Hyderabad: Rains on Tuesday night led to the opening of gates of twin reservoirs Osman Sagar and Himayat Sagar on Wednesday to release surplus water into the River Musi, according to an official statement issued by the HMWSSB. The statement said that two gates of Osman Sagar and two gates of Himayat Sagar were opened to release surplus water into the river. HMWSSB officials had operated the gates of these twin reservoirs over the past couple of months and shut them in the last two weeks due to the monsoon windup.

Man gets 32 years in jail in POCSO case in Nalgonda

Nalgonda: In a landmark verdict, the POCSO Court in Nalgonda sentenced a man to 32 years of rigorous imprisonment for raping a minor girl and coercing her into marriage. The accused, Gurijala Chandu, a resident of Panagallu village near Nalgonda town, was arrested following a complaint filed in 2022 at the Nalgonda Two Town police station. The police registered a case under the Protection Of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act and conducted an enquiry. It was alleged that Chandu had sexually assaulted the underage victim and subsequently forced her into a marriage to cover up the crime. During the trial, presided over by Judge Rojava Ramani, the court reviewed evidence, including witness testimonies and forensic reports.

Telangana's EAGLE force, Khammam Narcotics team seize 500 kg ganja in Jharkhand

Khammam: Telangana's Elite Action Group for Drug Law Enforcement (EAGLE) and Regional Narcotics Control Cell (RNCC) Khammam team seized 500 kg ganja at Rourkela, Jharkhand in a three-day operation. Acting on credible intelligence, the RNCC Khammam team initiated surveillance on ganja suppliers operating in the Andhra-Odisha Border (AOB) region.

The team received specific input that a truck would be transporting a consignment of ganja on the intervening night of October 20 and 21 in an attempt to evade police checks during Diwali. The RNCC, Khammam team led by Inspector Vijay Ram Kumar and SI Ravi Prasad rushed to the AOB border on October 19. They maintained continuous watch and confirmed that the suspect vehicle departed from Janpati in Malkangiri district of Odisha at 9 pm on October 20 en route to Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh.

Though initially expected to transit through Telangana, the suspects diverted the vehicle northward via Biju Expressway to avoid heavily monitored routes. Upon detecting the change in route, the RNCC Khammam team immediately redirected their pursuit and alerted the police stations along the way. However, due to the vehicle's high speed, interception attempts were unsuccessful. The RNCC Khammam team continued the chase throughout the night, relaying real-time location updates to senior officers, who in turn coordinated with the NCB Ranchi division. Based on this, the joint team intercepted the vehicle at Simdega on Ranchi-Rourkela Road in Jharkhand and seized 500 kg of ganja. The team arrested an accused Naseem Kamruddin of Haryana. The receivers of the consignment, Mushthaq Khan and Arif, natives of Haryana now residing in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh were absconding. Cases under relevant sections were registered against them, said a release.

Election Commission reviews voter mapping ahead of pan-India SIR rollout

New Delhi: Ramping up its preparations for special intensive revision of voter lists across India, the Election Commission top brass on Wednesday assessed the progress made on mapping the current electors with the voters as per the last SIR in different States. The exercise will help State poll machinery find out the number of electors who were in the electoral roll after the last intensive revision and continue to be in the latest voter list. As was the case in Bihar, the voters will not have to submit any documents but only semi-filled enumeration forms. There is a view in EC that mapping of current electors with those in the last SIR will ensure that more than half the electorate in most states may not give any documents in SIR. The commission, a statement said, also reviewed the status of appointment and training of district election officers, electoral registration officers, and booth-level officers, and booth-level agents who are appointed by a political party. The two-day meet is the second since September to decide on the massive exercise.

Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar and Election Commissioners S S Sandhu and Vivek Joshi met all state chief electoral officers here to review preparedness. One strong opinion within the top EC brass is to hold SIR in phases, beginning with the states going for assembly elections next year. More states may be included in the first phase. At the same time, it will not hold the electoral roll cleanup exercise in states where local body elections are taking place or are due, as the grassroots poll machinery is busy with it and may not be able to focus on SIR, officials said. Assembly elections in Assam, Kerala, Puducherry, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal are due in 2026. Besides these five states, SIR could be held in a few other states in the first phase. A voter list cleanup exercise has concluded in Bihar, where the final list with nearly 7.42 crore names was published on September 30. The CEC had earlier this month said work is in progress to launch the SIR of electoral rolls in all states, and a final decision on its rollout will be taken by the Election Commission. Earlier, responding to a question at a press conference to announce the Bihar assembly polls, the CEC said that a pan-India SIR was announced on June 24, while a roll-out of the Bihar SIR was still underway.

IT Rules 2021 amendment to add 'accountability' for State, Central governments

The Union Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) will amend social media takedown rules to add more "accountability" to officers sending notices to social media companies over content on their platforms, officials said on Wednesday (October 22, 2025). The new safeguards will be introduced by way of an amendment to the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021 within this week itself, senior officials briefing the press said.

"The accountability of the government increases with this change," IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw told presspersons. As a part of these new rules, the government "will be giving a reasoned intimation whenever any such order is passed, and orders will be passed at a fairly

senior level, Joint Secretary and above for the Central government, and Deputy Inspector General at the State level", he said. The safeguards specifically pertain to Rule 3(1)(d) of the IT Rules, under which government officials are empowered to flag content in such a way that social media firms would not be able to claim "safe harbour" from legal liability for content users post. Such notices would force social media firms to defend content as though they were publishers, and not just an intermediary for such content. The amendment has not yet been notified in the Gazette of India, but officials said it would be within the week, and would go into effect on November 15.The social media platform X had challenged the use of Rule 3(1)(d) as an unconstitutional and arbitrary way for police officers to issue "censorship" orders from around the

Govt must stop blaming past regimes for economic failures

Top functionaries of the Narendra Modi government nust stop blaming the previous regimes for the problems plaguing the country, but they don't. In keeping with this nindset, Union Commerce & Industry Minister Piyush Goyal last week found fault with the trade agreements ndia had with Japan and South Korea. "Since the signing of the agreements exports to both these countries have ardly grown, only the imports have grown," he pointed out at an event in Delhi. Factually, he is not incorrect. ndia's Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreenent (CEPA) with South Korea became effective in January 2010 and with Japan in August 2011.

Before the Korea pact, India's exports in 2009-10 vere \$3.42 billion while imports were \$8.57 billion. By 024-25, exports rose modestly to \$5.8 billion, but imorts jumped to \$21.06 billion. With Japan, the pattern is imilar. India's exports stood at \$5.09 billion in 2010-11, and imports at \$8.63 billion. In the last fiscal, exports were only \$6.42 billion while imports had more than doubled to 18.91 billion. These figures show that the benefits of the rade pacts have been asymmetric, leaving India with videning trade deficits vis-à-vis both nations. However, what Goyal's statement conveniently overlooks is that his own government has been in power for over a deade, long enough to renegotiate, recalibrate, and even ethink these agreements had it truly believed they were opsided. Instead, New Delhi continued to live with them, occasionally expressing discontent but rarely taking substantive action to address the issue. It is disingenuous. herefore, to suggest that the economic imbalance with Japan and South Korea is solely the result of Congress-



India's Power Grid Becomes the World's Largest, But Challenges Persist

Hyderabad; Right-of-way issues and approval delays have slowed down power transmissionPrivate investment and public awareness are key to expanding the transmission networkIndia has set an ambitious target of generating over 600 GW of renewable energy by 2032. While significant efforts are being made to boost power generation, expanding transmission lines to deliver electricity to remote areas is equally critical. Without transmission towers and lines, power supply simply cannot reach consumers. Despite government initiatives, only 8,830 circuit kilometers of transmission lines were added in 2024-25, the lowest addition in a decade.

According to energy experts, the transmission network carries electricity generated hundreds of kilometers away at very high voltage to end-users. The biggest bottleneck in expanding the grid is Right-of-Way (RoW), which involves land acquisition. Local resistance is common, often due to lack of awareness. Many still believe compensation is based on outdated rules. However, the RoW policy was amended in June 2024, with new guidelines released in March 2025 to ensure better compensation and greater transparency for landowners. Environmental clearance delays are another major hurdle.

Energy sector analyst Saddaf Alam notes that under the National Electricity Plan (Transmission), 2024, India aims to expand its transmission network to 6.48 lakh circuit kilometers, boost transformation capacity to 23.45 lakh MVA, and increase High Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) capacity to 66,750 MW by 2032. Achieving this requires faster approvals, greater public awareness, stronger state cooperation, and active participation through Public-Private Partnership (PPP) models. Private investment has already improved technology, speed, and cost-efficiency, and with renewable energy and digital solutions gaining prominence, the private sector's role will be even more critical. By early 2025, India's transmission lines of 220 kV and above spanned 4.92 lakh circuit kilometers, while transformation capacity reached 1,269 GVA - making it one of the world's largest synchronized power grids. The integrated grid can now handle power exchanges up to 118,740 MW. As a result, power shortages have fallen drastically: from 4.2% in 2014 to just 0.1% in 2025. India has also emerged as a net

Customers visiting the hotel are reportedly parking their ve hicles on the roadside without any regard for traffic regula-tions, often leaving them for hours. This has turned the main thoroughfare into a bottleneck, "affecting RTC buses and private vehicles moving from Secunderabad side towards ECIL X Road and vice versa. Motorists say they are forced to weave through blocked lanes, often risking accidents, due to the unregulated parking. Local commuters expressed their irritation at the seeming indiffer-ence of authorities. "He said that the health of pregnant women (prenatal care services) should be improved and ANMs and ASHA workers should follow up on the health of pregnant women "He said that high-risk pregnant women should be identified and special attention should be paid to their medical treatment. A review was conducted on 4 maternal deaths in the district. The district medical and health officials and staff were instructed to pay special attention to the health of pregnant women, provide timely treatment and ensure that maternal deaths do not occur in the future. They were also asked to conduct timely vaccination for pregnant women."They were instructed to conduct home visits of ANMs and ASHAs, register pregnant women in a timely



manner, and provide them with vaccinations, pills, and treatment. On this occasion, they were asked to take special measures to identify high-risk cases in a timely manner and ensure that the mother and child are safe without any problems during pregnancy and childbirth. If necessary, they were advised to send them to a referral hospital for delivery. They were asked to keep the medical officers, supervisors, ANMs, and ASHA workers in UPHCs informed about the health status of pregnant women from time to time and provide appropriate instructions, advice, and treatment. They were asked to speak to pregnant women with love and affection so that they can gain confidence in government hospitals.

Found dead with gunshot wound, IPS officer Puran Kumar was known for speaking up against caste bias, administrative issues

Haryana cadre IPS officer Y Puran Kumar, 52, who was allegedly found dead with a gunshot wound at his Sector-11 residence in Chandigarh Tuesday, was known for his proactive interventions in various issues related to administration, seniority, and rights of officers, besides the transparent functioning of the system. The 2001-batch officer, who hailed from Andhra Pradesh, never shied away from challenging assignments or postings and was particularly vocal about issues pertaining to the representation of Scheduled Castes (SC) in police ranks. An engineering graduate, Kumar served in several districts of Haryana, including Ambala and Kurukshetra, and also served as the Inspector General of Police (IGP) heading Ambala and Rohtak ranges, besides heading the Home Guards, Telecommunications, and several other key departments. He was due to retire in 2033.

In recent years, he had been involved in several administrative and procedural disputes with the Haryana government. In April last year, Kumar returned his official car to the state police department, asking for a car as per his entitlement. Alleging "discriminatory and selective" allotment of official vehicles to IPS officers in Haryana, he wrote to the state's then chief secretary T V S N Prasad, urging him to look into the matter. At the time, Kumar was the IGP (Telecommunications) and also headed the state police's Dial-112 Emergency Response project. Last year, he raised questions about the promotion of IPS officers of the 1991, 1996, 1997, and 2005 batches in Haryana. In his letter to Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini, Kumar stated that the promotions were "illegal because they override the

guidelines of the Union Ministry of Home Affairs based solely on the concurrence of the Finance Department". In his letter to Saini, Kumar had mentioned: "On October 11, 2022, I had submitted a representation to the then Additional Chief Secretary of the Home Department, TVSN Prasad...requesting that the officers of the 2001 batch be considered for promotion to the DIG rank as per the guidelines of the Ministry of Home Affairs". He also demanded that their pay be refixed and arrears be given.

Kumar further wrote that he believes that his representation was not acted upon because he and his batchmates belong to the SC category. He also claimed that in the state's Home Department, even files that do not require legal opinion are unnecessarily sent to legal officers.Kumar alleged that he was being discriminated against on the basis of caste, citing that IPS officers of the 1997 batch had their pay fixed in advance and were granted advance increments. Although those orders were later put on hold, his own promotion was delayed. Last year, he also lodged five complaints - particularly of "harassment and humiliation" - against a senior IAS officer in less than two months and raised objections on the formation of a committee comprising three former IAS officers on February 8 to probe into his charges. In March 2023, the government posted him as IGP (Home Guards). However, quoting the gradation list of IPS officers and the IPS 2017 (Fixation of Cadre Strength) Amendment Regulation of Haryana, in October that year, Kumar informed the then chief secretary Sanjeev Kaushal that IGP (Home Guards) was not a cadre post in the state.

He added that the Home Department had informed the Punjab and Haryana High Court the same year that the post of IGP (Home Guards) was never created by the state government. Kumar alleged that he was "assigned the post despite there being vacant cadre posts in Haryana in the IGP rank to allegedly insult, humiliate and harass him in public view for over seven months now."In 2022, he initiated action over the alleged unauthorised construction of a temple in Police Lines, Sirsa, bringing attention to administrative oversight and triggering a probe into the matter.Kumar's wife, Amneet P Kumar, is a senior IAS officer. She is currently in Japan as part of an official delegation led by Haryana Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini.

'It's courtesy': Mamata meets BJP MP Khagen Murmu but skips meeting MLA Shankar Ghosh admitted to same hospital

West Bengal CM Mamata Banerjee on Tuesday visited the Siliguri hospital where BJP MP Khagen Murmu was admitted with injuries. However, she did not meet BJP MLA Shankar Ghosh, who is admitted at the same hospital.

The two BJP leaders were attacked by a 500-strong mob in Jalpaiguri district's Nagrakata village on Monday, when they had gone to check on people hit by floods and landslides in the Dooars region. The mob allegedly pelted stones, attacked them with sticks, and ransacked their vehicle. Banerjee spoke to Murmu and his family members inside the ICU cabin. She later said, "It's courtesy. I heard he got injured and I came to see him. He is stable now. He is diabetic and that is why doctors are keeping him under observation. He has a small injury under the ear."

Following the attack, Bengal BJP leadership had alleged that Trinamool Congress was behind the attack. "When we visited the area, suddenly some people came up to us and said they were Didi's sainik and why are you here, we said we are Modi ji's sainik," Ghosh claimed. The attack has sparked a political row between the ruling TMC and the opposition BJP. While the BJP has accused the TMC of orchestrating the assault, the Trinamool has hit back, alleging that BJP leaders were using the natural disaster as a backdrop for photo opportunities instead of offering help.



The TMC posted on X, "When adversity strikes, humanity must rise above politics. Smt. (Banerjee) embodies this very ethos. Today, she visited BJP MP Khagen Murmu in the hospital, personally inquiring about his health and wellbeing. For her, compassion knows no political boundaries, because service to humanity is the truest service to God."Meanwhile, the BJP questioned why no one was arrested after the attack. BJP state president Samik Bhattacharya said, "Mamata Banerjee went to see the condition of Khagen Murmu, that is fine, but what action was taken after this attack on our adivasi MP? No one has arrested those who attacked Shankar Ghosh and Khagen Murmu till date."

Prices of homes in NCR rising fastest among top 7 markets in India; Noida and Greater Noida are providing the major push

The National Capital Region (NCR) recorded the steepest rise in housing prices among India's top seven cities in the third quarter of 2025, with average rates increasing by 24% year-on-year, according to data from real estate consultancy Anarock.A 1,000-sq ft house now costs around Rs 90 lakh on average in the NCR, compared to Rs 72 lakh last year. Average prices in NCR stood at Rs 8,900 per square foot in the July-September period this year, compared to Rs 7,200 a year earlier. On a quarterly basis too, the market showed strong momentum, rising 3% over the second quarter, when prices averaged Rs 8,650 per sq foot. This was the biggest quarterly increase witnessed among India's top metropolitan cities. The Indian Express has previously reported that the supply of new houses in the NCR has skewed massively towards luxury and ultra-luxury segments, leaving the affordable and premium segments starved of inventory.


The share of newly-launched houses priced below Rs 40 lakh dropped sharply from 62% in 2020 to 11% last year, according to Anarock data. Meanwhile, units in the luxury and ultra luxury sections - worth Rs 1.5 crore and above saw a massive jump, with 70% houses added to the market in 2024 being in this category, up from only 13% in 2019. In fact, as many as 59% of houses in this category that were added to the market last year were worth more than Rs 2.5 crore. Earlier reports have pointed out that Greater Noida and Noida have led the steep increase in housing prices, mainly due to the upcoming Noida International Airport in Jewar. Within the NCR, Delhi has the highest average property prices – at Rs 25,200 per sq foot earlier this year, which would translate into more than Rs 2.5 crore for a relatively small 1,000-sq ft apartment. Taken as a whole, the Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR) remains the most expensive housing market at Rs 17,230 per sq ft. However, prices of property increased relatively slowly, at about 6% annually. Prices in Bengaluru, India's technology hub, was the second-fastest growing after the NCR, with prices up 10% year-on-year to Rs 8,870 per sq ft on average. Other major southern and eastern markets saw more moderate increases, says the report. Prices in Hyderabad rose 8% to Rs 7,750 per sq ft, while Chennai saw a 5% increase to Rs 7,010. Pune and Kolkata registered smaller annual increases of 4% and 6% respectively. Sequential quarterly growth, or quarter-over-quarter growth across these cities was mostly in the range of 1%, says the report. Across all seven cities, the average price stood at Rs 9,105 per sq ft in the third quarter this year, reflecting a 9% year-on-year rise from Rs. 8,390 in Q3 of 2024 and a 1% increase over

Bombay High Court refuses to stay GR granting Kunbi status to Marathas under OBC category, seeks state's reply

The Bombay High Court Tuesday refused to grant interim stay on the September 2 Government Resolution (GR) on the implementation of the Hyderabad Gazette to grant Kunbi status to Marathas from the Marathwada region. The court also issued notices to the Maharashtra Government in various pleas challenging the GR and sought its reply in affidavit through the Social Justice and Special Assistance Department within four weeks. The division bench of Chief Justice Shree Chandrashekhar and Justice Gautam A Ankhad passed the order on pleas against the GR which was issued following hectic talks between ministers and Maratha quota activist Manoj Jarange Patil to resolve the quota crisis. The GR mentioned implementing the Hyderabad Gazette, a 1918 order by the then Nizam of Hyderabad. Kunbi is classified as an Other Backward Class (OBC) caste in Maharashtra.

The pleas alleged that the impugned GR was issued due to "political pressure", and it "arbitrarily extended OBC status to a politically dominant and socially advanced community without sufficient data" in violation of Article 14 of the Constitution and that discriminated against genuine OBC communities by diluting their share of reservation. The petitioners, through Senior Advocate Anil Anturkar and Venkatesh Dhond, also argued that various committees constituted by Maharashtra government and State Backward Class Commissions had made a clear distinction between Marathas and Kunbis, and had observed that the Marathas did not fall within the OBC category. Dhond, appearing for petitioner Maharashtra Mali Samaj Mahasangh, said that they were in no way challenging the inclusion of Maratha-Kunbis or Kunbi-Marathas under OBC, but their apprehension was that through the impugned GR, procedure has been laid down "to (facilitate) the infiltration of other persons belonging to Maratha community in the OBC category and therefore the state's response was necessary to clarify certain aspects of GR."However, opposing the pleas, Advocate General Birendra Saraf, appearing for the state government, submitted that the petitioners were not the aggrieved persons and they could not challenge the GR based on the grounds indicated in their pleas. Anturkar, representing the petitioner Kunbi Sena, sought urgent interim relief citing upcoming civic elections in Maharashtra, and said that otherwise ineligible persons may get the benefit of the GR, obtain OBC certificate and contest from seats reserved for the category, which would create an "irrevers-



ible situation" if they win.Anturkar also referred to The Maharashtra Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Denotified Tribes (Vimukta Jatis), NT, OBC and SBC (Regulation of Issuance and Verification of) Caste Certificate Act, 2000.

He argued that the impugned GR was issued without following mandatory procedure provided in the law pertaining to the government's rule-making powers. He argued that once the field is occupied by the statute, the government is denuded of its purview to exercise powers under Article 162 (executive power of the state) of the Constitution to issue such a GR. Anturkar claimed the GR was issued by ignoring the constitutional mandate under Article 338B of the Constitution, which provides that the state government shall consult the National Commission for Backward Classes on all major policy decisions affecting the socially and educationally backward classes. The petitioners also argued that the government has opened a "backdoor entry" for a community to get certificates under the OBC category. The court noted that the issue regarding the validity of GR based on provisions of the 2000 Act and rules framed under it, along with the applicability of the provision in Article 338B of the Constitution, can be decided after taking state government's response. The court also said that at present it was "not inclined" to make any observations regarding the executive powers of the state under Article 162 of the Constitution, and the same can be done after a "full-fledged" hearing. "At this stage, we are not elaborating upon issues raised by senior counsel (Anturkar) and would decline interim relief (seeking stay on GR)," the high court noted and posted a hearing for next month.

After Nepal, now Darjeeling: Tourism in Bengal takes hit this year even as festive season passes

Durga Puja, Laxmi Puja, and Diwali are the peak season for tour operators. This is the time when families can plan holidays, with schools, colleges, and offices closed simultaneously. However, this year, with political turmoil and natural calamities, the tourism industry has taken a hit."Hardly any destination is left to sell. There was Covid, then natural disasters affected us — Kashmir, Kedarnath, everything was affected. We have no space to breathe, Riddhi Roy of Dolphin Travels told The Indian Express.At least 20 people were killed and many more injured after a string of powerful landslides — following a barrage of rain - swept through Mirik, Sukhiapokhri, Darjeeling and adjoining areas on Sunday night and into Monday. "We had a group of around 10 to 15 people who were to go to Darjeeling and Mirik during Diwali, but after this, we will give them other options, or they can keep the money with us and later opt for another place. We are giving the Northeast as an option," said Roy. Earlier this year, protests against Nepal's

government meant that Indian airlines and travel operators were forced to cancel trips and tours. Anil Punjabi, owner of Ares Travels Pvt. Ltd. and a member of the Travel Agents Federation of India, told The Indian Express, "When such calamities happen, tourism gets hit first and recovers last. For the last eight months, something or the other has been happening. I have told clients to wait and watch. We will give them alternatives, or if they want a refund, we will. Tourism has been hit in the recent past — I can see that in 2025 the industry has slowed down. This time, we are seeing a trend where tourists are going to places where they have relatives and friends."Soumitra Kundu of Kundu Travels told The Indian Express, "Two things affect tourism —political disturbance and natural calamity. The hilly areas have become very risky for tourists; like in the Himachal region, there is flooding. This is all due to deforestation. Even a few years ago, such calamities were not seen. This is very dangerous for the tourism industry." Priyadeep Das of Jadavpur said, "A group of friends were to visit Kalimpong between October 10 and October 15, but the plans are on hold given the current situation. We regularly visit the hills, it's like a quick detox from hectic life. But now, with the payment already made, we will not be making any other plans soon."Roshmika Chandra, who lives in the United States and is visiting her maternal home for Durga Puja, had come with her husband and five-year-old son. They had plans to visit the Hills. "Post-Durga Puja, around 15 of us were to visit Mirik, Lava, and Lolegaon. It was a family trip for seven days, but now everything is on hold because the conditions are not suitable to travel. We had already booked the hotels and flights, and now there's a big question about whether we will get a refund," she said.

5 charged in Surrey extortion-linked shootings as Lawrence Bishnoi gang claims fresh attacks in Canada

In a major crackdown on extortion targeting British Columbia's South Asian community, the Canadian police Monday charged five men in two separate shootings in Surrey. The move comes as the city grapples with 56 extortion investigations this year, including 31 shootings, amid fears stoked by the Lawrence Bishnoi gang. Hours after the charges were announced, a man opened fire near the Gateway SkyTrain station before shooting at Surrey Police Service's District 1 office. He was swiftly arrested, but the incident underscored tensions already heightened by a Bishnoi associate's online claim of responsibility for three fresh Surrey attacks. The first case dates to August 10, 2024, when shots were fired and an arson attempt made at a Port Kells home near 88 Avenue and 192 Street. The following day, the residents received an extortion demand.On October 6, the British Columbia Prosecution Service approved charges against Abjeet Kingra, 26, and Vikram Sharma, 24, for discharging a firearm for arson. Kingra, already serving time for another offence, was remanded in custody. Sharma remains at large, with warrants also in a West Shore police case. The police have circulated his description: 5 feet 9 inches, 174 pounds, with black hair and

Three others were charged in a separate March 27, 2025, shooting at a residence in the 13300 block of 89A Avenue. Bullets struck the home at 1.55 am, but caused no injuries. Mandeep Gidda, 23, Nirmaandeep Cheema, 20, and Arundeep Singh, 26 face charges of reckless discharge of a firearm. Gidda and Cheema were remanded after appearing in court Monday, while Singh is due Wednesday. A February 18 shooting at the same address remains unsolved. The charges gained attention because Kingra was recently sentenced in the high-profile attack on Punjabi singer A P Dhillon's Vancouver Island home. On September 26, 2025, a Victoria court gave him a concurrent six-year term, 4.5 years after credit for time served, for arson and gunfire

at Dhillon's Colwood property in September 2024. The court noted he acted under orders from the Lawrence Bishnoi gang, which was declared a terrorist entity by Ottawa. The gang has been tied to dozens of Canadian incidents since 2023, including the killing of Sikh leader Hardeep Singh Nijjar in Surrey. On October 6, self-identified Bishnoi associate Fateh Portugal posted videos claiming responsibility for three recent shootings targeting properties linked to businessman Navi Dhesi (aka Navi Tesi), including the Swift 1200 AM radio station, which had aired anti-gang commentary hours earlier. Portugal alleged Dhesi extorted \$5 million from singers using the Bishnoi name, a charge the family denies. The police are investigating but cautioned against spreading online threats.

Even as charges were unveiled, gunfire struck Ustaad G76 Indian Cuisine in South Surrey's 2100 block of King George Boulevard at 2.20 a.m. Monday. No injuries were reported, but the restaurant's facade was hit with bullets. The police suspect extortion links, citing attacks on the chain's Maple Ridge outlet on October 1 and a nearby radio station on September 29. Later that afternoon, the SkyTrain and police office shootings rattled Surrey's core. No injuries occurred, but the police station was locked down while an explosives team checked an abandoned bag, which proved harmless. Authorities have mounted a multi-agency push against the extortion wave. In September, British Columbia launched a 40-officer task force led by Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Canada's federal police force, backed by \$200,000 in provincial funds. Surrey added a \$250,000 reward for tips and opened a Punjabi-staffed hotline (236-485-5149). "These arrests are a positive step, but one charge doesn't erase the fear," said Surrey Chief Constable Norm Lipinski. Assistant Commander Chief Supt. Duncan Pound pledged more resources to "secure further charges". Community leaders say businesses remain on edge. "Families are terrified; reporting saves lives," one shop owner said, standing outside boarded-up windows.

Punjab bans contaminated cough syrup linked to deaths of children in Madhya Pradesh

The Punjab Government Monday imposed an immediate ban on the sale, distribution, and use of Coldrif Syrup across the state, following the deaths of 11 children in Madhya Pradesh allegedly linked to the cough medicine. The decision comes amid growing concerns over adulterated medicine, with the syrup declared "Not of Standard Quality" by the Government Analyst at the Drugs Testing Laboratory under the Food & Drugs Administration, Madhya Pradesh. Goa, Gurgaon, Karnataka, and Maharashtra are also among those that have banned the sale, distribution or use of Coldrif Syrup. "A test report (No. 68N, dated October 1, 2025) revealed the presence of diethylene glycol—a toxic industrial solvent—at alarmingly high levels of 46.28% w/v, rendering the drug injurious to health," the state government's ban notice read.

The Punjab Drugs Control Authority's notice, issued by the Food and Drugs Administration (Drugs Wing) has linked the formulation to the recent fatalities in Chhindwara district, Madhya Pradesh, where several children succumbed after consuming the syrup for cold and fever relief. "Considering the seriousness of the matter," the order states, the product is "hereby completely prohibited... with immediate effect in public interest." All retailers, distributors, registered medical practitioners, hospitals, and healthcare in



stitutions in Punjab have been directed to refrain from purchasing, selling, or utilising the syrup. Any existing stocks must be reported promptly to drugscontrol.fda@punjab.gov.in for further action, with authorities warning of strict enforcement to prevent potential harm. The banned product, Coldrif Syrup (containing paracetamol, phenylephrine hydrochloride, and chlorpheniramine maleate), bears a batch number of SR-13, with a manufacturing date of May 2025 and an expiry date of April 2027. It is produced by Sresan Pharmaceutical Manufacturer in Sunguvarchatram (Mathura) of Tamil Nadu's Kancheepuram District.

Karnataka extends deadline for caste survey till Sunday; last date in Bengaluru to be October 24

Telangana caste survey: The social, economic, educational, employment and political caste survey was conducted by the Telangana government through door-to-door visits and self-certification of the people. In Bengaluru, where the Survey began last Saturday, 2.6 lakh of the target 39.82 lakh households have been covered so far. Owing to various delays and the slow pace of enumeration in different parts of the state, the Karnataka Government has decided to extend the deadline for the ongoing Socio-economic and Educational Survey till October 12. In the limits of the Greater Bengaluru Authority (GBA), where the survey began late, the last date has been extended till October 24. According to a memo issued by the Department of School Education

and Literacy, the timings of government and aided schools – which will reopen on Wednesday after Dussehra holidays – have been altered to facilitate the survey. Till the end of the survey, classes will be held from 8 am to 1 pm, after which teachers will have to carry out enumeration in households. In GBA limits, the revised school timings will be applicable till October 24. Though the Karnataka State Commission for Backward Classes was yet to make a formal announcement regarding the same, the state government was of the opinion that extending the duration of the survey by a few days would result in the inclusion of a majority of households in the exercise. Data shared by the Commission on Monday evening said that of the total target of 1.43 crore households in the state, the survey was completed in 1.10 crore houses (80.39%).

The message from Google that your storage is full, that you have filled your free space of 15 GB, leaves you with a choice: either delete some emails, photos, and videos, or buy more storage space. Businesses grapple with similar problems but at a far greater scale as they increasingly generate data that needs secure storage. To address the issue of cloud storage for Indian firms, Amit Chaurasia, who has spent 22 years "purely building storage products", founded a startup, Dataneers, in Pune to align with the nation's goal to become self-reliant in terms of data storage.

Dataneers' service holds significance, taking into account the fact that the top cloud vendors operating in India are based in foreign countries. The main risk lies in the fact that these multinational corporations operate under their own respective legal frameworks, adds Chaurasia, while mentioning an Indian company whose 10 years' data was jeopardized because the cloud vendor blocked access to its services. "This was due to some policy violation, which this company had no idea about. It was a small company, and its 10-15 years of business data were in jeopardy. Cloud storage is widely preferred for its ease of management and the extensive features it offers to the smallest customers. The terms of use and policies of the top cloud vendors vary, and if an Indian organisation happens to violate any of these, the company can suspend or block access to its services, says Chaurasia. Dataneers focuses on building data storage solutions for Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs), a segment that Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman spoke of strengthening in the Union Budget. "We are one of the few firms building indigenous data storage products," says Chaurasia. "Almost all data storage products used in India, across both public and private sectors, are developed by non-Indian companies," adds Chaurasia. The startup has been leveraging open-source technologies, enabling companies to build both foundational and complex storage products using community-driven software. "The Indian government, too, actively encourages the adoption of open-source solutions," he adds. This week, Dataneers is launching a Network Attached Storage (NAS), a simple storage system in which a customer plugs into its network and creates shares so that members of the organization are able to access and store data in a centralized way.

"Once the data is stored on the centralised server, we provide a mechanism to back up that data to the cloud or any other location preferred by the customer. This ensures that even if the primary NAS storage experiences a failure, the data remains secure and accessible...We go a step further. The company has built a complete data pipeline that not only stores information but also safeguards it across multiple environments, whether on the cloud or customerdesignated locations," says Chaurasia. Moreover, clients can specify the required data volume, and Dataneers designs a customised, cloud-like storage solution for them on their premises. "This approach delivers the flexibility of cloud storage without the financial unpredictability of public cloud providers," says Chaurasia. "Going forward, we will provide a similar kind of service on the cloud to provide companies with ways to store the data that they can own. They do not have to rely on somebody else's policy fees or services. At present, there are cloud vendors who offer security options, but these are very costly for Indian mid-tier organizations. We are building cloud-based storage solutions that will not be owned by any other vendor," says Chaurasia. What could turn into a challenge for Dataneers is a lack of brand presence. "We do not have a large marketing budget, but we are also hopeful that our cost differential will be a plus for us. The experience of the customers who have used our products has been positive, and this is fuelling us to go fur-

Special NDPS court discharges Muchhad Paanwala co-owner Ramkumar Tiwari in 2021 drugs case

A special court under the Narcotics Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act last week discharged Ramkumar Tiwari, a member of the family which co-owns the famous Muchhad Paanwala shop in South Mumbai, who was arrested by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) in 2021. The special court issued the order on October 3, and it was made public Monday.

NCB arrested Tiwari along with five others, claiming that they were involved in sourcing and selling CBD sprays and ganja. Tiwari said there was no evidence to show that he was in any way involved in sourcing, storing and selling of drugs. He also said that there was no evidence to suggest that he was linked to the other co-accused.

Accepting Tiwari's submissions, the special court said there was no proof of any conspiracy between him and the co-accused, and that there was no evidence to show he was selling any contraband material. "It has been shown that the material seized from accused No. 4 (Tiwari) was sent



for chemical analysis, and as per the government laboratory report, the vegetative material did not show any sign of containing the narcotic substance. Therefore... the grounds for discharge sought by the accused are accepted," Special Judge S M Patil said.

87-year-old woman who fell into a swollen Damodar River, rescued by fishermen 45 km away in West Bengal

What began as a routine bath in the swollen Damodar River turned into a 45-kilometre ordeal across powerful currents for 87-year-old Maturi Tudu from the Jakta village in West Bengal's Purba Bardhaman district, ending in an astonishing rescue. According to residents, after finishing her bath on Sunday afternoon, Maturi tried to climb up the stairs of the riverbank when she slipped and fell into the deep waters. Swept away by the strong monsoon currents of the overflowing Damodar, she drifted nearly 45 kilometres downstream before reaching Muidipur in the Jamalpur police station area by evening.

There, at the confluence of the Damodar and Mundeswari rivers, she got caught near the bamboo poles of a footbridge. Exhausted and shivering, she cried out for help. A group of fishermen, who were fishing nearby under torchlight, heard her cries and rushed to her rescue in small boats. They pulled her to safety and took her to a local Durga temple near Muidipur.

Villagers, especially women, immediately came forward — helping her remove her soaked clothes, providing warmth, and administering first aid until police arrived. 

Gurupada Hembrom said, "Mother-in-law went to bathe around noon. When she didn't return for hours, we were very tense and feared the worst, that she had drowned. We searched everywhere, but by evening there was no trace. Then, late at night, Jamalpur police called to inform us that she had been found alive and rescued 45 kilometres away."

Later that night, Gurupada, his wife, and son rushed to the hospital. Maturi herself recounted what happened: "I was



coming out of the river after bathing when my foot slipped and I fell into the water. The current carried me away. I tried to reach the bank, but I couldn't. I just kept floating," she said. The survival drew praise from Sayani Das, Bengal's nationally recognised swimmer and recipient of the Rashtrapati Award. "I salute the woman's courage and composure. 'Was handed weapons and sent to Ukrainian territory': Rohtak man's kin seek help after he was lured into Russian army

After two men from Haryana's Fatehabad were reported to have been trapped in the Russia-Ukraine war zone, one more family from the state has come forward claiming that their son was allegedly lured into joining the Russian Army, along with two others from Ambala and Sonipat. The family of Sandeep, 29, from Jethpur (Taimurpur) village in Rohtak, said he sent them a video informing them of his situation and pleading to be rescued. Sandeep had travelled to Russia along with youths from Sonipat, Ambala, and Uttar Pradesh. He went on a study visa on September 23, 2024, and was working part-time at a restaurant while studying. During his stay, his family claimed, he was 'tricked' into joining the Russian army as a cook. Soon after, he was

His maternal uncle, Shribhagwan, told media persons that they had paid Rs 6 lakh to an agent from Charkhi Dadri to send Sandeep abroad. "Initially, he worked at a restaurant in Russia, but now the army has handed him weapons and sent him to occupied Ukrainian territory — just 2.5 km from the city," Shribhagwan said. Sandeep's father, Bakshe Ram, added, "Our family is financially very weak. Sandeep is the youngest of five siblings. He has completed his BA degree. One of his brothers is a hairdresser in Jhajjar, another works in Gurgaon. One sister is divorced, while another sister is married. The family was hoping that sending him abroad will improve our financial situation. We took a loan to send him to Russia.""Our family is going through a terrible situation. We sold all our jewellery and borrowed money to pay around Rs 6 lakh to an agent to send Sandeep to Russia. Since then, he hasn't been able to send even a thorities to bring them back home.

rupee back. The house is now in a dilapidated condition," the father added. 'Non-Russians sent out on patrol at night'His sister Saroj said he informed them over a video call that their group was not even allowed to light fires. "They are given only one meal of porridge per day. He fears being attacked during night patrols. He spends the day in a bunker, and at night, non-Russian recruits are sent out on patrol. He begged us to bring him back home somehow," she said. Shribhagwan said they have written to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), the Embassy, and the Prime Minister's Office requesting to bring Sandeep back. They also met BJP national secretary Omprakash Dhankar, who forwarded their letter to External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar. The family is pleading with the government to help bring their son back.

Bakshe Ram said multiple surgeries have rendered him unable to work. Sandeep's mother has also undergone surgery. They had pinned their hopes on him, but now he too is trapped. They are urging the Indian government to contact Russian authorities and help bring their son home.A man from Ambala and another from Sonipat too have been trapped in the war zone, Sandeep's family said, but their details are yet to be ascertained. Earlier, the families of Ankit Jangra and Vijay Poonia of Kumharia village in Fatehabad alleged that they were forcibly recruited into the Russian army. The two were sent to the warzone, following which their families have lost contact with them for over three weeks now. Fatehabad native Ramesh, who returned from Russia, revealed that a network is "actively recruiting youth into the Russian army" using monetary temptations. "They give 10 days of basic weapons training, then send them to the frontlines with the harsh choice - kill or be killed," he said. Ramesh added that this network is not limited to Indians. "They are targeting young men from Sri Lanka, Nepal, and Pakistan as well. They promise a luxurious life and high salaries. Youths from Uzbekistan and Kyrgyzstan often resist because they understand the Russian language. But Indians, Nepalis, Pakistanis, and Sri Lankans fall into the trap easily," he added. The families of Jangra and Poonia now see a ray of hope after the MEA released a list of 27 Indian youths forcibly recruited into the Russian army and sent to fight in the Ukraine war. Their names are on the list, and the government is now in talks with the Russian au-

Canadian PM Carney visits Trump as relations between them remain at a low point

Washington: Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney will meet with President Donald Trump in the Oval Office on Tuesday at a time when one of the world's most durable and amicable alliances has been fractured by Trump's trade war and annexation threats. Carney's second visit to the White House comes ahead of a review next year of the free trade agreement, which is critical to Canada's economy. More than 77 per cent of Canada's exports go to the US. Trump's talk of making Canada the 51st state and his tariffs have Canadians feeling an undeniable sense of betrayal. Relations with Canada's southern neighbour and longtime ally haven't been worse. "We've had ups and downs, but this is the lowest point in relations that I can recall," said Frank McKenna, a former Canadian ambassador to the United States and current deputy chairman of TD Bank.

"Canadians aren't being instructed what to do; they are simply voting with their feet," he said. "I talk every day to ordinary citizens who are changing their vacation plans, and I talk to large business owners who are moving reward trips away or executive business trips. There is an outright rebellion." There is fear in Canada over what will happen to the US-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Carney is looking to get some relief on some sector-specific tariffs, but expectations are low. "Improving relations with the White House ahead of the USMCA review is certainly an objective of the trip, but opposition parties and part of the Canadian public will criticise Prime Minister Carney if he doesn't achieve some progress on the tariff front at this stage," said Daniel Béland, a political science professor at McGill University in Montreal. Trump said Monday that he anticipated Carney wanted to use the meeting to discuss trade.

"I guess he's going to ask about tariffs, because a lot of companies from Canada are moving into the United States," Trump told reporters after signing an executive order related to Alaska. "He's losing a lot of companies in Canada." Carney has said the USMCA, which is up for review in 2026, is an advantage for Canada at a time when it is clear that the US is charging for access to its market. Carney has said the commitment of the US to the core of USMCA means that over 85 per cent of Canada-



US trade continues to be free of tariffs. He said the U.S. average tariff rate on Canadian goods is 5.6 per cent and remains the lowest among all its trading partners. But Trump has some sector-specific tariffs on Canada, known as Section 232 tariffs, that are having an impact. There are 50 per cent tariffs on steel and aluminum imports, for example. McKenna said he is hearing Canada might get some relief in steel and aluminum. "It could be 50 per cent to 25 per cent or agreeing on tariff-free quotas to allow the steel and aluminum to go through at last year's levels," he

The ties between the two countries are without parallel. About USD 2.5 billion (nearly USD 3.6 billion Canadian) worth of goods and services cross the border each day. Canada is the top export destination for 36 US states. There is close cooperation on defense, border security and law enforcement, and a vast overlap in culture, traditions and pastimes. About 60 per cent of US crude oil imports are from Canada, and 85 per cent of US electricity imports are from Canada. Canada is also the largest foreign supplier of steel, aluminum and uranium to the US and has 34 critical minerals and metals that the Pentagon is eager for and investing in for national security."The bigger prize would be getting a mutual agreement to negotiate as quickly as possible the free trade relationship," McKenna said. Canada's PM Mark Carney makes second White House visit to talk trade with U.S. President Trump

Canada's Prime Minister Mark Carney is making his second visit to the White House in five months on Tuesday (October 7, 2025) under increasing pressure to address U.S. tariffs on steel, autos and other goods that are hurting Canada's economy. A Canadian government official and several analysts played down the chances of an imminent trade deal with U.S. President Donald Trump and said the mere fact that discussions are continuing should be considered a success for Carney.

The prime minister last visited the Oval Office in May, when he bluntly told Trump that Canada would never be for sale in response to Trump's repeated threat to purchase or annex Canada. Since then, the prime minister has made numerous concessions to Canada's biggest trading partner, including dropping some counter-tariffs and scrapping a digital services tax aimed at U.S. tech companies.PM Carney's office has said the working visit will focus on forging a new economic and security relationship with the U.S.White House spokeswoman Karoline Leavitt said Monday (October 6, 2025): "I'm sure trade will be a topic of discussion ... and all of the other issues that are facing both Canada and the United States."While the majority of Canada's exports are entering the United States tariff-free under the U.S.-Canada-Mexico free trade agreement, tariffs have pummeled Canada's steel, aluminum and auto sectors and a number of small businesses."The reality is that right now, Canadian products have among the lowest tariff rate," said Jonathan Kalles, a former adviser to

Carney's predecessor, Justin Trudeau. "You don't want to poke the bear when things could be much worse," he said, adding that any meeting with Trump is a calculated risk." Carney will probably get a better deal through private negotiations, not the pomp and ceremony of going to the White House, "he said.

Mr. Carney won an election in April promising to be tough with Trump and secure a new economic relationship with the United States. Shachi Kurl, President of the Angus Reid Institute, said polls show Canadians have largely been willing to give Carney time to deal with Trump."But that amount of time is finite," Mr. Kurl said, noting pressure may build with job losses mounting and economic growth hobbled by U.S. tariffs. The U.S. is the destination for nearly three-quarters of Canadian exports.

Canada's opposition leader, Pierre Poilievre, has criticised Mr. Carney's approach to Mr. Trump, noting the prime minister's earlier pledge to "negotiate a win" by July 21. Asa McKercher, a specialist in Canada-U.S. relations at St. Francis Xavier University, said Mr. Carney's meeting with Mr. Trump would be a success if there is any recognition that Canada has moved to address some of Trump's persistent grievances. "Carney has just set up this new defense agency and boosted military spending, so it would be great if Trump could reduce some of those sectoral tariffs on autos," Mr. McKercher said, citing Trump's past complaint that Canada is a "military free-rider."

Houthis detain nine more U.N. staff as part of Yemen crackdown

Iranian-backed Houthis in Yemen have detained nine employees of the United Nations as part of a long-running crackdown on the organisation, the U.N. said. The detentions bring the number of detained U.N. workers in Houthiheld territories in Yemen to 53 since 2021, U.N. spokesman Stephane Dujarric said in a statement late Monday (October 6, 2025). No details about the circumstances or timing of the latest detentions were given.

Mr. Dujarric said the crackdown has impeded "the U.N.'s ability to operate in Yemen and to deliver critical assistance" to the local population in the Arab world's poorest country. He called for "the immediate and unconditional release" of all U.N. staff as well as workers from other international organisations and diplomatic missions who have been detained by the rebels. "They must be respected and protected in accordance with applicable international law,"

Mr. Dujarric said.A spokesman for the rebels did not respond to calls and messages seeking comment.

The rebels have previously said that their crackdown on the U.N. and other international groups is linked to suspected members of an alleged espionage network. In August, the rebels raided U.N. offices in the capital, Sanaa, and detained 19 employees, according to the U.N. They later released Lana Shukri Kataw, the deputy director of UNICEF in the country. The raids were the latest in a long-running Houthi crackdown against the U.N. and other international organisations working in rebel-held areas in Yemen. The crackdown has forced the U.N. to suspend its operations in the Houthi stronghold of Saada province in northern Yemen, following the detention of eight staff in January 2025.

The U.N. also relocated its top humanitarian coordinator in Yemen from Sanaa to the coastal city of Aden, which serves as seat for the internationally recognised government. Yemen has plunged into civil war in 2014 when the Houthis seized Sanaa and much of northern Yemen, forcing the internationally recognised government into exile. A coalition led by Saudi Arabia and including the United Arab Emirates intervened the following year in an attempt to restore the government. The war has been stalemated in recent years, and the rebels reached a deal with Saudi Arabia that stopped their attacks on the kingdom in return for ceasing the Saudi-led strikes on their territories. The rebels are engaged in tit-for-tat attacks with Israel over the war in Gaza. They have also attacked ships sailing in the Red Sea off Yemen over allegations of links to Israel. Israel has previously launched waves of airstrikes in response to the Houthis' firing of missiles and drones at Israel.

Intruder with mental health issues vandalises Washington state Capitol

An intruder broke into the Washington State Capitol and smashed a glass door, set fire to a rug and flag, and knocked over busts of George Washington and Martin Luther King Jr. before he was taken into custody by State troopers. The man, who has a history of mental health challenges, was booked into Thurston County Jail on suspicion of first-degree burglary, first-degree arson and first-degree malicious mischief, said Chris Loftis, spokesman for the Washington State Patrol. "The suspect's actions were very purposeful at the Capitol, but appears to be an individual experiencing a mental health crisis of some sort," Mr. Loftis said in an email to The Associated Press. The man parked in a flower bed in the flag circle in front of the Legislative Building at about 10:15 p.m. on Sunday (October 6, 2025) and was spotted by someone with the Department of Enterprise Services, which stewards the state Capitol Campus. They alerted the State Patrol. The suspect had two hammers and broke in through a ground-floor office window, proceeded upstairs where he damaged items as he



moved through the building, Mr. Loftis said.Lt. Gov. Denny Heck said the flags on the side of the Rotunda were knocked over and one was burned. "He broke a glass door to enter the State Reception Room, where he also set fire to several objects, including the original rug, which is a priceless treasure." Diandra Asana, spokesperson for Mr. Heck, said that the State Patrol did not find the incident to be politically motivated

World Bank ups FY26 growth outlook to 6.5% on but downgrades next year's forecast due to Trump tariffs

The World Bank has upgraded its growth outlook for India to 6.5% in 2025-26, from the earlier 6.3%, citing stronger domestic conditions and also the impact of the GST rate cuts. However, it has revised downward its forecast for 2026-27 to 6.3%, saying the impact of the US tariffs will dampen growth. In its South Asia Development Update released on Tuesday (October 7, 2025), the World Bank said India's real GDP growth "exceeded expectations" in the April-June 2025 quarter, accelerating to 7.8%. It noted that growth was bolstered by strong private consumption and investment and boosted by lower-than-expected prices.

For the current financial year, the World Bank said India's growth has been revised upwards to 6.5% from the earlier prediction of 6.3%. "India is expected to remain the world's fastest growing major economy, underpinned by continued strength in consumption growth," the report said. "Domestic conditions, particularly agricultural output and rural wage growth, have been better than expected."

"The government's reforms to the Goods and Services Tax (GST)— reducing the number of tax brackets and simplifying compliance— are expected to support activity," it



added. However, it said that the forecast for 2026-27 has been downgraded from 6.5% to 6.3% as a result of the imposition of the 50% tariff on about three-quarters of India's goods exports to the US. "India had been expected to face lower U.S. tariffs than its competitors in April but as of the end of August it faces considerably higher tariffs," the report noted. "Almost one-fifth of India's goods exports went to the United States in 2024, equivalent to about 2% of GDP."

In Bangladesh's flooded plains, schools in boats keep learning afloat

Each morning, he waits on the edge of his flooded village in Bhangura, western Bangladesh, for the solar-powered classroom that sails right to his doorstep. His home lies deep in Chalan Beel, a sprawling 26-square-kilometre (10 sq miles) wetland where seasonal floods often cut off roads and submerge entire villages.

But for Islam and hundreds of other children, education floats. The initiative, launched in 2002 by architect Mohammed Rezwan using \$500 of his scholarship money, has grown into a nationwide model run by the non-profit Shidhulai Swanirvar Sangstha (SSS).Now, more than 100 boats serve as schools, libraries, and clinics. The project has educated over 22,000 students and won a UNESCO Confucius Prize for Literacy this year for its work.

In Chalan Beel, around two dozen boats serve as classrooms, visiting riverside villages six days a week. The school boats are made of local timber and are equipped with benches, blackboards, and bookshelves. Solar panels power lights and computers. "Over 22,500 students have graduated so far, and during severe floods, these boats also double as shelters for displaced families.'

Other NGOs have adopted similar models for their



work in the country's wetland areas. Classes are run in three shifts a day, lasting about three hours each. Teachers navigate narrow waterways to collect students, conduct lessons in Bengali, maths, and general knowledge. "We never had the chance to study," said parent Sufia Khatun, waiting on the riverbank for her son Islam to return. "But this boat lets my children dream of a better future." Teacher Sakhina Khatun, who has been with SSS for over a decade, said similar floating school initiatives have since inspired projects in countries like Nigeria, Cambodia, and the Philippines. "These schools never close — not even during floods," she said. "That's what makes them special."Founder Rezwan, a World Fellow at Yale University, said: "I haven't had many things during my life and these children don't have much either. But giving them access to schooling, healthcare and seeing that replicated around the world - that gives me motivation."

Looking beyond limitations: on embracing the strengths of the cerebral palsy community



The theme for World Cerebral Palsy Day 2025, which falls on October 6, is #UniqueANDUnited. This carries a profound message for all of us—to adopt a perspective that focuses on discovering and celebrating the unique abilities of individuals living with Cerebral Palsy (CP). Understanding CP

Cerebral Palsy is an umbrella term describing a group of disorders caused by damage to the developing brain, often before or during birth. While CP itself is not progressive, meaning the brain injury does not worsen over time, the individual's functional abilities may change throughout their lifetime. This dynamic nature of CP highlights the importance of continuous care and adaptive support. Each child with CP possesses distinct strengths that go beyond their disability. As physicians, therapists, and caregivers, we are called to seek out and nurture what is possible rather than concentrating solely on limitations. M.C. Mathew, a pioneer in child development and rehabilitation services in India, offers a practical and compassionate approach to supporting children with CP. His three-step method begins with identifying the child's abilities. This is followed by examining boundaries—often treatable conditions such as iron deficiency, recurrent chest infections, or Vitamin D deficiencythat may hinder developmental progress. Finally, he considers concerns that directly impact the child's function. This comprehensive strategy not only helps unlock the child's potential but also empowers families to focus on achievable goals and outcomes. One of the most significant challenges in countries like ours, compared to developed nations, is the late identification and intervention when it comes to CP. Often, children are diagnosed as late as at five years old, by which time irreversible developmental setbacks may have occurred. This delay underscores the critical need for early screening and proactive intervention. Early identification improves the possibility of better outcomes and functional independence.

It is here that the second part of the theme, "United," becomes essential—standing together as a community to advocate for children with CP and their families. Unity means fostering inclusion, not only in schools but in all public spaces. Although laws exist that recognise elementary education as a fundamental right, many families face rejection from schools who cite physical disabilities as a barrier. This must change: supportive environments where children with disabilities are integrated into mainstream schools are vital to lay the foundations of acceptance and opportunity. Inclusion also remains a challenge beyond education. Parents often encounter barriers when seeking medical care, largely due to a lack of awareness about the diverse needs of children with CP. While many specialised centres provide essential services, children are sometimes confined to these facilities, limiting their social participation and independence. Physical accessibility remains a significant hurdle-mobility aids such as walkers or wheelchairs can be difficult to use in areas with inadequate infrastructure and poor road conditions. Advocacy and celebrationAs we observe World Cerebral Palsy Day, let us remember our larger mission embodied by the hashtag #UniqueANDUnited: to be mindful of the strengths and needs of children and adults with CP. Together, as a united community, we can promote early identification, advocate for inclusion, improve accessibility, and celebrate the unique contributions of every individual living with Cerebral Palsy. Our collective efforts will help ensure that these individuals are not just seen for their challenges but recognised for their

Why does mental health and disability support often end when you turn 18?



What happens when a child with autism, an intellectual disability, or ADHD turns 18? For most Indian families, the answer is stark -- the carefully-structured supports built around school-based systems abruptly end, leaving young adults and their caregivers to navigate an uncertain future. Data from studies in India indicates a significant mental health burden among children, with prevalence rates in the community ranging from approximately 6% to 16% and higher in schools. While many children require support, 80-90% do not receive it, and only about 0.05% of India's health budget is allocated to mental health. Children with intellectual disabilities and other conditions including autism, anxiety, and depression face challenges, with 50% of children with mental disabilities never attending an educational institution, according to the People's Archive of Rural India's analysis of Census 2011 data.

"In India, most structured supports stop at 18 because they are largely designed around school-based systems and child-focused programmes," says Mithun Prasad, consultant, psychiatry, SIMS Hospital, Chennai. "Once young adults leave school, there are very few options for continued care or vocational training. This transition gap leaves families worried and often struggling to find meaningful activities or support. Many young adults feel lost and isolated because the system does not prepare them for life beyond school,"Shoroug Motwani, child and adolescent psychiatrist, SRCC Hospital, Narayana Health, Mumbai, explains that the gap is systemic. "Most public and NGO services are organised around child development frameworks. Policy cut-offs, workforce shortages and fragmented ministries create an administrative cliff at the end of school age," she notes. The result, she adds, is functional decline, social withdrawal and mounting caregiver stress. There are some scattered services available. "NGOs do run vocational training or day-care centres, but these are few and concentrated in cities," says Dr. Prasad. "Higher education opportunities are rare and largely lack necessary accommodations."

According to Yayathee S., consultant psychotherapist & counsellor, Rela Hospital, Chennai, tertiary care and rehabilitation centres do exist. "In Chennai, organisations such as The Banyan and SCARF, and at the national level NIMHANS, offer inpatient and outpatient support. But what's missing is a well-established community rehabilitation system. After acute care, many individuals get lost in the com-

munity due to poor family or community support. Some tragically end up wandering or begging on the streets."Dr. Motwani points to international evidence-based approaches such as the Clubhouse model for social recovery and Individual Placement and Support (IPS) for employment. "While small pilots exist in India, they are not scaled up. Community-based housing, supported education, and systematic transition planning are still glaringly absent."

For families, the burden is heavy. "Financial barriers make things even harder. Insurance rarely covers mental health or developmental services. Respite services for caregivers are almost nonexistent," says Dr. Prasad. Parents often quit jobs or reduce work to provide full-time care, leading to burnout and financial strain.Dr. Yayathee emphasises the insurance gap. "Even now, no insurance company in India supports mental health services in a meaningful way. The cost of therapy, rehabilitation, and inpatient treatment is enormous. Caregivers not only shoulder financial losses but also emotional exhaustion."Dr. Motwani adds that this creates a "missing-middle" problem — middle-income families, who cannot afford long-term private therapy yet fall outside welfare safety nets, are left especially vulnerable.

Experts agree that India needs a continuum of care that bridges adolescence to adulthood. "An ideal system would include smooth transition services, vocational training, inclusive higher education, community-based day programmes, regular mental health support, respite services and financial support for families," says Dr. Prasad.Dr. Yayathee suggests a public—private partnership model. "Starting from early identification in schools, proper vocational and community-based rehabilitation with family involvement is essential. Insurance coverage would be a game changer."

Dr. Motwani outlines features seen in successful international systems: "Transition planning starting in adolescence, local Clubhouse-style hubs, supported employment at scale, disability-friendly higher education, community-based housing, and robust financial protection." What can be done? Doctors propose a multi-sectoral approach. "Collaboration between governments, NGOs, and private institutions is essential and support should not stop at 18, but continue across the lifespan." On government level, a national transition policy with dedicated funding, scaled-up community day-care and respite schemes, and strict enforcement of insurance parity. And at NGOs level, replication of Clubhouse and IPS models, building respite networks, and providing transition counselling for families.

The private sector could also conduct internships, CSR-backed vocational hubs, workplace training, and public-private pilots for supported living and education, they say. As India moves towards expanding mental health infrastructure, experts say the measure of success will be whether young adults with autism, intellectual disability, or psychiatric conditions are able to live with dignity, participate in communities, with access to education and employment.

NITI Aayog CEO optimistic on bilateral trade agreement with US

New Delhi: NITI Aayog CEO BVR Subrahmanyam on Monday exuded confidence that a trade agreement would be concluded between India and the US soon, as both countries are committed to having a mutually beneficial bilateral trade pact. Subrahmanyam also said that India should lower tariffs and non-tariff barriers and open its markets to improve competitiveness in manufacturing. "So the good thing is, both sides are still committed to having a trade deal. So negotiations happened last month, so I think both sides are hopeful," he told reporters while launching 'Trade Watch Quarterly'.

The ties between New Delhi and Washington have come under severe stress after US President Donald Trump doubled tariffs on Indian goods in August to 50 per cent, including an additional 25 per cent duty on India's purchase of Russian crude oil.India had described the US action as "unfair, unjustified, and unreasonable". Asked to comment on the impact of a whopping 50 per cent tariffs on Indian goods, Subrahmanyam said, "Building a trade channel is difficult, and unwinding a trade channel is also difficult... No

impact will happen till Christmas."The NITI Aayog CEO, however, noted that 'summer' is going to be an issue if both countries do not settle the trade deal. "We are at a disadvantage...50 per cent tariffs are a major, major cost factor... There is no escaping that. People are hopeful that if the trade deal comes through by November, then there will be no disruption," he said. In February this year, leaders of the two countries directed officials to negotiate a proposed Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA). It was planned to conclude the first tranche of the pact by the fall (October-November) of 2025. So far, five rounds of negotiations have been held. The pact is aimed at more than doubling the bilateral trade to USD 500 billion by 2030 from the current USD 191 billion. The US remained India's largest trading partner for the fourth consecutive year in 2024-25, with bilateral trade valued at USD 131.84 billion (USD 86.5 billion exports). Subrahmanyam said India's trade deficit is manageable but unbalanced. While noting that India is absent in manufacturing intermediaries, Subrahmanyam said, "I do not think India should protect any sector."

The sleek pair of earphones on a traveller's ears is not just about music; it's about technology's clever promise, delivering only what we want to hear and filtering out everything else. Various companies have perfected this art of noise cancellation, filtering out unwanted sounds so the listener can enjoy pure music.But pause for a moment and ask if life itself is not in desperate need of this feature? Noise cancellation!

Every day, we spend a surprising amount of mental energy not on productive work or joyful moments but on distractions that creep into our thoughts. Unknowingly, we allow ourselves to be consumed by what others say, how they behave, or even by imagined judgments. This bundle of thoughts drains our vitality, leaving us dull by the end of the day. Tamil Nadu records 3,170 elephants in latest synchronised survey



The latest synchronised elephant population estimation exercise has revealed Tamil Nadu is home to 3,170 wild elephants, an increase of 107 individuals from the 2024 count of 3,063. The estimate was derived through a three-day synchronised survey conducted in May 2025 across all five elephant reserves in Tamil Nadu, covering 8,989.63 sq.km. of effective elephant habitats. The estimation exercise was carried out across 26 forest divisions. According to the State Forest Department, the overall elephant density was 0.35 elephants per sq.km. as per the direct Block Count method, and 0.37 elephants per sq.km. using the Line Transect Dung Count method.

The Block Count method, a direct observation approach, involves dividing elephant habitats into small sampling blocks (each about 5 sq.km.) and deploying forest teams to record all elephant sightings within these blocks over a fixed period. This helps determine population size and age—sex composition based on actual sightings. The Line Transect Dung Count method, on the other hand, is an indirect technique used to estimate elephant density in areas where direct sightings are difficult. Survey teams walk along fixed transect lines, counting dung piles and measuring their distance from the line. Using specialised software, dung density is converted into elephant density by factoring in dung decay and defecation rates. Highest sightings

A total of 681 blocks were sampled across the State. The survey involved over 2,000 forest personnel, including guards, watchers, and anti-poaching watchers. The highest number of elephants were sighted in the Mudumalai Tiger Reserve, where 162 elephants were counted in 24 blocks spanning 241 sq.km., accounting for nearly 50% of the division's elephant habitat. Other divisions with significant sightings included Gudalur (102 elephants), Sathyamangalam Tiger Reserve (94 elephants), Anamalai Tiger Reserve—Pollachi Division (107 elephants), Erode (74 elephants), and Coimbatore (72 elephants).

The Nilgiri Elephant Reserve, part of the larger Nilgiri Eastern Ghats landscape, recorded the highest elephant population and density, with an estimated 2,419 elephants (0.53 elephants per sq km) under the block count method, and 3,163 elephants (0.70 per sq km) under the dung count method. Together, the Nilgiri and Coimbatore reserves support nearly 70-80% of Tamil Nadu's wild elephants, forming part of a contiguous population shared with neighbouring Karnataka and Kerala. Other aspects assessed In addition to population estimation, the survey assessed demographic patterns through waterhole counts, which revealed that adults constituted 44% of the total population, followed by sub-adults (31%), juveniles (11%), and calves (14%). The sex ratio was recorded at 1:1.77 (male to female), while the adult female-to-calf ratio was 1:0.50. Average herd sizes ranged between three and sixteen elephants.

Forest officials said the findings indicate a stable and healthy elephant population structure, consistent with earlier surveys conducted in 2002, 2010, 2017, 2023, and 2024. However, the report highlighted the need for refining future estimates by incorporating division-specific dung decay rates, as the use of a single decay value across the State could lead to minor discrepancies between direct and indirect count methods. The report also noted that conducting the survey in late April, ahead of the early monsoon onset in the Western Ghats, could produce better results than holding it at the end of May.

The infinite naga in Indian art | Behind Bylgari's Serpenti Infinito exhibition in Mumbai

A 15th century Naga Sapta Naadi painting formed of seven serpentine lines represents the sevenfold divisions in the universe as a cosmic river of time and reality. Another, of a Nag-Pash Yantra, is a geometric schema of two copulating serpents from Hindu spiritual practice. The Serpenti Infinito exhibition by Bylgari in Mumbai, curated by art gallery Nature Morte, offers a fascinating insight into these and other symbols of the naga or serpent through the historic associations and artistic traditions of India. The naga, a timeless motif embodying protection and renewal, has resonated across faiths and cultural expressions in India. But what does this symbolism have to do with the Italian luxury fashion house? Well, in 1948, Bylgari brought the mysticism of the 'serpenti' to the world, via its iconic jewellery and watches - a story it has continued to tell through cross-cultural exhibitions, events and heritage dialogues across countries. This show marks Bylgari's India launch and presents over 75 works and 23 acclaimed artists in an exhibition celebrating the 'Serpenti' icon. Like its Shanghai and Seoul editions celebrating the Chinese Year of the Snake, the India exhibition, drawn from institutional and private collections, also examines the symbiotic relationship between the serpent and history, art and meaning. The tableau of artworks is diverse — from artist Radha Sollur and her impressive sculptural forms in paper to Turkish-American media artist Refik Anadol's futuristic work, a fascinating 360-degree mirrored environment shaped by machine learning algorithms trained on natural snake forms. Critically acclaimed Madhubani artist Baua Devi, one of the few Indian women who has shown at the Centre Pompidou, presents her serpent forms along with other notable artists such as Subodh Gupta, Reena Saini Kallat, Olivia Fraser and Rithika Merchant. Serpenti Infinito has been put together by Nature Morte and Artistic Director Sean Anderson, who was formerly Associate Curator at New York's MoMA and co-curator of the first-ever Qatar pavilion at Venice Biennale's Exhibition of Architecture this year. Edited excerpts from a conversation:

Sean Anderson, curator of Serpenti Infinito in Mumbai, is Associate Professor in Architecture at Cornell University. How did the idea for a show about nagas and art come about? My ambition was to not isolate the image of

the naga or the serpent but think about it holistically - think

across time and across various contexts of India, in particular. Knowing that the naga has had a transcendental aspect to it throughout time, a spiritual significance, and a locality attached to it, I wanted to create an image of the naga that embraces its multiplicity. And, of course, think about it with resonance within artistic practices. What did it mean to conceptualise a themed exhibition

on Indian art for an international iewellery brand? Bylgari had a specific trajectory of how this exhibition could be made based on their earlier show in Shanghai but I felt it was extremely important that we not think of the naga as one singular concept and questioned whether we could make an exhibition where the jewellery is not separate from the art. In India, the naga could be representated with many meanings, either as an individual or collective memory or as an artistic expression. The exhibition looks at the history of the naga in India through stories, narrative, spatially and through textures. I wanted an international jewellery brand to be refracted through Indian art.It is interesting that the show juxtaposes international jewellery with Indian art. felt it was important to nuance what the serpent in Indian art might be, and also that the art not be a backdrop for the jewellery. The exhibition aims at amplifying the jewellery and vice versa and is an opportunity for reciprocity, to tell us something about ourselves. Representing India was no easy task and there was so much to show. I wanted it to appeal and speak to as many different voices and constituencies as possible.

BJP's Gaurav Bhatia moves Delhi HC for removal of 'defamatory' posts on viral video



BJP national spokesperson and senior advocate Gaurav Bhatia, in a defamation suit on Tuesday before the Delhi High Court, argued for the take down of alleged defamatory content across social media over a video of his that went viral recently. Taking objection to posts on social media where "defamatory statements" are being made against him, Bhatia, arguing before Justice Amit Bansal, also claimed an "invasion of privacy". He said he was sitting at his home on September 12, from when the purported objectionable video, where he is improperly dressed, is being circulated "without my consent".

While Justice Bansal remarked orally, "When you're in politics you've to be thick skinned", Bhatia responded that while he appreciates political leaders being thick-skinned and also appreciates a sense of humour, what he is objecting to is use of offensive and abusive language. He added that some of the said defamatory posts also refer to male private parts. Bhatia, while seeking the court's intervention, also emphasised that the alleged defamatory content "has to be removed because there is Al-generated content, pictures are being morphed". Among those he is accusing of defamatory content include the Samajwadi Party's IT Cell.The court, however, orally opined that it will have to distinguish satirical comments from defamatory comments, referring to the Supreme Court's ruling where courts have been cautioned against ex-parte takedown orders. Bhatia, however, impressed that "wherever references to male private parts are made, wherever abusive language has been used, those need to be taken down".

Centre announces Ferozepur-Delhi Vande Bharat train service, to revive Rajpura-Mohali rail project

The Centre Tuesday announced a new Vande Bharat train service between Ferozepur and Delhi, and also sanctioned 202.99 crore for the Mohali-Rajpura rail link, a project originally approved in 2017 but stalled for years due to administrative delays. The announcements were made by Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw and Minister of State for Railways Ravneet Singh Bittu in Delhi

The new Vande Bharat train will depart from Ferozepur at 7.55 am, halting at Faridkot, Bathinda, Dhuri, Patiala, Ambala, Kurukshetra, and Panipat before arriving at Old Delhi at 2.35 pm. The return journey will begin from Old Delhi at 4 pm, returning to Ferozepur at 10.35 pm. The train will cover the 486-km distance in 6 hours 40 minutes on the onward journey and 6 hours 35 minutes on the return. The service will operate six days a week, except Wednesdays. However, the exact date of commencement of this train is

Hailing the announcements, Punjab BJP president Sunil Jakhar said, "Indian Railways has given two big gifts to Punjab today. The new rail line from Rajpura to Mohali, which was a decades-old demand, has been approved by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. With this, rail connectivity from the entire Malwa region to Chandigarh will become even better. Secondly, a new Vande Bharat train from Ferozepur to Delhi has been announced. I especially thank Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw and Minister of State for Railways Ravneet Singh Bittu for this". The revival of the 18-km Mohali-Rajpura rail link project was first announced on May 20, 2025, and has now been formally approved, Minister of State Ravneet Singh Bittu confirmed on Tuesday. Railway authorities revealed that the Punjab Government will acquire the 54 acres of land required for the project and hand it over to them. According to officials, the 24-km



railway line via Banur will directly connect Mohali with Rajpura, easing travel towards Delhi and beyond. In addition, a 5-km stretch from Rajpura has been cleared to remove the need for engine reversal on the Chandigarh route, reducing travel time and operational hurdles. The project has been included in Northern Railway's 2025-26 Pink Book under the 'New Lines' category (Item No. 458). With funds in place, land acquisition and construction work are expected to begin soon. The Railways has also been directed to invite expressions of interest for allied works, sources said.

The Rajpura-Mohali rail link, a long-pending demand by commuters for over five decades, is considered vital as Mohali already has a strong industrial hub, while Rajpura is emerging as another industrial centre. Officials said the link will benefit not only the public but also employees and freight transport.Rana Gurmeet Singh Sodhi, BJP national executive committee member and a Ferozepur-based former Punjab minister, added, "The train service will provide a new boost to trade, industry, education, and tourism. This longpending demand for a new train from Ferozepur to the New Delhi region has finally been fulfilled."

Why is Delhi's sex ratio dipping? Experts explain

In an alarming trend, Delhi continues to see a drop in the sex ratio at birth for the fourth consecutive year — a trend that has persisted ever since the pandemic hit the Capital. From 933 females per 1,000 males in 2020 to 920 in 2024, the latest data was revealed last week in the Annual Report on Registration of Births and Deaths in Delhi, released by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics and the Office of Chief Registrar (Births & Deaths) of the Delhi government. According to experts, some of the factors behind the trend are violation of sex abortion laws and low fertility rate. Data also reveals the trend has been witnessed in other parts of the country too and not just in Delhi.

Sex ratio serves as a social indicator of gender equality within a society with a ratio of 1,000 denoting an equal number of male and female births. Ratios above 1,000 indicate more females than males, while ratios below 1,000 signify a deficit. Various studies have shown that the "natural" or expected sex ratio at birth is around 952 females per 1,000 males. In the Capital, sex ratio at birth rose continuously for eight years from 2012 to 2020 — from 886 to 933. However, after Covid hit in 2020, the city has been seeing a persistent decline. This has come across as an unexpected phenomenon in the densely urban and prosperous national capital.Indicating prevalence of sex-selective abortions, experts say the data points to deeper faultlines in our soci-

Why the decline?

According to Srinivas Goli, Associate Professor, Demography at the International Institute for Population Sciences, Mumbai, the sudden drop in fertility rate in Delhi can be linked to the skewed sex ratio. A Total Fertility Rate (TFR) — the average number of children a woman is expected to have over her lifetime — of 2.1 children per woman, which ensures a broadly stable population, is called a replace-

A TFR below 2.1 means a population cohort is not producing enough children to replace itself, suggesting future population decline. India's TFR fell below the replacement rate to 2.0 by 2021, government data showed. Delhi's TFR fell to 1.2 by 2023, the lowest in the country, according to the Sample Registration System (SRS) report.

"A lower fertility rate, combined with a persistent preference for a son, has led to a skewed sex ratio. If a family is choosing to have fewer children, they still prefer sons over daughters," Goli said, adding that while surveys show a massive decline in such preferences, these numbers tell a different story. "Relatively higher wealth and education, along with an urban location, can result in a greater ability to use technology that allows prenatal sex determination," says Poonam Muttreja, Executive Director, Population Founda-

At such low levels of fertility, there are two reasons for a further decline — a delay in the age of marriage and postponement of fertility, according to Goli. Couples may be delaying fertility due to increased costs of childcare, school-

ing and housing.

Isn't sex selective abortion banned?

Delhi also lies in a region notorious for skewed sex ratios, surrounded by states such as Punjab and Haryana (said to be among the worst offenders in the country), as well as Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan. Sex detection and sexselective abortion has been banned in the country for more than three decades. The Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) (PC&PNDT) Act, 1994, prohibits sex selection, before and after conception and regulates prenatal diagnostic techniques. Muttreja points to a "misuse of prenatal diagnostic technology despite the PC&PNDT law".

Having worked in this field for more than a decade, Goli believes that without sex-selective abortions, the sex ratio at birth cannot be altered. While there is a sense that the law is strictly implemented in formal settings, he says we need to examine whether it is being flouted in informal contexts. "Technological advancements have created new challenges. Based on further studies, there is also a need to confirm anecdotal evidence from the field regarding the use of small, mobile-connected devices for sex determination. Furthermore, affluent individuals travel to other countries, such as Thailand and the UAE, to have the procedure done," Goli said.

What are the implications?

"Even a fall of a few points, sustained over several vears, adds up to thousands of 'missing' girls and will echo through education, labour markets and marriage patterns a generation from now," Muttreja says.

Delhi is not the only one seeing this phenomenon. A 2021 research paper from Goli and Aradhana Kumari notes that sex ratio at birth has worsened across the country and more significantly, across all social groups. "Masculinisation continues across the population in all religious, educational, and wealth groups," they note.

How a community radio run by a Mumbai college offers hands-on learning opportunities

For those looking to build a career in radio broadcasting, enrolling at NG Acharya and GK Marathe College in Chembur could be a good choice. The reason: its very own 24-hour community radio, Acharya 90 FM. Equipped with a professional-grade studio and trained staff on campus, the radio station offers students hands-on experience that mirrors the workings of a real-world radio channel. Launched in 2022, Acharya 90 FM is one of the rare college-run community radios in Mumbai. Initially broadcasting for just eight hours a day, the station has since expanded to a full 24hour schedule. Apart from dedicated segments by two inhouse RJs, the community radio features academic and career-related content recorded by faculty members, along with the traditional entertainment content of mainstream radio channels, such as music.

One of the two RJs, Tejaswini Mundaye, who also serves as the overall coordinator of the Acharya 90 FM, said the radio station broadcasts in Marathi, Hindi, and English, or a mix of these languages, tailored to suit the specific audiences. Besides music, the radio's content includes interviews with celebrities or people who are in the news locally, interactions with inspiring personalities, and academic or career-oriented sessions for the local youth. "The idea is to provide a dedicated platform for the local community," she said. Responsibility towards the local community was the idea behind the launch of this community radio by the Chembur Trombay Education Society, the parent body of the college. The society's general secretary, Subodh Acharya, said, "It all started with an application to the Central Government in 2016 after reading about the impact of a community radio station. After years of follow-up to obtain permission, we launched in 2022. And our college was selected as the base, so students could benefit directly." Acharya said the management had arranged for consultations with radio experts. The studio and the logo were designed by students of the trust's architecture college, while students of mass media and other courses have become a critical part of the station's day-to-day operations.

Elaborating further, Mundaye said, "Our radio station mirrors the setup of any professional radio channel with dedicated teams handling marketing, advertising, content creation, etc. This allows students the opportunity to gain experience in an area of their choice. Apart from students from mass media courses, students from other disciplines also intern with us to gain hands-on experience." Acharya 90 FM also features recorded academic and career guidance programmes by faculty, available as podcasts via the station's mobile app. "These podcasts are especially popular during exam and admission seasons—not just among our students, but also across the wider community," said Mundaye.Dr Sunil Kadam, the principal in-charge of the college, said, "Acharya 90 FM extends classroom learning into real-world application. Our teachers also record remedial lectures for past learners to clear pending papers, which invariably help a larger student community from the local-

They dragged him to the ground and bit him on different parts of his body. Passersby rescued the boy and took him home before he was rushed to the Community Health Care Centre and later shifted to a private hospital in Bharuch for further treatment.

'Must be a protector of law, not a predator': Delhi HC raps sub-inspector for misbehaving with woman advocate

Pulling up a Delhi Police Sub-Inspector (SI) for misbehaving with a woman advocate, her client and another lawyer, the Delhi High Court said "he is supposed to be a protector of law and not a predator". The incident took place on Monday before proceedings were supposed to begin. The woman advocate informed the judge about the matter, following which an order was passed. The order stated that cognizance is being taken of a complaint in relation to an "unsavoury incident which took place in the precinct of this Courtroom (just outside the entrance)".

"The Investigating Officer (IO) of the case was not only verbally abusive with the learned counsel for the applicant as well as the complainant, but also intimidated and threatened them with dire consequences, just short of physically assaulting them," the order passed by Justice Arun Monga read. "When a learned senior counsel, who is leading the matter to assist this court, tried to intervene, he was meted out similar treatment," it added. "In the premise, I am of the view that such misconduct on the part of SI Narinder cannot be countenanced under any circumstances." "He is supposed to be a protector of law and not a predator. He cannot turn his khaki to the level of such arrogance that not only did he misbehave with officers of this Court who are doing the honourable duty of assisting the Court in discharge of justice, but also threatened them with dire consequences merely because he thinks he is above law. Be that as it may, the entire matter needs to be investigated by an officer not below the rank of the Assistant Commissioner of



Police," it said in the order.

It directed Inspector Kishore Kumar, from the South Rohini Police Station who was present in court, to register a zero FIR under relevant penal sections. The FIR was lodged and marked to Tilak Marg police station.Later, the counsel for the state appeared and stated that SI Narinder has tendered his unconditional apology to the counsel concerned and he be let off. The judge, however, said in the order, "I am of the view that looking at the conduct of SI Narinder, the apology be submitted in writing by way of an affidavit. 
\$2 trillion in new revenue needed to meet AI demand globally by 2030: Report

New Delhi: At least \$2 trillion in annual revenue will be required to fund the computing power needed to meet anticipated global AI demand by 2030, a new report revealed on Tuesday. According to research by Bain & Company, even with Al-related savings, the world will still be short by \$800 billion to keep pace with demand.

The report estimated that by 2030, global incremental Al compute requirements could reach 200 gigawatts, with the US accounting for half of the total power. Even if US companies shifted all on-premise IT budgets to cloud and reinvested savings from applying AI in sales, marketing, customer support, and R&D into capital spending on new data centres, the funding would still fall short. This is because Al's compute demand is growing at more than twice the rate of Moore's Law, Bain noted. "By 2030, technology executives will be faced with the challenge of deploying about \$500 billion in capital expenditures and finding about \$2 trillion in new revenue to profitably meet demand. Meanwhile, because AI compute demand is outpacing semiconductor efficiency, the trends call for dramatic increases in power supply on grids that have not added capacity for decades,' said David Crawford, chairman of Bain's Global Technology Practice. He added that the arms race dynamic between nations and leading providers makes the potential for overbuild and under-build harder to manage,

'Geopolitical balancing shouldn't take India too far away from West'

The former IMF and World Bank executive director in an interview with The Indian Express said while the impact of tariffs may seem limited, it could pose a lasting challenge and would be harder to reverse. In context of the Russian oil import-related US tariffs on India, Landau said New Delhi's evolving role as a stabilising force may bring it to act at cross purposes with the West. However, there's a concern that in the current geopolitical scenario, India's necessary balancing act should not take it too far away from the West. Edited excerpts:

The US is radically changing its trade policy. While there are disruptions, Washington has also signed several trade deals. How do you perceive the effectiveness of these

To the extent that those measures are aimed at reestablishing or protecting the competitiveness of what I would call old-style industries, it is very hard to see how that could be positive for the US economy, which has a huge comparative advantage in high-tech sectors. From that perspective, I think additional analysis is needed.

Then you notice that, till now, no negative effects have materialised. That can be attributed either to an exaggeration of the problems by observers or to a delayed reaction

The big issue now is uncertainty. Uncertainty is very toxic because it does not show its effects immediately, but once the effects arise, it is very hard to reverse. From anecdotal evidence, I understand that a lot of big corporations have reduced or suspended their investment plans. So it may be too soon to tell.

The EU's trade deal with the US seemed more of a security deal than an economic one. Do you see India having similar compulsions to sign a deal with the US?

As you are aware, even in Europe, this (US-EU trade) deal is very controversial. A lot of people see it as an undue abdication into an asymmetric situation for, as you said, strategic reasons; others see it as the lesser of two evils One is justified in holding either opinion.

The real question is how do we come out of this suc-

cession of ad hoc deals made with different countries, each subject to different constraints and different political visions about the future. And again, it comes back to uncertainty. In my personal view, more than tariffs themselves, more than the measures, the lack of trust in each other's behaviour is what will ultimately have the most negative

India's Russian oil imports have become a tense issue in its relationship with the US. Many view it as bullying. Do you think it's the right approach to end the Ukraine war?

I'm not an expert on Ukraine, but I think I can make two very important remarks on your question. The first is that using tariffs as instruments of geopolitical coercion does not seem to me to be a good idea. Sometimes financial sanctions can be seen as an alternative to military conflict, but introducing tariffs, volatility and uncertainty as geopolitical tools — and as you know, India has not been the only target; another big emerging economy has also faced this is not a good idea for anyone, including the United States.

The second point is that I am very much worried, and I think all of us in Europe are aware, that India is now a key geostrategic player. It is a force for equilibrium, stabilisation and balance. It is very important that India can play that role; we all stand to benefit from it. It may at times mean that India will take positions or measures that we do not like, but that is the nature of a balancing act. And again, I am not a diplomat, nor am I expressing any official position, but I do not think we should do anything that would be seen as conflicting with what India is trying to achieve now.

China has increasingly signalled its ambition to lead the world trade order. Do you think Beijing is close to achieving that even as it grapples with problems of consumption

I think it has been clear for a decade now that China's ambition is to be an alternative leader for globalisation — an alternative to the US, perhaps with a different vision. The kind of order China would like to promote so far has materialised through the Belt and Road Initiative. It is not clear how it can expand and develop into a more complete

China's integration with the world over the last 20 years has been much more disruptive than everyone expected. It has been a huge success from a Chinese perspective, but much more disruptive for the rest of us - in terms of trade flows, industrial adjustment, and our dashed hopes that China would co-manage the system with the rest of us. That has not happened.

The idea, I think, would be for the community of nations to collectively confront the problem and find a way to integrate China, its success, ambitions, and imbalances, within a consistent framework.

Globalisation had its winners and losers. Which countries or sectors would be the winners and losers of this trade

Let us not throw the baby out with the bathwater. Whatever the problems of globalisation, and there are many, it has been extraordinarily successful. It has lifted billions of people out of poverty and can continue to do so. It is, therefore, very important that we do not give up on its benefits. Africa — the continent that I think India is increasingly interested in — poses the main challenge. Its population will double in the next 30 years. It is crucial that the prospect for growth, which in Africa's case can only come from globalisation, materialises; otherwise, we will all face enor-

What is the one thing that worries you about India in the global context, and the one thing that makes you most

I am very optimistic about the technology, wisdom and industriousness of the Indian people. I am extremely impressed by their ability to work and to learn. I would be worried, though I don't think it will happen, if India's necessary geopolitical balancing act were to take it too far away from the Western world. That would be my concern.

Why doctors want you to 'throw out' scented candles from your home

This can lead to serious health issues, particularly for pregnant women, children, and individuals with hormonal imbalances.

According to Dr Agrawal, here are some health risks linked to scented candles

1. Pregnancy Complications

Exposure to phthalates during pregnancy has been linked to preterm labor, preeclampsia, and even stillbirth. This makes it crucial for expecting mothers to minimize contact with scented candles and other synthetic fra-

2. Premature Puberty in Children

rupting chemicals can trigger early puberty in children. This condition, known as precocious puberty, occurs when puberty begins much earlier than normal, potentially leading to long-term hormonal imbalances.

According to Dr Agrawal, exposure to endocrine-dis-


3. Increased Risk of Obesity and Diabetes

Studies have shown that phthalates can interfere with insulin regulation, increasing the risk of insulin resistance, diabetes, and metabolic syndrome. Prolonged exposure may also contribute to weight gain and obesity.

For those planning a family, it's worth noting that phthalates can significantly affect fertility. In men, they are linked to low sperm count and reduced sperm quality, while in women, they can damage oocytes (egg cells) and lower their numbers, making conception more difficult. If you love a fragrant home but want to avoid harmful chemicals, switch to naturally derived alternatives, Dr Agrawal said:Beeswax or soy wax candles (free from toxic additives)Essential oil diffusers (using pure plant-based oils) Homemade potpourri or simmer pots (using citrus, herbs, and spices)

'I spend 2 million a year to live longer; do not do this': Bryan Johnson lists 3 habits he avoids at all costs



From plasma infusions to quitting sugar, biohacker and American entrepreneur Bryan Johnson has tried numerous ways to extend his lifespan. During a recent conversation with William Rossy on his podcast Sprouht, Johnson shared that he spends about "2 million a year to live longer", strictly avoiding certain habits that come in the way of his quest for longevity. "We have been trained poorly with habits, and society has trained us with false narratives. So you have to fight against the culture that asks you to stay up late. That tells you, 'It's okay to be on your screen, it's okay to sleep late.' Stress is non-stop. You are constantly doomscrolling," Johnson told Rossy, adding: "Basically, I have created rules for myself because I know I will make the wrong choice if I am given the opportunity.'

Johnson reiterated the fact that smoking is known to have permanently damaging effects on the lungs and respiratory function, and Dr Shivakumar K, MD, a respiratory medicine specialist and senior consultant at Birds Clinic, Bengaluru, shared some of its prominent effects. "Smoking can irritate the respiratory tract, leading to increased mucoughing is common as the body tries to clear the irritants from the lungs," he explained, adding that in the long term. smoking can cause Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), along with becoming a primary risk factor for lung cancer. Long-term inflammation of the bronchial tubes can lead to persistent coughing and increased mucus production, ultimately resulting in chronic bronchitis.

"Not exercising is the second worst thing you can do"Agreeing with Johnson, Dr Dhinesh David, Consultant Department of Cardiology, KIMSHEALTH Trivandrum, shared that skipping exercise and sitting for more than 8 hours a day with no physical activity comes with a risk of cardiovascular events almost similar to smoking.smoking Smoking can irritate the respiratory tract, leading to increased mucus production


"Metabolism slows by nearly 30% when sitting compared to standing or walking. This can lead to weight gain and fat deposits in the arteries, causing atherosclerosis,' he told indianexpress.com, further stating that work-fromhome professionals often engage in long hours of uninterrupted sitting, which limits their physical activity and contributes to metabolic dysfunction, obesity, impaired glucose tolerance, and systemic inflammation: all of which are precursors for cardiovascular disease. Collusion, gatekeeping in AI: CCI calls for industry self-regulation, self-audits

The potential for big enterprises to have an unfair market advantage in artificial intelligence (AI) due to their control over data sets and other computational resources, among other factors was flagged as a key "structural challenge" faced by India's burgeoning AI market, according to a study report released by the Competition Commission of India (CCI). The anti-competition watchdog also flagged the risk of algorithm-level collusion for manipulated price-fixing, and entry barriers for smaller Al companies in securing financing, and skilled workforce as a key challenge.

According to the study, India has a number of regulatory remedies to deal with the rise in use of Al. However, the report emphasised a clear need for proportionate safeguards, transparency standards, and industry-led self-regulation to ensure the safe, ethical, and inclusive use of Al technologies. To encourage fair competition, the CCI has also recommended that enterprises should carry out selfaudits by documenting their governance processes. One of the foremost issues in application of AI is the risk of algorithmic collusion, where enterprises use Al-driven pricing algorithms that may learn to align prices over time. This can lead to outcomes similar to price-fixing, even in the absence of direct human coordination, making detection and enforcement by regulators far more complex, the study said.

In a survey conducted while framing the study, Al-facilitated collusion was the biggest concern across stakeholders, followed by price discrimination and increased entry barriers. The concerns are compounded as over onethird (67 per cent) AI start-ups in India are focused on the application layer, rather than the core foundational layer that powers them. "In the AI industry, major firms may leverage their control over data, infrastructure, and proprietary models to entrench their market position which may end up raising barriers to entry," the study said. And the structure has so far evolved in a way that "positions big technology firms with a significant advantage in data access". It said that over years of operating large-scale platforms and services, big companies have accumulated vast datasets. Since new AI firms and start-ups increasingly rely on the infrastructure and cloud offerings of these hyperscalers, data often flows back to the incumbents (depending on the nature of the agreements). This reinforces their data advantage and skews data access in favour of big technology firms. Enterprises that control vast datasets may be able to train more effective AI models, giving them a substantial competitive edge. This may entrench market power and create high barriers to entry for smaller or newer players, stifling innovation and reducing consumer choice, it added.

The study — prepared by the Gurugram-based Management Development Institute (MDI) on CCI's behalf has proposed the introduction of enterprise self-audits to ensure fair competition across the AI development value chain and applications. The audits would include documentation of AI-based decision-making process including algorithmic objectives, data sources, and access protocols. They would also include design and testing of algorithms with built-in safeguards to prevent/detect unintended anticompetitive outcomes/practices and reduce unfair competition risk. Regular internal algorithmic audits/periodic review of algorithmic outputs/market outcomes to proactively identify and eliminate inadvertent algorithm-driven collusion will also be included. Noting that bigger enterprises gatekeeping how their algorithms work could cause market distortion in their favour, the study urged companies to adopt transparency measures to reduce information asymmetry. This includes documenting the usage and purpose of deployment of AI in decision-making, and a general description of the main parameters for Al-based decisions, among other

'I would react too quickly to situations': Anushka Sharma on learning to respond, and how it changed her and Virat Kohli's life

"A few years ago, I would react too quickly to situations. I think I am learning to respond rather than react now. So that has changed the quality of my life...," said Anushka Sharma during a promotional interaction for a sports brand. Highlighting that her considerate approach to situations and people has also improved her husband Virat Kohli's life, the actor added: "It has changed my life and yours?..." while looking at the cricketer with a broad smile, pointing out his impulsive reactions on the field. She continued, "Sometimes the bowlers are not celebrating as much as Virat is..."

Her words reflect a universal struggle: the human tendency to react impulsively when life gives them lemons. In those intense moments, we don't realise the irrationality of our actions. Eventually, all we are left with is a deep sense of remorse, said Dr Adamina Gupta, a psychologist at Delhi's LimbiQ Centre for Psychiatry. "What should matter is how to get out of that state, train our minds to act better, and choose to respond with calmness instead. Our tendency to behave a certain way stems from both biology and practice," she told indian express.com.

Why do we react on impulse?

Dr Gupta explained, "Not everyone is wired to react on impulse, but certain life stressors can trigger a 'kneejerk' reaction to situations. In such moments, people act before thinking things through."It's like snapping back at a friend during an argument before really listening. Only later do we think, "I shouldn't have said that."

Fight or flight modeOur brain is constantly operating in fight-or-flight mode, also known as the stress response, which is generally triggered by the release of hormones that either prompt us to stay and fight back or to run to safety or become defensive.

"The fight-or-flight response, also known as an adrenaline rush, was meant to save us from danger, like running from a wild animal. Today, though, it can get triggered by things like a harsh email from your boss, making you panic or lash out even though it's not life-threatening. Socio-economic stressors, genetics, or mental conditions can activate it even in non-lethal contexts. This makes some people seem 'irrational,' as they react impulsively without time for reflection," explained Dr Gupta. This clearly suggests that socio-economic dynamics, genetics, and mental health conditions can amplify this tendency even further.

Can we rewire the brain?

Indeed, stressed Dr Gupta. "Learning emotional regulation helps shift from reacting to responding. For example,

pausing to take a deep breath before replying gives the brain space to settle. Instead of lashing out in anger, you might choose to say, "Let's talk about this later." Becoming mindful and aware of impulsive patterns allows you to pause before reacting. With practice, the brain gradually strengthens its capacity to respond thoughtfully, rather than falling back on automatic reactions.

The psychologist recommends several ways to switch from impulsive reactions to mindful responses:Practice mindfulness: Integrate breathing exercises and meditation in your daily routine to become more aware of your emotions before they escalate. Journalling: Start writing things down, from triggers to reactions. This will help you analyse and identify patterns, as well as cultivate selfawareness. Reorganise your thoughts: Take criticism constructively, rather than considering it as a personal attack. Ask yourself: Is this really meant to harm me, or is the other person simply expressing their perspective? Take a pause: Breathe, let the thoughts sink in, process, and then respond. A couple of months back, Virat Kohli gave one tiny glimpse of his rather secretive life in London, where he has moved in search of privacy and space. It was an Insta post of him with a reputed local coach with a strong Indian connection Naeem Amin. The frame, probably captured after an intense session at an indoor facility, had Virat resting his arm around the IPL franchise Gujarat Titans' assistant coach Amin's shoulder. There was a note of gratitude too: "Thanks for helping out with the hit brother ... ". This was around mid-August, the time when there brewed a storm of speculations in India about the international future of Virat and Rohit Sharma — the two semi-retired players, approaching 40, who just play ODIs these days. The question queue was

Shouldn't the two be included in the India A team that was to play Australia A at home in a 50-overs series or play domestic one-dayers? The biggest worry expressed by those who doubted their participation in the 2027 World Cup was their lack of match-day outings. Even the chairman of the selection committee Ajit Agarkar had raised this issue.

But do seasoned batsmen like Kohli and Rohit, legends of the game who have spent more than half their lives smashing the white-ball into stands around the world, need time in the middle to retain their sharpness and regain their erstwhile aura? Is the importance of match practice overstated? There was also the flip side. Can a 'hit' at the indoor facility be enough for a batting great to keep the competitive and batting edge razor sharp? Will the glare of the spotlight, the switching on of the floodlights in a stadium chanting his name, be enough to reignite the muscle memory?There's also the pressure — the crippling disruptor that can mess up that best of preparation. Rohit Sharma being replaced by the 26-year-old Shubman Gill as the ODI captain within months of his ICC tournament glory, is a loud enough hint for the seniors — they are now just one series failure away from being irrelevant to Indian cricket. This is a brutal world out there, the only long rope for those in their late 30s is the one circling the boundary line. This is a unique situation, an uncharted territory even for a consummate cricket traveler like Virat. It has never been done before but then Virat has several firsts to his credit. The resolve was still there. Within days of landing in Australia, there would be another social media statement: "The only time you truly fail, is when you decide to give up." This was getting interesting but it wasn't going to be easy. It has never been. Like was the case last time he visited Australia for the Border-Gavaskar Trophy earlier this year. It would prove to be his last in India whites. Virat started the tour with a hundred at Perth but by the end of the 5th Test at Sydney, questions were being asked about his temperament, skills, drive and ability to learn from his mistakes. His last dismissal in Australia had summed up his series, it was a reoccurrence of an old symptom of a chronic batting problem that he had battled all through his long career. In the past, a younger Virat had time to reflect and rediscover his lost touch but now he doesn't have that luxury. He couldn't hide his frustration.

In the second innings of the final Test, the crafty old Scott Boland, the expert exploiter of old weaknesses, would stick to the line outside off-stump and work on the ball to

get a sharp lift and move it away from the batsman. An uncertain Virat would stay in the crease and try to reach for the ball. As expected he would edge the ball into the hands of second slip. Virat would let out a cry — the echoes might be heard at those glorious Australian stadiums this time too. This time he is in Australia to play white-ball cricket but Virat has struggled to figure out where his off-stump is in this format too. Even in IPL, he gets bowled to the Testmatch line. It could be the same in the three ODIs again. Bowlers don't forget.It's not that Virat had adopted an ostrich approach to the problem, he hasn't buried his head in the stand and wished the problem away. At the start of the forgettable BGT series, he was stationed outside the crease. It's a tactic that batsmen use in England to counter the swing but Virat was doing so to negotiate the bounce that bowlers got on the hard Aussie pitches. He was trying to ride the bounce but would fail. Not known to play with soft hands, the edges from the bat would carry to the catchers behind the stumps. He would backtrack to the crease after a few failures but lack of a strong back-foot game would hamper his play. Now, he wasn't suitably front or back, Virat was caught in two minds and the nightmare would continue.

Back in the day, even the great Sachin Tendulkar, has worked with Virat to iron out his foot-work flaw. After one disastrous tour to England, India's two great batsmen had collaborated and the results were pleasing. Tendulkar suggested changes in the hip alignment and back-leg movement and runs would flow again. But with time, old habits surfaced again. In 2021, he tampered his stance, took a virtual off-middle guard. He now had his head in the line of offstump, this too seemed like a workable plan. Anything outside the eye-line, he would leave alone thus negating the away going balls. However, since he was covering all the three stumps, Virat was a likely candidate to be out lbw. In case he missed a ball coming in sharply or kept in line or if he failed to connect an on-drive to a ball on his pads, Virat

Batsmanship is a delicate art, it needs incredible anticipation, immaculate judgement of where the ball would pitch, subtle feet movement to reach it and fine transfer of weight. Virat has been around long enough, scored a mountain of runs to know this. Long back, when Virat was younger, run-making was second nature, the batting genius had given a peep into the mind in a podcast with Graham Bensinger. "Batting is about a split second of decision. The precision of that split-second has to be so good for every ball during the game. With visualisation you have to have worked on both the mental and technical side of his game," he would say. An indoor session in the company of friendly coaches is very different from facing hostile pacers bowling on the 4th-5th stump line. It's never easy to be on the stage when the curtains are about to fall and the final bow may be just a dismissal away.

Virat is under no illusion, he knows that age is catching up and the end could be near and not far. During the June-July-August England tour, Virat had turned for his old friend Yuvraj Singh's charity event. He was called on stage. The MC's ice-breaker was him informing the superstar that India misses him. Will they be stitching partnerships and saving India?

They have been playing for India for the past 10-15 years; the experience they bring to the table is something every captain and every team wants. That's what we are looking forward to. We want them to go out there and do their magic," Gill told broadcasters Star Sports after 2-0 win against West Indies in New Delhi.

"The experience the two of them have (is immense), and there are very few players who can match the number of matches they have won for India. There are very few players in the world with such skill and quality along with that experience, and we look at it from that perspective," Gill said at the start of the same Test match. "So many qualities that I have inherited from Rohit bhai - the calmness that he possesses, and the kind of friendship that he has among the group is something that I aspire to; these are the qualities that I want to take from him," he added.

Following a 3-1 loss in the Border-Gavaskar Trophy, the Board of Control for Cricket in India has issued strict guidelines to players. Among these, the one that caught the most attention and provoked discussions was regarding the duration of stay for family members and the number of personal staff allowed. Former Indian Head Coach Ravi Shastri, when asked about the guidelines, said he did not have anyone coming with a chef, and also added that he would not have minded it either.

"I don't remember anyone coming in with a chef in my time because that chef would have been very busy with me. I wouldn't have minded one or two, because then at least the cuisine could have been different with a glass of

red. You don't have to go to room service all the time. After a while, on tours, you want to minimize things. When there are too many people around, you tend to get distracted," Shastri said on The Grade Cricketer ahead of the first ODI between India and Australia. "He (Gambhir) must have seen it's getting out of hand. So he just put a limit on what can be done and what cannot be done. The good thing for him is that he has got a captain now who is stable, composed, and calm. Gill is the man for the next decade for India. What Gambhir will be looking out for is a nice bench of fast bowlers. With Shami retiring, and Bumrah's workload management, you need another three to be groomed quickly," he added. Speaking ahead of the Lord's Test of the Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy against England in an interaction with Cheteshwar Pujara, Head Coach Gautam Gambhir backed the BCCI's decision to limit the players' families on tour. "Families are important, but you've got to understand one thing. You are here for a purpose. It's not a holiday. You're here for a huge purpose. You've got very few people in that dressing room or in this tour that gets this opportunity to make the country proud. So yes, I'm not against not having families with us." "It is important to have families, but if your focus is towards making our country proud and you have a much bigger role than any other thing, and you're committed to that goal, you're committed to that cause, I think everything else is fine. But for me, I think that cause and that goal is more important than any other thing," said

Rashid Khan reacts to late-night attack on civilians: 'Absolutely immoral and barbaric...must not go unnoticed'



In a tragic incident in Afghanistan on Friday, air raids from Pakistan struck the Afghan civilians directly, causing the deaths of nearly 40 people. Among the victims were also three cricketers from Urgun district in Paktika Province. T20I skipper Rashid Khan, reacting to the incident, took to social media to express his grievance." I am deeply saddened by the loss of civilian lives in the recent Pakistani aerial strikes on Afghanistan. A tragedy that claimed the lives of women, children, and aspiring young cricketers who dreamed of representing their nation on the world stage," Rashid wrote on his X account. (Formerly known as Twitter)"It is absolutely immoral and barbaric to target civilian infrastructure. These unjust and unlawful actions represent a grave violation of human rights and must not go unnoticed," Rashid further wrote. "In light of the precious innocent souls lost, I welcome the ACB's decision of withdrawing from upcoming fixtures against Pakistan. I stand with our people at this difficult time, our national dignity must come before all else." As per Tolo News, the Pakistani air raids targeted residential neighbourhoods in Kandahar's Spin Boldak district. Most of the casualties reportedly were women and children. Following the attack, the Afghanistan Cricket Board canceled a cricket tournament in which Pakistan was to participate.

The ACB said it considered this a great loss for Afghanistan's sports community, its athletes, and the cricketing family. "In response of this tragic incident and as a gesture of respect to the victims, the Afghanistan Cricket Board has decided to withdraw from participating in the upcoming Tri-Nation T20I Series involving Pakistan, scheduled to be played in late November," the board announced its decision. Karimullah Zubair Agha, Head of Public Health in Spin Boldak, was quoted as saying by Tolo news, "Civilian casualties are extremely high. Yesterday's airstrikes further increased the numbers. We now have 170 injured and 40 dead."The attacks mark a sharp escalation in tensions between Afghanistan and Pakistan, drawing widespread condemnation and concern. Witnesses and survivors alleged that Pakistan deliberately targeted civilian structures and non-combatants in violation of international humanitarian law. Haji Bahram, one of the survivors, said, "I've never witnessed such injustice. A country that calls itself Muslim bombed our women, children, and homes. Issues like this should be resolved through dialogue." Another survivor, Abdul Zahir, stated, "They bombed Muslim women and children. Pakistan carried out this act with complete

'Old dogs' Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma are in Australia but form is crucial, young guns nipping at their heels: Ravi Shastri

Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma will be back on the field after a break in which a lot has happened in the Indian men's cricket team. Among the big news points was Rohit himself, who was stripped of ODI captaincy, with the post being given to Shubman Gill ahead of the Australia tour, but still kept in thr squad. It means that Kohli and Rohit will now be playing three ODIs in Australia under Gill, whom they both had captained in his formative years in international cricket. Former India head coach Ravi Shastri feels that Kohli and Rohit will be both be quite hungry in Australia knowing that they have a number of youngsters vying for their positions in the squad. The three-match ODI series starts in Perth on Sunday. "I mean, this is a good side, a very good side. India are a far better white ball side than Test match side," Shastri said on Fox Cricket. "And especially (with) the young guns, the Australian crowds, they (will) love seeing some of the young guns. A lot of the young players who are in the side, they will entertain.

"Plus, the old dogs are here. Rohit Sharma is here.

Virat Kohli too. They know that these youngsters are pushing so you might just see the best out of them. That's why they're here. They're part of the mix but, again, form is crucial," he said. Rohit and Kohli both retired from Test cricket earlier this year in the days leading up to India's epic five-Test tour of England. They had both struggled for form in the preceding five-match Test series in Australia, with Rohit especially losing his to the extent that he dropped himself from the squad for the final Test. However, the fact remains that both Rohit and Kohli are among the all-time greats in ODI cricket and the former's last act as India captain in the format was leading them to victory in the 2025 Champions Trophy. "But there's no substitute for experience when it comes to the big games, as we saw in the Champions Trophy," said Shastri. "Come the big games, the big boys step up, so it'll be interesting (to see what happens). (They) have to prove something, because they have the young guns nipping at their heels."Rohit has played 30 ODIs in Australia and scored 1328 runs at an average of 53.12 with five centuries and four half-centuries.
