ED searches 40 locations in West Bengal, Jharkhand over coal theft

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Friday (November 21, 2025) conducted coordinated searches at more than 40 locations in West Bengal and Jharkhand in connection with coal theft and mining cases in the two States. The agency has so far seized over ?10 crore in cash or precious metals as well as copies of 120 land deeds. While cash and gold or jewellery totalling over ?8 crore have been impounded from different locations in West Bengal, over ?2.20 crore in cash and land deeds have been found in Jharkhand.In Jharkhand, 18 locations linked to major cases of coal theft and smuggling, allegedly involving "Anil Goyal, Sanjay Udhyog, LB Singh and Amar Mandal" were covered by the agency, an official said.

Thirty seven Maoists surrender before Telangana DGP in Hyd

Hyderabad: In a major development, 37 CPI (Maoist) members from Telangana and Chhattisgarh surrendered before the Telangana DGP B Shivadhar Reddy in Hyderabad on Saturday. Among them are Koyyada Sambaiah alias Azad (49), a native of Mulugu district, and Appasi Narayana alias Ramesh (70), a native of Peddapalli district. Both carried rewards of Rs 20 lakh each. Among the important Maoist leaders who surrendered are Muchaki Somada alias Erra (42), State Committee Member in DKSZC and a native of Chhattisgarh, who also carried a reward of Rs 20 lakh.

Telangana DGP B Shivadhar Reddy said the decision of the 37 underground cadres reflects a positive and constructive response to the appeal to surrender. "It also signifies a conscious and pragmatic step to move away from the path of extremism and reintegrate into civil society. They have chosen to prioritise health and family and have resolved to lead a peaceful, dignified and law-abiding life," he said. Seven of the 37 cadres who surrendered before the DGP handed over eight firearms including an AK 47, two SLRs, four .303 rifles and a G3 rifle along with 346 live ammunition of various calibres. A total amount of Rs 1.41 crore was handed over to the surrendered Maoists.

Telangana DGP said that a total of 59 cadres from Telangana are active and working with the CPI (Maoist) party. "Of the eight Central Committee Members, five are natives of Telangana State," he said. He said the Maoists



are facing a significant decline in organisational strength and operational capabilities resulting in large surrenders. "Over recent years, the outfit sustained pressure from security forces, resulting in disruption of key networks, reduced mobility and shrinking support base. Ideological differences have emerged within the organisation, creating dissatisfaction among cadres regarding the relevance and direction of the movement," said Shivadhar Reddy. He added that so far 465 Maoists of different ranks have surrendered in Telangana in 2025. The Telangana DGP appealed to the Maoists to surrender and added, "You can surrender with the help of revenue officials, local politicians, press persons or your relatives. We assure to take care of your rehabilitation as per the guidelines of the Telangana government.

PM Modi, Giorgia Meloni meet briefly ahead of G20 Summit in South Africa

Johannesburg: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday briefly met Italian counterpart Giorgia Meloni just ahead of the opening session of the G20 Leaders' Summit at Nasrec in South Africa. Both leaders shook hands and exchanged warm greetings, displaying the strong rapport that has deeply strengthened India-Italy friendship over the past few years. PM Modi is among several prominent world leaders attending the November 22-23 summit.PM Modi had last met Meloni on the sidelines of the 51st G7 Summit in Canada's Kananaskis in June, where both leaders had committed to making the friendship between India and Italy stronger. In September, PM Modi called the Italian PM an "extraordinary political leader who combines ideas and heart", described her autobiography as a "Mann Ki Baat", or ideas from the heart.In the preface to the book titled 'I Am Giorgia', PM Modi emphasised the closeness between India and Italy, founded on what he writes as "shared civilising instincts, such as the defence of heritage, the strength of community, and the celebration of femininity as a guiding force". Reciprocating the feelings, Meloni had mentioned that the bond between both nations remains quite strong. "The words of Prime Minister Narendra



Modi, for whom I have profound respect, in his preface to the Indian edition of the book 'I Am Giorgia', deeply touch and honour me. These are sentiments that I sincerely reciprocate, with all my heart, and which testify to the strong bond between our nations," Meloni was quoted as saying by Italian news agency Adnkronos.PM Modi's preface to the book, which Adnkronos said it was able to read, stands out for its personal and symbolic tone as the Indian leader links this message to his personal friendship with Meloni and their shared ability to combine tradi-

Sajjanar launches Cybercrime awareness rally, urges public vigilance

Hyderabad: Fear and greed of the public is becoming the investment for cyber criminals, pointed out Hyderabad Police Commissioner, V C Sajjanar, while stressing the need for everyone to be more vigilant regarding cybercrimes.Participating in 'Jagrut Hyderabad Surakshit Hyderabad' Cybercrime Awareness Programme on Saturday at Charminar, he distributed

pamphlets on cybercrime prevention and flagged off the Cybercrime awareness rally from Charminar to Madina.

Sajjanar said 'Jagrut Hyderabad - Surakshit Hyderabad' cybercrime awareness programmes are being conducted every Tuesday and Saturday, as part of which, police officials are going to every house to create awareness. He said the public is being involved in cybercrime prevention, and volunteers who come forward willingly were asked to register their names as Cyber Simbas. Sajjanar cautioned against uploading private photos and personal details on social media, as doing so creates the possibility of being trapped and defrauded. Children were getting addicted to social media, especially girls who were becoming victims by chatting with unknown individuals and providing personal details. He advised parents to be careful with their daughters and to explain precautions before giving them mobile phones. He also stressed the need to be extremely vigilant about 'Digital Arrest' frauds that target the elderly. In case of falling victim to a cyber fraud, the victims should immediately call the Helpline Number 1930 to report the incident and also file a complaint at www.cybercrime.gov.in.

New Nitish Kumar cabinet full of corrupts, criminals, alleges Prashant Kishor

Jan Suraaj Party leader Prashant Kishor, on Friday (November 21, 2025), alleged that the new cabinet of the Nitish Kumar government in Bihar was full of corrupt and criminal leaders. Speaking to reporters after a day-long silent fast at Gandhi Ashram in West Champaran, Mr. Kishor also said his party will launch the 'Bihar Navnirman Sankalp Yatra' on January 15, during which Jan Suraaj Party workers will visit all houses in the State. "The new cabinet of Nitish Kumar, which took oath on Thursday, is full of corrupt and criminals. I must say that this council of ministers is a slap in the face of the people of Bihar. It's like rubbing salt on the wound as several corrupt leaders were inducted," he

alleged, days after drubbing in the recently held Assembly elections in the State.Mr. Kishor claimed the leaders inducted into the cabinet indicate that Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah and CM Kumar are least concerned about Bihar. "They have purchased votes by transferring ?10,000 into the bank account of more than 1 crore women. Now, they have no concern for the State or the people," he alleged. "If I am saying anything wrong, the State government can put me behind bars," he added.Mr. Kishor claimed the government diverted funds from the State's contingency fund and a grant from the World Bank for the cash transfer scheme."Now, we will ensure that women get Rs 2 lakh as promised by the NDA ahead of the polls," he said.Mr. Kishore said as part of the 'Bihar Navnirman Sankalp Yatra', Jan Suraaj Party workers, including him, will visit every house in the state. "We will visit all houses in the state over 15-18 months and create awareness among organisation of the Jan Suraaj Party will be strengthened before the campaign starts," he said. The former poll strategist said he will donate 90% of his income over the next five years for the party's campaign. "Besides, whatever assets I have acquired in the last 20 years, except my Delhi house, I will donate those for the party," he said."Now, I request the people of Bihar to donate just ?1,000 to the party on a yearly basis. I will not meet anyone who doesn't donate this amount to the party," he

The BRS president had embarked on the fast with the slogan "Telangana vachudo – KCR Sachchudo" (Either Telangana or KCR's death) demonstrating his firm resolve to achieve Statehood.


The indefinite hunger strike forced the Centre to announce the formation of Telangana and remains a symbol of supreme sacrifice in the Statehood movement. "Deeksha Diwas is a glorious milestone in Telangana's history. We must celebrate it with pride and enthusiasm across every district," Rama Rao told party leaders. Rama Rao instructed district units to conduct preparatory meetings at all party headquarters on November 26. MLAs, former MLAs, MPs, MLCs, former ministers, ex corporation chairpersons and other key leaders must be invited to these meetings to finalise a detailed action plan for the successful conduct of Deeksha Diwas programmes. The main Deeksha Diwas

events will be organised at party offices in every district headquarters. The programme will commence by paying tributes to Telangana Thalli and the martyrs' memorial followed by milk abhishekam to a large cut-out of Chandrashekhar Rao. Photo exhibitions will be organised featuring historic moments, news clippings and developments related to the 2009 fast unto death. Social welfare activities such as fruit distribution and annadanam will also be conducted, while a special fruit distribution programme will be held at NIMS Hospital in Hyderabad on the occasion.BRS youth and student wings will organise Deeksha Diwas programmes in every university campus, wearing special T-shirts bearing Chandrashekhar Rao's portrait and the Deeksha Diwas logo.

South Telangana braces for light to moderate showers

Hyderabad: Telangana residents, particularly those residing in the southern districts, might have to switch over from heavy winter jackets to raincoats as the State is expected to see light to moderate rain or thundershowers during the next two days. This is due to formation of a low pressure over Strait of Malacca. It is expected to intensify into a depression over the southeast Bay of Bengal around November 24, and further intensify during the subsequent 48 hours. As per Saturday's preliminary forecast, districts including Bhadradri Kothagudem, Khammam, Nalgonda, Suryapet, Nagarkurnool, and Wanaparthy are expected to witness light to moderate rains due to depression. However, there are no major changes in the weather conditions in Hyderabad in the next two days. In its forecast, the IMD said light to moderate rain or thundershowers are very likely to occur at isolated places over Telangana on Sunday and Monday and dry weather is likely to prevail from November

HC halts Telangana's 85% local quota in PG medical management seats

Hyderabad: Chief Justice Aparesh Kumar Singh and Justice GM Mohiuddin of the Telangana High Court on Friday put on hold the State's recent amendments introducing an 85 per cent local quota within the management seats for postgraduate medical courses in private unaided institutions. The Court was hearing a batch of writ petitions filed by non-local students seeking admission to PG courses under the management category in private, unaided, minority and non-minority colleges. They argued that until this year, management quota seats were open without any reservation, and the sudden introduction of an 85:15 local-toall India division after the admission process had already begun was illegal and fundamentally unfair.

Senior counsel Gandra Mohan Rao, appearing for the petitioners, contended that the government's amendments through GO Ms Nos 200 and 201 dated November 3, 2025, effectively rewrote the admission framework mid-process. He submitted that the move ran contrary to the Supreme Court's ruling in PA Inamdar vs State of Maharashtra, which bars reservation within management quota seats, and violated Article 14.He also relied on the Supreme Court's recent judgment in Dr Tanvi Behl vs Shrey Goel, which held that residence-based reservations are permissible for MBBS but not for postgraduate medical courses that require higher merit and competitiveness.

The counsel argued that dividing management quota seats into 85 per cent for locals and only 15 per cent for allIndia candidates would drastically reduce the petitioners chances, amounting to changing the rules midway. The State and the Standing Counsel for Kaloji Narayana Rao University of Health Sciences sought time to obtain instructions and file counter affidavits. After hearing all sides, the bench held that the amendments prima facie amounted to "changing the rules of the game after it has begun" and decided to keep the new quota formula in abeyance for the current academic year. It clarified that the impugned rule introducing 85 per cent local reservation shall not apply to PG medical admissions for 2025-26 under Management Quota Sub-Category-1 in private, unaided minority and non-minority colleges. The State and the University were granted four weeks to file their counters, and petitioners were given two weeks thereafter to file replies. The matter was posted to January 19, 2026 for further hearing.

BRS demands Assembly session to debate controversial industrial land policy

Hyderabad: Demanding an immediate Assembly session to enable full debate on the controversial Hyderabad Industrial Land Conversion policy of the Congress government, Bharat Rashtra Samiti (BRS) senior leader T Harish Rao on Saturday sought an immediate probe into what he called collusion with real estate interests and pre-arranged deals. Addressing a news conference at Telangana Bhavan, Harish Rao and other party leaders also demanded complete suspension of the policy until all allegations were clarified and questions answered. Harish Rao posed eight pointed questions to the Congress government led by Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, seeking immediate answers on the controversial new industrial land conversion policy that allows payment of just 30 percent of the land value instead of the higher rates followed during the previous BRS re-

Right-sizing Indian banks needs more than mergers

In a large, diverse economy with various income groups and businesses, the banking system's capacity nust be properly aligned in terms of outreach and business volume to realise its growth potential fully. The strength of banks is measured worldwide by asset size or narket capitalisation. The ranking of the top 100 global banks is based on these metrics. S&P Global Market Inelligence data ranked SBI at 43rd and HDFC at 73rd among the top 100 global banks in 2025, based on 2024 data. It places HDFC at 10th, ICICI at 20th, and SBI at 25th in the worldwide ranking by market capitalisation.

It is continually debated that India, as the fourth-largest economy and on its way to becoming the third-largest economy, should have more banks on the global list to und its burgeoning growth opportunities. The current size and scale of banks may not bode well for achieving the aspirational growth envisioned under the Viksit Bharat 2047 vision. An aggressive and collaborative financial ector ecosystem is needed to ramp up the capacity.

The well-diversified banking system has developed, vith bank reforms leading to the entry of new private and differentiated banks, thereby strengthening the number of commercial banks to 128. It includes 12 public sector banks, 21 private sector banks, 28 regional rural banks, 44 foreign banks, 11 small finance banks, five private banks, and two local area banks. The four non-scheduled banks are local cooperative banks. Additionally, there are 1,470 urban cooperative banks. The evolving banking sector serves its customers through a network of 165,000 bank branches and 2,15,000 ATMs. The financial sector n March 2025 had an asset base of Rs 730 lakh crore, with 55 per cent. or Rs 415 lakh crore, held by banks.

WASMO accountant defrauds department of Rs 1.41 crore, booked

Chhota Udepur district police, WASMO, Assistant Accountant, Timir Hasmukh Patel, According to the FIR lodged by the district police, the financial transactions made by Timir Hasmukh Patel involved misappropriation of funds. The Chhota Udepur district police have booked an Assistant Accountant of the Water and Sanitation management Organisation (WASMO) of Chhota Udepur district for allegedly defrauding the department of Rs 1.41 crores through 56 transactions into his personal account between November 2024 and October this year. WASMO Assistant Accountant Timir Hasmukh Patel has been booked for forgery, using forged documents and criminal breach of trust after it came into light that Patel had siphoned off money from the Water and Sanitation department grants meant for various programmes in the rural areas. An FIR lodged at Chhota Udepur police station, based on the complaint of WASMO Unit manager states the fraud came to light during Diwali last month when the cheques meant for paying staff salary were not deposited into the bank account of the department. The FIR states that when Patel, who was entrusted with the task of depositing the cheques for payment of staff salary, was asked about the delay, he had stated that the bank concerned had not updated the amount due to a "delay" in the process.



Criminal cases will be filed against contractors if farmers are inconvenienced by not sending lorries to purchase centers:

Yadadri Bhuvanagiri District Collector Hanumantha Rao ""(Mandava Srisailam.. Yadadri Bhuvanagiri District Bureau...Indian Chronicle.. November 22) :- Yadadri Bhuvanagiri District Collector Hanumantha Rao has warned that criminal cases will be filed against contractors if farmers are inconvenienced by not sending lorries to purchase centers. On Saturday, the District Collector conducted a surprise inspection of the FPO and PACS grain purchase centers located in the Valigonda Market Yard of Yadadri Bhuvanagiri district. Speaking on this occasion, the District Collector said ... adequate lorries should be sent to the purchase centers every day. "The District Collector warned that if there is negligence in sending lorries, cases will be registered against the relevant contractors. They asked how much grain was purchased at the two centers and how much grain was left in the market. They inquired whether the Agriculture AEOs come every day and checked the grain grade or not. They said that the grain with moisture content should be immediately bagged and sent to the mills. They said that it was not possible to stay in the market. When the managers informed that not enough lorries were coming to the center, the District Collector expressed his anger by calling the relevant contractor. He warned that if the managers called that the lorries were not coming to the center, they would file cases and take action against the lower-level staff for not paying attention and not responding properly. Later, the District Collector made a surprise inspection of the I.K.P. grain purchase center in Sangem, Valigonda mandal. On this occasion, the District Collector spoke to the center managers and asked how much grain was in the center, how much grain was purchased, and whether the tab entry was completed until the purchase was made. The tab entry should be completed as soon as the lorries are loaded, "If the truck sheets are delayed, the tab

entry will be late, so it should be completed early. He said



that the money is being deposited to the farmers within 48 hours of the purchase. "When the center in-charges said that the purchase would be late due to the lack of lorries, they called the concerned contractor and asked him to send 6 lorries a day to the two centers of the Sangem IKP purchase center. He said that the lorries would be delayed without the lorries. The district collector warned that action would be taken against the contractors if they inconvenience the farmers. "Later, the district collector made a surprise inspection of the PACS paddy purchase center in Sunkishala, Valigonda mandal. On this occasion, the district collector spoke to the farmers... How many days did it take to reach the center, how many acres of crop was planted, and whether the staff came and checked the moisture content and planted the konta every day. "He asked the center administrators whether the center was receiving enough lorries every day and asked them to complete the tab entry for the piles of paddy that had been purchased so far. If the tab entry is pending, the bills will be delayed, so entries should be completed on time. The concerned officials, center administrators, and farmers participated in this program.

'Large-scale hill cutting and illegal tree felling' case: NGT directs HP pollution panel to file compliance report on recovery of environmental compensation

National Green Tribunal, NGT, Himachal Pradesh State Pollution Control Board, The NGT had held that Indu Walia was liable to pay environmental compensation and instructed the HPSPCB to determine the amount and recover it within three months. The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has directed the Himachal Pradesh State Pollution Control Board (HPSPCB) to file a fresh compliance report on the recovery of environmental compensation in a case involving alleged large-scale hill cutting and illegal tree felling in Una district. The directive came on Friday.

The matter stems from a petition filed by Bhavak Parasher, who had blamed one Indu Walia of removing a

mountain top using heavy machinery and dumping its remains down the slopes in village Mahalat of Una district, causing extensive damage to the local topography. The case was originally disposed of by the tribunal on August 27, 2024, with directions to the HPSPCB to compute environmental compensation and take punitive action. The NGT had held that Walia was liable to pay environmental compensation and instructed the HPSPCB to determine the amount and recover it within three months. It also asked the Board to initiate punitive and remedial measures to restore the environment damaged due to the illegal felling of trees. The HPSPCB was further directed to file a compliance report by December 15, 2024. In response, the HPSPCB submitted a report dated December 13, 2024, stating that it had calculated an environmental compensation of Rs 3,83,870 in consultation with the Forest Department. The assessment was based on a methodology framed by the Uttarakhand Pollution Control Board for evaluating damage caused by illegal tree cutting. The compensation was imposed on Walia, wife of Ram Parkash Singh, Director, Group Colonizer Private limited, a resident of Basant Vihar, Rakar Coloney, Una, through an order issued on December 12, 2024. However, the NGT observed that further directions were required and has now listed the matter again for appropriate orders. The Registry has been directed to issue notice to the HPSPCB, asking it to furnish an updated compliance report.

PSPCL functioning with only 2 full-time directors; key posts remain vacant amid ongoing employee unrest

Even as protests by the Punjab State Power Corporation Limited (PSPCL) employees intensified following the Corporation's decision to terminate the services of Director (Generation) Harjeet Singh and suspend the chief engineer of the Ropar and Goindwal Sahib thermal plants, a deeper structural issue has come into focus: PSPCL is currently operating with only two full-time directors from its cadre, raising concerns over decision-making and governance in the power sector. The Punjab government had fired Director (Generation) Harjit Singh and suspended the chief engineer over 'discrepancies' in fuel cost management at staterun thermal power plants. Notably, the Punjab State Electricity Board (PSEB) was unbundled into PSPCL and the Punjab State Transmission Corporation Limited (PSTCL) on April 16, 2010. Over the years, director-level posts such as Administration, Commercial, Distribution, Generation, Finance, Human Resources (HR) and Technical were created across the two corporations. Of these, the post of Director (Technical) is in PSTCL, where the position is currently filled. However, on the PSPCL side, only Director (Finance) S K Beri and Director (Commercial) Inderpal Singh remain as the corporation's full-time technocrat directors. Government-appointed directors - IAS officers Bhawna



Garg and Alok Shekhar – along with Basant Garg, who serves simultaneously as power secretary and chief managing director (CMD) of both PSPCL and PSTCL, continue to occupy their positions. The shortage of full-time directors worsened after PSPCL terminated the services of the Director (Generation) on November 4. An office order issued by CMD Basant Garg on November 8 redistributed charges among the remaining directors, stating: "Director Distribution will look after the charge of Director Generation and Director Commercial, while Director/Finance will look after the charge of Director Administration, till further orders."

BJP flags 'disproportionate' increase of Muslim voters in Bengal; TMC calls claim 'baseless'

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) recently submitted a document to the Election Commission of India (ECI) claiming that the share of Muslim voters in West Bengal increased by 127.7 per cent while the percentage of Hindu electors rose by 72.3 in the last 23 years. The document submitted by the BJP reads, "From 2002 to 2025, total electors in West Bengal rose from 3.93 crore to 7.24 crore, an 84.1 per cent increase. Hindu electors grew from 3.1 crore to 5.3 crore, up 72.3%, while Muslim electors rose from 83.9 lakh to 1.9 crore, a whopping 127.7%. Hindu voter % (percentage) fell from 78.68% to 73.62%, and Muslim % rose from 21.32% to 26.38%."The saffron party also claimed that the number of Muslim voters more than doubled in 37 Lok Sabha seats, but Hindu electors doubled in only three Lok Sabha seats.

"At the Assembly level, the broadening is sharper because ACs (assembly constituencies) are smaller and more sensitive to local shifts. The number of Muslim-dominated ACs has increased from 45 to 60 between 2002 and 2025... On multiplicative change, Muslim numbers have more than doubled in 231 ACs compared with 28 ACs for Hindus;

Muslim numbers have more than tripled in 7 ACs," the document further reads. The BJP also alleged that Kolkata and its adjoining districts of North and South 24 Parganas have seen huge illegal migration from Bangladesh.

Jagannath Chattopadhyay, General Secretary, Bengal BJP unit, said, "The challenge of meaningful SIR (Special Intensive Revision) in West Bengal has to be gauged in the context of the demographic pattern of the state. ECI should focus on demographic change, and the cleansing process should be done accordingly. If illegal migrants manage to keep their names in the voter list, then SIR is of no use."The ruling TMC countered the BJP's claims. TMC spokesperson Jayprakash Majumder said, "The data that the BJP is producing is baseless. There was no census organised after 2011. The Muslim population increase can only be gauged through the census report. In general, the fertility rate of West Bengal is lower than the national rate. The fertility rate of West Bengal is less than 2.1 per cent. Then, how can such an increase be possible? So, it is basically baseless and another example of the BJP's divisive politics." Scammers use Union FM Nirmala Sitharaman's photo to gain trust, defraud retired Mahim doctor of Rs 1.47 crore

Cyber fraudsters defrauded a retired doctor in Mahim of Rs 1.47 crore in an online share-trading scam after gaining his trust by using the photo of Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman. According to the police, on October 1, the complainant came across an advertisement on social media that claimed an investment of Rs 21,000 would give guaranteed profits of at least Rs 60,000. The advertisement displayed a picture of Sitharaman, which made the elderly man trust the advertisement

After the victim entered the basic details, he received a phone call from an unknown WhatsApp number, and the caller introduced herself as 'Meenakshi', promising to assist him in share trading. The woman claimed she was representing share trading firm UPSTOX SECURITIES, and asked the victim to create a trading account and follow her instructions. Later, he was added to two WhatsApp groups: 'C23-Upstox Securities Online Customer Service' and '188 SBI Wealth Mindset Exchange Group'. The complainant said he saw members of the groups posting screenshots of their profits, and so got enthused to invest. He made his first deposit on October 5, and the next day, he saw a 'profit' of Rs 108 in his trading account. "On October 18, the woman allegedly convinced the victim to invest in an IPO. As per her advice, the victim invested Rs 5 lakh in the Rubicon



Research Ltd IPO. The victim made further investments in the share market following the woman's instructions, and after a month, his balance rose to Rs 6 crore (inclusive of Rs 1.47 crore principal amount). But when he tried to withdraw even a portion of the money, he was asked to pay Rs 90 lakh, claiming that it was mandatory before releasing the funds," said a police officer. The victim had invested all his savings and tried to contact the woman, but the latter disconnected the call, and suddenly, the trading account also disappeared. The retired doctor then approached the central cyber police station, and a case was registered against unknown persons.

Fishermen fear losses as fishlings release delayed again in Telangana

Hyderabad: The Congress government marked World Fisheries Day on a grand scale, yet the fishermen community in the State remains anxious due to the delay in the distribution of free fishlings and the likely impact on their earnings. Usually, the distribution of free fishlings begins in the July–August season. However, this year, the delay in floating tenders and finalising bidders for the supply of fishlings affected the timely release. Tenders are normally floated in April, but the exercise was pushed back this year for reasons known only to the Fisheries Department. The department had planned to procure 90 crore fishlings at an estimated cost of Rs 123 crore.

About five lakh fishermen families across the State depend on the free fishlings scheme for their livelihood. Every year, the government releases fishlings into 26,326 water bodies, including major, medium and minor reservoirs and tanks. Against the targeted release of 90 crore fishlings this year, only 11.31 crore have been released in 26 districts so far. Separately, there was also a delay in finalising tenders for the distribution of freshwater prawn seedlings. Although tenders were floated on August 28 with September 8 as the last date, the response from bidders was poor. The department issued fresh tenders on October 11, and they were opened on October 22. Seven bidders submitted propos-



als, and officials are currently inspecting their hatcheries and water bodies, according to department sources. The delay has left the fishermen community worried. The timely release of fishlings in the July–August season helps ensure good growth and harvesting in December and January. Any delay pushes the harvesting cycle further, while declining water levels in small water bodies and tanks from March may affect the growth and survival of fishlings. Last year too, the State government proposed releasing 90 crore fishlings, but the tendering process was delayed until July and only 29.25 crore were released, which affected fish production across the State.

Delhi Police bust arms trafficking racket with links to Pakistan's ISI

The Delhi Crime Branch busted an international weapons trafficking module allegedly linked to ISI-backed handlers in Pakistan and the network of Punjab-USA-based gangster Sonu Khatri, the police said on Saturday. Ten foreign-made semi-automatic pistols, including high-end Turkish-manufactured PX-5.7 models used exclusively by special forces, and 92 live cartridges were seized. Four key operatives of the interstate arms supply chain were arrested during the operation. "This module was involved in the smuggling of weapons from across the international border using drones. Investigation revealed that traffickers based in Pakistan deploy customised commercial drones to drop arms, ammunition, and other contraband items near vulnerable stretches of the border, primarily during late-night hours to avoid detection," said Sanjeev Kumar Yadav, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Crime).

The arrests were made after the police received intelligence on November 19 that arms traffickers supplying sophisticated weapons to gangs in Delhi-NCR would arrive in Rohini for a delivery. A trap was laid near the Khatu Shyam

temple stretch leading to Bawana, where a white Swift Dzire matching the tip-off was intercepted. Inside a concealed cavity in a speaker box, officers recovered a duffle bag containing eight foreign-made pistols and 84 live cartridges of 0.30 bore, said the police. The occupants of the car, Mandeep Singh, 38, and Dalvinder Kumar, 34, both residents of Jalandhar district of Punjab, were arrested. Their questioning led the police to two more intermediaries, Rohan Tomar, 30, and Ajay, 37, both from Baghpat in Uttar Pradesh. Two additional pistols and eight cartridges were recovered at their instance, the police said. The drones used for arms trafficking typically fly at low altitude to evade radar and carry small but high-value payloads, the officer said. The consignments are dropped at pre-selected GPS locations close to the border fence, where receivers on the Indian side, usually local criminals or drug/arms traffickers, retrieved the material, Yadav said. 'Network relies on local collaborators who monitor police movement'"The handlers coordinate the drop through encrypted communication platforms and frequently change locations.

2 from Shivamogga IS module, whose handler is suspected to be linked to Red Fort blast, awarded 6 years' jail for 2022 terror plot

A special court in Bengaluru sentenced two persons belonging to the Shivamogga module of a nascent terror group to six years' imprisonment on Friday after they pleaded guilty to terrorism charges. The handler of this module is suspected to be linked to the Kashmir doctors' module behind the November 10 blast near the Red Fort in Delhi.The two accused, Zabiulla alias Jabiulla alias Mohammed Zabiulla alias Charbi, 34, and Nadeem Faizal, 29, both residents of Shivamogga, were sentenced in the case probed by the National Investigation Agency (NIA). They were arrested in 2022. A group of 10 others who were part of the module - including the accused in last year's March 1 Bengaluru Rameshwaram Cafe blast case Abdul Matheen Taha, 32, Mussavir Hussain Shazib, 32, and the accused in the 2022 Mangaluru cooker blast case Mohammed Shariq, 27 - have not pleaded guilty and have chosen to face trial in the case. The special court for NIA and terrorism cases in Bengaluru convicted Zabiulla and Nadeem Faizal to six years of rigorous imprisonment on charges of criminal conspiracy under the Indian Penal Code and multiple charges of terrorism under Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA) - under sections 13, 16, 17, 18, 20, 38, 39, and 40 of the UAPA for unlawful activities, terrorist conspiracy, terrorist act, and being part of a terrorist

"The substantial sentences imposed on the offenders / Accused Nos.8 and 9 shall run concurrently. The period of detention undergone by the offenders / Accused Nos.8 and 9 in judicial custody shall be set off against the term of imprisonment imposed, as provided under Section 428 of the CrPC," the special court said in its order on Friday.Suspected link to other modulesThe Shivamogga module is alleged to have been handled by a missing accused in a 2012 Bengaluru Lashkar-e-Toiba (LeT) terror conspiracy case, Mohammed Shahid Faizal, 42. Faisal, who is currently based abroad, is suspected to be also linked to the Kashmir doctors accused in the Red Fort blast, and a 2022 Coimbatore suicide bomb case on account of the modus operandi employed by the separate modules in the blasts. The NIA alleged that Zabiulla was radicalised and recruited by Mohamed Shariq, the accused in the Mangaluru cooker bomb blast, which occurred accidentally while he was transporting the device in an autorickshaw "for furthering the activities of Islamic State (IS)". Zabiullah is alleged to have "radicalised and recruited his friend Nadeem Faizal". Zabiulla and Nadeem Faizal were paid by Shariq for participation in the terror conspiracy by conducting recce for targets of attack on behalf of Sharig who, in turn, was being directed by a handler based abroad who identified himself in online chats only as the "Colonel" but was later identified after the Bengaluru Rameshwaram Blast probe as Shahid Faizal. Zabiulla is alleged to have procured match boxes and supplied them to Shariq while the latter was trying to create an IED with everyday materials as directed by the handler. "Scrutiny of mobile phone of accused Zabiulla (A-8) revealed a lot of images and speeches/ videos by leaders of PFI, SDPI and ISIS radicalisation videos/audios

of a wanted terrorist Farhatullah Ghauri, 58, who is originally from Hyderabad and suspected to be in Pakistan, was also found with the two men. Ghauri is reported by security agencies to be the father-in-law of the alleged handler of the Shivamogga module Shahid Faizal alias 'Ustad' alias 'Colonel'. How the Shivamogga module was unearthed The module was incidentally uncovered by the police and security agencies in 2022 after a stabbing incident that occurred in the city of Shivamogga on Independence Day, where Zabiullah was arrested for attempting to kill an innocent bystander in a communal incident.

Zabiullah, who had a criminal record in the region, was arrested, along with a group of local residents, after a 20year-old worker at a local silk clothing store, Prem Singh, was stabbed. The subsequent questioning and the analysis of his mobile phone alerted the police to the fact that he had been receiving content on the Islamic State and on topics like making Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) using easily available materials."In the course of the statement of the accused in the stabbing case, we learned that one person identified as Mohammed Shariq was radicalising the youths. Based on this statement, Shariq was considered an accused in the stabbing case and a separate case of terror under UAPA was also filed," police sources said in 2022. Zabiullah's mobile phone revealed a video sent by Shariq, a dropout from a commerce graduation course, about efforts to build an IED. The findings led to the arrest of two associates of Shariq - Maaz Ahmed and Syed Yasin, 21-year-old engineering students. "They believe that just how IS operates and declares war against the non-believers/kafirs through jihad to uplift Islam, they too should carry out jihad against the kafirs and have stored material required to make explosives for the purpose," the Shivamogga police said in a statement on September 22, 2022. After learning how to make IEDs from the material shared by Shariq, the group allegedly purchased timer relay circuits required for the bomb from Amazon, two batteries of nine volts each, switches, wires, match boxes and other explosive materials in Shivamogga, the police said in September 2022. "The accused had experimentally exploded the bomb made by them at a place locally known as Kemmangundi on the banks of Tunga river in Shivamogga district, and the experimental blast was successful," said a statement by the Shivamogga SP at the time. Funding in cryptocurrency from

The probe in Shivamogga revealed that Shariq and an associate, Syed Yasin, received funding in the form of cryptocurrency for conversion into regular cash for the group's activities from abroad. The NIA probe found that Yasin got cryptocurrency deposited into the crypto wallet of his friend Mohammed Noorin Sharief and collected the cash. Yasin also allegedly received cryptocurrency in his crypto wallet and "transferred more than Rs 1 lakh into the account of accused No.1 (Mohammed Shariq)". The module is suspected to have received over Rs 5 lakh in cryptocurrency from handlers suspected to be based abroad. The Enforcement Directorate (ED) launched a probe into the funding of the module after it executed the Rameshwaram Cafe blast on March 1, 2024. According to the NIA's probe, the online handler identified as 'Colonel' transferred the funds to the members of the module "in cryptocurrency to crypto wallets of the accused and their friends to further the activities of Islamic State". "The bank statements and other documents collected by the investigating officer clearly go to show that accused No.2 (Maaz Muneer) received cryptocurrencies through crypto wallets of accused No.4 (Reeshan Shaikh), witnesses Shadab, Mohamed Riyaz, Tabish Tabarak Sheikh and others," the NIA has reported to the special court for terrorism. Reeshan Shaikh received cryptocurrencies from the online handler 'Colonel' and in the crypto account of his college friend Shadab, the NIA has alleged.

New Aravalli definition may open low hills to mining: Activists

Environmentalists and water conservationists have criticised the Supreme Court's November 20 order that accepted a uniform, elevation-based definition of the Aravalli Hills given by a Centre-appointed expert committee. Activists have warned that hills below 100 metres from local relief will lose protection and could be opened for mining, threatening the ecological continuity of India's oldest mountain range. A three-judge bench headed by CJI B R Gavai, and comprising Justices K Vinod Chandran and N V Anjaria, had asked the Centre to prepare a Management Plan for Sustainable Mining (MPSM) "for the entire Aravalis" and barred the grant of new mining licences in the region before it is finalised.

"In the result, we pass the following order: (i) We accept the recommendations made by the Committee with regard to the definition of Aravali Hills and Ranges given by MoEF&CC...," it had said. As per the definition, the Aravali Hills is defined as any landform located in the Aravali districts, having an elevation of 100 metres or more from the local relief. While two or more Aravali Hills (as defined above) located within the proximity of 500 m from each other, measured from the outermost point on the boundary of the lowest contour line on either side, forms the Aravali Range. 'Deeply problematic' Neelam Ahluwalia, foundermember of People for Aravallis, called the judgment a "mixed bag". "We welcome the complete freeze on new mining leases and the mandate for a comprehensive management plan. But accepting the uniform definition is deeply problematic. It excludes all hills below 100 metres from local relief, breaking the continuity of the range and creating more gaps for Thar desert dust to advance towards Haryana, Delhi-NCR, Western UP and Eastern Rajasthan," she said. The group argued that even low, scrub-covered Aravalli hills play critical roles in biodiversity conservation, groundwater recharge, micro-climate regulation and checking dust storms. Retired Conservator of Forests Dr R P Balwan said Harvana's natural forest cover, just 3.6%, could decline further. "Most notified forests in the state lie on low-elevation ridges that do not meet the 100-metre criterion. These areas will lose Aravalli protection and become vulnerable again," he warned. Ecologist Pia Sethi warned that loss of vegetation on these smaller hills could disrupt local rainfall patterns and increase heat stress. Environmentalist Tanuia Chauhan said the move would further choke Delhi-NCR's "green lungs" at a time when cities in the region already rank among the world's most polluted. Water conservationist Dr Rajendra Singh, known as the "Water Man of Rajasthan", said the Aravallis are a vital recharge zone, with fractured rock systems capable of recharging up to 2 mil-

lion litres of groundwater per hectare. "Disturbing smaller



hills through mining will lower water tables and contaminate aquifers across Gujarat, Rajasthan, South Haryana and Delhi-NCR," he cautioned. Ecologist Dr Ghazala Shahabuddin noted that the range supports over 400 native plant species, 200 bird species and mammals such as leopards and hyenas. "Shrinking habitat will intensify human-wildlife conflict," she said. People for Aravallis also noted that more than 12 breaches already exist in the range from Ajmer-Jhunjhunu in Rajasthan to Mahendergarh in Haryana, allowing desert dust to blow into the National Capital Region. "A height-based definition will create many more such breaches," the group said.

Hyderabad groundwater dips despite heavy monsoon, raising summer shortage concerns

Hyderabad: Despite the city experiencing bountiful rains this monsoon, the Ground Water Department's recent data report indicate a scenario of the groundwater reserves not replenishing as they should have. Based on the comparison of September and October's groundwater report, the groundwater table across the city saw a significant dip in certain areas such as Asif Nagar, Charminar, Saidabad, Marredpally, Khairatabad, Musheerabad, and Himayat Nagar. In these areas, the groundwater table dip is found to range between a metre to 3 metre. Failure of incessant heavy rains this monsoon to replenish the groundwater resource in the city highlight the need to find solutions of tapping the rain runoff and ensuring it percolates to water table. At the present trend, where the groundwater table doesn't replenish adequately.

1 police constable, 2 others held in Bengaluru ATM cash van heist; no mobile phone used during robbery

The arrested have been identified as Annappa Naik, a police constable with Govindapura police station in Bengaluru East, Xavier, a former employee of CMS Info Systems that was handling the ATM cash-loading van, and Gopi, an employee at CMS. The Bengaluru police on Saturday announced the arrests of a police constable and two others, and recovered Rs 5.76 crore in connection with the biggest broad-day heist where Rs 7.11 crore was robbed from an ATM cash-carrying vehicle on November 19. Bengaluru City Police Commissioner Seemant Kumar Singh said that a gang of six to eight members is involved in the crime, and they have launched a manhunt in many South Indian states. Throughout the entire operation, no mobile phones were used, eliminating the possibility of electronic tracking, and there was a delay in reporting the crime by the CMS staff, he added. Singh said that the gang had planned the heist for more than three months and had done recce for 15 days before executing their plan. On November 19, a gang, posing as Income Tax and Reserve Bank of India (RBI) officers, allegedly intercepted an ATM cashloading vehicle near Ashoka Pillar at 12.48 pm and made off with Rs 7.11 crore on the Dairy Circle Flyover. The criminals took control of the cash boxes and abandoned the van by 1.16 pm before fleeing the scene. Following verification of the incident, a case of dacoity by showing firearms was registered at Siddapura Police Station.

Singh said that the criminals made multiple calculated stops exclusively in areas without CCTV coverage, avoiding any digital footprint. Gang members deliberately communicated in multiple languages to mislead investigators about their origins and identities. The operation involved multiple vehicles with frequent changes in number plates and identifiers, making vehicle tracking extremely challenging. Adding to the complexity, the stolen currency notes had not been serialized by the issuing bank, virtually eliminating the possibility of tracing them through banking channels, he added. The operation was led by 11 Police Inspectors and 2 Assistant Commissioners of Police from South Division, along with 6 PIs from the Crime Branch (CCB), all supervised by senior officers. Investigation teams pursued technical and field leads across Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, and Telangana, with some teams extending their coverage to Goa. More than 30 individuals were questioned as part of the probe. The police also traced and seized one of the vehicles used in the crime. According to investigators, the gang is estimated to consist of around six to eight people with clearly defined roles spanning the planning phase, execution of the heist, and post-crime movement of the stolen cash. A police officer said that Gopi was the mastermind who chalked out the movement and route in which the cash would be transported for CMS. "As he was part of the gang, it became easier for the gang to conduct the robbery. The precise knowledge of CCTV blind spots indicates extensive reconnaissance and planning," the officer added. Lapses from CMS that flouted several RBI guidelinesSingh also said that there were lapses from CMS as they had flouted several RBI guidelines, including the GPS location equipment that was not working. "According to the RBI, the cash movement route must often be changed so that it does not become predictable. But with the inside staff part of the crime, it became easier," he added. Xavier was also involved in a similar offence in the KG Halli police limits previously and was sent to jail. A year ago, he had met with an accident. Court imposes fine of Rs 90,000 on kiosk outside PU for selling shakes, sandwiches without licence

The case was initiated by the Chandigarh Administration through the Health Department against Gian Singh and Associates, which runs Kiosk No. 2 at Food Street, Sector 14, along with its partners Giano Devi and Harish Kumar. Pankaj Kumar, who was present as manager at the time of inspection, was also named in the complaint. According to the prosecution, Food Safety Officer Bharat Kanojia carried out an inspection of the kiosk, which sells shakes, cold drinks, sandwiches, noodles, on September 5, 2023. During the check, he found Pankaj operating the food outlet and selling various ready-to-eat items without any valid food licence. The FSO stated that the business was being conducted for public sale and human consumption, thereby requiring a licence under Sections 26(2)(iii) and 31(1) of the Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006.

Based on this violation, a challan was issued to the firm and its partners for contravention of the law punishable under Section 63 of the Act.During the trial, the defence counsel argued that the inspection lacked credibility as no independent witness from the scene was examined. They also argued that no food samples or raw materials were seized, and further claimed that Pankaj had no connection with the ownership or partnership of Gian Singh and Associates, suggesting false implication. However, Chief Judicial Magistrate (CJM) Sachin Yadav dismissed these arguments, noting that the testimony of the FSO was consistent and reliable. The court observed that there was no evidence of any enmity between the FSO and the accused, leaving no basis for claims of false implication. The absence of independent witnesses or food sample seizure did not, in



the court's view, undermine the fact that the kiosk was operating without a mandatory licence. The court held that Pankaj was present as a manager and not a partner of the firm, and since the prosecution did not produce evidence to establish his legal responsibility for licensing compliance, he was acquitted of all charges. In contrast, the court found partners Giano Devi and Harish Kumar, along with the firm Gian Singh and Associates, guilty of conducting food business without the required licence.

The court ruled that the prosecution had clearly established the offence under Section 31(1) read with Section 26(2)(iii), punishable under Section 63 of the Food Safety and Standards Act. Taking into account the age and antecedents of the convicts, the court awarded a lenient sentence: imprisonment till rising of the court and a fine of Rs 30,000 each, amounting to a total fine of Rs 90,000.

4 dead, 3 injured as Shiv Sena candidate's campaign car crashes into bikers on Thane flyover

A routine campaign drive turned fatal on Friday evening when the driver of Shiv Sena candidate Kiran Chaubey's car lost control on the Ambernath flyover in Thane district, crashing into bikers coming from the opposite direction. Four people died in the accident, and three received grievous injuries.

A senior police officer said the accident took place while Chaubey was heading to Buvapada for an election campaign in Ambernath West. The officer said eyewitnesses told them that Chaubey's driver, Laxman Shinde, 30, became motionless while driving as he suffered a heart attack and lost control of the Tata Nexon car.CCTV footage captured the high-impact crash, showing the Nexon car heading from Ambernath East to West suddenly swerving right before colliding with at least four to five vehicles. Sachin Gore, Deputy Commissioner of Police, said, "The post mortem (of Shinde) would clear the exact reason... We cannot say at this stage what happened to the driver. But he lost control of the vehicle, and that was captured by the CCTV camera."The deceased have been identified as Laxman Shinde, driver of Chaubey's car, bikers Chandrakant Anarse, Shailesh Jadhav, and Sumit Chelani. Due to the impact of the crash, Anarse was flung into the air along with his motorcycle and later died during treatment. Anarse and Jadhav were employees of the municipal council. Among

the injured, Chaubey is currently admitted to Fortis Hospital. Other injured persons, Amit Chavan and an unidentified biker, are recuperating in Dombivali hospital, said a police officer. Senior Inspector Shabbir Sayyed of Ambernath police station said passersby rushed to the spot after the ac-

The injured bikers were taken to the hospital while people broke open the car's windows to pull Chaubey out of the mangled vehicle. The Ambernath police have registered a case against driver Shinde. The police are analysing CCTV footage as well as eyewitness accounts to reconstruct the sequence of events. The police said they would also carry out a mechanical inspection of the car to determine the cause of the accident.

IMD forecasts heavy rain, squally weather for Andaman and Nicobar

The Met office said that a low-pressure area had developed over south Andaman Sea near the Strait of Malacca. "It is very likely to move west-northwestwards and intensify into a depression by November 22 and lay over southeast Bay of Bengal. The system will continue to move west-northwestwards and further intensify and prevail over southwest Bay of Bengal till about November 26," the IMD said. As the IMD has also indicated further intensification of the system, weather experts are not ruling out the development of a cyclone around November 26.As the system approaches, moderate intensity rainfall will prevail along the islands till Sunday. Thereafter, the Nicobar islands will experience an increase in rainfall activity with the IMD warning of heavy to very heavy rainfall (105 to 204 mm in 24 hours) on November 24 and 25. Fishermen have been warned against venturing into Andaman Sea and southwest Bay of Bengal till November 25 and along the southeast Bay of Bengal till November 28. Squally weather with winds with speeds reaching 35 to 45 km/hr, gusting to 55 km/hr, is likely to prevail till Sunday.

BLO found dead in Bengal: As family blames SIR work pressure, Mamata asks, 'How many more need to die?'

A 53-year-old booth-level officer (BLO) in West Bengal's Nadia district allegedly died by suicide on Saturday, with her family claiming that it was due to the "severe mental stress" she was under due to work related to the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in the state. Rinku Tarafdar, a para-teacher from Krishnanagar who had recently been assigned the BLO responsibilities, was allegedly found dead by her husband at their residence in Sasthitala. While the police are yet to issue a statement on the incident, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee questioned the SIR process even as the Election Commission sought a report.

According to Rinku's family, she had been stressed, especially after BLOs were given the responsibility of data entry, as she lacked adequate computer skills, a key requirement for the digital workload involved in the SIR process. Her family further alleged that she had been struggling for days with the door-to-door visits and continuous calls regarding queries with the enumeration forms, along with the growing weight of administrative demands, tight deadlines, and the fear of punitive action in case of errors. In her suicide note, she has blamed the Election Commission. She was unable to upload the form online. She used to worry that she would be blamed for the non-completion

of forms," Rinku's husband, Asish Tarafdar, told the media.Rinku's brother-in-law, Abhijit Tarafdar, said that she was a part-time teacher and was not used to computers. "Despite that, she was forced into such a huge responsibility. She could not take the pressure, and this is the result. She would tell us that the pressure was immense. She was mentally disturbed for the past few days due to this," he added. "Profoundly shocked to know of the death of yet another BLO, a lady para-teacher, who has committed suicide at Krishnanagar today. BLO of part number 201 of AC 82 Chapra, Smt Rinku Tarafdar, has blamed ECI in her suicide note (copy is attached herewith) before committing suicide at her residence today," Banerjee posted on X. "How many more lives will be lost? How many more need to die for this SIR? How many more dead bodies shall we see for this process? This has become truly alarming now!!" she added. The incident occurred two days after Banerjee wrote to the chief election commissioner, highlighting the multiple suicides of BLOs and citizens across Bengal. In her letter, she accused the Election Commission of rushing the voter list revision exercise and urged its immediate suspension. Meanwhile, the Election Commission has sought an urgent report from the district magistrate (DM) on the entire incident. "We have sought a report from the

Why was Rinku Tarafdar mentally distraught? What had happened? After the report arrives, the next course of action will be decided," a senior Election Commission official said. Earlier this week, another BLO allegedly died by suicide due to work pressure. Shantimoni Ekka, 48, a resident of Rengamati panchayat in Malbazar, had recently been assigned SIR duties as a BLO and had been going from house to house distributing and collecting forms. Her family alleged that she had been under tremendous pressure, was mentally distressed and had died by suicide. The police did not, however, find any suicide note. On November 9, BLO Namita Hansdar died of a brain stroke in Purba Bardhaman district. Her family alleged that she had to work "day and night" in her role as BLO of booth number 278 of Chowk Balrampur, Memari.

350th martyrdom of Guru Tegh Bahadur: Anandpur Sahib turns white, gears up for historic observance

With the 350th martyrdom day of the ninth Sikh Guru, Guru Tegh Bahadur, drawing near—commemoration events begin on Sunday—the holy city of Sri Anandpur Sahib in Punjab is wearing a transformed look. As one enters the city, the first striking impression is of an entirely white landscape. Houses, shops, and religious structures along the front stretch have all been painted with a fresh coat of white, creating the sense of stepping into a serene, sacred township gearing up for a historic moment.

This large-scale repainting, made possible through contributions led by Anandpur Sahib MLA and minister Harjot Singh Bains—amounting to 25,000 litres of whitewash donated by political leaders, workers, and common citizens—has given the city a unified and almost spiritual glow. Beyond its whitewashed façade, the city is buzzing with elaborate preparations. The Punjab government has given Anandpur Sahib a complete facelift to accommodate the massive footfall expected during the commemoration. Along with the gurudwaras that already attract hundreds of devotees daily, the city's landmarks-especially Virasate-Khalsa-have become major points of interest for visitors.A week of sacred eventsThe commemorative events are spread across several days. A major Nagar Kirtan set the tone for the celebrations when it began on November 19 from Gurdwara Chhevi Patshahi in Srinagar. Travelling through Jammu, Pathankot, Dasuya, Hoshiarpur, Mahilpur, and Garhshankar, this procession will culminate at Gurdwara Sri Sis Ganj Sahib in Sri Anandpur Sahib on Saturday. On the same day, another Nagar Kirtan will begin from Gurdwara Sri Sangat Sar Pathwala in Gurdaspur, passing through Batala, Baba Bakala Sahib, Sri Amritsar Sahib, Tarn Taran, Goindwal Sahib, Kapurthala, Kartarpur, Jalandhar, Phagwara, Banga, Nawanshehar, and Balachaur before reaching Sri Sis Ganj Sahib. Two more Nagar Kirtans—one beginning from Qila Mubarak in Faridkot and another from Takht Sri Damdama Sahib in Talwandi Sabho, both starting on November 20-will also conclude at Sri Anandpur Sahib on November 22.

On November 23, Sri Akhand Path Sahib will commence at Baba Buddha Dal Chhauni, and an exhibition on the life of Guru Tegh Bahadur will be inaugurated at Virasate-Khalsa. The same day will witness a Sarv Dharm Sammelan at the main pandal in Baba Buddha Dal Chhauni, bringing together eminent religious leaders from various faiths, including Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, Dr Rabbi Ezekiel Isaac Malekar, Bhikkhu Sanghasena, Swami Chidanand Saraswati, Acharya Lokesh Muni, Dr Binny Sareen, Haji Sved Salman Chishty, Mahant Gyandev, Syed Afsar Ali Nizami, Param Pujya Muktanand Bapu, Mahant Sampurnanand, etc. The following day, November 24, will see events at the Sheesh Bhent Nagar Kirtan from Kiratpur Sahib to Bhai Jaita Ji Memorial. A heritage walk covering Gurudwara Bhora Sahib, Gurudwara Sheesh Ganj Sahib, the Guru Tegh Bahadur Museum, Takht Sri Kesgarh Sahib, and Qila Anandgarh Sahib will conclude at Virasat-e-Khalsa. A special Vidhan Sabha session will also be held at Bhai Jaita Ji Memorial, while the Charan Ganga Stadium will host cultural and martial performances, including gatka, tent pegging, dhal-talwar duels, shastra darshan, and Simran and sword fusion. From November 23 to 29, a spectacular drone show at Virasat-e-Khalsa will narrate the life and teachings of Guru Tegh Bahadur through advanced light and laser technology. On November 25, after the Bhog of Sri Akhand Path Sahib, the Sarbat Da Bhala Ikattarta programme will take place at Baba Buddha Dal Chhauni.

For the thousands of devotees expected to stay in the holy city, two expansive tent cities—Chak Nanki Niwas Tent City at Chandesar and Bhai Mati Das Niwas Tent City at Jhinjri—are rising across 81 acres. Designed to collectively accommodate 9,520 pilgrims in a mix of 4-bedded units and 16-bedded dormitory tents, these tent cities are equipped with high-speed Wi-Fi, dedicated washrooms, bathing areas, uninterrupted water supply, CCTV surveillance, LED screens, and 24×7 Aam Aadmi Clinics offering OPD services, lab tests, and medicines. Daily fogging, disinfection drives, water tankers, mobile toilets, and bathing vans ensure sanitation and hygiene across the premises. Shuttle services and e-rickshaws are being arranged to smoothly connect these tent cities with Kesgarh Sahib, Virasat-e-Khalsa, main pandal areas, parking sites, and help desks. To manage the unprecedented vehicular rush, the administration has developed a structured three-tier parking system with Category A slots nearest to the major congregation



points, Category B stations at mid-range locations, and Category C spaces on the periphery to prevent congestion near central venues. Every parking zone has CCTV surveillance, barricading, lighting, signage, marshals, and mobile toilets. A massive shuttle transport network—including 500 e-rickshaws, 150 minibuses, 25 Force Urbania vans, 15 cars, 20 Tata Ace support vehicles, and 10 golf carts for elderly and specially abled visitors—will ferry devotees from parking areas to key locations under the supervision of an Integrated Control Centre.

Security arrangements are equally comprehensive with more than 8,000 police personnel deployed across the city. Sri Anandpur Sahib has been divided into 25 sectors, each with its own sub-control room and help desk. A sophisticated high-tech control room has been established with automatic number plate recognition systems, PTZ and facial recognition cameras, and surveillance drones monitoring all entry and exit points. Smart barricading systems, realtime digital mapping of parking zones in collaboration with IIT Ropar, and round-the-clock patrol teams are working to ensure seamless movement and safety. Medical facilities, including mohalla clinics and referral hospitals, are on standby, while recovery vans and cranes have been stationed to handle emergencies. Lady police and specially trained personnel in civil uniform have also been deployed in high-footfall and sensitive areas. The much-anticipated drone show, scheduled daily from November 23 to 29 at Virasat-e-Khalsa, will bring alive the philosophy, humanism, and supreme sacrifice of Guru Tegh Bahadur through cutting-edge visual projections, lasers, and a powerful soundscape. The show is expected to offer a deeply immersive experience, particularly for younger generations witnessing the Guru's life story depicted through technology. In every corner, in every freshly painted wall, the city appears not merely prepared for visitors but pre-

26 e-commerce platforms declare compliance to eliminate dark patterns

New Delhi: In a major step towards protecting consumer interest in the digital marketplace, 26 leading e-commerce platforms have voluntarily submitted self-declaration letters confirming compliance to eliminate dark patterns, the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution, on Thursday. The compliance with the Guidelines for Prevention and Regulation of Dark Patterns, 2023, marks a significant milestone in India's efforts to curb deceptive online design practices that mislead or manipulate consumers."The platforms have conducted internal selfaudits or third-party audits to identify, assess, and eliminate any presence of dark patterns. All 26 companies have declared that their platforms are free from dark patterns and do not deploy any manipulative user interface designs," the Ministry said. The compliance demonstrates a strong commitment towards consumer transparency, fair trade practices, and ethical digital ecosystems. The Central Consumer Protection Authority (CCPA) has also appreciated these declarations and termed them "exemplary". It encouraged other companies to adopt similar self-regulation. To strengthen compliance, CCPA issued an Advisory on 5 June 2025, instructing all e-commerce platforms and online service providers to conduct a mandatory self-audit within three months to detect and eliminate dark patterns.

Railways to take action after woman seen cooking noodles in electric kettle in train's AC coach

Central Railway responded firmly on X, saying action had begun against the channel and womanThe Central Railway said action had been initiated against the woman cooking maggi on a train using a kettle. Terming it a major safety violation, the Central Railway (CR) is set to take action after a viral video emerged recently showing a woman passenger cooking instant noodles inside a train's AC coach. "This is a serious safety violation and it will be dealt with firmly," said a senior CR official, reacting to the video. The official added that "such acts, though seemingly minor to passengers, carry significant fire risks and cannot be

The clip, first posted on the Instagram account of one Sarita Lingayat on November 20, shows a woman plugging a domestic electric kettle into a charging socket inside a train's coach. These sockets, railway engineers said, are intended only for low-power devices such as mobile phones and laptops. In the video, the woman is seen preparing noodles and joking that she could "set up a kitchen anywhere", even claiming that she was making tea for more than a dozen people. The footage drew quick criticism online, with several users tagging the Central Railway's official handles and pointing out the potential danger of using highwattage appliances inside coaches. Railway officials said the act not only violates onboard electrical safety protocols but also risks causing electrical overloads that could lead to short circuits or fires.

CR officials said they have identified the social media account which posted the clip and are working to trace the passenger by matching reservation details, CCTV footage, and digital records. "We are correlating her travel data and the footage from the train. Once confirmed, action will be taken under the Railways Act," another senior official told The Indian Express. Officials indicated that Section 147(1), concerning trespass or misuse of railway property after lawful entry, is likely to be applied. Following the incident, CR reiterated on its official X handle that appliances such as kettles, immersion rods and heating coils are strictly prohibited in trains. Technical staff explained that these appliances typically draw between 1,000 and 2,000 watts, while coach sockets supply only 110 volts at low amperage, designed exclusively for light electronics. Overloading them can trip the electrical supply, disrupt the AC system, or trigger fire hazards. The CR official added that while such incidents are infrequent, they are not isolated. "Passengers must understand that coach sockets cannot handle heavy voltage. Using them for heating appliances is dangerous and puts everyone at risk. Strict action will be taken against anyone who compromises safety," the official said.

No prayers at Sanjauli mosque, protesters end indefinite hunger strike

The Sanjauli mosque, declared illegal by courts and marked for demolition, wore a deserted look Friday even as various right wing organizations on an indefinite hunger strike, suspended their protest after the local administration agreed for meeting on November 29 to discuss their demands "within the ambit of the law". The protesters, led by the Dev Bhoomi Sangharsh Samiti, who have been sitting on an indefinite hunger strike outside the Sanjauli police station— around 70 metres from the mosque — partially blocked the traffic, but didn't move towards the mosque, where a heavy police contingent had already been deployed.

Although the main entry gate to the mosque was found bolted from the outside, a few people entered the building through a side passage prompting some activists to lodge their protest before the police personnel standing there. Maulana Shahzad Alam, the mosque's cleric, said, "No one came to offer prayers. Whoever wanted to come was told to pray at another mosque. I can't say beyond this. This land belongs to the State Waqf Board. I am a salaried employee here". Mohammed Irfan, a resident of Dhalli, said, "Due to heavy police presence and the current situation, my friends and I preferred not to go to the Sanjauli mosque for Friday prayers. There are other mosques in Shimla, so we went there. The fixed time for Friday prayer was 1.30 pm. Yesterday, when I contacted office bearers of the mosque committee, they had hinted that we should avoid going." Meanwhile, a short video went viral even as district administration officials—including Additional District Magistrate (ADM) Pankaj Sharma—were interacting with the protesters. The video showed certain individuals entering the mosque, prompting protesters to intensify their demand to seal the disputed structure and disconnect its water and electricity supply. Vikas Thapta, one of the protestors on hunger strike, said, "A local resident shot a video showing people entering the mosque, bypassing the police district administrative officials.



stationed at the main entrance. When a structure has already been declared illegal, what is the point of performing religious activity there? We have ended our indefinite hunger strike for now, as the administration has assured us that our demands will be discussed on November 29.

The atmosphere at the protest site grew tense when right-wing activists under the banner of the Hindu Sangharsh Samiti urged Hindus to boycott goods and services sold or provided by members of a certain community. ADM Pankaj Sharma told The Indian Express, "There was no traffic jam" or any untoward situation. We conveyed to the protesters that a joint meeting will be held on November 29 to discuss their demands, within the ambit of the law. Action will be taken as per rules and regulations."Shimla SDM Oshin Sharma, ASP Navdeep Singh, Sanjauli SHO Jaswant Singh, and other officials were present at the site. Meanwhile protester Madan Thakur, who was on indefinite strike, was taken to Indira Gandhi Medical College & Hospital (IGMC) due to low blood pressure. Inside 'Malgudi', Shankar Mahadevan's vegetarian South Indian all-day resto-cafe with its own Kaapi programme

Who hasn't dreamt of opening a restaurant one day? Shankar Mahadevan — the Grammy-winning, Padma Shrihonoured singer and composer — is no exception. In August this year, he launched Malgudi, an all-day South Indian resto-cafe in Borivali. The brand has been expanding quickly: Chembur opened last week, and Lower Parel will follow next week."I have been manifesting it for over 20 years," he told The Indian Express at the Chembur inauguration. "As artists, we are always dreaming — new songs, new projects, new IPs — but we need people like Ram who can take these dreams forward.'

He was referring to his friend KS Ramakrishnan (Ram to most), the CEO and MD of Digiphoto Entertainment Imaging, who launched Eatopia Holdings in 2022. Ramakrishnan recalled long admiring Mahadevan's culinary instincts. "I enjoyed his hospitality so much that I would land up at his home whenever I was in Mumbai. One day, he said, 'What I can do in food could be a lot more than what I've done in music.' It was a tall statement coming from him. It intrigued me," Ramakrishnan said. Months later, over dinner, Mahadevan expressed interest in joining one of Ramakrishnan's ventures. Ramakrishnan, then building Eatopia Holdings, told him, "You are the real reservoir of food. Why don't you be a part of all of it?" Within minutes, Mahadevan and his wife Sangeeta and Ramakrishnan and his wife Sanghamitra were mapping out what they could create together. Mahadevan eventually invested in the company and seven of its brands, from Spice Mantraa to Wandr. When Malgudi, a brand they acquired and reimagined, came along, Ramakrishnan asked him to nurture it. "In less than three minutes, he said yes." Mahadevan was clear about the gap he wanted to fill. "When you go out to eat South Indian food, it is usually just an eating activity. It lacks experience. You can't spend a nice evening there or celebrate an occasion. On the other hand, high-end restaurants are expensive and so dimly lit you need a torch to read the menu. There is a huge vacuum in between," he said. "I wanted to offer soul food like dosa and kaapi, but in an experiential setting — bright, colourful, welcoming, with kind staff, premium cutlery and authentic taste. A place where you can celebrate."He added, "Malgudi is not just about food. It is about stories of family, culture and creativity. Every dosa, every cup of kaapi is a piece of heritage retold for today."Thus, Malgudi was born. Its bright indigo-blue facade leads into a space with Chettinad-inspired tilework, an open kitchen and a lively filter kaapi counter. Floor-to-ceiling sheer curtains bathe the room in natural light, while terracotta-

topped tables, deep teal seating and orange-and-cream patterned chairs create a warm, South Indian palette. Cane accents, brass touches and framed illustrations and vintage-style posters lend the space a modern yet nostalgic character. Malgudi serves an all-vegetarian menu, with no alcohol. The airy, perfectly made thatte idli with ghee podi sets the tone, transporting you straight to Chennai. Another standout is the Mulbagal Legacy Dosa, a 100-year-old recipe from the town it's named after, a thick dosa that is crisp outside, cloud-soft inside, served with coconut and tomato chutneys, a special puli inji, and the signature Mahadevan sambar. Every community has its own sambar," said Sovon Saha, the corporate chef who spent months travelling across southern India to master the cuisine. "The one we serve is exactly what you get at Shankar Mahadevan's house." Their sambar is thicker than most. with a fragrant tempering of hing, mustard, curry leaves, and boriya chilli.Mahadevan travelled with Saha to refine the menu. "I went to ITC Chennai to learn how they make perfect idli batter — they grind it with ice," he said, emphasising that he isn't merely lending his name. "People won't come to Malgudi because I make good music. We are completely invested."Other signatures include the comforting Sri Lankan Tamil curry with idiyappam and the Bisi Bele Bibimbap — Karnataka's classic reborn as a spicy stone-pot rice bowl. While the appetisers (podi cheese balls, crispy lotus root, butter pepper garlic water chestnuts) were underwhelming, the Filter Kaapi Barista program spotlighting Chikmagalur beans, served in brass tumblers, impresses. So do indulgent fusions like Filter Kaapi with Ghee and Jaggery. A non-caffeinated favourite is the Malgudi Picante, a spicy blend of guava, pomegranate, Guntur chilli and activated charcoal. Although suburbs like Borivali are not usually a celebrity's first choice for a flagship, the response has been overwhelming. Mahadevan shared proudly that on weekends, there is a waitlist for a table. But why Borivali instead of Bandra? "Hume pata hai hit gaane kaise banana hai (We know how to give a hit)," he laughed. Ramakrishnan admitted they, too, were eyeing Bandra, but research pointed them to Borivali. "If you do something in Bandra, you won't be forgiven. Borivali allows you room."The plan now is to "carpet bomb Greater Bombay." Their research shows potential for around 20 Malgudis. Beyond Mumbai, they are eyeing Delhi and Ahmedabad. Malgudi already has two outposts in Dubai, with two more and an Abu Dhabi branch in the works. "Our vision is to make Malgudi the global benchmark for modern South Indian dining culture," said Ramakrishnan. '

G20 host South Africa sees consensus for summit declaration despite U.S. boycott

G20 envoys drew up a draft leaders' declaration on Friday (November 21, 2025) without U.S. input, four sources familiar with the matter said, in a surprise move that a senior White House official described as "shameful". One of those sources confirmed that the draft made references to climate change, despite objections from the administration of U.S. President Donald Trump, who doubts the scientific consensus that warming is caused by human activities. In opening remarks to the Johannesburg summit, Mr. Ramaphosa said: "There's been overwhelming consensus and agreement that one of the other tasks we should undertake right at the beginning is to ... adopt our declaration." He thanked all delegations who had worked together with South Africa "in good faith to produce a wor-

thy G20 outcome document". "We should not allow anything to diminish the value, the stature and the impact of the first African G20 presidency," he continued. Trump rejects South Africs's G20 agenda

Mr. Trump said U.S. officials would not attend the summit because of allegations, widely discredited, that the host country's Black majority government persecutes its white minority. The U.S. President has also rejected the host nation's agenda of promoting solidarity and helping developing nations adapt to weather disasters, transition to clean energy and cut their excessive debt costs. The boycott had put a dampener on Mr. Ramaphosa's plans to trumpet South Africa's role in promoting multilateral diplomacy, but some analysts suggested it might be a benefit, if other members embrace the summit's agenda and make headway on a substantive declaration. It was not clear what concessions had to be made on the language to reach agreement on a draft declaration. The United States had objected to any mention of climate or renewable energy in the discussion, and some other members are often reticent about it. Three out of four of South Africa's planned top agenda items preparing for climate-induced weather disasters, financing the transition to green energy, and ensuring the rush for critical minerals benefits producers — are closely linked to climate change. The fourth is about a more equitable system of borrowing for poor countries. The United States will host the G20 in 2026 and Mr. Ramaphosa said he would have to hand over the rotating presidency to an "empty chair". The South African presidency has rejected a U.S. offer to send the U.S. charge d'affaires for the G20 handover.

Commission for Air Quality Management makes GRAP more stringent in Delhi-NCR amid worsening air quality

The Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM) has tightened the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) for Delhi-NCR, advancing several pollution-control measures to earlier stages to prevent further deterioration of air quality in the region. The revised schedule, finalised on November 21 after consultations with stakeholders, shifts multiple actions from higher alert stages to lower ones meaning restrictions will now be triggered sooner as the Air Quality Index (AQI) worsens. Under the new framework, several curbs that previously fell under Stage II ('Poor' AQI 201-300) will now be enforced at Stage I. The city's overall AQI stood at 360 in the 'very poor' category at 9 am on Saturday, according to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB). These include ensuring uninterrupted power supply to discourage the use of diesel generator sets, deploying additional personnel to streamline traffic at congestionprone points, issuing pollution alerts through newspapers, TV and radio, and augmenting CNG and electric public transport fleets with higher service frequency and differential fares to promote off-peak travel. Measures earlier listed under Stage III ('very poor' AQI 301-400) have been moved to Stage II, such as staggering working hours for government offices in Delhi, Gurugram, Faridabad, Ghaziabad and Gautam Buddh Nagar. The Centre may also decide on staggered timings for its offices in the region. Similarly, restric-



tions previously applicable only in Stage IV ('severe+') will now apply at Stage III ('severe' AQI 401-450). These include allowing public, municipal and private offices to operate with 50% staff while the remainder work from home. The Centre may also implement work-from-home provisions for its employees. CAQM said the changes were based on scientific assessments, expert recommendations and past experience. All implementing agencies across NCR have been directed to enforce the revised schedule immediately.

EU leaders meet in South Africa to counter US Ukraine peace plan

Kyiv: European leaders were set to meet in South Africa on Saturday to hash out alternatives to a US plan to halt Russia's war in Ukraine, seen as favouring Moscow, nearly four years after it invaded its neighbour. The 28-point blueprint to end the Kremlin's aggression sparked alarm in Kyiv and European capitals, with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy saying on Friday that his country could face a stark choice between standing up for its sovereign rights and preserving the American support it needs.

European countries see their own future at stake in Ukraine's fight to beat back Russia, and have insisted on being consulted in peace efforts. On Saturday, they prepared to meet on the sidelines of a Group of 20 summit in

Johannesburg, South Africa, in a show of support to Kyiv. The planned talks were announced by top European Union officials, EU Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and EU Council President António Costa, after their call with Zelenskyy on Friday. Earlier that day, von der Leyen said a key principle for Kyiv's European allies was "nothing about Ukraine without Ukraine".

The US plan foresees Ukraine handing over territory to Russia — something Kyiv has repeatedly ruled out while reducing the size of its army and blocking its coveted path to NATO membership. It contains many of Moscow's long-standing demands, while offering limited security guarantees to Kyiv. Elsewhere, a nighttime Ukrainian drone strike hit a fuel refinery in southern Russia, killing two people and injuring two more, a local official said. The attack on the Samara region in the latest of Kyiv's long-range strikes against Russian oil infrastructure that it says fuels the Kremlin's war in Ukraine.Regional Gov Vyacheslav Fedorishchev did not immediately name the site that was targeted or detail any damage. There was no immediate comment from Ukraine. Russian air defences overnight shot down 69 Ukrainian drones over Russia and occupied Crimea, including 15 flying over Samara province, according to the Defence Ministry in Moscow. The nighttime strikes forced at least five Russian airports to temporarily halt or restrict operations, and cut off power to some 3,000 households in the southern city of Rylsk, according to Russian

Hasina mourns Bangladesh quake victims, blames interim govt for negligence

Dhaka: Bangladesh's former Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on Saturday expressed deep sorrow over the loss of lives and widespread destruction caused by the devastating earthquake that struck the country. Her remarks came after a 5.7-magnitude earthquake reportedly killed at least 10 people and injured more than 200 across Bangladesh, causing widespread panic and structural damage. "Many lives were lost, hundreds were injured, and the country has suffered immense damage due to the terrible earthquake that struck Bangladesh," read a statement issued by the former PM, which was posted on the Awami League's social media platform. Expressing condolences for the victims and extending sympathy to the bereaved families, Hasina wished a swift recovery for those injured. Slamming the Muhammad Yunus-led interim government, she said, "This illegal occupying government has no accountability to the people, and that is why they are not actively working to ease the suffering of citizens. Instead, they are handing over the country and its national resources to foreigners." Highlighting the country's vulnerability to natural disasters, Hasina added, "Bangladesh is a disaster-prone country. Keeping this in mind, the Awami League government has governed the

state with policies of inclusive and sustainable development." Bangladesh earthquake kills 10, over 200 Injured

Four of the victims died in Dhaka, five in Narsingdi, and one in Narayanganj. China takes spat with Japan over Taiwan to UN, cites right of 'self-defence' against armed intervention

China has taken its widening spat with Japan to the United Nations, accusing Tokyo of threatening "an armed intervention" over Taiwan and vowing to defend itself in its strongest language yet in the two-week-old dispute.

Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi committed "a grave violation of international law" and diplomatic norms when she said a Chinese attack on Taiwan could trigger a military response from Tokyo, China's U.N. Ambassador Fu Cong wrote in a letter on Friday to U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres. "If Japan dares to attempt an armed intervention in the cross-Strait situation, it would be an act of aggression," Mr. Fu wrote, according to a statement from China's U.N. mission. "China will resolutely exercise its right of self-defence under the U.N. Charter and international law and firmly defend its sovereignty and territorial integrity." Beijing views democratically governed Taiwan as its own territory and has not ruled out the use of force to take control of the island. Taiwan's government rejects Beijing's claims and says only the island's people can decide their future

Japan's Foreign Ministry and Prime Minister's Office could not immediately be reached on Saturday (November 22, 2025) for comment on Mr. Fu's letter, the strongest criticism of PM Takaichi yet from a senior Chinese official in the biggest bilateral crisis in years.PM Takaichi, a conservative nationalist who took office last month, ditched the ambiguity that Japan and the U.S. have long used regarding Taiwan when she told a questioner in parliament on November 7 that a hypothetical Chinese attack on Taiwan which lies just over 100 km (60 miles) from Japanese territory - could be deemed "a situation threatening Japan's survival". That is a legal designation that allows a Japanese prime minister to deploy the nation's military.

PM Takaichi's remarks sparked the tit-for-tat dispute with China that has spilled beyond diplomacy in recent days,



with China saying it has "severely damaged" trade coop eration, while concerts of Japanese musicians in China have been abruptly cancelled.Mr. Fu demanded that Japan "stop making provocations and crossing the line, and retract its erroneous remarks", which he said were "openly challenging China's core interests". Ahead of this year's 80th anniversary of Japan's World War Two defeat, Beijing has increasingly invoked Tokyo's wartime atrocities and China's postwar role in setting up the U.N. as it criticises its Asian neighbour and seeks to reshape the international governance system. China, a permanent member of the U.N. Security Council, has repeatedly emphasised two postwar declarations envisioning that Taiwan and other territories that had been occupied by Japan would be "restored" to Chinese rule. The Potsdam and Cairo declarations form the basis for China's legal claims of sovereignty over Taiwan, though many governments view them as statements of intent, not legally binding accords. Moreover, the declarations were signed by the Republic of China government, which fled to Taiwan in 1949 after losing a civil war with Mao Zedong's communists. Taiwan held China's U.N. seat until 1971, when it was transferred to the Beijing government of the People's Republic of China.

Centre notifies four new Labour Codes



The government on Friday (November 21, 2025) notified all four Labour Codes ushering in major reforms including extending universal social security coverage for gig workers, promising gender pay parity, expanded rights and safety for women workers, providing statutory backing for minimum wages, and introducing fixed term employment.

It also significantly simplifies compliance and promotes 'Ease of... - Narendra Modi (@narendramodi) November 21, 2025The four Labour Codes - Code on Wages (2019), Industrial Relations Code (2020), Code on Social Security (2020) and the Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions (OSHWC) Code (2020) - have been held back due to protests from trade unions, which continue. In a joint statement, 10 Central Trade Unions (CTUs) called the Codes an "anti-worker and pro-employer" reform. The laws came into effect from Friday. These replaced 29 fragmented laws, many of which date back to pre-Independence and early post-Independence eras (1930s-1950s). Prime Minister Narendra Modi described the new laws as "one of the most comprehensive and progressive labour-oriented reforms since Independence" which, he said, will serve as a strong foundation for universal social security, minimum and timely payment of wages, safe workplaces, and remunerative opportuni-

"It greatly empowers our workers. It also significantly simplifies compliance and promotes 'Ease of Doing Business'," he said in a post on X.Union Labour Minister Mansukh Mandaviya said the Codes will formalise employment, strengthen worker protections, and make the labour ecosystem simpler, safer and globally aligned. He had been in regular touch with State governments, trade unions and employer bodies for the past three years. The Ministry had informed that almost all States had published draft rules for the Codes, and the Centre is hand-holding those States and Union Territories that were yet to frame the rules.

The reforms include expanded rights and safety for women, including night-shift work, free annual health checkups for workers aged over 40 years, pan-India ESIC coverage including hazardous process units, and a single registration, licence and return system. Additional systemic reforms include a national floor wage, gender-neutral work policy, inspector-cum-facilitator model for supportive compliance, faster dispute resolution through two-member tribunals, and a National Occupational Safety, Health (OSH) Board to harmonise safety standards. The reforms are aimed at streamlining contractual workers with the provision of "fixed term employees" which entails all benefits equal to those of permanent workers, including leave, medical, and social security. The Codes have defined gig work, platform work, and aggregators for the first time. Aadhaarlinked Universal Account Number will make welfare benefits easy to access, fully portable, and available across States, regardless of migration. Plantation workers will be brought under the OSHWC Code and the Social Security Code. The government will now initiate consultations to frame

detailed rules and schemes.

On Thursday (November 20), the CTUs met Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman and urged her not to implement the Codes. On Friday, 10 unions sent a message that the notification of these codes, amidst deepening unemployment crisis and rising inflation is nothing short of "declaration of war" on the working masses. "The Union government in cahoots with its capitalist cronies is attempting to take the country back to the exploitative era of masterservant relationship," they said, adding that a series of protests will be launched on November 26 against the Codes. The CTUs had observed a one-day general strike on July

Reliance halts Russian crude at Jamnagar SEZ to meet EU sanctions

New Delhi: Reliance Industries Ltd on Thursday said it has halted the use of Russian crude at its export-only refinery in Jamnagar, Gujarat, as the company moves to comply with European Union sanctions. Reliance is India's largest buyer of Russian oil, which it processes and turns into fuel, such as petrol and diesel, at its giant oil refining complex at Jamnagar. The complex is made up of two refineries - one SEZ unit from which fuels are exported to the European Union, the US and other markets, and an older unit that caters to the domestic market. The European Union - a big market for Reliance - has imposed wide-ranging sanctions targeting Russia's energy revenues, including measures that restrict the import and sale of fuels produced from Russian crude oil. To comply with these, Reliance has stopped processing Russian crude oil at its only-for-exports (SEZ) refinery. "We have stopped importing Russian crude oil into our SEZ refinery with effect from November 20," a company spokesperson said in a statement. As is the case with any large industrial factory, the refinery must have past raw material (crude oil) inventories, which it is currently processing and turning into fuels.

The evolution of India's liver transplant programme



The first successful liver transplant was performed on a 20-month-old child from Kancheepuram at Apollo Hospital in Delhi on November 15, 1998. This success laid the foundation for theestablishment of liver transplantation in India. The journeyIn the early years, only a select group of institutions took on the challenge of establishing liver transplant programmes. They invested heavily in infrastructure, built multidisciplinary teams, and trained specialists capable of managing every aspect of the transplant. Back then, the surgery involved large open incisions, prolonged hospitalstays, and reliance on imported immunosuppressant (anti-rejection) medicines that made the treatment prohibitively expensive for most families. Over the years, however, steady progress has been made. From barely 100 procedures in 2005, the annual number of liver transplants in India exceeded 1,000 by 2012. By 2024, the country was performing roughly 4,500 transplants each year, one of the highest volumes in Asia.

Innovation and expertiseBehind this transformation lies a convergence of medical innovation, policy support, and growing clinical expertise. Outcomes have improved sharply as surgical techniques, post-operative care, and infection control practices have evolved. Indigenous production of essential immunosuppressive drugs has reduced dependence on imports, significantly lowering long-term costs. The introduction of minimally invasive and robotic procedures has shortened hospital stays and enhanced recovery. Greater experience has allowed expansion to a range of liver transplants — ABO incompatible transplants (where the blood group of the donor and recipient does not match), combined liver-kidney transplants, multiorgan transtransplants, and transplants. Training programmes have produced a new generation of skilled professionals — adult hepatologists, paediatric hepatologists, surgeons, anaesthesiologists, and transplant nurses — who are taking transplant services beyond major metros to smaller cities. This decentralisation has made access to advanced care more equitable and strengthened the national transplant network. Despite this

growth, liver transplantation remains complex and costly, calling for sustained policy attention. Greater coordination between State and Central authorities under the Transplantation of Human Organs Act (THOA) can help address key barriers such as donor availability and public awareness. India's organ donation rate remains low compared to global averages, leaving a vast unmet need. The majority of liver transplants in India remain live donors, despite there being many potential deceased organ donors. The country needs to shift away from live donors to deceased donor transplants. Southern and western regions in India have led in deceased organ donations, and the rest of the country must follow.

Teaching and tertiary care centres are ideally positioned to become major contributors to deceased organ donation programmes. Efforts to integrate donor registration with existing national identity platforms - such as Aadhaar, voter IDs, or driving licenses — could simplify organ pledging and promote wider participation. Public awareness must go beyond one-time campaigns. Regular community education, coordinated hospital programmes, and the inclusion of organ donation topics in medical and nursing curricula can help change long-term attitudes toward donation. While India's transplant outcomes now compare favourably with global standards, we need to improve access. Expanding health insurance coverage — both public and private — to include the entire continuum of care, from evaluation to recovery, will ease the financial burden. Equally important is improving early referral systems. Many patients with end-stage liver disease are referred to transplant centres only after irreversible complications arise. Earlier referrals, guided by clear protocols and greater primary care awareness, can improve outcomes and reduce costs by avoiding late-stage interventions.

India's liver transplant story is one of adaptation, collaboration, and resilience. In less than three decades, the country has moved from a handful of experimental attempts to a thriving ecosystem with global standard outcomes. What began as a rare, high-risk procedure is now a successful treatment option for thousands of patients each year. The next phase of this journey must focus on scaling capacity, enhancing deceased donation, and ensuring greater financial inclusivity. As we celebrate 27 years of successful liver transplantation in India, we can draw inspiration from the first recipient. He is now pursuing a post-graduation in microbiology after completing his MBBS and recently became a father. '123456' tops India's password list again, highlighting weak digital security habits



New Delhi: '123456' has once again emerged as India's most common password, topping the list for the second consecutive year, a new report said on Wednesday. The data compiled by password manager NordPass analysed passwords used globally and in 44 countries, with a special focus this year on how different generations choose their passwords. The report shows that Indians continue to rely heavily on extremely weak and predictable passwords.

After '123456,' the next most used passwords in India include 'Pass@ 123' and 'admin,' followed by simple numeric sequences such as '12345678,' '12345,' and '123456789.' Despite adding symbols like '@' or capital letters, combinations like 'Admin@ 123,' 'Password@ 123,' and 'Abcd@ 1234' remain easy to guess. The research notes that many Indians try to make their passwords appear strong

by inserting special characters, but the overall patterns are still very easy for hackers to crack. Personal elements also influence password choices. Names and patriotic references appear frequently, with passwords such as 'Kumar@123,' 'Global123@,' and 'India@123' making the country's top list. Experts warn that while such combinations may feel more personal or unique, they follow predictable formats that can be easily targeted by automated attacks. Globally, the findings are similarly worrying. "123456" is again the world's most common password, followed by "admin" and "12345678."

Simple numeric patterns like "12345," "1234567890," easy combinations such as "gwerty12 across countries. Researchers also observed a significant rise in the use of special characters this year - with 32 passwords on the global list containing them, compared to just six last year. However, most of these remain predictable variations of common words or number patterns. Karolis Arbaciauskas, head of product at NordPass, said that overall improvements in password hygiene remain slow despite years of awareness campaigns. Arbaciauskas added that until passwordless authentication methods like passkeys become widespread, strong, unique passwords are essential. "Around 80 per cent of data breaches are caused by weak, reused, or compromised passwords," he noted. The report also found that generational differences are minimal.In fact, the most popular passwords among 18-year-olds look very similar to those used by 80-yearolds. Numeric sequences like "12345" and "123456" domi-

How do airbags work?

Testing. Testing. The auto mechanics are hard at work making sure the air-filled balloon-looking pillow-like bags work and deploy properly in this sleek and brand new car. Look at the dashboard and see how firmly the system is incorporated. But wait a minute, how does it know when to pop out and how can we make sure it doesn't harm us? Turn on your thought wheels.

Safely, safetyAirbags have one aim - to protect those inside the car. It is a restraint system which acts to intercept. When a vehicle is met with a sudden impact, the people inside the car tend to move in a direction opposite to that of the forces of collision. This means there is high risk of critical injuries to occur. With airbags, the movement opposite to the forces is restricted and thus, the people inside the car remain relatively safe with lesser injuries. A seatbelt, also a restraint system, works with airbags to protect those inside the car.

Crash protector chemistryCar companies want to offer best protection with the airbags they provide in their cars. To ensure this, the airbag mechanism goes through a series of simulations and tests for different types of impact conditions. Afterall, crashes aren't all a single type. For this the bag is prepped thoroughly. Airbags have one aim - to protect those inside the car. Airbags are made of strong nylon fabric which does not allow the gas with which it is filled to leak out. It is not normal air around us that's inside the bag. There is a special chemistry for it. The key chemical involved is Sodium Azide (NaN3). Once the bag is made, they are kept folded at places in the car's dash.

Once the crash is sensed, electric signals are sent to the igniter which triggers an exothermic reaction where sodium azide decomposes to produce nitrogen gas. This gas fills up the airbag. Since the sensors need a bit of time to do the detecting, the inflation has to be even quicker.

Typically the full process takes about 25 to 30 milliseconds (0.025 to 0.03 seconds!) Then, in about 50 milliseconds, the person inside the car comes into contact with the airbag. The airbag intervenes and absorbs the sudden forward movement reducing injuries and damage. Airbags are fantastic when there is space between the bag and the person. If the person is too close to where the airbag is, the immediate inflation can cause grave harm. This is why it's advised that airbags should be used in conjunction with seatbelts. Make sure your seat is a good distance away. For children, care must be taken to ensure that they are properly buckled up for the ride. It is advised that children should be placed in the back seat. Ensure that the airbags aren't defective.

What changes are planned for the plant variety Act? | Explained

The story so far: Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan said that the Centre will amend the Protection of Plant Variety and Farmers' Rights Act (PPV&FRA Act), incorporating suggestions from stakeholders. While promoting new and high-yielding varieties is essential, preserving traditional seeds is equally important, he said. The Minister said there is a need for reforms, and new suggestions received from various stakeholders would be considered and incorporated into future amendments of the PPV&FRA Act, wherever necessary.

Have consultations started?

A committee headed by eminent agriculture scientist R.S. Paroda, appointed by the Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers' Rights Authority (PPVFRA), has started stakeholder consultations on the amendments. PPVFRA Chairman Trilochan Mohapatra told The Hindu that the committee will examine in detail the premises for amending the law and hold wide consultations with all stakeholders about the amendments. After consultations, the committee will submit its report to the PPVFRA, and the PPVFRA subsequently will present it with its views to the Union Agriculture Ministry. Prof. Mohapatra said the process of consultations has just begun and it will take time for preparing a report. The committee met farmers' organisations, civil society organisations, industry representatives and researchers in the last week of October. The committee consisting of scientists and policymakers will review various provisions of the Act in light of inherent deficiencies, present day challenges, and to further bolster farmers' interests. Prof. Monapatra said the present Act has completed two decades. and in that time the sector has witnessed various technological and scientific advancements as well as changes in trade aspects and farmers' requirements. The panel's terms of reference include that it shall make make wider consultations with various stake-holders and identify the issues and needs to cater to their requirements. It will propose the amendments in relevant sections of the PPV&FRA Act of

What are major topics of discussion?

Though officials maintain that consultations are at the preliminary stage, discussions with farmers include amendments to the definition of 'variety needs' that could be modified to include 'combination of genotypes' so that it could be at par with the draft Seeds Bill of 2019. It was also proposed to include seedlings, tubers, bulbs, rhizomes, roots, tissue culture plantlets, synthetic seeds and other vegetatively propagated material in the definition of seed. There is a proposal to define the term "institution" occurring in the definition of 'breeder' to include both public and private establishments in the seeds sector. The committee also has questions for stakeholders on the Distinctness, Uniformity and Stability (DUS) test. Stakeholders are being told about the importance of trait and the necessity to include it in DUS guidelines. Further, there are discussions to define "abusive act" so that acts such as producing, selling, market-



ing, exporting and importing a variety which has the same or an identical denomination of another variety can be made

What are the concerns?

The Samyukt Kisan Morcha (non-political) founding leader K.V. Biju, who attended the meeting, said the Act should have provisions to register all community-developed seeds. He said that seeds which went through DUS tests should not be allowed to register under a farmers' or an individual's name. "This is to prevent the misuse of the ownership of the seeds in future by private companies and to avoid monopolisation of seeds. The government should make it a priority that seeds developed by the farmers should remain under community control," he said. Mr. Biju added that there are suspicions of the misuse of the DUS test. He said farmers' groups suspect that in the case of njavara, a paddy seed from South India, proper DUS testing was not followed before registration. Policy analyst Shalini Bhutani, who attended the meeting, said small peasantry is still largely outside of the system and many of them are not aware of techno-legal issues. She said that as per their biocultural practices, they have been approaching seeds as a shared material. "This does not fit into the Intellectual Property Rights framework of granting exclusive economic rights over seeds," she said adding that many countries are operationalising open-source ideas to keep their local plant varieties outside of the IPR system so that no body can claim private rights on them. She said there have been attempts to arm twist developing nations so that domestic laws such as the PPV&FR Act are compliant with the International Union for the Protection of New Varieties of Plants. On another matter of seed quality, "despite provisions for accountability for non-performance of IP-protected propagating materials in the original Act, the criteria for compensating farmers are not yet detailed out in its Rules," she said.Ms. Bhutani said the committee may watch how the plant treaty negotiations scheduled in Peru towards the last week of November, particularly on the multilateral system (MLS) pan out. "Both are connected in a way. Expansion of MLS is a big issue," she said and added that other concerns are in situ conservation and benefit sharing with local

US sanctions Indian entities, individuals involved in Iranian petroleum & petroleum products sales

New York/Washington: The Trump administration has sanctioned entities and individuals from India involved in sales of Iran's petroleum and petroleum products, saying the funds from this trade support Tehran's regional terrorist proxies and procure weapons systems that are "a direct threat" to the US. The Departments of State and Treasury sanctioned shipping networks responsible for funding the Iranian regime's "malign activities" through illicit oil sales, as well as an airline and its affiliates that arm and supply Iran-backed terrorist groups. Among those added to the Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control Specially Designated Nationals List are Indian nationals Zair Husain Iqbal Husain Sayed, Zulfikar Hussain Rizvi Sayed, Maharashtra-based RN Ship Management Private Limited and Pune-based TR6 Petro India LLP. The State Department is designating 17 entities, individuals, and vessels in several countries, including, but not limited to India, Panama, and the Seychelles, involved in Iran's petroleum and petroleum products sales, the administration said.

Concurrently, the Department of the Treasury is designating 41 entities, individuals, vessels, and aircraft, intensifying its efforts against Iran's petroleum and petrochemical exports and disrupting financial streams and commercial operatives that support Iran's malign activities. The funds generated by this oil trade are used to support Iran's regional terrorist proxies and procure weapons systems that

pose a direct threat to US forces and American allies, the State Department said Thursday. The administration said TR6 Petro is an India-based petroleum products trader, which between October 2024 and June 2025, imported over USD 8 million worth of Iranian-origin bitumen from multiple companies. It is being designated for knowingly engaging in a significant transaction for the purchase, acquisition, sale, transport, or marketing of petroleum or petroleum products from Iran, the State Department said. The Iranian regime continues to fuel conflict in the Middle East to fund its destabilising activities, the State Department said. This behaviour enables Iran to fund its nuclear escalations, support terrorist groups, and disrupt the flow of trade and freedom of navigation in waterways that are crucial to global prosperity and economic growth. The United States will continue to act against the network of maritime service providers, dark fleet operators, and petroleum products traders involved in the transport of Iranian crude oil and petroleum products, it said. The State Department said the US will continue to act in support of National Security Presidential Memorandum 2 (NSPM-2), which directs the imposition of maximum pressure on the Iranian regime to deny it access to resources needed to sustain its destabilising activities."The United States remains committed to disrupting the illicit funding streams that finance all aspects of Iran's malign activities.

India's mental health crisis, the cries and scars



In Shahjahanpur, Uttar Pradesh, recently, a young couple ended their lives after poisoning their four-monthold son. They left behind a note wanting their home and car to be sold to repay their debts. Months earlier, the media reported how several students in Kota, Rajasthan, which is called the nation's coaching hub, had died by suicide. Treated individually as anomalies, these tragedies highlight a crisis in India — a grim national mental health crisis spanning villages, cities, classrooms, boardrooms, farms and homes

The data from across IndiaAccording to the National Crime Records Bureau's Accidental Deaths and Suicides in India (ADSI) 2023 report, there were 1.71.418 suicides in India — a rise of 0.3% from the previous year. Yet, the suicide rate per 1,00,000 population fell marginally by 0.8%, indicating that population growth had outpaced case increases. The Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Sikkim and Kerala reported the highest suicide rates, while Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka, and West Bengal accounted for more than 40% of all deaths Cities continued to have higher suicide rates than in rural India, reflecting the pressures of urban life. Men made up 72.8% of all victims, revealing gendered economic and social stress. Family problems accounted for nearly a third (31.9%) of suicides, followed by illness (19%), substance abuse (7%), and relationship or marriage-related issues (about 10% combined).

Distress in the agrarian sector persists, with 10,786 farmer suicides, around 6.3% of the total reported in 2023, slightly lower than the previous year. Most cases were in Maharashtra and Karnataka. But there is a broader crisis — since 2014, over 1,00,000 farmers have taken their lives. Between 1995 and 2015, nearly 2,96,000 of the cases were the result of debt, crop failure, market shocks and institutional neglect. Equally invisible are homemakers and caregivers, predominantly women, who face high rates of depression, marital distress and domestic violence but do not feature in official statistics. It was against this backdrop that one of us, on an ordinary morning, felt the weight of existence suddenly unbearable — not from illness or exhaustion, but from a numbing sense that every small act, such as brushing one's teeth to answering a message, had lost meaning. There was food in the fridge, work in progress, and no visible crisis, yet the heaviness was overwhelming. In that moment of quiet panic, reaching out to an Artificial Intelligence (AI) platform felt safer than speaking to someone. Why does technology seem more approachable than human company? It was a moment that captured a painful truth: countless Indians are confiding in algorithms because they have no one else to turn to. This is not a technological failure, but a human one. Nearly 230 million Indians live with mental disorders, from depression and anxiety to bipolar and substance-use conditions. Yet, over four in five persons with severe illness receive no formal care due to stigma, the cost, and a severe shortage of professionals. Lifetime prevalence sits at 10.6%, with treatment gaps that range from 70% to 92%. Even as official suicide rates appear stable, the World Health Organization (WHO) estimates 16.3 deaths per 1,00,000 people, highlighting India's heavy mental health burden. Behind these numbers are h as a voung university student who iumped off a bridge after leaving behind a note that she felt "unworthy"

 a word that echoes quietly in hostels, offices and unread messages, and denoting silent despair. Gaps in the system

India's mental health system needs attention. With just 0.75 psychiatrists for 1,00,000 people, well below the WHO minimum of 1.7, and far from the ideal three, besides a similar shortage of nurses, psychologists and social workers, care is scarce. In schools and colleges, "counselling" often means a part-time teacher for thousands of students; in coaching hubs and universities, support is tokenistic and underfunded. On paper, laws appear progressive: the Mental Healthcare Act (2017) decriminalised suicide and guaranteed mental health care, while the National Suicide Prevention Strategy (2022) aimed to reduce deaths by 10% Yet, suicides have risen. Manodarpan, the school-based psycho-social support scheme, remains largely inactive, and despite 47 postgraduate psychiatry departments and 25 centres of excellence being sanctioned, staffing, pay and training gaps persist. Even the ?270-crore mental health budget has been largely unspent, leaving policies as empty

Today, millions of Indians turn to AI tools such as ChatGPT — not out of trust but out of Ioneliness. The OpenAI CEO, Sam Altman, himself has acknowledged that many young users treat the platform as a therapist or life coach, despite its lack of confidentiality, crisis intervention or privacy guarantees. This reliance reflects not technological faith but institutional collapse. AI can assist. But without regulation, it risks becoming a dangerous substitute for real, protected human care

India must treat mental health as an emergency, not as an afterthought. The government should prioritise mental health and establish a cross-ministerial task force that spans health, education, agriculture, and women and child welfare with independent funding and clear accountability. Within five years, the aim should be to have at least three to five mental health professionals for every 1,00,000 people, achieved through expanded training, scholarships and incentives for rural postings. Counselling must become a public infrastructure, not a charity. Every school, college, district hospital and agrarian block should have a full-time trained counsellor or a direct link to one, funded by central budgets. It should not be left to non-governmental organisations or goodwill. Public campaigns must destigmatise help-seeking, share recovery stories, and normalise conversations about distress.

Special outreach is needed for high-risk groups such as farmers, homemakers, students, survivors of abuse, and caregivers. For farmers, counselling must go hand in hand with debt relief and livelihood support. Homemakers, often isolated, need community-based therapy networks. In coaching hubs such as Kota, mental health care must be continuous, institutional, and preventive. At the same time, India must urgently regulate the digital mental health ecosystem. Emotional-support apps and AI tools should disclose privacy risks, carry mandatory disclaimers, embed crisis-response redirections, and provide real-time access to licensed professionals. Until robust ethical and legal frameworks exist, such tools cannot replace qualified human care. What is at stake is not only life but also the moral and social fabric of the nation. Suicide remains the leading cause of death among India's youth aged 15-29 years and the country bears a disproportionate share of global female suicide deaths. Untreated mental illness could cost India over \$1 trillion in lost GDP by 2030 — employers already lose over ?1.1 lakh crore annually to absenteeism, attrition and burnout. Each suicide, each breakdown, is a silenced voice, a broken family, and a future cut short. Every one of us has known the relief when someone or some system says these important words: "You matter". SIM-phony of scams: ordinary homes, extraordinary crimes in Hyd

In a narrow lane of Hyderabad's Hafiz Baba Nagar, a modest home hummed with sounds that betrayed nothing unusual — a pressure cooker's whistle, a child's laughter, the clatter of steel plates. But above the everyday chaos, a small device tucked quietly on a kitchen shelf blinked in coded rhythm.It wasn't a Wi-Fi router, though it looked like one. Inside its sleek, rectangular shell, hundreds of calls were being routed from Cambodia to unsuspecting victims across India. In this unremarkable two-storey house in south Hyderabad, a global cybercrime syndicate had found an unlikely headquarters.

For weeks, the kitchen doubled as a command post. As the family stirred curries and packed lunchboxes below, 28-year-old Hidayatullah climbed up to the shelf on cue from his overseas handler, swapping SIM cards, checking the power connection and resetting the device. To his neighbours, he seemed like any other young man; often home, moving around in track pants and a loose T-shirt, rarely stepping out except to collect food deliveries. To his family, he was simply between jobs. They had no reason to suspect that their kitchen had turned into a nerve centre of a multi-crore criminal enterprise. That illusion shattered when the police came knocking on September 11.

Investigators say Hidayatullah had reassured his ageing parents, his brother, sister-in-law and young nephew that he had "finally found work where he could mint loads of money". He warned them not to question him about his work or the device, even threatening to end his life if they did. For months, the family continued with their routine, unaware that their home was a hub connecting scammers in Cambodia to victims across Telangana and beyond. Hidayatullah's path to crime wasn't deliberate; it was desperate. Once a car dealer, he had watched his life unravel in quick succession: first losing money to addiction, then to a fraudulent investment scheme that wiped out over ?16 lakh. Cornered and hopeless, he turned to the same friend who had lured him into the investment fraud. This time, the friend introduced him to a woman named Venisa, based in Cambodia, who promised a way to recover his losses. Her instructions were simple, but sinister: install a SIM box at home, connect it to broadband and feed it with SIM cards. Each call it handled would be part of a sophisticated network that blurred international routes, spoofed caller IDs and allowed fraudsters to pose as government officials. Hidayatullah would be paid for "traffic", each blink of the device translating into profit. But keeping the machine alive required hundreds of SIM cards, and that's where his network came in. Apart from him, police arrested two others, both authorised point-of-sale (POS) agents for Vodafone and BSNL. One of them, just 24, ran a small tea-and-samosa stall from a rented room in the same colony and another counter near the Mahatma Gandhi Bus Station in Imlibun, south Hyderabad. The stall, investigators say, was a cover — a way to appear like an ordinary vendor while secretly supplying SIM cards in bulk to keep the operation running.

By the time police swooped in, they had uncovered over 500 SIM cards, with 80 plugged into the device and another 100 kept in reserve for future use. The criminal operation continued for seven months — from February to September 2025 — until it was finally brought to an end with the full scale still being assessed. A burgeoning scamWhat happened in his kitchen was no anomaly; it was a small node in a vast and rapidly growing web of digital deception. SIM boxes, or compact devices capable of masking international calls as local ones, have quietly become the weapon of choice for cybercrime syndicates behind the booming 'digital arrest' scam.

In less than two months, Telangana Police, working with the Department of Telecommunications (DoT), dismantled two such networks. The numbers reveal the scale of the menace. So far in 2025, 898 people across Telangana have fallen prey to these scams, collectively losing ?55.7 crore, according to data from the Telangana Cyber Security Bureau (TGCSB). During the same period, the State has reported 62,345 financial fraud cases, with losses soaring past ?1,042.56 crore.Some 300 kilometres away, in Jannaram of Mancherial district, Telangana, investigators stumbled upon a near-identical set-up — this time inside a cramped, rented room with peeling blue walls and a bare stone floor. On a thin mat lay five SIM boxes, their tiny lights blinking in mechanical rhythm. A modem and inverter kept the system alive during power cuts, while a whirring airconditioner prevented the devices from overheating as they pushed through hundreds of calls daily. At first glance, it looked like nothing more than an improvised workspace. The men behind it — an unemployed diploma holder, a farmer, a labourer and his younger brother — seemed as ordinary as their surroundings. But in just two months, they had routed calls that triggered 14 digital arrest scams across India — 11 in Telangana and one each in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and Tamil Nadu — siphoning off at least ?1.6 crore. Their operation was eerily disciplined. Working between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., they mirrored government office hours, giving their deception a veneer of legitimacy. Each call they routed impersonated a law enforcement officer, scaring victims into transferring their life savings. When investigators combed through the space, they found the operation's real backbone - 230 SIM cards from Jio, Airtel and Vodafone Idea networks, illegally sourced from multiple locations, including Parvathipuram in Andhra Pradesh.

Glitter, garbage, and good intentions



Deepavali is India's festival of lights. But increasingly it is also the festival of laminated boxes, glittering ribbons, bubble wrap, single-use packaging, and unwanted trinkets. What was once a season of generosity and thoughtful gifting has quietly evolved into one of the largest annual surges of waste in urban India. The spirit of giving remains, but the environmental cost is mounting. India generates close to 1.6 lakh tonnes of municipal solid waste daily, according to the Swachch Bharat Mission. Of this, just over half is processed. The rest ends up in overflowing landfills or open dumps. During Deepavali week, several cities see sharp spikes in waste generation. In 2023, Nashik collected more than 750 tonnes of additional garbage over the festive week, media reports said. Vadodara saw a 20% jump during the Navratri-Dasara stretch this year. This is not anecdotal; it's measurable seasonal waste inflation driven by gifting, packaging, food, and decor.

Food waste is a silent but significant contributor. According to the UN Food Waste Index, Indian households waste around 55 kilograms of food per person every year. That totals more than 78 million tonnes annually. A large part of this happens during festivals: boxes of sweets that expire unopened, excessive buffets, and "sample platters" that land in bins the next morning. Apart from being a moral failure in a food-insecure nation, decomposing food emits methane, a greenhouse gas far more potent than carbon dioxide.

Then there's packaging. India's plastic recycling rate remains low, hovering around 13%. Laminated gift wraps, glossy chocolate boxes with metallic finishes, and stryofoam-filled baskets cannot be recycled by local material recovery facilities. These items are visually stunning but environmentally unrecoverable. A single corporate gifting exercise can result in hundreds of hampers made of mixed materials that no existing recycling system can handle. E-waste is another growing Deepavali phenomenon. Low-cost LED string lights, novelty gadgets, and budget electronics are gifted in massive numbers. India already generates over a million tonnes of e-waste annually. While new rules make producers responsible for collection and recycling, take-back mechanisms remain patchy. Cheap electronics are rarely repairable and often end up in informal landfills within months. Why this matters The ecological damage is twofold. First, there's the obvious physical burden with more waste to collect, segregate, and dispose of in cities that already struggle with basic waste management. Second, there is the longer-term environmental cost: microplastics shed from glitter and laminates, methane from rotting food, and toxic leachate from informal e-waste dumps. All of this seeps into soil, air, and water. Deepavali gifting has evolved with consumerism, but policy and social behaviour have not kept pace. What was once a simple

box of homemade sweets wrapped in brown paper has morphed into elaborate hampers flown across cities, often containing imported chocolates, synthetic candles, and plastic-heavy decor. Custom and consciousness The question is not whether we should give gifts. Gifting is a beautiful cultural expression of affection and community. The question is how we can align that tradition with ecological responsibility. Make waste-wise gifting aspirational: societies, corporates, and resident welfare associations can create simple "Deepavali gifting codes": avoid stryofoam, glittered or laminated wrapping, and mixed-material boxes. Opt for compostable packaging, mono-material containers, or reusable tins. Promote gifts that are genuinely useful; artisan-made foods with clear storage guidance, refillable candles, high-quality steel serveware, seed bombs with native species, or experience vouchers. Publicising such codes makes sustainability a badge of pride rather than a

Tighten policy at key choke points: packaging standards need to be clear and mandatory. Recyclability or compostability labels should be displayed as prominently as nutrition labels. Plastics and papers fused together in laminates should be disallowed. Companies claiming "ecofriendly" status should back it with third-party verified recovery data. Food waste needs targeted attention. Large events, corporate offices, and apartment complexes can be required to submit food waste plans during the festive season, including partnerships with food redistribution networks. Cities can integrate surplus pickups into existing food rescue programmes, preventing methane emissions and feeding people in need. E-waste take-back drives should be made visible and accessible during October and November. Retailers can set up collection bins for used string lights and small appliances. Extended producer responsibility credits can reward those who collect before the waste hits landfills. Strengthen urban infrastructure: cities must plan for October-November surges with additional door-to-door pickups, night-shift sweepers, and decentralised composting units. Where urban local bodies have invested in bio-CNG or composting facilities, post-festival waste overflow is significantly reduced. Infrastructure, not just good intentions, will determine long-term impact. Price externalities: a modest "festive waste surcharge" on non-compliant packaging balanced by rebates for eco-friendly alternatives, can influence corporate behaviour quickly. Similarly, residential colonies can offer housekeeping discounts to households that segregate and participate in composting during the season. Economic nudges are often more effective than moral appeals.Change the cultural narrative: ultimately, culture shifts when storytelling shifts. Media, influencers, and brands can highlight elegant minimalism: the one meaningful gift, the hamper that is entirely recyclable, or the dinner that feeds guests without feeding landfills. When thoughtfulness becomes the new status symbol, behaviour changes follow.This conversation is not about shaming tradition. Deepavali gifting is how India says, "I remember you." But memory doesn't have to be wrapped in plastic. A society that celebrates light can also lead the way in reducing waste. If citizens demand better products, if companies design with that end in mind, and if governments enable the right systems, customs and consciousness can coexist.Deepavali's brilliance should not leave behind a trail of garbage. With thoughtful action, it can be a festival that lights up homes and protects the planet. That would be a legacy worthy of celebration. When Justice Party contemplated admitting Brahmins into its fold nearly 100 years ago

The ruling Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam's decision to admit AIADMK's former MP V. Maitreyan has attracted an adverse reaction in certain quarters owing to his Brahmin roots. With the Assembly election due next year, it has led some commentators to assume the former MP will be fielded in a suitable constituency. The question, according to such commentators, is whether the DMK can go to such an extent of accommodating the Brahmins. However, not many are aware that B. Munuswami Nayudu (1885-1935), the Chief Minister of the Madras Presidency during 1930-32, made an unsuccessful attempt to admit "willing" Brahmins to the Justice Party, a precursor of the DMK. At the party's two-day Nellore confederation in October 1929, Navudu sought to amend the party by-laws, as he felt that the explicit exclusion of one community had resulted in the party not being a "full representative" of the Presidency. Debate within the party

A perusal of reports in The Hindu Archives reveals the change in the rules, as suggested by Nayudu, had triggered a huge debate within the Justice Party, formally called the South Indian Liberal Federation (SILF). The purpose of the organisation was to "promote the political interests of non-Brahmin caste Hindus," writes Eugene F. Irschick in Politics and Social Conflict in South India (University of California Press, 1969). The Nellore meeting took place almost a year before the 1930 election to the Legislative Council. As Nayudu had made it clear that he wanted the party to consider amending its constitution, his move ruffled the feathers of many. At a meeting of the party's Chennai branch held on Anna Salai on September 20, many stalwarts, including V. Chakkarai Chettiar, A. Ramaswami Mudaliar, and J.S. Kannapar, were present, with G. Narayanaswami Chetti presiding. Calling the Nellore event "very important", Chettiar expressed his opposition to the admission of Brahmins as the organisation primarily existed to "advance the interests" of the Non-Brahmins. But, at the same time, he favoured the idea of assigning the party's work in the Legislative Council and the local bodies to the Brahmins as the objective was to "do justice to all communities". Mudaliar was categorical in saying that there was to be "no pact or compromise" with the Brahmins. Meanwhile, the party's Srivilliputtur unit adopted a resolution that "until the non-Brahmins establish equality with the Brahmins in political and social fields", the Brahmins should not be admitted to the party. Regarded widely as a close associate of the Raja of Panagal who was the Chief Minister during 1921-26, Nayudu became the president of the Justice Party at the Nellore meeting. A galaxy of leaders, such as P.T. Rajan, P. Subbaroyan, R.K. Shanmugam Chetti, the Raja of Bobbili, A.P. Patro, Mudaliar, and 'Periyar' E.V. Ramaswamy (EVR), attended the conference. Delivering his presidential address, Nayudu referred to the Article 4 of the party constitution, wherein it was stated that "every Non-Brahmin who is over 21 years of age and who accepts the creed of the SILF shall be eligible for membership". Pointing to this clause that excluded only one community, he argued the organisation was not started as an "anti-Brahmin movement". Its main objective was the improvement of non-Brahmin communities and securing the equal opportunities for all communities in the governance of the country.'A real

Congress Party'Tracing the genesis of the party, Nayudu,



who hailed from a Kamma family of the then Tirutanni taluk and learnt the basics in law practice from P.R. Sundara Aiyar and T.T. Vijayaraghavachariar, said that when the Home Rule Movement was launched in 1916, "a considerable number of influential and representative Non-Brahmins" felt "the devolution of power from the bureaucracy to a responsible legislature should not result in the substitution of one oligarchy by another". He went on to say that by removing the ban on the entry of the Brahmins, the organisation would be the "real Congress Party in south India", according to The Hindu on October 5, 1929. Many speakers deliberated on the issue of allowing membership to the Brahmins either in the party or in the Legislative Council arm of the party. At the two-hour session of the subjects committee that discussed the issue, Shanmugam Chetti, EVR, and Surendranath Arya spoke against the amendment. Earlier, two, including Patro, had favoured the proposed change. Chetti said it would be "too early to take" such a step. EVR said he had "no objection" to the admission of the Brahmins to the legislature arm of the party, if the organisation was so inclined. He had also contended that it was "ideal" to think of admitting the Brahmins to the party when non-Brahmins from other organisations were joining the Justice Party, "being fed up with Brahmin methods". Motion defeated Eventually, the motion was defeated. While delegates from 14 districts went against the resolution, those from 13 districts supported it. Chennai, Tiruchi, Thanjavur (East & West), Madurai, Ramanathapuram, Tirunelveli, Godavari (East & West), Kurnool, Malabar, the Nilgiris, North Arcot, and Salem voted against the motion, while Ganjam Visakapatnam, Guntur, Kadapa, Krishna, Anantapur, Bellary, Nellore, Chengalpattu, South Canara, Chittoor, South Arcot, and Coimbatore backed the resolution. Navudu took the decision sportingly and called the event "a splendid success", The Hindu reported on October 7, 1929. Though the party did not agree to his idea of admitting the Brahmins into it, the motion of allowing them to the legislature arm of the party was defeated by only one vote, an outcome that he called "significant". However, P. Varadarajulu Naidu, a nationalist, described the decision of the Justice Party as "simply deplorable". Shortly after quitting the post of Chief Minister, Nayudu left the Justice Party to form the Justice Democratic Party, which had the support of 20 legislators. His untimely death in January 1935 led to the disintegration of the new body. A road at K.K. Nagar in Chennai has been named after the former Chief Minister. M. Chakravarthy, one of the members of the Nayudu family,

(File Photo)IndiGo has around 900 planes on order, and is looking to have a more balanced fleet with a mix of aircraft under direct ownership and on finance leases, as well as on operating leases in this phase of growth.India's largest airline IndiGo has approved a capital investment of \$820 million, or around Rs 7,300 crore, in its wholly-owned aircraft and engine leasing services arm InterGlobe Aviation Financial Services IFSC (IndiGo IFSC) for acquiring aircraft as the carrier looks to progressively have more planes under its ownership and through finance leases, instead of having nearly its entire

"The Investment will be made through combination of equity shares and 0.01% Non-Cumulative Optionally Convertible Redeemable Preference Shares (OCRPS), in one or more tranches. The funds raised by IndiGo IFSC shall be primarily deployed towards acquisition of aviation assets, thereby enabling ownership of aircraft," IndiGo said. "IndiGo has historically maintained a fleet structure predominantly reliant on operating leases. In recent years, the organization has undertaken a strategic development towards a more balanced ownership structure and diversified forms of financing. This move reflects IndiGo's commitment to prudent capital allocation and sustainable value creation for all stakeholders," the airline added. In its nearly

two decades of existence, IndiGo has primarily relied on operating leases—taking the aircraft on lease for a fixed period after which it is returned. The airline mainly relied on the sale-and-leaseback model, under which an airline sells the aircraft it has ordered to a lessor, and then takes it on lease. This model helps the carrier generate cash flow, free up capital, and remain asset-light. Sale-and-leaseback has emerged as the go-to model for low-cost airlines globally, allowing them to expand their fleets while remaining free of large debt.

But IndiGo is now a large airline and has plans to rapidly expand further, particularly in the international long-haul segment. The carrier has around 900 planes on order, and is looking to have a more balanced fleet with a mix of aircraft under direct ownership and on finance leases, as well as on operating leases in this phase of growth. The airline aims to have up to 40 per cent of its fleet on finance lease or under its ownership by 2030. As of September 30, IndiGo had a fleet of 417 aircraft, of which 14 were owned and 62 The share of owned and finance-leased aircraft in the fleet stood at around 18 per cent. In finance lease, the airline has much greater control over the aircraft and is almost like owning it as the aircraft is also recorded as an asset on the carrier's books. The lease periods are also typically much longer, allowing the airline to use the aircraft for a longer duration, and there is also the option to own the aircraft at the end of the lease period. IndiGo intends to take aircraft on finance lease from its GIFT City-based arm IndiGo IFSC, which would mean these planes would ultimately be owned by the company through the subsidiary, and the finance lease rentals would also remain within the group. According to industry watchers, while operating leases have their obvious benefits in terms of flexibility and keeping the carriers asset-light and debt-free, finance leases and direct ownership help airlines build a stable core fleet and better control and stabilise costs over a long period. Having more aircraft on finance lease or under direct ownership also helps carriers shield against fluctuating operating lease costs and volatility in foreign exchange rates, as aircraft leasing is pre-


Centre may widen 'obscene' content net to 'half truths,' criticism of social, public figures

The Centre is considering amendments to the Information Technology (IT) Rules 2021, to prohibit the proliferation of "obscene" content on video on digital news outlets, and video-on-demand platforms. The term could have a wide ambit, and may disallow content that contains defamatory allegations, "half truths," "anti-national attitudes," and "criticises" segments of "social, public and moral life of the country,"

These changes are being considered for part III of the IT Rules, which covers over-the-top (OTT) video platforms like Netflix, Prime Video and Disney+ Hotstar and digital news publications. This specific part of the rules is administered by the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting (MIB). It follows the Ranveer Allahbadia and 'India's Got Latent' row earlier this year, when the Supreme Court had granted Allahbadia protection from arrest, but asked the Centre if it was planning to take steps to regulate "obscene" content online. The amendments being considered include introducing a new definition to the IT Rules for "obscene digital content," and a new code of ethics around such content for digital news, and OTT platforms, it is understood.

Under the code of ethics, digital content shall not offend against good taste or decency; deride any race, caste, colour, creed and nationality; contain attack on religions or communities; contain anything obscene, defamatory, deliberate, false and suggestive innuendos and half truths; incite people to crime; promote anti-national attitudes; criticise, malign or slander any individual in person or certain groups, segments of social, public and moral life of the country; denigrate women, children and persons with disabilities; and contain visuals or words which reflect a_slandering, ironical and snobbish attitude in the portrayal of certain ethnic, linguistic and regional groups, among other things. The Centre may also deem live coverage of any anti-terrorist operation by security forces as obscene, and the media coverage would have to be restricted to periodic briefings by a designated officer. The MIB did not respond to an immediate request for comment. The Indian Express had earlier reported that amid violence and obscenity pertaining to content on digital platforms, especially against the backdrop of the Ranveer Allahbadia controversy, the Central government was examining the need to create a new legal framework to regulate online platforms. In its communication to a parliamentary panel earlier this year, the MIB had said there was a growing concern in the society that the constitutional right of "freedom of expression is being misused to showcase obscene and violent content on digital platforms".

It had told the Standing Committee on Communica-



tions and IT — headed by BJP MP Nishikant Dubey — that while certain provisions exist under the current laws, there is a growing demand for a stricter and effective legal framework to regulate such harmful content. "This ministry has taken note of these developments and is in the process of examining current statutory provisions and the need for a new legal framework," it had said. Under Part III of the Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code (IT Rules, 2021), online streaming platforms are required to implement a three-level grievance redressal mechanism for violations of the Code of Ethics. This Code also prohibits platforms from transmitting unlawful content, mandates age-based classification, and restricts access to 'A'-rated content for children. However, the rule requiring the creation of this mechanism — which involves self regulation at the platforms' level and industry-wide level, and oversight by the government — has been stayed by the Bombay High Court and Madras High Court. The Kerala HC has also restrained coercive action over non-compliance with Part III of the IT Rules. More than 15 petitions have been filed against these rules, and in 2021, the Centre approached the Supreme Court, seeking to transfer all challenges to the top court to avoid "divergent judicial views." The top court has since transferred those petitions to the Delhi HC, where hearing is currently ongoing. Wider social security net to minimum wage: Long stalled, labour reforms roll in

Over five years after they were cleared by Parliament, the Centre on Friday implemented the four long-pending labour codes covering wages, industrial relations, social security and working conditions. Welcoming the announcement, Prime Minister Narendra Modi described the codes as "one of the most comprehensive and progressive labouroriented reforms since Independence". A senior official told The Indian Express that the Government is likely to prepublish draft rules for the labour codes within a week, after which it will provide a 45-day window for public comments before finalising the rules. Some of the provisions of the codes that relate to the industry may come into effect from April 1, 2026, the official said. The Parliament had cleared the Code on Wages in 2019 and the rest of the three codes in 2020 — Industrial Relations Code; Code on Social Security; and Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions Code. They will replace 29 Central labour laws and are aimed at widening the social security net for all workers, including gig workers as they define gig and platform work and aggregators for the first time. The Ministry of Labour and Employment said there will be a provision for compensation for accidents occurring while travelling between home and workplace that will now be treated as employment-related accidents. "Aadhaar-linked Universal Account Num-

ber will make welfare benefits easy to access, fully por-

table, and available across states, regardless of migration," it said. The codes will also define a National Floor Wage along with mandating timely wage payments.

However, the codes have certain contentious provisions such as the norms for fixed-term employment, retrenchment and curtailment of the right to strike by trade unions for which they had earlier come under criticism from trade unions. The Prime Minister said these labour reforms will build a future-ready ecosystem that protects the rights of workers and strengthens India's economic growth. "It also significantly simplifies compliance and promotes 'Ease of Doing Business.' These Codes will serve as a strong foundation for universal social security, minimum and timely payment of wages, safe workplaces and remunerative opportunities for our people, especially Nari Shakti and Yuva Shakti," he posted on X. Taking to X, Union Labour Minister Mansukh Mandaviya posted that the new codes will ensure "appointment letters for the youth, equal pay and respect for women, gratuity for fixed-term employees after one year of employment, free annual health check-ups for workers above 40 years of age, double wages for overtime, 100% health security for workers in hazardous sectors, and social justice for workers as per international stan-

"When your body stays stuck in fight or flight mode even while you're sleeping, you wake up multiple times at night, feel tired but wired, can't switch off your thoughts, and your body never truly rests," she shared in a recent Instagram post.Listing some common sleep behaviours that you must not ignore, Patil mentioned: Waking up covered in sweat: Your body is trying to cool down because cortisol and adrenaline are running high Grinding teeth/clenching jaw: A sign that the body is releasing tension through the jaw, linked to anxiety, gut stress and poor recovery. Frequent nightmares: The brain is overstimulated. High stress chemicals are disrupting your REM sleep and dream cycles. Sleeping with T-Rex arms: Curled arms show your nervous system is still holding on to stress while you rest. Talking in your sleep: Your mind is still processing emotions. The body hasn't fully relaxed into deep sleep yet.Sleepwalking: When your stress response is on high alert, your body moves even when your mind should be resting. Waking up multiple times through the night: Cortisol

spikes or gut imbalances can cause sudden wakeups Having a hard time falling asleep: Your cortisol rhythm is likely flipped.Dr Shaunak Ajinkya, Consultant Psychiatrist at Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital, Mumbai, agreed with all her claims, stating that sleep patterns reflect how regulated or stressed your nervous system is. "Restless sleep, frequent awakenings or difficulty winding down often indicate a heightened sympathetic state – the body's fight-orflight mode staying switched on," he told indianexpress.com.In contrast, deeper, uninterrupted sleep reflects stronger parasympathetic activation, signalling that the body feels safe enough to rest, repair and reset. Tracking these behaviours can offer early insights about stress load, emotional strain or lifestyle habits that may be impacting overall nervous system balance. According to Dr Ajinkya, regulating the nervous system can significantly improve sleep quality. "Simple practices like breath work, consistent sleep timings, reducing screen exposure before bed, and creating a calming pre-sleep routine help activate the parasympathetic 'rest-and-digest' response," he shared. Somatic healer Navedita Singh shared some functional strategies to help in this regard:Slow diaphragmatic breathing: This type of breathing activates the vagus nerve and brings the body into a parasympathetic state. Cold exposure: Splashing cold water on the face or showering with cold water is likely to stimulate the vagus nerve and reset the nervous system. Grounding techniques: Sensory-oriented activities such as barefoot walking, grasping a textured object, or attention to physical sensations can dearouse the nervous system. Vagal nerve stimulation: Humming, singing, or gargling stimulates the vagus nerve, supporting a more regulated, calm state. Maintenance sleep and nutrition: Routine activities facilitate brain and body regulation and stressor resilience. The experts emphasised that a regulated nervous system depends heavily on stable sleep cycles and balanced blood sugar. Prioritise seven to nine hours of sleep and regular meals along with regular exer-

Its natural fatty acids and probiotics help soothe dryness and frizz, promoting stronger, healthier hair," explained Dr Badyal, adding that it is rich in proteins and vitamins, which can help strengthen the hair strands, prevent breakage, and improve overall hair health. According to her, honey aids moisture retention and scalp repair, preventing brittleness and damage.Lemon, with its natural cleansing and antifungal benefits, helps control dandruff and excess scalp oil. However, Dr Badyal mentioned that lemon juice is acidic and can be drying to hair strands, so it should only be applied to the scalp and not the lengths to prevent damage or breakage. For first time users, Dr Badyal recommended applying the mask no more than once a week and performing a patch test to ensure no sensitivity occurs. "Proper rinsing with lukewarm water and a gentle shampoo



is essential to avoid buildup that can leave hair heavy or greasy," she added. People with chemically treated or coloured hair should be cautious or avoid lemon altogether, as the acid may cause colour fading or dryness. Those with sensitive or compromised scalp should consult a dermatologist before trying such home remedies, she warned. It's important to be aware that individual results may vary. Before applying the mask, Dr Badyal said that it is crucial to perform a patch test on a small area of your skin to check for any potential allergic reactions or sensitivity. This precaution is necessary as everyone's skin and scalp react differently to various ingredients. "Natural ingredients like curd, honey, and lemon can be wonderful additions to hair care routines when used thoughtfully. But for persistent scalp or hair issues, professional advice remains the safest and most effective route," she added.

5 items you will never spot at a dermatologist's house

Not all beauty products are good for the skin and hair. Some everyday items can secretly cause harm in the long run, and who better than dermatologists to guide us about what to use and avoid? Digital creator and renowned dermatologist Dr Gurveen Waraich from Garekars MD Dermatology Clinic, Delhi, took to Instagram to share a fun post highlighting 5 everyday items that will seldom be spotted in their house. According to her, loofahs are breeding grounds of bacteria, plastic combs irritate sensitive scalps, nose strips that target blackheads can cause significant damage to the skin barrier, makeup wipes are not the most sustainable option, and anti-hairfall shampoos are nothing but a big

Curious about her claims, we decided to reach out to a skin expert to verify their validity.Dr Shireen Furtado, Sr. Consultant – Medical & Cosmetic Dermatology, Aster CMI Hospital, Bangalore, helped decode the five common items, sharing why we must avoid them and what to use instead.

1. Loofal

A loofah might seem like a good exfoliator, but dermatologists avoid it because it can trap bacteria and dead skin cells, which can cause acne and infections. It also scratches the skin's surface and disturbs the natural barrier. Instead, they use a soft microfiber washcloth or a mild chemical exfoliant with lactic acid or salicylic acid to gently remove dead cells.

2. Plastic comb

Plastic combs can create static and break the hair due to friction. They also have sharp edges that damage the scalp. Dermatologists prefer wide-tooth wooden or carbon combs that reduce static, evenly distribute natural oils, and prevent hair fall.

3. Nose strips

Nose strips pull out blackheads but also remove healthy skin cells and natural oils. Frequent use can irritate pores and cause redness. Dermatologists prefer gentle exfoliation with a salicylic acid-based cleanser or a clay mask that unclogs pores without tearing the skin.things dermatologists avoid using at home Dermatologists prefer widetooth wooden or carbon combs that reduce static (Source: Freepik)

Makeup wipes seem convenient, but they usually contain alcohol and fragrance that dry out and irritate the skin. They also don't fully clean pores. Dermatologists rely on micellar water, a double-cleansing routine with oil, and a gentle face wash to remove makeup completely and safely.



5. Anti-Hairfall shampoo

Many anti-hairfall shampoos contain harsh sulfates and silicones that damage hair over time. Dermatologists instead recommend mild, sulfate-free shampoos with ingredients like biotin, caffeine, or peptides, and advise checking diet and stress levels for lasting results. In conclusion, Dr Furtado shared that dermatologists trust gentle, clean, and science-backed products that protect skin health rather than harm it

Indian markets edge higher as Q2 earnings, trade optimism boost sentiment

Mumbai: Indian equity benchmarks made marginal gains for the second week, supported by stronger second quarter (Q2) earnings, easing inflation and optimism around the India-US trade negotiations.

Benchmark indices Nifty and Sensex edged higher 0.68 and 0.50 per cent during the week to close at 26,068 and 85,231, respectively. Analysts said that a moderation in FII selling due to expectations of earnings upgrades in H2 FY26 also supported the rally. However, markets turned volatile on Friday amid weak global cues. The Nifty fell after failing to cross its previous all-time highs of 26,277, ending its two-day advance. Broader indices underperformed, with the Nifty Midcap100 and Smallcap100 ending the week down 0.76 per cent and 2.2 per cent, respectively.

Between three deliveries on either side of Saturday morning's chai-break and the fleeting five-over period that followed, the expectant Guwahati crowd witnessed a slice of what Test cricket's creative peaks looked like, conjured up by two contrasting bowling superstars. When Jasprit Bumrah customarily bore the brunt of the bowling load, Kuldeep Yadav (3/48) did the easier things to reel in wickets on India's grinding Guwahati initiation. The masterful duo comfortably led the early resurgence, leaving South Africa six down for 247 before stumps.

While he can turn up trumps practically any time – as he did in a short four-ball notice before the first break – Bumrah's attacking postures had begun to recede when Kuldeep grew into his and nabbed wickets with a simpler but enticing plan against the South African top order. But it was a largely even morning that put the storylines in place for India's progressive bowling success.

The muggy weather had eased up, the softer ravs of the sun beamed perfectly through before the coin toss soared at 8:30 am. The skies were not moist enough to debilitate the captains. The propensity of heightened suspense around the ACA Stadium's varied conditions on its maiden Test match morning had quietly vanished. The sting was partially alleviated by a touch of moisture beneath the red soil surface. Bowling from the northern end, Bumrah's deliveries appeared heavier on the fuller lengths, exuding firm bounce only on the greener tinges outside the channel.Markram and Rickelton observed no hurry either. Rarely did they chase anything away from the body. The controlled skid off the surface initially meant the only two scoring shots in Bumrah's first three overs were carefully curated tap and runs to cover by Rickelton. Siraj too backed up the senior talisman, employing an uncharacteristic upright seam first up to test both edges of the left-handed

For the first time in four overs, Bumrah slipped to the

shorter length with room, and an assured Markram finally opened his account with a solid punch to the cover boundary. He proceeded to design the near-perfect delivery next ball, the one Markram dreads most on harder wickets. He looks unflappable until that moment arrives perfectly, shaping away late on the full outside the off-stump, the same position from where he thumped the previous delivery for four. To the collective dismay of Bumrah and the soaring Guwahati crowd, KL Rahul grassed the thickish outside edge that flew from Markram's careless front-footed stroll at second slip. Regaining cautiousness, the openers built another stable 50-plus stand thereafter, adding to their impressive first-innings association from Kolkata. The energies had dipped by then, India had ceded their first striking opportunity on a harder wicket. With the returning Nitish Kumar Reddy untroubling their defences and Siraj's switch to the wobble deliveries incurring inaccuracy, Rickelton too moved off the blocks

The compactness in strokeplay was briefly tested by Washington Sundar, who magically resumed his bowling duties after having sent down only six balls in Kolkata. With Sai Sudharsan returning to No. 3, Sundar had slid back to No. 8 on the team sheet. He still remains a superior bowler, and it is his subtle array of tricks that first planted doubts in Markram and Rickelton. As the sun moved overhead midway through the morning session, Sundar began to extract something from a drier strip, turn with the off-break and bounce with the flight.

Unlike the Eden Gardens minefield that encouraged the tweakers to leverage flatter trajectories, the loopy deliveries had a vital role in the narratives here. It was something Kuldeep adjusted to as the afternoon progressed, especially after Rickelton employed a more open stance in the crease to counter him early on. After Bumrah added the masala to India's 11 am Tea, castling Markram two balls before the break, Kuldeep returned to spin Rickelton out with a snappy leg-break. Swerving the ball into the southpaw, it didn't take a prodigious turn to stir the faulty drive to the lively captain, Rishabh Pant, behind the stumps.

With the pitch still retaining hardness, the visitors promoted Tristan Stubbs back up to the volatile No. 3 slot. It had its merit on the wicket with Stubbs' firm punches and liking to walk down the track, keeping the spinners away from total control in the second session. Stubbs and Bavuma extended an unhurried response to fend off the spinners over the next 30 overs with a diet of sweeps and smites between square leg and wide long on. Their attacking lines unyielding, Ravindra Jadeja was the first to return to flighted deliveries outside the off-stump, inviting Bavuma to commit the mistake in his offense, ending with a tame chip to the mid-on fielder. Ushering in a similar ploy away from the batters, Kuldeep claimed Stubbs (49) and Wiaan Mulder in his first spell in the final session. Seizing 82.5 overs with an hour's play under the floodlights, India eventually ensured no easy runaways for the visitors. As Siraj's outswinger claimed the jittery Tony de Zorzi caught-behind a minute before stumps, Northeast's dipping skies too stood kinder to the hosts, holding up a little longer than usual before break-

Lakshya Sen wins 85 minute thriller against Chou Tien Chen with dazzling defensive retrieves to make Aus final

Their Olympic dreams didn't culminate into a medal. But there's a whole four years in between two Games when badminton stays terrifically interesting. When the likes of Lakshya Sen and Chou Tien Chen, each more tenacious than the other, turn an ordinary Super 500 Sydney spring semifinal, into something that's better than absolute cinema. Lakshya Sen turned Live Sport into silverscreen stuff that's better than once-in-4-years silverware, as he defeated Chou in a 85 minute thriller. He reached the second final of 2025 after Hong Kong, but is still searching for the first title of a very difficult season, where at No 12, he failed to qualify for the World Tour Finals. But that's where Sen and Chou light up badminton – they make it irresistible to watch, never mind that it's an end-season competition with little at stake.

They even made the mid-set, badminton's unofficial snack-break for watchers, the crescendo of the match, as the first set and decider were reduced to footnotes. You could talk about the slap-drives in Sen's 17-21, 24-22, 21-16 win, a very Bangalore-coded shot that those from the Padukone academy are casually rattling off. The outstretched racquet smothers skimmingly over the shuttle to send it cross and very flat. But Sen and Chou made the diving retrieves far

Defense alone can't win you badminton matches, as Sen has painfully learnt. But it sure can buy you time to tire out a very accurate, powerful opponent and take matters into a decider, where Sen had shredded Chou's resolve by denying him a win in the second set. The Taiwanese, 35 years old, but elegantly foxy and unfailingly accurate, has mastered the control game. Chou dictates in-rally pace, controls placement to front or back, straight or cross, and works angles like set squares of a geometry compass box. His first set win came despite Sen not erring, not fading out, not giving up, only because Chou stood at the front court and comandeered a symphony of criss-crossing shuttles with his patented shuttle control. But the tone of the match was set at Chou leading 19-15 in the opener. A 44 shot rally, offered a glimpse into just how determined Sen was to play very high quality strokes at a very fast clip, with very bull-headed intent. As the comms said, Sen needed to tell himself to 'never give up' while Chou had a 'living tattoo, a living cheer meme' in his coach-trainer Victoria Lao, his animated courtside one-woman team. In that scarcely believable rally over 22 shots Sen played, he told Chou that his low pick-up defensive retrieves and clear headed anticipation meant he could cover the court, in all dimensions, and the shuttle wouldn't stop coming back. Chou is perhaps the most cerebral and skilled player on the Tour, and had a counter to Sen's defiance. He would not only make the Indian dive across his body on the backhand corners, he would ensure the next shuttle was far on the opposite flank. This was one of those matches when accuracy from both players was guaranteed - errors not blighting the tempo. The number of backline corner lobs and floating clears that Sen nailed pinpoint, was outrageous. Chou's precision on the short cross smashes was equally impressive. His superpower is deceptively simple — he can hit more overhead strokes with variety and control, back to back, and the arms don't tire. Sen's superpower is he can defend one shot more than Chou flings at him, retrieving real low. Sen trailed 4-7, then made ground at 9-9. Because these two are so talented, they can literally mimic each other and it was Sen in the mid set, as he used Chou's tactic of making opponent twist and turn, by going for the flanks. Without mistakes. Sen took the mid-interval lead at 11-9. Chou wasn't built to make life easy for his opponents. At 12-10, while beginning to tire, Chou dug from his reserves the patience to let go two opportunities for a kill, before smashing the third. Snapping at Sen's heels, Chou went 15-13, 17-14, before he levelled at 17-all. One incredible Sen point for 15-13, saw Sen put in three diving retrieves at three separate corners, then scurry to the net and track back next second for a back court straight smash kill. The mileage in Sen's feet, and palms (given he is on all fours often and bouncing back on feet with catapult elasticity) can be a researcher's dissertation, given he is shorter than most of the top opponents. even at 5'10. But he neutralizes that advantage with his read on the game, and Chou had to stitch together clever ways and work hard, crank up power, to get his points. Still, he reached 20-18, when Sen floated one long. Sen aced a back corner toss-drop to go 19-20, and drew out a smash error to stay afloat - when 2 points from exiting. A tight dribble gave Chou another match point, but the Sen defense put such massive pressure on the Taiwanese that he forced Chou to again go long. 21-all. Catching him on the forehand corner once more, Sen went ahead 22-21. At 23-22, Sen played that slap-drive once more, and the shot always travels awkward for opponents, coming into their torso flat. Who is Lakshya Sen's next opponent – Yushi Tanaka?

Yushi Tanaka or Yuji, if you go by the Japanese phonetics, had once told Japanese media that he loves to talk, and once he starts talking, he can't stop. Now that he's started winning, the World No 27 will hope he doesn't stop. At that point, while battling domestic competition and completing a college degree, also winning the inter collegiate, he was still finding his feet on the international circuit. On Saturday, he made the Australian Open Super 500 finals, beating Lin Chun-Yi 21-18, 21-15. Earlier at the Paris World Championships, the Japanese, a late bloomer at 25, had defeated Chinese World No 4 Li Shifeng, to create quite the stir on Day 1 of the Worlds. He is coached by the very popular former World champion Kento Momota, from whom he has learnt defensive rigour.

Very unlike the Japanese conservative style in singles, Tanaka is quite an amalgamation of very many players. His original intent is fiercely attacking, with speed bursting abd bustling in him, which explains the presence of his other coach, the former restless maverick Sho Sasaki. But Momota has brought in the poised shuttle control. Speaking to Nikkan Sports earlier in the year, Tanaka had said, "Learning from the world's best player has really helped me improve."Tanaka took his time, but gained immense confidence by consistently beating Kodai Naraoka, the top Japanese at No 8 currently. Back at home, Tanaka was gaining miles on Kodai in domestic ranking events, though he was criticised for being a 'domestic lord' and not managing results abroad. But brought into the national setup, he has taken the opportunity to prove himself. While he continued to struggle in international tournaments, he was determined to change his fortunes. "I'll do my best so that people won't say that Tanaka can only win in Japan. First of all, I want to



be in the top 10 in the world," he had declared to Nikkan. Soon after he started working with Momota, Tanaka won Orleans Masters, beating Sathish Karunakaran, Mark Caljouw and Alex Lanier on the way. After getting his second All Japan title, he had explained Momota's contribution. "The most important things are his demeanor and mindset as champion. It is not just about learning about his sense of the game but learning from someone who has become World champion even though there can be only one. I am learning a lot from his teaching and observing him. And members of Nippon national team are lucky to gave him," Tanaka said. Momota after tragically missing out on an Olympic medal, and facing eye issues post his accident in Malaysia, had vowed to help Japan in his second innings as coach. Momota had said in December 2024, "I've always wanted to leave something for the Badminton World. I thought about continuing on the national team until I no longer could, but I also felt it was important to train the next generation while I still could. I chose the latter. I want to contrib-

Italy's Flavio Cobolli wins marathon tie-break to take his side into final

In an intense game, Italian tennis player Flavio Cobolli came on the winning side to take his team to the final of the Davis Cup as he has defeated Belgium's Zizou Bergs in Bologna. Cobolli tore off his shirt in joy as he defeated the Belgian, and the crowd erupted. The 23-year-old in a more than three-hour marathon contest has taken the game to a seventh match [6-3 6-7 (5-7) 7-6 (17-15)] and ended on the winning side. The tie-break is the sixth-longest in the history of the 125-year old competetion. "It's really tough to say something about this match. We played for our countries and fought a lot for this win. In the end, I realised my dream and we are now in the final. I played an amazing match against a great opponent. I played for all of [the supporters], for all of my team, my family, for me. It is one of the best days of my life," Cobolli said.

Italy team captain Filippo Volandri said: "In my five years as captain I have never seen something like that. It was an unbelievable match. At the end I just said [it was] 5% tactics and 95% heart. This guy gave everything he had – I am really proud. We have an unbelievable bench, Matteo [Berrettini, Cobolli's team-mate] lost his voice. But it is not the last match. We celebrate tonight and then we fo-



cus on the final."Cobolli gave Italy an unassailable 2-0 lead without needing the doubles contest. Italy is riding a 13-tie winning streak and meets the winner of Saturday's semifinal between Germany and Spain, which is without injured No. 1 Carlos Alcaraz. Earlier, Matteo Berrettini beat Raphael Collignon 6-3, 6-4 to help Italy on its way. Neither Belgian has won a singles title on the men's tour. But the No. 43-ranked Bergs played like it was the biggest match of his life against No. 22 Cobolli, who had the crowd behind him in Bologna.

Australia cricket chief clarifies speculation of Usman Khawaja's back stiffness due to playing golf

Australian veteran opener Usman Khawaja could not open yesterday in the first Ashes Test. He left the field for eight minutes due to back stiffness, which meant that the 38-year-old could only open after eight minutes have elapsed in the second innings as a result, Australia had to send Marnus Labuschange as the opener instead of Usman Khawaja. As debutant Jake Weatherald was dismissed for a duck in the first over, skipper Steve Smith had to come in at number four.

Unwell Saroj Khan choreographed Devdas' Dola Re while lying on the floor, won 17 awards for Aishwarya Rai-Madhuri Dixit song



India is one of the largest film producers in the world, and while it may not always churn out top quality, the Indian film industry certainly makes up for it by offering the world something that no one else seems to have – choreographed dance numbers in the middle of the movie. Something that might appear alien to European or American audiences, is an intrinsic part of Indian films. Every era of Hindi films has a distinct song and dance style and for those who grew up in the 1990s, this era was defined by the choreographed songs of Saroj Khan. With popular songs like "Ek Do Teen", "Choli Ke Peeche", "Nimbooda Nimbooda" among many others, Saroj Khan's dance steps were a part of the pop culture, but it was Devdas' song "Dola re Dola" that won her her first National Film Award. Composed by Ismail Darbar, with lyrics by Nursat Badr, the vocals here were done by Shreya Ghoshal and Kavita Krishnamurthy. Such was the impact of the song that the sarees and jewellery worn by the actors, Madhuri Dixit and Aishwarya Rai, became a part of mainstream fashion, and 21 years later, Karan Johar paid tribute to the song in his film Rocky Aur Rani Ki Prem Kahani.

Devdas was an ambitious project for director Sanjay Leela Bhansali, and he left no stone unturned in getting every element of the film just right. Reportedly made on a budget of Rs 50 crore, the making of Devdas was an arduous process, and so was the making of the song "Dola Re Dola". Calling it the "toughest" song of her career, Saroj Khan once said that she saw it as a "feather in my cap." This was also the song that had to deliver on the biggest promise of the

film – the dance-off between Madhuri and Aishwarya. Both top actresses, and the best dancers of their generation, this music video had people comparing them throughout to see who would come out on top. Saroj was well aware of this and on top of that, she also had to make sure that both actresses had enough to perform, so it wouldn't look like one was given preference over the other.

Aishwarya or Madhuri, who got the better steps?


"Madhuri Dixit and Aishwarya Rai are both brilliant dancers and I couldn't let either of them feel that they did not have good steps. I was scared that one of them may feel left out, but luckily nothing untoward happened," she recalled in a 2012 chat with Mumbai Mirror. Saroj shared that while both actresses were brilliant on screen, they had a different approach to prepare for the song. Madhuri would come prepared on set after days of rehearsal, vs Aishwarya, who would rehearse on set. However, Saroj was extremely unwell when she shot the song. Bhansali told Quint that Saroj was in a lot of pain when she shot the song and would be lying down on the floor. "At the time we were shooting, Sarojji was extremely unwell. She was in a lot of pain, but she would lie down on the floor and give instructions. She shot for 15 days", Bhansali said. None of this pain was visible on screen, and after the song came out, Saroj won 17 awards for it. Saroj's health deteriorated as Devdas released. On the day of the release, Bhansali and Aiswarya visited her in the hospital, and even then, she wondered how her song was being received. "On the day Devdas released, Sarojji was in hospital. Aishwarya and I went to meet her. In her semi-conscious state she asked, 'Dola Re Dola pe paise miley ya nahin? (Did the audience shower coins on Dola Re Dola?)'. Imagine her passion for her work! Even in that state, she wanted to know if her work was being appreciated," he told Subhash K Jha after the choreographer's death in 2020. Bhansali believed that Saroj was to choreography, what Salim-Javed were to screenwriting. He shared in the same chat, "She brought stardom to choreography just like Salim-Javed brought stardom to scriptwriting. There were great choreographers before her, but Sarojji brought an aura to choreography." While Bhansali said some very kind things about her after her passing, their working relationship went south after a few collaborations. Saroj, in a chat with Talking Cinema's YouTube channel, explicitly accused Bhansali and his team of using her choreography in "Ram Chahe Leela" without paying her for it, and crediting someone else for her work. The song was exquisitely styled but over the years, costume designers Neeta Lulla and Abu Jani Sandeep Khosla have both claimed credit for it. While Neeta largely focused on Aishwarya's character, there was some overlap in their work, and the intersection for the same came at "Dola Re". In a recent chat with Namrata Zakaria, Abu and Sandeep shared that Abu "created that sketch" for the song, but, in a chat with Rediff in 2002, Neeta had claimed, "I did design for both of them in the song 'Dola re dola' because the whole concept of sari was mine

Farah Khan, whose four films made over Rs 700 cr, says she has earned more in one year from YouTube

Farah Khan, who has amassed around 2.5 million subscribers on YouTube, has become a digital sensation thanks to her wildly hilarious cooking vlogs featuring her 'world famous' chef, Dilip. His popularity has soared so much that he has begun headlining advertisements, including one alongside Shah Rukh Khan. Farah's journey has been one of a kind — coming from a broken home where her father — a filmmaker — died penniless, she started as a choreographer, graduated to a filmmaker judged reality shows and is now a content creator with her YouTube channel. Given her early years, Farah has earlier said that she remains determined to seize every opportunity and remains insecure about money. In a recent conversation with Soha Ali Khan on her podcast, Soha spoke to Farah about how she has earned more in the last one year than from making blockbusters, choreographing some of the most memorable Bollywood songs and judging India's top reality shows.

Soha brought up the huge financial success Farah has achieved with her YouTube vlog, even surpassing earnings from her blockbuster directorials such as Main Hoon Na (box office earning Rs 89 crore), Om Shanti Om (box office earning Rs 152 crore), and her biggest hit, Happy New Year (box office earning Rs 383 crore). The total box office earning of her three Shah Rukh Khan starrers came to Rs 624 crore. She also directed Tees Maar Khan with Akshay Kumar in the lead. While the film didn't attain the sort of success like the Shah Rukh Khan films, it made Rs 101.8 crores. When asked how much she earns from YouTube, Farah responded modestly: "I don't know what to say. Massive is a relative term. But I think I said it somewhere that in my entire career, maybe in a year, I've not made so much money, even though I've directed so many films and all."She further explained how YouTube has given her creative independence: "There's no ownership over the money. But it's my channel, so I can do what I want. There's no one telling me. There's no OTT channel or no production house saying, 'yeh toh kaatna padega, yeh toh daal le.' And there's no TV channel saying, 'You can only bring this guest on,' which I used to hate. I used to hate that so hard. You know, that is something from my inner core. I used to hate this demarcation, that this one is an A-lister, and this one is tacky. I used to genuinely just hate that. I now have the freedom to invite whoever I want."

Farah said authenticity is the biggest currency on YouTube, which is why she avoids relying on makeup artists or stylists. "That's why I don't keep a makeup person or a hair person or anything. I buy my clothes online, and I try to wear a new outfit for every vlog, only because it helps me keep track of with whom I shot that day," she said. Consistency, she added, matters just as much. "Only two weeks that we didn't post anything was when my mom passed away. I was like, please don't post anything. But literally when she was in hospital for 40 days, luckily, I don't know why, I had banked like 8–9 episodes and kept. So that was consistent. But when she passed away, I was like let's not post. So that was the only two weeks that we have missed posting on our channel. See, I think this discipline comes from filmmaking, and like, I'm on the job. And we finish shooting in one and a half hour." Farah laughed and replied: "Dilip can't say anything unless I'm giving him the lines. So I have to be then the voice of Big Boss saying, 'Dilip, now say this, now that..." Speaking about Dilip, Farah also



opened up about how she began her YouTube journey a year and a half ago. She recalled: "So I had finished writing my script for my movie, and I knew it's a long wait now, waiting for it to go on floors. And people kept telling me, 'Ma'am, it's very lucrative,' and, you know, 'this one is making that much.' I was like, abhi mere teen bachche university jaayenge, movie may not happen for a year or two. So okay, now I have time. I told them, 'Achha, let's try it.' I said, I want to do something with food, because I'm comfortable. And you know, all my food reels used to go very, very viral." After filming her first video, Farah realised she would have to prep all the food while also holding the audience with a monologue. That's when she decided to bring Dilip on camera. "I used to just tell him, 'Tu yeh bol de'. I would give him the punchline and it just kind of exploded. By the second vlog, we had our silver button," she said. When asked how her three children react to her online fame, Farah admitted: "I think now I feel they are a little more embarrassed. I used to be a cool mom before. Because now their friends are watching me. So their friends are like, 'Oh, you're all poor because your mother said she started YouTube to pay for your university fees."Farah also spoke about how her cook Dilip has become "world famous," and how much of their earnings initially went into making him debt-free. She shared: "He had a lot of debt. I don't know how. One year has just gone in paying off that debt and telling him, 'You can't take loans on interest anymore because whatever I am giving you is going down a well'.

'We grew marijuana for the British': Kunal Ganjawala reveals how he got his surname, says 'lagaan maaf tha' as they were 'licensed druggists'



When you listen to songs like "Salaame" from Dhoom, "O Humdum Soniyo Re" from Saathiya, "Tauba Tauba" from Kaal, "Dil Na Diya" from Krrish, or most memorably "Bheege Honth Tere" from Murder, one thread connects them all. Each track, a chartbuster in its own right, was sung by Kunal Ganjawala. Over the years, audiences have admired his powerful voice, but many have been just as curious about his unusual surname, "Ganjawala." On social media today, it has become both a subject of jokes and genuine intrigue. Now, Kunal has finally revealed the true story behind his surname. Speaking to the Hindi Rush podcast, he explained

in detail how it originated. He said, "During the British Raj, our family used to grow marijuana for medical purposes. It was a profession before 1942, before the Quit India Movement."He then added, "Hum ganje ki kheti karte the, aur uska produce hum government ko dete the. Mere father ne mujhe bataya ki humein lagaan maaf tha, humare ancestors ko lagaan nahi dena padta tha. Kyunki humse British ye cheez lete the aur humein 'Rao Saheb' ki takhti de rakhi thi. Hum medical purposes ke liye iski kheti kiya karte the, aur uss mein se woh afeem ke injections banaakar cancer patients ko diya karte the, jahanjahan British Kingdom tha."(We cultivated cannabis and gave the produce to the government. My father told me that our family was exempted from paying land tax, because the British took this crop from us and had given us the title of 'Rao Saheb.' They used the crop to make opiumbased injections that were given to cancer patients across the British Empire). He further said that his ancestors continued this work in this business until the Quit India Movement. But when Mahatma Gandhi urged people to become self-sufficient, the family decided to abandon the trade. Kunal recalled, "After that, we started working in construction and making steel furniture." Speaking more about the baggage and curiosity attached to his surname, he said, "We were licensed druggists during the British Raj until 1942. Sometimes on social media people are intrigued by my surname, and sometimes they make fun of it. But this is the real history. And this surname actually helped me a lot in the jingle industry. People would joke, 'Oh, ganjewala, do you have maal?' And I would tell them that I neither smoke nor consume such things."
