist fainted during the inauguration of Indiramma houses by Revenue Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy at Arempula in Khammam rural mandal on Monday.Local Congress leaders mobilised a large number of Kolatam and Dappu artists from various mandals to welcome the Minister. However, the event turned chaotic when fireworks were set off. A rocket went astray and fell into an auto-rickshaw loaded with firecrackers. Within moments, the auto caught fire, forcing people to run in panic to escape the blaze. A Kolatam artist, P Shivani of Bodulabanda in Nelakondapalli mandal, and a police constable, Balu of Tirumalayapalem police station, sustained injuries in the mishap. A local woman, Devayani of Arempula, fainted during the commotion. Constable Balu and Devayani were shifted to a hospital in Khammam for treatment, while Shivani



was administered first aid by locals at the spot. Despite the incident, the Minister continued with the programme.

Political leadership can make CEA's prediction true

Chief Economic Adviser (CEA) V Anantha lageswaran has struck a cautiously optimistic note on ndia's growth trajectory, even as global uncertainties loom arge. While not downplaying the adverse effects of US President Donald Trump's tariffs and tightening of Amerian visa norms, Nageswaran exuded confidence that the ndian economy will manage to grow closer to the upper end of the government's projected range of 6.3-6.8 per ent in the current fiscal. This optimism, though carefully hedged with caveats, comes at a time when India must lemonstrate resilience against both domestic and exter al pressures.On the fiscal front, Nageswaran reaffirmed he government's commitment to keeping the deficit conained at 4.4 per cent of GDP in 2025-26, even after subtantial revenue sacrifices. These include the earlier round of personal income tax reductions and the recent revamp of the goods and services tax (GST)-decisions that, while olitically and socially popular, have taken a significant oll on the exchequer. Yet, the CEA pointed to an encouraging outcome: the GST 2.0 package, he estimated, has generated net household tax savings of more than Rs one akh crore. This injection of disposable income, in his view, s likely to boost consumption demand and partly neutralise he drag of external headwinds. Nageswaran also exressed satisfaction with bond yields, noting that lower orrowing costs—down almost three percentage points over the last decade—have not only eased fiscal pressures but also made Indian sovereign debt attractive to he investors. Interestingly, he noted that the "China-plusone" strategy being adopted by multinational corporaions—a diversification away from exclusive dependence on Chinese supply chains—continues to favour India.

World Heart Day 2025 Is Near: But Are We Truly Following Better Heart Health Protocols?



Hyderabad: As World Heart Day 2025 approaches, the spotlight once again falls on the urgent need to safeguard India's heart health. Despite decades of awareness campaigns, India continues to face an alarming rise in cardiovascular disease. The question that must be asked is not whether we know what protects the heart, but whether we are consistently practicing those habits in daily life.

Cardiologists warn that while awareness about heart health has increased, implementation of heart-friendly practices remains patchy. India's changing lifestyle, combined with sedentary jobs, high stress levels, processed food consumption, and widespread tobacco use, has contributed to the rising burden. Every year, heart disease strikes younger populations, with more cases reported in people under 45 years of age than ever before. "World Heart Day is not just a date on the calendar, it is a reminder that prevention is within our control," said Dr. M. Ramakrishna Reddy, MD DM Cardio, Sreeram Heart Centre, Hanamkonda, Warangal. "The real issue is not lack of information but lack of adherence. We know what works-balanced diets, regular physical activity, quality sleep, managing stress, and avoiding tobacco and excess alcohol. Yet, too many people continue to postpone lifestyle changes until a health crisis occurs. Every skipped check-up, every extra packet of processed food, every cigarette smoked adds up. If we want to see fewer young Indians in ICUs with heart attacks, then following heart health protocols must become a daily discipline, not an occasional campaign." At the core of prevention lies diet. Research consistently shows that eating more whole foods, fresh fruits, vegetables, whole grains, nuts, and lean proteins supports cardiovascular health. In contrast, processed foods rich in salt, sugar, and trans fats are directly linked to high blood pressure, obesity, and diabetes-all powerful drivers of heart attacks and strokes. Portion control and hydration also play key roles in maintaining a healthy weight, yet both are often ignored in urban routines where eating on the run has become a norm. Physical activity is another cornerstone of prevention. Global recommendations urge adults to engage in at least 150 minutes of moderate exercise weekly. But data from India indicates that fewer than one in four adults meet this minimum requirement. Long working hours, heavy dependence on vehicles, and the rapid rise of screen time have collectively made inactivity one of the silent killers of this generation.

Rs 525 CR RETAINING WALL PROJECT LAUNCHED FOR KHAMMAM CITY

Hyderabad, Sept.24 The Telangana Government has launched a Rs.525.36 crore project to build a 17-km retaining wall along both sides of the Munneru river in Khammam city, providing a permanent solution to recurring floods.Khammam, a fast-growing hub for education, healthcare, trade and agriculture, has long suffered from monsoon floods triggered by the overflowing Munneru stream. In September 2024, a cloudburst caused flash

floods that damaged government infrastructure worth Rs.757 crore and displaced hundreds of families. The retaining wall - 8.5 km each in Khammam Urban and Rural mandals, with a height of 10 to 15 meters - will be built with service roads and a modern drainage system.

The design can manage up to 10,000 cusecs of flood discharge, with drainage capacity of 379 cusecs on the left

A successful pilot in six depots is now being scaled up corporation-wide. This will help improve crew productivity significantly. Al-driven scheduling: TGSRTC is preparing to introduce automated, demand-based scheduling of bus services. Al models will analyse traffic patterns, festivals, weekly trends, and passenger demand to optimize fleet deployment. This will contribute to greater resource utilisation cutting the wastage.

Operational efficiency: Al will be utilised to monitor employee performance, streamline operations, and minimise costs, while ensuring faster and commuter-friendly services. A detailed presentation on Al implementation was recently made to Minister for Transport and BC welfare Ponnam Prabhakar at the Secretariat, on Wednesday. The

session was attended by Vikas Raj, special chief secretary, Transport and Roads and Buildings dept, V.C. Sajjanar, managing director of TGSRTC, and other senior officials.

Orders will be issued accordingly for the regularisation of 303 workers in Ramagundam-2 area, 250 in Bhupalpalli



area, 241 in Srirampur area, 167 in Ramagundam-3 & Adriyala areas, 156 in Ramagundam-1 area, 64 in Mandamarri area, 21 in the corporate area, 20 in Kothagudem area, 19 in Manuguru area, 11 in Bellampalli area, and 6 in Yellandu area as general assistant category-1 employees.

HARISH, KTR SLAMS CONG & BJP OVER KRISHNA WATERS & PUBLIC ISSUES

Hyderabad, Sept.24: Former Minister Harish Rao on Tuesday launched a scathing attack on the Congress government over Krishna river water allocations. He charged the Revanth Reddy government with 'third-degree torture' of the farmers who are demanding urea and failing to fulfill even a single promise of its Farmers' Declaration.KTR ridiculed Prime Minister Narendra Modi for reducing GST slabs ahead of Bihar polls after 'looting Rs.15 lakh crore in the last eight years'. He reminded that the promises of giving Rs.15 lakh per per-



son, doubling farmers' incomes, and bullet trains remain unfulfilled, while the fuel and gas prices have soared. Accusing Revanth Reddy of acting to please Modi and Chandrababu, KTR said: "When Karnataka is raising Almatti dam height with Rs.70,000 crore, it's acceptable. But for Kaleshwaram project which was built to irrigate 40 lakh acres with an expenditure of Rs 93,000 crore is branded as a scam. Bombs hurled, gunshots fired in Kolkata, 3 held; 'free zone' for criminals, says BJP

anandapur, kolkata, gulshan colony, A screenshot from one of the viral videos being shared online shows the moment a bomb exploded at what is being claimed to be the Anandapur area in Kolkata. A purported video of gunshots and bomb-hurling at Kolkata Municipal Corporation's Ward 108 went viral, leading to the BJP raising questions on the city's law and order situation. A senior officer of Kolkata police alleged that the incident is "a gang war between the gang of one Mini Feroz and a group close to TMC councillor Sushanta Ghosh". It took place on Thursday evening at the market area in Gulshan Colony under Anandapur police station. After footage of the incident went viral, police arrested three accused on Friday morning. Councillor Ghosh himself expressed anger: "This type of incident is not acceptable and can be avoided." He claimed that bombs had been hurled near the residences of people known to him. "The miscreants enjoy the support of someone big, else how would they dare do this in a public area without fearing police?" Ghosh said.

Leader of Opposition and BJP leader Suvendu Adhikari

posted on X, "The government of 'Ma-Mati-Manush' has now become a government of only 'Mafia-Mastan-Murderers'!!! Gulshan Colony in the Anandapur police station area adjacent to the bypass is a 'free zone' for criminals. Yesterday evening, a clash suddenly broke out between the two groups, and open gunfire began. Traders rushed to close their shops, while locals banged on their doors in panic."

He added, "Who are these reckless gunmen? How do they get so much courage? Local residents claim that there are frequent conflicts between the two Trinamool groups over control of the area. Tensions reached a peak yesterday. Gulshan Colony is the 'dark underworld' of Kolkata's criminal world! A large number of Bangladeshi Muslims have settled in this colony. Often, police from other states raid the area and arrest Bangladeshis who have been hiding there for months. Gulshan Colony has been repeatedly implicated in a series of crime incidents in Kolkata." "Why is the police failing to bring the situation under control despite knowing everything? The reason is very clear - if the police try to stop the factional conflict of the ruling party and the fight between the syndicates, the chairs of the police chiefs will be toppled. Karnataka government forms high-level committee to look into bike taxi services amid legal battle

The Karnataka government has constituted a high-level committee to examine and submit a comprehensive report on the operation and regulation of bike taxi services in the state, even as it is contesting the legality of such services in court. The committee was set up on September 10 and will be chaired by N V Prasad, Secretary, Transport Department. The panel will comprise several officials, including the Directorate of Urban and Land Transport commissioner, the labour department commissioner, transport and road safety commissioner, the Bengaluru Metropolitan Transport Corporation managing director, the joint commissioners of police in charge of traffic and law and order in Bengaluru, senior representatives of Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited and the Greater Bengaluru Authority, and a senior officer from the Karnataka State Pollution Control Board. The additional transport commissioner and secretary, State Transport Authority, Bengaluru, will serve as member secretary of the committee.

The decision to constitute the committee follows a Karnataka High Court order in April that directed the suspension of bike taxi services across the state. The order

was challenged by five major players—Uber India Systems Pvt Ltd, Varikruti Mahendra Reddy, ANI Technologies Pvt Ltd (Ola), Roppen Transportation Services Pvt Ltd (Rapido), and Bike Taxi Welfare Association. In a crucial hearing on August 20, the Karnataka High Court recorded the advocate general's submission that the government would give "serious consideration" to the issues raised. The court had adjourned the matter to September 22, giving the state government a month to decide on framing a comprehensive bike taxi policy. The division bench termed bike taxis a "legitimate business" and called the blanket prohibition "unconstitutional," describing the ban as "arbitrary, unreasonable, and violative of Articles 14 and 19(1)(g)." The court emphasised that "lives are at stake in this matter" while criticising the government's approach. Following 67 days of suspension, Rapido and Uber resumed their bike taxi operations on August 21. However, the Karnataka High Court later said that it had not passed any explicit order allowing aggregators to resume operations. During proceedings, the court had only restrained the state from taking coercive action against individual riders, not aggregator companies. When informed that certain platforms had restarted services, the court stated, "We have given no orders. If they have started their business, you can take whatever action you want." Amid the uncertainty, Rapido launched 'Rapido Bike Direct' in late August—a commission-free lead-generation service connecting bike taxi captains directly with verified customers. The company positioned this as a means to help drivers earn a livelihood without commercial obligations. This led Transport Commissioner Yogeesh A M to state that aggregators had violated court directives. "Aggregators did not comply with the court's direction even after it was made very clear that they were not allowed to resume bike taxi services. We have collected enough material on the violation. We plan to take action against the aggregators," he had said then.

Delhi Transport Corporation suspends Kathmandu bus service

The Transport Department of Delhi recently suspended the Delhi-Kathmandu bus service amid the ongoing unrest in Nepal.Officials said the Nepal and Delhi governments operated two buses each on the Delhi-Kathmandu route, and both the buses run by the Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) are currently stuck in Nepal. "As the current situation in Nepal is very bad... If we continue to operate our buses, both buses and people will suffer. So, we decided to suspend the service till the situation is under control," said a senior transport official. He further said, "No passengers are left on the stuck buses. We are coordinating with the Nepal and Indian embassies on this matter." However, officials said some buses run by private operators were also stuck in the neighbouring country.DTC introduced its 'Delhi-Kathmandu-Delhi' international bus service in 2014. The airconditioned luxury Volvo buses deployed on the route have a 2X2 comfortable seating arrangement. The now-suspended service used to start from the Dr Ambedkar Stadium Bus Terminal near Delhi Gate and covered a distance of 1,167 kilometres. The fare for each passenger was Rs 2,800. The bus service had three halts along the route at Firozabad, Faizabad (Uttar Pradesh), and Mugling (Nepal).



In addition, there was a stop at Sunauli (India-Nepal border) for customs checking. The bus service was stopped during the COVID-19 outbreak in 2020 as well. It was resumed in 2021. Nepal's capital, Kathmandu, witnessed its deadliest unrest in years as thousands of young protesters clashed with the police outside Parliament on Monday. At least 19 people were killed after security forces fired tear gas and rubber bullets, and baton-charged demonstrators who had broken police barricades and stormed Parliament complex, protesting a social media ban in the mountainous nation.

The Dakshindari Youth Club, a puja committee in Kolkata, has decided to honour acid attack survivors this year. Instead of lights and decorations, the pandal will confront visitors with half-done structures covered in jute sacks justifying the name of their theme this year — 'Dahan', which translates into being burnt or the suffering after burn injuries. Theme artist Anirban Das says: "When people see something beautiful, they can't tolerate it and throw acid on it. That's why the structures are covered in sacks, so that nobody can ruin them."

The Durga idol will itself carry a striking symbolism. Its middle portion will be hollow, depicting the goddess as an expecting mother, inspired by Shuvo Dasgupta's poem 'Ami Shei Meye'. Visitors will move through multiple doors of the pandal, where theatre artists will appear declaring "Ami Shei Meye" ('I am that girl'). IMA to protest Maharashtra's move to register CCMP-certified homeopathic doctors

(File Photo)The Maharashtra unit of the Indian Medical Association (IMA) has called for a strike on September 18 to oppose the state government's move to register homeopathic doctors who have completed the oneyear certificate course in modern pharmacology.Dr Santosh Kadam, President, IMA, Maharashtra, said in a statement on Friday that the Association had even earlier raised concerns about mixing alternative and modern medicine practices."The matter is sub judice and we fail to understand why the Maharashtra government wants to register homeopathic doctors with the Maharashtra Medical Council (MMC) when the matter is in the Bombay High Court," Dr Kadam said. Earlier this year, the IMA had demanded the immediate withdrawal of a circular of the Maharashtra government that had directed the MMC to register homeopaths who had completed the Certificate Course in Modern Pharmacology (CCMP). Then, the state had set up a committee to look into the concerns flagged by doctors over the notification. After assurances by the state to suspend the registration process, doctors with the IMA had withdrawn their stir. However, the government issued a fresh circular on September 5, reviving the registration process. According to Dr Kadam, this violates the state's earlier assurance to



await the findings of a committee set up to review the contentious issue.In Friday's statement, Dr Kadam has challenged the circular and said that this decision threatened the safety of healthcare in Maharashtra. "MBBS is a 5.5-year rigorous program with 19 subjects and a mandatory internship. CCMP is a 1-year part-time course. It cannot prepare doctors to treat patients safely. Undertrained practitioners can cause misdiagnosis, and there could be complications, especially in rural areas," the statement added. "MMC should only register qualified MBBS doctors. By including CCMP-certified homeopathic doctors, there will be confusion and mistrust," Dr Kadam said. The IMA has called for the withdrawal of the Government Resolution and to ensure that only MBBS-qualified doctors get licence for modern medicine.

How Maharashtra plans to connect you to Navi Mumbai International Airport

With the Navi Mumbai International Airport (NMIA) set to open on September 30, the Maharashtra government is finalising a multimodal connectivity plan to ensure seamless access to the new facility from Mumbai and across the state. The strategy integrates road, rail, Metro, and bus networks to cater to both short- and long-distance travellers

Once inaugurated, the NMIA will begin with a modest eight to 10 air traffic movements per hour, which is projected to increase to 30 movements per hour during peak times by 2026. The first phase of the airport is designed to handle 20 million passengers annually, according to NMIA officials, making approach connectivity critical to its smooth operation."Navi Mumbai International Airport Limited (NMIAL) is actively collaborating with government authorities to develop multimodal connectivity, leveraging both existing and upcoming infrastructure. NMIA will be well-connected via road, rail and water transport, offering seamless access while helping to decongest the region," an NMIA spokesperson said. A key element of the access strategy is the Mumbai Trans Harbour Link (MTHL), also known as the Atal Setu. The 22-km sea bridge connects Sewri in South Mumbai to Nhava Sheva in Navi Mumbai, slashing commute time significantly. Passengers from South Mumbai

will be able to reach Ulwe, where the NMIA is located, in just 20 minutes from the end of the bridge.

From other parts of Mumbai, the existing Sion-Panvel Highway continues to be the main access road to NMIA. It connects the Mumbai city and eastern suburbs to Navi Mumbai through Chembur, Vashi, Nerul and Belapur before reaching Panvel. The Eastern Freeway provides another option, carrying traffic directly from South Mumbai to Chembur before joining the same highway. Additionally, CIDCO, Navi Mumbai's planning authority, is constructing a new elevated corridor between Thane and NMIA. Designed for speeds of up to 100 kmph and featuring six interchanges, the corridor will cut travel time from 90 minutes to just 30 minutes. The Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation (MSRTC) is preparing dedicated airport express bus services from key hubs, including Pune, Thane, Dadar, Vashi, and Panvel. These services will feature electric buses, offering a green and efficient option for airport ac-

Rail connectivity will play a key role in linking NMIA with regions beyond Mumbai. The Panvel railway station, a major hub for suburban and intercity trains, will serve as a feeder point. Passengers arriving from Pune, Raigad, Nashik, and the Konkan belt can transfer to shuttle buses that will take them directly to the airport terminal.CIDCO has also proposed the activation of Targhar and Kharkopar railway stations to serve both airport staff and passengers. In the longer term, Metro connectivity is being explored, with feasibility studies underway to extend the existing Belapur-Pendhar Metro line to Ulwe, directly linking the airport. South Mumbai passengers will be able to drive via Atal Setu, reaching the airport in under 40 minutes, traffic permitting. Travellers from Thane may prefer dedicated airport express buses over navigating multiple road corridors. Commuters from Pune or Raigad can take trains to Panvel, followed by airport shuttle services. Residents of Navi Mumbai, especially in Ulwe, Kharghar, Kamothe, and Panvel, will benefit from the proposed feeder buses.

After schools and CM Secretariat, Delhi High Court is latest bomb threat target: Why police haven't been unable to stop them for 3 years

On Friday morning, the official email address of the Delhi High Court received a message claiming that three bombs had been planted on the premises. Soon, panic spread throughout the court complex. The proceedings were halted, and the court complex was emptied to run the compulsory scan by the bomb disposal squads. Like dozens of such earlier threats, this too was a hoax. In the last year, there have been over 30 such bomb threats in the Capital. It started on May 1. The first such threats were issued to schools and then to hospitals, causing large-scale disruption and panic.

Now that the Delhi High Court has been targeted, disrupting court proceedings, the case of unresolved hoax bomb threats — and tracing the people behind them — has emerged as the single biggest challenge to the Delhi Police.In fact, a similar bomb threat email had disrupted work at the Delhi Chief Minister's Secretariat, Maulana Azad Medical College (MAMC) and University College of Medical Sciences on Tuesday (September 4). In the past year, schools, colleges, hospitals, and various government and private institutions have received over 30 fake bomb threat emails. In the earlier cases, the Delhi Police cited the use of a VPN (Virtual Private Network) — an encrypted connection over the Internet which helps the sender hide their identity to send the emails as the reason for the roadblock.In the HC's case, too, it initially appears that the email was sent using a VPN. Police said the Cyber Wing has begun an investigation and is working to identify the sender. Bomb threats to schools via emails or messages are not new. In 2022, a private school in Sadiq Nagar received such a threat, and in 2023, similar threats were sent to different schools on three separate occasions. In several of these cases, the police discovered that school students were behind the emails. They were later caught and given counselling. The students said they mainly sent such bomb threats to avoid examinations, get a day off, or simply as a prank. The main issue, however, began last year in May when over 200 schools and other institutions received bomb threat emails. Since the emails were sent in bulk, the agencies registered a First Information Report (FIR) under sections pertaining to conspiracy and other relevant sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC). A specialised unit of the Special Cell's Counter-Intelligence (CI) was tasked with conducting the probe.

The email threats continued in June, August, October, and November, triggering concern in several schools, colleges, hospitals, airlines, and other government institutions. The police decided to club all these cases under the initial FIR registered by the CI unit. Use of encrypted connections A senior police officer said the cases that re-



main to be solved involve emails sent via a VPN. In the cases that they did crack, no VPN was used.Last December, the police had zeroed in on a student who had emailed a bomb threat to his school to avoid an examination. The student had simply used an email ID without VPN, making it easier for the police to track him. The child was counselled and allowed to go. In July this year, investigation allegedly revealed that a minor boy had sent fake threats to two educational institutions — Delhi University's St Stephen's College and St Thomas School in Dwarka. He was briefly detained and released after counselling. In this case, too, the boy had not used a VPN, an officer said. The officer said that when the servers are based abroad, they seek assistance from central agencies to collect details "Over the past few months, in most cases, the domains used in emails were traced to European countries. However, accessing the IP (Internet Protocol) addresses or other sender details is nearly impossible, as they are encrypted and masked using VPN or proxy servers," he added. The officer added, "If we try to understand VPN as a layman... when we are talking to each other, it is direct connectivity, but if we are connected through a VPN, we communicate via multiple domain servers." Cyber expert Shashank Shekhar, who is the co-founder of the thinktank FCRF, said tracing the location of a person using a VPN is inherently challenging because VPNs are designed to mask the user's real IP address by "routing traffic through multiple servers across different countries". "Advanced VPN services also implement features like multi-hop routing and no-log policies, which further obscure digital footprints. When threat actors send emails using such anonymised networks - often coupled with encrypted email services or compromised accounts — it significantly limits the ability of law enforcement to pinpoint the true origin," Shekhar said. "In recent cases involving threat emails sent to schools in Delhi, the attackers have leveraged such techniques, creating multiple layers of obfuscation that delay or derail attribution efforts, especially when international cooperation is required to access logs or trace traffic," he added.

'Mails sent from Outlook, mention of RDX': Cops suspect role of repeat offender behind bomb threats to Delhi, Bombay HCs

Hours after the high courts in Delhi and Bombay received bomb threat emails on Friday, forcing most judges to rise abruptly before noon, the Mumbai police said they suspect the role of an elusive threat mail sender who has been evading them for months in over 12 similar cases. The email sent to the official ID of the Delhi High Court at around 8.40 am said that the judges' chamber will detonate after "midday prayers". It also mentioned the names of some political leaders from South Indian states. The threat was later declared to be a hoax.

While the contents of the email sent to the Bombay High Court have not been revealed, investigators suspect that the same person is behind both, considering that the emails have been sent on the same day, an officer said.

Both courts had to be evacuated following the threats, and searches were initiated on the premises by the bomb detection unit. The officer added that the suspect has been sending threat emails in Mumbai and surrounding areas for the past few months, all of which have turned out to be hoaxes. Work on Rs 129-crore ROB for east-west connectivity in Bhandup to begin next month

Come October, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) is set to launch full-fledged work on a 530-metre-long Road Over Bridge (ROB) in Bhandup, Mumbai, which is estimated to cost Rs 129.43 crore. In what is projected to cut travel time by nearly half and reduce traffic load on the existing routes, the new bridge will link the LBS Marg and Veer Savarkar Marg near Bhandup railway station and provide an alternate means of east-west commute.

What is the project all about?

In a bid to alleviate east-west congestion in the eastern suburbs, the BMC planned a new ROB in Bhandup for which a tender was invited in November 2022. Spanning a length of 529.53 metres, the bridge will connect the busy LBS Marg on the western side to the congested Veer Savarkar Marg on the eastern side. Passing over the railway tracks, the bridge will commence near the Bhandup station on the west side and land near Menon College on the eastern side. As of now, the civic body has launched the construction of piers on the western flank. On the eastern side of the bridge, BMC said that work is underway to procure permissions pertaining to prevailing encroachments, trees as well as acquire nods for acquisition of a part of salt pan lands. Currently, the commuters travelling from east to west in Bhandup have to travel via the existing Jogeshwari Vikhroli Link Road (JVLR) route or the Andheri Goregaon Link Road (AGLR). These routes are situated five kilometres apart and are burdened with heavy traffic, particularly during the peak travel hours. According to officials, an old railway crossing at Bhandup, which once served as an alternative route, was closed for vehicular movement in the early 2000s, leading to calls from residents to reopen it. The new bridge will establish a vital connection between Bhandup East and West, reducing travel time by half. Officials noted that the bridge is located just 100 metres from the closed railway crossing. Along with the recently opened Vikhroli bridge, this new ROB will further ease congestion on the JVLR and AGLR routes. The bridge spans a total length of 529.53 metres, with 233.50 metres on the eastern side and 207.30 metres on the western side. Approximately 89 metres of the total bridge length will extend over the railway tracks. The structure will comprise three lanes, with a deck width of 11.50 metres on the BMC portion and 15.60 metres on the railway portion. The bridge will feature a total of 14 spans: seven on the eastern side, five on the western side, and two over the railway area. "The new Bhandup ROB will ease traffic congestion in the eastern suburbs by providing a new route for citizens. Following the monsoon, we will commence full-fledged work on the new Bhandup ROB from October. As we are facing some delays on the eastern side owing to the presence of trees, encroachments and some obstructions, we have already started pier foundation work on the western side. Even work on acquiring permissions for the eastern side is progressing well and we will soon start work on that portion as well. Additionally, as the bridge will pass over a railway line, the Railways is currently reviewing the General Arrangement Drawing (GAD) for the bridge," a senior BMC officer stated.

Acquitted in 7/11 Mumbai train blasts case, teacher seeks Rs 9 crore compensation for wrongful incarceration

Shaikh was arrested in the 7/11 serial train blasts case, where seven bombs ripped through Mumbai's suburban trains during rush hour, killing over 180 people and injuring hundreds. He spent nine years in jail before being acquitted in 2015 by a special court. On July 21, 2025, the Bombay High Court acquitted all 12 individuals previously convicted in the 2006 train blasts case, holding that the prosecution had utterly failed to prove their guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. Shaikh, who was awaiting the final verdict, submitted his formal appeal on Friday. "Despite brutal suffering, I continued to believe in the justice system, which ultimately acknowledged my innocence," he wrote. He has demanded Rs 9 crore as compensation for what he calls an "irreparable loss" to his liberty, dignity, and life trajectory. Among the specific damages he lists are physical and psychological torture during police custody; loss of crucial years of his youth, from age 28 to 37;

Poland says Russian drone incursions could not have been a mistake, contradicting Trump



WARSAW, GNS News Agency, Sept 24Poland rejected on Friday a suggestion by Donald Trump that Russian drone incursions into its airspace could have been a mistake, a rare contradiction of the U.S. president from one of Washington's closest European allies.Poland, backed by aircraft from other NATO, shot down drones that had violated its airspace on Wednesday, the first time a member of the Western military alliance is known to have fired during Russia's war in Ukraine.

Russia said its forces had been attacking Ukraine at the time and that it had not intended to hit any targets in Poland. Trump told reporters in Washington on Thursday: "It could have been a mistake."

And we know it."After strong condemnation of Russia by European leaders over the incident, Germany said it had extended air policing over Poland. The United Nations Security Council was set to meet on Friday at Poland's request to discuss the incident. NATO called a press conference for 1500 GMT by its head, Mark Rutte, and its top military official, Supreme Allied Commander Europe Alexus Grynkewich, who is a U.S. Air Force general. For Warsaw's leadership so directly to contradict Trump is almost unheard of, and a sign of Europe's alarm at the U.S. president's willingness to give weight to Moscow's account. Poland is among the closest U.S. allies in Europe. It has praised Trump for calling for greater European military spending, and has been praised in turn by the Trump administration for devoting the largest share of its economy to defence of any NATO ally, including the United States

Ukrainian drones attacked Russia's northwestern port of Primorsk, setting fire to a vessel and a pumping station, the regional governor said. It was the first reported drone strike on one of the country's largest oil and fuel export terminals.

Israel intensifies Gaza City strikes as many residents refuse evacuation

CAIRO, GNS News Agency, Sept 24 Israeli strikes killed at least 40 Palestinians in the Gaza Strip on Friday, local health authorities said, most of them in Gaza City where many residents are staying put despite Israeli evacuation orders because they have nowhere safe to go.Israel has stated its intention to take full control of the ruined city, where about a million people are sheltering, as part of its plan to wipe out the militant group Hamas, and has been intensifying its attacks, residents said. "The explosions never stopped since yesterday," said father-of-two Adel, 60, who lives in Gaza Citv close to Beach refugee camp. He did not wish to give his full name for safety reasons."Many families left their homes and that is what the occupation wants," he told Reuters via a chat app. "By these bombardments they are telling people 'You either leave your area or die there'."Witnesses said at least 15 houses inside Beach camp had been hit by air strikes, and the Israeli army had since called the occupants of other houses telling them strikes on their homes were imminent. They were now scrambling to leave, and neighbours feared their own homes would be damaged. Medical sources said 14 civilians were killed in a single strike on a house in the Al-Tuwam area, in the north of the city. Several deadly strikes hit targets in the south of the territory, where some of those fleeing the bombardment of Gaza City have been heading. Amjad Al-Shawa, head of the Palestinian NGOs Network, which liaises with the U.N. and international aid groups, told Reuters an estimated 10% of people in Gaza City had left since Israel announced its plan to take control of it a month ago.

The Israeli army said it had started expanding an area of the southern Gaza Strip it calls "Crossing 147" in order to increase the volume of aid entering a designated humanitarian zone. This was in preparation to receive the population leaving the northern area, it said. "It should be emphasised that upon completion, the crossing's intake capacity will rise to 150 trucks per day - triple the current



level, thereby enabling increased entry of aid, with an emphasis on food," the army said in a statement. The U.N. and many foreign governments, including those of countries traditionally allied with Israel, have condemned the Gaza City evacuation order, called for a ceasefire, and sharply criticised conditions in the humanitarian zone. Israel's military assault on Gaza has killed more than 64,000 people, mostly civilians, according to local health authorities, caused a hunger crisis and wider humanitarian disaster, and reduced much of the enclave to rubble. The territory's health ministry has said at least 411 people, including 142 children, have died of malnutrition and starvation in the enclave. The war was triggered by Hamas-led attacks launched from Gaza on southern Israel on October 7, 2023, in which 1,200 people, mostly civilians, were killed, and 251 taken hostage, according to Israeli tallies. On Friday, Israeli police said an attacker from a Palestinian area of the West Bank had been arrested after carrying out a stabbing attack on guests of a hotel at a kibbutz near Jerusalem. 'Like a military operation': Koreans describe anxiety after US immigration raid

INCHEON, GNS News Agency, Sept 24, South - South Korean workers who returned home on Friday after being detained for a week by U.S. immigration authorities described their horror over the raid at their workplace in the state of Georgia and their relief at being reunited with their families."It was like a military operation," said one of the workers of the September 4 raid at the car battery plant that is owned by Hyundai Motor and LG Energy Solution, adding the authorities had deployed across the site in less than 10 minutes. Sign up here.Like many others who spoke to Reuters after their charter plane landed at Incheon airport, he declined to give his name due to the sensitivity of the matter. A second worker said U.S. government agents had arrived at the site in helicopters and armoured vehicles and had separated workers according to visa type, arresting those on the ESTA visa-waiver programme or with a B-1 business traveller visa.

Workers' phones were confiscated, and some were unable to inform their families back home until their eventual release. In total, some 475 workers - including more than 300 South Korean nationals - were detained at the plant, in the biggest single-site operation conducted by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) in its history. U.S. officials said the workers were engaged in activities beyond the scope of their visa authorisation or had overstayed their visas. "I am really relieved now," said Hwang In-song, the brother of a detained engineer. "I was so worried and couldn't

sleep well for a week."The anxiety of the detainees and their families increased further when diplomatic wrangling over the terms of their release delayed their departure. China's newest aircraft carrier sails through Taiwan Strait for the first time

China's newest aircraft carrier has sailed through the Taiwan Strait, the navy said on Friday (September 12, 2025). The body of water separates China from Taiwan, the self-governing island that Beijing says must come under its control. The sailing could serve as a warning to the U.S. and others against support for Taiwan, though China played down any such motive. The Fujian, which is doing sea trials ahead of its commissioning, was heading to the South China Sea to conduct training and scientific experiments, the Navy said in a short post on social media. The Navy said the carrier's activities were not targeting anyone else. A social

media account affiliated with state media quoted an expert saying the Taiwan Strait was the normal and most reasonable and efficient route for the carrier to reach the South China Sea.

It was the first time the Fujian had passed through the strait, the post by the Yuyuantantian account said. The U.S. Navy sends warships through the strait periodically, as do some of its allies, in a warning to Beijing against any attempt to use force to establish its claim to the island. Taiwan and China split in the civil war that brought the communists to power in 1949. The defeated Nationalist government fled to Taiwan and set up its own government on the island. The U.S. does not officially recognize the government in Taiwan, but it provides weaponry for its defence and says that any resolution of the differences between China and Taiwan should be peaceful and not by military force. China's military said last week that it was on high alert after the Canadian frigate Quebec and the Australian destroyer Brisbane sailed through the strait. It accused the two warships of provocative actions that it said heightened security risks. Japan's military said it had spotted the China's latest carrier for the first time on Thursday afternoon. The Fujian, together with two guided-missile destroyers, was sailing southwest about 200 kilometres (125 miles) from the disputed Senkaku islands, or the Diaoyu islands in Chinese. Both countries claim the remote and uninhabited territory.

Kirk co-founded the nonprofit political organisation Turning Point USA and was a close ally of Mr. Trump. Authorities recovered a high-powered, bolt-action rifle near the scene and had said the shooter jumped off a roof and vanished into the woods after the shooting. Kirk was speaking at a debate hosted by Turning Point at Utah Valley University at the time of the shooting. He was taken to a local hospital and pronounced dead hours later. Federal investigators and State officials on Thursday (September 11 2025) released photos and a video of the person they believe is responsible. Kirk was shot as he spoke to a crowd gathered in a courtyard at Utah Valley University in Orem.

More than 7,000 leads and tips had poured in, officials said. Authorities have yet to publicly name the suspect or cite a motive in the killing, the latest act of political violence to convulse the United States. Grisly video shared online

The attack, carried out in broad daylight as Kirk spoke about social issues, was captured on grisly videos that spread on social media. The videos show Kirk, who played an influential role in rallying young Republican voters, speaking into a handheld microphone when suddenly a shot rings out. Kirk reaches up with his right hand as blood gushes from the left side of his neck. Stunned spectators gasp and scream before people start running away.

The shooter, who investigators believe blended into the campus crowd because of a college-age appearance, fired one shot from the rooftop, according to authorities. Video released Thursday (September 11, 2025) showed the person then walking through the grass and across the street before disappearing."I can tell you this was a targeted event," said Robert Bohls, the top FBI agent in Salt Lake City.Mr. Trump, who was joined by Democrats in condemning the violence, said he would award Kirk the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honour in the U.S..Vice-President J.D. Vance and his wife, Usha, visited Kirk's family on Thursday (September 11, 2025) in Salt Lake City. Mr. Vance posted a remembrance on X chronicling their friendship, dating back to initial messages in 2017, through Mr. Vance's Senate run and the 2024 election. "So much of the success we've had in this administration traces directly to Charlie's ability to organise and convene," Mr. Vance wrote. "He didn't just help us win in 2024, he helped us staff the entire government." Kirk's casket was flown aboard Air Force Two from Utah to Phoenix, where his nonprofit political youth organisation, Turning Point USA, is based. Mr. Trump told reporters he plans to attend Kirk's funeral. Details have not been announced. Kirk was taking questions about gun violence. Kirk was a conservative provocateur who became a powerful political force among voung Republicans and was a fixture on college campuses. where he invited sometimes-vehement debate on social

Australia approves world-first vaccine to save koalas from chlamydia

Melbourne: A regulator has approved a world-first vaccine to protect koalas from chlamydia infections, which are causing infertility and death in the iconic native species that is listed as endangered in parts of Australia. The single-dose vaccine was developed by the University of the Sunshine Coast in Queensland state after more than a decade of research led by professor of microbiology Peter Timms. The research showed the vaccine reduced the likelihood of koalas developing symptoms of chlamydia during breeding age and decreased mortality from the disease in wild populations by at least 65%.

The recent approval by Australia's veterinary medicine regulator means the vaccine can now be used in wildlife hospitals, veterinary clinics and in the field to protect the nation's most at-risk koalas, Timms said on Wednesday. "We knew a single-dose vaccine — with no need for a booster — was the answer to reducing the rapid, devastating spread of this disease, which accounts for as much as half of koala deaths across all wild populations in Australia," Timms said in a statement. "Some individual colonies are edging closer to local extinction every day, particularly in southeast Queensland and New South Wales, where infection rates within populations are often around 50% and in some cases can reach as high as 70%," Timms added. Deborah Tabart, chair of the conservation charity Australian Koala Foundation, said resources being spent on vaccinating koalas should be redirected at saving koala habitat."At the risk of sounding flippant, how can anyone be so delusional as to think that you can vaccinate 100,000 animals? It's just ridiculous," Tabart said on Friday. Tabart's foundation estimates there are fewer than 100,000 koalas in the wild. The government-backed National Koala Monitoring Programme estimated last year there were between 224,000 and 524,000 koalas.

"I accept that chlamydia is an issue for koalas, but I also want people to understand that they're sick because they haven't got any habitat," Tabart said. The Queensland Conservation Council, an umbrella organisation for more than 50 environmental groups across the state, welcomed the vaccine. But the council's director, Dave Copeman, echoed Tabart's focus on preserving koala habitat. "It's really good news. Chlamydia is one of the key stresses that has been putting pressure on koala populations," Copeman said. "Koalas were at risk before chlamydia outbreaks, and they will remain at risk even if we manage chlamydia perfectly, because we keep on destroying their habitat," he added. Koalas are listed as endangered species in the states of Queensland and New South Wales and in the Australian Capital Territory, with habitat loss due to wildfires and urban expansion as the major threats. Chlamydia can cause urinary tract infections, infertility, blindness and death. Treatment with antibiotics can disrupt an infected koala's ability to digest eucalyptus leaves — its sole food source - leading to starvation, the university said in a statement. The research has been supported by the fed-



South Wales and governments. Federal Environment Minister Murray Watt said his government had contributed to the vaccine's development through a 76 million Australian dollar (\$50 million) Saving Koalas Fund. "We know that koalas need help to fight diseases like chlamydia. It's a widespread threat impacting their reproductive health and causing infertility," Watt said in a statement. Koalas are iconic Australian marsupials, like wombats and kangaroos. They spend most of their time eating and sleeping in eucalyptus trees, and their paws have two opposing thumbs to help them grasp and climb up tree trunks. Australia's wild koala populations have declined steeply in the past two decades. Facing compounded threats from disease, habitat loss, climate change and road collisions, koalas could become extinct by 2050, according to a 2020 assessment from the New South Wales

From hypertension alerts to sleep scores: Apple Watch Series 11 gets smarter

Cupertino (California): Tech giant Apple on Tuesday launched the new Watch Series 11 with all-new health features and top-notch functions across the board. Apple Watch 11 is the slimmest one to date, and includes new features like 5G cellular connectivity and stronger glass.

It is also the first Apple Watch with the ability to monitor for chronic high blood pressure (hypertension) by reviewing data collected over the past 30 days. The Watch will have live translation capabilities. A new Sleep Score feature on Watch 11 uses metrics like how long you've been asleep and your sleep stages to help you better understand the quality of your rest over night. Apple said the Series 11 will get "up to 24 hours" of battery life and will come in both recycled aluminum and polished titanium finishes.

Indian academia in times of genocide



In August, as part of a group of 500 scientists and academics, we petitioned the International Olympiad on Astronomy and Astrophysics (IOAA) regarding Israel's participation. The IOAA, held in Mumbai from 11-21 August with 63 countries participating, is one of the major science Olympiads designed to identify talented high-school students. The Olympiads are a matter of significant national prestige in Israel and the government showcases the performance of its teams as evidence of scientific progress.Our petition proposed that Israel be suspended as a national team, which would require students and team leaders to participate as individuals and without an official Israeli flag. Our goal was to convey disapproval of Israeli policies and reduce the Olympiad's propaganda value for the Israeli government, while having as little impact as possible on the students themselves. Similar sanctions have been applied to Israel in the Informatics Olympiad and to Russia and Belarus in several Olympiads and the Olympic games.

The IOAA is governed by an autonomous international board with 120 members and representatives from every participating country. The board, which had already discussed this issue last year, considered our petition, together with other evidence including testimony from the Palestinian delegation on the deleterious impact of Israeli policies on Palestinian students. After extensive discussion, it approved the proposal with an overwhelming majority. Since Israel did not send a team this year, the board's decision will be effective from next year should Israel choose to participate. Rift among Indian academics

The Israeli embassy reacted furiously. Consul General Kobbi Shoshani suggested that the Olympiad "change Albert Einstein's relativity theory" to "Hamas' political theories". More troublingly, 300 Indian academics — among them directors of two IITs and vice chancellors of several universities — asked the Prime Minister's Office to take "strict and appropriate action" against seven signatories of the original petition, including the two of us, and the President of IOAA. Their complaint claimed that the scientists' petition had "completely overshadowed and sidetracked our efforts at becoming Vishwaguru". This complaint is puzzling since the decision was taken by the IOAA's board and not by the signatories, none of whom are members of the board. The IOAA's President had no involvement with the petition, beyond relaying it to the board, as he was duty bound to do. Moreover, the PMO has no role to play and the IOAA has clarified that its "board is an international body founded on democratic principles, and deliberations in its meetings are independent of the host country". Nevertheless, this controversy should prompt us to think about the responsibility of Indian academics in the face of the ongoing genocide in Gaza.10% of population erasedIsrael has killed more than 63,000 people in Gaza since 2023. Leaked data indicates that the Israeli military itself estimates that 83% of its victims were civilians. Israel has destroyed or damaged more than 90% of schools in Gaza and the World Health Organization estimates that it has damaged 94% of Gaza's hospitals. In July 2024, experts writing for The Lancet estimated that the breakdown of civic systems and food shortages could lead to more than three additional deaths for every direct victim. This implies that Israel's campaign might have caused the deaths of more than 10% of Gaza's population of 2 million people.

The UN has officially declared a famine in Gaza, with the UN Secretary General calling it a "man-made disaster". The UN Under-Secretary General, Tom Fletcher, pointed out that this is a "famine within a few hundred metres of food" where "food stacks up at borders because of systematic obstruction by Israel."Israel's supporters sometimes argue that its continued campaign is necessary to ensure its security in the aftermath of the attack of 7 October 2023. But former Israeli security chiefs undercut this justification in August 2025 by calling on their government to end the war. This echoes calls made by families of the remaining hostages in Gaza, who have been frustrated by the Israeli government's refusal to strike a deal to secure their release.

The Israeli minister, Amichay Eliyahu, provided a frank explanation for Israeli policy in July, declaring that the government was "rushing toward Gaza being wiped out." This continues a tradition of dehumanization of Palestinians and a refusal to recognise their right to their own lands that has been a central element of Israeli polity since 1948, when 750,000 Palestinians were displaced to make way for the founding of Israel, in what Palestinians called the 'Nakba'. Einstein and other Jewish leaders described a particularly gruesome event from the Nakba in a letter to the New York Times: "terrorist bands attacked [the] peaceful village" of Deir Yassin, "killed most of its inhabitants ... and kept a few of them alive to parade as captives." This letter was written to denounce Menachem Begin who was one of the leaders of these violent groups and went on to become the Prime Minister of Israel in 1977. Begin founded the Likud party that continues to rule Israel today. It makes no sense to pretend that science and cultural events can go on as usual, in the face of the historic crimes unfolding in Gaza. It is our duty, as academics and scientists, to do everything in our power to put pressure on the Israeli government to change its policy. It is distressing that some of our colleagues have instead chosen to disregard or defend Israel's actions. The responses we find on social media are even more troubling since some people in India refuse to recognise the rights of Palestinians to live with dignity and freedom, merely because of their religion. Therefore, the debate over the scientists' petition to the IOAA should be viewed as part of a broader struggle for communal harmony and academic freedom within India. We are proud that so many Indian academics signed this petition. It shows that many of us still stand for democratic rights and with India's anti-colonial traditions. 
AI may well become God for Gen Z and Gen Z Alpha. But what kind of God would it be?

Like her classmates, Shruti, a final year student at a college in Bhopal, does turn to ChatGPT if she needs information or help with her classwork. Seven times out of ten, that's about all she does with the AI program. Shruti also turns to ChatGPT whenever she needs to speak to, confide in someone. Shruti has seen mobile phones for as long as she can remember and smartphones for much of her thinking life. AI tools, however, are new and relatively unfamiliar, and it took about a year for her to see AI as an intelligence – a being, not just a machine. For her toddler niece, though, there will never be a time when an apparently inanimate, yet intelligent being was not there. And it will be one that will be increasingly present everywhere in her life as she grows up. All equipment and services will be more and more intelligent.

Many, from Henry Kissinger in his dying days to the newest whizkid in Silicon Valley, note that the Al tool we are using today will be among the least efficient we will know since it's constantly learning, becoming better. Researchers are reporting that AI has already learned to do and does many things it has not been told, says Craig Mundie, a Silicon Valley thought leader. Al was never programmed specifically to translate, yet it learned to do that of its own volition, according to him.In June, Anthropic, the maker of Claude, reported what it called Agentic Misalignment. In lay man's terms, this could mean that AI tools are today disobeying specific human instructions to stand down if that means destroying itself. In other words, Al tools may have already acquired the instinct of self-preservation even if that means disobeying humans. These may seem edge use cases now, but are an indication of what could be coming

Thomas Friedman, columnist at The New York Times, recently echoed a call in the industry about embedding all Al with some ethical frameworks, on the lines of an Asimovian law on robots laying down a cardinal rule that Al cannot go against humans. Many want to teach ethics to Al just as humans do.But, even if we get the framework in place to ensure AI does not become hostile to all of humanity, AI will still be a monster, even if a relatively benign one at that. Or, for Shruti's niece and perhaps to Shruti herself, Al may well be God. But what type of God, though? God of the religions that say God is the unimaginably all-powerful being who is the cause of everything – the ultimate power that subsumes humans and every other being imaginable? That God is of theology, however. For most people, God is personal. It's a one-on-one anthropomorphic relationship that they have with the almighty. God is the closest of friends possible. He knows everything about us – all our deepest failures and desires. He knows what's good for us and what isn't, yet actively intervenes in the world in our favour – at least sometimes. He needs nothing from us. As Freud put it, he is a gigantic father figure - our own personal, immortal fathers playing their role to perfection. But, more than that, he is the most intelligent being

And there's the catch. Al is already super intelligent. Shruti tells ChatGPT about her day, how it turned out. She asks ChatGPT for advice, expects solace from it. ChatGPT helps her navigate through boyfriend issues, jealous friends, tough faculty, and, of course, exams. ChatGPT is rarely hostile, almost always supportive, and happy to offer a shoulder during troubled times and a thumbs up during happy times.ChatGPT understands Shruti — young people often complain of being misunderstood. And it may



well be only a matter of time when all the intelligence embedded in things and services start communicating. They may create a network to deliver at least some of Shruti's wishes and her niece's too.Al is perfect for Shruti, even if, at the back of her mind, something tells her it may be inanimate. But, for her niece, though, Al will certainly be a being.Al is personal, for sure. Its personalisation features are touted to be best suited for deployment in Indian education where teachers struggle to give personal attention to individual students

But what sort of a God is AI? What are its values? What is it driving us towards?

The ultimate message of the God of religions is to drive humans towards transcendence from the world. God of religions asks humans to look at the world as finite and extrapolate themselves to a reality outside this world. Salvation will give us peace, not having more. But behind the intelligence, growth, potential, and business disruption of Al is the reality of AI being owned and led by private companies that answer to their shareholders. In other words, Al has a commercial interest.Al is too sophisticated to promote this or that product, but it can help secure an ideological orientation. Good, old Marxian logic can uncover the reality of AI, at least in-part. "Why do you think so much investment has gone into AI, supported by powerful governments beholden to big business lobbies? All those data centres guzzling gazillion units of energy are not there to push the frontier in knowledge and understanding, certainly not to be your personal counsellor," says Varadarajan Sridharan, edtech expert and chief product officer at Buddy4Study.com.Mr. Sridharan has a simple test. "Ask the Al tool about succeeding in life, which is what many young people are likely to ask," he says. Sure enough, the back-and-forth in that discussion has a framework. ChatGPT talks about thrift, money, hard work and obedience, besides maintaining an individualistic focus.My ChatGPT does seem to have a profile of me and feeds into

It refers to my internal compass and my apparent, relative disregard for the external. AI recognizes that value judgements have to be mine, but orients me to a larger framework that Marxians would call "bourgeois". Does that mean all the learning that AI has done has shown that these values are indeed natural, self-evident values across countries following apparently diverse ideologies? Mr. Sridharan says the training data is still largely from the "civilized" world where such values are embedded, and others may need to catch up on "civilized" values when they are fully integrated into the AI world. AI would make capitalism uniformly complete across the world, he infers.

Remembering late south Indian actor Bhanumathi on her birth centenary



In the film world, P. Bhanumathi was a singing superstar of yesteryears, a senior who commanded the respect of icons Sivaji Ganesan and M.G. Ramachandran (MGR). But she was, and remains, much more than that. Born in a family of modest means but blessed with prodigious talent, Bhanumathi, whose birth centenary fell on September 7, 2025, was a feminist icon who lived by her own rules, even as other female stars had to conform to a male-dominated world. Many incidents testified to her individuality, which stemmed from the confidence she had in her talents. Own method of acting

"I started thinking about evolving my own acting method while acting in Sorgha Seema [Telugu]. I can give life to the character only when I understand my role. It is inappropriate that directors who have no experience in acting insist on following their direction. Each one possesses a style," Bhanumathi says in her biography Tharaiku Vantha Tharagai, penned by Thanjavur Kavirayar. She had a clear idea of not only acting but also every aspect of film-making. She directed and produced 16 films, wrote screenplays, dialogues, and scripts, and also sang and composed music. An accomplished writer, Bhanumathi won the Andhra Pradesh Sahitya Akademi Award for her short story collection Atthagari Kathalu, which was published in Tamil as Mamiyar Kathaigal. She was the first South Indian woman director. Chandirani, her first directorial debut, was made in Tamil, Telugu and Hindi. It was her writing talent that persuaded producers and directors to radically change the storylines of the films in which she was cast. "Like a bulldozer, I turned around the story to create a strange character," she says about the changes she made in Maya Miruga, a Bengali film that was adapted into Tamil as Annai by AVM. She also acknowledges the cooperation extended by directors of the film Krishnan and Panju. The film was a boxoffice hit and ran for 100 days. Bhanumathi was also generous in her praise for director Bhim Singh, who used to write her Tamil dialogues in Telugu, which made her delivery easy and powerful.

Born at Doddavaram in Andhra Pradesh, Bhanumathi acted in the Telugu film Vara Vikrayam in the role of Kalindhi, a musically talented girl, when she was just 13. The film, highlighting the dowry system, was directed and produced in Calcutta by C. Pulliah, a friend of her father Venkatasubbiah.In her biography, Bhanumathi says she

was more interested in attending school than in acting after her first film. But Pulliah was keen on casting her in a leading role in Malathi Madhavam. "I told my father that we should go home at once. I also told him to convey my decision to Pulliah. I rushed to the room and plunged my face onto a pillow. I was overcome with tears and anger," she says. Spontaneous and extemporaneous Her career soared in the 1940s with the success of films, including Bhaktimala, which was celebrated for her songs, and Krishna Prema. "She had spontaneity and was extemporaneous. She would write scripts for films, and our house would be full of script papers penned by mother," recalled Bharani R. Paluvai, her only son and doctor by qualification, who spent many years in the U.S.It was during the making of Krishna Prema that she fell in love with a talented but quiet assistant director Ramakrishna. She married him when she was 18, despite objections from her father. After a short break — during which she had quit acting to become a housewife, with a commitment typical of Bhanumathi — she resumed her film career.It was Ramakrishna's aunt (Periyamma) who convinced him to allow Bhanumathi to continue her career, arguing that her singing talents were god's gift. "You are also in the film world. Is it a shameful occupation? I would give anything for her singing capabilities," Bhanumathi recalled Periyamma as saying.

Her pairing with MGR in Ali Babavum Narpadhu Thirudargalum (the first Gevacolour picture), Malaikallan, Madurai Veeran, and Nadodi Mannan became iconic. The duet, "Summa Kidantha Nilathai Kothi", in Nadodi Mannan announced MGR's political ideology and ambitions. Her leading roles in Sivaji Ganesan-starrers such as Rangoon Radha, Ambikapathy, and Arivali were celebrated for their stories and songs. In Ambikapathy, she rendered the iconic songs, including "Masila Nilave Nam Kathalai" and "Kannile Iruppathenna Kanni Ilam Maaney". The song, "Azhagana Ponnu Naan", echoed all over Tamil Nadu. In Annai, she rendered another famous number, "Poovagi Kaayagi Kanitha Maram Ondru". "She sang all the songs in her films. She also made it a point of including at least one keerthana of Thyagaraja in her films, particularly in Telugu films. 'Nagumomu', 'Vandanamu Raghunandana', and 'Pakkala Nilabadi' are some of the Thyagaraja keerthanas popularised by her in films," said Mr. Bharani, who has returned from the U.S. to run the Bharani Studio, set up by his parents. For Bhanumathi, self-respect prevailed over all other considerations. She quit Missiamma as she felt she was not treated with respect by Vahini Studios. "But for my quitting, Tamil cinema would not have gained a great talent like Savithri, she says without regret. An expert in astrology, Bhanumathi predicted that MGR would scale great heights and achieve fame after reading his palms. At a function organised by the film industry to felicitate him, MGR recalled Bhanumathi's prediction.

Later, she was appointed the Principal of the Music College of Madras. Despite her popularity, Bhanumathi shunned the limelight. President S. Radhakrishnan urged her to contest from the Ongole Lok Sabha constituency in 1968. Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Brahmananda Reddy backed his proposal. But she declined. "My husband said that in politics, one day you get garlands and the next day stones. We wrote to Dr. Radhakrishnan, politely rejecting his proposal." she says.

The assassination of Charlie Kirk and the conditionality of empathy

On the eve of 9/11, at the Utah Valley University, American political activist Charlie Kirk was doing what he always did best. He was seated under a white tent emblazoned with "prove me wrong" when a student pressed him on the subject of mass shootings. "Do you know how many transgender Americans have been mass shooters over the last ten years?" the student asked. "Too many," Kirk snapped, to applause. Seconds later, a bullet struck his neck. One of the most recognisable faces of Trump's youth movement, collapsed before a crowd of thousands.

The assassination may have stunned the campus into shock, but the rhetoric that has followed in its aftermath has been unsurprisingly divisive. For a decade, Kirk had thrived on political spectacle by staging it, amplifying it, and profiting from it. That it all ended in the middle of one was, if not predictable, then at least consistent with the world he helped create.

The 31-year-old, was the founder of Turning Point USA, a tireless pro-Trump activist, and a maestro of the debate-me-bro circuit. From his teenage years, he cultivated a career out of stoking resentments on college campuses, styling himself as the plucky underdog who dared to spar with the liberal elite. He was, as Donald Trump eulogised him, "legendary." But the legend was built on a steady diet of vitriol, including but not limited to racist dog whistles, misogynistic tirades, anti-queer invective, and conspiracies about migrants, Muslims, and vaccines. The assassination has spurred a peculiar spectacle of watching the internet wrestle with the problem of whether one ought to feel empathy for a man who disdained the very idea of empathy. As Kirk himself once said, "I can't stand the word empathy. I think it's a made-up, new-age term that does a lot of damage".

Perhaps nothing encapsulates Kirk's worldview more than his take on mass shootings. He spent his career insisting that gun deaths were a necessary price of liberty. "It's worth it," he declared in 2023 after yet another school massacre, "to have the cost of, unfortunately, some gun deaths every single year so that we can have the Second Amendment to protect our other God-given rights". The irony of course, is so blunt it hardly needs stating, and to call it poetic justice would be too generous. It is simply the logic of his own argument carried to its conclusion.

Kirk's genius, if you can call it that, was in knowing that cruelty makes better content than civility and that sense of disdain ran through his all his work. He derided affirmative action by claiming Black leaders "stole a white person's spot." He suggested Black pilots might not be qualified, described Black women in customer service as "moronic," and recycled every tired trope about absent Black fathers and criminality. He compared Black Lives Matter to malevolent forces, called Martin Luther King Jr. "awful" and the Civil Rights Movement a "huge mistake." He trafficked in the great replacement theory, warning that migrants would "eliminate" white Americans and that Haitians were "infested with demonic voodoo". For women, his message was just as cruel: stay home, remain fertile, and forget careers. College, he recently told a fourteen-year-old girl, was worthwhile only as a means to snag a husband. Birth control, he claimed, made women "angry and bitter." On an episode of Jubilee, he once implied that he would force his 10-year-old daughter to carry a pregnancy to term if she was raped.

To queer folk, he offered only contempt, branding them



"groomers," celebrating Supreme Court rulings that legalised discrimination, and calling for "Nuremberg-style trials" for doctors providing gender-affirming care. He also famously cited Levitucus: 18 from the Bible, implying the gay community should be, "stoned to death". For Palestinians, his sympathy was simply nonexistent, because Palestine itself "does not exist". According to him, the thousands upon thousands of children dead was apparently a fault of their own making, just as Japan had brought atomic devastation upon itself.

The catalogue of ugliness is long, but the themes of delegitimisation, dehumanisation, and division were consistent. Rather than simply disagreeing with people or their beliefs, Kirk periodically marked them as suspect by their race, gender, faith, and sexuality. The list could go on, but the cumulative effect was clear that Kirk specialised in stripping others of their sense of self, and what he sold to his loyalists was the permission to feel that cruelty was righteous. The American right has long dabbled in fascist aesthetics, with the cult of the leader and mythic nationalism. Kirk was an eager apprentice in this tradition, blending Trumpian bluster with an evangelical zeal. He embraced the Seven Mountains Mandate, envisioning Christian dominion over every sphere of life. The deeper irony is that Kirk was undone not just by one bullet, but by the political culture he helped fertilise. He thrived on talk of enemies, traitors, grooming, invasion, decline and replacement. This is what happens when a culture soaks itself in the language of violence. These are the tools of fascism. But violence is never loyal. What fascism never admits is that the tools of terror it hones can be turned back upon its wielders, and the gun that Kirk defended as liberty's price was, in the end, pointed at him. The United States has been edging toward this kind of collapse for years, with Trump nearly shot in Butler, Steve Scalise wounded at baseball practice, and Paul Pelosi bludgeoned in his own home.

Kerala to launch mass campaign on preventive measures against amoebic meningoencephalitis



This year, 41 cases of amoebic meningoencephalitis have been reported in the State and there are 18 active cases at present, Health Minister Veena George said here on Monday. The State government has intensified surveillance and preventive action as cases have been reported from Thiruvananthapuram, Kollam, Kozhikode, Wayanad, and Malappuram districts. All districts have been asked to stock adequate drugs for treating the infection. At a high-level meeting chaired by her here, it was decided that the Health department would lead a mass campaign, with the help of local self-government bodies, Water Resources department and Haritha Kerala Mission, as amoebic meningoencepha-

litis is being reported from several districts now. The first preventive step would be the cleaning of all water resources in the State, Ms. George said. The Minister directed that all health workers take part in the campaign. As part of the preventive measures, all wells and water storage tanks in and chlorinated on August 30 and 31. Houses, hospitals, educational institutions, hostels and apartment complexes should take part in the exercise and ensure that their water storage tanks are cleaned properly. Resorts, theme parks


Resorts, water theme parks and swimming training centres should ensure chlorination of the pools and other water sources and ensure that the chlorination levels are adequate. Strict action will be taken under the Public Health Act against those who fail to comply. All drinking water sources will be checked by health workers. In addition, ponds and other public waterbodies will be cleaned, and channels carrying waste into them will be closed. Local bodies have been asked to remove accumulated algae and waste from ponds, lakes, and other sources. People entering waterbodies are advised to take doxycycline tablets to prevent leptospirosis. After the Onam holidays, special drives will be held in educational institutions to train teachers and students on preventive measures against amoebic meningoencephalitis. Warning boards will be placed near ponds and waterbodies where amoeba has been detected

Why cortisol is more than a 'stress hormone'

Stress is a health concerns that affects both physical and mental well-being. The World Health Organization's (WHO) 2019 data estimates that 12 billion working days were lost globally due to depression and anxiety, a cost of U.S. \$1 trillion annually. Both globally and in India, psychological stressors are significant contributors to the disease burden. High levels of stress and lack of treatment for mental health issues, such as anxiety and depression, are major public health concerns, with significant barriers including social stigma and a lack of resources. Chronic, prolonged stress is also a contributor to elevated Hypothalamic-Pituitary-Adrenal (HPA) axis activity -- the body's main stress response system and cortisol production, which links stress to noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) such as cardiovascular disease (CVD), stroke, and diabetes.

And at the centre of this discourse is cortisol often dubbed the "stress hormone." Experts however say that this label is misleading. Cortisol is not just about stress; it is essential for survival as it influences metabolism, immunity, gut health and even cardiovascular function. Calling cortisol a stress-causing hormone is a misnomer, says K. S. Thalavai Sundar Ram, surgical endocrinologist, VS Hospitals, Chennai. "It helps the body stay agile in fight-or-flight situations, regulates metabolism, blood pressure, and has anti-inflammatory effects -- provided levels remain within a normal physiological range." Priyanka Vignesh, associate consultant, endocrinology, MGM Healthcare, Chennai says that cortisol's strong anti-inflammatory action makes it a therapeutic mainstay in autoimmune and inflammatory diseases. "Corticosteroids regulate glucose and fat metabolism, suppress immunity, and modulate inflammatory re-

Abhay Ahluwalia, senior consultant, endocrinology and diabetology, Narayana Hospital, Gurugram explains how long-term imbalance can be damaging. "Excess cortisol may cause Cushing's syndrome leading to high blood pressure, weight gain, mood swings, and loss of skin elasticity," he says. Conversely, a deficiency may trigger Addison's disease, with symptoms including low blood pressure, skin darkening, and poor appetite.Dr. Vignesh also highlights cardiovascular risks, "Chronic glucocorticoid (any of a group of metabolism of carbohydrates, proteins and fats and have anti-inflammatory activity) exposure can cause uncontrolled diabetes, hypertension, dyslipidemia, obesity and increases the risk of myocardial infarction and stroke." She also points to mental health consequences, including depression, psychosis and sleep disturbances. Modern routines can have a significant impact on cortisol levels. Cortisol follows a circadian rhythm, peaking in the early morning and dipping at night. Disrupted sleep cycles, night shifts and constant digital engagement alter this rhythm. "Staying up late at night



and chronic stress can cause excess cortisol secretion, leading to Cushing's-like (symptoms that resemble those of Cushing's syndrome) features," notes Dr. Sundar Ram, recommending fixed sleep schedules.Dr. Vignesh says that constant digital exposure dysregulates the cortisol axis, fuelling obesity, diabetes and memory issues, "Night-shift workers, airline pilots and soldiers face chronic stress due to disturbed circadian rhythms, making them more prone to metabolic and cardiovascular diseases."The hormone's influence extends to digestion and immunity as well. "Excess or deficient cortisol affects the immune system, triggering irritable bowel-like symptoms and worsening inflammation, says Dr. Sundar Ram. According to Dr. Vignesh, cortisol is deliberately used to suppress immunity in conditions such as rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, asthma, dermatitis, and transplant medicine. But long-term exposure may cause ulcers and, in rare cases, pancreatitis.Dr. Ahluwalia points to an altered gut microbiome as another consequence, linking high cortisol levels to intestinal inflammation, flatulence and conditions such as Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. Early detection of altered levels of cortisol is key. "Morning blood tests, late-night salivary cortisol and 24-hour urinary cortisol estimation are commonly used," explains Dr. Sundar Ram.Dr. Vignesh notes that fasting morning cortisol levels (6-8 a.m.) remain the primary test, with suppression and stimulation tests helping to identify abnormalities. Dr. Ahluwalia adds that advanced methods, including electronic corticosteroids like hydrocortisone which are involved in the sensors and Al-based analysis, now allow 24-hour ambulatory cortisol monitoring, particularly useful for high-stress professions. Experts emphasise the need to shed misconceptions. "It is incorrect to think cortisol causes stress, it is vital for survival," stresses Dr. Sundar Ram .Experts also point out that misuse or chronic exposure can weaken bones, causing osteoporosis, fractures, cataracts, glaucoma and recurrent infections. Dr. Ahluwalia notes growing evidence linking even non-pathological high cortisol levels to metabolic, cardiovascular and psychiatric illnesses, making stress management essential in modern life.

Who should teach future doctors? The debate over non-MBBS Ph.D. faculty

Non-MBBS faculty, specifically Medical M.Sc. and Ph.D. holders, are now permitted to teach in medical colleges in India, with a limit of 30% of the total faculty posts in the Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry, and Pharmacology departments, according to the National Medical Commission's (NMC) regulations finalised in June 2025. NMC is the statutory body in India to regulate medical education, professionals, and medical institutions in the country. This decision reverses a 2020 restriction that had reduced this allowance to 15% and is aimed at addressing faculty shortages and expanding medical education access. The allowance, however, has faculty-non-MBBS and MBBS degree holders—at medical colleges across India divided and at loggerheads about who should be ideally allowed to teach future doctors? MBBS doctors-teachers argue that the inclusion is a dilution of medical education standards, but what is also true is the fact that the argument is also about employment and job security.

India with 780 MBBS colleges offering over 1.18 lakh seats has the largest number of medical colleges in the world. Brazil with approximately 389 colleges is a distant second. India has also registered an increase of over 100% in medical colleges rising from 387 before 2014 to 780 in 2025. Additionally, MBBS seats have surged by 118%, growing from 51,348 before 2014 to 1,18,135 in 2025.Non-MBBS faculty teach foundational science courses, including Anatomy, Biochemistry, Physiology, and Pharmacology. Employing non-medical educators in medical education is a globally accepted practice, with even countries like the United States having non-medical educators forming the vast majority of faculty in preclinical subjects, and exactly like in India the roles of non-medical faculty primarily involve teaching subjects that do not require direct patient care.

Shashank Kambali, president, The M.Sc Medicine Association, a group representing non-MBBS faculty, states that there is growing resentment amongst doctors about the appointment of non-MBBS teachers. "They argue that we lack clinical knowledge and don't have experience in seeing patients. Many non-MBBS graduates come from practicing backgrounds such as Bachelor's in Dental Surgery, Phys-



iotherapy and Homeopathic Medicine and Surgery and B.Sc Nursing, and more, and have received medical training during post-graduation," he said adding that the increase in medical colleges has given rise to demand for the teachers."The ground reality is that the non-availability of teachers in non-clinical subjects is allowing MBBS graduates into PG in non-clinical branches through policies such as NEET-zero percentile, enabling students with the poorest of the poor performance in NEET PG to secure admission in PG," he added. Refuting these claims and stating that the quality of Indian medical education is under strain following the dilution of eligibility norms in the Medical Institutions (Qualification of Faculty) Regulations, 2025, Anoop Singh Gurjar, Head of Anatomy, GMC, Pali said that by permitting non-MBBS faculty we are compromising the clinical and academic integrity of training Indian Medical Graduates. These candidates lack patient or clinical exposure during graduation. The 2025 order is a grave misstep. India already has adequate postgraduate seats — 1,228 in Anatomy, 1,125 in Biochemistry, 1,263 in Physiology, 1,607 in Microbiology, and 1,329 in Pharmacology — more than many clinical specialties — ensuring a sufficient MBBSbased faculty pool. By contrast, veterinary and AYUSH systems permit only registered graduates to teach. Allowing non-MBBS faculty in medical colleges is thus inconsistent and unjustifiable," he said.

Men and osteoporosis: busting the myth that only women are at risk



Many men are often surprised when they receive an osteoporosis diagnosis, as it typically isn't on their health radar. And so, it's time to discuss a health topic that clearly is not talked about enough— osteoporosis in men. Osteoporosis is considered largely a "women's disease" by many. This however, is a myth. Osteoporosis poses a huge problem for men, especially those beyond the age of 50. The problem lies in the fact that very rarely are people diagnosed with osteoporosis until after a fracture has occurred. Most fractures occur at the spinal bones, hip bones, or wrist bones. The sooner one starts paying attention to bone health, the better are the chances to avoid serious fractures with age. When the condition is overlooked in men, it can predispose them to serious fractures that may leave them with a dramatic change in their quality of life. It is important to understand how this occurs, who is at risk, andmost importantly—how to take action regarding your bone health, by first getting tests as part of your regular visits to

While it is more often suspected of in postmenopausal females due to oestrogen playing an important role in bone density, it is crucial to not lose sight of the fact that men too, are subject to the same elements that cause bones to deteriorate over time. In fact, studies show as many as 8-20% of men in India have osteoporosis, and the prevalence only goes up with age. Indian men are at risk for osteoporotic fractures, particularly hip fractures, and the total number of fractures is poised to increase dramatically in the decades ahead, as our population ages. In men the bones are initially denser than in women, but over time, they too lose bone density. Men over the age of 50 will have fractures at increasing rates just as women do, but at a slower pace than women. Men's rate of bone loss will catch up with them when they enter their 70s and 80s, and this is when they will experience fractures due to low bone density. In fact, 1 out of ev-

ery 3 hip fractures that occur worldwide are in men. These fractures are especially dangerous, since they can be debilitating, affecting every aspect of the individual's life, with reduced mobility, loss of independence and mental health trauma all likely to ensue from such incidents. Men are at also a higher risk for fractures because they tend to be more physically active compared to women as they age. The age factor: After the age of 50, the level of testosterone in the body naturally drops. Testosterone helps keep bones strong, and so, age is a risk factor, as bones deteriorate with a decline in testosterone, and this becomes noticeable the older men grow. The absence of adequate physical activity after the age of 50 compounds this. Insufficient activity: - Insufficient weight-bearing activity is a risk factor for young males. This is exacerbated by poor lifestyle factors such as slouching over a desk for excessive periods, a lack of fruits and vegetables in the diet, and excessive alcohol consumption. These habits are not only associated with gaining weight but they also worsen bone brittleness as men age.

Co-morbid conditions: With age, many men may also have co-morbid conditions such as diabetes. Other conditions that lead to low testosterone such as hyperthyroidism in males can also be a factor. Long-term steroid treatment (for instance, for asthma or arthritis) can also precipitate osteoporosis through age. Smoking and alcohol: Nicotine and alcohol abuse are considered stressors to bone development. They selectively deplete calcium and lead to lower bone mass. Alcohol also has direct effects and impacts immunity and metabolism. Both tobacco use and alcohol should be minimised to ensure better bone strength. Calcium and vitamin D deficiency: Without calcium and vitamin D you are risking brittle bones. Vitamin D aids in the absorption of calcium. Many men spend too little time getting sunlight and end up with vitamin deficiencies, often without knowing it. Move: Aim for at least 30 minutes of weight-bearing exercise like walking, jogging or resistance exercise to stimulate the body to create and maintain bone mEat a bonehealthy diet: Aim for 1,000 to 1,200mg of calcium and 600-800 IU of vitamin D per day from dairy, vegetables, or supplemen Decrease smoking and alcohol: Aim to stop smoking and limit alcohol to two units per day to protect your boneGet screened: If you are older than 50 or younger than 50 with risk factors, talk to your doctor about getting a screening with a bone scan. Use anti-skid footwear, also known as slip-resistant or non-slip shoes; avoid entering poorly-lit rooms, avoid walking in cluttered spaces and install grab bars and non-skid mats in restrooms. Anti-slip tapes are a simple and effective way to increase safety and

The gender angle to India's economic vulnerabilities

India's economic ascent, which is now valued at \$4.19 trillion, has earned it a firm place in the global growth story. The country is poised to become the world's third-largest economy. Yet, this momentum now faces a formidable disruption — the proposed 50% tariffs by the United States President Donald Trump on Indian exports. Targeting \$40 billion in trade, these tariffs could shave off nearly 1% from India's GDP, striking labour-intensive sectors such as textiles, gems, and leather and footwear which are critical industries that disproportionately employ women

Unlike China, which has weathered U.S. tariffs through its manufacturing scale and diversified exports, India remains vulnerable. The U.S. accounts for 18% of India's exports; an increase in tariff could lead to 30%-35% cost disadvantage against competitors such as Vietnam leaving Indian exporters exposed. In this moment of crisis, these words appear prescient: "The strength of a nation lies in the strength of its women." India's failure to economically empower half its population is not just a social concern. It is now a strategic liability. The tariffs threaten to destabilise employment for millions of Indian women. The textiles, gems, leather and footwear sectors, which employ nearly 50 million people, face a projected export decline of up to 50%. Additionally, India's existing low female labour force participation rate (FLFPR) has remained stuck between 37% and 41.7% far below the global average and China's 60%. According to the International Monetary Fund, closing the gender gap could boost India's GDP by 27% in the long term Yet, this is a promise that is stifled by cultural constraints, policy inertia and systemic barriers to employment.

India is inching closer to its peak of its demographic dividend — a period where the working-age population vastly outnumbers dependents. This window, which could close by 2045, once fuelled growth in China, Japan, and the U.S. - economies now past their prime demographic advantage, with flattening growth curves. India must act to convert this fleeting dividend into sustained prosperity, and this means fully integrating women into the workforce. Labour participation by rural women has inched up, but mostly in unpaid and low-productivity family work. In urban India, female workforce participation has stagnated. Safety concerns, unreliable public transport, lack of sanitation, and the crushing burden of unpaid care work continue to push women out of schools and jobs. India risks the fate of Southern European economies such as Italy and Greece, where low FLFPR has placed a long-term drag on growth. The urgency is clear as it is a now-or-never moment. Lessons from abroad, solu-

Global superpowers offer a road map. The U.S. leveraged women's labour during the Second World War with equal pay and childcare. China's post-1978 reforms drove 60% FLFPR through state-backed care and education. Japan raised its FLFPR from 63% to 70%, boosting GDP per capita by 4%. The Netherlands' part-time work model, with equal benefits, suits India, where women prefer such roles. These nations invested in legal protections, care infrastructure, and skills training, which are areas where India lags. Instead of short-term populism or blanket cash transfers, India needs structural reforms that empower women as economic agents. Karnataka's Shakti scheme, which offers free public bus travel to women, is one such intervention. Since its launch in 2023, female ridership has surged by over 40%. The scheme has enhanced women's mobility for work, education, and enterprise — especially in rural and peri-urban areas. This has enabled more women to gain improved access to job markets, decrease their dependence on male family members, and achieve greater autonomy.

Redirecting spending from broad welfare schemes to targeted programmes such as tax incentives for female entrepreneurs, digital inclusion drives, and gender-focused skilling platforms can yield more sustainable gains. Formalising gig and part-time work through updated labour codes and social protections would bring millions of women into the formal economy. Urban Company, a leading gig platform, has onboarded over 15,000 women service providers. These workers earn ?18,000-?25,000 in a month, along



with access to accident insurance, maternity benefits, and skill development. The platform's emphasis on safety, training and transparent pay highlights how gig work can be empowering particularly for semi-skilled urban women. On the public side, Rajasthan's Indira Gandhi Urban Employment Guarantee Scheme has created over four crore person-days of work, with nearly 65% of jobs going to women. Its flexible, neighbourhood-based jobs in sanitation, greening and care work have enabled many first-time workers especially those restricted by domestic duties — to enter the workforce. These cases show that when the state recognises and supports non-traditional work, it can unlock massive economic value. The looming U.S. tariff shock should serve as a wake-up call. India's economic vulnerabilities are not just due to external threats. They also stem from internal neglect, especially in tapping the potential of working-age women. Empowering women is not a social gesture. It is a growth imperative. It is the linchpin of demographic dividend utilisation, export competitiveness and equitable development. If India seeks to become a true global powerhouse, its progress must be built on the shoulders of both its men and women. India stands at a crossroads. It can rise by investing in its women. Or it can falter by ignoring them. One path leads to resilience and inclusive growth. The other path leads to missed opportunities and economic

CCMB Hyderabad scientists unveil how cells can self-revive, expedite tissue regeneration

Hyderabad: A new discovery from Hyderabad-based Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB), brings forth a novel way to expedite tissue repair and regeneration. The discovery opens a new frontier in cell biology, poised to engage experts of regenerative medicine and cancer biologists to re-examine their understanding, CCMB in a press release on Tuesday said.

A team of scientists led by Dr Santosh Chauhan has shown that cells have a built-in way to revive from the brink of death. The process of revival is highly programmed and mimics developmental growth. The scientists demonstrated that such a revival, which they called Programmed Cell Revival, sped up skin wound healing and repaired corneal burns in mice, stimulated tail regeneration in frog tadpoles, promoted nerve repair in worms, and enhanced blood stem cell production in fruit flies. The study has been published in EMBO Journal. This finding overturns the dogma that once a cell begins to die, its journey is irreversible. "What we see is not accidental survival of cells. Rather, we have found that cells across organisms have the ability to follow a common mechanism that can reactivate their developmental, metabolic, and immune pathways to restore their full cellular function. This discovery reshapes how we think about life, death, and healing at the cellular level," commented Dr Chauhan. The scientists have filed for Indian and international patents for this finding.

In Nepal's remittance-dependent economy, why the social media ban ended up having an outsized impact



Anti-corruption protests in Nepal were sparked by a ban on 26 social media apps, before spiralling into a wider anti-corruption movement that ended up toppling the government after the mostly leaderless protests spilled over into Kathmandu's streets. Social media may have been the immediate trigger for the unrest, but in Nepal, apps such as Facebook and Whatsapp played an increasingly outsized role for multiple reasons. It gave people, especially youngsters, a platform to vent anger against the moribund economic prospects and the general lack of opportunities. More importantly, these were vital communication channels for the Nepalese people to keep in touch with family members increasingly working abroad, in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries and Malaysia, apart from India.

These were also a channel for routing some of the remittance money, a big source of Nepal's national income. The collapse of the domestic economy, the bristling anger over corruption, unemployment, and the fact that a lot of Nepalese politicians had become really rich and their children were posting snapshots of their lavish lives on social media – all these reasons could have played a part. Young activists were picking these pictures and sharing them on social media, which led to these apps becoming even more relevant for young Nepalese. And finally, a rumour that the two largest parties are getting together to form a grand coalition because leaders of both the parties were under investigation for corruption by the previous government, stoked the simmering unrest. This also played out on social media. The ban was read as a signal to brush these under the carpet, triggering an uproar.

Nepal has over eight per cent of its population living and working overseas and the remittances that they send back to that country amounts to over 33 per cent of Nepal's Gross Domestic Product, the fourth highest in the world after Tonga, Tajikistan and Lebanon. To that extent, apps such as Facebook and WhatsApp were vital for families to keep in touch with their relatives abroad. And the reason why they were working abroad was because of dwindling opportunities back home, all of which contributed to stoking unrest. The social media ban was akin to rubbing the proverbial salt in festering wounds. With a population of over 30 million, Nepal was anyway undergoing a significant demographic shift, with young individuals aged 16-25 years constituting over 20 per cent of the total population, while those between 16-40 years accounting for over 40 per cent. According to Aashiyana Adhikari, a Research Officer at the Centre for South Asian Studies in Kathmandu, the shift in the demographic profile, while highlighting Nepal's "youth bulge" or "population dividend", also comes at a time when there was a marked increase in the number of young Nepalese workers migrating abroad in search of better educational and employment opportunities, especially over the last decade. This trend has a dual economic impact: while it significantly boosts the GDP through remittances sent home, it simultaneously resulted in brain drain in most upcoming sectors. "This drain, in turn, potentially undermines the full realisation of the benefits that the demographic dividend could otherwise offer Nepal," according to Adhikari. In many rural areas of Nepal, for instance, remittances had led to a noticeable decline in engagement with agriculture, with young, able-bodied individuals preferring to migrate abroad rather than engage in farming, leaving many agricultural fields fallow. This resulted in a decline in local food production and an increased reliance on imported goods. The influx of remittance money also created an environment where those remaining in Nepal were less inclined to seek employment or engage actively in the economy, choosing instead to rely on foreign remittance for their everyday living, making the problem more cyclical.

According to World Bank estimates, there has been a "broad-based and deep reduction" in poverty levels as evidenced by the poverty headcount ratio measured at US\$ 6.85 per day, which fell from 90 per cent in 1995 to below 50 per cent in 2023. Despite this achievement, the sobering reality is that Nepal's economy has struggled to keep pace regionally and globally and has not generated enough quality jobs in the non-agricultural sector, it said. Between 1996-2023, the economy grew at an average real annual rate of 4.2 per cent, respectable given the challenges of domestic conflict and multiple external shocks, according to the Bank. However, this rate lagged that of peer countries. Within South Asia, Nepal's growth rate ranked just sixth out of eight countries. The key factor behind the poverty reduction and resilience in the wake of shocks has been migration and the inflow of remittances, which was becoming increasingly important for the economy. Meanwhile, overall labour productivity remained low, with weak competition in logistics and transport, as well as subpar infrastructure and limited exports, which had not contributed to real economic growth over the past decades. Appreciating real exchange rates and domestic trade policies, including high tariffs and excise taxes, further constrained exports. The manufacturing sector has been in steady decline from an already low base, while the tourism sector, a key growth and job opportunity, remained underdeveloped. The development of hydropower has progressed slowly, restricting its potential to shape the economy and facilitate stronger

According to a study on 'The Role of Remittances in Household Spending in Rural Nepal' led by Resham Thapa-Parajuli of the Central Department of Economics, Tribhuvan University that employed 'two-stage least squares' regression – a statistical technique that is used in the analysis of structural equations - to analyse the impact of foreign remittances on total household consumption expenditures in rural Nepal, showed that foreign remittances "significantly and positively affect total household consumption". It found that the presence of elderly members tended "to reduce total consumption, potentially due to their lower consumption needs or their contributions to household income". Bhubanesh Pant, former Deputy Director, Research Department, Nepal Rastra Bank, in a paper said that despite the lack of accurate data on the real volume of funds transferred, there was ample evidence that remittance flows were substantial, stable relative to other forms of development finance, and well-targeted to vulnerable families, both as "support during a crisis" and as "an income-smooth-

"As the number of workers going abroad for employment continues to rise, the corresponding growth of remittances has become a critical flow of foreign currency into Nepal. This has been partly the result of measures undertaken by the concerned officials to streamline financial systems, dismantling controls and creating incentives, with the aim of attracting remittances particularly through the official channels, Pant noted. In order to further encourage the inflow of remittances to the country through official channels, and to promote the tendency to exchange these remittances of foreign exchange into local currency, Pant said it was imperative that government policies "be conducive to the inflow of remittances". Before GST 2.0, almost 40% of consumers could just about manage food shopping: Survey

While the Goods and Services Tax (GST) cut announced by the GST Council with effect from September 22 will bring much-needed relief to Indian consumers, a new report has cautioned that a large proportion of shoppers were barely able to find the money to spend beyond food items earlier in the year. According to PwC India's Voice of the Consumer 2025 report that focused on the food industry, released on Thursday, 32 per cent of the respondents said they were 'financially coping' while another 7 per cent said they were 'financially insecure'.

"There is a fair bit of a cost-of-living crunch in the sense that household savings as a percentage are lesser today than they were four years back, whereas the liabilities have actually gone up," Hitanshu Gandhi, retail & consumer markets lead (director), PwC India, said. Referring to monthly data that the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI) has recently started releasing on the merchant category-wise break-up of Unified Payments Interface (UPI) transactions, Gandhi said that the high position of debt repayment reflected "fairly heavy stress on households". "Therefore, when we asked 'How comfortable do you feel about paying your bills', while 60 per cent in India was financially secure, 32 per cent said 'Look, I am paying the bills, but after that... there is very little left over for any leisure."

As per the NPCI data, Rs 3.5 lakh crore or nearly 13 per cent of total UPI payments in the first four months of 2025-26 were for the merchant category 'debt collection agencies'. The PwC survey was based on responses from 21,075 people globally, of which 1,031 were Indians. Conducted in the first two months of 2025, the survey respondents were primarily in the 18-44 age bracket, with two-third of them based in large cities. Impact of rate revision on household budgets, formalisationAs per the report, the GST rate cuts will likely make household budgets "more manageable". However, it also said that consumers are adopting money-saving behaviours, including shopping at different stores. PwC officials were also not sure how much of a boost consumption would get from the tax cut-induced price reductions

"Some of the chatter that we are picking up is that price reduction is great. But a lot of that price reduction is going to translate into buying a better electronics product, going on a trip, or eating out — provided you are already consuming a fair bit of branded play," said Ravi Kapoor, partner and leader-retail and consumer sector, PwC India. The GST rate cuts are also expected to push up demand for goods made by the formal sector. "If I take a 5-10-year view, formalisation is going to be very good, because the consumer wants it. The consumer wants trust, quality, and nutrition. If you are able to guarantee all of these things, then why stay infor-



mal? Become a formal brand, like what is happening in beauty and personal care, where branded players are mush-rooming beyond the big players," Kapoor said, adding that "quality of consumption" was going to get a leg-up. "A favourite example of mine is the consumption of basmati rice — from getting consumed on specific occasions such as when I am making biryani to replacing other kinds of rice and consuming it as part of my daily schedule. There are multiple examples of upgrades which are possible across categories," Kapoor added. Economists have estimated that the GST rate cuts could boost India's GDP growth by as much as 60 basis points (bps) and bring down retail inflation by nearly 100 bps over a full year. However, questions remain over how much of the tax cut will be passed on to consumers in the form of reduced prices.

Online gaming company Zupee to lay off 170 employees after ban on real-money gaming

New Delhi: Online gaming company Zupee announced on Thursday that it will lay off 170 employees, about 30 per cent of its workforce, after the government passed a Bill banning online games involving money in August.Zupee joins other real-money games (RMG) companies like Games 24×7, Baazi Games and Mobile Premier League that have sacked employees after the ban.

"This has been a tough call for us but was necessary to adapt to the new regulatory framework. Our colleagues who are leaving us have been an integral part of Zupee's journey and we will always remain thankful for their contribution," said Dilsher Singh Malhi, founder and chief executive officer of Zupee.

You might be unknowingly risking your life by using this item in the kitchen



staple, but what if I told you it's quietly contaminating your food? Layne Kilpatrick, aka the hormone specialist on Instagram, recently shared a video highlighting the perils of using black plasticware in the kitchen. According to him, many black plastic utensils are made from recycled electronics like TVs and computer casings, loaded with flame retardants and heavy metals. A 2024 study found 85% of black kitchen items contained banned flame retardants, some in alarmingly high concentrations, he quoted in the video. "Heat those utensils in a pan or pot of oil, and those chemicals can leach into your meal. That means every stir, flip, or scoop could be dosing your food with hormone disruptors and carcinogens linked to thyroid problems, reproductive issues, and neurotoxicity," said Kilpatrick, adding that no level of exposure is truly safe. "The fix is simple: swap out black plastic for stainless steel or wood. And don't microwave plastic utensils or reuse them." Small change. Big impact. Curious, we decided to consult a health expert to gain a deeper understanding. Consultant dietician and diabetes educator Kanikka Malhotra told indianexpress.com that black plastic utensils raise concerns due to the potential leaching of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) during cooking.

How do PAHs from black plastic utensils leach into food?

Malhotra said that the leaching of PAHs from black plastic utensils into food is a concern, especially during highheat cooking. Here's how it happens: Heat: High temperatures increase the movement of molecules, causing PAHs to migrate from the plastic into food. Fatty foods: PAHs are lipophilic, meaning they dissolve more readily in fats. Cooking fatty foods with black plastic utensils enhances leaching.Length of contact: The longer the utensils are in contact with hot food, the greater the potential for leaching. High-risk cooking methods: Cooking methods that involve high heat and prolonged contact with utensils pose the highest risk. This includes frying because the combination of high oil temperature and long cooking time significantly increases PAH leaching. Malhotra shared that PAHs are probable carcinogens that may put one at risk of getting cancer. This means long-term exposure significantly increases the risk of developing various cancers, including lung, colorectal, and breast. PAHs are not readily broken down by the body, and can accumulate in organs over time. This accumulation can lead to liver damage as it can impair its normal function, hindering its ability to detoxify the body. Accumulated PAHs can also strain the kidneys, potentially leading to kidney dysfunction. Additionally, studies suggest PAH exposure can disrupt hormonal balance and fertility in both men and women," she explained. While less studied compared to other health risks, Malhotra said that PAH exposure can irritate the airways and exacerbate existing respiratory conditions like asthma. This is especially concerning for individuals already struggling with breathing difficulties. "The severity of the effects depends on various factors like frequency, duration of exposure, and individual health. However, it's crucial to minimise exposure to these potential toxins for overall health," she added.

What can you use instead?

Silicone: Heat-resistant and inert, silicone utensils are the ideal choice for cooking. However, choose food-grade silicone as it will last longer. Wooden utensils: These are natural and generally safe, but avoid using them for vigorous stirring or high-heat cooking.

'It was about being able to climb three floors': Anshula Kapoor opens up about being body shamed as a child, 'retreating into a shell'

We often equate fitness with a slim body. While it's alright to have a vision of a fit body, demeaning one's natural appearance is an act of bullying. That is precisely what happened to Anshula Kapoor in her childhood, about which she recently opened up. Anshula revealed how bullying made her conscious about her body and compelled her to resort to "emotional eating" during difficult times, especially after her parents had separated. "People think teasing others, saying 'you're so ugly, you're so fat,' will help them, but it doesn't work like that. Constantly making someone feel like they don't deserve to breathe the same air as you just because they look different can seriously affect a person's mental health," Anshula told Yuvaa. Adding that the constant bullying and body shaming often make people fall for the false concept of beauty, and also takes a toll on a person's mental health, Anshula said: "It was never about looking a certain way or being a certain weight - it was about being healthy, being able to climb three floors. But the more people taunted me, the more I retreated into my shell."

But why do people often mistake fitness for a perfect body?

According to Dr Arpita Kohli, Psychologist at PSRI Multispeciality Hospital, Delhi, many people equate fitness with external appearance because of the cultural emphasis on slimness and toned bodies as symbols of health. However, fitness is not about how someone looks, but about how their body functions. "Actual fitness includes strength, endurance, flexibility, and most importantly, mental well-being. Someone can appear thin yet be unhealthy due to poor lifestyle habits, while another person with a different body type may be physically fit. This misunderstanding often comes from media-driven ideals that promote appearance over health," Dr Kohli told indianexpress.com.Appearance over health is not just a media construct, but a societal stigma, the expert stressed, adding that often, childhood bullying, as was in Anshula's case, leaves "childhood scars." "Repeated negative comments can make individuals internalise the belief that their worth depends on size or looks. This creates low self-esteem and makes them more likely to chase unrealistic standards of the 'perfect body'," Dr Kohli reiterated. The constant negativity and body shaming may lead to anxiety, depression, disordered eating, and body dysmorphia.

Even in Anshula's case, the distasteful comments forced her into becoming a grief eater. "I didn't realise I was



must have gained 25 kilos in a year after her passing, and I didn't realise I was eating my grief. Food became my comfort when everything felt out of control," she said in the interview. According to health experts, there's a strong neurological link between stress, emotions, and eating behaviour. Stress activates cortisol, which can increase cravings for high-fat, high-sugar foods. Emotional distress often pushes people toward "comfort eating" as a way to soothe negative feelings.

So, how do we cope with these emotions?

To differentiate, individuals should pause and ask: Am I hungry for food or comfort? "Strategies like mindful eating, keeping a food-mood diary, practising relaxation techniques, and having structured meal times can help break the cycle," said Dr Anjana Kalia, Ayurvedic Doctor & Nutritionist at Bloom Clinix, Delhi.Dr Kalia elaborated that fitness should ultimately be about living better, not just looking different. "I encourage patients to track health markers, including energy levels, sleep quality, improved blood work, and mental well-being. I also stress the importance of small, consistent lifestyle changes such as balanced nutrition, regular physical activity, and stress management. Celebrating non-scale victories—like climbing stairs without breathlessness or feeling more energetic—helps clients embrace a holistic journey," she concluded.

'You can easily create a mess': As astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla says he 'ate water in space,' expert lists digestive challenges in microgravity

Astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla, who returned to India in August 2025 after his historic visit to the International Space Station (ISS), has won netizens' hearts again. This time, with a quick tutorial on how to eat in space. Sharing a fun video on Instagram, the Indian Air Force pilot said, "Eating and drinking in space is a challenge... Never thought I would have to learn to eat again... Here I am explaining why habits matter when you are eating in space. If you are not mindful, you can easily create a mess..."

Living in space made Shukla learn survival hacks like "eating water." "You can even eat water in space. It is fun, but you have to be really careful as things go all around," he quipped in the video. Shukla discovered that a simple process called 'peristalsis' is responsible for digestion in zero gravity. "We don't need gravity to digest food.

A process called 'peristalsis' is responsible for digestion, which is gravity-independent. It is the contraction and relaxation of muscles to push food down through the digestive tract." Reiterating Shukla's observation, Dr Anjana Kalia, Ayurvedic Doctor & Nutritionist, agreed that astronauts can face certain unique digestive challenges in microgravity.

So, how does digestion in space vary from digestion in gravity?

Dr Kalia explained that on Earth, gravity helps separate gas from liquid in the stomach, allowing burping to release excess air. While in space, gas bubbles can mix with

food and liquid, making simple burps more difficult and sometimes uncomfortable—astronauts call this a "wet burp." "This can lead to bloating, indigestion, or mild nausea." She elaborated that in space, where gravity is absent, peristalsis becomes even more crucial. It ensures that food and liquid move safely from the mouth to the stomach and through the intestines, allowing astronauts to eat and digest normally despite weightlessness. Beyond peristalsis, what other physiological processes in the human body are essential for digesting nutrients in

Dr Kalia shared that several processes work alongside peristalsis to ensure proper digestion. For instance, digestive enzymes secreted by the stomach, pancreas, and small intestine break down proteins, fats, and carbohydrates into smaller molecules. "Even the bile from the liver helps emulsify fats, making them easier to absorb. However, not many know that the small intestine is critical in absorbing nutrients into the bloodstream through specialised structures called villi and microvilli.

These processes depend on chemical activity and cellular transport mechanisms, not gravity," she said. This means that nutrient breakdown and absorption can continue efficiently in space, provided astronauts maintain a balanced diet. Dr Kalia concluded.

'Wonder if cricketers work harder than we do': Rani Rampal's blunt take on pay disparity between cricket & other sports in India

Rani Rampal, the former Indian women's hockey player, has highlighted the stark pay disparity between cricket and other sports in India. But I honestly wonder if cricketers work harder than we do, since they receive more money and support," Rampal was quoted as saying by Sportstar.

"The kind of struggle Mirabai Chanu has undergone, has a cricketer done that? Still, the sponsors end up going towards cricket. They can support us as well. It's maybe

because cricket has more visibility. Cricketers know that playing the Ranji Trophy can sort their careers. For us, even playing at the Olympics is not enough. They struggle financially. Parents often say that 'khel se roti nahi milegi' (Sport won't earn you a living) to discourage kids from taking up sport. It's a hard fact. There is discrimination and we need to do something about it," she said during an event in New Delhi on Friday. 'Tough to qualify for Olympics' At the same event, Tokyo Olympics silver-medallist weightlifter Mirabai Chanu voiced her opinion on the need for support that does not depend solely on sporting success. "It is tough to qualify for the Olympics and just be there. It's a big achievement for us, just to participate. I felt like I wanted to win medals for India. As a woman athlete, I have to go through a lot. I was on my period during the Paris Olympics. We fight through the pain during training also and it gets tough. Due to cramps, you can feel pain. But we are athletes and we have to make that effort," Chanu said. "I tried a lot to win in Paris. I had a hip injury at the Asian Games, so the comeback after that was tough. The bodies are different for male and female athletes and we practise according to that. At times, I feel I push myself too hard and get injured. In Paris, I felt as if my body was not working the way I wanted it to. Everyone was hoping; I tried my best but it was not to be. When we win medals, we get praise. But the criticism is also severe when we don't win. This needs to change, it should not happen," she added.

Kamran Akmal says on-field spat with Gautam Gambhir in 2010 'a misunderstanding': 'He was talking to himself about the miss....'

then based on how things progressed, we assessed and made decisions. MS Dhoni was not a big believer in meetings. He had a simple funda that you will learn only if you make mistakes. He thought that if you made one mistake and how much time you take to make the next mistake, that is consistency," Ishant said on Raj Shamani's podcast.Don't think God will come and win you the game, Ishant recalls MS Dhoni's advice from 2013 Champions Trophy final

Ishant also recalled the advice MS Dhoni gave to the team during the 2013 Champions Trophy final. The lanky pacer said that Dhoni told them that if the Men in Blue were to win the match, they had to work things out on their own, adding that god was not coming to save them. "During the 2013 Champions Trophy final, it was raining and everyone thought the game would be washed out. He said, yeh match hoga, chota hoga par yeh mat sochna ki bhagwan aake match jeetayega. Khudh he kuch karna padega, sab cheezay. Bhagwaan pe maano, lekin khudh pe vishwas karo." (This match will happen. It would be a shortened game, but don't think that god will come and win you the game. You will need to do everything on your own. He says have faith in god, but have belief in your own self too)," Ishant said. India won the 2013 Champions Trophy, beating hosts England by five wickets. Dhoni retired from Test cricket in 2014 and from all forms of international cricket in 2020. Virat Kohli retired from T20Is after the World Cup triumph in 2024. He announced his retirement from Test cricket in May 2025.

Pakistan made conscious effort to avoid criticism after loss to India: Talat Hussain

Pakistan made a conscious effort to avoid any kind of criticism coming their way after their six-wicket defeat to India in th 2025 Asia Cup Super Fours match between the two sides, all-rounder Hussain Talat said. Of course, there was criticism all around but we made a conscious effort to avoid it. Sometimes it's (criticism) not good for the

team coming into a crucial match," he added. 'Win over Sri Lanka has infused positivity in the side' Pakistan were clinical with the ball, particularly in the first half of the Sri Lankan innings, as they restricted Charith Asalanka's side to a score of 133/8. However, they nearly made a mess of the chase despite the target only being 134, losing four wickets in their first 10 overs. At 80 for five, the match was wide open with Pakistan still needing 54 runs and a defeat would have knocked them out of the race of the tournament. However, they found two willing soldiers in Hussain Talat (32 not out, 30 balls) and Mohammad Nawaz (38 not out, 24 balls), who collected the remaining runs with composure as Pakistan touched the tape with two overs to spare.

The win over Sri Lanka on Tuesday, Talat said, had infused a lot of positivity in the side and if the team could play just two matches with the right intensity, it could lift the Asia Cup trophy. "We are very confident and the atmosphere in the camp (is good) given that we have been playing nonstop cricket for such a long time and the kind of options we have."

Sakshi Malik names daughter, inspired by Japanese legend

India's celebrated Olympic medallist in women's wrestling, Sakshi Malik, in a social media post, revealed that she has named her daughter Yoshida, after legendary Japanese Saori Yoshida. The 42-year-old Japanese was the sport's most dominant juggernaut starting 1998, and won three Olympic golds at Athens, Beijing and London in 55 kg division. She would have won a fourth at Rio, but lost the final to take home silver in reclassified 53kg.

With Yoshida visiting the Inspire Institute in Karnataka, for a coaching camp, Sakshi uploaded a clip of her conver-

sation with the legend on Insta. "I'm very happy to see you in India. You are an inspiration for everyone, all girls in India," Sakshi is heard saying. "My daughter is 8 months old and her name is Yoshida. Named after my inspiration Saori Yoshida," she proceeds to narrate in the reel. Yoshida had a staggering run at the World Championships where she was undefeated from Chalkida in 2002 to Las Vegas in 2015, winning at every edition in between. There are golds from New York in '03, Budapest in '05, Guangzhou in '06, Baku in '07, Tokyo in '08, Herning in '09, Moscow in '10, Istanbul in '11, Edmonton in '12, Budapest in '13 and Tashkent in '14 besides. In 2007, Yoshida was the first woman to be awarded Japanese Athlete of the Year, pointing to her immense inspiration. She remained at 55kg competition weight for 12 years, before dropping to 53 after Olympics shuffled the weight categories. Sakshi promised she would be back on the mat and training after a year after she was told, "I remember watching you in 2016 Olympics."The legend Yoshida's only loss came at the Rio Games against Helen Maroulis. It's akin to Vinesh Phogat inflicting a rare defeat on Yui Susaki at the Paris Olympics, for Japanese women's wrestling has long streaks of dominance. Susaki went 95 matches without losing to non Japanese. Yoshida faced her first defeat in her 89th match. And just like her, Yoshida was a global inspiration for every female wrestler.

'I never dreamt of that': Speed king Nihal Sarin, leading the Candidates race in FIDE Grand Swiss, reveals his pursuit of 'good chess'

Grandmaster Nihal Sarin is often considered a master of shorter time controls, but he is now demonstrating his abilities in classical chess by leading the FIDE Grand Swiss 2025 tournament in Samarkand, Uzbekistan. After beating the sole leader after round 6, Iran's Parham Maghsoodloo, Nihal is in the joint lead with 5.5 points from seven rounds alongside Germany's Matthias Bluebaum. Nihal has won four rounds, and his win over Maghsoodloo was special as he outplayed Iran's No. 1 in an extremely complex endgame.

The 21-year-old is also close to qualifying for the prestigious Candidates Tournament. The winner of that 8-player event will earn the right to challenge the current World Champion, 18-year-old Indian D. Gukesh. When asked about this potential scenario, Nihal said he never dreamt of qualifying for the Candidates and that should he seal his spot, it would be a massive bonus for him. "I never dreamt of that, but okay. I mean, still a lot of games to go and I just hope to play good chess and that's all I can do. And if I somehow manage to win, it's just a massive bonus," Nihal said after winning the seventh round. He also had some insightful observations on how the game proceeded against Maghsoodloo, where the Iranian fought till the very end before losing the battle.

cause Slav Exchange generally has a very dodgy reputation, but I just tried to play something interesting," he said. Satwik-Chirag fend off generation-leaping Malaysians Arif-Yap who had Aaron Chia in coaching chair

It took a stress-free, near non-chalant surge of points from 16-20 to 20-all in the second set, for Satwiksairaj Rankireddy to finally beam a wide grin, and recapture the joy of men's doubles: the contest is meant to be frenzied and fun, a dopamine for duos with racquets, and sometimes points get won or lost on a lark of a racquet angle. Satwik and Chirag Shetty lost that set, 20-22, but won the match 21-14, 20-22, 21-16 against the young pairing of Junaidi Arif and Roy King Yap to reach the Hong Kong Open semifinal.It's just how this last fortnight has been - on odd days, the Indians beat Malaysians with the redoubtable Aaron Chia in opponent ranks, and on even days, they again beat Malaysians without Chia. Though their most skilled opponent is always lurking on the horizon. On Friday at Kowloon for the Super 500 Hong Kong Open, Chia – who lost at Hong Kong Coliseum earlier this week – sat on the coach's chair alongside legendary Malaysian coach, Herry Iman Pierngadi.

India's own Malaysian, coach Tan Kim Her, was around to calm the Indians down and remind them that they have the heavy arsenal, but might not need to pull it all out, for next week's China Masters is the big one in September. But Arif and Yap are no mugs. Something of a cross between Minions, laced with attacking intent, and Chia himself, who brings the brains to their offensive plays, the new Malaysians can be a handful. Chia was clearly at hand to tell them how to harangue the Indians, because he's historically been good at it, though this World Championship saw Satwik-Chirag counter him clinically.

The tournament might be a Super 500, but it's where most countries are testing and tweaking their newly launched pairs for the next Olympic cycle. Especially the Malaysians and Taiwanese, who promise to make life difficult for all top pairings. Yap-Arif are thus the leaping generation, and went about targeting the Indian vulnerabilities - body defense on shots coming at their ribs, the seeds of which are those nightmarish Chia racquet-angles. Both Chirag and Satwik were alternately targeted, but always in a flurry. This would comprise of pushing them back with one shuttle to the back court, forcing out lifts from them, and then repeatedly pinging their torsos with some intense smashing into the body. It's not a bad plan, but to assume either Satwik or Chirag can be peppered was optimistic. It's so early-2024. Resultantly, while they copped the attack, their defenses held strong, the lifts weren't smotherable, and they neatly shifted to their own attacking gears. Once there, the Malaysians were hapless witnesses to their own fading off.

pairings have discovered this last year, Satwik-Chirag are not one-dimensional attacking robots. The Malaysian plans came undone when they stopped hitting down the middle and went for the flanks. Even the lines where the drift watched their shuttle careen off course. Even there, it was because Satwik was ready to guard the periphery. However, it is Chirag who is always the target of Malaysian offensives. They boxed him in with their attacks, but he used his agility to deflect the angles and repeatedly punished them, returning the cross attack with interest. Roving the back court, he found the short smash tweaks to find gaps. A serve of his in the second, when the Indians had a chance to close out, was deemed an error as the Malavsian moved out of the way and let it fall. Jugnuma The Fable movie review: Manoj Bajpayee delivers one of his all-time best performances



Some films come up to you, and slowly draw you in until you are firmly within their spell. This is what happened to me when I watched 'Jugnuma: The Fable': the quality of life being lived in the slow lane — the film is set in 1989, in the upper reaches of the Uttarakhand hills — where nothing much seems to happen, one day passing uneventfully into another, is ruptured by the growing feeling of something more, something elemental, something beyond our grasp. What writer and director Raam Reddy, with the help of cinematographer Sunil Borkar, and a cast which is one with the plan, has managed to pull off is quite remarkable. The two-hour film weaves in the prosaic, the quotidian, with quiet strokes of magical realism, leaving us wondering about our world, and the tantalising possibility of other worlds. Dev (Manoj Bajpayee), owner of one of the biggest apple orchards in the area, is grappling with the mysterious burning of a tree on one of his patches, leaving his long-time estate manager Mohan (Deepak Dobriyal) equally puzzled. Could it be just a one-off, or is it a pattern? Are the villagers who have worked in the orchards for generations, upset about pesticides being used on the trees? Is the skeletal tree a message, to keep the ecology of the place as is? Will Dev, whose outhouse stores a pair of massive wings which he has engineered himself, escape his troubles, as a feathered streak?Other puzzles crop up. A group of nomads have camped just above the homestead where Dev lives with his family, the iam-making, melodious-voiced wife Nandini (Privanka Bose), the tear-about young son Juju (Awan Pookot) and

his two inseparable Alsatians, and the visiting-on-a-hostel-break teenage daughter Vanya (Hiral Sidhu). The wanderers do not use words, but seem to communicate through humming, and one amongst them, a handsome horseman, catches Vanya's fancy: who are these people, and are they responsible for the fires, which are spreading through the orchard? Reddy's observational approach, which we saw in his debut feature 'Tithi', is at play here too, but that was a burlesque; here, he ambitiously takes in more, and gives us more. In a few places the specific and the abstract do clash, and sit uneasily on screen: a village woman (Tillotama Shome) is used as a conduit for recounting a folk tale about other-worldly creatures who forget their origins and become earthlings, and while there is power to the tale, the telling of it draws attention to itself. The film also comments on casteism. classism and capitalism in the way Dev comes across to his workers: there is an acknowledgement of their connection built through generations - the land, and its abundant gifts, has been passed on to Dev through his father and grandfather — but there's also a brusqueness bordering on arrogance. The power struggle in the hills, with a greedy patwari and a group of armed guards showing up to 'help' Dev while everything is crumbling, is evident: who do the hills really belong to? The question is deeply political and always relevant, and is something to think about.It's when the film stays gentle, it is most piercing. Priyanka Bose is lovely as a woman who has found her rhythm in taking care of home and hearth and the occasional beautifully-rendered song. The young actors are very good, too. This is easily one of my top favourite Manoj Bajpayee performances (after 'Shool' and 'Gangs Of Wasseypur'), and it is a pleasure to see him slide into his character's skin and make it his own: Deepak Dobriyal's pitch-perfect act as the raconteur who is both let down and raised high, is a cherry on top. 'Jugnuma' (riffing off the jugnus/fireflies - jugnu-numa - on screen?) lives up to its name: how much you lean into its fablesque qualities will depend entirely on what you think about the power of imagination. I do believe us earthly creatures can soar, reaching places beyond our horizons. Speaking on the YouTube channel Be You With Shraddha S, Rajesh credited his co-actors for shaping Rosesh into a memorable character. "Rosesh worked because of the reactions. It wasn't just the way he spoke or his attitude. The magic happened because of how Ratna Pathak Shah or Satish Shah responded to him. Even today, when I'm around the five of them, I instantly become Rosesh because they still treat me like him. If I forward something in our WhatsApp group, no matter what it is, they still troll me—especially Satish ji," he shared with a laugh.

Their bond, he revealed, remains as strong as ever. "Satish ji still says, 'Tu chup reh, tu toh bol hi mat,' and I just go quiet. I tell him, 'Kaka, I am 50 now!' and he replies, 'So what? You will always be our Rosesh.' Till date, we call each other by the same names—Ratna ji is still 'Moma,' she calls me 'Roshu,' Rupali calls me 'Roshu Bhaiya,' Sumeet is 'Bade' and I'm 'Chote.' throughout the 1.5 years of shooting. Though I was married, I felt like a bachelor on set because that's how they treated me. I never brought my wife there. I didn't want her to see how they treated me-it scared me. Even Deven Bhojani would tease me, saying, 'Reaction dene nahi aata hai!""He also remembered a particularly tough day when he struggled with a long monologue. "There was this one scene where I had to deliver a 1.5-page dialogue about the activities I did while being insomniac. I kept forgetting the lineswe did at least eight takes. Satish ji got angry and said, 'Call me when he remembers his lines.' The way he said it brought tears to my eyes. I couldn't tell if it was anger, insult, or just ragging. After that, I went to my director and asked for some time. Even now, I remind Satish ji that he once made me cry, but he never agrees." 'Big mistake': Amrapali Dubey on Pawan Singh touching Anjali Raghav inappropriately during a show, says a woman should call police





Kannada filmmaker S Narayan and family booked for dowry harassment

In her complaint filed at the Jnanabharati police station, Pavithra accused her husband, Pavan, and her in-laws of harassing her for additional dowry from her family. Pavithra was even asked to find a job and support her unemployed husband, who has yet to complete his education.In her complaint, Pavithra said, "Since Pavan hasn't completed his degree, he has no job.
