Major setback to Congress Govt as Telangana HC stays local body polls

Hyderabad: In a major setback to the Congress government, the Telangana High Court on Thursday temporarily stayed the process of local body elections across the State after taking strong note of petitions challenging the enhancement of Backward Classes (BC) reservation from 23 per cent to 42 per cent through Government Order (GO) No. 9, issued on September 26. The State government had released a notification on September 29 announcing the schedule for conducting local body elections in five phases across the State. The division bench comprising Chief Justice Aparesh Kumar Singh and Justice G M Mohiuddin directed the government to file its counter within four weeks, while the petitioners were granted two weeks thereafter to file their replies, observing that the interim stay shall oper-

The arguments, which went on for two days, concluded on Thursday evening. The petitioners' contentions were primarily based on the breach of the ceiling limit of 50 per cent on reservations, in violation of Supreme Court judgments starting from the Indra Sawhney case to the Vikas Kishanrao Gawali case. The 50 per cent cap, laid down as one of the triple tests by the apex court, cannot be breached, the petitioners argued. They also contended that GO 9 violated the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act, 2018, which capped the total reservation at 50 per cent. The State, on the other hand, relied heavily on the empirical data collected during



Caste (SEEPC) survey. It argued that the BC population, which is about 57 per cent in the State, created an extraordinary circumstance forming the basis for enhancing the reservation. The State's counsel further argued that Supreme Court judgments do not impose an absolute ceiling in such exceptional cases.

The government also contended that the ordinance amending the reservation was valid and that the pending assent from the Governor on the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act amendment bill was no impediment to implementing the enhanced BC quota in the local body elections. The court heard both sides extensively before issuing the interim order. The detailed reasoned order explaining the stay is

TSRTC towards privatisation

Hyderabad: BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Thursday alleged that the Congress government was deliberately pushing the Telangana State Road Transport Corporation (TGSRTC) towards bankruptcy to justify its eventual privatisation. He claimed that the government was attempting to sell RTC assets and hand over profitable divisions to private players under the guise of reforms. After the "Chalo Bus Bhavan" protest, a delegation of BRS leaders met RTC Managing Director N Nagireddy and submitted a memorandum demanding a rollback of the recent bus fare hike. During the discussion, the MD reportedly confirmed that Rs. 1,353 crore in remained pending from the government. The BRS leaders recalled that the previous BRS regime had released Rs. 9,246 crore in grants to strengthen the RTC and pre-

Speaking to the media after the meeting, Rama Rao termed the fare hike unjust and anti-poor, saying it imposed an unbearable burden on the middle class. "We welcome the free bus travel for women, but the government must increase the number of buses. Instead, it has doubled the fares for men and students. It is cruel to give with one hand and take away with the other," he said. The BRS working president hit out at Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, accusing him of "running a circus, not a government." He condemned the police for arresting BRS leaders who were peacefully participating in the protest and questioned why



the government feared a simple petition being submitted to the RTC MD. "The people of Telangana are facing rising prices, job losses and economic stress. Instead of providing relief, this government is adding to their suffering through arbitrary fare hikes," he said. Rama Rao argued that public transport was a government responsibility and not a profit-making enterprise. "Even when RTC was running at a loss, the previous K Chandrashekhar Rao government never passed the burden on to commuters. If RTC is now in profit, why increase fares?" he asked. He also took a jibe at the police, urging them to show the same enthusiasm in tackling the soaring crime rate in Hyderabad as they did in arresting opposition leaders. He reiterated that the BRS would continue its agitation until the fare hike was withdrawn, warning that attempts to privatise RTC would face strong public resis-

Revanth raises concerns over recent US tariff hikes, increase in H-1B visa fee

Hvderabad, Oct.9 Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy expressed concerns over the United States' recent moves to increase tariffs on Indian goods and to raise the H-1B visa fee. He made the statements during a meeting with an American delegation comprising senior U.S. business leaders, think tank representatives and philanthropic figures. The delegation, which engages in bilateral relations, investment, and policy exchange between India and the US, met the Chief Minister and IT, Industries Minister Duddilla Sridhar Babu at the Secretariat here on Thursday. The Chief Minister, emphasising the significance and contribution of Telangana diaspora in America's progress, said the recent decision to raise the H-1B visa fee could have an adverse impact on both sides of economies and lead to unrest and misunderstandings between the countries. He also shed light on the apprehensions that arise from abrupt decisions like the recent tariff hikes.

He highlighted that successive state governments followed a continuity in developmental policy initiatives, paving way for the growth of a global city that Hyderabad is today. Despite political and ideological differences, our governments adopted best practices from the past and never deviated from policies, he said. Explaining his plans for the Telangana Rising 2047 vision, the Chief Minister said the government aims to become \$1 trillion economy by 2034 and \$3 trillion by 2047. He said Hyderabad is now competing with New York, Tokyo and South Korea, challenging by global standards in improving our infrastructure and manufacturing capabilities."We are undertaking several gamechanger projects for Hyderabad and my state - Regional Ring Road, Regional Ring Rail, manufacturing zones, Bharat Future City, Dry Port, Dedicated Road and Rail connectivity with Sea Port in neighbouring Andhra Pradesh, Musi Rejuvenation and the expansion of Hyderabad Metro rail."

The Chief Minister further said that the Musi rejuvenation project will open up new avenues for advancing



Telangana's economy. With the riverfront development we want to unveil opportunities that come with night economy, he added. "Hyderabad has the heritage and culture to develop a great riverfront."Further, Revanth Reddy stressed on the government's plans to place Telangana as the standout choice for the 'China+1' strategy. "I request the support of US industry partners in development of the Bharat Future City. In the near future, I would like to invite all the Fortune 500 companies to have presence in Future City." Minister Sridhar Babu outlined the government's grand plans to establish the state as a skill capital, especially in the artificial intelligence (AI) domain by setting up an Al University in Hyderabad. Building on the city's emergence as a hub for Global Capacity Centres (GCCs), we plan to encourage the GCCs towards becoming value centres, thereby exporting services and building products. The Minister added that companies from Hyderabad supplied a major share of Covid vaccines globally, emphasising that efforts are on to further nurture indigenous companies. Prof. Walter Russell Mead, Distinguished Fellow at the Hudson Institute and Columnist, Wall Street Journal, Mark Rosenblatt, founder & CEO, Rationalwave Capital Partners, Harlan Crow, Chairman, Crow Holdings, Ravenel Curry, founder and Co-CIO, Eagle Capital Management, and Henry Billingsley, Partner, Billingsley Company were part of the delegation.

Government keen on expanding solar power usage: Bhatti Hyderabad, Oct.9: Deputy Chief Minister Bhatti

Vikramarka said the Telangana government is keenly interested in promoting solar power generation and utilisation as part of efforts to strengthen the power sector in the State. The Deputy Chief Minister met a delegation from Germany at the Secretariat hehe on Thursday. The German representatives said they had come forward with certain proposals after learning about the Telangana government's interest in the solar energy sector.

Bhatti Vikramarka explained to them that the State currently provides free power supply to 29 lakh agricultural pump sets and up to 200 units of electricity under the Gruha Jyothi scheme. He said the government is exploring ways to supply solar power to both agricultural pump sets and Gruha Jvothi beneficiaries.Bhatti Vikramarka said the government's idea is to develop a model where farmers and Gruha Jyothi consumers can earn a steady monthly income as part of this solar initiative. The Deputy Chief Minister directed Energy department principal secretary Naveen Mittal to study how the German solar technologies can be integrated into Telangana's power sector and assess how the proposals from the German team can help strengthen the sector both economically and technologically. He also instructed the principal secretary



to prepare a detailed report after studying the proposals submitted by the German representatives.

The meeting was attended by Transco CMD D. Krishna Bhaskar, SPDCL CMD Musharraf Faruqui, REDCO CMD Anila, and German delegates Dr. Sebastian and Dr. Raghu Chaliganti, among others.

BRS takes "Chalo Bus Bhavan" route to protest RTC fare hike

Hyderabad: In a dramatic escalation of political tensions, the Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) on Thursday took its protest against the Telangana Road Transport Corporation (TGSRTC) fare hike to the streets. Amid police restrictions, party leaders boarded RTC buses as part of the "Chalo Bus Bhavan" protest, demanding a rollback of the fare hike and terming it "anti-poor, unjust and part of a conspiracy to privatise the corporation.

Police forces were deployed in large numbers at the residences of BRS working president KT Rama Rao, senior leaders T Harish Rao, Talasani Srinivas Yadav, P Sabitha Indra Reddy and other elected representatives and senior leaders since early morning. They were briefly placed under house arrest before being allowed to board the buses.Later, BRS leaders boarded public buses as part of the protest. Rama Rao, Srinivas Yadav and Padma Rao took the 2J bus service from Rathifile bus stand, while Harish Rao boarded an 113 I/M service from Mehdipatnam. En route, the leaders interacted with commuters, collecting feedback on the fare hike and criticising what they termed an unnecessary financial burden on common citizens. However, police disrupted the movement of other BRS leaders midway, detaining several of them and dropping them at distant locations to delay their arrival at Bus Bhavan. Sabitha Indra Reddy and MLA D Sudheer Reddy, who were travelling from Amberpet, were taken to Lalaguda police station and released later. Several other detained BRS leaders were kept at different police stations till afternoon.

Cough syrup deaths: A systemic problem that needs a solution

The official reaction to the terrible mishap in Madhya Pradesh, resulting in the death of 19 children, is as kneeerk as it is absurd. The deaths were allegedly caused by he consumption of Coldrif, a cough syrup whose samples contained diethylene glycol (DEG), an industrial toxic chemical that severely damages the kidneys. Two drug nspectors and a deputy director of the Food & Drug Adninistration have been suspended, the state's drug conroller transferred, a Special Investigation Team (SIT) constituted, and a Chhindwara-based pediatrician Dr Praveen Soni, arrested for alleged negligence.

Meanwhile, the Tamil Nadu-based manufacturer of he syrup has been booked. Several states have banned Coldrif. Given the nature of the sordid episode, the state povernment's action against the culpable has been mired n controversy. The Indian Medical Association (IMA) has piposed the arrest of the doctor, blaming pharma company and government lapses instead for the lapses. The MA has a point: the doctor can only prescribe what is available at a government hospital; they can't ensure the quality of medicines in the pharmacies at these hospitals.

Besides, the severity of the action against the doctor also raises questions; whereas those responsible for supplying government hospitals have only been suspended, he pediatrician has been arrested. The unvarnished truth s that the official reaction is necessarily inadequate because the problem is essentially systemic, and those running the system—politicians—are little bothered about the plight of people. The recurring pattern points to the failure of the regulatory ecosystem, not isolated negligence. State drug control departments are chronically understaffed, underfunded, and riddled with political interference.



Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) General Anil Chauhan said on Wednesday that use of the Air Force would have slowed the Chinese offensive considerably in the 1962 war. The CDS delivered a video-recorded speech during the unveiling ceremony of the revised and expanded edition of From Reveille to Retreat, the autobiography of late Lieutenant General SPP Thorat, Kirti Chakra. The event was attended by Southern Army Commander Lt Gen Dhiraj Seth, Central Army Commander Lt Gen Anindya Sengupta, military historian Shiv Kunal Verma, along with numerous senior serving and retired officers from the three services.

Gen Chauhan said in his speech, "I was requested to speak about forward policy and about not using the air force during the 1962 war. To comment on the adequacy or inadequacy of a forward policy at this time is slightly difficult. Our views will be colored due to many reasons like geography has changed entirely and so has geopolitics. The security situation has changed. Force levels have changed. The type of warfare itself has changed. All I can say is that the forward policy should not have been applied uniformly to Ladakh and NEFA. The two regions had very different histories of the dispute, different security context and entirely different terrain. In Ladakh, China had already occupied much of Indian territory, whereas in NEFA the legitimacy of India's claim was stronger. To equate the two and

pursue identical policies was, in my view, a bit flawed.'

The CDS added, "I think Gen Thorat had in his mind the use of the Air Force, which the government did not permit. They would have had a significant advantage during the 1962 conflict. Shorter turnaround times, a favorable geography and the ability to bring maximum payloads to bear with maximum weight on the enemy. Use of air power would have slowed the Chinese offensive considerably, if not stymied it completely. This would have given the army much more time to prepare. In those days, I think, the use of the Air Force was considered escalatory. This is I think no longer true, and Op Sindoor is an apt example of this. To conclude, From Reveille to Retreat is not simply an autobiography. It's a reflection on leadership, strategy and service. In 1959, Gen Thorat submitted a prescient report on Chinese military intentions and their likely invasion routes, later borne out in the 1962 war. He opposed Defence Minister Krishna Menon's Forward Policy, warning it would lead to "certain defeat and death" for inadequately supplied Indian units on the frontier.

Like 1905 but different: how BJP's 'swadeshi' call has local business interests at heart, not a boycott

The BJP Thursday launched a nationwide outreach programme with homemade or 'swadeshi' products at its core to commemorate the birth anniversary of its ideologue Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay. The 'Atmanirbhar Bharat and Swadeshi Abhiyan' will continue for three months until the birth anniversary (December 25) of former prime minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, said Arun Singh, BJP national general secretary and the party's in-charge for the campaign.

Similar to the movement that was initiated in reaction to, and successfully reversed, the partition of Bengal announced by then Viceroy Lord George Curzon in 1905, this movement will also have a technical dimension that aligns with current global economic conditions. While the 1905 movement boycotted mainly cotton-based foreign goods, this one does not have the need to boycott anything in particular, as long as it is manufactured in India by its citizens. Singh said the campaign will see the next step of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's call to tread on the path of 'Atmanirbhar Bharat' (self-reliant India) for the nation to become developed by 2047, adding that the 'Swadeshi' push is at the core of the objective. "The Prime Minister has appealed to 140 crore citizens to buy products which are made in India... These are those items which are made in our country and with the sweat of our sons and daughters... BJP president JP Nadda has, following the PM's call, given us the task of making this a people's movement," Singh said, addressing a press conference over the initiative in Delhi. "You all remember that after the partition of Bengal in 1905, this call for 'swadeshi' was given in protest. After that, the British had to bow to Maharishi Dayanand Saraswati, Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore, Bankim Chandra Chatterjee ji, who had thrown their weight behind the movement for 'swadeshi'," he said. "The struggle for 'swadeshi' also became the basis for the freedom movement. This, too, will be conveyed to the people, and the significance of 'swadeshi' will be underlined. Mahatma Gandhi ji, inspired by the 'swadeshi' movement, made it a movement for each citizen," he added.



According to party sources, the programme will feature around 70 events in each district of the country, translating to an estimated 20,000 big and small events, including 1,000 'vocal for local melas' and 'swadeshi' reels by eminent personalities, among other initiatives. "Swadeshi here means accepting and utilising products which are made in India; this is not a call for boycotting anything, we are not boycotting anything. All we are saying is that Bharatiya products and those items which have been manufactured with the skill of Indians need to be prioritised," he said. "Like the prime minister has said, the aim is to enthuse citizens to accept those products that smell of the sweat and soil of India. This mindset takes us towards atma nirbharta and cultural pride, which was espoused by Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay ji," he said. The roadmap, he said, will include reaching "each doorstep" with a sticker promoting swadeshi products, and, going forward, also connect with the promotion of the 'One District One Product' programme, which aims at a push for items which are indigenous to a district, aimed at increasing the income of those engaged in their manufacture. "We will appeal to each household to ensure that items of daily use: in their kitchens, on their dining tables, to utilise 100 per cent 'swadeshi' products... Around 20,000 initiatives will be undertaken across the country...We will request shopkeepers to display local products at a 'swadeshi corner' in their shops," he said.

Just 10 days after Haryana Civil Service (HCS) officer Dr Richa was sent back by the Chandigarh administration, another HCS officer, Sumeet Sihag, was repatriated to his parent cadre on Thursday.

Sources said that Sihag had written to the Chandigarh administration requesting to send him back citing personal reasons. This was during the ongoing tussle between officers of the Haryana cadre and the Union Territory cadre. On September 15, HCS officer Dr Richa was sent back to her parent cadre of Haryana by the Chandigarh administration, almost eight months after joining the Union Territory on deputation.

On Thursday, the order for Sihag's repatriation said, "The Administrator, U.T. Chandigarh, is pleased to relieve Sumeet Sihag HCS, Joint Commissioner Municipal corporation Chandigarh, from Chandigarh Administration to enable him to join his parent State of Haryana." When asked about his repatriation, Sihag said he was going back owing to "personal reasons". A cold war is ongoing between officers of the Haryana cadre and the Union Territory cadre,

Sources said that even Richa was not allotted an office or driver for days and was posted as the registrar of cooperative societies. Feeling sidelined, she went on leave, and upon her return, was made to sit in the court of the assistant registrar of cooperative societies in the absence of an office. Sihag, who too was unhappy with the state of affairs in the Union Territory, had proceeded on leave after indicating that he would not continue any longer. Important departments like excise and health, all of which were with Haryana IAS officers, have also gone to officers of the AGMUT (Arunachal Pradesh-Goa-Mizoram-Union Territories) cadre.

Even among IAS officers, the crucial charge of the excise and taxation commissioner, which is normally held by the deputy commissioner, a Haryana-cadre IAS officer, has been given to AGMUT-cadre officer Hari Kallikkat, who is also the managing director of the Chandigarh Industrial and Tourism Development Corporation. Similarly, the health department, earlier handled by the home secretary (a senior Haryana-cadre IAS officer), is now with AGMUT-cadre officer Ajay Chagti. After the repatriation of then home secretary Arun Gupta, who also held the health portfolio, the charge has remained with Union Territory-cadre officers. The Haryana Government has sent a fresh panel of HCS officers to the Chandigarh administration for deputation. The officers whom the panel selects will replace Richa and Sumeet. Once a name is finalised, it will go to the Chandigarh administrator for approval. An officer's name is finalised based on their work experience and administrative qualities. Other HCS officers who have leftlt is not the first time that an HCS officer has sought premature repatriation. Shashi Vasundhara, 2016-batch HCS officer, also expressed her willingness to go back to Haryana. She was serving as the joint commissioner in the Chandigarh Municipal Corporation. Similarly, Shalini Chetal returned to Haryana while serving as the joint commissioner of the Chandigarh Municipal Corporation, and Shambhu Rathi also returned to his parent cadre. Another HCS officer, Sanyam Garg, was relieved by the Chandigarh administration before the completion of his term.

Enumerators skipping Karnataka caste survey to face disciplinary action

Enumerators of the Socio-Economic and Educational Survey in Karnataka, carried out by the State Commission for Backward Classes, will face disciplinary action if they are absent or fail to carry out the exercise. The Karnataka Cabinet, which met Thursday, decided on the move for those enrolled to carry out the exercise in Greater Bengaluru Authority limits. The Cabinet has empowered the Chief Commissioner of Greater Bengaluru Authority (GBA) to initiate action against the absentees as per the provisions of the Karnataka Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 2021, and Karnataka Civil Services (Classification, Control and Ap-

peal) Rules, 1957. The survey exercise that began on September 22 hit a roadblock after a section of teachers protested, urging to be relieved from enumeration duty, and technical glitches. While teachers are enumerators in various parts of the state, the Karnataka State Commission for Backward Classes will carry out the exercise in the GBA limits with help from public servants, along with teachers. Addressing a news conference Thursday, Law and Parliamentary Affairs minister H K Patil said that while server issues hampered the enumeration process in the first two days of the exercise, there was a "lot of improvement since then". He said that Chief Minister Siddaramaiah will chair a meeting with Deputy Commissioners and Chief Executive Officers of various districts on Friday to address the challenges faced during the survey. According to sources, the meeting is also likely to discuss disciplinary action against enumerators in different parts of the state who failed to conduct the enumeration. The survey was hit due to protests by teachers in parts of the state, such as Udupi and Belagavi. The state government has deployed around 1.75 lakh teachers for the purpose. The enumeration is scheduled to be carried out till October 9. On queries about whether low enumeration during the beginning of the survey would force the state to advance the last date of enumeration, Patil said that the government was yet to dis-

Food processing cluster to come up in Aerocity, small farmers to gain

GNS News Agency, Oct 9

The upcoming Aerocity area in the Purandar International Airport is expected to have a food processing cluster. Jitendra Dudi, District Collector, Pune, Wednesday told The Indian Express that they are exploring export-oriented food processing parks within the Aerocity area, which will help small holders earn a steady income from their fields.

Purandar is famous for custard apples and figs, which have been awarded the Geographical Indication (GI) tag. Both custard apples and figs are also being exported. The exports happen mostly via air, given the low shelf life of the fruits. Figs from Purandar have made their way to international markets with Farmer-Producer Companies (FPCs), like Purandar Highlands, taking the lead in exports.

Dudi said talks are in advanced stages about ways of developing the food processing cluster. This, district collectorate officials said, would help the farmers become exporters. "The cluster would have export facilities as well as facilities for packing and grading as well," said the officer. Work is in advanced stages to prepare the Detailed Project Report (DPR) for the same. The DPR would be sent to the central government also.

Meanwhile, 91 per cent of the farmers have already given their consent for the acquisition of their land for the international airport project. The airport would be coming up over 3,000 acres of land distributed in seven villages in Purandar taluka. Officials in the district collectorate said special programs were run to ensure farmers are convinced to give their consent.



"Our aim was to ensure the district collector spoke directly to the farmers. Instead of them becoming project-affected, the farmers were to become beneficiaries of the project," the official said. For many farmers, the promise of 10 per cent developed land within the Aerocity complex proved to be a deal-catcher. "The developed land is akin to having developed land parcels in the Viman Nagar area of Pune. This was over and above the compensation the farmers were to get for their land," the official added. The Purandar airport project had faced protests from some villages, especially those from Pargaon. Farmers had resorted to stone pelting as well as staging protests against the project. Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis had sanctioned this project in his first term as the chief minister. The project has again gained ground after Fadvnavis returned to power in 2024.

'Inclined towards full-fledged stay' on bike taxi ban: Karnataka High Court

The Karnataka High Court on Thursday orally observed that it was inclined to grant a full stay on the order banning bike taxis, noting that the State had yet to frame a policy in this regard. The court was hearing a petition by major appbased aggregators such as ANI Technologies, the holding company of OLA Cabs, in the context of an April order of the Karnataka High Court that directed that aggregators cannot operate in the state unless the government notifies relevant guidelines under Section 93 of the Motor Vehicles Act.

Appearing before a division bench of Chief Justice Vibhu Bakhru and Justice C M Joshi, Advocate General Shashikiran Shetty submitted that the interests of the bike riders would be covered under the Karnataka Platform Based Gig Workers (Social Security and Welfare) Act, 2025, that came into effect on September 12. Shetty also argued that various app-based aggregators were in contempt of the court's order as they were continuing to operate bike taxis. Opposing this, Senior Advocate Dhyan Chinappa, representing bike riders, argued that these platforms were the only way for the riders to carry on their business, as unlike the autos on these platforms, they could not rely on auto stands. After hearing the submissions, the bench orally observed, "We are inclined towards a full-fledged stay at this stage." The bench added that a month had already been



granted for the State to come up with a policy. As previously reported by The Indian Express, a division bench of the high court had in August questioned the government regarding the existence of a de facto ban on two-wheeler vehicles, noting that it was the State's prerogative to regulate them, but this should not amount to a complete ban. "We will not dictate how you regulate...but today there is no policy, only prohibition," the bench had stated. Noting that lives were at stake, the court had at the time granted a month for the state government to decide on framing a policy. On September 12, the Karnataka transport department constituted a 10-member team to analyse bike taxi policies in Chennai, Delhi, Hyderabad, Mumbai and Kolkata.

No known address and contact of next of the kin is available at this point. We have launched a probe to establish his identity," an officer said. "Initial information suggests that the patient was admitted to Sassoon General Hospital by railway police personnel. It has come to light that he had allegedly attempted suicide on railway track and had sustained a severe leg injury. He was admitted to the Sassoon Hospital on September 5 and had since been under treatment. In the early hours of Thursday, the patient died by suicide. A case of sudden death pending probe into causes has been registered at the Bundgarden police station," the officer added. The police said that as part of the investigation they would check the CCTV cameras on the hospital premises and also record statements of hospital staff and doctors to establish the sequence of events leading to the man's death. Earlier this month, a woman prisoner from Haryana who was under treatment at the Regional Mental Hospital in Pune's Yerawada was found dead in a suspected case of suicide. The woman, who was lodged in Maharashtra's Parbhani prison, was brought to the hospital for treatment with the court's permission after she reportedly experienced mental health issues. She was admitted on July 31 and was found unresponsive in her hospital ward on the morning of September 3.

Indian Revenue Service (IRS) officer Sameer Wankhede Thursday moved the Delhi High Court with a defamation suit seeking an injunction and damages for "misleading" and "negative" portrayal of anti-drug enforcement agencies in the recently released drama series 'The Ba***ds of Bollywood'.

The series, which premiered on September 18 on Netflix, marks the directorial debut of Aryan Khan, son of

Shah Rukh Khan, and has been produced by Red Chillies Entertainment. Wankhede, who shot to limelight when he arrested Aryan Khan in 2021 while serving as Mumbai zonal director of the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB), filed the suit against the production company, Netflix, X Corp, Google LLC, Meta Platforms Inc, RPG Lifestyle Media Pvt Ltd, and John Does. Wankhede has claimed that the series disseminates a misleading and negative portrayal of anti-drug enforcement agencies, thereby eroding public confidence in law enforcement institutions. It is learnt that the suit alleges the series has been "deliberately conceptualised" and executed with the intent to malign Wankhede's reputation in a "colourable and prejudicial manner".

Wankhede has also objected to references made in the series to Aryan's NCB case, highlighting that it is pending and sub-judice before the Bombay High Court and the Special Court dealing with cases under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act in Mumbai.Wankhede has also taken objection to a character in the series making an obscene gesture — specifically, showing a middle finger after the character says Satyamev Jayate, which is a part of the National Emblem. He submitted that this constitutes a "grave and sensitive violation of the provisions of the Prevention of Insults to National Honour Act, 1971."Wankhede is seeking an award of damages of Rs 2 crore, to be donated to the Tata Memorial Cancer Hospital for the treatment of cancer patients.

Why Mumbai water tank faces same crisis every year

Between September 21 and 23, following Pitru Paksha, the period when Hindus pay respects to their ancestors, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) removed 10,000 kg or 10 metric tonnes of dead fish and organic solid waste from the Banganga Tank in Mumbai. In the last three years, the BMC has deployed four trucks every year to clear similar accumulations from Banganga. However, despite these recurring incidents, the authorities have yet to come up with a solid plan to prevent this annual mishap. Here's why:Located in Walkeshwar in Mumbai's upscale Malabar Hill neighbourhood, Banganga is a rectangular stepwater tank whose origin dates back to the 12th century. This tank is protected as a heritage site by the state Directorate of Archaeology and Museums. The steps are constructed with black basalt stones, while deepastambhs or pillars located within the periphery are constructed with limeplaster and bricks. Banganga is one of the last remaining natural water bodies in Mumbai, and the tank is known to store fresh water even though it is in proximity to the Arabian Sea. Therefore, devotees make religious offerings in the tank's water on the last day of the Pitru Paksha period every year. The offerings mainly comprise flowers and food items, which later pollute the tank. The increase in pollutants reduces oxygen levels in the water, harming the aquatic life in the tank—Banganga is home to 220 different species of fish—often resulting in large-scale fish deaths.

What are the authorities doing?

Every year, after the Pitru Paksha rituals end, the civic authorities remove the dead fish along with floral waste. Following this, the BMC also increases the oxygen in the water by installing water pumps and artificial aerators. However, no concrete action has been taken so far. "Previously, we tried setting up artificial tanks around the periphery of Banganga to prevent immersion in the natural water body. But that process had failed terribly since people gathered over there in large numbers, and the artificial tanks were not enough to cater to the crowd," a civic official said.

Who is responsible for the Banganga tank?

According to the authorities, since the tank is a listed heritage structure, its ownership is with the state Director-



ate of Archaeology and Museums, while the responsibility of the management of the water body lies with the Gaud Saraswat Brahmin (GSB) Trust. Civic officials said that the BMC does not have any administrative power to maintain or protect the tank. "Since the tank is managed by the archaeology department and trust, it is their decision to allow or disallow Pitru Paksha rituals at the tank. The BMC, as a civic body, cannot take these decisions. If they need any logistical support, the BMC can provide, but we do not have administrative power to stop these rituals," the civic official explained. In 2024, the Maharashtra government, along with the BMC, had proposed a renovation of the Banganga Tank. The project, which stands incomplete today, was backed by Guardian Minister Mangal Prabhat Lodha, who also happens to be the local MLA. Prior to this, between 2018 and 2019, massive restoration works of these projects were proposed by the GSB trust as well as the state govern-

However, those projects too have failed to take off. "The GSB trust does not have the authority to maintain it, considering it is a listed heritage structure. The onus is on the archaeological department of Maharashtra to maintain the site," a representative of the trust told The Indian Express. When contacted, a state archaeology department official said, "Whether to stop religious offerings in the tank is not a decision that needs to be taken up by the archaeological authorities. Our job is limited to the physical state of the structure. The methodology of usage of the site stands with the trust, and they have to decide."

Court rejects closure report in Delhi Fortis hospital case, orders police to carry out investigation

A Delhi court has directed the Delhi Police to conduct an investigation and file a detailed report within three months in a case where two doctors were accused of medical negligence and record-tampering at Fortis Hospital in Shalimar Bagh. The court rejected the closure report filed by the investigating officer in 2023, which stated that no case was made out against the accused persons. The case stems from an FIR filed in 2019 by Sapna Jain, who alleged that her son sustained permanent hypoxic brain damage during his birth in 2017 as a consequence of the hospital's negligence. Hypoxic brain damage occurs when the brain is deprived of sufficient oxygen, leading to the death of cells and potentially long-term cognitive, behavioural and motor disabilities. The petition filed by the mother said that the National Medical Commission (NMC) and the Delhi Medical Council (DMC) have raised doubts about the qualifications of the accused doctors, Dr Akhilesh Singh and Dr Vivek Jain.Dr Singh was found to have only an MBBS degree, while his additional qualifications were unrecognized. Dr Jain claimed Membership of the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (MRCPCH), a postgraduate qualification for pediatricians in the United Kingdom, but he did not possess the Certificate of Completion of Training (CCT), which is mandatory for enrolment as a specialist in both the UK and India. In its order passed on September 22, the court observed that several critical issues remained uninvestigated. These include whether Dr Jain, lacking a CCT, was legally permitted to present himself as a neonatologist or super-specialist in India after the government in 2008 made this certification an eligibility condition for registration; and whether Dr Singh, who holds only an MBBS degree, falsely represented himself as a specialist in violation of the law. The court also noted unresolved allegations of falsification and fabrication of medical records, including the suppression of resuscitation notes. Key medical questions also remain unanswered, such as determining the cause and timing of the child's brain injury, including whether it occurred before, during, or after birth. The court also emphasized the need to examine all medical and nursing staff involved in the child's care during the stay in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), and to record the statement of Dr Alok Kumar, whose child allegedly suffered similar neg-



ligence, as stated in the protest petition. Additionally, the court called for an investigation into any prior complaints or incidents of negligence involving the doctors or the hospital. It asked why essential neurological tests like EEG, MRI, or USG, which are carried out in similar cases, were not performed on the child. Finally, the court directed that a fresh medical opinion be obtained from a board that includes at least one pediatric neurologist, along with a clinical evaluation of the child. "The court cannot be unmindful of the fact that the closure report has been filed without the comprehensive investigation as allegations of unqualified practice by Doctors, falsification and concealment are serious in nature and warrants thorough investigation," the court said.

Responding to the court order, Fortis Hospital said in a statement that it was examining the order, and appropriate steps would be taken after obtaining legal advice. The statement said that no negligence was found in the expert opinion of the Delhi Medical Council and Guru Tegh Bahadur Hospital. "The proceedings before the Ld. Trial Court in a protest petition was done without hearing the concerned doctors. The order of the learned Trial Court is being examined, and the next steps will be taken as may be legally advised to ensure the rights and interests of all parties are appropriately considered," the hospital said in its statement. "There are already two expert opinions in respect of the medical treatment rendered to the patient from the Delhi Medical Council and Guru Tegh Bahadur Hospital, wherein they found no negligence... Further, the FIR has been challenged before the Hon'ble High Court, and the related petition is sub judice," the statement said.

Drones disrupt Danish airports again, Russia denies involvement



COPENHAGEN, GNS News Agency, Oct 9(Reuters) - Denmark said on Thursday that drone incursions overnight, which briefly closed two airports and affected military installations, were hybrid attacks aimed at spreading fear, though authorities could not identify the perpetrators. The incident, the second in two days in Denmark alone, is part of what some European officials see as a pattern of Russian disruption that has exposed the vulnerability of European airspace at a time of high tensions between Moscow and NATO. Danish authorities said on Thursday they decided not to take down any of the drones in their airspace for safety reasons, despite the disruption caused to air traffic

Russia's embassy in Copenhagen rejected as "absurd" speculation about Moscow's involvement in the Danish incursions. Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said she had spoken on Thursday with NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte about the drone incidents and that they had agreed to work together to ensure security. The incursions forced Aalborg airport, used for commercial and military flights, to shut for three hours, while Billund airport, Denmark's second-largest, was closed for an hour, police said. Both reopened on Thursday morning.

Drones were also seen near Esbjerg and Sonderborg airports, as well as Skrydstrup airbase, home to Denmark's F-16 and F-35 fighter jets, and over a military facility in Holstebro, police confirmed. They are all located in the western Jutland region. "This shows at least that we do not have the capacity at present to prevent the intrusion of drones over our airports," Peter Viggo Jakobsen, an associate professor at the Royal Danish Defence College, told Reuters. "This is a hole in our preparedness. "The incursions come after Denmark this year its military budget to address acute shortcomings. Last week, it announced plans to acquire long-range precision weapons, while its decision to

host Ukrainian missile fuel production near the Skrydstrup airbase has drawn criticism from Russia.

It looks systematic. This is what I would define as a hybrid attack," Defence Minister Troels Lund Poulsen told a press conference, adding that Denmark faced no direct military threat. The head of Denmark's armed forces, Michael Hyldgaard, acknowledged weaknesses in the country's ability to counter drone attacks: "We have a wide range of capabilities in the Armed Forces, but we would like to have more."Danish opposition lawmaker Pelle Dragsted of the Red-Green Alliance slammed the government's handling of the incidents, saying on X: "Billions (are being) allocated to defence ... But no control over the most basic thing: Defence of our own vulnerable infrastructure. "Map of Denmark showing where drones were spotted near airports and military bases in Aalborg, Copenhagen, Esbjerg, Sonderborg, Skrydstrup, Billund and Holstebro, as concerns grow over vulnerability of critical infrastructure.

Prime Minister Frederiksen called the Copenhagen incident the most serious "attack" yet on Denmark's critical infrastructure and linked it to suspected Russian drone activities across Europe, though no evidence was provided. Authorities in Norway also shut the airspace at Oslo airport for three hours on Monday evening after reports of a drone flying in the area. Danish analyst Jakobsen also pointed the finger at Moscow. "So the Russians - if it's them, and I think it is - are doing what they've been really good at for a long time: they're going right to the edge of what would trigger a military response from NATO, but not over it," he said. Poulsen stressed on Thursday that there was no evidence linking the recent drone activities to Russia. He also said Denmark had not yet decided whether to follow Poland's example this month and invoke NATO's Article 4, which allows members to request consultations over any security concerns. The drone incursions come as Denmark, current holder of the European Union's rotating presidency, prepares to host EU leaders in Copenhagen

Former French President Sarkozy handed 5-year jail term in stunning downfall

PARIS, - Former French president Nicolas Sarkozy was sentenced to five years in jail on Thursday for criminal conspiracy over attempts to raise campaign funds from Libya and will soon become the first former president of France to serve time in prison. The sentence was harsher than many expected and Sarkozy, who was president between 2007-2012, will spend time in jail even if he appeals the ruling - which he said he would do. As he exited the courtroom, Sarkozy, visibly moved, expressed his anger at what he said was a "scandalous" ruling. "What happened today ... is of extreme gravity in regard to the rule of law, and for the trust one can have in the justice system," he told reporters. "If they absolutely want me to sleep in jail, I will sleep in jail, but with my head held high," he said, adding that he was innocent. "I will not apologise for something I didn't do. "Sarkozy was found guilty of criminal conspiracy over efforts by close aides to procure funds for his 2007 presidential bid from Libya during the rule of late dictator Muammar Gaddafi. He was acquitted by the Paris court of all other charges, including corruption and receiving illegal campaign financing.

However, the prison sentence is enforceable immediately, with the judge saying Sarkozy would have just a short period to put his affairs in order before prosecutors call on him to head to jail. That should happen within a month.Sarkozy, who has always denied the charges, was accused of making a deal with Gaddafi in 2005, when he was France's interior minister, to obtain campaign financing in exchange for supporting the then-isolated Libyan government on the international stage. The judge said there was no proof that Sarkozy made such a deal with Gaddafi, nor that money that was sent from Libya reached Sarkozy's campaign coffers, even if the timing was "compatible" and the paths the money went through were "very opaque".But she said Sarkozy was guilty of criminal conspiracy for having let close aides get in touch with people in Libya to try and obtain campaign financing. The 70-year-old has been on trial since January in a case he said was politically motivated. The court found him guilty of criminal conspiracy between 2005 and 2007. After that he was president and



covered by presidential immunity, the court added. This was the second time this year that a French court handed down a ruling with immediate effect on a major political figure. Farright leader Marine Le Pen was convicted in March of embezzling EU funds and given an immediate five-year ban on running for office. Le Pen was prompt to react to Sarkozy's sentencing, saying it was "a grave danger" that judges were opting for immediately enforceable rulings and not waiting for appeals. Despite his legal battles, and having his Legion of Honour, France's highest distinction, stripped in June, Sarkozy remains an influential figure on the French political stage.

He recently met with his former protege, Prime Minister Sebastien Lecornu, and has also lent credibility to Le Pen's National Rally (RN), saying the far-right, anti-immigrant party now forms part of the "republican arc." Sarkozy has faced several legal battles since leaving office. Last year, France's highest court upheld his conviction for corruption and influence peddling, ordering him to wear an electronic tag for a year, a first for a former French head of state. The tag has now been removed. Also last year, an appeals court confirmed a separate conviction for illegal campaign financing over his failed re-election bid in 2012. A final ruling from France's highest court is expected on that case next month. Vincent Brengarth, lawyer for economic justice campaign group Sherpa, which was party to the Libya trial, welcomed the ruling. "This confirms we have an independent justice system, that can be brave," he said.

Kimmel is back on ABC to big ratings, but some affiliates still refuse to air his show

New York: Jimmy Kimmel is back on his ABC latenight show, but it's still a mystery when — or if — viewers in cities such as Washington, Seattle and St. Louis will be able to see him again on their televisions.ABC stations owned by the Nexstar and Sinclair corporations took Kimmel off the air last week on the same day the network suspended him for comments that angered supporters of slain conservative activist Charlie Kirk. Those stations kept him off the air Tuesday, when ABC lifted the suspension. The unusual dispute attracted the attention of US senators, who said they wanted to investigate the relationship between the affiliates and President Donald Trump's administration. Kimmel returned with no apologies, but in an emotional monologue where he appeared close to tears, the host said that he was not trying to joke about the assassination. He also paid tribute to Kirk's widow. And it got a large audience, with ABC reporting nearly 6.3 million people tuned in to the broadcast alone, despite the blackouts in many cities. As is often the case with late-night hosts' monologues, there was a larger audience online, with more than 15 million people watching

Kimmel's opening remarks on YouTube by Wednesday evening.ABC says more than 26 million people watched Kimmel's return on social media, including YouTube. Typically, he gets about 1.8 million viewers each night on television. The numbers released by ABC do not include viewership from streaming services. A spokesman for Nexstar said Wednesday that Kimmel will continue to be preempted from its stations while the company evaluates his show. Together, the Nexstar and Sinclair groups account for about a quarter of ABC's affiliates, many in smaller cities such as Nashville, Tennessee; Lubbock, Texas; or Topeka, Kansas. "We are engaged in productive discussions with executives at the (ABC parent) Walt Disney Co., with a focus on ensuring the program reflects and respects the diverse interests of the communities we serve," Nexstar said. The dispute focused attention on the business relationships between television networks and the local stations that carry their programming. In the past, local stations occasionally balked at airing a network show, but it was usually an individual market or two worried about pushing boundaries in language or sexual content, said .

Chinese drone experts worked with sanctioned Russian arms maker, sources say

) - Chinese drone experts have flown to Russia to conduct technical development work on military drones at a state-owned weapons manufacturer that is under Western sanctions, according to two European security officials and documents seen by Reuters. The Chinese experts have visited arms maker IEMZ Kupol on more than half a dozen occasions since the second quarter of last year. During that time, Kupol also received shipments of Chinese-made attack and surveillance drones via a Russian intermediary, according to the documents and two officials. In September last year, Reuters documented that Kupol had developed a new drone, the Garpiya-3, in China with the help of local specialists. Now the news agency is the first to report specific details of the extensive involvement of Chinese experts in tests and technological work on military-use drones inside Russia.

The officials, who asked that neither they nor their organisation be identified due to the sensitivity of the information, said the collaboration suggested a deepening relationship between Kupol and Chinese companies in developing drones - which have proven to be critically important to Russia's war in Ukraine. China's foreign ministry said it was unaware of the collaboration. "China has always maintained an objective and fair position on the question of the Ukraine crisis, never providing lethal weapons to any party in the conflict and strictly controlling dual-use items, including drone exports," the ministry said in a statement. The Kremlin, the Russian defence ministry, and IEMZ Kupol did not respond to requests for comment. The documents, including business invoices and bank statements, showed that Kupol received more than a dozen one-way attack drones last year produced by Sichuan AEE, a Chinese drone maker. The drones were supplied by Russian defence procurement company TSK Vektor, which is under U.S. and EU sanctions, according to the officials and documents. TSK Vektor and Sichuan AEE did not respond to requests for comment. The U.S. and European governments have repeatedly expressed concern at Chinese companies supplying Russian arms makers, and have imposed sanctions on some of them. Reuters reported in July that Kupol was producing thousands of Garpiya one-way attack drones using Chinese parts, including engines. Garpiyas - which are modelled on Iran's Shahed drone - can fly hundreds of miles to pre-programmed targets before diving out of the sky and exploding on impact. Kyiv has said around 500 are being used each month in Ukraine. The two European officials said the shipments of small numbers of Chinese attack drones and the presence of Chinese experts could indicate Kupol's interest in expanding production to new drone models. Reuters was unable to confirm independently the reason behind the drone shipments, nor the exact nature of the work carried out by the Chinese experts.

Samuel Bendett, an adjunct senior fellow at the Center for a New American Security, a Washington-based think tank, said China had become a vital part of Russia's military supply chain. "There is just such an enormous role and

influence and impact of Chinese components in Russian military systems...especially in aerial drones," Bendett said. A letter from TSK Vektor to Kupol reviewed by Reuters showed that in the second quarter of 2024 the procurement company billed the weapons manufacturer for more than half a dozen drones produced by AEE. The European sources requested that specifics of the letter, as well as the other documents shown to Reuters, be withheld, including their dates. An AEE corporate document detailing shipments to TSK Vektor, seen by Reuters, confirmed the delivery of the A140 and A900 one-way attack drones. It also listed more than half a dozen other drones - the A60, A100 and A200 - due for delivery. Kupol reports seen by Reuters describe flight tests of the A60, A100 and A200 drones at the Chebarkul military test site in Russia's Chelyabinsk region in the last quarter of 2024.

A group of Chinese experts visited Kupol's facilities in the city of Izhevsk to assemble the drones and train Kupol staff to use them, a Kupol document said. The experts then visited Chebarkul, it added. Airline bookings seen by Reuters showed the Chinese experts were due to fly out of Chelyabinsk the day after the tests. The letter and flight reports described the Chinese experts as employees of TSK Vektor, the Russian procurement company. However, the European officials said they assessed that the individuals were AEE staff. They cited AEE's response to feedback from the test flights of the A200 drones, reviewed by Reuters, which said it was drawing on information from AEE technicians. Subsequently, AEE billed TSK Vektor more than 5 million yuan (\$700,000) for several A200s fitted with anti-iamming equipment as well as other goods in the second quarter of 2025, according to an invoice and an account statement reviewed by Reuters. In another Kupol link to a Chinese drone manufacturer, a flight test report approved by the Russian weapons manufacturer and TSK Vektor assessed the performance of an HW52V drone made by Chinese firm Hunan Haotianyi - in the third quarter last year. The HW52V is a vertical take-off and landing (VTOL) drone that can be used militarily for intelligence, surveillance and reconaissance, and as a strike drone, the European security officials said.

Air tickets seen by Reuters showed that Liu Mingxing, the CEO of Hunan Haotyanyi, and Artem Vysotksy, head of TSK Vektor's drone department, flew out of the Irkutsk airport in Siberia in adjacent seats in June following the last day of an event where the company's drones were displayed. Hunan Haotyanyi and TSK Vektor did not respond to requests for comment. Reuters was unable to reach the executives. A separate Kupol document from the third quarter last year described a visit to its facilities by Chinese citizens, including engineers and technical staff, described as TSK Vektor employees. The European security officials said they assessed that the Chinese citizens were staff of Hunan Haotianyi because several of the experts who visited Kupol on that occasion - and on other trips in 2024 and 2025 - had accompanied the Hunan Haotianyi CEO during his visit to Russia. Reuters couldn't confirm they were Hunan Haotianyi staff. The purpose of the experts' third-quarter visit, the document said, was to adapt a new Chinese flight control computer and a new engine for the Garpiya. Several other letters between Vektor and Kupol described over half a dozen week-long visits by Chinese and Russian experts in 2024 and 2025. The groups, the letters said, would be conducting work on a flight control computer. A final letter, which described a visit by Chinese experts from the same group in the third quarter of 2025, said they would also conduct work on a new drone, referred to as the GA-21. The European officials assess the GA-21 is a version of Iran's Shahed-107, which can be used for surveillance or as an attack drone.

Israel deepens Gaza City offensive as Netanyahu heads to US

CAIRO/JERUSALEM, GNS News Agency, Oct 9(Reuters) - Israeli forces advanced deeper into Gaza City on Thursday as Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu headed to New York to address the United Nations General Assembly, with U.S. President Donald Trump pursuing a deal to end the Gaza war. Israeli strikes killed at least 19 people across the Palestinian enclave on Thursday, local health authorities said. They included 11 people from two families in Zawayda town in the central Gaza Strip, where planes hit a residential building.

Israel's military did not comment on the incident but said it had struck 170 targets across Gaza in the past 24 hours and attacked "terror infrastructure" used by militant groups to attack soldiers. Its forces were deep in Gaza City, it said. Tanks have entered Gaza City as part of an offensive that Israel says is intended to eliminate Hamas following its deadly attack on Israel in October 2023 but which has caused extensive destruction, a humanitarian catastrophe and widespread hunger. Netanyahu says Gaza City is the Palestinian militant group's last bastion, but hundreds of thousands of civilians remain there, fearing there is nowhere safe for them to go.U.S. envoy Steve Witkoff said on Wednesday Washington was confident of securing breakthrough on Gaza in coming days after Trump shared a 21-point Middle East peace plan with leaders of Muslimmajority countries in New York.

Trump also promised Arab leaders he would not allow Israel to annex the Israeli-occupied West Bank, Politico reported. Palestinians want the West Bank for an independent Palestinian state, with Gaza and East Jerusalem.Netanyahu has declared there will never be a Palestinian state although Britain, France, Canada and other nations this week formally recognised Palestinian statehood. Some of Netanyahu's coalition allies want Israel to annex the West Bank.

Israel has become diplomatically isolated over its military siege of Gaza, with European nations and others increasingly critical of its conduct. The International Criminal Court has issued a warrant for Netanyahu for alleged war crimes in the Gaza war. Israel rejects the court's jurisdiction and denies committing war crimes in Gaza. Netanyahu has retained the backing of the U.S., Israel's most important ally, and Trump told the U.N. this week that moves to recognise a Palestinian state risked rewarding what he called Hamas atrocities and could encourage continued conflict. Netanyahu is expected to address the General Assembly on Friday and meet Trump next week. Leaving Israel on Thursday, Netanyahu said he would denounce leaders who had recognised a Palestinian state. He said he would discuss the war in Gaza with Trump, including defeating Hamas and freeing hostages held in Gaza since the Hamas attack on October 7, 2023. He said he also intended to discuss efforts to expand diplomatic relations with countries that do not officially recognise Israel.



About 1,200 people were killed and 251 were taken hostage in the Hamas-led attack on Israel. About 48 hostages remain in captivity, with 20 of them believed to be alive. Israel's military campaign in Gaza has killed more than 65,000 Palestinians, according to local health authorities. Hamas' armed wing has warned the Israeli military that an expansion of its operation in Gaza City would put Israeli hostages at risk, while Israel's military has called on Gazan residents to "rise and break away from Hamas" to end the war.In Jordan, mother-of-five Afkar Alwan told Reuters her young son Yaman Alwan had been evacuated from Gaza last month for urgent medical care after severe malnutrition worsened his congenital kidney condition, and medical shortages growing."By God, the situation in Gaza is very tragic," she said. "There are no laboratories and the hospitals, of course...the situation there is deplorable.

India's muted voice, its detachment with Palestine



France has joined the United Kingdom, Canada, Portugal and Australia in recognising Palestinian statehood — the first step in the fulfilment of the legitimate aspirations of the long-suffering Palestinian people. One hundred and fifty-plus of the 193 countries that are members of the United Nations have now done so. India had been a leader in this regard having formally recognised Palestinian statehood way back on November 18, 1988, after years of support to the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO). India's decision was fundamentally a moral one and in keeping with our world view.

Even before Independence, India raised the issue of Apartheid South Africa in the UN and cut off trade relations with the apartheid regime. During the Algerian struggle for independence (1954-62), India was one of the strongest voices for an independent Algeria, ensuring that the international community could not forget that decisive battleground in the crusade against imperialism. In 1971, India intervened firmly to prevent genocide in what was then East Pakistan, midwifing the birth of modern-day Bangladesh. When much of the world merely stood by amidst the bloodshed in Vietnam, India was the voice of moral clarity, seeking peace and opposing foreign brutality against the Vietnamese people. Even today, India contributes one of the largest contingents to the UN's Peacekeeping Forces. The promotion of 'international peace and security' is one of the Directive Principles of State Policy enshrined in the Constitution of India.

On the critical and sensitive issue of Israel-Palestine as well, India has long maintained a delicate but principled position, emphasising its commitment to peace and the protection of human rights. India was among the first countries to recognise the PLO in 1974 and has consistently supported a two-state solution that guarantees Palestine's right to self-determination while encouraging peaceful coexistence with Israel. Over the years, India has backed numerous UN resolutions affirming Palestinian rights and condemning the occupation and settlement expansion in the West Bank. At the same time, India has maintained full diplomatic relations with Israel. Through multilateral forums such as the UN, the Non-Aligned Movement, and Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) observer platforms, India has urged negotiated settlements, adherence to international law, and a cessation of violence. India has also provided humanitarian and development aid to Palestine, including scholarships for students, support for education and health care, and capacity-building for institutions

In the last two years, since the outbreak of hostilities between Israel and Palestine in October 2023, India has all

but relinquished its role. The brutal and inhumane Hamas attacks on Israeli civilians on October 7, 2023, were followed by an Israeli response that has been nothing less than genocidal. As I have previously raised, more than 55,000 Palestinian civilians have been killed, including 17,000 children. The residential, schooling and health infrastructure of the Gaza Strip has been obliterated, as have agriculture and industry. Gazans have been forced into a famine-like situation, with the Israeli military cruelly obstructing the delivery of much-needed food, medicine, and other aid a 'drip-feeding' of aid amidst an ocean of desperation. In one of the most revolting acts of inhumanity, hundreds of civilians have been shot down while trying to access food. The world has been slow to respond, implicitly legitimising the Israeli actions. The recent moves by several countries to recognise Palestine as a sovereign state are a welcome and long-due departure from the policy of inaction. This is a historical moment, and an assertion of the principles of justice, self-determination and human rights. These steps are not merely diplomatic gestures; they are affirmations of the moral responsibility that nations bear in the face of prolonged injustice. It is a reminder that in the modern world, silence is not neutrality — it is complicity. And here, India's voice, once so unwavering in the cause of freedom and human dignity, has remained conspicuously

The Modi government's response has been characterised by a profound silence and an abdication of both humanity and morality. Its actions appear to be driven primarily by the personal friendship between the Israeli premier and Mr. Modi rather than India's constitutional values or its strategic interests. This style of personalised diplomacy is never tenable and cannot be the guiding compass of India's foreign policy. Attempts to do the same in other parts of the world — most notably, in the United States have come undone in the most painful and humiliating ways in recent months. India's standing on the world stage cannot be wrapped up into the personal glory-seeking ways of one individual, nor can it rest on its historical laurels. It demands persistent courage and a sense of historical continuity. Meanwhile, it is appalling that just two weeks ago, India not only signed a bilateral investment agreement with Israel, in New Delhi, but also hosted its highly controversial far-right Finance Minister who has invited global condemnation for his repeated incitements of violence against Palestinian communities in the occupied West Bank. Most fundamentally, India must not approach the issue of Palestine as merely a matter of foreign policy but as a test of India's ethical and civilisational heritage. The people of Palestine have endured decades of displacement, prolonged occupation, settlement expansion, restrictions on movement and repeated assaults on their civil, political and human rights. Their plight echoes the struggles that India faced during the colonial era — a people deprived of their sovereignty, denied a nationhood, exploited for their resources, and stripped of all rights and security. We owe Palestine a sense of historical empathy in its quest for dignity, and we also owe Palestine the courage to translate that empathy into principled action. India's historical experience, its moral authority and its commitment to human rights should empower it to speak, advocate and act in favour of justice - without delay or hesitation. The expectation is not of partisanship in this conflict, of choosing between Israel and Palestine. The expectation is of principled leadership, consistent with the values that have long guided India, our nation, and on which

Follow the rains, not the calendar, to fight floods



Each year, urban India braces for the monsoon contractors are deployed, drains desilted, and emergency protocols rehearsed. Yet, when the rain finally arrives often untimely and more intense than expected — headlines are dominated by flooded roads, waterlogged homes, and stranded commuters. The deeper issue is that our cities are often still designed for a climate that no longer exists. Northern States are seeing heavy flooding even in September, with all of Punjab's 23 districts being hit by floods. Delhi and Gurugram have been inundated by intense rains, and Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh are experiencing frequent cloudbursts. In the east, Kolkata is facing torrential rains. Timing, amount, and intensity But the rains came early too. In May, Mumbai recorded 135.4 mm of rainfall in just 24 hours, followed by 161.9 mm the next day. Delhi recorded 81 mm fall within a few hours on the same day, overwhelming the drainage systems. This shift in rainfall timings is not new; yet our preparedness remains tethered to outdated schedules. Drain cleaning, for instance, still follows the June monsoon calendar.

Cities must follow the rain to be able to bridge the gap between schedules, and readiness and reality. An analysis by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water shows that about 64% of Indian tehsils have seen a rise in the frequency of heavy rainfall days by 1-15 days, especially in Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Gujarat, and Karnataka. The consequences for urban systems are significant, from localised flooding to disruptions in essential services. In the last two decades, floods have caused most of the loss to life and property from natural disasters in India. Today, a single flood can cause damages of some ?8,700 crore, with such events becoming increasingly frequent. The challenge is not just the amount of rainfall, but also the intensity. Intensity, Duration, Frequency (IDF) curves, which track rainfall patterns over time, offer an interesting picture. For instance, CEEW's analysis of daily rainfall from 1970 to 2021 in the coastal city of Thane shows that one-hour rainfall now reaches 50 mm once every two years, and about 80 mm per hour once every 50 years. This means such heavy rainfall can be expected to occur within hours, leaving little room for cities to respond. There is also a sharp difference between how much rain falls in one hour versus three hours,

revealing that rainfall that once spread across a day may now have a higher chance of falling within an hour. We propose three interlinked actions to prepare Indian cities better for the monsoons and flood-proof them.

First, city authorities should incorporate sub-daily rainfall analysis into city monsoon planning. Municipalities must move beyond long-term averages and integrate recent patterns and short-duration, high-intensity rainfall events that unfold within a few hours, into infrastructure design. Realtime data on sub-daily rainfall, which occurs over intervals shorter than 24 hours, must inform citizens about drainage operations and upgrades. For instance, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) has announced this year that it will widen its drains to handle up to 120 mm of rainfall in an hour. While India's monsoon officially spans 100-120 days, just a few hours of intense rain across select days account for most of the seasonal rainfall. Yet, maintenance and planning assume a uniform spread. This illusion of consistency leads to systems that fail not due to excessive seasonal totals, but hourly extremes. Recognising this compression is the first step towards resilience. Second, align cleaning of storm water drains and municipal solid waste management calendars. An overlooked cause of urban flooding is unmanaged waste — plastic, debris, and litter frequently block drains. Yet storm water and waste are handled by separate departments on different schedules. While the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs recommends drain cleaning before, during, and after the monsoon, its effectiveness hinges on coordination with waste collection. Even a freshly cleaned drain can clog again if garbage is left uncollected nearby. Ideally, storm water and sanitation departments must coordinate, especially during highrisk periods. Rainfall alerts from the India Meteorological Department should automatically trigger joint sanitation drives and drain inspections in vulnerable areas. In Vijayawada, such coordination — through monsoon response teams composed of officials from the sanitation, engineering, and planning departments - has reduced waterlogging and eased conditions for residents.

Third, city authorities must update IDF curves every 5-10 years to ensure that infrastructure keeps pace with evolving rainfall patterns. Without this, new drainage systems will continue to rely on outdated data, leaving them illequipped to handle present day storm water run-off volumes. In response to recent intensifying rains, the BMC has also proposed expanding storm water capacity and preparing a new drainage master plan based on updated trends. Drainage design should also be based on micro-catchment-level hydrological analysis that accounts for topography, which affects peak discharge during storms. New systems must be separated from the sewerage networks to avoid overload and ensure efficiency. We are not losing to the rain, but to the idea that the rain fits into seasonal boxes. Instead of asking when the monsoon will begin, we need to ask, are we prepared for the rain already falling?

The age of India's leaders has steadily risen

When Jagdeep Dhankhar stepped down as Vice-President, citing age-related health issues, discussions on ageing in politics sharpened in India. The suggestion of Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) chief Mohan Bhagwat two months ago that leaders should step aside at the age of 75 had also triggered a debate. Narendra Modi continues as Prime Minister despite crossing the age of 75 and so do several other leaders, underscoring the lack of a clear retirement norm.

The BJP's unofficial age limit of 75 years — symbolised by the creation of the Margadarshak Mandal, often seen as a euphemism for the party's retirement cell — has kept the spotlight on the question of when politicians should call it a day. At the State level too, Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's age and health have emerged as key talking points ahead of the Bihar elections. Several instances of incoherence at public events have raised doubts about his ability to take crucial policy decisions and effectively discharge his duties. This is in sharp contrast to the image of 'sushasan babu (boss of good governance)' that he cultivated during his early years.

In fact, gerontocracy — commonly defined as rule by a group of old men or a council of elders — has become an important theme in the global discourse on democracy. In the 2024 U.S. presidential elections, age dominated the campaign conversation: Joseph Biden, the oldest President in American history, left office at 82, while his successor Donald J. Trump took office at 78 years and 220 days, setting a record as the oldest to be inaugurated. That year, celebrated worldwide as the 'year of democracy' for its many pivotal elections, saw the rise of several geriatric leaders to power, including Brazil's President Lula da Silva, 79; Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, 75; and Narendra Modi, 74. The persistence of gerontocracy is evident even among unelected leaders and dictators. From long-ruling strongmen in parts of Africa to supreme leaders in oil-rich Asian republics, many continue to hold on to office well into old age. Authoritarian leaders such as Turkey's Recep Tayyip Erdogan, 72, and Russia's Vladimir Putin, also 72, have extended their grip on power for decades, underscoring how age is rarely a barrier to political dominance outside democratic systems.

This trend of elderly leaders dominating politics, whether through democratic elections or authoritarian rule, is hardly new. Gerontocracy was a defining feature of governance in the Greek city-states and the Roman Senate, where advancing age was closely associated with wisdom and experience, creating a form of traditional authority that legitimised the rule of the old. An analysis of the ages of India's Prime Ministers shows a steady upward trend. At independence in 1947, Jawaharlal Nehru became the first Prime Minister at 58, serving with a median age of 66 during his tenure. By 2014, Narendra Modi entered office at 63, and the median age of Prime Ministers had climbed to 76. The range has been wide: Rajiv Gandhi was the youngest to assume office at 40, while Morarji Desai was the oldest, taking charge at 81. Tellingly, Nehru died while in office at 74 in 1964, whereas Manmohan Singh, the last Prime

Minister before Modi, stepped down in 2014 at 81. Across India's history, the median age of Prime Ministers has hovered around 67.

In comparison, the median age of Chief Ministers increased only modestly, from 57 in the 1950s to 59.5 in the 2020s, with the peak decade being 2010-2020 when it touched 62.25. A breakdown by party — regional versus national, and within national parties between the Congress and the BJP — shows negligible variation, with the average age of Chief Ministers across the board hovering around 58 years. The presence of younger leaders such as Nayab Singh Saini, Mohan Yadav, and Yogi Adityanath might suggest that the BJP promotes younger talent, especially when contrasted with the Congress's image as India's 'Grand Old Party'. However, our analysis shows minimal difference in average age between the two. In general, the younger appointments across parties are balanced out by veterans such as the late Prakash Singh Badal in Punjab, the late V.S. Achuthanandan in Kerala, and the late M. Karunanidhi in Tamil Nadu, all of whom served well into their late 80s and 90s. The age profile of the Lok Sabha has shifted markedly over the decades (Chart 1), with the 18th Lok Sabha, which began its term last year, being the "oldest" yet.

The average age of parliamentarians rose from 46.5 years in 1952 to 56 years by 2014. Meanwhile, the share of younger members (25–40 years) declined sharply from about 25-30% in the early years to under 10%. In contrast, the share of members aged 56-70 grew from less than 25% to nearly 40% by 2019. The data makes clear that India's Parliament is ageing, with fewer young politicians making it into the House over time. If we were to pick out a random Indian, there is a 50% probability that they are less than 30 years old. However, this probability is 0.007% if we were to do the same for a member of the Lok Sabha.

Will AI help fix India's energy demand or will its own needs surge?

As artificial intelligence (AI) and its attendant data demand continue to expand in India and worldwide, a curious dilemma has arisen: will AI help transform energy delivery for the better or will the data centres crucial to its operations impose a new burden on the world's power grid?

In a 2024 report, the International Energy Agency (IEA) highlighted the growing interconnections between energy and AI worldwidelt projected that demand from data centres would more than double by 2030 to around 945. I win and that AI would be the principal driver. The demand from Al-optimised data centres was projected to more than quadruple by 2030. A McKinsey report has also estimated that the annual global demand for data centre capacity could rise at 19-22% from 2023 to 2030, reaching 171-219 GW, against the total current demand of 60 GW. To avoid a deficit, at least twice as much data centre capacity built since 2000 will have to be in place in less than a quarter of the time. Given Al's significant hunger for computing power, energy demand is naturally increasing, Ms. Anwesha Sen, an assistant programme manager at Takshashila University studying the impact of technology policy and AI on society, said. She is however optimistic that it's "not as drastic when compared to other energy-intensive industries". Worldwide, data centres consume 1-2% of total power and that's expected to increase to 3-4% by 2030. To compare, the steel industry consumes around 7% of total power, Sen said. According to McKinsey, India's data centre demand is projected to increase from 1.2 GW in 2024 to 4.5 GW by 2030, driven largely by AI and digital adoption across sectors.

Al-driven data centres in India are projected to consume an additional 40-50 TWh of electricity annually by 2030, according to Raghu Raman, professor and Dean at the School of Business at Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham. The increasing adoption of AI and digital technologies in India is contributing to a significant rise in energy demand, especially in already energy-intensive sectors like real estate, Vimal Nadar, national director of research at the Mumbaibased India office of Colliers, a global investment company, said. India is the third-largest energy consumer worldwide, after China and the US, with coal, crude oil, and natural gas comprising the bulk of its energy mix. The energy consumption of data centres is imposing huge pressure on energy systems worldwide, Anish De, global head for Energy, Natural Resources, and Chemicals at KPMG, said, adding: "India will not be any different." According to Sen, an equal concern is the correspondingly increasing demand for freshwater required to cool the servers in these data centres.

That said, there is scope to press AI to the service of smarter energy management as well."Al is playing a pivotal role in transforming how energy is delivered, utilised, and managed, both globally and within India," Mr. Nadar said. On the one hand, AI could help develop energy transition technologies and as well as new materials that mitigate India's dependence on critical minerals it currently has to import from abroad, Dr. De said by way of example. "It will also aid faster project development. This is already playing out in the main geographies and will propagate to others quickly," he added. "We will see energy efficiency and resource efficiency gains that will also be substantial, though not enough to offset the demand. Al itself will support the gains in expansion of clean energy."On the flip side, carbon emissions will also increase. "Despite best efforts it is practically impossible to meet this demand from renewables, both from quality and quantity standpoints," according to Dr. De. The IEA also noted in its report that AI "could intensify some energy security strains" as "cyberattacks on energy utilities have tripled in the past four years and be-



come more sophisticated because of Al" even as Al tools are becoming critical for energy companies to defend

against such attacks. As energy demand intensifies, real estate stakeholders are increasingly prioritising energy efficiency, sustainability, and emission reduction in both new developments and retrofitting of existing assets, Mr. Nadar said. "Concurrently, there is a growing emphasis on renewable energy adoption. Real estate developers are increasingly incorporating rooftop solar solutions and solar-integrated building systems, further reducing the sector's reliance on conventional energy sources."The IEA has also said a range of energy sources will be tapped to meet data centres' rising electricity needs although, according to its report, "renewables and natural gas are set to take the lead due to their cost-competitiveness and availability in key markets."India and many other countries are taking advantage of AI to enhance energy efficiency and promote sustainable real estate practices, per Mr. Nadar. In India, the Energy Conservation Building Code and the Roadmap of Sustainable and Holistic Approach to National Energy Efficiency schemeaim to integrate Al and data analytics into smart metering, renewable energy management, and sustainable building design. Also within the real-estate sector, Al-driven solutions like smart lighting systems, predictive HVAC optimisation, and automated building controls promise to reduce energy consumption by up to 25%. Green certifications such as GRIHA and LEED further encourage Al-based monitoring of energy and resource usage. Data centres are also adopting AI to optimise cooling systems and server utilisation. As of April 2025, nearly one-fourth of the country's total data centre capacity in major cities had been green-certified, reflecting an explicit focus on creating sustainable infrastructure. Almost 67% of the Grade A office stock across India's top seven cities is also greencertified. 'Need some nudging' Under the National Smart Grid Mission, Al-enabled systems manage demand and integrate renewables, enhancing grid reliability while reducing wastage, according to Raman, The Nxtra (Airtel) Data Centres uses Al-powered cooling and predictive analytics to cut energy use, paired with renewable power purchase agreements to run green data centres. BrightNight's PowerAlpha AI deployed in India to forecast and optimise hybrid solar-wind-battery plants and ensure 24/7 access to renewable energy while minimising grid stress. Tata Power ReNew Power and Hindustan Zinc both use AI for real-time load forecasting, reducing outages and optimising power supply in Mumbai, Dr. Raman added. BESCOM in Karnataka has also started using AI to detect faults and 'heal' grid sections and thus mitigate downtime. Similarly, smart meters in Uttar Pradesh have been using AI to detect power theft as well as manage demand-side issues."A

digital energy grid approach aims to build a unified and

interoperable power infrastructure, and its potential can be

amplified using AI," Ms. Sen said.

With Sci-Hub gone, will the 'One Nation, One Subscription' scheme step up?



When the Delhi High Court ordered internet service providers to block access to Sci-Hub and its mirrors, it closed a chapter in one of the more fraught debates in contemporary research: who gets to read research papers, and who must pay. The verdict followed years of litigation by Elsevier, Wiley, and the American Chemical Society against Sci-Hub founder Alexandra Elbakyan. The court held that Ms. Elbakyan had violated an undertaking not to upload publishers' articles, and that Sci-Net, a mirror service, was being used to circumvent judicial orders, leaving her prima facie in contempt. This seemingly straightforward case of copyright violation — private corporations defending intellectual property against piracy — is transformed by its context. The publishers' legal win must be weighed against the case for public access to knowledge, the economics of scholarly publishing, and the arrival of 'One Nation, One Subscription' (ONOS), which together suggest that depending on courtroom battles might be misplaced.

An endeavour apartScientific publishing is unlike other enterprises where piracy drains income from creators. Scientists who produce and review research are not paid by journals: their work is largely funded by public money in India. Yet publishers charge institutions exorbitant subscription fees, sometimes lakhs of rupees per journal. Publishers have defended these figures on grounds of quality control and peer review. But with profit margins of 30% or more and a voluntary review system, the system has often resembled rent-seeking. On the other hand, Sci-Hub was always vulnerable to the charge of copyright infringement. Courts in the U.S. and Europe have consistently ruled against it, and now the Delhi High Court has joined that chorus. While this is uncontroversial from a strictly legal standpoint, the larger implication is troubling. The judgment risks reinforcing the idea that legal strategies to restrict access are valid even in settings where no affordable or equitable

Internationally, publishers have used the courtroom to buttress the legitimacy of their business model and portray shadow libraries like Sci-Hub as rogue actors rather than as symptoms of dysfunction. In fact, the outcome in the High Court fits a pattern: publishers protect a lucrative business model, courts apply the letter of the law, and the underlying lack of access stays unresolved. Experts have been steadfast that the dysfunction is the real disease that needs to be cured. The Indian government recently put forward the ONOS initiative as an alternative. Whether it succeeds will determine if future generations of researchers must still look for back doors. The Union Cabinet approved ONOS in 2024 with an outlay of ?6,000 crore for its first phase (2023-2026). Under the scheme, the state has negotiated a bulk subscription with 30 major publishers so that research institutions — all public and, in phase II, many private ones have equal access to some 13,000 journals. Thanks to the

rise of preprints and institutional repositories, more than half of the scientific papers worldwide are now open access. From 2026, all federally funded research in the U.S. must be openly accessible; the EU's Horizon Europe programme has similar requirements. Paying crores for subscriptions at a time when openness is expanding could render ONOS an expensive detour. Until phase II, independent researchers and those at private institutes and centres — who may outnumber their counterparts at public centres — will still have to pay considerable non-ONOS fees to access journals and still depend on platforms like Sci-Hub.ONOS also doesn't address structural flaws in scholarly publishing, reinforces dependence on foreign publishers, and continues to force Indian researchers to transfer copyrights of their own work to journals. At the same time, the subscription model that ONOS pays for still encompasses several thousand journals, including those that many researchers wish to be published in. Blaming ONOS on this count rather than a long-awaited culture change, especially not one the state could have forced, wouldn't make sense. Ms. Elbakyan's attempts to (further) incentivise scholars to contribute to Sci-Hub's collection of papers using the Sci-Net portal and its cryptocurrency-based rewards system also don't seem to be succeeding. Whatever moral force Ms. Elbakyan's project once had has since been squandered by technical unreliability and increasing redundancy. The High Court's injunction may thus be decisive less because of its punitive sting than because of the fact that the Indian community is

Pathology of publishingAt the time the publishers sued Ms. Elbakyan in 2020, there was no realistic prospect of universal access. For countless researchers outside elite institutions, Sci-Hub was (and remains) often the only path to knowledge. Both legal experts and researchers have thus contended that on principle alone, courts could have acknowledged the unique nature of scientific publishing — that the absence of author royalties, prevalence of public funding, and exorbitant pricing by publishers set it apart from creative industries like music or film — and refused to privilege corporate margins over public good. Today, ONOS provides a legal path to broader access and its success could render shadow libraries unnecessary. It needs to prove it can seamlessly deliver equitable access at a fair cost while India must foster greater indigenous publishing capacity. On both counts, however, it's not clear if ONOS can do so in its present form. For example, on the first count, the concerned authorities will have to improve the efficiency of use by regularly consulting researchers on which journals are useful and keep other options, like a per-article fee for esoteric journals, open.On the second, ONOS frees funds at many individual institutes and the scheme currently intends to redirect them towards pay-to-publish (rather than pay-to-read) open-access journals. Instead, governments may consider using them to install and manage institutional repositories. Experts have said this service could in turn be complemented by a national rights retention policy, like those at Harvard University and MIT, that require researchers to deposit their work in the repositories regardless of publishers' restrictions. This could keep researchers in control of their work, force pay-to-publish journals to modify their terms, and allow people who aren't linked to university and/ or public libraries to access papers, including journalists, activists, and independent researchers. Sci-Hub in many respects remains a symbol of resistance against publishers' profiteering. Following the Delhi High Court order, the question is whether ONOS will step up to eradicate the disease rather than simply manage the symptoms.

Forest rights of tribal people were not settled for Nicobar project: council

The Andaman and Nicobar Islands administration made a false representation to the Centre claiming that rights of the tribal people under the Forest Rights Act, 2006, had been "identified and settled", which eventually led to forest clearances being granted for the ?72,000-crore mega infrastructure project on the Great Nicobar Islands, the Tribal Council of Little Nicobar and Great Nicobar has said in a complaint to the Minister of Tribal Affairs, Jual Oram. The proposed Great Nicobar Island Project will include a transhipment port, an airport, a power plant, and a township. Local tribespeople had raised several concerns, including the diversion of nearly 13,075 hectares of forest land for the project and its impact on vulnerable groups. Soon after taking charge in 2024, Mr. Oram told The Hindu that his Ministry would look into the issues raised by them. Earlier this year, the Minister said their concerns are "being examined", without going into details of which aspect was specifically being looked at.

"In the last two months, we have found that the administration in A&NI issued a certificate in 2022 saying the FRA rights were identified and settled and that the consent for diversion of forest land was taken only after this." a member of the Tribal Council told The Hindu on Friday. The council is the key representative body of the Nicobarese people on the islands, and has been regularly interacting with the administration. The council, in a letter to Mr. Oram dated July 21, clarified that it had not given its consent for the project. "We write to you to inform that the process of settlement of forest rights under the FRA has not even been initiated. Therefore, there is no question of forest rights being settled." The council said it had recently been made aware of an August 2022 "certificate", issued by the Deputy Commissioner of Nicobar District that claimed the opposite, and was thus seeking the Minister's intervention.

According to this forest diversion certificate under FRA that was issued on August 18, 2022, a copy of which was seen by The Hindu, the administration specifically claimed: "The complete process for identification and settlement of rights under the FRA has been carried out for the entire protected forest area of 121.87 sq. km and deemed forest of 8.8 sq. km falling under project of holistic development of Great Nicobar Islands."However, as reported by The Hindu earlier, the administration in A&NI has maintained before the Tribal Affairs Ministry in its monthly FRA progress reports that it need not implement the law on the islands as the forests there are already protected under the Protection of Aboriginal Tribes Act of 1956 (PAT56). While the PAT56 gives the administrator of the islands full authority to divert forest land, the FRA requires such diversion to be made only after rights are first settled and then consent is taken from the Gram Sabhas concerned. It was not clear whether diversion of forest land for the project was made under the FRA or PAT56. The infrastructure project on the island has been mired in controversy since it received preliminary clearances in 2022. Soon after the project was said to have secured the consent of local tribespeople, the Tribal Council of Little and Great Nicobar withdrew the consent it was said to have granted. The National Green Tribunal, and the Na-




tional Commission for Scheduled Tribes had also subsequently flagged concerns over alleged violation consent procedures and the environmental impact of the project.

The Union Government has maintained that due process was followed in the forest clearances for the project. In the paperwork for the clearances seen by The Hindu, the administration called a special Gram Sabha meeting on August 12, 2022, for villagers of Laxminagar, Gandhi Nagar, and Campbell Bay panchayats, which passed a resolution consenting to the diversion of forest land. Further, three days later, the Sub-Divisional Level Committee convened a meeting where a no-objection certificate (NOC) was obtained on behalf of the Shompen tribespeople, who were represented through the administration's Andaman Adim Janjati Vikas Samiti (AAJVS). In its letter, the Tribal Council went on to say, "The Gram Sabha that is said to have given consent for forest diversion did not involve the Nicobarese of Great Nicobar whose ancestral villages of Chingenh, In Haeng Loi, Pulo Baha, Kokeon, Pulo Pakka, and others will be affected by the proposed project."

The council also said the consent of the Shompen, classified as a Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Group, cannot be obtained through an officer of the AAJVS. The member who spoke to The Hindu on condition of anonymity said, "We are hoping and waiting for the Minister to reply to our complaint. If it does not come we will see what other options are available to us." The member said the council's complaint was marked delivered by the post office on July 30, adding that it had also sent an email to Mr. Oram's office about it but was yet to receive a response or acknowledgement. Multiple attempts to reach the Office of the Minister, and senior officials of the Ministry have not vet elicited a response. In their letter to the Minister of Tribal Affairs, the Tribal Council has further said that multiple representations were made to the authorities concerned about the council withdrawing its consent but to no avail. In requesting for the Minister's intervention to protect the "rights, tradition, culture, and forests" of the Nicobarese and Shompen, the council stated that "we don't want the proposed project" to be anywhere in Tribal reserve area or areas the Shompen use.

CCMB's seminal work on programmed cell revival offers hope for regenerative medicine



A landmark study by Indian researchers has not only found evidence of cells recovering from the near-death stage but has also found the molecular mechanism that drives the recovery process, the opposite of programmed cell death. Scientists at the Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CSIR-CCMB), Hyderabad, call the survival mechanism that they uncovered as "Programmed Cell Revival". "We here discovered a genetically encoded intrinsic revival code, which we named as Programmed Cell Revival, which allows cells to recover from a near-death state," Dr. Santosh Chauhan, a senior researcher at CCMB and the corresponding author of a paper published in The EMBO Journal says. Programmed cell death is generally considered as an irreversible process. However, in recent years, researchers have found evidence that some forms of cell death can indeed be reversed under certain conditions. The study by CCMB researchers led by Dr. Santosh Chauhan has for the first time uncovered the key molecular mechanisms that regulate the reversal of cell death.

The first signs of Programmed cell revival of cells were discovered by accident when Kautilya Kumar Jena, who was a PhD student about six years ago and now at BRIC-Institute of Life Sciences, Bhubaneswar, added a sublethal dose of a death-inducing agent (L-leucyl-L-leucine methyl ester — LLOMe) added to cause lysosome-mediated cell death in a petri dish, which led to revival of cells instead of causing death. The cells that are attached to the plate surface get detached and come into the surface and show cell death-like features. "The cells not only get detached but they also exhibit properties that suggest cell death has actually started, such as the bulging of the cell membranes (blebbing). The pathway to cell death appears committed. So, researchers collect the cells at this stage assuming that the cells are dead," Dr. Chauhan. "The pathway to cell death is not limited to phenotypical features but molecularly also. We saw many molecular manifestations of cell death such as mitochondria getting disrupted or disintegrated."Though the cell death process had started but was not executed in full as only a sublethal dose of the death-inducing agent was used. Just five minutes after treatment with the death-inducing agent, the cells began the process of apoptosis as displayed by cells becoming round. Thirty minutes later, the cells began detaching from the growth surface and the cell membranes began bulging (blebbing), which is an advanced stage of cell death. Instead of further progressing towards programmed cell death, about 80-90% of the cells instead reattached to the surface within two-three hours, and regained their normal morphology in six hours. And 16 hours after treatment with the deathinducing agent, the cells appeared normal and began the division process. Remaining traces of abnormality disappeared in 24 hours, and the cells appeared morphologically

As per literature, 4-8 millimolar of the death-inducing agent is considered sufficient to kill the cells. "But we found that at this concentration, the cell death process gets initiated but is not completely executed. The process of cell death then takes a U-turn and the cells don't die but rebound when a sub-lethal concentration of the agent is used, which is really interesting," Dr. Chauhan explains. The researchers found that cells can recover even when the integrity of the plasma membrane is compromised, but not after disruption of the nuclear membrane. They found that resuscitation from cell death was a highly regulated, well-programmed process.

Becoming stem-like cellsMore than unravelling the reversal of cell death, the researchers discovered that the initiation of the programmed cell death actually causes the cells to reverse from a differentiated state to a de-differentiated state. "The cells appear de-differentiated, something like the embryonic stem cells. When the cells begin to die, they reprogramme themselves such that stem-like characteristics start appearing in them, and then they don't die," he says. "Since the cells don't die, the reversal of cell death appears to be converting a fully differentiated cell into embryonic-like stem cells with a potential to regenerate and potential to heal."The reversal from differentiated state to a de-differentiated stem-like cells were not ascertained based on morphological characteristics alone but also molecularly. "We did whole genome RNA sequencing and epigenome studies to ascertain that the adult, differentiated cells were resetting themselves and becoming stem-like cells," says Dr. Chauhan. "The data indicate that the reviving cells launch a molecular programme mimicking embryonic cells for reinitiating a new life," they write. Skin wound healingOnce the researchers observed that molecularly the cells appear stem-like, they proceeded to test the regenerative capacity of the cells that were treated using a sub-lethal dose of the cell death-inducing agent. First, the researchers tested the ability of the death-inducing agent (LLOMe) in speeding up skin wound healing in a mouse model.

The cell death-inducing agent was dissolved in water to get a concentration of 4 and 8 millioMolar, and the water was topically applied to the wound surface twice every day. The animals treated with LLOMe-containing water healed "significantly faster" compared with the control group. In just one day of treatment, the average reduction in wound size was 27% in the 4 milliMolar group and about 50% in the 8 milliMolar group, while the control group showed only 3% healing. By the third day, the average wound size was reduced by 64% and 78% in the 4 milliMolar and 8 milliMolar groups, respectively, compared with just 23% healing in the control group. Corneal wound healing Having tasted success with the mouse wound model, the researchers tested the effectiveness of the sub-lethal dose of the cell-killing agent in healing corneal injury. Collaborating with Dr. Kiran Kumar Bokara from CCBM who studies corneal injury models, the researchers tested the corneal wound healing in a mouse mode. The corneal epithelium of one eye was purposely damaged by gentle scraping of the corneal epithelium and alkali burn produced by topical application of a single drop sodium hydroxide. The cell death-inducing agent (LLOMe) was administered topically twice a day for seven days. There was "significant reduction" of the epithelial defect from day two in the group treated with LLOMe compared with the control group. "We found that re-epithelisation, which is the kind of regeneration of the epithelial cells, was very fast and dramatically better in LLOMe-treated groups," Dr. Chauhan says. The results indicate that the agent could prove to be a potent therapeutic option for treating corneal burn injuries. Tadpole tail regeneration "We were more encouraged by corneal wound healing results. Since both the skin wound healing and corneal wound healing are restricted to the surface, we wanted to test real regeneration potential," he says. For this, they turned to the established tadpole tail regeneration model. In collaboration with Dr. Pravati Kumari Mahapatra from Utkal University, Bhubaneswar, the researchers tested the efficacy of LLOMe in accelerating a tadpole tail regeneration in Asian tree frog (Polypedates maculatus) model. The tails of Asian tree frog tadpoles were amputated and then treated using four different doses of LLOMe-containing water. They observed rapid blastema (cluster of undifferentiated cells that forms at the site of injury and has the ability to regenerate into an organ or appendage) formation in the treated group within 24 hours of amputation. The study found that treatment with different concentrations of LLOMe led to "significantly accelerated" tail regeneration compared with the control group. "In the case of tadpoles treated with sub-lethal concentration of the LLOMe agent, the tails were regenerating five-six days earlier than the control group," Dr. Chauhan says. "We did some molecular experiments to understand what is happening in the tail during regeneration, and we found that the LLOMe agent was working through lysosomes."Axon regenerationIn one more test to verify the regenerative capacity of the sublethal dose of LLOMe agent, the researchers in collaboration with Dr. Anindya Ghosh-Roy of National Brain Research Centre (NBRC), Manesar, Haryana, tested the efficacy of the agent in inducing regeneration of axons in C. elegans. And they found that the regrowth length of axons after they were cut was "significantly enhanced" with LLOMe treatment. In addition, the functional restoration also improved "significantly" after the treatment. Increase in haematopoietic stem cellsFinally, in collaboration with Dr. Rohan Jayant Khadilkar from the Advanced Centre for Treatment, Research and Education in Cancer (ACTREC) Tata Memorial Centre, Mumbai, the researchers tested the stem-like nature of cells when exposed to sublethal dose of LLOMe agent. The fruit fly larvae were treated with the cell death reagent at sublethal concentration (8 milliMolar) for 14 hours. The fruit flies showed "pronounced increase" in the haematopoietic stem and progenitor cells in the lymph glands upon LLOMe treatment. "These new insights into the molecular mechanisms of programmed cell revival have promising therapeutic implications, while also opening new directions for experimental investigation," says a News and View article in the same issue of the journal. The medical promise is immense, ranging from faster recovery after a stroke or heart attack to regenerating tissues in degenerative diseases. Instead of replacing damaged organs, doctors might one day coax the body to heal itself by awakening this hidden programme," he says. "This breakthrough opens a new chapter in cell biology, blurring the line between death and repair and hinting at a future where healing comes from within. This study's findings could be exploited in not just regenerative medicine and cancer, but also in ageing, neurodegeneration, and infection biology, to name a fewA word of caution"But there's also a warning. Cancer cells may exploit the same revival programme to resist treatment and return stronger," he warns. Elaborating about the harm that such treatment may cause in people who have cancer he says: "The cancer therapies kill tumour cells. But chemotherapy or radiotherapy can be suboptimal leading to relapse of cancer. We feel relapse could be due to the procedure we discovered. In suboptimal dosing. cancer cells rather getting killed fully may revive more powerful with this programme and become stem-like, leading to therapy-resistant tumours. Ideally, drugs that can inhibit this process in combination with cancer therapies might be key to reduce cancer relapse," he says.

The greening of our chemical industries

Deepening concerns over the warming of our planet have made "green" and "sustainable" popular words. 'Going green' means taking steps to lessen harm to the environment, like adopting eco-friendly practices. Sustainability aims for changes that balance environmental concerns with economic realities. Whatever term you use, the shared goal of minimising or eliminating environment hazards points us towards green chemistry. And this field leads us away from toxicity and pollution. The 12 Principles of Green Chemistry, introduced by Paul Anastas and John Warner in 1998, focus on basics, such as the adoption of safer solvents and reagents in chemical processes; designing energy-efficient methods that lead to safer chemicals that are as nontoxic as possible and also do not linger for too long in the environment; and preventing waste (so that you don't have anything to clean up). An illustration of how green chemistry can be put to work comes from the production of biodiesel. The Indian Oil Corporation, as part of a green fuels mission, produces biodiesel from non-edible oil seeds such as Jatropha (jamal ghota in Hindi and kattukkotai in Tamil). The seeds have over 30% oil content and the tree grows in lands with little rainfall and poor soils. Biodiesel is produced from a transesterification reaction, where the seed oil is reacted with methanol to yield biodiesel and the by-product glycerol, which is also commercially useful. For reducing the carbon footprint, the methanol must be derived from biomass. Chemical reactions are speeded up by catalysts. Biodiesel production is facilitated by an alkali. Sodium hydroxide is often used, but washing it away generates wastewater, which has to be treated before it is released into the environment. Calcium oxide is a greener alternative, because it is a solid and 95% of it can be recovered after each production cycle. Very toxic substances are used in the manufacture of pharma products as well. In the vicinity of some of these factories, the air has a strong smell that reminds you of nail-polish: the solvent toluene is widely used in the synthesis or extraction of paracetamol and many other drugs. It is a neurotoxin. Green initiatives have led to a slow replacement of such volatile organic compounds with alternatives that are less toxic, biodegradable, and can be produced from biomass sources like sugarcane. Another tenet of green chemistry that chemists love to work towards is the atom economy. The aim is to incorporate as many atoms present in the input mixture into the desirable product. In the biodiesel production process described above, green chemistry results in an atom economy of 90%. It is not 100% because of the atoms that are 'taken away' in the byproduct, glycerol. But then, in a sustainable initiative, the glycerol would itself serve as an input for making polymers, cosmetics, etc. Attention to atom economy is even more critical in industries where the by-products are very toxic. A fine example of green chemistry's superiority has come from chemists at the Hyderabad campus of the Birla Institute of Science-Pilani. Their green method for pharmaceutical production, of the anti-cancer drug Tamoxifen and related drug

FDI into India in July at 50-month high of \$11.11 billion

Even before S&P Global Ratings upgraded its rating on India and the government announced a raft of measures to boost the economy, Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) into the country had risen to the highest in over four years in July, according to data released by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Wednesday. At \$11.11 billion, the gross FDI inflow in July was the highest since May 2021, when \$12.32 billion had come into the country on a gross basis. In June, gross FDI inflows into India stood at \$9.57 billion, while the figure for July 2024, at \$5.54 billion, was half the latest number. "Singapore, followed by the Netherlands, Mauritius, the US and the UAE, together accounted for more than three-fourth of total inflows. Manufacturing and services including communication, computer and business services were the top recipient sectors," the central bank's staff noted in their monthly State of the Economy article, also published on Wednesday. On a net basis, \$5.05 billion came into India in July compared to \$2.51 billion in June and an outflow of \$2.69 billion a year ago. Net FDI is calculated after adjust-

ing for investments that are repatriated by foreign companies and overseas investments made by Indian companies.FDI is a key indicator of the health of the economy and the confidence foreign investors have in the country. S&P's decision on August 14 to upgrade its rating on India to BBB from BBB- is expected to boost flows in the medium to long term. A day later, on August 15, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced a wide range of economic reforms to boost domestic growth. This included cuts to the Goods and Services Tax (GST) rates that came into effect earlier this week on Monday. Inflows have picked up steam in recent months after a disappointing 2024-25 which saw net FDI inflow total just \$959 million even though gross inflows rose to \$80.62 billion. The precipitous fall in net FDI in 2024-25 from \$10.15 billion in 2023-24 came on the back of a sharp increase in overseas direct investments made by Indian companies and foreign companies cashing in on their past investments in India. In 2024-25, foreign firms took back \$51.49 billion to their home countries from India, up 16 per cent from 2023-24. Meanwhile, overseas FDI by Indian companies rose 69 per cent to \$28.17 billion. Both these factors contributed to the net FDI in the last fiscal being negligible. So far in 2025-26, despite the global trade, policy, and financial market uncertainty, the numbers are on the up for India. At \$10.75 billion, net FDI in the first four months of the fiscal is three times that in the same period last year, gross FDI is up 33 per cent at \$37.71 billion, and repatriations by foreign companies is down 6 per cent at \$16.28 billion. On the other hand, Indian companies' direct investments abroad are up 44 per cent at \$10.68 billion. However, in July, both repatriation of FDI and outward FDI moderated, the RBI noted in its State of the Economy article. "Outward FDI was mainly directed towards financial, insurance and business services, as well as manufacturing, with the US, Singapore, the Netherlands, Mauritius, and the UK being the major destinations. These movements together led to an increase in net FDI," it said.

Mass deletions of Disney, Hulu accounts: Why ABC may have resumed Jimmy Kimmel's show



Last week, when ABC indefinitely suspended Jimmy Kimmel's late night show following conservative ire over his comments on Charlie Kirki's death, search queries on Google on how to cancel Disney+ subscription rose dramatically. A week later, Disney (which owns ABC) announced it was returning the show. "Last Wednesday, we made the decision to suspend production on the show to avoid further inflaming a tense situation at an emotional moment for our country. It is a decision we made because we felt some of the comments were ill-timed and thus insensitive," Disney said in a statement. "We have spent the last days having thoughtful conversations with Jimmy, and after those conversations, we reached the decision to return the show on Tuesday," it added.

IS President Donald Trump had celebrated who Kimmel was taken off air, saying more late night show hosts should receive the axe. In a post on his social media platform Truth Social. Trump had said. "Congratulations to ABC for finally having the courage to do what had to be done. Kimmel has ZERO talent, and worse ratings than even Colbert, if that's possible," urging another network, NBC, to take down shows by Jimmy Fallon and Seth Meyers. "That leaves Jimmy and Seth, two total losers, on Fake News NBC. Their ratings are also horrible. Do it NBC!!!"A grassroots boycott campaignAn analysis of Google Trends, which shows the most commonly searched things on the website, gueries related to canceling Disney+ and Hulu (also owned by Disney) saw a sharp spike on September 18 – a day after the show was pulled - and kept rising until September 20. Other related queries which saw a similar spike in that time include Disney+ and Hulu's "boycott," how to cancel ESPN (also owned by Disney) subscription, people asking whether Disney owns Hulu and ESPN, and those looking for directions on how to delete their paid accounts. Although it is worth noting that the actual financial impact of the grassroots boycott drive on Disney and its subsidiaries is unclear, it could have played a role in the company deciding to resume the show, given that some key networks have still not agreed to do so. Sinclair, a company that operates more than 35 ABC affiliates across the US, said that it would replace Kimmel with news programming.

What did Kimmel say about Charlie Kirk?

During his opening monologue last week, Kimmel suspected that Kirk assassin Tyler Robinson was a MAGA (Make America Great Again) Republican. "We hit some new lows over the weekend with the MAGA gang desperately trying to characterise this kid who murdered Charlie Kirk as anything other than one of them and doing everything they can to score political points from it," Kimmel said on his show. He also criticised flags being flown at half mast in honour of Kirk, and mocked Trump's reaction to the shooting. "This is not how an adult grieves the murder of someone he calls a friend. This is how a four-year-old mourns a goldfish," said Kimmel, Kimmel's comments had earlier drawn criticism from Federal Communications Commission chair Brendan Carr, who had also threatened ABC's licence. In a podcast, Carr said "What people don't understand is that the broadcasters ... have a licence granted by us at the FCC, and that comes with it an obligation to operate in the public interest. When we see stuff like this, look, we can do this the easy way or the hard way. These companies can find ways to change conduct, on Kimmel, or there's going to be additional work for the FCC ahead."The ABC's decision to indefinitely take Kimmel's show off air came shortly after Nexstar, one of the largest local broadcast station groups in the US, said it would preempt 'Jimmy Kimmel Live!' beginning Wednesday night over the host's comments about Kirk. Carr has thanked Nexstar for "doing the right thing".

For decades, late-night chat shows have epitomised free speech ideals in the US, where hosts could speak truth to power, and regularly make fun of them, with very little fear of state retribution. It's a format that many countries have tried emulating with varying degrees of success. Of course, they faced competition from online content creators who built up sizable audiences of their own, at a fraction of the costs it takes to produce a television show. But, beyond their social relevance, it is the involvement of political compulsions that is today clear in a way that has never been before. Earlier this year, American broadcaster CBS decided to cancel Stephen Colbert's talk show citing financial constraints. However, several suspected that there were reasons deeper than that. Karnataka hotels cite high LPG and rent taxes for not passing GST cuts

Bengaluru: The Karnataka State Hotels Association has expressed its inability to pass on the GST rate cut benefits to consumers as the taxes on LPG cylinders and property rents have not been reduced. The Association has urged the government to provide relief by reducing the GST on property rent and helping hotels survive in the competitive

This comes after the GST Council, comprising the Centre and states, decided to reduce tax rates on about 375 goods and services, from September 22 — the first day of Navaratri. In a statement, the association President G K Shetty welcomed the government's decision to reduce the GST on several items, saying it would benefit the common public. "People are asking when hotel food and room tariffs will be reduced," he said, and explained that the hoteliers cannot lower the prices at this juncture unless they get some relief from the government. Shetty pointed out that vegetables, meat, and some other items are under 0 per cent GST from the beginning, but the 18 per cent GST on cooking gas cylinders has remained untouched. "In addition, hoteliers who run their business from rented buildings are paying 18 per cent GST on the rent they pay," he said. Noting that a majority of restaurants and Hotels are run from rented buildings, Shetty said, if the GST is reduced to 5 per cent on rent, then we can pass on the benefits to consumers. "With the present GST rate, it is not possible to offer any relief to consumers," he said.

Neurosurgeon says a simple blood test can predict brain diseases years before symptoms; here's everything you need to know



Elevated neurofilament light chain reflects neuronal injury and is one of the most sensitive blood markers we have for ongoing brain damage. Elevated neurofilament light chain reflects neuronal injury and is one of the most sensitive blood markers we have for ongoing brain damage. Could a simple blood test give people a warning about brain diseases years before symptoms show up? Neurosurgeon Dr Jay Jagannathan recently raised this question on Instagram, asking his followers: "Would you take this test if it could give you a warning sign years before symptoms?"

In his post, he highlighted the Neurofilament Light Chain (NfL) test as a potential game-changer. "Neurofilament light chain (NfL) — a marker of nerve cell injury — is emerging as one of the most powerful predictors of brain health. Elevated levels are linked to Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, multiple sclerosis, stroke, and even traumatic brain injury." What makes it significant, he explained, is that "you could feel 'fine'... but NfL can already be sounding the alarm. Why it matters: nerve cells don't repair easily. Elevated NfL means silent but ongoing brain damage — long before symptoms appear."

He also described how the test works: "What the test is: the serum/plasma NfL test is a simple blood draw. It measures tiny protein fragments (NfL) released when brain or spinal cord cells are damaged. Normally, these proteins stay inside neurons. When neurons are injured, they leak into the blood and spinal fluid, where we can measure them." According to him, doctors may use NfL trends as a red flag or to track disease progression even before an MRI picks

up changes. Alongside this, Dr Jagannathan stressed prevention, advising people to control blood pressure and blood sugar, sleep 7–8 hours, move daily, eat a Mediterranean-style diet, avoid smoking and excess alcohol, and manage stress. He concluded with a clear reminder: "Brain damage is often silent — until it isn't. Don't wait for symptoms. Ask your doctor about NfL testing if you're at risk or have a family history of neurological disease."But, how reliable is this marker in actually predicting conditions like Alzheimer's or Parkinson's before clinical signs develop?

Dr Jagdish Chattnalli, senior minimal invasive brain and spine surgeon, Bengaluru West Clinics, HCG Hospitals Bengaluru, tells indianexpress.com, "Elevated neurofilament light chain reflects neuronal injury and is one of the most sensitive blood markers we have for ongoing brain damage. It is particularly useful as a prognostic indicator because higher levels are consistently associated with faster decline or a greater likelihood of conversion to symptomatic disease in several disorders, including Parkinson's disease and Alzheimer's-related syndromes."

However, he notes that NfL is not disease-specific. "A raised value tells us that neurons are being damaged, but it does not by itself identify the cause or give a firm diagnosis. In practice, the best use of NfL is as part of a broader assessment that includes clinical evaluation, imaging, and other biomarkers."

The NfL test is described as 'a simple blood draw,' but is this test widely available, and should the general population consider it?

The assay itself is a straightforward blood test, Dr Chattnalli notes, and modern high-sensitivity platforms make it possible to measure very low levels reliably. Commercial laboratories and reference centres now offer NfL testing, and validated assays are available from major providers. That said, routine population screening is not the current practice. NfL testing is most valuable when ordered by a clinician who can interpret the result alongside symptoms, imaging, and other tests. "I would recommend testing in people who have concerning symptoms or objective findings on examination or imaging, and in individuals with strong family history or other clear risk factors, where knowing the trajectory of neuronal injury would change management," mentions the experts.



I started drinking very, very young, so this was the first time the brain fog lifted," he said. ier conversation with Filmfare disclosed dealing with childhood dysfunction and early emotional trauma, stating, "I had to grow up very quickly, due to the dysfunction in which I grew up. There were aspects of myself I had to shut down. I compensated and distracted myself. There was alcohol and hedonism. I lived a risque life and was on the edge. My dad said I was burning the candle from both ends. I wanted these distractions, but it all catches up. That's what I have learnt. You can't

What brain fog is, and how alcohol contributes to it

Gurleen Baruah, existential psychotherapist at That Culture Thing, tells indianexpress.com, "Brain fog isn't a clinical diagnosis, but many people describe it as feeling mentally dull, forgetful, or unable to focus—like the mind is moving through mist. Long-term alcohol use can contribute to this in several ways. Alcohol disrupts neurotransmitters, sleep cycles, and nutrient absorption, all of which are essential for cognitive function. Over time, this can lead to slowed thinking, poor memory, and emotional flatness."From a therapeutic lens, she says that chronic alcohol use can also serve as a numbing tool — keeping unresolved emotions buried. "This emotional avoidance, combined with the physiological impact on the brain, creates a state where clarity and emotional presence are difficult to access. It's only when someone begins the process of sobriety and healing that the 'fog' gradually lifts, and a more grounded, connected version of the self can re-emerge."

Using substances like alcohol to cope with childhood traumaWhen emotional needs aren't met in childhood, the nervous system adapts in survival mode. In such cases,



substances like alcohol can become a way to self-soothe, escape, or numb what feels too overwhelming to face. Baruah informs, "The body remembers what the mind can't always articulate. So even years later, a person might reach for alcohol not because of the present moment, but because of the old emotional residue still living inside them. Healing begins when that pain is finally named, understood, and met with compassion rather than avoidance." Quitting alcohol "in one go" can sound impressive, Baruah states, but it's not always safe or advisable for everyone — especially those with long-term or heavy dependency. "Sudden withdrawal can lead to serious health risks like seizures or delirium tremens. This is why professional supervision is so important — it helps monitor the body's response and offers structured support through the most fragile stages of recovery," stresses the expert.

If you play Washi, Axar, and Jadeja, you will play Kuldeep as well. Batting will go up to number 10. I think Bumrah will get a rest against South Africa," Ashwin said on his YouTube channel "Ash ki Baat".

The 106-Test veteran praised KL Rahul for how easy he made batting look in difficult conditions. He hoped that the right-hander would be able to finish the Test series against West Indies on a high."I always feel that KL Rahul makes tough runs look very easy. However, she had begun her Women's World Cup campaign on a scratchy note by scoring 8 and 23, respectively, in the first two matches against Sri Lanka and Pakistan. The southpaw is playing in her third ODI World Cup and was part of the side that finished runners-up to England in the 2017 edition, which was held in the United Kingdom. Mandhana is also nearing 5000 runs in ODIs, which will make her only



the second Indian batter and the fifth overall to get to the landmark.India came into the fixture after having won their opening two fixtures against Sri Lanka and Pakistan. South Africa captain Laura Wolvaardt won the toss and elected to field first on Thursday, after rain delayed the start of play by one hour.Both teams made one change to their playing XI from their previous matches. South Africa brought in Tumi Sekhukhune for Masabata Klaas, while India brought back Amanjot Kaur, who missed the Pakistan match due to illness, for Renuka Singh Thakur.Both teams will play one more match in Visakhapatnam after Thursday. What are the chances of an amateur – of any age – winning a point against World No.1 Carlos Alcaraz on a court that hosts a Grand Slam final? They can find out by entering the 'One Point Slam', to be held just before next year's Australian Open. It will pit 10 amateurs and 22 professionals – including Alcaraz, who won two of the four Grand Slams in 2025 – in a knockout competition at Melbourne Park, with the eventual winner taking home a million Australian dollars. It is another initiative to create buzz around a big tennis event after the US Open held a standalone mixed doubles tournament before the main event with bigger prize money and shorter matches, featuring some of the top singles players in the world, causing consternation among those who depend on doubles to make a living. In the 'One Point Slam',

'rock, paper, scissors' will be used to determine who serves or receives, and the winner of the point will advance to the next round. In a handicap system of sorts, the professionals will be allowed just one serve, while the amateurs two, the norm in the game. The Australian Open held its inaugural One Point Slam event this year, but the prize fund was A\$60,000 with Russian Andrey Rublev the only top-10 player involved. To put the million-dollar top prize in perspective, the players losing in the singles semifinals of the 2025 Australian Open earned A\$1.1 million. "Whether you're an amateur or a pro, the ultimate winner will walk away with the prize," Australian Open tournament director Craig Tiley said, adding there were "more big names to be announced soon."

The tournament website said "celebrities" would be involved. There will be five knockout rounds. This year's event was held at the smaller Kia Arena, but in 2026, it will be held on the main show court – the Rod Laver Arena on the first weekend of the opening Grand Slam of the tennis season. The final stages will be held in the night session, instead of the 1 pm slot this year, the BBC reported. There will be qualifiers held across the country to finalise the 10 amateurs who will take on the professionals. Any Australian – or international players registered with Tennis Australia – can enter the competition at their local tennis club. The main draw of the Australian Open runs from January 12 to February 1.But not everyone is enamoured by the initiative with the legendary Martina Navratilova believing it reduces tennis to the level of a stunt. She asks: "Is the tennis itself not good enough?"

'So, I really hope he capitalizes on that innings in Delhi He is young, very motivated, high-quality player. I really hope he gets runs in this game. Because otherwise, with the competition that is there in the Indian Test side, I think he could find it a little uphill after this. For that reason, I think this Test match is very, very important. I really hope he plays this Test match. I think they should give him another go," Ashwin said on his YouTube channel "Ash ki Baat". Ashwin admitted that Karnataka left-hander Devdutt Padikkal was breathing down Sudharsan's neck as far as competition for the top order spot was concerned. He, however, did admit more players competing for a spot was good for the game."I remember, we played a practice match in Perth before the Australia test match. Devdutt and Abhimanyu Eswaran in Perth. India bowled us out in the first innings. The next day, they played for two hours without wickets. And on really tough conditions against Siraj and Jasprit Bumrah. They didn't give wickets. And they played fabulously well. Devdutt Padikkal was unbelievably good. So, Devdutt Padikkal is breathing under Sai Sudarshan's throat a little bit. I think it's good for the game. It's good for in-game cricket. But it's a very important test match for Sai Sudarshan," Ashwin said.

England are now Ashes favourites against Australia: Michael Vaughan

Former England captain Michael Vaughan feels it is 2010-11 all over again, the last time England tasted success Down Under. In his column for The Daily Telegraph, he elaborates on the reasons Australia are vulnerable at home more than ever before this century. "When you look back to 2010-11, the only England win in Australia in my time, a couple of breaks went our way. Australia were unsure about their best XI, they had not transitioned properly away from the great side of the early 2000s and they lost a top bowler, Ryan Harris, with injury."Read Pat Cummins in place of Harris. The Australia skipper would miss the opening Test in Perth due to a stress injury to his back. "With the news of Pat Cummins's injury sinking in, one or two will think England are now favourites this winter. I would not argue against that right at this moment but I would also say be very wary," he added.

He wonders whether he would be fit in time for the second Test in Brisbane as well. "If you have a stress fracture and are not able to bowl on November 21 in Perth, how are you going to be fit for the second Test starting on December 5? A stress fracture requires careful management. As much as the Ashes matter, and the temptation to rush him back will be huge, Cummins has to realise there are other series down the line. If he misses this one, he still has a few years left in the game. The last thing he should do is go all out to play one or two Tests in this series and cause some long-term damage and miss a whole year," he reflected

His absence would weaken the batting department as well, he pointed out. "But it is the balance he brings to the team that is hard to replace. Scott Boland is a very good stand-in as a bowler but if Cummins is unavailable then all of a sudden Australia are saddled with a very long tail: Mitchell Starc, Boland, Josh Hazlewood and Nathan Lyon. Alex Carey is a good player at No 7 but when he looks behind him and sees Starc at No 8, wow, that batting order is light," he wrote.



'Over the last few Ashes series, especially in Australia, their tail has had a massive say in the series. England have struggled to finish them off. But now, you think taking 20 wickets looks that bit easier for England, especially with Australia's top three looking weak too," he said. Australia have an unsettled opening pair. Usman Khawaja has showed signs of decline; Sam Konstas erratic, and Cameron Green's obvious talents flickering than shining. Marnus Labuschagne, meanwhile, is out of the side. However, Australia have a significant edge over England in the spin department. "They have a world-class spinner in Lyon and a good back-up in Matthew Kuhnemann, the left-armer. Are we going to see Australia going for two spinners later in the series because it might take them a couple of Tests to realise that is the best way to beat this England side? The one thing I would not rule out later in the series from Adelaide onwards is the element of spin," he opined. He also praised Steve Smith's captaincy nous. "Tactically, Steve Smith is an outstanding captain and he will lead Australia well in the absence of Cummins. A lot of Australia's ideas originate from Smith in the slip cordon anyway. He is always ahead of the game and England will see that his record as a batsman when he is captain is

Andrew Flintoff parts ways as Northern Superchargers coach after disagreement over pay with new owners, who also have Sunrisers Hyd

Former England all-rounder Andrew Flintoff has parted ways with The Hundred franchise Northern Superchargers after he couldn't agree on terms with the new owners, the Sun Group, who also have IPL team Sunrisers Hyderabad in their portfolio. Flintoff, one of the most charismatic England cricketers of his generation and an Ashes hero, had been the Superchargers head coach for the last two seasons, which had seen a turnaround in their results. The team finished fourth in 2024 before reaching the Eliminator (third) this year. The franchise, based at Headingley in Leeds, was last the season before Flintoff took over and sixth and fifth in the two previous editions.

Flintoff said he wanted to continue in the role but added that he couldn't do so if he was paid much less than the other head coaches in the competition. "Unfortunately, I'm not going to do it, which is sad. The past two years I felt we were building something really nice and I'd have loved to see it through. We've got new owners. I spoke to them. They phoned up, they said they wanted us to do it, so I said: 'Yeah, fine. Make us an offer,' the 47-year-old said on the Beard Before Wicket podcast, co-hosted by Superchargers and England spinner Adil Rashid.

But Flintoff felt the offer wasn't to his expectations. "I genuinely don't do it for the money, although it's nice, but I'm worth more than just over a quarter of the [salary of] other head coaches," he said. "I wasn't encouraged they wanted me anyway, but then also you want to feel valued. So, I said that it's not going to work for me, and they weren't going to move on it."The Sun Group, who own 100 percent stake in the franchise, after Yorkshire sold the 51 percent control they held to them, in addition to the 49 percent ac-

quired via the auction, took operational control on October 1. They also own the Sunrisers Eastern Cape team in the SA20. The owners claimed they had offered Flintoff a raise

"We had discussions with Freddie and extended an offer, which was an increase over his current salary at Northern Superchargers. While we would have loved to have him on board, we respect his decision," a spokesperson said. Daniel Vettori is the Sunrisers Hyderabad head coach at the moment, but he is currently in charge of another The Hundred team, Birmingham Phoenix.

The Superchargers job was Flintoff's first coaching stint before he was also appointed in-charge of the England Lions side and he will be with the shadow squad during the upcoming Ashes series in Australia. Other The Hundred franchises like the Manchester Originals, soon to be rebranded as Manchester Supergiants, and Trent Rockets, could be one the lookout for a head coach soon. Flintoff has said that he has had "a couple of offers" but hasn't decided anything vet

Diljit Dosanjh says he was termed 'anti-national' after Sardaarji 3: 'My film was shot before Pahalgam attacks, India-Pak matches being played now'



Actor and singer Diljit Dosanjh recently spoke about the controversy surrounding his film Sardaarji 3, which starred Pakistani actor Hania Amir and came out after the Pahalgam attacks, Diljit, who was performing in Malaysia, commented about the controversy that entailed — he was personally targeted and the film released globally but not in India — and wondered how India is playing Pakistan in the Asia Cup after the dastardly attacks. At the concert, Diljit was seen saluting the Indian flag. He later addressed the

crowd and said, "Woh mere desh da jhanda hai (That's my country's flag). Always respect. If you allow me, I have something to say. When my film Sardaarji 3 was shot in February, the matches were being played. After that, the tragic Pahalgam terror attack happened. At that time, and even now, we have always prayed that the terrorists should receive strict punishment. The difference is that my film was shot before the attack, and the match was played after the attack."

He said that he was called 'anti-national' after the attacks. "The national media tried their best to portray me as anti-national, but Punjabis and the Sikh community could never go against the nation," Diljit Dosanjh added. He even shared that while he kept quiet all this time, there are many answers he wants to give. The singer added, "I have many answers, but I kept quiet, kept everything inside me. I didn't speak. I have many answers. Whoever tells you anything, you shouldn't take that poison inside you. I have learned that from life. So I didn't say anythin. There is a lot to say, but I don't want to do that."The Pahalgam attack took place on April 22 in which 26 tourists were killed. Amid the tension between the two countries, social media accounts. YouTube channels, and all film releases with actors from across the border were banned in India. Diljit's film, starring Hania, was released globally on June 27 but didn't come out in its primary market, India. India and Pakistan are playing each other in the Asia Cup. While the two teams plated each other, they didn't shake hands or greet each other.

The unconventional villains in the cinema of AR Murugadoss

A few minutes into Sivakarthikeyan's Madharaasi, you see a police battalion taking on a mysterious figure, who is single-handedly fighting a group of special unit cops trying to take down a gun supply operation. The staging is careful not to show the face of the acrobatic figure taking on the cops with a sort of stealthy charm. The crowd at my screening started going berserk. You know this is not our hero, and you recognize the darkly lit figure as he picks up a dead cop's helmet from the ground. AR Murugadoss slowly cuts to a poker-faced Vidyut Jammwal staring right back at the camera with nonchalance, with Anirudh Ravichander's beats revving loudly in the background. The inspector in-charge of the operation points at the screen and declares with a breathless indignation, 'Virat, Virat has come.'This is the villain's introduction scene. You get the drill. Let us look at how AR Murugadoss navigates the conception and handling of the bad guys in his busy mainstream action films.

In the constantly changing grammar of commercial cinema, with the reframing of good vs evil narratives and how immorality is represented on screen, AR Murugadoss makes the entry of his villain a grand set piece with its own grammar and particular detailing that is emblematic of his cinema. Murugadoss' villains are a genre unto themselves. The director, known for his testosterone-fueled action entertainers, specializes in something that most filmmakers in the mainstream struggle to do in star-centric films. He comes up with exciting bad guys for his leading man, as he is aware of the axiom of storytelling that 'for the hero to shine bright, you need an equally well designed villain', forcing his actions

The antagonist archetype in Murugadoss films counterbalances the virtues of the hero and upends the villains as 'punching bags' cliche, prompted by less imaginative dramaturgy that fails to create a convincing challenge for the hero on screen. Murugadoss comes up with inventive ways for the hero and villain. For instance, in Madharaasi, he expertly sets up the larger-than-life status of Virat, played by Vidyut Jammwal. Casting Vidyut Jammwal as the coldblooded, menacing Virat in Madharaasi is a meta wink and a call-back to an earlier antagonist played by the same actor in Vijay's blockbuster Thuppakki (2012). There he played an undercover lead of a terrorist sleeper cell unit whose sharp wit and observational skill give the hero a hard time. You need a guy like Vidyut Jammwal to pull off the action sequences in Madharaasi, but the audience's familiarity to the no-nonsense loner from Thuppakki, bleeds into setting up the perfect foil for Sivakarthikeyan in Madharaasi. The films of AR Murugadoss use imaginative settings and character types to populate his antagonist figures. Social forces and political evils play spoilsport in the hero's journey in Murugadoss' film, so he devises well-written personifications of these evils in 'bad guy' types and creates situations that are smartly conceived to sidestep the conventional beats. In most commercial films today, villains have been reduced to bland, screaming psychopaths with no distinct identity, who are mere superficial placeholders for the hero to overcome. For instance, the kind of villains in a Lokesh Kanagaraj film, a Nelson film, or a Shankar film are far too identifiable and less defined than the bad guy in the films of

Remember the image of the twin evil brothers in Ghajini, or the menacing martial artist-cum-biological terrorist Dong Lee from Ezham Arivu, the uber cool industrialist Chirag played by Neil Nitin Mukesh in Kaththi (The flute based score by Anirudh is enough to remember the style with which he dominated Vijay in many scenes in that film), or S J Suryah as the sadistic psychopath in Mahesh Babu starrer Spyder? All these are generic action films that rises above conventionality with their treatment of the antagonist figures, who are given chances to one up the hero at regular intervals. AR Murugadoss is old school in the way he writes his antagonists. He is not afraid to let them overshadow the hero or take the spotlight. In an increasingly creatively bankrupt industry, that regurgitates age-old kitsch and moustache twirling for 'villainy', it is a welcome change to see a director write his villain with the same care as that of the leading man. Murugadoss villains don't give up so easily and are never made to look silly or clueless on screen. These are dangerous people, who externalized the threat to the hero in human form. In Thuppaki, Vidyut Jammwal's terrorist villain does not even have a name that registers during the runtime.It's pretty common knowledge that this bare sketch of a character has been widely celebrated as one of the finest bad guys in contemporary Tamil cinema. The character barely



speaks unless important and makes his moves with deep introspection. You feel the wheels moving inside his head though Vidyut's blank cadence does not give away the emotional state of the villain. You know exactly what he is feeling at all times and he holds his own against the cunning army officer, who is always two steps ahead of him.

When you look at recent Tamil cinema, there has been a dearth of solidly conceived villains, who are anything more than howling hooligans engaged in brawls and bloodshed. But, in Thuppaki and Kaththi, the villain is almost a cipher for the hero to overcome. The hero and villain rarely meet face to face and their interactions are mostly limited to phone calls. Murugadoss plots a reversal of Liam Neeson's famous 'I don't know who you are' monologue from Taken into a different context in Thuppaki, where the villain who has recently discovered the hero on his trail, delivers a iterated version of the same 'I will find you and kill you' monologue. The roles are virtually reversed as Murugadoss understands how the drama is transferred to his mystery villain, who sees himself as the hero of the story at the point when he is introduced in the film. To which a untethered Vijay responds, 'I am waiting,' which is of course a part of pop culture lexicon now. Murugadoss comes up with stylish gestures for his villains like the way he sets up the second introduction for Virat in Madharaasi, where he is shown taking down an entire floor full of security officers with the most minimal effort possible after taking push up's off his hospital bedside rooftop. You see Vidyut Jammwal getting as much appreciation from the crowd as the hero in that moment and sometimes even more. This is because Murugadoss is aware of how critical it is for a more than competent villain in building the myth of the hero even bigger. Even though Murugadoss also comes up with the most audacious villains on screen, he gives them solid backstories except for maybe S J Survah's habitual psychological madman who just wants to see the world burn. AR Murugadoss villains are born out of a particular problem or societal condition without repentance. Murugadoss villains have changed and shape shifted across his filmography and one can only hope to see the filmmaker use genius ways to present obstacles for the hero like return to form film Madharaasi showed us all. Less Sikander and more Madharaasi

Kimmel is back on ABC to big ratings, but some affiliates still refuse to air his show

New York: Jimmy Kimmel is back on his ABC latenight show, but it's still a mystery when — or if — viewers in cities such as Washington, Seattle and St. Louis will be able to see him again on their televisions. ABC stations owned by the Nexstar and Sinclair corporations took Kimmel off the air last week on the same day the network suspended him for comments that angered supporters of slain conservative activist Charlie Kirk. Those stations kept him off the air Tuesday, when ABC lifted the suspension.

The unusual dispute attracted the attention of US senators, who said they wanted to investigate the relationship between the affiliates and President Donald Trump's administration. Kimmel returned with no apologies, but in an emotional monologue where he appeared close to tears, the host said that he was not trying to joke about the assassination. He also paid tribute to Kirk's widow. And it got a large audience, with ABC reporting nearly 6.3 million people tuned in to the broadcast alone, despite the blackouts in many cities. As is often the case with late-night hosts' monologues, there was a larger audience online, with more than 15 million people watching Kimmel's opening remarks on YouTube by Wednesday evening. ABC says more than 26 million people watched Kimmel's return on social media, including YouTube.

Typically, he gets about 1.8 million viewers each night on television. The numbers released by ABC do not include viewership from streaming services. A spokesman for Nexstar said Wednesday that Kimmel will continue to be preempted from its stations while the company evaluates his show. Together, the Nexstar and Sinclair groups account for about a quarter of ABC's affiliates, many in smaller cities such as Nashville, Tennessee; Lubbock, Texas; or Topeka, Kansas. "We are engaged in productive discussions with executives at the (ABC parent) Walt Disney Co., with a focus on ensuring the program reflects and respects the diverse interests of the communities we serve," Nexstar said.

The dispute focused attention on the business relationships between television networks and the local stations that carry their programming. In the past, local stations occasionally balked at airing a network show, but it was usually an individual market or two worried about pushing boundaries in language or sexual content, said Ted Harbert, a former top executive at ABC and CBS. What's different this time is groups that have gobbled up multiple stations acting collectively on content for largely political reasons. "This is how much the country's political divisions have seeped their way into something that has been, for the last 50 or 75 years, a relatively orderly business," Harbert said.

Leadership of ownership groups is generally more conservative than the media and entertainment figures on the stations they broadcast, said Ken Basin, author of "The Business of Television." Both Sinclair, with conservative political content, and Nexstar have reason to curry favour with the Trump administration, he said. Nexstar is seeking regulatory approval for the purchase of a rival, he said."I worry that this is not going to be the only dispute of this nature in the years ahead," Basin said. It's possible that Disney could play hardball if negotiations on Kimmel's return drag on, such as threatening to withhold other ABC programming — even the "nuclear option" of football games. Its unclear how the affiliate agreements are worded. But Matt Dolgin, senior equity analyst at Morningstar Research Service, said he doubts the dispute reaches that point. The station groups have a far less diversified business portfolio



than Disney, and the expiration of affiliate agreements next year looms as a deadline, he said. They have few good options if they lose ABC programming. "From a business perspective, the best course on this issue (for Disney) is to stay above the fray," Dolgin said. "The dollars associated with this show are very low." As they climb, the stunning number of YouTube views of Kimmel's monologue serve to make television broadcasting less important, hurting the negotiating position of the stations. For the station groups, the biggest goal should be to negotiate their way out of this while finding a way to save face, he said. Sinclair initially took a strong stance, saying Kimmel would not return to its stations without apologising to Kirk's widow and donating money to Kirk's political organization. That's not likely to happen.Last week, Kimmel seemed to be in real danger of losing his show entirely until advocates for free speech protested, including many who cancelled subscriptions for Disney services. The backlash was stronger than they expected, stronger than I expected," Basin said. "There was a sense of despair within the industry that this was a canary in a coal mine' moment." Four Democratic senators said late Tuesday that they wanted to look into what happened with the station groups.

"If Nexstar or Sinclair traded the censorship of a critic of the administration for official acts by the Trump administration, your companies are not only complicit in an alarming trampling of free speech but also risk running afoul of anti-corruption law," Sens. Elizabeth Warren, Ed Markey Ron Wyden and Chris Van Hollen wrote to the companies.On Wednesday, another group of senators led by California Democrat Adam Schiff said they wanted to question FCC Chairman Brendan Carr about "implicit threats" made to Disney over Kimmel.In his monologue Tuesday. Kimmel tried to thread the needle between both sides in a raw political moment, and seemed to realise its difficulty. "I don't think what I'm going to say is going to make much of a difference," he said. "If you like me, you like me. If you don't, you don't. I have no illusions about changing anyone's mind." Within hours, many proved his point. Andrew Kolvet, a spokesperson for Turning Point USA, the organisation that Kirk founded that is now headed by his widow, posted on X that Kimmel's monologue was "not good enough".

We had to wait for months until the processed reels came back, and only during dubbing sessions could we actually see our work. Things changed much later. Now, after each shot, one can instantly review it and make corrections," he said. The actor further reflected on how the industry has transformed, especially after the OTT boom. "Today, Malayalam cinema holds a very important place in the film industry. We are now ready to produce big films for global audiences and generate larger revenues. Drishyam 1 was a huge success, and when we made Drishyam 2, it was released in multiple languages

and even sold to markets like China and Korea. Many Malayalam films are now being remade in Hindi and Telugu. It is a proud moment and also a great opportunity to keep creating strong content," he shared. Mohanlal also spoke about his association with filmmaker Privadarshan, with whom he has collaborated on nearly 50 films. "Over 90% of our films together have been superhits. Eventually, he remade my films in Hindi. Priyadarshan's first film was with me, and now his 100th will also be with me. That is something truly historic," he said with pride. Beyond cinema, the actor reflected on his stint as an honourary Colonel in the Territorial Army.
