Three killed in tipper lorry and scooter collision in Kamareddy

A devastating road accident occurred on National Highway 44 at Jangampally, Bhikkanur Mandal esulting in the tragic deaths of three individuals, including a young child, after a tipper collided with an electric scooter.

The incident happened when a tipper was reportedly travelling the wrong way and struck the scooter, which had four people aboard. Witnesses reported that a three-year-old boy, a woman, and an elderly man were pronounced dead at the scene. A six-month-old baby, who was also on the scooter, sustained critical injuries and has been transferred to Kamareddy Area Hospital for urgent medical care.

HRC orders action against misuse of govt, press, advocate titles

ECI bans exit polls for Jubilee Hills bye-election from Nov 6 to 11



Hyderabad, Oct.15 The Election Commission of India (ECI) has prohibited the conduct and publication of exit polls for the Jubilee Hills Assembly bye-election between November 6 and 11. The ban applies to all media platforms, including print, electronic, and social media. The ECI stated that any violation will invite strict action under Section 126A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, which deals with restrictions on conducting or disseminating exit poll results during the election period. Officials urged media houses, political parties, and individuals to adhere to the guidelines to ensure a free and fair electoral process.

BJP names Lankala Deepak as candidate for Jubilee Hills by-election



Hyderabad, Oct.15: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has formally announced Lankala Deepak Reddy as its candidate for the upcoming Jubilee Hills Assembly by-election in Telangana. The central leadership of the BJP has approved Deepak Reddy's nomination, with the party's State president set to issue the B Form on Wednesday.

In the 2023 Assembly elections, Deepak Reddy ran in the same constituency, receiving 25,866 votes, which represented a 14.11% share, ultimately finishing in third place. The state unit of the party identified three potential candidates—Deepak Reddy, Dr. Keerti Reddy, and V. Padma—and submitted this list to the central leadership five days ago. Deepak Reddy was selected as the party's final candidate. The Jubilee Hills by-election is scheduled for November 11 and the results will be announced on November 14.

BRS extends support to statewide bandh on Oct 18: KTR

Hyderabad, Oct.15 Leaders of various Backward Classes (BC) organisations, along with Rajya Sabha MP R. Krishnaiah, met Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) Working President K.T. Rama Rao (KTR) on Wednesday, seeking the party's support for the statewide bandh being organised by BC associations on October 18.

Senior leaders from the BRS also participated in the meeting, which witnessed an elaborate discussion on the issues concerning BC reservations and welfare.

During the meeting, KTR reiterated BRS's unwavering commitment to the cause of BCs and lambasted the Congress government for its lack of sincerity. "Chief Minister Revanth Reddy has no genuine concern for the BC community. The Congress made tall promises on BC welfare — from a ?1 lakh crore budget to a BC sub-plan — but not one has been implemented," he said. He said that BC reservations will never materialise under Revanth Reddy's leadership. "As long as he is in power, BCs will continue to be betrayed. The BRS will keep questioning and fighting until every promise made to BCs is fulfilled," he affirmed.

KTR reminded that the 42% reservation announced by the Congress was confined only to local body elections, whereas similar representation must be extended to education, employment, and all other sectors. "If 42% reservation is implemented across every field, lakhs of BC youth will benefit. BC associations must continue to demand their rightful share in all sectors — from government jobs to contracts," he asserted. The BRS working president accused the Congress of double standards and political deception. "On BC reservations, the Congress speaks in five different voices — through constitutional amendment, party declaration, ordinance, bill, and now saying it'll happen only if Rahul Gandhi becomes Prime Minister. This shows their complete lack of honesty," KTR said.

He stated that while the BRS is attempting to evoke sympathy to win the byelection, it must clarify who is accountable for the drug supply to local clubs and pubs. Arvind further claimed that the instances of fraudulent votes discovered in the Jubilee Hills constituency may have been registered during the previous BRS administration. He dismissed KT Rama Rao's claims of vote tampering by Congress as absurd, asserting that the BRS was the true pioneer of electoral fraud in Telangana.

Uttam directs collectors to ensure flawless execution of paddy procurement

Hyderabad, Oct.15: Telangana is preparing to undertake what officials described as the largest grain procurement operation in the country, with the state government directing district collectors and civil supplies officials to stay fully alert and ensure seamless coordination across all departments. Civil Supplies and Irrigation Minister N. Uttam Kumar Reddy and Agriculture Minister Tummala Nageshwar Rao chaired a high-level video conference on Kharif paddy procurement preparedness from the chambers of Chief Secretary S. Ramakrishna Rao at the Secretariat here on Wednesday.

Senior officials, including Civil Supplies Commissioner Stephen Ravindra, Agriculture secretary Surendra Mohan, Transport commissioner Raghunandan Rao, and several district collectors participated in the review. Addressing the meeting, Uttam Kumar Reddy said Telangana had created history by achieving a record paddy yield of 148.03 lakh metric tonnes, the highest ever in independent India, surpassing all previous production figures. "Telangana has emerged as the leading paddy-producing state in India, and this Kharif season marks an all-time record in both cultivation and procurement. The upcoming operation will be the largest grain procurement ever undertaken by any state or country," he said. The minister noted that the government would procure 80 lakh metric tonnes of paddy, equally divided between 40 lakh MT of fine (Sanna) and 40 lakh MT of coarse (Doddu) varieties. The paddy was cultivated over 66.8 lakh acres, and the total procurement value is estimated at Rs 22,000-23,000 crore.

Telangana has become synonymous with agricultural progress, and we will continue to strengthen this position," Uttam Kumar Reddy said. He instructed collectors to treat paddy procurement as a mission-mode operation and ensure that farmers face no hardship. "Officials at the field level must remain vigilant. No farmer should be made to wait for hours at procurement centres. Basic amenities such as water, shelter, and sanitation must be ensured at every location," he said. The minister emphasised the need for meticulous infrastructure planning. As of mid-October, 8,342 paddy procurement centres (PPCs) have been sanctioned across the state, including 4,259 through Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS), 3,517 through IKP groups, and 566 by other agencies.

HYDRA CLEARS ENCROACHMENTS; SAVES GOVT LAND WORTH Rs.139 CR



Hyderabad, Oct.15: The Hyderabad Disaster Response and Asset Protection Agency (HYDRA), established by the state government to protect government lands in the Hyderabad metropolitan region, has successfully reclaimed valuable land by cracking down on illegal encroachments.

Acting on public complaints received through its 'Prajavani' program, on Wednesday the Hydra officials removed illegal structures in Rajendranagar mandal of Rangareddy district. The operation led to the recovery of 19,878 square yards of government land valued at over Rs.139 crore, across four encroached parks in Jana Chaitanya Layout Phases I and II at Badvel-Upparapalli villages. Under the supervision of Hydra commissioner Ranganath, Hydra teams along with revenue and municipal officials have demolished unauthorized sheds and rooms constructed on the parks and immediately began 'fencing the reclaimed land' to prevent further encroachment. Commissioner Ranganath said Hydra had

received 48 complaints from the public earlier this week, which he personally reviewed and directed the officials to resolve promptly. He noted that encroachments were not limited to parks but also affected the roads, dead-end routes, and flood canals, leading to flooding and access issues in several colonies. He warned that strict action would be taken against anyone attempting illegal constructions in the future, reiterating Hydra's commitment to protecting public spaces and restoring natural water channels and government lands across Hyderabad.

CM TO UNVEIL TGSPCA WEBSITE & LOGO

Hyderabad, Oct.15 Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy will inaugurate the official website and logo of the newly constituted "Telangana State Police Complaints Authority (TGSPCA)" at his chambers in Dr. B. R. Ambedkar state secretariat here on Thursday at 2:45 PM.According to TGSPCA Chairman Justice Dr. B. Siva Sankara Rao, the Telangana government has established the State Police Complaints Authority along with two District Police Complaints Authorities for Hyderabad and Warangal regions, following directives from the Supreme Court. Although the authorities were constituted earlier in 2013 and rules framed in 2020, they remained non-functional until recently. In April 2025, the State appointed the Chairman and Members to these authorities.

India's global reset: Rebuilding ties with Canada, US and the West

India and Canada have agreed on an "ambitious oadmap" to restore and rebuild bilateral relations, which harply deteriorated following the killing of a Khalistani Sikh extremist in the North American country in 2023. This is a leasant surprise, as the then prime minister, Justin Frudeau's party, the Liberal Party, returned to power this rear. It may be recalled that Trudeau played a pivotal role n souring Indo-Canadian relations. The objective of the new roadmap is to advance "cooperation in various donains, including trade, investment, agriculture, science and technology, civil nuclear collaboration, artificial intellience, critical minerals, and energy," said External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar after meeting his Canadian counerpart Anita Anand in New Delhi. This should be seen as art of a major reset in India's engagement with the world: here is new urgency in boosting relations with other counries, especially the West. After months of bitterness over JS President Donald Trump's peevish remarks about Inlia, the two countries have also decided to hold trade neotiations this week. India has reportedly promised to imort US energy and gas as it aims to placate Washington's oncerns over the issue of Russian oil purchases. Trump's onciliatory tone in his statements has played a part in nsuring this. British Prime Minister Keir Starmer's recent visit should also be viewed in the same light. It has helped viden engagements between the two nations in critical reas such as trade, technology, defence, and security. His trip was preceded by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's risit to London in July, when the two countries signed a rucial comprehensive economic & trade agreement CETA) that is currently awaiting ratification.

India's Economy, Markets Show Resilience; Demand Revival Likely in 2H26: PL Capital



Hyderabad:PL Capital, one of India's most trusted financial services organizations, in its latest India Strategy Report titled "Holding Steady in Global Headwinds", cited that despite global headwinds such as heightened U.S. tariffs, H-1B visa fee hikes, and geopolitical volatility, India's economy and equity markets continue to demonstrate remarkable resilience. The report further highlights that with normal monsoons, a 100-basis point cut in interest rates, rationalisation of GST rates, and tax reductions announced in the FY26 Budget, the conditions are now conducive for a strong revival in consumption. Implementation of GST 2.0 is expected to further offset the impact of global tariffs, while the upcoming 8th Pay Commission in 2026 is likely to pro-

vide an additional boost to household spending, helping sustain economic momentum through FY27. It believes that the conditions are ripe for demand revival in 2H26 noting that consumer demand has seen a strong rebound from 22nd Sept, which is visible across auto and discretionary segments. Though PL Capital expect 2QFY26 numbers to be volatile due to GST transition and trade de-stocking in many industries. It expects strong demand trends in consumer staples, durables, apparel, footwear etc. in coming quarters. Auto has seen a big reset in GST rates and start of festival season has been strong, we expect strong growth in demand to sustain for both PV and 2W.It notes that GOI has unveiled strong commitment to invest behind Defense. Semiconductors, Ports, Dams, Nuclear Power etc. However, the incremental Govt push is likely to be limited as Govt capex is more than 3x since FY21. First five months have seen 43% higher capex outlay by GOI, and rest of the year will be flattish unless there is an incremental allocation by GOI. Revival of demand will likely increase private sector capacity utilization and increase private sector capex, which has been waiting on the sidelines.

India's current account: A structural surplus ex gold

India's current account dynamics have long been perceived through the lens of a persistent deficit, reflecting the economy's high import dependence on commodities like oil and gold. However, gold imports, unlike typical consumption goods, largely represent an asset or investment class not only within household savings portfolios but also central banks. While aggregate demand of Gold has not crossed the peak of 2010/2011 (~1000 tons), the buying by RBI and investment demand has been rising steadily. RBI did not add gold to its reserves between 2010 to 2018. However, it has been adding gold with addition of ~375 tons taking total reserves to ~880 tons by March 25.

Pawan's advice may be aimed at encouraging Vijay to consider an alliance with the BJP

Hyderabad: Pawan Kalyan reportedly phoned Tamizha Vetri Kazhagam (TVK) chief actor Vijay, cautioning him against contesting in elections alone without forming any alliances. According to sources, Pawan suggested that going solo could jeopardize Vijay's political future, potentially repeating the fate of Chiranjeevi when he launched PRP. The conversation highlights the high-stakes calculations involved in regional politics and the importance of strategic partnerships. Insiders suggest that Pawan's advice may be aimed at encouraging Vijay to consider an alliance with the BJP, By fostering alliances with established parties, new entrants can gain stronger footholds and wider visibility, which can be crucial in navigating the complex landscape of state and national politics.

Whether Pawan Kalyan's counsel to Vijay is the right strategy remains a subject of debate among political analysts and fans alike. However, history says that any party leader who keeps his party under a bigger party in the name of an alliance cannot become a Chief Minister. Alliances

For example, Chandrababu Naidu always became Chief Minister only with alliances, but he ensured that his major ally was always under him in the state, not above him. Similarly, since the BJP and AIADMK are already in an alliance in Tamil Nadu, if Vijay also joins them, in the case of victory, he can at most become Deputy Chief Minister but not Chief Minister, as that position would go to the AIADMK. Thus, if Pawan Kalyan's advice to Vijay is true, it may lead him toward the Deputy CM post, but never the CM position, making him number two in the alliance government, just like Pawan Kalyan himself.



Hit job done, killer calls conspirator from crime scene: How police cracked Malad businessman's murder

When the Charkop police began investigating the recent murder of a Malad-based businessman, Mohammad Ayub Sayyed, what initially proved challenging for them was that the CCTV footage from the crime spot showed two assailants, but their identities were unknown. However, there was one visual showing one of the assailants making a phone call, and the police latched on to that opportunity and traced the accused, including the businessman's son and his business partner. Ayub Sayyed, 69, who lived in Malad with his family, owned a business in metals and operated factories in Vasai and Charkop, located in the Kandivali area. He had two sons; the elder son managed the Vasai factory, while the younger son assisted his father at the Charkop factory.

The murder occurred on September 21, when two assailants allegedly entered the Charkop office around 11.30 am and remained there for more than half an hour. They allegedly stabbed Ayub multiple times in the abdomen, back, and hands with sharp weapons before fleeing the scene. The CCTV footage showed the killers exiting the factory emptyhanded after the murder. The police later recovered the bag containing the sharp weapons, which had been hidden in a water tank on the premises. Many people were called for an inquiry. A significant lead emerged from CCTV footage that showed the assailant making a call after the murder.

This raised suspicions about the identity of the person he was calling, suggesting that he was informing the person behind the plot, according to an officer from the Charkop police station. The police began examining the phone call records associated with the victim. Suspicion fell on the business partner, Shanu Mushtaq Chaudhary, 40, when investigators discovered that he allegedly received a phone call at the same time the assailant was seen making a call on the CCTV footage shortly after the murder, according to a police officer. "The timing of the call was our main focus, and as soon as it aligned, we contacted Chaudahry to inquire about the caller's identity. Chaudahry told us that he recognised the person who called and that the call was workrelated. A police team quickly moved in to apprehend the man based on the technical evidence. They successfully identified and captured Mohammad Khairul Islam Qadir Ali, 27, in the Govandi area," said a senior officer involved in the probe. During the interrogation, Khairul reportedly admitted that Chaudhary was the main conspirator in the murder. He claimed that Chaudhary contracted the killing for Rs 6.5 lakh and paid Rs 1 lakh in advance two weeks prior, according to the officer. Chaudhary's interrogation revealed that Ayub's younger son, Hamid Ayub Sayyed, 41, was also part of the murder plot due to a property dispute with his father, added the officer. The Charkop police then arrested Chaudhary, Hamid, Khairul and his associate on murder charges. During separate interrogations, Chaudhary and Hamid admitted to their roles in the crime, the police said. Chaudhary claimed he had invested nearly Rs 1 crore in partnership with Ayub, but consistently showed losses in the business and did not receive any profits. Recently, Ayub had Chaudhary pay Rs 8 lakh for machinery repairs, he said. When Chaudhary asked about the profits, Ayub abused him, according to his statement to the police. As for Hamid, he was upset that his father had only given him a flat and not the Charkop factory, the police said. "We arrested Hamid Ayub Sayyed, 41, son of the deceased; Shanu Mushtaq Chaudhary, 40, a betel nut dealer; and Mohammad Khairul Islam Qadir Ali, 27, and Khairul's associate. Hamid and Shanu had planned to eliminate the victim a month ago," said an officer of the Charkop police station. The police said that in the excitement of committing the contract killing, the assailant forgot he was under CCTV surveillance and made a phone call to the conspirator demanding payment, which proved decisive in solving the case.

Man held with drugs on NYE 2020 sentenced to 12 yrs in jail

A special court sentenced a man to 12 years in jail along with fine of Rs 1.37 lakh for the possession of over 200 grams of cocaine. Honare Igwe Gwahi, an Ivory Coast national, was found guilty under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, for possession of a commercial quantity of drugs. According to submissions made before the court, on December 31, 2020, the Anti-Narcotics Cell had carried out checks for suspected sale of drugs since it was New Year's Eve. On January 1, 2021, around 1.20am, the department claimed its officers saw a man sitting in a

Nano car in Santacruz.

The police claimed they asked him his name and sought his identification documents, and the man attempted to escape in his car. He was stopped and asked to step out. He had a shoulder bag and when confronted, the man told the police that it had cocaine. During the trial, the police claimed that independent witnesses were then called and a search was carried out as per procedure laid down under the NDPS Act. The accused through his lawyers had claimed that the procedure was not followed. The court, however. said that it was relying on the chemical analyser's report which showed that the drug seized from the accused was cocaine and the 202 grams of the drug found in his possession, fell in the category of a commercial quantity of drug, which has higher punishment. During the probe, police also found that the accused's valid visa had expired in 2018 and was living in the country illegally thereafter. He was also found guilty under the Foreigners Act and sentenced to three /ears in iail. While the accused had submitted that he can be exempted under provisions where members of Commonwealth countries are given certain exemptions, the court ruled that Ivory Coast is not a Commonwealth country Gwahi was sentenced to the punishment on September 23 and the detailed order was made available on Wednesday

Gujarat HC dismisses former judge's plea: 'Single adverse remark or doubtful integrity enough to justify compulsory retirement'

Stating that even a "single uncommunicated adverse remark" in a service record or "doubtful integrity" is enough to retire a judicial officer in public interest, the Gujarat High Court on Tuesday dismissed a petition filed by former adhoc sessions judge J K Acharya, who was among the 18 judges made to compulsorily retire in November 2016. Acharya was serving as ad-hoc Additional District Judge at Nadiad in Kheda. He had challenged a July 18, 2016 notification of the state's Legal department of Gujarat, which was based on a report of a committee of three High Court judges constituted to scrutinise the performance and evaluation of the judicial officers.

A division bench of Justice AS Supehia and Justice LS Pirzada, in its order of Tuesday, said, "An order of compulsory/premature retirement in public interest or in the interest of administration is not a punishment. The compliance of principles of natural justice is not necessary... A single uncommunicated adverse remark in the entire service record, or a doubtful integrity is enough to retire a Judicial Officer compulsorily in the public interest. Any promotion or grant of a higher pay-scale/selection grade cannot have any impact on the order of compulsory retirement."In its report dated March 23, 2016, the committee had opined that 18 judicial officers, after considering their service records, such as Annual Confidential Report, disposal, complaints, vigilance complaints, and departmental inquiry, among others, are required to be retired prematurely in pub-

lic interest. The order states that the committee recom-

mended the Gujarat government to "prematurely retire 18 Judicial Officers by giving three months' pay in lieu of notice", in "effective implementation of the provision of Rule 21 of the Rules of 2005". The division bench held that the decision reflected the "collective wisdom of the judges". "... An opinion formed by the High Court cannot be interfered with on the ground that it is formed without any material," the order states. The court ruled that it "cannot delve into the wisdom of the Full Court of the High Court, which has formed its opinion after assessing and evaluating multiple factors of the service record of the petitioner, more particularly in wake of the fact that the petitioner has not alleged patent illegality or mala fide in the decision-making process adopted by the High Court."

India tops medals tally at ISSF Junior World Cup

Hyderabad: India capped off a successful week at the ISSF Junior World Cup Rifle/Pistol/Shotgun on Wednesday as the leading nation on the medals table, adding a silver in the junior women's 25m pistol through Tejaswani Singh, who won gold at the Sub Junior World Cup, on the final day of the competition, at Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Range in Delhi.Individual Neutral Athlete Aleksandra Tikhonova claimed the junior women's 25m pistol gold, while Czechia's Tereza Zaviskova and Tomas Nantl edged compatriots Lea Kucerova and Kamil Bednar to win the Trap mixed team junior gold. Tikhonova was steady from the start in the 25m Pistol Women Junior final, hitting 33 to secure gold. Tejaswani, who had dominated the qualification with 580-17x, kept pace but finished with silver on 30, while Italian athlete Alessandra Fait completed the podium with 28. Among other Indians in the final, Naamya Kapoor (21) finished fourth, and Riya Shirish Thatte (16) was fifth. Scolded for playing games on mobile, Delhi boy dies by suicide

A 15-year-old boy in Delhi died by suicide, allegedly after he was scolded by his elder sister for playing games on her mobile phone, the Delhi Police said. The incident took place in Delhi's Adarsh Nagar area on Wednesday. The police identified the deceased as Adarsh, 15, the son of Anil Kumar Jha, who works at an export company in

Sonepat. According to the police, the incident came to light after Jha, who stays in the Lal Bagh area, called the local police station."On enquiry, we found that the boy attempted suicide after an argument with his elder sister," Bhisham Singh, Deputy Commissioner of Police, North West, said. Adarsh's sister allegedly spotted him playing games on her mobile phone. "She scolded him for playing games and not paying attention to his studies," Singh said. Adarsh was rushed to a hospital but died during treatment, the police said.A case was registered under Section 194 (Police to enquire and report on suicide) of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita. Following a post-mortem examination, Adarsh's body was handed over to the family, the police said. 'Equality is necessary': On Ashok Vijayadashami, 76 Dalits convert to Buddhism in Ahmedabad's Kankaria

On Ashok Vijayadashami, Thursday, 76 Dalits from various parts of Gujarat embraced Buddhism at a function held at a Buddha Vihar in Kankaria area of Ahmedabad city. Those who converted to Buddhism are from various parts of Gujarat like Gandhinagar, Junagadh, Kheda, Mehsana and Ahmedabad. The function was organised by Gujarat Buddhist Academy (GBA) in association with two other organisations from Ahmedabad. General Secretary of GBA Ramesh Banker said that the function took place peacefully, "complying with all the legal rules for conversion".

The 76 Dalits were given diksha by Bhante Pragna Ratna Thero from Porbandar. Those who converted from Hinduism took the 22 vows which were taken by Dr B R Ambedkar while renouncing Hinduism and converting to Buddhism in 1956. Chandrika Jadav (48), a social worker from Kadi in Mehsana district, is one of those who converted to Buddhism at the function. She was joined by her husband Jitendra and brother-in-law Dharmesh. Speaking with The Indian Express, she said, "People talk about Hinduism, but we (Dalits) are denied entry in temples (at many places) and do not get recognition. So, what is the purpose of staying in such a religion? Lord Buddha has given the right of equality to everyone and so it is necessary to go to a religion where there is equality. We have become enlightened that our original place is in Buddhism, and so we are returning to that place." Pravin Kumar Bagda (40) came from Junagadh to convert along with his family: his wife Sonal, 13-year-old son and three-year-old daughter. Bagda works as a senior research assistant at an agriculture university.

Bagda said, "I have been in Hinduism till now, but I have not experienced the virtues of equality, brotherhood and independence in the true sense. I have studied Buddhism in detail and then decided to take diksha." He went on, "I have seen discrimination in offices so many times.



People behave to be good just superficially, but are full of resentment and hatred for us (Dalits) from within. Those sitting in senior positions, they do not allow us to go up. They make every effort to ensure that we do not reach higher positions." Jashumati Maheta (62), from Shahibaug area of Ahmedabad city, said that she decided to convert to Buddhism owing to discrimination that her husband faced in his job in a bank. "My husband has already embraced Buddhism. He did so because he faced a lot of discrimination in his job. He faced a lot of difficulties. And so, I too decided to convert. I also decided to convert because Buddhism places a lot of importance on building good character. If a man nurtures good character, it definitely brings changes in him, especially towards women. Buddhism also gives a lot of importance to women and their independence and progress," Maheta said. Harshida Maurya (40) from Meghaninagar too converted to Buddhism for "spiritual development, equality and brotherhood"."I have felt that Dalits are not considered as Hindus in Hinduism. They do not get entry in temples, are beaten up for sitting on a horse or keeping a moustache or for carrying out marriage procession. Dalits do not get houses in certain areas. So, what is

Deshmukh, through advocate Rahul Arote, argued that the case was "politically motivated" and had "baseless" charges. Pending a hearing on his plea, he sought a stay on the investigation. The plea claimed that while the charges claimed that Deshmukh was involved in manhandling police officers who intervened, there was no mention of assault or obstruction of duty to justify charges brought under section 132 (assault or criminal force to deter public ser-

Punjab Anganwadi Employees Union president Hargobind Kaur alleged that despite repeated reminders, the honorarium component provided by the Centre has not been released for six months. Punjab Anganwadi Employees Union president Hargobind Kaur alleged that despite repeated reminders, the honorarium component provided by the Centre has not been released for six months. Over 50.000 anganwadi workers and helpers working in nearly 27,000 centres across Punjab have not received their honorarium for the past six months. The workers get ?11,000 per month, of which ?4,500 is the honorarium component. This includes ?3,000 from the Centre and ?1,500 from the state government. However, since April, this amount has not been credited into their accounts, union leaders alleged. Fed up with the delay, the childcare workers staged a massive protest outside the office of the Social Security Department in Chandigarh on Wednesday.

Union members said the deputy director of the Social Security Department had sought two to three days to resolve the issue, after which they would chalk out their next course of action. They said that if the issue is not resolved,

they would restrict the entry of Social Security Minister Dr Baljit Kaur to villages. Punjab Anganwadi Employees Union president Hargobind Kaur alleged that despite repeated reminders, the honorarium component provided by the Centre has not been released for six months. "For the last two months, we have been in talks with the department, but the officials are only buying time. On September 17, we even served notice for a protest. Yet till today, nothing has been credited to our accounts," Hargobind Kaur said. She added that while the workers continue to receive around ?6,500 per month from the state government for other social security works, the honorarium remains unpaid. "Already the monthly payout is the bare minimum, and now a major chunk is being withheld. Zelenskyy, UN atomic agency head warn of heightened risk at huge Ukrainian nuclear plant

Kyiv: Ukraine's president and the UN nuclear agency head are sounding the alarm about increased safety risks at the Russia-occupied Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant in southern Ukraine, which lost its external power supply more than a week ago as the war raged around it. Emergency diesel generators are providing power for crucial cooling systems for the facility's six shutdown reactors and spent fuel, and there is no immediate danger to Europe's biggest nuclear plant, according to International Atomic Energy Agency Director-General Rafael Mariano Grossi. But "it is clearly not a sustainable situation in terms of nuclear safety," he said. The backup generators have never needed to run for so long, according to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy.

"The generators and the plant were not designed for this," Zelenskyy said late Tuesday, describing the situation as "critical." Zaporizhzhia is one of the 10 biggest nuclear plants in the world, and its fate amid the fighting has caused fears of a potential nuclear catastrophe. Russian forces seized it days after the full-scale invasion of neighbouring Ukraine began on Feb. 24, 2022. The tension around the nuclear plant's safety has added to broader concerns about

the course of the war, which shows no signs of ending after a US-led effort this year to stop the fighting came to nothing. European leaders, spooked by violations of their airspace by unidentified drones and Russian warplanes, gathered Wednesday in Denmark for two summits centred on security, defence and the war in Ukraine. Zelenskyy blamed Russian artillery for cutting the power line to the Zaporizhzhia plant, but Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said it was Ukrainian shelling. Peskov told reporters on Wednesday that it was "stupid to accuse the Russian side of shelling the plant it controls." The Vienna-based IAEA has been walking a tightrope in the war, eager to maintain access to nuclear facilities and issuing warnings about the dangers without angering either side. Ukraine has four nuclear plants, though Zaporizhzhia is the only one in Russian hands. Grossi said that Zaporizhzhia's emergency generators were coping with the extra strain so far. "The current status of the reactor units and spent fuel is stable as long as the emergency diesel generators are able to provide sufficient power to maintain essential safety-related functions and cooling," he said in a statement late Tuesday. An IAEA team at the plant reported that it has fuel reserves ensuring the generators can operate for more than 10 days, with regular off-site supplies maintaining this level."Nevertheless, it is extremely important that off-site power is restored," Grossi said, adding that he was in touch with Russian and Ukrainian officials about how to swiftly reconnect the plant to the grid. As Russia's invasion churns across the Ukrainian countryside, the Zaporizhzhia facility has repeatedly been caught in the crossfire. It lost its offsite power for the 10th time during the war on Sept. 23, when its only remaining power line was damaged by military activity about 11/2 kilometres (a mile) from the plant, the IAEA statement said. Eight emergency diesel generators are operating, with nine additional units in standby mode and three in maintenance, according to the IAEA. It said that over the past week, the plant has been alternating those in use and servicing idle generators in an effort to ensure con-

Three dead in Manchester synagogue 'terrorist' attack, including suspect: U.K. police; two arrests made

Three people were killed on Thursday (October 2, 2025) following an attack at a synagogue in Manchester, including the suspected perpetrator, who was shot by the United Kingdom police. There was no ongoing risk to the public following the incident, the police added. Two people have been arrested in connection with the attack so far.

The incident took place as people gathered at the synagogue on Yom Kippur, the day of atonement and the most solemn day in the Jewish calendar. The attack, which left two dead and three seriously wounded, had been declared a "terrorist incident", added Laurence Taylor, assistant commissioner in counterterrorism policing at London's Metropolitan Police force. In a series of posts on X, Greater Manchester Police said they were called to the Heaton Park Hebrew Congregation Synagogue in Crumpsall shortly after 9:30 am by a member of the public, who said he had witnessed a car being driven toward members of the public and that one man had been stabbed. Shots were fired by firearms officers minutes later, police said. "One man has been shot, believed to be the offender," it added.

Police had "declared Plato," the national code-word used by police and emergency services when responding to a "marauding terror attack." That does not mean it has been declared a terrorist incident.Prime Minister Keir Starmer said he was appalled by the attack and additional police officers would be deployed at synagogues across the U.K.. He was flying home early from a summit of European leaders in Copenhagen, Denmark, to chair a meeting of the government's emergency committee. "The fact that this has taken place on Yom Kippur, the holiest day in the Jewish calendar, makes it all the more horrific," Mr. Starmer said on the X platform. Dave Rich of the Community Secu-



rity Trust, a charity that monitors antisemitism in the UK. said Yom Kippur is the holiest day of the Jewish year. "It's a very solemn day and synagogues across the country will be full throughout the day," he said. He said there is "always a significant security operation in place" between police and the trust across the Jewish community on all major Jewish festivals. Manchester was the site of Britain's deadliest attack in recent years, the 2017 suicide bombing at an Ariana Grande concert that killed 22 peopleLondon Police boost patrols near synagoguesPolice said on Thursday (October 2, 2025) it had deployed additional officers around synagogues and Jewish community sites in London, following a deadly attack at a synagogue in Manchester earlier in the day.London's Metropolitan Police said there was no indication of an increased threat to the capital but had taken precautionary measures. "While there is nothing to suggest an increased threat to London, we have deployed additional resources to the areas around synagogues, other Jewish community venues and in those boroughs with significant Jewish populations," it said in a post on X.

Dubai: Yemen's Houthi rebels early Wednesday claimed the attack that left a Dutch-flagged cargo ship ablaze and adrift in the Gulf of Aden, underlined the range of their weaponry and their campaign targeting shipping over the Israel-Hamas war. The attack Monday on the Minervagracht was the most serious assault in months by the Iranian-backed Houthis in the Gulf of Aden, which is some distance from the Red Sea where they have sunk four vessels since November 2023. The attack also comes as Israel engages in a new ground offensive targeting Gaza City as efforts to reach a ceasefire again hang in the balance.

Meanwhile, the Mideast also remains on edge after the United Nations reimposed sanctions on Iran over its nuclear programme. The Houthis separately threatened to

"employ all means and instruments available" to target several American oil firms. The Houthis fired a cruise missile that targeted and struck the Minervagracht, Houthi military spokesman Brig Gen Yahya Saree said. Saree accused the the ship's owners, Amsterdam-based Spliethoff, of violating "the entry ban to the ports of occupied Palestine."

Initially, the US Navy-overseen Joint Maritime Infor-

mation Centre said the Minervagracht had no ties to Israel, but a note Tuesday said the centre was "reviewing vessel affiliations for possible links to Israel."The attack wounded two mariners on board the Minervagracht, whose 19-member crew hailed from the Philippines, Russia, Sri Lanka and Ukraine. They were forced to evacuate the ship after the strike inflicted substantial damage. A European naval force operating in the region, known as Operation Aspides, said on Tuesday the Minervagracht was on fire and adrift after the crew's rescue. The Houthis have launched missile and drone attacks on over 100 ships and on Israel in response to the war in Gaza, saying they were acting in solidarity with the Palestinians. However, some of the group's targets have had tenuous links or no connections at all to Israel. The Houthi attack widens the area of the rebels' recent assaults, as the last recorded attack on a commercial vessel in the Gulf of Aden before the Minervagracht came in August 2024. Their attacks over the past two years have upended shipping in the Red Sea, through which about US\$ 1 trillion of goods passed each year before the war. The Houthis stopped their attacks on shipping and Israel itself during a brief ceasefire in the war. They later became the target of an intense weekslong campaign of airstrikes ordered by US President Donald Trump before he declared a ceasefire had been reached with the rebels. The Houthi campaign against shipping has killed at least eight mariners and seen four ships sunk. Meanwhile on Wednesday, the Houthis said they had levied sanctions against multiple American oil companies, including Chevron Corp, ConocoPhillips and Exxon Mobil Corp, as well as individuals and two ships. The rebels in the past have issued such designations before launching attacks.

'Brings no benefit to Palestinian people': Italy's PM Meloni again criticises Gaza flotilla; 22 Italians held



Italy said Thursday (October 2, 2025) that Israel had detained 22 Italians from an aid flotilla, as Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni repeated her criticism of their attempt to reach Gaza."Obviously we will do everything we can to ensure these people can return to Italy as soon as possible," Ms. Meloni told reporters at a European Union meeting in Denmark.But she added that "I continue to believe that all this brings no benefit to the Palestinian people".

Earlier, Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani told parliament that Israel had reportedly detained 22 Italians who were, as far as he knew, in good condition." I am relieved to note that

the rules of engagement have been respected and that, up to this point, no acts of violence or complications have been recorded in the operation carried out by the Israeli forces, he said. Two Italian members of parliament and two Italian members of the European Parliament participated in the Global Sumud Flotilla, which aims to break Israel's siege of Gaza.On Wednesday (October 1), the Israeli navy began intercepting vessels in the flotilla after warning the activists against entering waters it says fall under its blockade. In a statement, the flotilla organisers branded the interceptions as "illegal" since they were traversing international waters.Mr. Tajani said the activists would be sent to Europe on charter planes from as early as Friday (October 3). Thousands of protesters gathered in Rome and Naples on Wednesday (October 1) evening in solidarity with the flotilla, while Italian trade unions have called for a general strike on Friday (October 3). "Israel is violating international law. It is time to block everything," said the USB union. Ms. Meloni, the head of a hard-right government, had previously called the flotilla a "dangerous, irresponsible" initiative, even while Italy sent a navy frigate to provide assistance.On Tuesday (September 29), the premier urged the flotilla to stop to avoid jeopardising US President Donald Trump's plan to end the Israel-Hamas war.

Indian-origin couple 'deliberately starved' 3-yr-old daughter to death, UK court told

London: An Indian-origin couple who were charged with the murder of their three-year-old daughter nearly two years ago by the Metropolitan Police have been accused of "deliberately starving" the toddler at a court hearing in London.Manpreet Jatana, 34, and Jaskiret Singh Uppal, 36, appeared at the Old Bailey criminal court on Tuesday, charged with the murder of Penelope Chandrie. The couple is additionally charged with manslaughter, causing or allowing the death of a child, and abandoning a child or causing them unnecessary suffering or injury, according to a court report in The Daily Telegraph.

Judge Lynn Tayton has remanded both to custody until the next hearing on December 16, when they will enter their pleas of guilty or not guilty to determine if the case progresses towards sentencing or a jury trial. The newspaper reported that the prosecution claims that Jatana and Uppal had mistreated their daughter over an "extended period of time" and "deliberately starved" her, leading to her death. The family's vegetarian diet is said to have mainly consisted of yoghurt, lentils and butter, and police officers also found their home in west London to be in poor condition. Police found Penelope's "very emaciated" body wrapped in a sheet in December 2023, the court was told. An examination of her body found the cause of death was



malnutrition.Pathological findings indicated "starvation over a prolonged period of many months culminating in fatal ketoacidosis", the prosecution was quoted as saying.Earlier, the Met Police had said that London's emergency services were called to a residential address on Pennine Way in Hayes on the evening of December 17, 2023, where the child was found deceased.The child's death remained under investigation over the years until Jatana and Uppal were arrested and charged last month."Following consultation with the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS), both people have been charged with murder in connection with the girl's death," the police said at the time.

India clinches another 1-2 in javelin at Para Worlds as Sandip Sargar wins F44 gold

Hyderabad: Another day, another 1-2 finish for India in javelin at the ongoing IndianOil New Delhi 2025 World Para Athletics Championships at Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium in New Delhi.

After Rinku and Sundar Singh Gurjar clinched gold and silver in the F46 category on Monday, it was Sandip Sanjay Sargar and Sandeep Chaudhary who emulated them in the F44 category on Tuesday. Sargar admitted that Rinku and Gurjar's performance was at the back of his mind and revealed he was in the stands watching their glory unfold.

"I was here yesterday to get the hang of the whole thing — the atmosphere, the people shouting encouragement. That helped me today," said the Maharashtra athlete after clinching gold. Sargar matched his personal best with a throw of 62.82m in his fifth attempt, though he had already taken the lead with a 62.68m throw earlier. It was Sandeep Chaudhary of Rajasthan who set the tone with an opening throw of 62.33m, later bettering it to 62.67m. But Sargar proved too strong in the final round. Heavy afternoon showers brought down temperatures considerably. While the weather offered relief to spectators, it posed a challenge for Sargar.

"Rain and cool weather didn't help me. I could have done better. Warm weather helps loosen up the muscles," said Sargar, who trains at SAI Sonepat and is part of the TOPS Core group. Draped in the tricolour, Sargar remained modest. "I was sure there would be a medal for me. Winning it for your country is a great feeling," he said. Interestingly, while the cold impacted Sargar, it played



to Chaudhary's advantage. A gold medallist in the Dubai and Kobe World Championships in 2019 and 2024 respectively (in the F64 category), Chaudhary credited the Bengaluru-like weather for his performance. "I trained in Bengaluru and the temperature here was similar. I guess it worked in my favour. I'm very happy to win a medal for the country," he said. Sargar's gold was India's third of the championship. Not long after, Sumit added a fourth in the F64 category. On Monday, Rinku's family and friends had turned up in large numbers, making a three-hour journey from their village in Rohtak. Their presence, he admitted, was a huge motivator. Sargar, however, had no such support in the stands. "There was no one in the stands — no family or friends. But I was still motivated to do well," said the shy athlete, who once worked as a Zomato delivery boy in Pune.

Taiwan says 'will not agree' to making 50% of its chips in U.S.

Taiwan "will not agree" to making 50% of its semiconductors in the United States, the island's lead tariff negotiator said Wednesday, as Washington pressures Taipei to produce more chips on U.S. soil. Vice Premier Cheng Lichiun's remarks came after U.S. Secretary of Commerce Howard Lutnick said he had proposed to Taiwan a 50-50 split in chip production."I want to clarify that this is the US's idea. Our negotiation team has never made a 50-50 commitment to a chip split," Ms. Cheng told reporters in Taipei. "Please be rest assured that we did not discuss this issue this time, and we will not agree to such a condition," she said.Ms. Cheng spoke after returning from Washington where she said negotiations over U.S. tariffs on Taiwanese shipments "made some progress". Taiwan is struggling to finalise a tariff deal with Washington, after President Donald Trump's administration imposed a temporary 20% levy that has alarmed the island's manufacturers.

Mr. Trump has also threatened to put a "fairly substantial tariff" on semiconductors coming into the country. Soaring demand for AI-related technology has fuelled Taiwan's trade surplus with the United States — and put it in Mr. Trump's crosshairs. More than 70% of the island's exports to the United States are information and communications technology, which includes chips, the cabinet said in a statement on Wednesday. In a bid to avoid the tariffs, Taipei has pledged to increase investment in the United States, buy more of its energy and increase its own defence spending to more than three percent of gross domes-



tic product. Taiwan produces more than half of the world's semiconductors and nearly all of the high-end ones.

The concentration of chip manufacturing in Taiwan has long been seen as a "silicon shield" protecting it from an invasion or blockade by China, which claims it as part of its territory — and an incentive for the United States to defend it. In an interview with NewsNation broadcast over the weekend, Mr. Lutnick said having 50% of Taiwan's chip production in the United States would ensure "we have the capacity to do what we need to do if we need to do it". "That has been the conversation we've had with Taiwan, that you have to understand that it's vital for you to have us produce 50%," he said. "Our goal is to get to 40% market share, and maybe 50% market share, of producing the chips and the wafers, you know the semiconductors we need for American consumption, that's our objective."

Jane Goodall: the scientist who gave chimps names, not numbers



Jane Goodall, a primatologist and ethologist known worldwide for chronicling the life of chimpanzees in East Africa, died on October 1 at the age of 91. Goodall died of natural causes in Los Angeles while on a speaking tour of the U.S., a statement from the Jane Goodall Institute said. Goodall's films and books reshaped primatology and public understanding alike. In her later years, she became a champion of conservation and climate action. She was honoured as a Dame in 2003 and with the U.S. Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2025. Born in London in 1934, Goodall grew fascinated by animals after reading books such as Tarzan and The Story of Dr. Doolittle. She was also gifted a stuffed toy chimpanzee, named Jubilee, by her father. In her memoir Reason for Hope: A Spiritual Journey (1999), she wrote, "Some people were horrified by Jubilee, thinking he would frighten me and give me nightmares. But I loved him, and he is still with me today — nearly 60 years later."

When she was in her mid-20s, Goodall travelled to Kenya. She met the noted archaeologist Louis Leakey, who later sent her to Gombe. In 1960, despite having no formal scientific training, Goodall began her landmark studies, documenting tool use, social bonds, and conflict among chimpanzees in the Gombe Stream Chimpanzee Reserve (now Gombe Stream National Park). At a time when primatology prized controlled experiments and short field visits, Goodall settled in for long periods, recording daily activities, interactions, and individual differences among the primates. Her immersion yielded discoveries to alter the boundaries of what 'separated' humans from animals. Goodall's research was supported by the National Geographic Society. In 1963, the National Geographic magazinepublished a 37-page feature on her studies, which brought global attention to her work. The article also carried visuals by a Dutch photographer named Hugo van Lawick, who Goodall married the following year. Three years later, she gave birth to Hugo Eric Louis van Lawick, her only child, and nicknamed him Grub. She later divorced van Lawick and married Derek Bryceson, the director of Tanzania's national parks. In Gombe, Goodall spent months habituating the chimpanzees to her presence, slowly mitigating their fear until they allowed her to observe them up close. This patience led to one of her first landmark findings: that chimpanzees fashioned and used tools to extract termites from mounds. In 1964, Nature published her observation, shattering prevailing assumptions that tool use was uniquely human. Among the several challenges she faced on the field, Goodall also mentioned being a woman as an important one in several interviews. "I had no training, I had no degree — and I was female! Women didn't do that kind of thing in those days," Goodall said. She often credited her mother Vanne for providing both emotional and practical support to her, especially during the early days of her work. In later years, several primatologists, including Dian Fossey and Birute Galdikas, publicly credited Goodall for opening doors for women in the field. In 1965, Goodall earned her Ph.D. in ethology from the University of Cambridge, becoming one of the very few people to be admitted to the programme without first having an undergraduate degree. Her own way'

Goodall's career has often been described as transformative for primatology and for the ways in which her science approached the place of animals in human understanding. There are also good reasons why her work is celebrated beyond the academy: they are rooted in her long-term observations, reshaping of scientific conventions, and later, conservation and education efforts. In the 1970s, Goodall documented what came to be called the 'Gombe

Chimpanzee War': one community split into factions and engaged in years of violent conflict. Some observers found the revelation that chimpanzees could form coalitions and wage attacks unsettling because it undermined assumptions of their peacefulness. Yet Goodall also recorded extensive practices of reconciliation and grooming - a documentation virtuous in its honesty for neither idealising nor demonising chimpanzees but revealing their full social repertoire. Goodall's ability to communicate her findings to broad audiences has often been seen as a scientific virtue. not merely a rhetorical flourish. Her books, such as My Friends, the Wild Chimpanzees (1967), In the Shadow of Man (1971), and Through a Window (1990), and films helped broaden public support for conservation and raised funds for research. Her later decades were marked by conservation initiatives, including the Jane Goodall Institute, founded 1977, and the Roots & Shoots programme in 1991. These institutions fostered education, habitat protection, and youth engagement in dozens of countries. Few figures in 20th century science have enjoyed the cultural stature according to Goodall. Yet the very qualities that made Goodall an icon have also made her a focal point of scholarly critique. Anthropologists, historians of science, and other primatologists have repeatedly debated what is endangered when scientific observation is blended with (human) narratives and activism.Perhaps the most enduring criticism concerns Goodall's use of names, personalities, and even 'moods' to describe the chimpanzees she observed. Unlike the numbering conventions her contemporaries preferred, she bestowed individuals with names such as "David Greybeard" and "Flo". For critics, this anthropomorphic practice blurred the line between human and non-human categories. In 2016, the historian Etienne Benson traced how her choice risked smuggling human traits into ethological science. "Jane violated a scientific taboo by naming the chimpanzees she recognised rather than assigning them numbers," Galdikas recalled in Reflections of Eden (1995). "Part of the reason Jane did this was practical: names are easier to remember. But she also felt that ... numbering chimpanzees robbed them of their individuality. ... From the beginning, Jane was accused of anthropomorphising the chimpanzees of Gombe, treating them like family members or pets. The not-so-hidden message was that Jane was a typically sen-

Goodall was also a jet-setting advocate for conservation and animal rights, drawing fire from those who believed her activism sometimes exceeded her disciplinary authority. The Genetic Literacy Project for instance challenged her opposition to genetic modification, suggesting her authority as a primatologist had been repurposed for domains where Goodall was evidently not an expert. The 2013 plagiarism allegations surrounding Goodall's 2013 book Seeds of Hope, later acknowledged and corrected, fed into a narrative that her iconic status shielded her from the standards expected of less celebrated scholars. In fact the critiques taken together were less a dismissal of Goodall's contributions than a collective insistence that her fame shouldn't insulate her from scrutiny. To name, narrate, provision, and advocate is to introduce values and judgments into science, whether or not Goodall admitted that, and her career itself has demonstrated the power of such moves — yet it also demonstrated why science requires constant vigilance. Reflecting on her legacy is thus to see in one career both the promise and the perils of expanding science's boundaries. As Galdikas wrote, "If you don't immerse yourself in your subjects' world, you only gather facts and figures, a computerised image; if you do become involved, you're accused of being unscientific. If you continue to study from a safe scientific distance subjects who are endangered, your time runs out."To her credit, Goodall recognised early that just because something can be criticised doesn't mean that that thing isn't worth doing. This is of course easier said than done: while Goodall "didn't give a hoot what they thought," as Galdikas put it, Fossey's experiences in the Congo and Awanda struck a snarp contrast with Goodali s in a more politically stable and ecologically more progressive state. It still took Goodall's courage to inspire Galdikas, Fossey, and others, to open doors to discoveries that reshaped how humans understand animals

Pollutants altering gut health of India's wild tigers, warn Hyderabad scientists

Hyderabad: New evidence in a groundbreaking study led by Hyderabad-based scientists has revealed that the majestic Indian wild tiger's gut health is being compromised by human activity. For over two years, the scientists meticulously analysed the tiger scat (faeces) collected from prominent tiger reserves, which unearthed insights into the big cat's gut microbiome. In the study, published in Global Ecology and Conservation (September-November, 2025) journal of Elsevier, that employed advanced DNA analysis techniques, scientists from Hyderabad were able to map the intricate communities of bacteria residing within the tigers' digestive systems, i.e., their gut microbiome.

The study, led by G Umapathy of Hyderabad-based Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB), has unequivocally indicated a concerning trend: the gut microbiome in Indian wild tigers is changing. The researchers, who conducted the two-year study at five major Indian tiger reserves including Corbett (Uttarakhand), Bandhavgardh and Kanha in Madhya Pradesh, Tadoba-Andhari in Maharashtra and Periyar in Kerala, discovered alarming signs that tigers are metabolising substances linked to pollutants and other human-related activities.

The substances linked to pollutants suggests a direct human interference in the tiger's internal ecosystem, where the very bacteria essential for digestion, immunity, and overall well-being are adapting to a polluted or disturbed environment. The comprehensive investigation, which involved collecting fresh samples from both the highly protected core zones and the more human-influenced buffer zones at the tiger reserves, aimed to understand how external environmental factors shape the internal microbial world of these big cats. These findings carry significant im-

plications for the conservation of India's tiger population, as a healthy gut microbiome is fundamental to an animal's ability to absorb nutrients, fend off disease, and manage stress. Human encroachment, tourism, cattle grazing, or other anthropogenic pressures have the potential to alter the delicate internal balance, compromise the long-term health, fitness and reproductive success of tigers. The Hyderabad scientists' work indicates urgent need to mitigate human impact within and around tiger reserves, not just for the visible threats, but for the unseen, yet crucial, battle being waged within the tigers themselves.

South Korea's President apologises over poorly managed foreign adoption programmes

South Korea's President apologised on Thursday (October 2, 2025) for poorly managed foreign adoption programmes that were rife with abuses and fraud, months after the country's truth commission admitted state responsibilities for such practices for the first time.

President Lee Jae Myung said in a Facebook post that he was offering "heartfelt apology and words of comfort" on behalf of the country to South Koreans adopted abroad and their adoptive and birth families. Findings by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and recent court rulings have confirmed some cases of human rights abuses in the course of international adoptions, Mr. Lee said, adding that the government failed to play its role in such cases.Mr. Lee said he "feels heavy-hearted" when he thinks about "anxiety, pain and confusion" that South Korean adoptees would have suffered when they were sent abroad as children. He asked officials to formulate systems to safeguard the human rights of adoptees and support their efforts to find their birth parents. South Korea has faced growing pressure to address widespread fraud and abuse that plagued its adoption programmes, particularly during a heyday in the 1970s and 1980s when the country allowed thousands of children to be adopted each year.

Why doctors still rely on the stethoscope in the age of AI



Have you wondered why, at every hospital visit, the doctor still reaches for a stethoscope before ordering tests or scans? In the era of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and precision medicine, this instrument continues to hold its place as the first line of assessment, offering immediacy that no machine can yet replicate. The stethoscope was invented in 1816 by French physician René Laennec to improve the examination of heart and lung sounds, which were previously heard by applying one's ear directly to the patient's chest. The stethoscope's relevance lies in its ability to provide detailed clinical information non-invasively, enabling early diagnosis and monitoring of conditions.

"Every sound transmitted through the stethoscope has clinical significance," says Jayaraman S., senior consultant, pulmonary medicine, MGM Healthcare, Chennai. "Auscultating the chest can help us understand the risks a patient may be facing in the heart or lungs. Despite advances in imaging and AI, the stethoscope remains the gold standard in bedside examination."The instrument allows doctors to detect a wide range of abnormalities. K. Thiruppathi, senior consultant, pulmonology, SIMS Hospital, Chennai, describes it as the doctor's "first set of eyes and ears on the inside of the body." Murmurs, irregular rhythms, extra beats, or reduced breath sounds can all be picked up within seconds. In the lungs, it can reveal wheezing or crackles that point towards asthma, pneumonia or fluid build-up. Even the simple act of measuring blood pressure or listening to bowel sounds depends on it.

But the instrument has limits. A stethoscope cannot reveal small valve defects, early-stage tumours or clots in the lung. For such structural detail, doctors turn to echocardiography, X-rays or CT scans. As Dr. Thiruppathi explains, "It serves as an initial screening tool. It cannot replace imaging but it helps us narrow down possibilities quickly and cost-effectively." Elakiya Mathimaran, consultant pulmonologist, VS Hospitals, Chennai, adds that auscultation is always the starting point. "Of course, the stetho-

scope will not show me a small clot or tumour. That is where advanced imaging or AI steps in. But the stethoscope is the first step before further investigations."A symbol of trustBeyond its clinical use, the stethoscope continues to play a cultural role in medicine. "When I place it on a patient's chest, it signals attentiveness. It reassures them," says Dr. Mathimaran. "Many patients feel the consultation is incomplete if the stethoscope is not used."Dr. Thiruppathi agrees, calling it a 'symbol of care and trust' that creates a personal connection. For many patients, the act of a doctor listening with a stethoscope is the most visible sign that they have been examined with care.

Technology is reshaping the way auscultation is performed too. Digital and Al-enabled stethoscopes now offer amplification, recording and the ability to share sounds for consultation. Some models are already integrated with algorithms that can identify abnormal heart murmurs or classify lung sounds with high accuracy. Recent studies published in The American Journal of Medicine and Respiratory Research have shown that Al-powered stethoscopes can detect aortic valve disease or pathological breath sounds in children with sensitivities of over 85% and specificities close to 100%. They also allow sounds to be stored, replayed and analysed remotely, making them useful in telemedicine and teaching. Electronic stethoscopes, research shows, perform better in patients living with obesity where conventional auscultation can be difficult. They can also reduce variability between clinicians by capturing and standardising sounds. However, they come with challenges: higher cost, the need for training, and dependence on reliable connectivity in some cases. Despite these advances, the transition to AI tools in India will take time. As Dr. Jayaraman notes, clinical examination continues to be at the heart of medical practice here. "In another five to ten years, Al systems may become more prevalent. But in India, where clinical examination is central, the conventional stethoscope will continue to coexist with its digital counterpart," he says. The World Health Organization has also underlined the enduring value of clinical examination, especially in resource-limited settings. While AI can support screening and diagnosis, auscultation remains indispensable as a first step in patient evaluation. Portable, affordable and immediate, the stethoscope continues to bridge medicine's past and future. For doctors, it is both a diagnostic instrument and a symbol of presence. For patients, it is reassurance that someone is listening, literally. As technology advances, both traditional and digital stethoscopes are likely to coexist, one as a timeless tool of care and the other as an adjunct offering new precision. For now, the familiar sight of a doctor's stethoscope pressed against the chest remains one of medicine's simplest and most enduring ways of paying attention to patients.

Republicans, Democrats blame each other on 1st day of U.S. government shutdown as tourist sites close



Republicans and Democrats spent the first day of the federal government shutdown blaming each other for the dysfunction, as iconic sites representing the nation's core identity — from the Liberty Bell in Pennsylvania to Pearl Harbour in Hawaii — were temporarily closed. The Trump administration enlisted Vice President J.D. Vance for an appearance in the White House briefing room to argue, falsely, that Democrats refused to keep the government funded because they were trying to extend health coverage to people in the country illegally. Top Democrats countered that they simply want to renew funding for health care subsidies under the Affordable Care Act so that insurance premiums won't spike nationwide for American families. Neither side said it would budge, but, as the fingerpointing persisted, the economic pain became more likely to spread — potentially putting hundreds of thousands of jobs and basic services at risk.

"We are going to have to lay people off"

Callers to the White House comment line heard a recorded message from Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt stating: "Democrats in Congress have shut down the federal government because they care more about funding health care for illegal immigrants than they care about serving you, the American people." Several federal agencies posted overtly partisan messages on their websites blaming Democrats for the shutdown. The White House underscored its argument by reviving a deepfake video posted by President Donald Trump of House Democratic leader Hakeem Jeffries in a fake moustache and sombrero, a meme that Mr. Jeffries described as bigoted. They played it on repeat in the White House briefing room, though Mr. Vance promised that the "sombrero memes will stop" when the government reopens.Mr. Jeffries responded with a meme of his own superimposing an image of Mr. Vance with a fat head and curly, long hair. "J.D. Vance thinks we will surrender to the Republican effort to gut healthcare because of a Sombrero meme. Not happening Bro," Mr. Jeffries wrote in a post on X.Mr. Vance said he couldn't predict how long the shutdown might go on, but also said he didn't believe it would be lengthy because some moderate Senate Democrats might soon vote with GOP colleagues to restore funding. "Let's be honest, if this thing drags on for another few days or, God forbid, another few weeks, we are going to have to lay people off," Mr. Vance said. Senate Democratic leader Chuck Schumer of New York said that Mr. Trump has refused to negotiate in good faith and that the claims of Democrats closing the government for immigrants in the country illegally is a lie.

"Donald Trump says it loud and clear: He is using the American people as pawns, threatening pain on the country as blackmail," Mr. Schumer said.Roughly 750,000 federal workers were expected to be furloughed, with some potentially fired. Many offices were being shuttered, perhaps permanently, as the Republican President vows to "do things that are irreversible" to punish Democrats. The White House's key policy priorities, including an aggressive deportation agenda, may continue with few disruptions. But education, environmental and other services may eventually sputter. The economic fallout could further imperil an

already weakening job market, as a jobs report Wednesday by payroll processor ADP showed that private employers cut 32,000 jobs last month.

The Trump administration has also begun targeting funding projects in Democratic states. White House budget director Russ Vought announced on Wednesday a hold on roughly \$18 billion in payments to build the Hudson Rail Tunnel and the Second Avenue subway line in New York City, two projects dear to Schumer. He later announced that almost \$8 billion in green energy projects would be withheld for 16 states, all states represented by two Democrats in the Senate. The last government shutdown came in late 2018 and early 2019, during Mr. Trump's first administration. It centred on a fight between both parties over funding for a wall along the Mexico-U.S. border and lasted more than 30 days. But Congress had already passed separate funding measures then that ensured that shutdown only partially affected government services, and wasn't as widespread as this one might be.Mr. Trump took most of the blame for the last shutdown, with an AP-NORC poll conducted during it, showing about 7 in 10 Americans said Donald Trump had "a great deal" or "quite a bit" of responsibility. This time, about two-thirds of registered voters in a recent New York Times/Siena poll conducted before the shutdown said the Democrats should not allow the government to halt even if their demands were not met. Still. Republicans as the party in power could also face blowback. About one-quarter of registered voters in that poll said they would blame Mr. Trump and the Republicans in Congress if a shutdown happened, while about 2 in 10 said they would place blame on congressional Democrats. About one-third said they'd blame both sides equally. Shutdown starts taking holdFederal courts will remain fully operational at least through Oct. 17, and potentially life-saving forecasting by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and its National Weather Service haven't been disrupted.But tours of the Liberty Bell were scrapped, and St. Louis' Gateway Arch and the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum in Boston closed, Pearl Harbour National Memorial in Hawaii began on Wednesday shuttered, though officials were working with nonprofit partners to get it reopen. At Acadia National Park in Maine, which gets 4 million visits a year, would-be hikers in search of trail maps checked empty receptacles outside the closed visitors centre. With no park rangers in sight, Jim Feather of Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, and his wife were unsure about trying to tackle Cadillac Mountain, with its panoramic views of the North Atlantic coast. "It's frustrating that they're playing politics in D.C.," Mr. Feather said. "Their job is to pass a budget. And if they're not doing their job, what are they doing down there?"

Pakistan, IMF begin review talks on \$7 bn loan programme

Islamabad: An IMF mission held a formal kick-off meeting with Pakistan's economic team to review the implementation of a USD 7 billion loan and a USD 1.1 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility, according to a media report on Tuesday. It comes as the programme's performance as of end-June 2025 — the period under review has been mixed, the Dawn newspaper reported. The IMF team led by Pakistan's Mission Chief Iva Petrova met on Monday with Pakistan's delegation headed by Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb. The opening session was attended by key economic stakeholders, including the State Bank of Pakistan governor, the finance secretary and the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) chairman. The mission will remain in Pakistan for almost two weeks and review the implementation of the USD 7 billion Extended Financing Facility (EFF) and the USD 1.1 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility (RSF)

Rethinking carbon pricing and taxes



India's free trade agreement (FTA) with the U.K., heralded as the gold standard by the Minister for Commerce and Industry, Piyush Goyal, has a lot going for it. Yet, it does not address the one imminent policy instrument that is likely to significantly upend its possible benefits for India.The U.K.'s Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (UK-CBAM), similar in principle to the European Union (EU)'s CBAM, will be implemented from January 2027. It covers both direct and indirect emissions for hard-to-abate sectors such as steel and aluminum, including the electricity used in their production. CBAM's scope will later be expanded to other products.

Mr. Goyal noted that India would retaliate against any harmful impacts of CBAM. However, any prospective action may not provide the desired relief for the imminent cost impact. This is an issue that needs to be addressed upfront in a bilateral agreement. For instance, in the recently announced U.S.-EU trade agreement, the EU has agreed to address U.S. concerns on CBAM and other rules relating to corporate sustainability, through flexibilities. CBAM effect on India's exportsBefore the FTA, the U.K.'s MFN rates for aluminium and iron and steel were in the range of 0-6%. Under the India-U.K. FTA, these duties will be reduced to zero for Indian exports. At first glance, this appears beneficial for India. But from January 2027, aluminium and steel imports will need to match the U.K.'s carbon price, which, as of now, is approximately \$66/tCO2, translating to a cost increase of at least 20% to 40% for exporters.

The U.K.'s CBAM permits deductions for carbon pricing in exporting countries, including carbon taxes or prices paid under emissions trading schemes. While Indian industry pays levies such as coal cess, bears costs under the renewable purchase obligation, and now an explicit carbon price under the recently announced Carbon Credit Trading Scheme (CCTS), it is unclear whether the U.K. will allow deductions beyond the CCTS. Even with respect to the CCTS, a major challenge is the large gap between India's projected carbon price, estimated by the Bureau of Energy Efficiency at around \$8-10 per tonne of CO2, and the U.K.'s carbon price, currently at \$66 per tonne. As with the EU's CBAM, the U.K.'s approach is focused on levying a charge on exports into the U.K. to match the embedded carbon price paid by domestic producers. By levying the same price as paid by U.K. producers in specific sectors where the U.K. perceives a competitive disadvantage, the unilateral setting of carbon price upends multilateral commitments on emission reductions under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Paris Agreement. There can never be a singular carbon price across economies as emissions vary across countries based on energy mix, industry structure, and technological availability and viability. A joint report by multilateral institutions in October 2024 urged greater coordination on carbon markets, warning that fragmented systems cause distortions, leakage, and undermine net-zero goals.

Fragmented markets will only raise compliance costs, disrupt supply chains, and hinder both growth and climate goals. A global carbon pricing agreement is essential to align methods for measuring emissions, streamline reporting requirements, and ensure support for green tech transfer. The International Monetary Fund in 2021 proposed an International Carbon Price Floor (ICPF) with tiered pricing: \$25 for low-income, \$50 for middle-income, and \$75 for high-income countries. Building on this, the World Economic Forum proposed a three-phased approach to facilitate a smooth transition to global carbon pricing, starting with minimum standards for pricing and reporting, and linking this to regional systems and harmonising monitoring and verification processes. It also proposed linking regional carbon markets (EU, China, India, other parts of Asia) to reduce fragmentation and move towards a unified global system. It is important for the Indian government to assess whether this model would work and explore synergies with like-minded developing countries. In an era of rising tariff and non-tariff barriers, we cannot risk fragmented carbon pricing turning into massive compliance costs. Amidst rising protectionism global consensus is unlikely in the short term. Hence Indian industry must view clean technologies as tools for efficiency and competitiveness, and not just as export compliance. The government needs to act as an enabler by streamlining various implicit carbon taxes into a unified carbon market framework. Implementing stricter emission reduction targets under a single explicit carbon tax through the CCTS, instead of multiple taxes on carbon-intensive sectors, will improve carbon price discovery, simplify compliance and monitoring, and preserve our competitiveness. It would position India to build a stronger carbon pricing system, capable of joining a cohesive global carbon market in the future. Revenues from these carbon taxes should be ploughed back for industrial decarbonisation. The draft climate finance taxonomy developed by the Ministry of Finance, is another initiative that will enable investors to boost clean tech investment.In a world where multilateral rules are being undermined, and bilateral free trade deals are failing to secure equity, proactive action between government and industry within the country is the only answer.

The rise and risks of health insurance in India



A minimal definition of universal health care (UHC) is that quality health care should be guaranteed to "all members of the community irrespective of their ability to pay" as the Bhore Committee report put it as early as 1946. Nearly eight decades later, India is nowhere near this basic goal of human development, even as many other countries, rich and poor, have achieved it in substantial measure. An illusion is being created today that UHC can be achieved by expanding health insurance. In the last 10 years, Statesponsored health insurance schemes have grown by leaps and bounds. The Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PMJAY), launched in 2018 under Ayushman Bharat, is one landmark in this regard. Alongside PMJAY, every major State has its own State Health Insurance Programme (SHIP). Most SHIPs are modelled on PMJAY, with a maximum cover of ?5 lakh a household a year. All these insurance schemes are restricted to in-patient care, with patients making a choice from a list of empanelled hospitals, public and private (roughly half-half). In 2023-24, PMJAY covered 58.8 crore individuals with an annual budget of about ?12,000 crore (assuming that States contributed 40% of the total, as prescribed). Taken together, SHIPs covered a similar number and had a combined budget of at least ?16,000 crore. The grand total of ?28,000 crore or so is still a relatively small portion of public expenditure on health, but it is growing fast. In Gujarat, Kerala and Maharashtra, States for which relevant data are available, we found that the SHIP budget had grown at 8% to 25% a year in real terms between 2018-19 and 2023-24.

The faultlines can deepenThere is no doubt that the PMJAY and SHIPs provide some relief to poor patients when public facilities are overcrowded or substandard, by giving them wider options at reduced cost. However, these schemes are no substitute for a sound UHC framework. And they have major defects, some of which could worsen the fault lines of India's health-care system.

First, health insurance promotes for-profit medicine. About two-thirds of the PMJAY budget is spent on private, mainly profit-oriented hospitals (corresponding figures for SHIPs are not available). A recent study of PMJAY in six major States found that the scheme made little difference to hospitalisation rates, but increased the utilisation of private hospitals. As is well understood in economics, the profit motive in health care is highly problematic. If profit-seeking private providers are allowed at all, they must be tightly regulated. India's health-care system, however, is dominated by poorly-regulated profit seekers. Health insurance reinforces this bias rather than correcting it. Second, health insurance also tilts the health-care system towards hospitalisation, when investments in primary and outpatient care may be more urgent. Strengthening primary care would not only ensure accessible treatment but also reduce unnecessary hospital visits and their financial burden. The ongoing induction of all elderly citizens (aged 70 years and above) in PMJAY, along with the rapid ageing of the population, involves a risk that expensive tertiary care will absorb a growing share of public health expenditure, even as many basic health services continue to fall short. Third, there appear to be serious utilisation problems. Official figures

suggest that the combined coverage of PMJAY and SHIPs is as high as 80% of the population. However, many people do not seem to know about the scheme or how to use it even if they are nominally enrolled. As a recent analysis of the 2022-23 Household Consumption Expenditure Survey shows, only 35% of insured hospital patients in that year were able to use their insurance. Other studies also report serious utilisation hurdles, especially among disadvantaged groups. Perhaps this is one reason why there is no strong evidence linking PMJAY or SHIPs with a substantial reduction in out-of-pocket health expenditure.

Hospitals and discriminationFourth, targeted health insurance schemes create issues of discrimination between insured and uninsured patients. Private hospitals prefer an uninsured patient since commercial charges for health care are usually higher, often much higher than the insurance reimbursement rates. One plausible reason why insurance utilisation is so low is that private hospitals discourage it in one way or another. Public hospitals, for their part, prefer insured patients since they get some money for their treatment. This creates its own problems, such as discriminatory treatment and pressure to enrol for insurance on the

Fifth, health-care providers have their own complaints about health insurance, including low reimbursement rates and long delays. The first complaint may or may not be fair (one would expect to hear it), but the second is hard to dismiss. Indeed, the National Health Authority (NHA) itself revealed a few months ago that pending dues under PMJAY alone added up to ?12,161 crore, more than the scheme's entire annual budget. Many reports have emerged of private hospitals suspending services to patients under PMJAY or even withdrawing from the scheme, as bills remain unpaid for months. According to a recent statement of the Health Ministry, in the Lok Sabha, 609 hospitals have opted out of PMJAY since its inception. Last but not the least, health insurance schemes are prone to corruption and abuse. The NHA recently recommended action against 3,200 hospitals for fraudulent activities under PMJAY. There are also regular media reports of irregularities from across the country. These include eligible patients being denied treatment, private providers charging insured patients, and unnecessary procedures being performed to milk the scheme. These irregularities defeat the purpose of health insurance by exposing patients to serious financial and health risks. Tight monitoring and a battery of audits are supposed to prevent irregularities, but there is little evidence that these safeguards are effective. We were unable to find any trace of audit reports on the scheme portals. This is one symptom, among others, of a pervasive lack of transparency in health insurance. The system is profit driven

In short, India's health insurance schemes are a very poor way of arranging health care, especially for people who find it difficult to navigate the system. They cannot make up for India's persistent failure to expand and improve public health facilities. No country has achieved UHC on this sort of foundation. This is not to deny that social health insurance is a part of the UHC framework in some countries. Canada and Thailand are two examples. But PMJAY and SHIPs lack important features of social health insurance. such as universal coverage, and more importantly, a strong focus on non-profit health-care providers. India's profit-driven health-care system reflects decades of severe under-investment in public health facilities — few countries beat India in this regard. According to the World Bank's latest World Development Indicators, public expenditure on health was still as low as 1.3% of GDP in India in 2022, compared with a world average of 6.1%. UHC cannot be achieved without a serious effort to address this deficit and transform healthcare standards in the public sector. Some Indian States are moving in that direction, with encouraging results, but immense gaps remain. Health insurance is little more than a pain killer for a system that needs proper healing

table non-invasive brain injury diagnostic tool, developed through a collaboration between the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), the Medical Device & Diagnostics Mission Secretariat (MDMS), AIIMS Bhopal, NIMHANS Bengaluru, and Bioscan Research. The device is to be used for Traumatic Brain Injuries (TBIs) and can detect intracranial bleeding and edema within a minute. It is safe for infants and pregnant women, and can be used by paramedic staff as well as unskilled personnel.

The device is designed for deployment in ambulances, trauma centres, rural clinics, and disaster response units and is aimed at enhancing early TBI detection and patient outcomes. According to the ICMR, CEREBO has undergone clinical validation, regulatory approvals, and feasibility studies, paving the way for global adoption in emergency and military healthcare systems.ICMR added that multi-centre clinical performance evaluation and utility trials were conducted at leading trauma care and neurosurgical centres to generate prospective evidence on diagnostic accuracy, time-to-decision benefits, and integration feasibility within emergency care pathways. Post-market surveillance supported by ICMR-MDMS further confirmed its role in user adoption as a tool for effectively triaging patients for further neurological assessments.

Health technology assessments also recommended the adoption of the device in tertiary care to accelerate CT scans, optimise triage, and reduce imaging costs.

TBIs are a significant public health challenge, particularly in emergency settings, rural areas, and underserved populations. Traditional diagnostic methods, such as the Glasgow Coma Scale (GCS), are prone to errors and subjective interpretations, while imaging techniques require specialised infrastructure, trained personnel, and are costintensive. It is to address this issue that CEREBO has been developed using advanced near-infrared spectroscopy technology powered by machine learning.TBI is a condition caused by a sudden trauma or injury to the head, which disrupts normal brain function. This injury can range from mild (concussion) to severe, often resulting in long-term physical, cognitive, emotional, and behavioural impairments. The severity of TBI depends on factors such as the force of impact, the location of the injury, and the individual's overall health. According to an article titled, 'Epidemiology of traumatic brain injuries: Indian scenario', TBIs are a leading cause of morbidity, mortality, disability and socio-economic losses in India and other developing countries. It is estimated that nearly 1.5 to 2 million persons are injured and one million succumb to death every year in India. Road traffic injuries are the leading cause (60%) of TBIs followed by falls (20%-25%) and violence (10%). It is possible for a TBI to go undiagnosed initially, especially if symptoms are mild or if there are no visible signs of injury. A TBI can cause permanent brain damage in some cases, particularly if the injury is severe or if there are complications such as bleeding or swelling in the brain. Patients with mild TBIs (concussions) may only require monitoring and observation to ensure symptoms do not worsen. "Close monitoring of neurological status, vital signs, and cognitive function is important, especially in the first 24 to 48 hours after injury," it adds. Long-term consequences of TBI include cognitive impairments (such as memory problems), emotional and behavioural changes (such as depression, anxiety), physical disabilities, and increased risk of neurodegenerative diseases later in life, say experts.

Noise pollution is rising but policy is falling silent

Urban noise pollution has quietly emerged as one of the most neglected public health crises of our time. Across Indian cities, decibel levels routinely exceed permissible limits, especially near schools, hospitals and residential zones, eroding the constitutional promise of peace and dignity.In 2011, the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) launched the National Ambient Noise Monitoring Network (NANMN), which was envisioned as a real-time data platform. A decade later, the network functions less as a tool for reform and more as a passive repository. Data are scattered across dashboards, but meaningful enforcement remains elusive. The problem lies not only in flawed sensor placement (many are mounted 25 to 30 feet high, in violation of the CPCB's 2015 guidelines — but in a deeper absence of accountability. Whether biased or incomplete, the available data remains politically and administratively inert. Contrast this with Europe, where noise-induced illnesses and mortality statistics actively shape policy. The European Environment Agency recently pegged the annual economic cost of urban noise pollution at •100 billion, prompting redesigns in speed zones and zoning frameworks. India, by contrast, suffers from regulatory fragmentation and institutional silence. Right to Information queries go unanswered; State Pollution Control Boards operate in silos; and even in States such as Uttar Pradesh, first-quarter 2025 data remains unavailable to the public. Apathy, neglect, serious questions

This is not merely environmental apathy. It borders on constitutional neglect. Article 21 guarantees the right to life with dignity, encompassing mental and environmental wellbeing. Article 48A mandates proactive environmental protection. When "silence zones" become epicentres of noise, it raises serious questions about state capacity and civic respect.

The Noise Pollution (Regulation and Control) Rules, 2000 offer a robust legal framework, but enforcement has remained largely symbolic. According to the World Health Organization, safe limits in silent zones are 50 dB(A) by day and 40 dB(A) by night. Yet, in cities such as Delhi and Bengaluru, readings near sensitive institutions often reach 65 dB(A)-70 dB(A). Infrastructure expansion and logisticsdriven traffic have exacerbated the crisis. Late-night drilling and crane operations continue despite regulatory restrictions. In 2024, the Supreme Court of India reaffirmed that environmental disruptions — including excessive noise can infringe upon the fundamental right to life and dignity under Article 21. In Noise Pollution (V), In Re, the Court recognised that unchecked urban noise poses a serious threat to mental well-being and civic freedom (The case dates back to 2005, and was referenced and interpreted again by the Court in 2024, in the context of renewed concerns over urban noise and its impact on fundamental rights). The ecological cost is no less troubling. A 2025 study by the University of Auckland found that urban noise and artificial light disrupted the sleep and song patterns of common mynas after just one night. The birds sang less and with reduced complexity, impairing their social signalling. This is not merely an avian concern, it signals a breakdown in ecological communication systems. When biodiversity loses its voice, it reflects a deeper erosion of urban envi-

Civic fatigue and the politics of silenceUrban noise is not just a technical issue, it is deeply political. The absence of sustained public outrage stems from a normalisation of sonic aggression. Honking, drilling and loudspeakers have become ambient irritants, tolerated rather than challenged. This civic fatigue is compounded by the invisibility of noise as a pollutant. Unlike smog or garbage, sound leaves no residue, no visible stain — only a frayed mind and a disturbed sleep cycle. The result is a quiet erosion of public health, especially among children, the elderly, and those with pre-existing conditions. India's legal framework, while robust on paper, suffers from fragmented execution. The Noise Pollution Rules, 2000 are rarely updated to reflect urban realities. There is little coordination between municipal bodies, traffic police and pollution control boards. A national acoustic policy akin to the National Ambient Air Quality Standards is urgently needed. Such a framework must define permissible decibel levels across zones, mandate regular audits, and empower local grievance redress mechanisms. Without inter-agency synergy, enforcement will remain sporadic and symbolic.

Adopt a culture of 'sonic empathy' Ultimately, the fight against urban noise is not just regulatory, it is cultural. Cities must cultivate a shared ethic of sonic empathy. Public campaigns should move beyond slogans to immersive education, in schools, driver training programmes and com-



munity spaces. Just as seatbelt usage became a norm through sustained messaging, honking reduction and noise sensitivity can be socially internalised. Silence is not the absence of sound, but the presence of care. Where, then, must reform begin? First, decentralise NANMN - grant local bodies access to real-time noise data and the responsibility to act. Second, link monitoring to enforcement — without penalties, zoning compliance or construction curbs, data remains performativity. Third, institutionalise awareness initiatives such as "No Honking Day" must evolve into sustained behavioural campaigns. Fourth, embed acoustic resilience in urban planning — cities must be designed not just for speed and expansion, but for sonic civility. Silence must not be imposed and must be enabled through design, governance and democratic will. Unless India adopts a rights-based lens to urban noise, its smart cities may re-

Fear of being replaced — Navigating value in an Al-driven workplace

At the heart of the modern workplace lies an uncomfortable question that once whispered beneath layers of professional decorum and now echoes through Slack channels, boardrooms, and virtual town halls: Am I replaceable? In the age of AI, this question is no longer limited to factory lines or routine-heavy occupations. It creeps into creative industries, management circles, legal practices, and even scientific research. The spectre of artificial intelligence — efficient, tireless, and increasingly capable — has transformed professional insecurity from a vague existential unease into a daily reckoning. Let's begin with the facts. In 2023, Goldman Sachs reported that AI could replace the equivalent of 300 million full-time jobs globally. OpenAl's own models have demonstrated proficiency in passing bar exams, generating code, writing poetry, and even conducting basic data analysis. White-collar workers who once watched automation from the safety of their ergonomic chairs now find the lens turning on them. Generative Al systems, from ChatGPT to DALL•E, are proving that what we once believed to be the irreplaceable human domain nuance, creativity, and empathy — is not so untouchable after all. Yet, as someone who has spent decades navigating the crests and troughs of workplace change, I'd argue that the fear of being replaced, while real, is not new. It's merely been accelerated and globalised in scale. We've been here before: with industrialisation, with outsourcing, with the digitisation of processes. What's different now is the speed and scope. Al doesn't need onboarding. It doesn't take sick leave or negotiate salaries. That's a seductive proposition for companies pressured by profit margins, shareholders, and hypergrowth expectations. But here's where I diverge from the doomsday narrative. The real value of human labour was never just about output; it was about context, trust, and meaning. Al is, at present, a tool without consciousness or lived experience. It can draft a legal contract, but it doesn't understand justice. It can compose music, but it doesn't feel heartbreak. It can summarise a company's internal policies, but it can't sense the unspoken tensions in a team room or navigate the cultural subtext of a negotiation. The mistake many of us are making is imagining value as fixed, a binary of useful or obsolete. But value in the workplace has always been relational. It evolves. A skill that was prized in the 1990s, say, shorthand or mainframe programming, may now be irrelevant, but the adaptability that came with mastering it?

India-bound crude oil loadings at Russian ports in September were also largely stable at August levels, shows provisional tanker data. Although there are evident signs of growing diversification in India's oil sourcing, the import basket continues to be dominated by Russia, which commanded over one-third share in India's total oil imports in September.

India's Russian oil imports in September were 1.60 million barrels per day (bpd) in September, down 5.4 per cent from August levels, according to provisional vessel tracking data from global real-time data and analytics provider Kpler. Oil loadings headed for India at Russian ports averaged at 1.52 million bpd, flat on a month-on-month basis. Notably, destinations of sizable volumes of Russian crude loadings in September—over 300,000 bpd—are not known yet, and much of this oil could make its way to India, according to industry watchers. Contracts for Russian crude supplied to India are usually finalised six-eight weeks before delivery, which means that the volumes imported in September correspond to contracts from July and August. In July, US President Donald Trump began to publicly target India over its Russian oil purchases, and by the first week of August, he announced an additional 25 per cent tariff on most Indian goods as a penalty for buying Russian oil. The additional tariff took effect late August. Russian oil deliveries to India in October are expected to provide a clear picture on whether or not the pressure from the Trump administration has had any significant impact.

"At this stage, it's unlikely India will make meaningful cuts purely for political signaling. The calculus remains economic. If US pressure escalates, India could make a token reduction of 100,000–200,000 bpd to demonstrate diversification, but a structural cut is unlikely without a formal government directive," said Sumit Ritolia, Lead Research Analyst, Refining & Modeling at Kpler. According to industry sources, the dip in September volumes of Russian oil imports into India appears to have been largely due to a rise in

freight cost and a slight narrowing of discounts on Russian crude, not pressure from the US. Going forward, there is potential for deeper discounts on Russian crude, given that a portion of Russia's refining capacity was hit by Ukrainian drone strikes. With domestic processing of crude going down, Russia would be looking to export more oil, which is bound to add some competitive pressure on the pricing of Russian barrels. "Honestly, I don't see India stepping away from Russian supplies anytime soon in the near to midterm. Russian barrels are still priced cheaper than most other grades India imports. True, the discounts are narrower than the \$10-20 per barrel spreads we saw earlier, but even a small price edge matters. Refiners won't leave a single dollar on the table unless there's a clear government directive banning Russian imports—similar to how India treated Iranian barrels," he said. Oil exports are the biggest source of revenue for Moscow, and New Delhi is the second-largest buyer of its oil after Beijing. But despite US rhetoric and imposition of 25 per cent secondary tariff over the 25 per cent tariff imposed earlier on most Indian goods, India has shown no signs of backing down on Russian oil imports.

The Indian government has consistently maintained that the country will buy oil from wherever it gets the best deal, as long as the oil is not under sanctions. There are no sanctions on Russian oil; it is only subject to a price cap imposed by the US and its allies that applies if Western shipping and insurance services are used for transporting the oil. India's public sector refiners have stated that they have not received any signal or directive from the government on the issue, and they will continue to buy Russian oil as long as it remains economically and commercially viable. New Delhi has termed the Trump administration's action "unjustified and unreasonable" and said these imports began as its traditional supplies were diverted to Europe, with the US having "actively encouraged such imports by India for strengthening global energy markets stability". The Joe Biden administration had encouraged India to increase Russian oil imports following Russia's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine as the West began shunning Moscow's oil. Russia is a major oil exporter and if a bulk of its oil goes off the market for dearth of buyers, international oil prices could shoot up, something that the US itself did not desire. Even as India has so far shown no major signs of cutting oil imports from Russia, there has been a stronger push for diversification of supply from various regions— West Asia, Africa, North America, and South America. "What we are seeing is that Indian refiners are gradually looking to expand their basket—not necessarily to replace Russia in the short term, but to enhance energy security, continuity of flows, and economic flexibility," Ritolia said. When Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, Moscow's share in New Delhi's oil imports was less than 2 per cent. With much of the West snubbing Russian crude following the invasion, Russia began offering discounts on its oil to willing buyers. Indian refiners were quick to avail the opportunity, leading to Russia—earlier a peripheral supplier of oil to India emerging as India's biggest source of crude within a matter of months, displacing the traditional West Asian suppliers.

RBI keeps rates steady, slashes inflation forecast to 2.6 pc, hikes growth rate to 6.8 pc



Lending and deposit rates in the banking system will remain unchanged as the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Wednesday kept its key policy rate—the repo rate—steady at 5.5 per cent. The six-member Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) voted unanimously to pause for the second consecutive meeting, while also retaining its "neutral" stance, signalling that interest rates could move in either direction depending on how growth and inflation unfold.

While slashing the inflation projection to 2.6 per cent from 3.1 per cent and raising the growth rate to 6.8 per cent from 6.5 per cent projected earlier, the MPC indicated that the decision comes at a time of steady domestic growth, subdued inflation, and heightened global risks. Escalating trade tariff disputes and H-1B visa tensions with the United States have added to uncertainty, prompting the RBI to adopt a watchful approach while maintaining flexibility in its policy direction. Lending rates stay put, but with caveats

The immediate impact of an unchanged repo rate is that all external benchmark lending rates (EBLR) linked directly to the repo will remain unchanged. Borrowers with loans tied to the repo benchmark will not see any change in their equated monthly instalments (EMIs). Deposit rates will also remain unchanged. However, the story is slightly different for borrowers whose loans are linked to the marginal cost of funds-based lending rate (MCLR). Banks often recalibrate their MCLR depending on their cost of funds, liquidity conditions, and credit demand. While repo-linked rates will remain steady, lenders may still make marginal adjustments to MCLR-linked products. Earlier this year, when the RBI cut the repo rate by a cumulative 100 basis points (bps) between February and June 2025, most banks passed on the benefit by lowering repo-linked lending rates. MCLR was also reduced, though the transmission was more gradual. However, some banks raised the home loans in the wake of pressure on margins.

Why did RBI pause again?

This is the second consecutive meeting where the MPC has opted for a pause after the aggressive rate cuts earlier in the year. The committee's decision reflects a balancing act: it wants to support growth while also acknowledging inflationary risks. "Growth-inflation narrative has altered since the August 2025 policy. Inflation has turned benign and there has been significant moderation in inflation," RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra said. Several factors contributed to the decision: The introduction of a simplified two-slab Goods and Services Tax (GST) structure—5 per cent and 18 per cent, replacing the earlier four-rate system—has reduced tax burdens on several items, boosting consumption.

India's GDP growth surged to 7.8 per cent in Q1 FY2026, the highest in five quarters, compared to 6.5 per cent in the same period last year and 7.4 per cent in the previous quarter. Rural demand is improving and government capital expenditure continues to support activity, though urban consumption and private investment remain tepid. The MPC has now increased the growth projection to 6.8 per cent. Thanks to GST rationalisation, the RBI expects average inflation in FY2026 to be 2.6 per cent, down from an earlier projection of 3.1 per cent. While the short-term inflation outlook is comfortable, the trajectory could turn upward beyond FY2026 as input costs and global volatility feed through. Governor Sanjay Malhotra, while announcing the policy, said the GST rationalisation is likely to offset issues related to global trade and other uncertainties. The policy meeting took place in a tense international environment. The US has slapped an additional 25 per cent tariff on Indian goods from August 27, raising the total tariff burden on certain exports to 50 per cent. Negotiations between India and the US are ongoing, and the outcome could materially affect India's trade and growth outlook. Meanwhile, the US Federal Reserve recently cut its benchmark rate by 25 bps to a 4–4.25 per cent range—the first cut of 2025– signalling concerns over slowing global growth. For India, the Fed's move could influence capital flows, currency dynamics, and inflationary pressures through imported costs. The RBI's neutral policy stance, maintained since June, means it is neither committing to further rate cuts nor preparing the ground for tightening. In effect, the central bank has positioned itself to respond flexibly to incoming data. This means if inflation remains benign, there could be rate cuts in the subsequent policies. If growth shows signs of faltering again or global shocks worsen, the RBI has room to cut further. Conversely, if inflation surprises on the upside, the neutral stance allows it to pivot toward raising rates. The RBI has hiked its FY2026 GDP growth forecast to 6.8 per cent, citing robust Q1 numbers and government spending while private capex recovery remains patchy and global headwinds could weigh on exports. "Global uncertainties will likely decelerate growth in the second half of fiscal and beyond," Malhotra said.

On inflation, the RBI is more optimistic in the short term. In its August policy, it had already lowered the projection for FY2026 CPI inflation to 3.1 per cent from 3.7 per cent earlier. With the GST rationalisation, analysts expect the number to fall further by around 50 bps, with the fullyear average closer to 2.6 per cent. For now, the RBI appears content to adopt a wait-and-watch approach. With growth holding firm, inflation relatively subdued, and fiscal spending providing support, there is little immediate pressure to adjust rates. Yet uncertainties loom large—from US tariff actions and volatile crude oil prices to unpredictable global monetary shifts. Borrowers can take comfort in the fact that repo-linked loan rates remain unchanged, at least for now. The real challenge for the central bank, however, will arise if external shocks undermine India's growth momentum or if inflation accelerates faster than anticipated. The October policy, in essence, reflects a pause with intent—designed to preserve flexibility and keep every option open in a volatile global environment.

Mukesh Ambani reclaims top spot; Shah Rukh Khan enters billionaire club

Led by Mukesh Ambani and family, India's tally of US dollar billionaires (wealth above \$1 billion, or over Rs 8,800 crore) has risen by 24 to 358 in 2025. The M3M Hurun India Rich List 2025 shows 1,687 individuals — up by 148 from last year — across 91 cities with wealth of Rs 1,000 crore or more. As many as 1,004 individuals with wealth above Rs 1,000 crore saw their fortunes rise or hold steady, including 284 new entrants, while 643 lost wealth and 139 dropped off the list. Among billionaires, Ambani leads with a fortune of Rs 9.55 lakh crore, followed by Gautam Adani with Rs 8.14 lakh crore. Bollywood superstar Shah Rukh Khan (59) entered the billionaire club for the first time with a fortune of Rs 12,490 crore. Chennai-born Aravind Srinivas (31), founder of Ai-focused company Perplexity, debuted with Rs 21,190 crore, making him the youngest billionaire on the list.

Roshni Nadar of the HCL Group is the youngest in the Top 10. The Bajaj family saw their wealth jump 43 per cent to Rs 2.33 lakh crore, climbing four spots to sixth place. "The Top 10 richest hold 27 per cent of total wealth, capable of powering nation-building projects, while the base of wealth is broadening rapidly — individuals with over Rs 1,000 crore have more than doubled in five years, with representation rising to 91 cities from just 10 at inception," M3M Hurun India said. The combined wealth of those on the Rich List 2025 stands at Rs 167 lakh crore — nearly half of India's GDP — with 358 dollar-billionaires, up from just 59 in 2012 and 200 five years ago. "Wealth creation is increasingly borderless, with Jayshree Ullal in Silicon Valley, industrial stalwarts in London and Dubai, and new Gulf billionaires linking global capital back to India," the report noted.

Mumbai remains the billionaire capital with 451 entrants, followed by Bengaluru (116), Hyderabad (102), Chennai (94) and Pune (66), signalling the decentralisation of wealth hubs. By sector, pharmaceuticals leads with 137 listers, followed by industrial products (132), chemicals & petrochemicals (125), software & services (110), real estate (99) and a fastemerging biotech sector — making India's wealth engine more diverse and resilient. A record 66 per cent (1,115 individuals) on the Hurun Rich List 2025 are self-made, up from 55 per cent five years ago. Among the 284 new entrants, 74 per cent built fortunes from scratch. The start-up boom has become the single largest engine of new wealth creation, reshaping not just fortunes but India's economic fabric. Anas Rahman Junaid, founder and chief researcher of Hurun India, said: "The cumulative wealth of India's richest climbed to Rs 167 lakh crore, with 1,044 individuals gaining versus 643 losing, showing the wealth-creation engine remains strong. Optimism is reflected in the rise of first-generation founders, regional hubs beyond metros, and new-age sectors reshaping the economy."The entry threshold for the Top 10 billionaires has surged to Rs 1.83 lakh crore, up from Rs 1.63 lakh crore, making it tougher than ever for newcomers to break in. The average age of the richest has dropped to 69 — three years younger than last



year. The list also features 97 startup founders, including 46 first-timers, and 12 founders from publicly listed startups.

TCS forced around 2,500 employees to resign, says IT employees' body

New Delhi: India's largest IT firm Tata Consultancy Services has allegedly forced around 2,500 employees in Pune to resign from their jobs, the IT employees' body NITES said in a letter to Maharashtra Chief Minister on Wednesday

However, TCS said, only a limited number of employees have been affected by its recent initiative to realign skills in its organisation. Nascent Information Technology Employees Senate (NITES) president Harpreet Singh Saluja, in a letter to Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, sought timely intervention to protect the interests of the affected employees. Saluja said based on NITES representation, the Union Labour Ministry has directed the Maharashtra labour secretary to take necessary action in the matter, "Sadly, despite this directive, the ground reality has become even more distressing. In Pune alone, nearly 2,500 employees have been forced to resign or have been abruptly removed in recent weeks," NITES said. When contacted, TCS said, "The misinformation shared here is inaccurate and purposefully mischievous. Only a limited number of employees have been affected by our recent initiative to realign skills in our organisation". "Those who have been affected have been provided due care and severance, as is due to them in each of the individual circumstances."The company, in June, announced to lay off about 2 per cent, or 12,261 employees, of its global workforce this year, with the majority of those impacted belonging to middle and senior grades. NITES said the affected employees are not just numbers; they are mothers and fathers, breadwinners, caregivers, and the backbone of thousands of households across Maharashtra. "Many of those affected are mid- to senior-level professionals who have given 10-20 years of dedicated service to the company. A large number are over 40 years of age, burdened with EMIs, school fees, medical expenses, and responsibilities towards ageing parents

Neuroscientist recommends simple hack that will help you reduce stress: 'The biggest change I would say is...'

Stress management often feels complicated, but sometimes the smallest tweaks to daily habits can make the biggest difference. In an episode of her podcast, content creator Masoom Minawala Mehta asked neuroscientist Dr Sweta Adatia a simple yet powerful question: "If you could recommend changing just one habit to reduce stress, what would it be?"

Dr Adatia's answer focused on mornings as the foundation for mental balance. She said, "The biggest change that I would say is when you wake up in the morning, fix your morning, you know, your stress, everything will get fixed automatically. Do not wake up the last hour, the last moment, do not rush to work. Do not go from the delta, the deepest sleep state you were in, going suddenly to beta, the fast-firing of the brain. Take your time, get into alpha, get into theta, start to practise these breathing techniques which allow your autonomic balance, and that's it (sic)."Dr Adatia clarified that this doesn't have to be overwhelming or time-consuming. "It's not at all a rigorous process that, you know, 'I have to spend hours and hours building it, doing it.' No, just give yourself 5 to 10 minutes in the morning."

But what actually happens in the brain when we transition too quickly from deep sleep to a rushed start?Gurleen Baruah, Existential Psychotherapist, tells indianexpress.com, "When we wake up, our body is still shifting out of deep sleep. At this stage, cortisol, the stress hormone, is already high to help us become alert. If we immediately rush into emails, meetings, or chores, the nervous system is pushed from 0 to 100 too quickly. The brain doesn't get time to regulate this spike, so instead of energy, it often leaves us feeling tired, irritable, or foggy." Over time, she adds that this constant "shock start" can make us more vulnerable to stress, poor focus, and even burnout.

Dr Adatia mentions "alpha" and "theta" states. How can an average person recognise or encourage these states in practical, everyday ways?

Baruah explains that alpha and theta are brainwave states. Alpha is a calm but alert state. It's what we feel during daydreaming, light meditation, or when we are fully



present but relaxed. Theta is a deeper state, linked to creativity, reflection, or that transitional state between sleep and waking. We naturally pass through these states in the morning before we are fully awake.

"To encourage them, avoid rushing straight to screens. Instead, spend a few quiet minutes stretching, journaling, or even just sitting with your thoughts. These practices help the brain ease into the day, reducing stress and improving focus," she explains. Simple breathing or mindfulness techniques that can realistically be done in just 5 to 10 minutesBaruah says, "Even a short pause can reset the nervous system. Box breathing, which involves inhaling for 4 seconds, holding for 4, exhaling for 4, and holding for 4, is a simple tool to calm the body. Guided meditations (many available online) or mindful journaling can also help." Another underrated practice is simply stepping outside and sitting in natural light for a few minutes, letting the body wake up gradually. The key is not to overload the mind immediately and avoid reaching for the phone first thing. These small rituals train the body to begin the day grounded, not stressed,

Hyderabad-born researcher Dr Mugdha on a quest to uncover black holes in tiny galaxies

Hyderabad: Dr Mugdha Polimera spends her days searching for what most of us can never see: black holes. An astrophysicist, software engineer and AI researcher, she is part of a new generation of scientists reshaping our understanding of how galaxies evolve and how cosmic giants come into being. At NASA's Astrophysics Data Systems (ADS), she is building next-generation tools that help astronomers worldwide keep up with the constant deluge of scientific papers and related materials. Her journey to the stars began far from the laboratories of the US. Born in Hyderabad, educated in BITS-Pilani Dubai, and raised in Abu Dhabi, Mugdha grew up under desert skies, where her father often told her stories about constellations and Indian traditions of astronomy. Those stories, half myth and half science, lit up her imagination. What began as childhood

infatuation with the night sky gradually transformed into a career dedicated to uncovering its deepest mysteries. Mugdha's most celebrated breakthrough came during her doctoral research at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Her team discovered that dwarf galaxies – the small, faint cousins of galaxies like our Milky Way – host many more black holes than anyone had realised. 'Almost all of them were overlooked,' she explains. 'Their signals were mistaken for high-energy stars. But when we looked again with different techniques, it became clear these were real, growing black holes hiding in plain sight.'The discovery matters because large galaxies such as the Milky Way are thought to have formed by merging thousands of dwarf galaxies. If those dwarfs carried hidden black holes,

How the wobbled seam helped Mohammed Siraj run through West Indies on Day 1 at Ahmedabad

Day One of their home season began on a resounding note for India. On what was a muggy day in Ahmedabad with a 22-minute rain-break in the third session, despite losing the toss, India showed all the good signs of their old self. Setting the tone straightaway were their pacers Mohammed Siraj and Jasprit Bumrah who restricted the spinners to a supporting role before KL Rahul brought assuredness to their batting. If they breathed fire with the ball, they looked solid with the bat. All of it meant, West Indies, as expected, struggled to put any sort of fight, combusting under sustained pressure to fold for 162 under two sessions. At stumps, India were only 41-runs behind after losing Yashavi Jaiswal and B Sai Sudharsan.

For a team that is still reeling under the shock defeat to New Zealand a year back, India were not willing to take chances against an opponent that is ranked eighth in the table. Even though the West Indies are thin on experience, India didn't compromise on one aspect – adding depth to batting and bowling. It has been the case since Gautam Gambhir took charge as coach and the pitch in Ahmedabad provided more reasons for him to field as many as three all-rounders. With a fair bit of grass on it, the pitch offered movement and good carry throughout the day for the seamers before the odd deliveries from the spinners began to spit and turn towards the end of the day. Maybe this is what prompted West Indies to expose themselves against two raging pacers Bumrah and Siraj. And more than the former, whom the Caribbean great Andy Roberts had told this newspaper that they would have preferred him to be part of their pace quartet, it was Siraj who was the unplayable

Having thrived in recent months, in particular in the absence of Bumrah, Siraj has come across a different seamer, one with the capability to move the ball both ways. Unfortunately for the Windies, Siraj found his rhythm soon. In the two months he spent at his home town Hyderabad, one of Siraj's favourite pastime was to make a drive to Eidgah Maidan in the Old city, park his swanky car and have the Irani Chai from the mobile chaiwala. It is a place where he is able to reconnect with himself, and the same can be said when he takes up the red cherry as well. With a

cross-seam delivery – which he delivers when none of his other tricks aren't working for him – he can conjure moments of brilliance out of nowhere. It is that scrambled seam that undone Brandon King and later on Roston Chase before he struggled hard to get the fifth that never arrived. "When my in-swing stopped. I automatically started getting an out-swing. Then, I realised that this uses wobble seam kehte hain. I kept putting it in practice. I have just heard the name wobble seam," he said at the end of the day. "I get wickets by working hard. I got wickets by working hard in England as well. Here also, I worked hard. No one gave me a free wicket, mujhe 5th wicket pe koi nahi diva."

With Bumrah, it was a different sort of a day. Like Siraj, he sent down 14 overs, but appeared far from his lethal best, but the X-factor bowler he is, produced two special deliveries towards the end of West Indies innings. All-rounder Justin Greaves, who looked the part during his 48-ball stay where he top-scored with 32, had no answer to a screeching yorker from Bumrah that took the off-stump with it. Ollie Pope would definitely sympathise with Greaves. And to Johann Layne, he dished out another full delivery that came back in sharply to dismantle the off and middle stump.

The performance of the two quicks meant the spin trio of Ravindra Jadeja, Washington Sundar and Kuldeep Yadav had little to do. When the seamers were struggling to control their line, Washington and Kuldeep were warming up as early as the second over, as if to send a reminder to skipper Shubman Gill. He eventually turned to them, but in total they delivered 12.1 overs between them for two wickets.



Lionel Messi has confirmed his visit to India, stating that it is an "honour" to revisit the "passionate football nation" country where he last played 14 years ago. Messi will embark on a four-city tour of India starting at Kolkata on December 12. He will then fly to Ahmedabad, followed by Mumbai and then Delhi on December where he is set to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "It is such an honour for me to make this trip. India is a very special country, and I have good memories from my time there 14 years ago — the fans were fantastic. India is a passionate football nation, and I look forward to meeting a new generation of fans while sharing the love I have for this beautiful game," Messi said in an official statement.

Organiser Satadru Dutta had already unveiled the itinerary on August 15, and Messi's statement on Thursday marked the first time the football great himself confirmed the visit. After landing in Kolkata on December 12, the next day Messi will attend the unveiling of a statue of his followed by a 'GOAT Concert' and 'GOAT Cup'. The GOAT Cup will be a celebratory seven-a-side soft-touch football match, with Messi teaming up alongside Sourav Ganguly, Leander Paes, John Abraham and Bhaichung Bhutia. Tickets are likely to start at Rs 3,500 and West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee is expected to felicitate Messi during the programme. This will be followed by a flight to Ahmedabad on the evening of December 13, where Dutta says Messi will be attending a private event with some of his sponsors. Messi then moves to Mumbai on December 14. Messi will be in Delhi on December 15, where he will have another GOAT Concert at the Arun Jaitley Stadium. Dutta also said that Messi will be meeting Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "We will seek an appointment from the Prime Minister," Dutta said. The visit this year won't be Messi's first trip to India. That was made in 2011, when he played a friendly against Venezuela at the Salt Lake Stadium in



Kolkata. That also happened to be Messi's first match as Argentina captain.

Messi in Kerala too in November?

Even as Messi prepares for his December commitments, the Argentina national football team has included India in its schedule for a November FIFA international window. The Lionel Scaloni-coached world champions are set to play a friendly in Kerala between November 10-18, though the opponents and venue are yet to be finalised. If that visit goes ahead, it could mean Messi making two trips to India within two months. However, it remains to be seen whether the 38-year-old forward will feature in the Kerala match."I will be surprised if the legendary footballer comes twice in a month. However, it is most likely that the Argentina team minus Messi may come to play in Kerala," a source in the state said. The November friendly will be part of three games during the window, with the other two scheduled in Angola. "The Argentine national team, led by Lionel Scaloni, will have two FIFA friendly windows in the remainder of 2025," the AFA had said in its statement. "The first, in October, from the 6th to the 14th, will be played in the United States (opponents and cities to be determined). The second, from the 10th to the 18th of November, will be played in Luanda, Angola, and Kerala, India (opponents to be determined)," it added. Messi, an Olympic gold medallist and 2022 World Cup-winning captain, continues to attract unprecedented fanfare worldwide, and his December tour is expected to be one of the biggest football-related events ever staged in India.

World champion Gukesh D drops out of top 10 in FIDE rankings; Divya Deshmukh rises to no 11 in women's list



After a wretched FIDE Grand Swiss in Uzbekistan's Samarkand, world champion Gukesh Dommaraju has fallen out of the top 10 rankings in the October 2025 ratings list announced by FIDE on Wednesday. At the Grand Swiss tournament in September, Gukesh had ended in 41st spot out of 116 players having lost three games in a row and being held to four draws over the course of the 11-round tournament. Gukesh, the youngest world champion in history, lost 15 rating points—from 2767 in September to 2752 in October—over the course of 11 rounds in Samarkand. Gukesh was rated 2794 last October, meaning he has lost

43 rating points in the past year. Gukesh's predecessor on the world championship throne, China's Ding Liren, is currently in 18th spot with a rating of 2734.

Divya Deshmukh, meanwhile, is also ranked no 11 in the women's ratings list with a tally of 2498. Divya had a remarkable month winning the Women's World Cup, which earned her a spot in the Women's Candidates tournament and then playing in the open section of the Grand Swiss, where she beat two grandmasters and held world champion Gukesh to a draw. Vaishali R successfully defended her title at the Women's Grand Swiss, picking up 21 rating points and reaching a career-high 15th place. Arjun Erigaisi, at world no 4, is the top rated Indian chess player with a rating of 2773 followed by Praggnanandhaa, who is world no 5 with 2771. Praggnanandhaa also lost 14 rating points at the Grand Swiss tournament. Magnus Carlsen remains the world no 1 with a rating of 2839. Carlsen and Hikaru Nakamura are the only two players with a rating over 2800 in the October rating list. In women's ratings, Koneru Humpy remains the best-rated Indian player at world no 6. Meanwhile, China's Zhu Jiner rose to world 2 after an excellent performance at the Fujairah Global Chess Championships Superstars, where she earned 21 rating points and reached a career-high.

'He made an innocent face that day': Abhishek Sharma reveals childhood incident about Shubman Gill after Asia Cup 2025 triumph

Indian T20I opener Abhishek Sharma has revealed that Test captain Shubman Gill was one player who never got caught doing mischief when he was a junior cricketer. The 25-year-old narrated an incident from the Under-16 days when he was part of five players who had caused trouble, but the bus drivers refused to blame Gill for it. Sharma said that Gill had a "talent" to alter expressions and had made an innocent face on that day, when the incident took place.

"There is one guy who did a lot of mischief in agegroup cricket but never got caught, and that is Shubman. I will tell you an incident. We were in Dharamsala for Under-16. Our hotel was 500m away from the stadium. We used to go there by bus. The driver was stopping the music, but we wanted to play Punjabi songs. He said no, and we got into an argument with him. And the one who was shouting the most was Shubman. The incident went to the coaches and the drivers complained.""They asked the drivers to identify who did it. There were 4-5 of us. Five of us were standing in a line and Shubman was last. The coach pointed towards each of us and asked the drivers. They said no it was not him (Shubman). I was shocked. They called the four of us out and made us sign a letter that was to send us back home. I was sad that how come the one who started it was not called out. He has a talent to change expressions. He made an innocent face that day." Sharma said on the "Breakfast with Champions" show.

The southpaw credited the role played by his father in



pushing him towards playing the game when he was young. He admitted that his father was a strict coach, but agreed that was the right guidance he needed at that stage. "In the beginning, I felt that as a youngster, even if you are talented, till your Under-19 days, you need someone who can push you. That was my dad. He was a different coach. He was very strict. But I also feel I needed someone like that for the way I was. I would be so scared. Even if I was out in any game by hitting a lofted shot, I would not sit next to him while he would be driving. I would sit behind. He would start anytime talking about my shot selection," he said. The Punjab left-hander made his T20I debut for India against Zimbabwe in July 2024. He is currently the number one T20I batter in the world, with 931 ranking points against his name.

'Spoke to Tendulkar and Steve Smith before England series': Shubman Gill reveals advice from them

India's Test captain Shubman Gill had starred in the Test series in England, amassing 754 runs in five Tests at an average of 75.40 with four hundreds. He has now revealed that he had spoken to Australia's Steve Smith and Sachin Tendulkar just before he left for that tour to pick up trade secrets to do well in England. "There was pressure of not doing well outside India. But I was feeling very confident in terms of my practice, mentally, and what positions I was getting into," Gill told Hotstar.

When the host asked him if he took counsel from someone in particular, Gill revealed the two cricketers he consulted on how to play in England."I spoke to Sachin Sir and also took the (phone) number from Matthew Wade (who played with Gill in the IPL team) and spoke to Steve Smith. Both said the same thing: defend straight and score square."That advice has proved to be simple and effective. If there was one issue in Shubman's batting in the past, it was his slow weight transfer onto the front foot. Quality seamers like James Anderson, Tim Southee, Kylie Jamieson, Matt Henry, Mohammad Shami (in IPL), Scott Boland and others have all dismissed him with a good-length nipbacker that would either trap him lbw or get him bowled. He wouldn't get a proper stride out and if he did, he would be late in getting there. Sachin Tendulkar had told The Indian Express just before the first Test about what Gill needs

to do to tackle that front-foot issue. "80% of the time or even more, most batters are dismissed on that front foot," Tendulkar told this newspaper. "Back foot, unless it's an obvious weakness, is less. The key to solving this is to focus a lot on getting on the front foot, having that nice stride on the front foot and defending well. Driving is only an extension of that. If he [Shubman] can keep it straight and do that, it will help him. "When the length is closer to you, then the hands automatically are going to go. But his challenge is not to let the hands go when the length is not there to be driven ... To start with, he has to play in the V, just like our coaches used to tell us. As that would help him to also leave the balls [not just deal with nipbackers] because when focusing on playing in the V, your eyeline and your body setup is different. So, I would like him initially to stay side on and move forward if the ball is pitched up," Tendulkar had told this newspaper. Gill's reluctance to get on to that front foot stems from his childhood, in his developmental years of playing cricket. His game had been built on cement tracks as a kid where he would either stand tall at crease or even push back a touch to punch balls on the rise. In case he moved forward it was never a stride but a short step. If the ball was fuller, he would just let his hands go through the line. It had become such a strength of his, that if he changed that particular aspect, it might upset his balance and poise.

In a recent interview with Digital Commentary, Inaamulhaq opened up about how his cameos in Jolly LLB 2 and Airlift went viral on social media, yet few bothered to learn his name. Instead, he was frequently referred to as "Akshay Kumar's co-actor." I have a problem with that. When Airlift came out, people didn't even mention my name. They used to write 'Akshay Kumar's co-actor'. But I haven't come here to build my identity as someone's co-actor. I want people to write my name. I want my name to be recognized. I came here to earn a name, please take it correctly."In the same conversation, Inaamulhaq also revealed how, after the success of Filmistaan, a strange perception began circulating that he was actually a Pakistani actor, something he has repeatedly had to clarify. He emphasized that he was born and raised in India, and proudly identifies as an Indian ac-

Emily Blunt, Whoopi Goldberg and others rally against AI generated actor Tilly Norwood: 'Please don't do this'



Ever since Dutch actor Eline Van der Velden revealed the new Al-generated actor Tilly Norwood, Hollywood has been in a frenzy. SAG members and actors have come out in numbers to oppose the usage of artificially created actors for their projects, and the whole industry looks to be panicking. Unveiled as the next Scarlett Johansson, Tilly has been the talk of the town for quite some time, but she really made some news when Velden talked about getting her some acting gigs. She said during a summit at Zurich, "When we first launched Tilly, people were like, 'What's that?' Now we're going to be announcing which agency is going to be representing her in the next few months." It did not take long for SAGAFTRA to release a strongly-worded statement against this move.

The statement read, "To be clear, 'Tilly Norwood' is not an actor; it's a character generated by a computer program that was trained on the work of countless professional performers — without permission or compensation. It has no life experience to draw from, no emotion and, from what we've seen, audiences aren't interested in watching computer-generated content untethered from the human experience. It doesn't solve any 'problem' — it creates the problem of using stolen performances to put actors out of work, jeopardising performer livelihoods and devaluing human artistry." The organisation has always been against the integration of Al into the industry, considering Al was a major point of contention during the 2023 strikes.

Actor Emily Blunt also reacted to Tilly Norwood during an interview with Variety, where she said, "No, are you serious? That's an Al? Good Lord, we're screwed. That is really, really scary. Come on, agencies, don't do that. Please stop. Please stop taking away our human connection." She admitted that she was terrified about Al and did not really know how to react to the news. Veteran actor Whoopi Goldberg gave her two cents on the matter during her show The View. She said, "You can always tell them from us. We move differently, our faces move differently, and our bod-

ies move differently."

The backlash is now getting even more serious, with Equity (Actors Guild) also joining in and expressing concerns. Their audio and new media organiser, Shannon Sailing, told BBC Radio, "Tilly is not an actress. She is an Al tool. Or 'it' is in the Al tool. That's not a performer. But what that tool is is made up of performers' work, and we are concerned about where that work has come from and if that's been given consent to be used in that way."

Shah Rukh Khan becomes world's richest actor with \$1.4 bn fortune

Mumbai: Bollywood megastar Shah Rukh Khan is now the richest entertainer in the world. The actor has now officially become a billionaire with an estimated wealth of \$1.4 billion.

As per the M3M Hurun India Rich List 2025, Shah Rukh Khan has officially entered the billionaire club. This milestone places him among the wealthiest entertainers globally. Notably, his wealth surpasses that of several international celebrities, including Taylor Swift (\$1.3 billion), Arnold Schwarzenegger (\$1.2 billion), Jerry Seinfeld (\$1.2 billion), and Selena Gomez (\$720 million).SRK's wealth extends beyond his film career, and is anchored in a diversified portfolio of businesses and investments. His flagship enterprise is Red Chillies Entertainment, founded in 2002, which has produced numerous blockbuster films such as Chennai Express, Raees, and Pathaan. The company not only produces films but also manages visual effects, distribution, and content rights, making it a major player in Indian entertainment. He also co-owns the Kolkata Knight Riders (KKR), a franchise in the Indian Premier League (IPL), which has been highly profitable both from sponsorship deals and league revenues. In addition, he has significant real estate holdings, including his iconic Mumbai residence Mannat, a villa in Beverly Hills, a farmhouse in Alibaug, and properties in London and Dubai. He has also invested in luxury automobiles and lifestyle brands, while Red Chillies has a separate visual effects and post-production wing that generates additional income through third-party projects. Collectively, these ventures have made SRK a global business mogul, contributing substantially to his net worth of INR 12,490 crore (roughly \$1.4 billion).

'Raj Kapoor demanded a mela every day; new toilets and makeup rooms were constructed at RK Studios': Ketan Desai recalls shooting 'John Jaani Janardhan'

Long before Farah Khan's iconic Om Shanti Om title track brought together dozens of Bollywood stars, it was filmmaker Manmohan Desai who first pulled off the grand stunt. For his 1981 blockbuster Naseeb, he conceptualised the legendary song "John Jaani Janardhan", featuring a galaxy of stars including Raj Kapoor, Shammi Kapoor, Randhir Kapoor, Dharmendra, Rajesh Khanna, Rakesh Roshan, Vijay Arora, Waheeda Rehman, Sharmila Tagore, Mala Sinha, Bindu, Simi Garewal, Simple Kapadia, and Prema Narayan. The star-studded song was shot at RK Studios over the course of a week. In a conversation with Manju Ramanan Talks, Manmohan Desai's son, Ketan Desai—then just 17—recalled being handed the enormous responsibility of organising the shoot.


Ketan revealed how the idea was born: "My father was chatting with his writers when someone asked him why he always seemed nervous despite back-to-back hits. He said, 'You're still celebrating success, while I'm thinking how to raise the bar.' When asked what could possibly be bigger than directing a multi-starrer, he suddenly replied, 'What if we bring the entire industry together in one scene?' Since Amitabh Bachchan was already playing a waiter in the song, he imagined a setting where all the stars gathered at a party, while Amitabh served them."The concept sounded impossible to a teenage Ketan Desai. "I panicked and told my father, 'It's easy to say, but how do we pull this off?' He looked at me and asked, 'Are you satisfied with your pay?' When I said yes, he simply told me to get it done. While he personally spoke to the bigger stars, I coordinated with the others, arranged costumes, and managed the logistics."

The arrangements were elaborate. "Because RK Studios had limited makeup rooms, we constructed additional spaces, even toilets. Outside, we created a festive mela with kebabs, vegetarian and non-vegetarian stalls, and chaat counters—something new every day. Raj Kapoor said: 'Manmohan mujhe roz mela chahiye (I want a fair-like



atmosphere). Raj Kapoor played a critical role in the making of song and he assured my father, 'Don't worry, I will handle the actors." Manmohan Desai even asked lyricist Anand Bakshi to tailor lines for specific stars. "For Dharmendra, the quintessential tough hero, a special line was written to highlight his persona," Ketan recalled. The camaraderie among actors was palpable—Randhir Kapoor jokingly remarked, "We are the highest paid junior artistes ever! All this while, we played the leads, and now we have become extras." To which Raj Kapoor wisely replied, "In cinema, whether you're the lead or a junior artiste, you are all part of the film." Raj Kapoor played a vital role in ensuring discipline on set. "He managed timings for all actors. Every day, he would sit with my dad and ask him the actors he would need for the next day's shoot and he would personally inform them about their timings with a warning that they can't be late. He would arrive first every day, and because he was the most senior, no one dared to be late. After each day's shoot, he would also give my father feedback," Ketan

Rani Mukerji, Aditya Chopra will never share their wedding photos, actor reveals he encouraged her to do Hichki: 'He saw me getting into a mother's role too seriously'



Actor Rani Mukerji and producer Aditya Chopra, who tied the knot in 2014, have always kept their relationship private.
