Hyderabad—Chennai high-speed rail project enters crucial phase

Hyderabad: The ambitious and much-awaited Hyderabad – Chennai high-speed rail corridor has entered a significant phase, with the South Central Railway authorities reportedly submitting the final alignment plan for the 778-km route to the Tamil Nadu government. This marks a vital step towards preparing the Detailed Project Report (DPR) for the proposed bullet train. As per information, in a major change from the earlier plan, originally routed via Gudivada in Andhra Pradesh, the latest alignment now includes Tirupati, also in Andhra Pradesh, as a key station. This addition is expected to greatly enhance passenger connectivity, boost tourism, and increase the corridor's overall utility.

Over 50 foreign nationals arrested for overstaying, massive drug haul seized

Hyderabad: In one of the biggest coordinated anti-narcotics operations this year, the 'Eagle' Force of Telangana, in joint action with the Delhi Crime Branch and police units in Greater Noida, Gwalior, and Visakhapatnam, executed simultaneous raids across multiple States, arresting over 50 overstaying Nigerian nationals linked to an international drug cartel.



Appear in person or face non-bailable warrant, Telangana HC warns Hydraa chief

Hyderabad: The Telangana High Court on Thursday expressed strong displeasure over the conduct of Hyderabad Disaster Response and Asset Protection Agency (Hydraa) Commissioner AV Ranganath in the ongoing Bathukamma Kunta dispute, cautioning that a nonbailable warrant would be issued if he fails to appear in person by December 5.A Division Bench of Justice Moushumi Bhattacharya and Justice BR Madhusudhan Rao was hearing a contempt case filed by A Sudhakar Reddy. The petitioner alleged that Hydraa carried out substantial alterations on the disputed land in violation of the court's earlier orders. On the previous date, the court had recorded that photographs from June 13 to October 5, 2025 prima facie showed major modifications on the land despite subsisting directions that Hydraa must not encroach upon the petitioner's interest. The Bench had ordered issuance of Form-I notice to the Commissioner after observing that there was sufficient material indicating substantial changes to the prop-

When the matter was taken up on Thursday, Commissioner Ranganath filed an absent petition. The court refused to accept the explanation and made it clear that his personal presence was mandatory. The Bench warned that failure to appear before the court on December 5 would result in a non-bailable warrant. The contempt case will be taken up next on December 5.In a separate case, the High Court came down sharply on Hydraa for undertaking demolitions and excavation works at Sunnam Cheruvu without first determining the Full Tank Level (FTL) or the actual boundaries of the water body. Justice Anil Kumar, hearing the batch of petitions relating to Sunnam Cheruvu at Guttalabegumpet, repeatedly questioned how Hydraa could proceed with field activity when even the basic survey details remain unsettled. The court noted that the National Green Tribunal's findings on the extent of the lake were available, yet the agency had failed to act on



them. The judge pointed out that Hydraa had not invoked Section 90 of the Telangana Land Revenue Act, which is the statutory mechanism for resolving boundary overlaps an issue central to the dispute between Survey Nos.12 and 13. He asked how fencing, digging and alleged demolition work could be justified when village boundaries themselves had not been confirmed.

The Bench expressed serious concern over the impact of Hydraa's actions on residents of the SIAET/CEAT Colony abutting the lake. The court observed that interfering with private lands without completing the mandatory survey process amounts to a violation of the citizens' right to property under Article 300-A of the Constitution. "What is the basis for fencing or excavation when the FTL itself has not been established?" the court asked, taking exception to the manner in which Hydraa proceeded despite earlier directions. The judge made it clear that no fencing, demolition or physical interference shall take place in the colony lands until the State finalises the village boundaries and conducts a proper survey. The court further directed that Hydraa must first determine the FTL of Sunnam Cheruvu and address all overlapping survey number issues before taking any enforcement action.

PM Modi unveils Skyroot's Vikram-I rocket, lauds Gen Z for boosting India's space sector

Hyderabad: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday unveiled space startup Skyroot's first orbital rocket and praised Gen Z professionals for creating new technologies.

The PM virtually inaugurated Skyroot's Infinity Campus here. The company's orbital rocket Vikram-I has the capability to launch satellites to orbit. Modi said today, Gen Z engineers, Gen Z designers, Gen Z coders, and Gen Z scientists are creating new technologies. In his address, the PM highlighted the government's 'historic' space reforms and said that opening up the space sector to private players has resulted in Skyroot and others coming up with such innovations. The PM said that today in India's space ecosystem, the private sector was emerging with flying colours. Over 300 space startups were giving new hope to the sector. "The Infinity Campus is a reflection of India's new thought, innovation, and the bigger youth power. Youth's innovation, risk-taking ability, and entrepreneurship are touching new heights," the PM noted. "India's private space talent is making its own identity in the world. Today, India's space sector is becoming an attractive destination for global investors. Today, the demand for small satellites is increasing rapidly in the world," Modi said. He traced the journey of the Indian space programme from its nascent stageswhere rocket parts were moved on a bicycle to building the "most trusted launch vehicle." The journey might have started with limited resources, but the growth proved that determination decides dreams, Modi said.

In these changing times, the space sector is expanding so much, covering the areas of communication, weather prediction, urban planning, and national security, among others. "So that is why we have made historic reforms in the space sector, opened it up to the private sector, and made a new space policy. Startups and industry were



linked with innovation, set up In-Space," he said. He further said plans were there to open up the nuclear sector also to private players. Skyroot's state-of-the-art facility will have around two lakh sq ft. workspace for designing, developing, integrating, and testing multiple launch vehicles, with a capacity to build one orbital rocket every month. Skyroot is India's leading private space company, founded by Pawan Chandana and Bharath Dhaka, both IIT alumni and former scientists of ISRO. In November 2022, Skyroot launched its sub-orbital rocket, Vikram-S, becoming the first Indian private company to do so. The rapid rise of private space enterprises is a testament to the success of the transformative reforms carried out by the NDA government in the last few years, reinforcing India's leadership as a confident and capable global space power, an official release had earlier said. In his address, Modi recalled that India's space journey started with limited resources, but its ambitions were never limited. For decades, ISRO has given new wings to the country's space journey, he said, and stressed that credibility, capacity, and value have established India's distinct identity in the sector.

Mandated 50 percent quota denied, Congress fails women too in local body poll reservations

Hyderabad: After backward class communities, women too have received a raw deal in reservations for the forthcoming gram panchayat elections in the State.Under the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act, 50 percent of seats for both ward members and sarpanches across SC, ST, BC and unreserved categories must be reserved for women through a draw of lots.However, after completing the revised reservation process, the Congress government has provided only 45.41 percent of seats for women.This comes at a time when the previous BRS government had extended 49.09 percent reservations to women in the 2019 local body elections.

The State has 12,760 gram panchayats, and notification for elections has been issued for 12,728 panchayats. Thirty-two panchayats with 292 wards were exempted due to High Court stay orders. Of the 12,728 panchayats going to polls, women should have received reservations in 6,364 panchayats. Instead, reservations were assigned in only 5,780 panchayats, leaving women without the chance to contest as sarpanches in 584 panchayats. Even in Panchayat Raj and Rural Development Minister D Anasuya's home district of Mulugu, women lost out. The district has 146 panchayats, of which 73 should have been reserved for women, but only 65 were allotted. Defending the reduced reservation, officials said the mandal was taken as a unit for sarpanch reservations and the gram panchayat



for ward member reservations. For example, in a mandal with 15 villages, seven would be reserved for men and seven for women, while the remaining one village was left unreserved, they claimed. Of the 1,12,242 wards, women were entitled to reservations in 56,121 wards, but many were denied these opportunities as well. According to data shared by the State Election Commission, the total rural electorate stands at 1,66,55,186, comprising 85,12,455 women, 81,42,231 men and 500 categorised as Others. Despite women outnumbering men by over 3.70 lakh, the Congress government has failed to ensure even the mandated level of reservation.

KTR slams Revanth Reddy for abandoning Palamuru-Rangareddy Lift Irrigation Scheme

Hyderabad: Holding Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy squarely responsible for the continued hardships of people in the Palamuru region, including his home district Mahabubnagar, BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Thursday said the Congress government had abandoned the Palamuru-Rangareddy Lift Irrigation Scheme, a flagship project that was the top priority of the previous BRS regime. Speaking after welcoming several BJP and Congress leaders from Kalwakurthy constituency into the BRS under the leadership of former MLA Jaipal Yadav at Telangana Bhavan, Rama Rao launched a fierce attack on Revanth Reddy for the neglect that the key project was subjected to during the past two years. Over 90 per cent of the works on the project were completed by the previous regime under K Chandrashekhar Rao's leadership.

"We built five massive reservoirs – Narlapur, Edula, Vattem, Karivena and Uddandapur, installed and switched on the pumps, and ensured water actually reached the agriculture fields of Palamuru. But today, Revanth Reddy, who keeps calling himself 'Palamuru Bidda', has not lifted even a single drop of water for the region despite inheriting a project that was 90 per cent complete," he charged, stating that the Congress government had deliberately stalled the remaining 10 per cent work, thereby denying irrigation water to lakhs of acres and pushing the once-flourishing re-



gion back towards distress migration. "Because of K Chandrashekhar Rao's commitment to change the agrarian profile of the State, the project implementation was fast tracked. The status of Palamuru had changed from a symbol of migration into a land of reverse migration by providing assured irrigation and 24-hour free power. Within just two years, Revanth Reddy has destroyed all that progress. Pumps are lying idle, reservoirs are gathering dust, and farmers are in despair, all because the remaining 10 per cent work that could have been finished in months is being deliberately delayed," he said, also mocking the Chief Minister's habit of merely renaming projects built by the previous government after his father-in-law.

Major relief as Telangana HC stays cancellation of 2015–16 Group-II recruitment process

Hyderabad: In a major relief to candidates selected through the 2015–16 Group-II examination, the Telangana High Court on Thursday stayed the single judge order that had cancelled the entire recruitment process. A Division Bench comprising Chief Justice Aparesh Kumar Singh and Justice GM Mohiuddin granted interim relief while hearing a writ appeal filed by the Telangana Public Service Commission (TGPSC). The Commission challenged the recent single judge verdict that set aside the final selection list released on October 24, 2019, after holding that the re-evaluation of Part-B answer scripts suffered from serious irregularities. The single bench had observed that the re-evaluation exercise marked by double bubbling, use of whitener and erasures was contrary to the recommendations of the technical committee and earlier directions of

the court. It had directed the TGPSC to undertake a fresh evaluation, publish a new list of eligible candidates, and complete the process within eight weeks. Questioning this decision, the TGPSC moved the Division Bench, arguing that the cancellation of the entire recruitment would unfairly affect candidates who had secured their positions after years of delay.

Hyderabad police launch new protocol to maintain city's 24/7 CCTV surveillance

Nominations begin for first phase gram panchayat polls in Khammam, Kothagudem

Khammam: The process of receiving nominations for the first phase gram panchayat elections started on Thursday in Khammam and Kothagudem districts.In Khammam, as many as 192 gram panchayats and 1740 wards have been notified for the first phase polls. 99 nominations were filed by sarpanch candidates while 49 nominations were filed by candidates contesting as ward members.In Kothagudem, 159 gram panchayats and 1436 wards have been notified for the first phase polls. 82 nominations were filed by sarpanch candidates while 87 nominations were filed by candidates contesting as ward members.

Khammam district Collector Anudeep Durishetty inspected the nomination reception centre at the Raghunadhapalem gram panchayat office. Nominations will be received from Thursday to Saturday at the centres allotted for the first phase elections in seven mandals in the district. He said that all arrangements have been made to conduct the election process peacefully and around 8,000 officers, staff and police personnel have been assigned election duties in the district. Kothagudem SP, B Rohith Raju informed that 22 flying squad teams, six static surveillance teams, six inter-state border check posts and four inter-district check posts have been set up across the district in coordination with officials of other departments to ensure that GP elections were held in a peaceful atmosphere in the district.

ED raids medical colleges across 10 States in NMC bribery probe

Hyderabad: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Thursday, according to reports from news agencies, has launched coordinated searches across medical colleges in ten states, including Telangana and Andhra Pradesh. The raids are related to a money laundering investigation linked to an alleged bribery racket involving the National Medical Commission (NMC) and various private medical colleges, agencies said. Under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), the raids targeted approximately 15 locations, including the premises of seven medical colleges and individuals named as suspects in the case. States under the radar include Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, and Delhi.

Pune-Ajni (Nagpur) Vande Bharat bookings at 130%, high demand calls for more coaches

With the Pune–Ajni (Nagpur) Vande Bharat recording average bookings of over 130% for months, and with the Nagpur–Indore Vande Bharat already upgraded to a 16-coach rake, the need for more coaches on the Pune corridor has become increasingly urgent. The train covers 881 kms in about 12 hours and operates six days a week. Official data from April 1 to October 31 shows the average booking percentage at 130.63% from Pune to Ajni and 127.06% in

the reverse direction, indicating that the 8-coach rake has been running at near-constant full capacity. The train departs Pune at 6:25 am (except Tuesdays) and reaches Ajni at 6:25 pm the same day. The return service leaves Ajni at 9:50 am (except Mondays) and arrives in Pune at 9:50 pm, making it one of the longest Vande Bharat runs. Hemant Kumar Behera, Divisional Commercial Manager, and PRO of the Pune division said that the demand has clearly risen.

BCs Will Not Tolerate Injustice by Congress Government: MP R. Krishnaiah



"How can they promise 42% reservations and cut it down to 17%?" "JAC stages protest rally from Liberty to Ambedkar Statue" Indian Chronicle, Secunderabad, November 27: "The Congress government, which deceived the Backward Classes after promising increased reservations, will not be spared, warned BC Welfare JAC Chairman and MP R. seven ST voters, all belonging to three families.

It questioned the State if all ST voters fall in one ward, how will the remaining ward members be elected, and how will the representation of other communities be ensured? The petitioners pointed out that after the earlier reorganisation by the previous government, Mahabubpatnam Gram Panchayat had 576 voters, comprising 199 SCs, 358 BCs, 13 OCs and 7 STs.

Sena MP Milind Deora urges BMC to halt all construction as Mumbai faces a 'public health emergency'

Shiv Sena Rajya Sabha MP Milind Deora has written to BMC Commissioner Bhushan Gagrani, warning that Mumbai's deteriorating air quality has reached the level of a "public-health emergency" and urging an immediate halt to all construction, excavation and road-digging work until pollution levels improve.In his letter dated November 27, Deora said Mumbai is "gasping for clean air" and highlighted the sharp spike in particulate matter last week. On November 22, the city's AQI touched 298 (Unhealthy), with PM2.5 at 126 µg/m³ and PM10 at 1,163 µg/m³. The following day, the AQI remained high at 255, with PM2.5 at 110 µg/m³ and PM10 at 138 µg/m³.

Citing the BMC's Environment Status Report 2024–25, he noted that annual PM10 levels across monitoring zones range between 70–125 µg/m³ and PM2.5 between 27–52 µg/m³, with Chembur recording the highest concen-

trations. October 2025, he said, was the most polluted month of the year, with several stations reporting their worst PM2.5 and PM10 readings since January. Deora said that despite the BMC's dust-control guidelines issued in October 2024, covering full barricading of construction sites, green cloth facades, water sprinkling, dust-extraction systems and mandatory AQI monitors, compliance has been poor. He pointed out that areas like Mazgaon have repeatedly crossed AQI 300, reflecting gaps in enforcement.

Arguing that "routine measures will no longer suffice," he called for a temporary moratorium on all constructionrelated work, including projects by utility agencies. Construction dust, he said, is the largest contributor to particulate pollution, and a temporary pause would offer the most immediate relief. The MP also sought daily inspections of construction sites, immediate shutdowns for violations, mandatory washing and water-sprinkling of debris and cement trucks, compulsory washing bays, and enhanced dust-suppression measures such as fogging, roadside sprinkling and mechanical sweeping in known hotspots. He further demanded independent real-time AQI monitors in construction and industrial areas, ward-wise public disclosure of data, and strict penalties for repeat offenders, including restrictions on future permits. "Mumbai is now facing a public-health emergency," Deora wrote, adding that prolonged exposure to high PM levels increases respiratory and cardiovascular risks, particularly for children and the elderly. He said airquality management should become a year-round priority rather than a seasonal response. Sharing the letter on social media, Deora said Mumbai "deserves better" and called for a broader public movement demanding clean air.

PSEB launches new question paper format to boost critical thinking

The reform brings structured blueprints, real-life questions and higher-order skill assessments across Punjab's schools.PSEB has introduced a modern, competency-based question paper design to strengthen critical thinking and reduce rote learning. In a major move to transform school education, the Punjab School Education Board (PSEB), under the leadership of chairman Dr Amarpal Singh, has introduced a completely revamped question paper design aimed at strengthening students' critical thinking and problem-solving abilities.

A three-day workshop, held in Mohali, brought together over 120 academic experts, subject specialists and master trainers, marking a landmark shift from rote learning to competency-based education across Punjab's classrooms. The board unveiled a modern question paper framework built on Revised Bloom's Taxonomy, ensuring assessments evaluate not just memory but also higherorder skills such as understanding, analysing, evaluating and creating. Officials emphasised the need for better alignment between classroom activities, learning outcomes and assessments to create a seamless learning experience. Going forward, all exams will follow structured blueprints and item matrices, featuring real-life, application-



based questions in core subjects, including science, mathematics, social studies and English. This redesign aims to make evaluations more transparent, accurate and meaningful for students across 13,000 government and affiliated schools. Experts from PARAKH and the Azim Premji Foundation also shared key insights on modern pedagogy, helping shape PSEB's roadmap for curriculum and assessment reforms. This initiative marks a significant stride in preparing Punjab's students for 21st-century challenges by modernising assessments, strengthening teacher training and updating the curriculum.

'I had to live...': How an ISRO scientist beat breast cancer to work on Chandrayaan-3 mission

Breast cancer survivor Rinku Agrawal wasn't as scared of chemotherapy as she was about losing her hair. And cancer didn't stop Agarwal from her professional pursuits. Since her recovery, she has worked on the hardware side of India's most prestigious missions such as Chandrayaan-3, Earth Observation Satellites and NISAR. She has also become a TEDx speaker and a vociferous advocate for breast cancer awareness. "Losing hair was a touchy subject for me. I've loved my long hair since I was a little girl. They are the best part of me. And when the time came, I only cut them short. I was not scared of chemotherapy as much as I was of losing my hair," said Agrawal, Senior Scientist/Engineer and Head of Department at the Space Application Centre, ISRO, Ahmedabad. Speaking to The Indian Express on the sidelines of an event on early breast cancer diagnosis at Apollo Hospitals, 50-year-old Agarwal, who is mother to twin boys, said, "When I realised I had breast cancer, the first question I asked my ISRO doctor was whether I have have to undergo chemotherapy because I knew that would lead to hair loss. When my hair began to shed due to chemo, I didn't let our house help sweep it away, I used to pick them up and dispose of them

Her very human telling of the psychological impacts of not just losing a breast to mastectomy but also her most prized possession - her hair - resonates with the stories of many survivors. Some of the advocates for breast cancer awareness plead with women to conduct self breast examinations routinely and seek medical opinion because more than 50-60% patients in India reach doctors only when it is too late. Speaking on her diagnosis, Agrawal said, "I had undergone several rounds of hormone therapy for three years and then gave birth to twin boys, through In-vitro Fertilisation (IVF) in 2007. Then, in June 2013, when the boys were about six-years-old, I received a setback at work. And at the same time, I began feeling my right side getting heavy and my hand would pain when raised. But I thought it was because the children were sleeping on my hands. But I did go to see our in-house ISRO doctors who recommended mammography and sonography. So, I came to Apollo Hospital where an acquaintance of mine was already under treatment." She added, "A couple of days later, my son was sick so I took him to the doctor and then went to work. My doctor called me and asked me to meet Dr Anagha Zope where I was told I had breast cancer. My family was counselled and my treatment began."At that time, Agrawal hadn't realised the full scope of what she would have to undergo. "But I had made up my mind that I had to live and get better for my kids."Dr Anagha Zope, Lead Consultant, Breast and Oncoplastic Surgeon at Ahmedabad's Apollo Cancer Centres said, "Breast cancer is the most prevalent cancer in India accounting for 13.6% of all cancers in India. In Gujarat, we recorded 11,500 breast cancer cases in 2023 which amounts to 32 new cases per day and we lost 4,280 people in 2023, which is 12 deaths per day of women due to breast cancer in Gujarat." Agrawal said when the treatment began, she was in a bad mood, lashed out at people and was in extreme physical discomfort. However, the first major point in her treatment would come in October 2013.

She said, "I had four chemotherapy sessions and in October 2013 went for mastectomy and my right breast was removed.""When the mastectomy took place, I was given an option to have breast reconstruction surgery but I didn't want to go through more treatment at that time. I had already undergone so much treatment and I couldn't take more of it. My husband and I consulted on the issue and decided we didn't need to go for it. So, I use a prosthetic and now it doesn't make that much of a difference. But this is a very personal choice. And I think that if this had happened today, I would have perhaps opted for it because of development in the field."Striking a comparison between breast reconstruction and breast saving surgery, Dr Zope said, "We have procedures where patients can use their own body part tissues to reconstruct the breasts or use medical silicone. It is easy to tell someone to remove the breast but for the woman, it is an integral part of her identity. It's not just what others see but what she sees herself as. Saving a breast is every woman's right. We can also do breast saving surgeries where we can do so but that requires additional radiation therapy and costs also increase. The end result is the same in both procedures but the only thing in reconstruction is that the part of the breast that could cause more cancer, has been removed completely.

After the mastectomy, Agrawal said she received vital support at work. "In January 2014, my seniors told me I should go to the office and work to take my mind off all this treatment. At that time I was designing the hardware of a miniaturised subsystem for the NASA-ISRO Synthetic Aperture Radar (NISAR) mission. While this work was on, radiation dates came up so I used to go for radiation for two hours and then returned to the office."

On the psychological impact of the cancer treatment on her work, Agrawal said, "My colleagues were very helpful and encouraging but since I was undergoing treatment, I thought I was down, I thought what work could I do now?"The majority of the treatment was completed by March 2014. But the first two years were critical and five years were crucial, where a lot of care had to be taken to reduce the scope of relapse. Speaking on the Check-Olate awareness campaign, a statement quoted her as saying, "Check-Olate is our way of turning a moment of indulgence into a reminder for proactive health. Dark chocolate, known for its antioxidant and mood-enhancing benefits, becomes a comforting messenger of care, reminding every woman that a simple self-examination, just a few minutes a month, can make all the difference. By making this message accessible and relatable, we aim to replace fear with awareness and action."In 2015, as Agrawal was recovering from her treatment, her work too saw an upturn and she was made a project manager with a team working on the components of the Earth Observation Satellite (EOS) Series. "This prestigious work gave me confidence, hope and encouragement to work harder. But on the side, there were constant check ups and I had to undergo another gynaecological procedure," she said. Even after the treatment, Agrawal said she had a kind of fear that there would be a relapse and she could lose her life. She found peace in a Buddhist community and began chanting as well as yoga to help with the lingering anxiety."There was also a lack of confidence in the work I had done during treatment and that lingering fear of whether everything had been done right or not. However, things got even better because I got the opportunity to work on the Vikram Lander which went to the Moon on the Chandrayaan-3 Mission. That also gave me satisfaction that life would go on and I wouldn't be hindered by what I had gone through with the treatments. And on the personal front, both my kids have grown up and one is in Engineering and the other in the medical field," said Agrawal, adding that the experience had made her stronger. According to her, the experience has only made her stronger. "Today, I'm the head of my division and I have much more work left to do,"

Hyderabad insurance agent loses 72 lakh

GNS News Agency, Nov 27Hyderabad: A 40-year-old insurance agent from Uppal fell prey to cyber fraudsters and lost Rs 72 lakh after joining a fake stock trading group on WhatsApp promising high returns. According to the police, the victim was added to a WhatsApp group named "Stocks VIP Exchange Group E8", where members promoted what was described as 'lucrative stock investment' opportunities. Convinced by their claims, he joined the group and interacted with its admins, identified as Karim Varma and Kristen, who claimed to represent Russell Investments. Initially, the victim invested Rs 50,000 and was shown small profits on a fake trading dashboard. Attracted by the returns, he continued investing in phases, totaling Rs 72,03,133. However, when he tried to withdraw his profits, the fraudsters demanded additional payments in the name of taxes and commissions. Realizing he had been duped, the victim filed a complaint with the Rachakonda Cybercrime Police, who have registered a case and took up investigation.

'Never said I will finish drugs from Punjab,' says former CM Captain Amarinder Singh

Punjab's former chief minister Capt Amarinder Singh Thursday said he had "never vowed to completely eradicate drugs from Punjab", but only to "break its back", and claimed that while all the gangsters were "put behind the bars" during his government, they are now "roaming free again."The veteran leader, who made a public appearance after months, sought to set the record straight on several issues, including his vow with Gutka Sahib (a Sikh holy scripture) in hand in 2015 that he will solve Punjab's drug issue within four weeks once voted to power.

"I had gone to Bathinda for a rally and the venue was near Takht Sri Damdama Sahib. I had held Gutka Sahib in my hand and said "main nasheyaan da laq tod dunga" (I will break the back of drug supply). "Laq todan da matlab eh nahi ki main khatam kar dunga (Breaking the back does not mean I will completely finish the drugs)," said Amarinder.Addressing a press conference in Moga, Amarinder said that he took several steps during his second tenure as the chief minister (beginning 2017) to break the drug supply chain.

"Senior IPS officer Harpreet Singh Sidhu was handling anti-Naxal operations in Chhattisgarh and I got him back to Punjab to head the anti-drug special task force. Over one lakh drug peddlers were arrested in our special anti-drug drive. My jails minister had told me that prisons were full and there was no space left to keep more drug peddlers. I told him to release pickpockets, but keep drug peddlers in jail," said Amarinder. He said, "When I was the CM in 2002, drug peddlers used to operate from across the border by jumping fence and crossing river and entering inside by 7 km. Then we had to deploy Border Security Force (BSF) in 7-km radius. Then came drones, which started entering 40 kms. Recently, Punjab Police confiscated 35 kg heroin. It's all coming from Pakistan which has only one motive: to finish our side of Punjab and our youths". Amarinder, who had earlier accused the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government of 'targeted harassment' of Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) leader Bikram Singh Majithia, currently lodged in Nabha jail

after being arrested in an alleged disproportionate assets (DA) case arising out of probe into the old drugs case, also sought to clarify his stand on the issue. "This country has a rule of law. The High Court had directed (then STF chief) Harpreet Sidhu to probe drug allegations against Majithia and put them in sealed over before the court and that is what Sidhu did (in 2018). So now when one investigation was done, who is (current Punjab CM) Bhagwant Mann to get the investigation done again? It is the court which should decide if that probe was right or wrong. In the US, it is called double jeopardy, which means one crime and two investigations is not possible," he said. The findings in Sidhu's 2018 report served as the foundation for the FIR against Majithia under the NDPS Act in December 2021. The senior BJP leader also targeted the AAP government over the law and order issue in the state. "Gangsterism is at its peak in Punjab. Main taan karte si seedhe (I had made gangsters fall in line). Tell me which gangsters were active during my tenure? We had put all of them behind the bars. Now all of them are roaming free again," said Amarinder. Announcing that he was now fit to campaign for BJP in coming days, Amarinder said that he has come out in public after a long time due to his "spinal cord issues" which were now sorted

"I had got injuries in spine during Army days and later got operated. It took time to settle down but now I am in Chardi Kalan and will rest only after we win. The BJP will form the next government in Punjab. We will work for the party at the ground level. I will soon visit Tarn Taran also where bypoll is scheduled," said Amarinder. After parting ways with the Congress on bitter note in 2021 without completing his tenure as CM, Amarinder had formed his own party Punjab Lok Congress (PLC) which contested the 2022 Punjab Assembly polls in alliance with BJP. However, the party drew blank, failing to win a single seat, including Amarinder's loss from his bastion Patiala. He later merged his party with the BJP and joined the saffron party along with his wife and former Patiala MP Preneet Kaur and daughter Jai Inder Kaur. Asked if he had left the Congress due to his bete noire and former cabinet minister Navjot Singh Sidhu, Amarinder said: "Who is Sidhu to decide if I had stayed in Congress or not? He was a minister. He was given culture and sports portfolios. For seven months, he would not clear his files. I called him (Sidhu) and asked and he had no explanation. Then I gave him power portfolio as he used to give a lot of statements on Punjab's power problem. He refused to work in that department too and resigned. That is what Navjot Sidhu was."Commenting on his former party colleague and now state Congress chief Amrinder Singh Raja Warring who has repeatedly criticized Amarinder's tenure as CM and also called him a "liability on Punjab", Amarinder said: "I better not say anything on Warring. He should first see his own actions and past."

In a five-minute-long video from 2023 on the website of Project Let's Change (PLC) Swachhata Monitor, Rohit Arya, who is identified as the Project Director, is seen passionately speaking about the initiative, how it is being implemented in schools across the state. In another video from 2023, Arya is seen with then Minister of School Education Deepak Kesarkar, in which the minister is seen praising the project and its results. In October 2024, Arya held a hungerstrike in Pune, claiming that he had not been paid the funds promised by the government. It was at this agitation held at the Pune Union of Working Journalists premises, Arya had suffered a seizure and had to be taken to hospital in an ambulance. On Thursday, Arya was at the centre of a hostage drama, where he held captive 17 students at a studio in Powai, at the end of which he was killed. At a residential society in Shivtirth Nagar area of Kothrud, where Arya's elderly parents live, a neighbour said, "Rohit's father A R Harolikar lives in our residential society with his wife. Both are in their late 70s. We have heard that Rohit changed his surname sometime in the past. Harolikar is a heart patient. The couple left for Mumbai in the afternoon. Rohit stays at a residential society nearby with his wife and son, we have

Another neighbour of the parents said, "The elderly couple always kept to themselves and hardly talked to anyone. I have interacted with Rohit a couple of times. He used to come here regularly during Covid pandemic to take care of his parents. I thought from my brief interaction that Rohit was a bright and enthusiastic man. What has happened is very tragic." At the agitation where Arya suffered a seizure, his wife Anjali had rushed to the location after hearing about it. In some of the videos of the time available online, Anjali says that her husband had been demanding and holding a hungerstrike for the pending payment for his project, which had been approved by the government. She said the government had taken up the project and approved Rs 2 crore for it. Activist Suraj Lokhande said he knew Rohit since last year when he held a fast outside the Patrakar Bhavan in



Pune last year. "He had fasted last year in August demanding that the state government should pay him for the help he extended in implementing the My Beautiful School project launched by the education department. He claimed the idea behind the project was his," Lokhande said. Lokhande said his condition deteriorated during the fast and he collapsed. "After he collapsed, I took him to the hospital and in a way saved his life... The same thing happened when he undertook another fast a few months later," he said.Lokhande said during his interactions, Arya told him that the state government owed him between Rs 45 lakh and Rs one crore. "I have the copies of the letters which Arya had sent to the state government demanding his dues. However, the government did not respond," he alleged. Showing pictures of Kesarkar, Lokhande said, "Arya's family feels let down by Kesarkar... Arya had sent a letter to the state government in which he said Kesarkar had come to his home in August 2024 and promised to resolve his grievance including giving his name to a project. However, Kesarkar did not keep his word."Lokhande said Arya sounded polite and would discuss his problems with him freely. "But I never thought he would go to such an extent... The path he adopted to secure justice for himself was wrong. But at the same time, the government should also think as to how it refused to give justice to him despite his repeated demands," he said.

National-level wrestler from Maharashtra among 4 held as Mohali police busts arms supply racket

The Mohali police has arrested a national-level wrestler and three alleged gangsters from Uttar Pradesh and Punjab, cracking down on an interstate arms supply network that had been funneling illegal weapons into the state. The arrests are linked to the notorious Papla Gujjar gang, with the police recovering five pistols, live cartridges, cash, and two vehicles used in the operation.

The accused have been identified as Danveer (26) and Bunty (26), both residents of Shergarh Chauraha in Mathura, Uttar Pradesh; Sikandar Shaikh (26), a national-level wrestler from Solapur, Maharashtra, now residing in Mullanpur Garibdas, Mohali; and Krishan Kumar, alias Happy Gujjar (22) of Nadda village, SAS Nagar.

According to Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Harmandeep Singh Hans, the CIA staff of Kharar had received intelligence on October 24 that two men from Mathura were transporting firearms to deliver in Mohali district. Acting on the tip-off, the police intercepted the suspects on the Kharar–Mullanpur–Airport Road and registered FIR No. 345 under sections 25, 54, and 59 of the Arms Act at Sadar Kharar police station. The operation led to the recovery of four .32 bore pistols with two live cartridges, one .45 bore pistol with two live cartridges, ?1.99 lakh in cash, a white Mahindra XUV300 car (registration no. 24 BH 8220 C), and



a black Scorpio N (registration no. MH13 ES 1200).

The police said Danveer, a key operative of the Papla Gujjar gang, had multiple previous cases of murder, dacoity, and Arms Act violations in Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, and Rajasthan. He allegedly procured the weapons from Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh for supply to criminal groups in Punjab. Shaikh, a BA graduate and former Army recruit under the sports quota, had come to Mohali to purchase the weapons allegedly for a local network. He was arrested along with the two UP natives near Gopal's Sweets at Airport Chowk during the transaction while Krishan Kumar was nabbed two days later."

Xi to meet Canadian, Japanese leaders after Trump trade truce

China's Xi Jinping will take centre stage at an annual gathering of Pacific Rim leaders in South Korea on Friday (October 31, 2025), holding talks with Canadian and Japanese counterparts after securing a fragile trade truce with U.S. President Donald Trump. That agreement, struck just before Mr. Trump left South Korea, skipping the main twoday Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit, will suspend further curbs on China's exports of rare earths that threatened to jam up global supply chains. Bolstering supply chains is a key focus of this year's APEC talks, which are being hosted in the historic town of Gyeongju. The 21member economic club aims to encourage cooperation and reduce trade and investment barriers, though decisions made at meetings are non-binding and consensus has been increasingly difficult.Xi meets Japan's new hawkish lead-

With the leader of the world's biggest economy absent, attention turns to Mr. Xi, who is expected to hold his first talks with Japan's newly elected leader Sanae Takaichi. While relations between the historic rivals have been on a sounder footing in recent years, Ms. Takaichi's surprise elevation to become Japan's first female leader may strain ties due to her nationalistic views and hawkish security policies. One of her first acts since taking office last week was to accelerate a military build-up focused on defending Japan's islands from an increasingly assertive China. Japan also hosts the biggest concentration of U.S. military abroad. The detention of Japanese nationals in China and Beijing's import restrictions on Japanese beef, seafood

and agricultural products are also likely to be among the sensitive issues on the agenda. Canada seeks to restart China engagementCanadian Prime Minister Mark Carney will meet Xi Jinping at 4:00 p.m. local time (0700 GMT), his office said, aiming to restart broad engagement with China after years of poor relations. Embroiled in a bitter trade war with its biggest trading partner, the United States, Canada is aiming to wean itself off that overwhelming dependence and seek new markets. China is Canada's second-biggest


Under the leadership of Carney's predecessor, Justin Trudeau, Canadians were detained and executed by the Chinese government, and Canada's security authorities concluded that China interfered in at least two federal elections. Mr. Xi also publicly scolded Mr. Trudeau, alleging he leaked their discussions to the press. China announced preliminary anti-dumping duties on Canadian canola imports in August, a year after Canada said it would levy a 100% tariff on imports of Chinese electric vehicles. Senior officials from both sides met to discuss those issues earlier this month, but gave no indication of any looming breakthrough. Bessent stands in for TrumpDeputising for Mr. Trump, U.S. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent will participate in the opening session of the summit, where South Korean Prime Minister Lee Jae Myung will host a discussion on "restoring the will to cooperate in the Asia-Pacific region". South Korean Foreign Minister Cho Hyun said on Thursday that negotiations were still taking place on a joint statement even for the ministerial meeting itself, but added that he was hopeful it would be adopted together with a leaders' declaration when the summit concludes on Saturday. "We are very close," he told a briefing. Two APEC member nation diplomats privately expressed scepticism that any statement would be particularly substantive, given fractures in global politics. APEC failed to adopt a joint declaration in 2018 and 2019, during Trump's first presidency. Nvidia's CEO Jensen Huang will be speaking this afternoon to a gathering of executives running parallel to the APEC Summit.Mr. Huang has had a whirlwind week, with Nvidia becoming the first company to surpass a \$5 trillion valuation, but the issue of the U.S. chipmaker's sale of advanced AI chips in China was seemingly left out of Thursday's Xi-Trump summit.

India's been 'very good' on that front: Trump repeats claim on Delhi reducing energy purchases from Moscow

U.S. President Donald Trump on Thursday) said India has been "very good" on the issue of reducing oil imports from Russia, reiterating his claim that Delhi will significantly reduce its energy purchases from Moscow. Speaking to reporters onboard Air Force One on his way back to Washington following his summit meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping in Busan, Mr. Trump was asked about Russian oil purchases.Mr. Trump said Mr. Xi has been "buying oil from Russia for a long time. It takes care of a big part of China. And, you know, I can say India's been very good on that front. But we didn't really discuss the oil. We discussed working together to see if we could get that war finished."Mr. Trump has been claiming for the past few days that Delhi has assured him that it will significantly reduce its oil imports from Russia

Last week, Mr. Trump reiterated his claim that India has agreed to "stop" buying oil from Russia and would bring them down to "almost nothing" by the end of the year. The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) has said that India is a significant importer of oil and gas, and it has been Delhi's consumer in a volatile energy scenario. "Our import policies



are guided entirely by this objective. Ensuring stable energy prices and secured supplies have been the twin goals of our energy policy.

This includes broad-basing our energy sourcing and diversifying as appropriate to meet market conditions. "Where the U.S. is concerned, we have for many steadily progressed in the last decade. The current Administration has shown interest in deepening energy cooperaconsistent priority to safeguard the interests of the Indian tion with India. Discussions are ongoing," the MEA had said

India's youth boxers clinch four golds, two silvers, and one bronze at 3rd Asian Youth Games 2025

Hyderabad: India's youth boxers delivered a historic performance at the 3rd Asian Youth Games 2025 in Bahrain, finishing with four golds, two silvers, and one bronze, the highest medal tally by any discipline in the Indian contingent and marking the country's best-ever showing in youth boxing at continental games. With this remarkable performance, India topped the Girls' Boxing section, reaffirming the nation's growing dominance in youth boxing on the Asian stage. In the Girls' Boxing category, India finished in Rank 1 with 4 gold medals and 1 silver medal.

The golden run began in the morning session with Khushi Chand (46kg) defeating China's Luo Jinxiu 4:1, displaying exceptional precision and control. Ahaana Sharma (50kg) followed with a first-round Referee Stopped Contest (RSC) win against Ma Jong Hyang of Korea. Chandrika Bhoreshi Pujari (54kg) then secured gold with a commanding 5:0 decision over Uzbekistan's Muhammadova Kumriniso. Anshika (+80kg) added the fourth gold for India, while Harnoor Kaur (66kg) claimed silver after a hard-fought bout.On the boys' side, Lanchenba Singh Moibungkhongbam (50kg) fought valiantly but narrowly missed gold, taking silver against Kazakhstan's Nurmakhan



Zhumagali. Earlier, Anant Deshmukh (66kg) clinched bronze, rounding off a stellar campaign for India's young boxers. The six-medal haul underscores the strength of India's youth boxing program and the rigorous preparation at NS NIS Patiala under Head Coaches Vinod Kumar (boys) and Jitender Raj Singh (girls). This landmark achievement reinforces India's growing dominance in Asian boxing and highlights a promising new generation ready to make its

Tourists to Sri Lanka not required to obtain Electronic Travel Authorisation

Colombo: Tourists travelling to Sri Lanka are not required to obtain Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) prior to their arrival in the island nation, the authorities said

The Department of Immigration and Emigration said in a statement on Thursday that it has withdrawn the requirement, which came into effect on October 15.As per the new directive, all ETA and visa issuance services will continue to operate under the existing procedures until further notice. "Travellers may therefore apply for visas under the same process that existed before October 15," the statement said. India has been Sri Lanka's biggest inbound tourism market for the last three months—July to September.



Fate of thousands feared in Darfur after reported rampage by Sudanese paramilitary force

Sudanese fleeing a paramilitary force that seized a city in the country's Darfur region trickled into a nearby refugee camp Thursday after walking for miles, telling aid workers that roads were littered with bodies. Aid groups feared for the fate of thousands more trying to escape, with hundreds reportedly killed in the turmoil. The U.N. Security Council convened an emergency meeting on Sudan amid international alarm over the bloodshed. U.N. officials have warned of a rampage by the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces after it took over the city of el-Fasher, reportedly killing more than 450 people in a hospital and carrying out ethnically targeted killings of civilians and sexual assaults

Speaking at the meeting, U.N. humanitarian chief Tom Fletcher criticized the Security Council for not acting sooner in Sudan. The country has been torn for the past two years by a war between the military and the RSF that has killed more than 40,000 people and left more than 14 million displaced."Can anyone here say we did not know this was coming?" he said. "We cannot hear the screams, but as we sit here today the horror is continuing. Women and girls are being raped, people being mutilated and killed with utter impunity." As the U.S. and others at the gathering called for an end to "external support" for the warring parties, Sudan's representative accused the United Arab Emirates, a top American ally, of backing the RSF. The Gulf nation has denied reports it provides weapons and funding to the paramilitary forces. A U.N. panel of experts in 2024 said it found the reports credible. The RSF had been besieging el-Fasher, the last military-held stronghold in the Darfur region, for the past 500 days. Its capture raises fears that Africa's thirdlargest nation may split, with the paramilitaries holding Darfur and the military holding the capital Khartoum and the north and east of the country. The U.N. migration agency said over 36,000 have reportedly fled el-Fasher since Sunday, with people fleeing on foot in the middle of the night. Experts analyzing satellite imagery say an earthen wall built by the RSF around the city is preventing residents from fleeing and has become a "kill box" where some appear to have been shot. Only thousands have arrived at Tawila, a town some 60 kilometers (35 miles) west of el-Fasher. Tawila has already burgeoned into a sprawling refugee camp housing hundreds of thousands who fled the RSF's siege of el-Fasher over the past year. Mathilde Vu, advocacy manager for the Norwegian Refugee Council, which manages the camp, said the small number reaching Tawila "should be a concern for all of us ... That tells the horror of the journey."The new arrivals told aid workers that there were arbitrary killings by RSF along the roads, which were littered with bodies, the International Rescue Committee said. Save the Children said arriving women described hiding with their children in trenches or abandoned buildings inside el-Fasher to escape fighters, then being attacked and robbed by armed men as they left the city. Vu said the vast majority of those arriving in Tawila are women, or families headed by women, as well as large numbers of children separated from their parents. Some among the arrivals were injured, many were malnourished. Some women reported rapes as they fled, Vu said. "Men are just not arriving. Either they were killed, disappeared or lost along the way," she said. In Tawila, the newly displaced sheltered under trees. One woman, Aisha Ismael, said she arrived barefoot with none of her belongings amid constant drone attacks and shelling. People foraged for livestock fodder known as ambaz, which is made from peanut shells and water, because they were so hungry."We looked for it in the dirt to eat and they didn't even let us. If they catch us, they hit us and throw it away," she said. Disrupted communications around el-Fasher has made assessing the devastation inside the city difficult. Witnesses told The Associated Press that RSF fighters went from house to house, beating and shooting people, including women and children. Some 460 patients and their companions were reportedly killed Tuesday at the Saudi Hospital in el-Fasher, said Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, the director-general of the World Health Organization. The AP has not been able to independently confirm the hospital attack and death toll. The RSF on Thursday denied carrying out killings at the hospital. It said it had arrested a number of individuals accused of committing violations during the seizure of el-Fasher. The Yale School of Public Health's Humanitarian Research Lab said satellite imagery from Airbus corroborated alleged killings by the RSF around the Saudi Hospital. It also analyzed images of a children's hospital that the RSF turned into a detention center months ago and found "a pile consistent with human remains" in the yard. We think those are people who were killed at the detention center," the lab's executive director Nathaniel Raymond said. The Yale researchers also said that "systematic killings" took place in the vicinity of the earthen wall, which the RSF built outside the city earlier this year. "The entire city is surrounded by a berm. It is a kill box, to trap them, to kill them," said Raymond. At the Security Council gathering, U.S. ambassador to the U.N. Dorothy Shea condemned "the horrific violence occurring in el-Fasher." She repeated Washington's stance that the RSF and its allied militias have committed genocide in Sudan.

She said American officials are working to secure "an immediate humanitarian truce and halting external support" for the violence in Sudan. The military — which opponents say is linked to Sudanese Islamist groups — and the RSF were previously allies in ruling Sudan, until they fell out in a struggle for power in 2003. Both sides have faced allegations of human rights abuses. But rights groups and the United Nations have accused the RSF and allied Arab militias of repeated mass killings of civilians and widespread rapes, mainly targeting non-Arab communities. The RSF is largely made up of fighters from the Janjaweed militia that committed genocide in the early 2000s in Darfur. Egypt, where the military dominates the government, gives political backing to the Sudanese military, seeing it as a more reliable ally in the neighboring nation. The UAE is reported to back the RSF, similar to its support of armed factions in Libya and Yemen to spread its influence and combat Islamist groups. It has repeatedly denied allegations that it funnels weapons to the RSF. But in January 2024, the U.N.appointed Panel of Experts for Sudan detailed reports of cargo planes believed to carry weapons destined for the RSF through neighboring Chad and called the reports credible. During Thursday's session, the UAE's representative to the U.N., Mohamed Abushahab, said the Gulf state stands in "solidarity" with the Sudanese people and announced \$100 million in humanitarian aid.Sudan's U.N. Ambassador Al-Harith Idriss Al-Harith Mohamed accused the UAE of waging a "war of aggression" in Sudan with its support of the RSF and criticized the Security Council for failing to take "any practical measures to hold this particular sponsor and others accountable."

If US resumes nuclear weapons testing, this would be extremely dangerous for humanity

Melbourne: US President Donald Trump has instructed the Pentagon to resume nuclear weapons testing immediately, "on an equal basis" with other countries' testing programs. If Trump is referring to the resumption of explosive nuclear testing, this would be an extremely unfortunate, regrettable step by the United States. It would almost inevitably be followed by tit-for-tat reciprocal announcements by other nuclear-armed states, particularly Russia and China, and cement an accelerating arms race that puts us all in great jeopardy. It would also create profound risks of radioactive fallout globally. Even if such nuclear tests are conducted underground, this poses a risk in terms of the possible release and venting of radioactive materials, as well as the potential leakage into groundwater. The Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty has been signed by 187 states – it's one of the most widely supported disarmament treaties in the world.

The US signed the treaty decades ago, but has yet to ratify it. Nonetheless, it is actually legally bound not to violate the spirit and purpose of the treaty while it's a signatory. What testing is used for, and why it stoppedIn earlier years, the purpose of testing was to understand the effects of nuclear weapons - for example, the blast damage at different distances, which provides confidence in destroying a given military target. Understanding the consequences of nuclear weapons helps militaries plan their use and, to some extent, protect their own military equipment and people from the possible use of nuclear weapons by adversaries. But since the end of the Second World War, states have mostly used testing as part of the development of new weapon designs. There have been a very large number of tests, more than 2,000, mostly seeking to understand how these new weapons work. The huge environmental and health problems caused by nuclear testing prompted nations to agree on a moratorium on atmospheric testing for a couple of years in the early 1960s. In 1963, the Partial Test Ban Treaty banned nuclear tests in all environments except underground. Since then, nuclear-armed states have stopped testing at different times. The US stopped in 1992, while France stopped in 1996. China and Russia also aren't known to have conducted any tests since the 1990s. North Korea is the only state to have openly tested a nuclear weapon this century, most recently in 2017. These stoppages came in the 1990s for a reason: by that time, it became possible to test new nuclear weapon designs reliably through technical and computer developments, without having to actually explode them. So, essentially, the nuclear states, particularly the more advanced ones, stopped when they no longer needed to explosively test new weapon designs to keep modernising their stocks, as they're still do-

Worrying levels of nuclear proliferationThere is some good news on the nuclear weapons front. The Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons has now been signed by half the world's nations. This is a historic treaty that, for the first time, bans nuclear weapons and provides the only



internationally agreed framework for their eventual elimination. With the exception of this significant development, however, everything else has been going badly.All nine nuclear-armed states (the US, China, Russia, France, the United Kingdom, India, Pakistan, North Korea and Israel) are investing unprecedented sums in developing more accurate, stealthier, longer-range, faster, and more concealable nuclear weapons. This potentially lowers the threshold for their use. And it certainly gives no indication that these powers are serious about fulfilling their legally binding obligations to disarm under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. Moreover, multiple nuclear-armed states have been involved in recent conflicts in which nuclear threats have been made, most notably Russia and Israel. Worryingly, we have also seen the number of nuclear weapons "available for use" actually start to climb again. This includes those in military stockpiles, those that have been deployed (linked to delivery systems such as missiles), and those on high alert, which are the ones most prone to accidental use because they can be launched within minutes of a decision to do so. All of these categories are on the increase. Russia, in particular, has weapons we haven't seen before, such as a nuclear-powered, nuclear-armed cruise missile that President Vladimir Putin said on Sunday his country has successfully tested. China, too, is embarking on a rapid build-up of nuclear weapons. And the US has just completed assembling a new nuclear gravity bomb. A new START treaty is also not moving forwardNearly all of the hard-won treaties that constrained nuclear weapons since the end of the Cold War have been abrogated. There's now just one remaining treaty constraining 90 per cent of the world's nuclear weapons, which are in the hands of the US and Russia. This is the New START Treaty, which is set to expire in February next year. Putin offered to extend that treaty informally for another year, and Trump has said this is a good idea. But its official end is just four months away, and no actual negotiations on a successor treaty have begun. The US has also said China needs to be involved in the successor treaty, which would make it enormously more complicated. China has not expressed a willingness to be part of the process. Whether anything will be negotiated to maintain these restraints beyond February is unclear.

AI's rewriting of the rules of education



India is gearing up to turn its education system on its head by introducing Artificial Intelligence (AI) to students as early as class three from the academic year in 2026-27. This is no small feat. The Ministry of Education, in synchrony with the National Education Policy 2020, is crafting a comprehensive framework to weave AI learning through the entire K-12 tapestry (kindergarten to class 12). The goal is to arm the future workforce with cutting-edge tech skills to thrive in a techno-driven economy.

Teacher training and pilot projectsBut throwing Al into classrooms is not just plug-and-play. The real challenge lies in upskilling a mammoth teaching force of over one crore educators in India. The government is rolling out pilot initiatives allowing teachers to harness Al tools to design lesson plans and teaching resources. Over 10,000 teachers have already been trained since 2019 with help from technology giants Intel, IBM, and government institutes such as the National Institute of Electronics and Information Technology. The goal is to equip educators who can impart AI concepts confidently and practically. But how ready are India's teachers to morph into Al guides? What are the obstacles in this massive transition? How ready teachers are will dictate how successful the Al revolution becomes.Al is not just about introducing new content. It promises a colossal shift away from "one-size-fits-all" education to personalisation. Al-powered platforms analyse student behaviour, learning speed, and comprehension to tailor lessons that meet individual needs. If a student struggles with algebra, the Al tutor offers extra practice and alternative explanations. If a student is good in biology, he can get ready for more advanced challenges, with AI. Such adaptive learning not only boosts engagement but also dismantles barriers for diverse student populations, including those with disabilities or regional language needs. Despite its transformative potential, AI is designed to augment, not replace, the human element in education. The focus is on enhancing human judgment, creativity and critical thinking through smart tools. Al automates repetitive tasks such as grading and attendance, freeing teachers to spend more time on

meaningful engagement with students. It acts as a powerful assistant in personalised lesson planning and real-time feedback, amplifying the effectiveness of educators. So, while AI is shaking up the classroom, there is still no substitute for a passionate teacher who drives learning with empathy and insight. Opportunity amid disruption

As Al reshapes education, it also signals seismic workforce changes. According to a recent NITI Aayog report, while AI could displace up to two million jobs in India's tech sector over the next five years, it is also projected to create four million new jobs by 2030, jobs that demand new skills and adaptability. This is a dual-edged sword that calls for the urgent preparation of today's learners. By embedding Al in early education, India aims to create a workforce that is ready for a digital economy, and not left behind by rapid automation. But are students and educators prepared to embrace this whirlwind of change? The question is not just about job loss or creation but about shaping a resilient workforce that can ride the AI wave. Generative AI technology, which creates new content based on patterns in data, is already gaining traction in Indian education. More than half of India's higher education institutes are incorporating generative AI to enhance teaching and learning. From AI chatbots that answer student queries 24X7 to platforms that create interactive quizzes and personalised study materials, generative AI is making education more engaging and tailored. This explosion of AI tools could narrow the learning gap significantly in India's vast and diverse education landscape. It is a frontier full of promise but also challenges that are related to access, quality and ethics. Driving inclusivity and accessibilityPerhaps the most heartening impact of AI in education is its role in fostering inclusivity. Al-powered adaptive learning and language processing tools break down barriers for non-native speakers and learners with disabilities. The customisation of educational content can create equitable learning environments. In countries that are multicultural and multilingual like India, this Al-driven push for inclusiveness could rewrite the rules of who gets to learn and how. Could AI be the great equaliser that education systems worldwide have long sought? The signs are promising, but deliberate design and policy are critical. India's bold initiative to weave AI into early education signals a massive transformation in how knowledge is imparted, how teachers teach, and how students engage with learning. The revolution comes with challenges: teacher training at scale, ensuring equitable access to Al tools, and preparing students for jobs that do not even exist. Are Indian schools truly ready for this AI overhaul? Can the education system keep pace with rapid technological advancements without leaving disadvantaged communities behind? Only time will tell. But one thing is clear: the rules of education are being rewritten right before our eyes, and AI is the pen scripting this brave new

Gender disparity exists even in informal labour market

Gender inequality issues are widespread and numerous. Wage and earning inequality in the labour market has been a major concern. Why job market outcomes differ across genders, even after controlling for human capitalspecific factors, is a key question. Even within the informal sector, which is generally characterised by low levels of productivity and earnings, gender differences are perceptible. Some studies present a thorough and intricate assessment of the recent growth in female workforce participation rates (FWPR) in India, supported by detailed data obtained from the Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS). Their paper reveals that a substantial portion of this increase is concentrated specifically within the agricultural sector, where notable rises in self-employment and unpaid family work have collectively contributed to heightened participation rates among women.?The authors compellingly argue that these trends should not merely be interpreted as indicators of disguised unemployment; rather, they may signify productive engagement in economic activities that have historically been under-recognised and undervalued (Goldar and Agarwal, 2024).

In general, the informal sector is viewed as a sector that is subordinate to the formal sector. For the sake of flexibility, regulations are not encouraged, allowing for greater employment potential to be tapped, which is often lacking in the formal sector. Though residual types of activities are conducted within the informal sector, the greater employment potential is considered a merit in low-income countries. Within the residual activities or a sector that is subordinate to another, any further possibility of discrimination is usually unexpected. However, our findings reveal that even within the informal sector, women experience worse outcomes than men. In the face of an excess supply of labour in menial and low-productivity activities, the possibility of gender-based outcomes cannot be ruled out, as hiring and firing practices may involve gross inequality, perpetuated by stereotypes and prejudices. Our study using the unit-level data of the PLFS argues that significant differences exist between males and females in terms of employment structure and labour market outcomes. In general, the industrial classification and the nature of employment for female and male workers vary significantly. Furthermore, within the informal sector, the types of employment and wage/earning outcomes reveal substantial differences. In order to assess whether the rising employment of women is associated with productive absorption, resulting in an increased standard of living, the average monthly per capita consumption expen-

diture (MPCE) is compared across households with and

without women workers. First, the households are distributed across different decile groups, and for each group, the average consumption expenditure per capita has been estimated separately for households with women workers and those without.

At the upper end, the backward-sloping supply curve of women suggests that the average monthly consumption expenditure per capita could be higher for households without women workers compared with those with women workers. This is somewhat evident when we compare the top decile in the rural context across both survey years. In the lowest decile group, households with women workers are marginally better off than those without. Overall, there does not seem to be any significant difference in the consumption expenditure per capita between the two groups of households across most of the decile classes. This compels us to reflect on the quality of employment in which women are engaged. If the recent surge in employment statistics is due to a rise in women's employment, it does not necessarily indicate that rural women are being increasingly absorbed into quality jobs. Had that been the case, the rise in rural women's employment would have been accompanied by an increase in income per household, which would again be reflected in the monthly consumption expenditure per capita. In the urban context, most of the decile groups do not reveal any significant difference in terms of consumption expenditure per capita between households with and without women workers. At the top, households in the decile class without women workers are better off than those with women workers, as noted in the rural context as well. However, in the lowest decile group, households with women workers are marginally better off than those without women workers.Low-productivity work

Hence, the recent rise in women's employment appears to be largely a proliferation of low-productivity activities. The indirect evidence does not indicate any improvement in the availability of decent jobs for women. The lack of productive jobs compels many women to participate in low-productivity activities, as open unemployment may not be a feasible option. As men, the principal breadwinners, may not have access to jobs with sufficient incomes to meet their households' consumption requirements, women feel compelled to enter the labour market and resort to jobs of last resort. Additionally, in the absence of male members to participate in the job market, women are forced to seek income-earning opportunities, even if the quality of those jobs remains poor. Of course, this increase in low-productivity jobs does not necessarily reflect a shrinking demand for decent jobs; it could also be attributed to poor human capital formation among women job seekers. A more rigorous analysis is conducted based on the unit-level data to assess gender differences in the nature of employment within the informal sector. After controlling for important variables, the gender differences in the occupational choice function are significant. Furthermore, these differences are reflected in the wage/earning function, providing evidence that women's engagement in the labour market is not necessarily associated with equality. In regular wage employment, casual wage employment, and self-employment, women earn less than

Additionally, wage employment within the informal sector is less accessible to women workers compared with their male counterparts; they are more susceptible to self-employment, which may not generate substantial earnings for the workers. This has important implications for the non-attainment of empowerment and a "say" in the decision-making process. Policy directives can be envisioned to extend support to female workers for accessing wage employment and to reduce gender wage inequality. It is important to recognise that even within the domain of petty and residual activities, discrimination exists, perpetuating inequality. How Mari Selvaraj has portrayed Dalit lives within Tamil cinema



Filmmaker Mari Selvaraj's rise in Tamil cinema as one of its top filmmakers from humble beginnings and his evolution as a master craftsman is a story by itself. It wouldn't be a stretch to state that Mr. Selvaraj along with filmmaker Pa. Ranjith filled a yawning gap in Tamil cinema by ensuring that Dalit protagonists and Ambedkarite politics of emancipation formed the central core of their films, serving as an anathema to the persistent normalisation of violence and oppression by dominant castes in the name of valour and history in Tamil cinema. It has been 13 years since filmmaker Pa. Ranjith burst onto the scene with Attakathi and seven years since Mari Selvaraj's first film, Pariyerum Perumal, released in theatres to positive reviews and success at the box office, dispelling the notion that films about caste discrimination set in the deep south are akin to a spark in the powder keg. Yet, crucial differences between the two filmmakers haven't been emphasised enough. Except for Attakathi, Mr. Ranjith largely shies away from making films with significant autobiographical elements while Mr. Selvaraj situates his autobiographical episodes in historical contexts, save for Maamannan

Mr. Ranjith's point of view has been informed by a different political tradition in northern parts of Tamil Nadu, where fight for rights would mean large scale political mobilisations, street protests and litigations. However, Mr. Selvaraj's formative years were spent in what was then a part of the Tirunelyeli district, a southern district of Tamil Nadu, that has been a hot-bed of caste-violence and caste-based mobilisation through the 90s, including widespread rioting across neighbouring districts, known as the 'Thenmaavatta Kalavarangal'. Young and middle-aged taxi drivers hailing from southern districts but making a living in Chennai, Bengaluru or Mumbai could tell you how the smallest of provocations, say, in restrooms, in cinema halls, in public buses (as in Bison: Kaalamaadan), or in tea shops could snowball into a major incident of violence. Irrespective of which community they hail from, most of them find the prevailing environment toxic and are realising that it is not worth contributing to violence and spending one's life entangled in court cases. This is perhaps why Mr. Selvaraj's point of view appears to look like he is striving for a negotiation, often resorting to dialogue even with his worst enemy, despite the fact that Dalit communities in the south of Tamil Nadu often fight back and resist oppression violently. During a visit to Tirunelveli before the 2021 State Assembly elections, this author asked political activists within the Devendrakula Vellalar community about Mr. Selvaraj's first film Pariyerum Perumal. They were quite critical of the film. "It is not our film. It is a film made for you people," a political

party office bearer said jokingly. He meant that the film was meant to tug at your heart, and not aimed at his throat.

However, Mr. Selvaraj quickly changed his tone in Karnan, featuring Dhanush, in which he wove a story around a painful historical incident of police brutality to etch a rather spirited story about how a regular, everyday youth uses revolutionary violence in pursuit of justice. "This is more our film. We fought back...and now everybody knows that," the same activist, told me over the phone after the release. In four of the five films that Mr. Selvaraj has made so far, it is clear that he has been struggling to make sense of his personal experience with caste and the social machinations around him. Questions have been asked, not just by those who don't like the politics in his films, but also by those who take him seriously as a filmmaker.Questions of conscience

Many have spoken about how Mr. Selvaraj has mastered the art of representation — the way women tie their sarees in his films, how dominant castes strut around and throw their weight in villages and towns, and how the smallest of scuffles could snowball into a conflict involving whole communities. After an uncomfortable outing in Maamannan, which had some decent ideas, Mr. Selvaraj returned to his familiar surroundings with Vaazhai, telling us a story of characters hailing from his world, with episodes from his life. Its message was that caste-based labour exploitation has a role to play in accidents, too.

With Bison: Kaalamaadan, Mr. Selvaraj plonks his protagonist, Kittan, an aspiring Kabaddi player, who is asked to stay out of trouble by his father, in the midst of a raging, violent war between two community leaders — one fighting to ensure that the social balance remains tilted in his community's favour and the other, fighting to create equilibrium. In Bison, Mr. Selvaraj continues to open himself up to the criticism that his films often tries to appeal to the good conscience of the oppressor castes. A writer who is wellinformed about the politics in the south said, "Except for Karnan, protagonists in Mari's films have sought equality with the oppressor castes by showcasing the struggles of the protagonist and appealing to their good side. However, nobody in Tamil cinema today has been able to capture how the dominant castes try to maintain their dominance in the caste society. He is exceptional in that case."While one need not speculate about his motivations, it is true that the idea of seeking parity by appealing to the good conscience of dominant castes sits uncomfortably with the larger Dalit community who remember their struggles in the south differently. It is perhaps understandable that cinema, being an expensive mainstream art, necessitating the need to recoup money in the market, imposes certain restrictions such as creating a sense of balance in representation and so on The movement that began with Pa. Ranjith and Mari Selvaraj, finds itself at an inflection point: can mainstream cinema be used to build bridges and force a change of mindsets in other communities while telling stories of oppression the way it must be told? Bison could be seen as a move towards that. By bringing the life and struggles of Manathi Ganesan, a Kabaddi player, on the silver screen, Mr. Selvaraj has shown his intent to celebrate not just those who fight for the rights of people, organise protests and so on, but also heroes from the community who quietly break glass ceilings and set benchmarks, not just for young people within the community but for Tamil society as a whole.

As campaign peaks, Bihar narrative revolves around old and new strands

The verdict in the two-phase Bihar Assembly election will be pronounced in a little over a fortnight, on November 14, but the campaign's momentum on the ground has given way to Chhath festivities, which fell this year on October 27-28. Moreover, a paradigm shift in the format of the election campaign has seen it move from the ground to social media. And from the heat and dust of intense campaigning have risen a handful of dominant themes in voter conversations.

Firstly, Chief Minister Nitish Kumar still appears more popular than other political leaders in the arena but his failing health is a talking point, especially among male voters. The ruling National Democratic Alliance's (NDA) 'Dus Hazaria' scheme, a reference to the ?10,000 transferred to 'Jeevika Didis' (community mobilisers for self-help groups in a World Bank-supported initiative) under the 'Mukhyamantri Mahila Rozgar Yojana' (CM women's employment scheme) through Direct Benefit Transfer to the beneficiaries' bank accounts, has gained huge traction and accolades. Mr. Kumar has been, for a long time, assiduously carving a caste-neutral women's vote bank, with several welfare schemes crafted especially for women under his baton. Women voters (at 48%) are almost equal in number to male voters in Bihar. They can be heard speaking of the 'Dus Hazaria' scheme everywhere, proclaiming their support for Mr. Kumar. "We will all vote for Nitish Kumar," a group of women voters from an Extremely Backward Class (EBC) told this reporter, sitting by the roadside under the shadow of a neem (margosa)tree at noon on October 22 in Samastipur. They were busy weaving supdaura (handcrafted bamboo baskets) used in the Chhath festival to carry fruits and other offerings to the rising and setting Sun. Men of the same group, sitting nearby and also weaving baskets, beads of sweat crowding their brow, sounded more cautious. "We have heard he (Nitish Kumar) is not well these days. He should give up his position before things turn fatal," they said. The ruling NDA has fielded 34 women candidates, while the Opposition Mahagathbandhan (grand alliance) has 31 women candidates in the fray this year. Tejashwi's burden

Secondly, voter conversations centre around Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) leader Tejashwi Yadav burdened by the inherited tag of "lawlessness in Bihar" of his parents' regimes from 1990 to November 2005. The younger son of RJD supremo Lalu Prasad is a former Leader of the Opposition in Bihar Assembly, and was Deputy Chief Minister twice in Mahagathbandhan (grand alliance) governments. NDA leaders have targeted him over the years of "misrule and migovernance" under the RJD, a focus Mr. Yadav has struggled to shrug off.Mr. Lalu Prasad has declared his younger son to be his political heir, and Mr. Yadav has announced several welfare schemes for women but voters frequently recall the "jungle raj" that became a byword for the RJD era in Bihar's governnance. "It's okay that he (Mr. Yaday) too has announced something for us, but who can forget the total absence of law in the RJD regime," voters in urban Darbhanga told this reporter. At 36, Mr. Yadav is popular among younger voters. "He is young, and has proved he means what he says in the 17 months during which he was a Mahagathbandhan Deputy CM," students returning from a coaching institute in Darbhanga town as the prepared to write examinations for 'government jobs', said. Mr. Yadav has promised one 'government job' per family if he comes to power. "Did Modi ji provide ?15 lakh to everyone in the country as he had promised?" they said, when asked about

Mr. Yadav's campaign promise.PM's popularity
Thirdly, Prime Minister Narendra Modi is still the most



popular leader across age groups in both urban and rural constituencies of the State, irrespective of their caste affiliations. Voters speak of Mr. Modi as a "strong leader who is tough, and at the same time takes care of every section of society". "We need a leader like him," Ramesh Kushwaha of Vaishali district said, looking to others sitting with him for confirmation as they nodded.Mr. Modi has campaigned extensively in Bihar. On October 30, he is scheduled to address two public meetings at Muzaffarpur and Chhapra, and will hold a roadshow in Patna on November 2. "He is more appealing for us than any other leader either in Bihar or the country," Sanjay Bind, pedalling his cycle swiftly on the Mahua-Samastipur road in Vaishali district, said.

Congress is backFourthly, the Congress party, which was pushed into something approaching a political coma in the State when Mr. Prasad led the RJD to power in 1990, has finally found its stride with the success of Rahul Gandhi's 14-day, 1,300-km-long Voter Adhikar Yatra across 24 districts. Congress leaders and supporters have received a fresh lease of life, and the party Bihar headquarters Sadaqat Ashram is seen buzzing with activity after a long time. Enthused party leaders have even pressured the RJD to let the Congress contest more seats. Several party leaders suggested that had Mr. Gandhi stayed for more days in Bihar, or camped here, the contest in Bihar this time would have been between "the BJP-led NDA and the Congress-led Mahagathbandhan", with the party reclaiming lost ground.

'Over-hyped' JSPFifthly, the lack of traction for the newly launched Jan Suraaj Party, founded by former poll strategist Prashant Kishor on October 2, 2024 in Patna, has become evident. The JSP is contesting all 243 seats, with three candidates withdrawing their nominations. But despite the hype on social media, and in some sections of conventional media, there is little evidence of interest in the party on the ground. "It (the JSP) is doing well only on social media. It is over-hyped publicity of the kind Mr. Kishor was doing for other political parties as an expert on elections, nothing else," Rajesh Kumar, 55, an engineer-turned-stock broker from the Kumhrar constituency in central Patna, said. "Candidates with a good personality and career are not guaranteed to win elections in Bihar. Do you think the Congress party candidate from Patna Sahib, Shashant Shekhar, is in anyway less educated than any of the JSP's candidates, but will he win the poll? It's a million dollar question," Mr. Kumar added. Several smaller parties have had a little impact in some constituencies on the ground. The All India Majlis-e-Ittehadul Muslimeen (AIMIM) has caught the attention of voters in some constituencies of the Seemanchal (border) districts of northeast Bihar, where its presence may be impactful in the results.



Language belongs to a different realm



From sails to steam engines, from bullock carts to motor cars, from huts to skyscrapers, every stage of human history has been marked by breathtaking technological progress. Each new invention has made life faster, easier and more comfortable. Yet, amid all this change, one aspect of human experience has remained strikingly constant: how we communicate. The medium has evolved dramatically — from messengers and handwritten letters to telephones and instant messaging, but the essence has not. It is still one human being reaching out to another. The town crier's drumbeat in the village square has become a digital notice on a government website, but both are acts of connection. The tools have changed but the impulse to communicate has not. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is now rewriting the rules of learning and work. It solves equations, drafts essays, designs buildings and composes music. It can act as a tutor, a translator, a researcher, and even a companion. In subjects that rely on logic, structure and fixed systems — mathematics, physics, engineering — AI has already become transformative. Students can now get instant explanations of complex formulas or visualise difficult scientific concepts at the click of a button. What a machine

Language, however, belongs to a different realm. It is not only a system of rules but also a living, breathing expression of culture and emotion. Al can process grammar and vocabulary, but it cannot capture humour, irony, affection or hesitation. A sentence translated by a machine may be correct in words, yet wrong in spirit. When someone says "I miss you" or "Te extraño", the meaning is inseparable from emotion, something a machine cannot feel. Technology has made translation almost effortless. A

Hindi email can appear in flawless English; a Japanese article can be read in French in seconds. Yet, these translations, however precise, may sound sterile. The tone, the rhythm and the subtle warmth that define human speech are easily lost. Translation can transfer meaning but not experience. Understanding a language requires more than decoding its words. It demands entering its world. In the lived moments

That is why learning a language has always been different from learning a formula. It is not an abstract skill but a human interaction. It happens in conversation, in laughter, in mistakes. It happens when someone struggles to express a thought and is gently corrected, or when a joke finally lands after weeks of practice. These small, lived moments build confidence and connection, something that no app or chatbot can replicate. Al tools can certainly assist. They can correct pronunciation, explain grammar and offer personalised practice. For teachers, they make lesson planning and feedback faster and more efficient. But they cannot replace the very heart of language learning, the emotional effort of trying to be understood by another person. Fluency is not achieved by perfection alone, but by empathy. To speak a language well, one must also learn how others think and feel. Moreover, languages constantly evolve. Slang, idioms and even tones of politeness change from year to year. A machine can record these shifts, but it cannot belong to a community. It can predict usage, but it cannot participate in the living rhythm of speech. True mastery requires being part of that rhythm - listening, adapting, responding. The biggest risk Perhaps the greatest risk is not that AI will replace language learning, but that it will make people believe they no longer need to learn. If machines can translate instantly, the temptation to skip the effort grows. Yet, in doing so, we would lose something vital: the humility and the patience that come from learning another's tongue. When we learn a language, we do not just acquire words. We learn another way of seeing the world. Al will continue to build our bridges, design our cities, and analyse our data. But when it comes to building bridges etween people, it will remain an assistant, not a substitute. The process of learning a language — slow, emotional, and deeply human — will outlast every technological revolution. Technology can help us talk across borders, but only effort and empathy can help us truly understand one another. And that is something no machine, however intelligent, will ever be able to automate

Study reveals heat-linked kidney strain among Tamil Nadu's agricultural workers

A new population-based study published in The Lancet has found that Tamil Nadu's agricultural workers face a growing risk of kidney disease linked to heat exposure, dehydration and long outdoor work hours. Conducted between August and December 2023, the Chronic Kidney Disease of unknown etiology (or uncertain cause) CKDu - AGRI study surveyed agricultural workers across all five agroclimatic zones of the State -- the North-East, North-West, Western, Cauvery Delta, and Southern regions. Using a stratified multi-stage cluster sampling method, researchers studied 3,350 farm workers from 125 villages, collecting data on occupation, health and environmental exposures.

The researchers observed a striking seasonal variation in kidney function. During August -- one of Tamil Nadu's hottest months -- 17.4% of participants had an estimated glomerular filtration rate (eGFR) below 60 mL/min/1.73 m². When tested again in December, kidney function had returned to normal in most. "These were asymptomatic, subclinical episodes of acute kidney injury," says R. Sakthirajan, co-author of the study, senior assistant professor, Institute of Nephrology, Madras Medical College. "Because all assays were done in a single reference laboratory, the variation almost certainly reflects physiological stress rather than measurement error."The team point out that these transient injuries are linked to repetitive heat and dehydration stress during fieldwork -- a pattern also documented in Central America and Sri Lanka. "We plan to follow participants across different seasons to track kidney markers, hydration, and individual heat exposure," adds Sudharshini Subramaniam, co-author of the study, associate professor, Institute of Community Medicine. "This will help confirm whether repeated seasonal stress leads to chronic kidney disease over time."The study found an overall CKD prevalence of 5.31%, with nearly half of these cases classified as Chronic Kidney Disease of Unknown aetiology (CKDu) -- that is, not linked to diabetes, hypertension or heart disease. The burden was significantly higher in the North-East (7.68%) and Southern (6.4%) zones compared to the North-West (2.16%). The Universal Thermal Climate Index (UTCI) used to model heat exposure showed levels above 38°C for more than four hours per day - an indicator of "very strong heat stress" across the North-East and South in August. Workers with CKD spent an average of 36.18 hours a week outdoors, compared to 33.42 hours among those with normal kidney function. For those with CKDu, the average was even higher, at 38.07 hours.

Risk factors included older age (above 53.5 years), male sex, hypertension, anaemia, history of renal stones, smokeless tobacco use, and long hours of outdoor work. Interestingly, factors such as potable water source, snake bite, COVID infection and alcohol intake showed no association with CKD prevalence. The prevalence was 7.9%



among those without formal education, compared to 2.5% among graduates. The prevalence of diabetes (13.4%) and hypertension (30.6%) was similar to national averages, yet two-thirds of people living with hypertension and 40% of people living with diabetes were newly diagnosed during the study, underscoring low awareness. The researchers note that the Tamil Nadu findings mirror global CKDu "hotspots" -- first reported among sugarcane and corn workers in El Salvador and later in Nicaragua, Mexico and Panama where heat and dehydration are suspected to play a key role. Preventive measures "Simple preventive measures can help," says Gopalakrishnan Natarajan, co-author of the study, member secretary of TRANSTAN and former Director, Institute of Nephrology. "Following the Water-Rest-Shade protocol around 750 mL of cool water every hour and 10-15 minutes of rest each hour can protect workers from heat strain."The researchers also recommend flexible work hours to avoid peak heat, and the inclusion of renal function monitoring in routine occupational health checks. At a policy level, they point to the absence of heat-specific labour standards in India. "There is an urgent need to integrate heat-stress thresholds and kidney health monitoring into workplace safety frameworks," the team notes. Need of early detection Only 1.6% of participants reported symptoms such as swelling, and nocturia -- waking at night to urinate was the only common complaint, seen in 12.9%. "The silent profile of CKD means symptom-based diagnosis misses most cases," says Dr. Subramaniam. The authors recommend annual serum creatinine and urine albumin-creatinine testing for agricultural workers through existing primary health programmes. Village health nurses and multipurpose health workers could be trained to identify high-risk groups -- men above 50, those with anaemia. tobacco users and those exposed to prolonged heat. Expanding access to education and implementing tobacco-cessation measures, they suggest, may also help reduce risk. As Tamil Nadu faces hotter summers, the study urge that kidney health must become part of India's climate and labour policy.

Five more arrests made, says Paris prosecutor

Five more people have been arrested in the investigation into the theft of crown jewels from the Louvre Museum, but the treasures remain missing, the Paris prosecutor announced Thursday (October 30, 2025). The five were detained on late Wednesday night (October 29, 2025) in separate police operations in Paris and surrounding areas, including the Seine-Saint-Denis region, prosecutor Laure Beccuau told RTL radio. She did not release their identities or other details. One is suspected of being part of the fourperson team that robbed the Louvre's Apollo Gallery in broad daylight on October 19, the prosecutor said. Two other members of the team were arrested on Sunday (October 26, 2025) and given preliminary charges on Wednesday (October 29, 2025) of criminal conspiracy and theft committed by an organised gang. Both partially admitted their involvement, according to the prosecutor. "Searches last night and overnight did not allow us to find the goods," Ms. Beccuau said. It took thieves less than eight minutes to steal the jewels valued at 88 million euros (\$102 million), shocking the world. The robbers forced open a window, cut into cases with power tools, and fled with eight pieces of the

French crown jewels. One of those who has been charged is a 34-year-old Algerian national who has been living in France since 2010, Ms. Beccuau said. He was arrested at Charles de Gaulle Airport as he was about to fly to Algeria with no return ticket. He was living in a suburb north of Paris, Aubervilliers, and was known to police mostly for road traffic offenses. His DNA was found on one of the scooters used by robbers to leave the scene, she said. The other suspect, 39, was arrested at his home in Aubervilliers. The man was known to police for several thefts, and his DNA was found on one of the glass cases where the jewels were displayed and on items the thieves left behind, she added. Video surveillance cameras showed there were at least four criminals involved, Ms. Beccuau said. The four suspected robbers arrived onboard a truck equipped with a freight lift that two of them used to climb up to the museum's window. The four of them left onboard two motor scooters along the Seine River toward eastern Paris, where they had some other vehicles parked, she detailed.Ms. Beccuau said nothing suggests that the robbers had any accomplices within the museum's staff.

Prince Andrew stripped of all titles after Virginia Giuffre's memoir



Toowoomba: Prince Andrew will be stripped of his royal titles, including prince, and will move out of his home, Royal Lodge, to a private residence. Buckingham Palace issued a statement today that King Charles has initiated a formal process to remove the "style, titles and honours of Prince Andrew", who "will now be known as Andrew Mountbatten Windsor". The decision comes in the wake of Virginia Giuffre's posthumous memoir Nobody's Girl, published this fortnight. The memoir includes an inside account of the two years Giuffre spent as a "sex slave" working for Jeffrey Epstein and co-conspirator Ghislaine Maxwell. Giuffre died by suicide in April this year, aged 41, on her farm in Western Australia.

Three weeks before she died, she emailed her co-author, journalist Amy Wallace, and longtime publicist Dini von Mueffling: "In the event of my passing, I would like to ensure that Nobody's Girl is still released." "Today." Giuffre's family said, "she declares a victory. She has brought down a British prince with her truth and extraordinary courage". British historian and author Andrew Lownie (author of a book about Andrew and his ex-wife Sarah Ferguson, called Entitled), told Sky News earlier this month, "the only way the story will go away is if [Andrew] leaves Royal Lodge, goes into exile abroad with his ex-wife, and is basically stripped of all his honours, including Prince Andrew". Sarah Ferguson will also move out of Royal Lodge. As a trauma memoir, Nobody's Girl forces us to bear witness to an uncomfortable truth: Giuffre's abuse was hidden in plain sight. "Don't be fooled by those in Epstein's circle who say they didn't know what Epstein was doing," she writes. "Anyone who spent any significant amount of time with Epstein saw him touching girls." She continues: "They can say they didn't know he was raping children. But they were not blind." Four days before the memoir was published, Prince Andrew announced he would no longer use the titles conferred upon him, including Duke of York. Three days later, leaked emails from 2011 suggested he gave Giuffre's date of birth and social security number to one of his protection officers, hours before the infamous photograph of him with her was published. Maxwell's brother, Ian Maxwell, published an article in the Spectator today, headlined "Don't take Virginia Giuffre's memoir at face value". The memoir keeps his sister, who was convicted of charges including sex trafficking of a minor, in world headlines - at a time Donald Trump has said he will "take a look" at pardoning her. Earlier this year, Maxwell was moved to a lower security prison to continue her 20-year sentence. Allegations of parental abuseGiuffre writes that her father began molesting her at the age of seven. He "strenuously" denies this. While the memoir makes this public for the first time, Giuffre's older brother Danny Wilson told ABC's 7.30 he first heard the allegations years before the memoir was published - and confronted his father about it.

Giuffre regularly wet her pants at school - earning her the cruel nickname "Pee Girl". She recalls: "I began to get painful urinary tract infections. My infections were so severe, I couldn't hold my urine." After one (of several) medical examinations, a doctor told her mother her primary school-aged daughter's hymen was broken. Giuffre writes of this moment: My mother didn't hesitate. 'Oh, she rides horses bareback,' she explained. That was the end of that. I didn't even know what a hymen was.Later, she recalls her mother raising suspicions about her involvement with Epstein and "apex predator" Maxwell, questioning "what this older couple wanted with a teenage girl who had no credentials". Giuffre writes: "I guess I was glad she cared enough to have suspicions, but at the same time, wasn't it a little late for that? I knew she couldn't save me; she'd never saved me before." Around the time of her doctor's visit, the memoir alleges, Giuffre's father began "trading" his daughter to a friend - a tall, muscular man with "a military bearing" who was also abusing his own stepdaughter. In 2000, the man was convicted of molesting another girl in North Carolina. He spent 14 months in prison and a decade as a registered sex offender. Giuffre writes that she was abused by these men for five years, from ages seven to eleven; it only stopped when she began menstruating. Heartbreakingly, Giuffre discloses that at one point she imagined Maxwell (or "G-Max" as she wanted to be known) as her mother: "While I was hardly equipped to judge, it often seemed to me that Epstein and Maxwell behaved like actual parents." Among other things, the pair gave Giuffre her first cell phone, whitened her teeth, and taught her how to hold a knife and fork "just so". 'The younger, the better'Giuffre's memoir is a courageous and clear-eyed account of what trauma takes - and what recovery demands. Told in four chronological parts - "Daughter", "Prisoner", "Survivor" and "Warrior" – the memoir meticulously records the "sexual assaulting, battering, exploiting, and abusing" Giuffre endured throughout her life, most notably at the hands of Epstein and Maxwell. The result is a devastating expose of the fetishisation and abuse of girls -"the younger, the better", Epstein said - and society's failure to protect the most vulnerable. It is also a damning indictment of everyone who knew and looked away. Please don't stop reading'Giuffre was 16 and working as a lockerroom attendant at Trump's Mar-a-Lago resort when Ghislaine Maxwell recruited her to "service Epstein", under the pretence of training as a masseuse.(In October 2007, Trump - who is portrayed favourably in the memoir - reportedly banned Epstein from his resort after Epstein hit on the teenage daughter of another member.) Over the next two years, and roughly 350 pages, Giuffre tells how she was trafficked to "a multitude of powerful men", including Prince Andrew, French modelling agent Jean-Luc Brunel, a prominent psychology professor and a respected United States senator. In one of the most distressing scenes, Giuffre describes how she was trafficked to "a former minister", who raped her so "savagely" she was left "bleeding from [her] mouth, vagina, and anus". When Virginia told Epstein about the brutal attack, which made it hurt to breathe and swallow, he said, "You'll get that sometimes." Eight weeks later, he returned Giuffre to the politician, who this time abused her on one of Epstein's private jets. In the US version of the memoir, the politician is described not as a "former minister" but as "a former Prime Minister". "I know this is a lot to take in." Giuffre writes. "The violence. The neglect. The bad decisions. The self-harm. But please don't stop reading." One of the most devastating revelations

comes toward the end of the memoir. Giuffre - now in her

forties – receives a phone call from a confidant claiming to have evidence that Epstein paid off her father when she was a girl. In 2000, when Epstein and Maxwell started abusing the teenager at El Brillo Way, it is alleged that her father accepted "a sum of money" from the paedophile. According to Giuffre, when she confronted her father, there was "a brief silence" before "he started yelling at [her] for being an ungrateful daughter". Of all the betrayals she endured, this one stands alone: "I will never get over it". Girls, no one cared about

"When a molester shows his face," Giuffre writes "many people tend to look the other way." In chapter 11. Giuffre describes how Epstein's personal chef, the celebrity cook Adam Perry Lang, made her her favourite food pizza. This, apparently, became something of a tradition -Lang feeding Giuffre, but never "ogling", "even if I was standing naked in front of him, which was not unusual". She wrote: "When I'd finished attending to Epstein or one of the other guests, Lang would have a cheesy hot pie waiting." In 2019, Lang issued a statement about working for Epstein: "My role was limited to meal preparation. I was unaware of the depraved behaviour and have great sympathy and admiration for the brave women who have come forward." In another scene. Giuffre reveals that Epstein "never wore a condom". After falling pregnant at the age of 17, she suffered an ectopic pregnancy. On this day, Giuffre recalls how Epstein and Maxwell ("two halves of a wicked whole") with the help of Epstein's New York butler - drove her to the hospital after she woke in "a pool of blood". Epstein lied to the doctor about her age, Giuffre alleges, and the two men seemed to enter "a gentlemen's agreement" in which "whatever was going on between this middle-aged man and his teenage acquaintance [...] would be kept quiet". "We were girls who no one cared about, and Epstein pretended to care," Giuffre writes. "At times I think he even believed he cared." She describes how Epstein "threw what looked like a lifeline to girls who were drowning, girls who had nothing, girls who wished to be and do better." As a self-described "pleaser" who "survived by acquiescing", Giuffre writes that Epstein and Maxwell "knew just how to tap into that same crooked vein" her childhood abusers had: abuse cloaked in "a fake mantle of 'love. '

In March 2001, at Maxwell's upscale townhouse in London's Belgravia - where Prince Andrew was famously pictured with his arm around the teenager - Giuffre recalls how Maxwell invited Andrew to guess her age. When the prince correctly guessed 17, he reportedly told her, "My daughters are just a little younger than you." Later that night, she writes, Prince Andrew bought the teenager cocktails at Tramp – an exclusive London nightclub – where she and the prince danced awkwardly and the prince "sweated profusely". In the car, on the way home, Maxwell instructed Giuffre "to do for [Andy] what you do for Jeffrey". In November 2019, in his calamitous interview with BBC's Newsnight, Prince Andrew denied any wrongdoing, claiming he had "no recollection of ever meeting this lady". He told presenter Emily Maitlis he could not have danced sweatily at Tramp because he had "a peculiar medical condition" that prevented perspiration, caused by what he described as "an overdose of adrenaline" in the Falklands War.

In that interview, Andrew admitted his decision to stay at Epstein's New York home in December 2010 - months after Epstein was released from jail for soliciting and procuring minors for prostitution - was "the wrong thing to do". However, the prince claimed his decision was "probably coloured by [his] tendency to be too honourable". In her memoir, Giuffre describes Andrew as "friendly enough but entitled" - "as if he believed having sex with [her] was his birthright." She alleges she had sex with the prince on two more occasions. Publishing a book posthumously can be an ethical minefield. Critics often question whether posthumous publication is what the author would have wanted. They point to the author's right to protect their work and their literary reputation - a right that cannot survive them. However, Giuffre left no space for speculation. In the email she sent her co-author and publicist before her death, she made her wishes clear: It is my heartfelt wish that this work be published, regardless of my circumstances at the time. The content of this book is crucial, as it aims to shed light on the systemic failures that allow the trafficking of vulnerable individuals. As the memoir progresses, Giuffre's health spirals. The physical, emotional and mental toll of trauma closes in on her. Epstein is dead. Maxwell is in prison. But Giuffre is still "trapped in an invisible cage". "From the start," she says, "I was groomed to be complicit in my own devastation. Of all the terrible wounds they inflicted, that forced complicity was the most destructive." Before she died. Giuffre made a promise to her husband and children that she would try with "all her might" to believe her life mattered. Her final goal was to prevent "the emotional timebomb" inside her from detonating. While Giuffre may at last be beyond harm, the truth remains. She - like the hundreds of girls abused by Epstein and his associates - was wronged. Her fight, like theirs, transcends death: release the Epstein files; hold abusers and their enablers accountable; expose the systems that protect predators; abolish statutes of limitations for the sexual abuse of minors. Ensure no other child suffers. This is what Giuffre wanted. By publishing her memoir, she ensured the fight would survive her. She made certain her voice would outlast her pain. In this way, she got the last word.

"Under this partnership, L&T will participate in the upcoming 87 MALE RPAS programme of the Ministry of Defence, where L&T will be the prime bidder and GA-ASI the technology partner," the infrastructure major said in a filing to the BSE. The collaboration will enable the production of GA-ASI's MQ-series RPAS that are combat proven. These are widely operational across the globe with millions of flight hours in surveillance and strike missions, it said. The partnership marks a milestone in India's pursuit of a self-reliant defence ecosystem, strengthening Indo-US defence collaboration and fostering a competitive, globally integrated aerospace manufacturing base.

Self-reliance in mind, Cabinet nod for Rs 7,280-crore rare earth magnets plan

Self-reliance in mind, Cabinet nod for Rs 7,280-cr rare earth magnets planRare earth magnets, especially neodymium-iron-boron (NdFeB) magnets, are crucial for EV manufacturing, particularly in electric motors. The Union Cabinet Wednesday approved a Rs 7,280-crore rare earth manufacturing programme, as India looks to cut reliance on imports for the critical elements crucial to sectors ranging from electric vehicles and aerospace to defence and electronics

The government said that the 'Scheme to Promote Manufacturing of Sintered Rare Earth Permanent Magnets' is a first-of-its-kind initiative, and aims to establish 6,000 metric tonnes per annum (MTPA) of integrated rare earth permanent magnet (REPM) manufacturing in India, to enhance the country's self-reliance and positioning it as a key player in the global REPM market.India's consumption of rare earth permanent magnets is expected to double by 2030, but it currently meets its demand primarily through imports, the government said. Currently, China has a stranglehold over these critical elements, and it had introduced export controls on the magnets in April, in response to the tariffs imposed on it by the US.

The Indian Express had earlier reported that Beijing stonewalled applications made by companies that supply

components to India's automobile manufacturers for a long time, but had started to clear some applications, following a cumbersome bureaucratic procedure. India imported over 53,000 metric tonnes of rare earth magnets during the fiscal year ending March 2025.

In a press release, the government said the scheme will support the creation of integrated REPM manufacturing facilities, involving conversion of rare earth oxides to metals, metals to alloys, and alloys to finished REPMs. The total duration of the scheme will be 7 years from the date of award, including a two-year gestation period. It consists of a sales-linked incentives of Rs 6,450 crore on REPM sales for five years and capital subsidy of Rs 750 crore for setting up an aggregate of 6,000 MTPA of REPM manufacturing facilities. The scheme envisions allocating the total capacity to five beneficiaries through a competitive bidding process. Each beneficiary will be allotted up to 1,200 MTPA of capacity. New restrictions on rare earth magnet and related materials from China that kicked in from April 4 have impacted automakers across the world, including vehicle manufacturers in India. EV makers here are particularly affected, and have been staring at a potential shortage of critical components, which raises concerns of price hikes and production delays in a nascent, cost-sensitive segment of the auto market. The Indian car industry had initiated a conversation with the government to smoothen the process for procuring rare earth magnets from Beijing. While the Chinese government had not imposed an outright ban on the export of rare earth magnets the process had been made very difficult - including requiring end-user licence and endorsements from the importing country - which could take up a long time and posed shortage risks in the meantime. Rare earth magnets, especially neodymium-ironboron (NdFeB) magnets, are crucial for EV manufacturing, particularly in electric motors. They provide the strong magnetic fields needed for efficient and powerful electric motors, including traction motors that drive EVs. These magnets also play a major role in other EV components like power steering systems, wiper motors, and braking sys-

BoP data is currently released for every quarter, with the current account balance (CAB) being the most keenly-watched figure.BoP data is currently released for every quarter, with the current account balance (CAB) being the most keenly-watched figure.The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) is looking to release the balance of payments (BoP) data, a key metric of the country's external sector position, on a monthly basis, its Deputy Governor Poonam Gupta said on Wednesday.To facilitate the timely and more frequent availability of the country's BoP statistics, the RBI has already brought down the time lag in the release of the quarterly BoP statistics from 90 days to around 60 days, starting Q1FY26.

"Going ahead, we will endeavour to prepare and release the monthly BoP statistics (albeit at a slightly more aggregate-level and at a lag of approximately 40 days)," Gupta said while addressing the first pre-release consultative workshop on the base revision of the Consumer Price Index (CPI), Gross Domestic Product (GDP), and the Index of Industrial Production (IIP), organised by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI).BoP data is currently released for every quarter, with the current account balance (CAB) being the most keenly-watched figure. The CAB denotes the net of payments made and re ceived by Indians for the trade of goods and services with the rest of the world and the flow of remittances, and other similar payments, in and out of the country. As per latest data, India's current account deficit widened to \$2.35 billion in April-June 2025 from a surplus of \$13.48 billion in the

Errors in forecasting 'common' Speaking on the RBI's inflation and growth predictions, Gupta said any forecasting exercise, by its very nature, has the risk of incurring errors and that such errors are a common feature around the world. Errors are generally larger when there are unpredictable shocks or events and when one is predicting far ahead into the future, she added. In India, Gupta said, inflation forecasting is challenging given the high and outdated weight of food in the CPI basket and the volatile nature of food prices. She added that the RBI is committed to using



the state-of-the-art models and approaches to improve its forecast accuracy continuously. "Besides minimising the forecast errors, what is equally important is to ensure that there is no systematic bias in the forecasts. As far as the inflation forecasts used in the MPC (Monetary Policy Committee) resolution are concerned, they are unbiased," she said. Gupta, as the deputy governor in charge of monetary policy, is a member of the RBI's monetary policy committee.

Over the years, the RBI's inflation forecasts have come under fire. Most recently, the central bank has had to make repeated downward projections to its CPI inflation projections as incoming data continuously came in lower than what it expected. In February, the RBI had forecast average CPI inflation for FY26 at 4.2 per cent. This was lowered to 4 per cent in April, 3.7 per cent in June, 3.1 per cent in August, and 2.6 per cent in October. With CPI inflation falling to a record low of 0.25 per cent in October, economists think CPI inflation could average below 2 per cent in FY26, making it likely that the RBI will lower its forecast again in early December. Speaking on the base year revision exercise of GDP, IIP, and CPI, which is currently underway, Gupta said the review is not merely a technical exercise, but of foundational importance for the wider community. The proposed new base year for the GDP and IIP is 2022-23, and for CPI the proposed base year is 2024.

Nvidia says it's 'a generation ahead' amid early signs of AI chip rivalry with Google. How this could unfold

Nvidia on Tuesday (November 25) said its chip technology is "a generation ahead" of the industry, responding to industry concerns that its dominance over AI infrastructure may be threatened by Google's foray into Al chips."We're delighted by Google's success — they've made great advances in AI and we continue to supply to Google," Nvidia said in a post on X. "NVIDIA is a generation ahead of the industry — it's the only platform that runs every Al model and does it everywhere computing is done."The post came after Nvidia saw its shares fall 3 per cent in Tuesday's trade after a report in San Franciscobased tech portal The Information that said Meta, a big Nvidia customer, could strike a deal with Google to use its tensor processing units for Meta's new data centres. Two developments have raised concern for market observers:First, whether the reported Meta deal, long a theoretical possibility but now closer to reality, may be a sign that Google is shaking off Nvidia's dominance and could finally pull ahead. Nvidia secured a \$5 trillion valuation in late October, while Google and its parent Alphabet are set to breach the \$4 trillion mark this month. Second, after propelling the techstock market rally to new highs in the US, whether the recent slide in Nvidia stock could reverse the gains made, even as investors conduct a reality check of the meteoric surge in the company's valuation in recent months.

Nvidia's upsurge has been serendipitous, given the chips giant's rise from a niche graphics-chip designer to an AI titan happened because its gaming-focused chips just turned out to be better at crunching data in the early stages of LLM (large language model) training. The euphoria about the potential of artificial intelligence has thus far driven up the demand for Nvidia's chips, and propelled its stock to record highs. Its GPU chips, such as the Hopper or the new Blackwell chips, are more flexible and powerful than Google's TPU. The TPU is an entirely different chip cat-

egory called ASIC (application-specific integrated circuit) designed for a single specialised function.

"NVIDIA offers greater performance, versatility, and fungibility than ASICs," Nvidia said in its post. At this moment, Nvidia has more than 90 per cent of the market for artificial intelligence chips with its graphics processors, AI analysts say, but Google's in-house chips have become a viable alternative to the Blackwell chips, which are expensive to run but very powerful and capable of parallel tasking. Unlike Nvidia, Google has so far not sold its TPU chips to other companies, but used them in-house, while allowing some of its clients to rent them through the Google Cloud platform. The first big signs of a shakeup came earlier this month, when Google released Gemini 3, an upgraded AI model trained on the company's own TPUs, not Nvidia GPUs. The Meta deal report added further fuel to market rumours.

On whether Google could finally pull ahead, a security specialist working for one of the 'magnificent seven' American tech companies told The Indian Express, "It might be too early for a direct comparison between (Google's) TPU and Nvidia (GPUs): cost vs performance, etc. Though more suppliers of accelerated compute are welcome. Nvidia has a 70 per cent margin: that was never going to last."The expert also flagged the challenge posed by TSMC, the Taiwan-based foundry specialist that runs the world's most integrated fabs, which can manufacture the most advanced chips. "So it may be more a matter not of design, but where you are in the queue and whether you can get enough chips made. Google will also have to get into the same gueue to get it made... Another significant point to consider is that TSMC is being cautious. They are not building fabs like crazy. They know if the bust happens, they'll be left with no orders and lots of idle capacity.

'You got this, kid': Sushmita Sen reveals the self-talk that keeps her grounded as she turns 50; how balanced inner dialogue supports emotional resilience



Before she celebrated her milestone birthday, actor Sushmita Sen reflected on how her relationship with herself has evolved over the years. Speaking about turning 50 this November, in conversation with Dr Sheen Gurrib, she shared, "You would have met no one who talks to herself like I do. You have a good moment, you bring yourself to the side and say, 'Don't get carried away. It's transient, don't get carried away."

She added that her self-talk doesn't just show up in moments of joy. It anchors her during setbacks, too. "You have a bad moment, you pull yourself back in and say, you got this kid, you've seen so much in life, this is nothing. Get back up, you can do this."According to her, this inner dialogue became a learned skill, something she discovered during the Miss Universe contest, a transformative period of her life. "That ability I learned in those 31 days, because I realised I wanted Rakesh Sharma. I wanted to be the first Indian (to win), and here God had put me in a position where I could be the first Indian." She mentioned how just moments before the winner was supposed to be announced, she knew that she was going to win.

So how does this kind of balanced self-talk help regu-

late emotions, especially for people navigating major life transitions?

Sonal Khangarot, licensed rehabilitation counsellor and psychotherapist, The Answer Room, tells indianexpress.com, "Balanced self-talk, like Sushmita Sen's reminder to stay grounded in good moments and hopeful in difficult ones, is a core emotional-regulation skill. It helps people pause, assess situations realistically, and avoid being swept away by extremes. For those entering major life transitions, such as turning 40 or 50, this becomes especially important." She continues, "At 40, many experience midlife reevaluation, comparing where they are with where they thought they should be. Self-talk like 'I can redefine success at my pace' reduces anxiety and perfectionism. At 50, people may face empty-nest changes, health shifts, or identity renegotiation. Positive self-talk doesn't deny reality; it provides balance."

Compassionate self-talk vs. motivational self-talkCompassionate self-talk like 'You got this, kid' works better than harsh criticism because the brain responds to supportive language with calmer nervous-system activity, better problem-solving, and higher motivation. Khangarot states, "Psychologically, speaking kindly mirrors the tone we use with loved ones, activating safety rather than threat. It also soothes the inner child, reducing old fears of failure or rejection. Harsh self-talk triggers the body's stress response, narrowing thinking and increasing anxiety. Training a kinder inner voice begins with noticing critical thoughts and intentionally replacing them with gentle, encouraging statements."

How can ordinary people cultivate resilient self-talk in their daily lives?

Resilient self-talk doesn't require a crisis; it can be built through small, consistent practices. As a psychologist, I often encourage people to start by observing their daily inner dialogue and gently correcting harsh thoughts. "Using evidence-based tools like cognitive restructuring, journaling, and grounding statements helps train the brain to respond with balance rather than panic. Repeating supportive phrases during routine stress—traffic, workload, family tensions — creates neural pathways similar to what Sen developed in those 31 intense days. Over time, the mind learns to choose calm, realistic, encouraging language, strengthening resilience long before a major life event occurs," concludes Khangarot

'Women need more sleep than men': Soha Ali Khan on communicating her sleep needs to her husband and daughter; how couples can balance different sleep rhythms

Sleep schedules are often among the first things to get disrupted in a busy household, especially for women who juggle multiple roles. In a recent conversation, Soha Ali Khan shared how she approached this at home by clearly communicating her needs. "I told my husband, women need more sleep than men, so let me sleep for that extra hour. Now he does," she said during an interaction with Tweak India, explaining how this small change has made a noticeable difference in her day-to-day functioning.

She also described how their daughter, Inaaya, has adapted to her sleep rhythm. "And Inaaya also knows because she goes to bed at least two hours before I go to bed. So she gets her full sleep, and I sometimes need that extra half an hour," she added. Over time, their routine has found a natural balance. "So now she comes and she knocks on the door and she says, 'Are you awake?' And of course, then she's woken me up. But now, often she very sweetly doesn't wake me up, and she will find a way to occupy herself until I wake up and go to her. And I think that a little extra half an hour, one hour is very precious."But why does this guilt arise about prioritising rest, and how can couples create an equitable approach to sleep needs at home?

Psychologist Rasshi Gurnani tells indianexpress.com, "Guilt around rest usually comes from how women are socialised to be caregivers first and individuals later. Many grow up believing that their value lies in how much they do for others. When a woman rests, it can feel like she's stepping away from this responsibility, even though sleep is a biological need, not a luxury."She adds that couples can handle this better when they treat sleep like nutrition or medicine, something every person needs in different amounts. Sharing responsibilities at home, adjusting routines together, and accepting that both partners don't have to follow the same schedule help create fairness rather than comparison. According to Gurnani, talking about sleep works best when it's framed as a need rather than a complaint.



Instead of saying 'You're disrupting my sleep,' it helps to say 'I function better when I sleep earlier or longer, and it will make our days smoother.' Being specific about what helps—like dimming the lights earlier or waking up separately—reduces frustration. "Mutual respect is key; both partners' sleep needs should matter equally. Starting small, experimenting with routines, and reviewing what works avoids resentment and turns communication into teamwork," notes the expert.

"Children learn boundaries when they are taught that caring for oneself is part of caring for the family," explains Gurnani, adding that when a parent says they need rest and follows through calmly and consistently, the child understands that personal time is normal, not rejection. "Parents can give children predictable cues like quiet play options during rest time or a comforting routine before the parent sleeps. Regular one-on-one time outside those hours reassures them that the connection isn't going away, it's just shared more thoughtfully. This teaches them that respecting others' needs doesn't reduce love; it strengthens it," concludes Gurnani.

Everything you need to know about FOFO (and why it could be dangerous)

People avoid tests because they worry the results may change their life, cause stress, or lead to expensive treatments or a serious diagnosis.fearln medicine, FOFO is found in people who do not go to the doctor because they are afraid of a diagnosis.Anxiety is tricky. It makes you imagine the worst-case scenarios and is often jarring enough to stop you from functioning and taking necessary steps. One such distant relative of anxiety, gaining popularity on the internet, is FOFO – the fear of finding out. It is exactly what it sounds like, specifically in terms of health and medicine.

"FOFO is a feeling where a person avoids medical tests or check-ups because they are scared of discovering something bad about their health, and this fear makes them delay important care," explains Dr Divya Shree K R, Consultant – Psychiatry, Aster CMI Hospital, Bangalore. The psychiatrist points out that people avoid these tests because they worry the results may "change their life, cause stress, or lead to expensive treatments", and they may also fear hearing a serious diagnosis. "Some people feel ashamed about their lifestyle, ignore early symptoms, or hope the problem will go away on its own, and this makes them avoid doctors even more," he tells indianexpress.com. Past bad medical experiences or low health awareness can act as triggers.

short article insert The biggest giveaway is when a person keeps delaying check-ups even when appointments are easy to access, and they often give vague reasons like "I'll go later" without a real barrier. "They may feel anxious or stressed when someone suggests medical tests, and they may avoid talking about symptoms or change the topic quickly," notes Dr Shree. Some people obsessively Google

their symptoms, fear the worst-case scenarios before testing, and yet avoid seeing a doctor. "Their behaviour often includes procrastination, overthinking, and emotional discomfort related to hospitals, and these patterns suggest fear and not inconvenience is stopping them from getting care". Showing show denial, pretending everything is fine, or downplaying are clear warning signs. Delay in diagnosis may lead to the progression of the disease to advanced levels, making the treatment much harder and even less effective in some cases. "Serious conditions like cancer, diabetes, heart disease, or infections need early diagnosis to prevent damage, and when people avoid tests due to fear, the illness keeps growing silently," Dr Shree warns. He further adds that late detection often leads to more complications, stronger medications, longer treatment, higher medical costs, and a lower chance of full recovery, and this puts both physical and emotional stress on the person. Mentally, it increases worry and guilt about delays, leading to a dip in the likelihood of living a healthy, long, and stable life.

How to overcome FOFO?

Dr Shree suggests overcoming FOFO by taking small steps, such as booking simple tests first, breaking tasks into smaller actions, and asking a trusted person to go along for support, which helps reduce fear. "Counselling approaches such as cognitive-behavioural therapy help patients challenge scary thoughts and replace them with realistic ones, and motivational interviewing encourages them to focus on the benefits of early care," Dr Shree notes. For doctors, he advises gentle communication, clear test explanations, and a safe space for questions, which reduce anxiety.

A team in transition need good wickets to gain confidence: WV Raman

The team is at the crossroads now. Obviously, the coach feels it's in a transition phase. But again, once he's recognized that, what should have also been thought about is the kind of tracks that they play on. And the kind of guys picked for Test cricket. The reason I say this is because if you are in a transition phase, you obviously want to bring in youngsters, give them confidence, especially the batters. That can happen only when you put out good tracks. One of the main reasons India had almost a Fab 5 or Fab 6 at the start of the millennium is because they played a lot of cricket on good pitches. And because everybody did well on the good tracks, they gained the confidence to do well abroad as well. And the other thing is that, if the bowlers are also given tracks where there's not much real help in terms of lateral movement of the surface, then they develop the skills to become better. Like Harbhajan Singh got 32 wickets on good tracks against Australia.

Similarly, Anil Kumble also picked up wickets on good tracks. They'll get a lot more craft here and they'll also develop the ability to bowl good spells, concentrate on good spells.short article insert But then of course, the rush for the points in the World Test Championship setup is also there, I agree. But then sometimes, you've got to try and see how you can get the balance going (of the wicket being prepared). So, this is the stage where maybe that could have been tried, especially after there was a bit of setback in the last series at home (New Zealand series). But again, as a coach myself, I know sometimes the decisions that you take do not always produce the results you think they'll produce. But that's the beast — the nature of the job.To a large extent, what is happening is that you don't really play regularly on tracks which help the spinners in domestic

cricket. As much as it's easy to criticize, it's also got to be understood that playing on turners is not an easy job. But it is also equally difficult for the bowlers to bowl well on a turner. It's an art — to bowl well and consistently pick up wickets. To sum it up, what is perhaps not really working well is these guys are not exposed to turners. And they also perhaps are not really aware of how to organize themselves on a turner.

Sweep can be a very useful weapon against the spinners. But again, on a turning track where the ball is also bouncing, you've got to be really good in playing that sweep shot. But what is important here is that you need to also have a lot of faith in your defense. If there is a little bit of insecurity as far as a player's defense is concerned, he will look to try to hit his way out of trouble. These clichés and these statements of playing fearless cricket, all that is fine, but you also need to play the right kind of shots. And you also need to be able to keep the good ones out. It is only then you are going to get the bad ones to score off. Yes, I agree, generally, selection is subjective, it's not objective. But the difference between a judgemental call and an assessment is that a judgemental call is final. Which means, you're not going to wait and see how a player goes on about his cricket or how he's improving and what it is that he can do on the kind of surfaces that you're going to play on. So, that is something that perhaps does not really sync with the need of the hour. Playing just three specialist batters, I saw a couple of sandwiches shot for the picnic. Because generally, on a track where it's absolutely loaded in favour of bowlers, you would not require more than four or five bowling options. And I think there were a plethora of options available. And again, one of them wasn't even used.It's a tough proposition to adapt to different formats. That is something that we'll have to concede. But at the same time, you get reports which say that the chairman and the coach and the support staff have been chalking out a route map for over a year. So, they must have really identified who will obviously fit for each format. If that doesn't happen, then obviously, these kinds of decisions are based more on judgment rather than assessment. There has been a consistency in that a lot of multi-dimensional cricketers have been preferred for Test cricket as well. And at times what happens is, if you have too many options, it can also lead to confusion. Because when you have too many multidimensional cricketers in a XI, you really don't know who to slot where. Theoretically, it's fine. You can always say they are capable of performing any role, but that is something which again can work on a given day, which may not work

UP Warriorz acquires Deepti Sharma for Rs 3.2 crore, Laura Wolvaardt sold to Delhi Capitals in marquee set

Deepti Sharma headlined the marquee set, returning to her original franchise after the UP Warriorz used the Right-to-Match card, following Delhi Capitals winning the solitary bid for Rs 50 lakh. DC quoted Rs 3.2 crores and the Warriorz accepted the bid.She will be joined by Meg Lanning and Sophie Ecclestone in the setup, the latter for whom the Warriorz used their second RTM card.Here's the full set of marquee players and the teams they were sold for:

All-rounder Deepti Sharma, who entered the auction at a base price of Rs 50 lakh, was sold to UP Warriorz for Rs 3.2 crore at the Women's Premier League (WPL) 2026 auction in New Delhi on Thursday. The all-rounder was initially bought by Delhi Capitals (DC) for Rs 50 lakh, but the UP Warriorz opted to use the Right-to-Match (RTM) card. DC valued her at Rs 3.2 crore, and the Warriorz accepted the bid to regain the player in their squad. The 28-year-old played three seasons for the UP Warriorz, during which she scored 507 runs in 25 matches at a strike rate of 117.63, with her highest score of 88 not out, which came in the second season against Gujarat Giants. She also took 27 wickets at an economy rate of 8.29. She will enter the fourth season of the league on a high, having won the Player of the tournament in the ODI World Cup, where she took 22 wickets in nine matches. She also scored 215 runs with the bat, including three half-centuries, one of which came in the final, where her run-a-ball 58 helped India reach a matchwinning score.

Indian medium pacer Renuka Singh Thakur, who entered the auction at a base price of Rs 40 lakh, was bought by the Gujarat Giants for Rs 60 lakh. The Giants and UP Warriorz tried to acquire her, but the former pipped the latter to sign her up ahead of the fourth season.

The pacer played three seasons for Royal Challengers Bengaluru and was part of the side which lifted the title in 2024. She played 10 matches in the title-winning campaign, claiming two wickets at an economy rate of 8.07. Overall, Renuka played 23 matches in the first three seasons for RCB, claiming 13 wickets at an economy rate of 8.34. Her best season was in the third edition, where she took 10 wickets in seven matches.Renuka played six matches in the Women's ODI World Cup, including the semi-final and the final, and claimed three wickets in the tournament. Her best performance came against New Zealand, where she took 2/25 in six overs, ensuring the White Ferns did not get off to a flying start in their mammoth run chase in the second innings.

Former New Zealand captain and veteran all-rounder Sophie Devine was bought for Rs 2 crore by Gujarat Giants. Her base prize was 50 lakh. Devine saw a bidding war between the Giants and the Royal Challengers Bengaluru, with Delhi Capitals entering the race to sign her at Rs 1.1 crore. Eventually, it was the Giants who acquired her for Rs 2 crore. The 36-year-old played the first two seasons for Royal Challengers Bengaluru and was part of the title-winning side in the second edition in 2024. She made 136 runs in 10 matches and also took six wickets to help the Smriti Mandhana-led side go all the way in the tournament. Overall, Devine made 402 runs in 18 matches for RCB at a strike rate of 153.43 with a highest score of 99, which came against the Gujarat Giants in the inaugural edition. Devine led New Zealand to victory at the 2024 T20 World Cup in the United Arab Emirates. She made 114 runs in six matches in the tournament and relinquished the leadership role after the tournament. The all-rounder retired from ODIs at the end of the recently-concluded World Cup, where New Zealand finished in sixth place on the points table.

England left-arm spinner Sophie Ecclestone, who entered the auction at a base price of Rs 50 lakh, was bought



by the UP Warriorz for Rs 85 lakh. RCB and DC were involved in a bidding war for the player, with the latter eventually winning the bid at Rs 85 lakh. The UP Warriorz, however, used the Right-to-Match (RTM) card and regained the player for the same amount. Ecclestone played three seasons for the Warriorz, claiming 36 wickets in 25 matches at an economy rate of 6.68. Her best showing came in the inaugural edition, where she took 16 wickets in nine matches with best figures of 4/13. She has also made handy contributions with the bat down the order, amassing 187 runs in 25 matches at a strike rate of 121.42 with a highest score of 33. Ecclestone played a key role in England's run to the semi-finals of the ODI World Cup, claiming 16 wickets in seven matches with two four-wicket hauls to her name.

The 26-year-old will lend enormous experience to the Warrioz in the upcoming edition and will aim to win her maiden WPL title with her old franchise.

New Zealand all-rounder Amelia Kerr, who entered the auction at a base price of Rs 50 lakh, was bought by the Mumbai Indians for Rs 3 crore. The two-time champions were involved in a bidding war for the player with the UP Warriorz, but the Harmanpreet Kaur-led side won the tussle and brought her back into their setup. The 25-year-old won the league twice with the Mumbai Indians in 2023 and 2025 and scored 437 runs in 29 matches at a strike rate of 119.39 during her three seasons with the franchise. She also took 40 wickets in 29 matches at an economy rate of 7.64, with a best bowling performance of 5/38. The all-rounder will bring a wealth of T20 experience for MI, having played in the WBBL and represented the White Ferns 88 times in the shortest format of the game and was the Player of the tournament in New Zealand's T20 World Cup win in 2024 in the United Arab Emirates. Kerr had an underwhelming time during the ODI World Cup, where she made a mere 137 runs in seven matches at an average of 27.40. She also took seven wickets with her leg spin as New Zealand could not progress past the league stage of the tournament. Former Australian captain Meg Lanning, who entered the auction at a base price of Rs 50 lakh, was bought by UP Warriorz for Rs 1.9 crore. The 33-year-old led the Delhi Capitals to three consecutive runner-up finishes and amassed 952 runs in 27 matches at a strike rate of 127.10. Her best season with the bat came in the inaugural edition, where she scored 345 runs in nine matches at a strike rate of 139.11 and formed a successful opening partnership with Shafali Verma at the top of the order. Lanning was released by DC when the retentions were announced earlier this month. She has been in excellent form in the ongoing Women's Big Bash League for Melbourne Stars, with 327 runs in six matches and a best score of 135 against Sydney Sixers. She retired from all forms of international cricket in November 2023 at the age of 31. As one of the game's greatest ever captains, she led Australia to four T20 World Cup titles, an ODI World Cup title and a Commonwealth Games title, the last two

After Smriti Mandhana's wedding postponed, Jemimah Rodrigues to stay in India to support teammate and miss rest of WBBL season

India's World Cup winning star Jemimah Rodrigues will miss the remainder of the Women's Big Bash League season in Australia as her franchise Brisbane Heat announced that she will stay back in India to support her teammate Smriti Mandhana. Rodrigues, who was the only Indian player part of WBBL's 11th season, reached Australia within a week after winning the World Cup in Navi Mumbai to turn up for Brisbane Heat in three matches. She then returned to India to be part of the wedding festivities of her close friend and teammate Smriti Mandhana with music composer Palash Muchhal.

"Brisbane Heat have agreed to a request to release Jemimah Rodrigues from the remainder of the Weber Women's Big Bash League. Rodrigues returned home to India after the Heat's match against the Hobart Hurricanes 10 days ago as part of a pre-arranged commitment where she was to be involved in Indian teammate Smriti Mandhana's wedding last weekend," the franchise said in a statement. "However, the celebrations were subsequently postponed due to a health issue with Mandhana's father. Rodrigues will stay in India to support her teammate, and the Heat has agreed to her not returning for the final four games of the WBBL season."

Mandhana's wedding was scheduled to take place on November 23, but was postponed on the day after her father Shrinivas' health deteriorated suddenly while having breakfast and he had to be hospitalised according to Smriti's manager Tuhin Mishra. Heat CEO Terry Svenson said the franchise had no qualms in agreeing to Rodrigues' request. "It has obviously been a challenging time for Jemi, so while it is unfortunate that she will take no further part in the WBBL, we were more than willing to agree to her request to remain in India," he said. "The Heat club obviously wish her and Smriti Mandhana's family all the best for the future. Jemi told us she was disappointed not to be coming back and has passed on her appreciation to the club and the Heat fans for being so understanding of the circumstances. She has been in touch with the players and wished them all the best for the rest of their games."Rodrigues was Heat's number one pick at the International Player draft earlier this year She landed in Brisbane just hours before Heat's first match of the season and played three matches for the franchise, scoring 6, 11 and 20. The last year's finalists have had a torrid season, losing six out of six matches so far. Mandhana, who has been part of WBBL in the past before with Strikers and Thunder, didn't feature in this edition.

Gautam Gambhir's contradictions: In press conference post South Africa series defeat in Guwahati, India head coach's puzzling comments

He perhaps doesn't have another tone to his voice when he speaks to the media, whether in victory or defeat, but it was the good old combative version of Gautam Gambhir that turned up to the press conference on Wednesday in Guwahati. What followed over the next 14 minutes was a case study in contradictions as he tried to make sense of – as Anil Kumble put it to the broadcasters – India's meek surrender against South Africa to lose the series 0-2.

"It lies with everyone in that dressing room and starts with me to everyone in that dressing room. I've said it before as well that we went together, we lose together. So I'm not going to be someone who's going to say that it lies with x, y or z."Cliched as it might be, that's what most coaches would say when fronting up after a damaging defeat. But after starting the press conference with these lines, at various points he'd go on to make pointed remarks about the batting collapse in the first innings, when his side went from from 95/1 to 122/7, terming it acceptable. When asked how one quantifies accountability, he went on to say this: "It comes from care. How much you care about the dressing room and the team? Accountability and the game situation can never be taught. You can talk about skills, you can work on skills, you can keep talking about the mental aspect of the game, but ultimately when you go in, if you keep putting the team ahead of your own self, not thinking, 'this is how I play, and this is how I will get the results, I don't have plan B,' so sometimes you will get these kind of collapses as well. More than the accountability, it's the care. How much you care about Indian cricket and how much you care about the team and people sitting in the dressing room is important as well." If any one of those six batters who were dismissed in that period were to read this, the message is that the buck stopped with them, and they didn't care enough for their wicket or for the dressing room."I know that I hate using this word... transition. This is exactly what transition is. When you've got a batting lineup which has literally played less than 15-20 Test matches, they need time to absorb pressure, they need time to keep getting better against quality attacks and against quality sides.'

He refused to call in transition in England too during the summer, but after saying he hated that word, Gambhir went on to explain how the batting lineup in the series against South Africa was inexperienced. But the lack of continuity in personnel and instability in the batting order during



Gambhir's tenure lie in direct contradiction. While it is indeed big shoes to fill for the recently retired stalwarts, the Indian side still had plenty of experience in their ranks.

"Start prioritising Test cricket. If we really care about Test cricket and want it to flourish in India, I think we've got to have a collective effort to make that happen. If you get runs in white-ball formats, suddenly you forget about what you have done in red-ball cricket. That should never happen."Over the English summer and during the home season as well, some of India's selection calls don't necessarily scream 'red-ball success', instead Gambhir has opted for all-rounders over specialists. Those who prioritised domestic red-ball cricket, like Sarfaraz Khan and Karun Nair, have gotten shorter ropes. Even if there are valid reasons for those specific calls, it doesn't sync with his larger vi-

"It is up to BCCI to decide. I've said it during my first press conference. Indian cricket is important: I'm not. And I sit here and say exactly the same thing. And yes, people can keep forgetting about it. I'm the same guy who got results in England as well, with a young team. I'm sure you guys will forget very soon because a lot of people keep talking about New Zealand. And I'm the same guy under whom we won Champions Trophy and Asia Cup as well."For someone who has been on record saying a tournament can't be won by won shot in the end by one individual. But after saving that his future as a head coach is up to BCCI, Gambhir threw a strong first-person retort, emphasising a couple of times "I am the same guy..." for a couple of good results in recent times across formats. The narrative quickly shifted from him not being important for Indian cricket to offering reminders of the wins.

Lakshya Sen's toughest moment of 2025? 'Uncertainty on whether I'll return at full speed'

What was the worst day of 2025?

To be honest, the worst day was early in the season when I was struggling with niggling injuries — especially my back issue. As I said before, I had a few injuries at the start of the season, and some of those moments were really frustrating. There were times when I doubted

if I could get back to where



wanted to be.

Two stunning defensive masterclasses — at Hong Kong and at Sydney. What is your mindset in long, punishing rallies?

My mindset is always to stay in the point, stay patient. When I know my opponent won't give up easily and we trade really long rallies, I have to expect that the shuttle would come back. So I try to absorb, defend, and

then pick my moments to attack. I don't try to win every rally with a smash; I want to make my opponent work, force mistakes, and then pounce."

Most painful part of inry management?

It's not just the physical pain. The hardest part is the uncertainty — wondering how long recovery will take, whether I'll come back at full speed, and not being able to

compete at my top level. On top of that, there's the frustration of doing all the rehab, working hard in training, but sometimes still feeling limited. Between Delhi Crime and The Family Man, OTT comes of age; cinema has a new competitor: 25 Years of Indian Cinema



Yes, there were a few good films this year too, but 2019 will be known as the year when desi web series came of age, with a clutch of terrific shows whose instant popularity ensured new seasons: shows on OTT began as an experiment, and when Sacred Games in 2018 became the phenomenon it did, the flood gates opened.

Sacred Games part 2 wasn't half as smart or entertaining as the first one, but it cemented the success of Netflix as the originator of 'desi originals' — shows that were funded and created with Netflix backing, as opposed to the ones that were 'bought' or 'acquired'. Richie Mehta's dark, disturbing 'Delhi Crime', based on a bunch of committed cops in the Capital solving the Nirbhaya case, made up for the Sacred Games dip. Other terrific shows — Raj & DK's spy saga The Family Man and Zoya Akhtar and Reema Kagti's wedding-planner splash-out Made In Heaven on Amazon Prime Video, TVF's middle-class-Mishras-ki-katha Gullak on Sony Liv and coaching-life-special Kota Factory on Netflix, legal drama 'Criminal Justice' – kept us busy. I'd go so far as to say that between Kaleen Bhaiyaa from Mirzapur and Jeetu Bhaiyya from Kota Factory, the case for the desi web series was won. From this year on, there would always be a fight for eyeballs between theatres and streaming platforms. The most important thing that happened

with this OTT wave was not just that we, the viewers, were now always going to be spoiled for choice, but also that there was now going to be a space for new stars to be born. These could well be established actors who never really got their due in the movies, which are driven by big stars and plots created to assuage their egos and massage their image, but also new faces that became the ones we lived with along with the popularity of their shows.vicky kaushal Vicky Kaushal won a National Film Award for Uri: The Surgical Strike. One of the blockbusters in 2019 was Aditya Dhar's Uri, starring Vicky Kaushal and Yami Gautam, which kickstarted the muscular nationalist movies that have defined this era, with its ghar mein ghus ke maarna turning into a flag-waving mantra. So was Hrithik Roshan's War, which dialled down the jingoism comparatively, but stayed determinedly on top of the India vs its enemies narrative. Shahid Kapoor's Kabir Singh, a remake of the Telugu blockbuster Arjun Reddy starring Vijay Deverakonda, got everyone stirred up, and rightly so, with Sandeep Reddy Vanga's all-out depiction of the domineering bad boy hero and submissive heroine: the conversation is still swirling around us, and rightly so. Zoya Akhtar's rap-ready Gully Boy was a swing for the director from her usual eat-the-rich problems to characters who live in Mumbai's slums, and with credible acts from Ranveer Singh and Alia Bhatt, gave us a film that nestles high on her CV. Anubhav Sinha's Article 15, starring Ayushmann Khurrana as the naive outsider who learns hard life lessons with his posting in a UP small town- the fissures of caste and class- was slammed for turning its hero into a saavarna saviour. But it is a film whose truths cannot be denied, and for a mainstream film to go down this path was brave. Ek Ladki Ko Dekha, directed by Shelly Chopra Dhar, starring Sonam Kapoor as a girl who likes girls doesn't proceed half as bravely as its title suggests, but it remains one of the few films that took on the subject of same-sex love. Child actor bought home for family at 6 in Mumbai's posh address, shared tiffin with Dharmendra, was tagged a drug addict as an adult

Imagine being one of the most well-known child artistes in the late 60s and 70s, having worked with top stars like Rajesh Khanna, Amitabh Bachchan, Dharmendra, Sanjeev Kumar, Jeetendra, Anil Kapoor and more — and becoming so successful at the age of 6 that he was able to buy a home for his family in Mumbai's most sought-after locality of Bandra. Such was the life of actor Master Raju. But after massive success as a child, he couldn't replicate the same as an adult and failed to establish himself as a leading star. Here's a look at his journey.

Master Raju was born as Fahim Ajani and hailed from Dongri, Mumbai. He didn't come from a film family, which is why his parents were initially reluctant to let him act. However, during his audition for Gulzar's Parichay (1972), he cried a lot and couldn't give the audition properly as he was just 5 years old. But Gulzar liked that he "behaved his age" and decided to cast him in the film.

While shooting with Sanjeev Kumar, the veteran actor gave him the name Raju. Speaking to Rediff in an old interaction, Raju shared, "Sanjeev Kumar started calling me Raju when I did my first film Parichay with him. People would call me Guddu but he said Raju was a better name." Raju would work in three films at a time, got National Award

After starring in Parichay, Raju started getting many roles and worked with top directors like Yash Chopra, Hrishikesh Mukherjee and Basu Chatterjee. He starred in hit projects like Amar Prem, Daag – The Poem of Love, Deewaar, Inkaar, Khud-Daar and Woh Saat Din.Raju in the interview shared that he got so busy with films that he would shoot for three films simultaneously. He said, "I had a busy shooting schedule. I would do about three films at a time and three shifts at a time." He added, "Even though I was working all the time, I never felt I was exploited." Raju's hard work paid off when he got the National Film Award for Best Child Artist for his role in Chitchor (1976).

Would get paid Rs 1 lakh per film in the 70s, bought house at age 6-7

Raju revealed that he was paid Rs 10,000 per film in 1973, a year after his debut film released. However, after four years of being in the industry and starring in multiple films, his remuneration increased to Rs 1 lakh per film. "In 1977, when I got very popular, I would get more than Rs 1 lakh," he said. He also shared how his income helped his parents buy property in Bandra. He said, "I bought a house in Bandra for Rs 1.10 lakh. Whatever I earned was invested wisely by my father. The benefits are still coming in. In fact, my house is still running today because of those acting assignments. A lot of it was used by the family. We bought a house and our standard of living changed. I never went through a bad phase where I had no work."

Raju's memories with Hema Malini and DharmendraDuring the interaction, Raju shared his memories with late veteran star Dharmendra and his wife Hema Malini. He said, "I was seven years old when I worked in Kushboo. I was working with Hema Malini, who spoke very little. But she would play with me. I taught her how to spin a top. I have done guite a few films with Hemaji like Dream Girl, Nastik, and Krodhi."Recalling sharing tiffin with Dharmendra, he said, "I had a great rapport with Dharamji (Dharmendra). I did Samadhi, Krodhi and Dream Girl with him. We would share the same tiffin."Raju took a break from films after 9th standard to concentrate on studies, and when he returned, he wanted to play negative roles as he was tired of playing "good boy" characters. He played a drug addict in the show Chunauti and again played the same role in Mahesh Bhatt's Saathi, after which the image stuck with him. He said, "I did Mahesh Bhatt's Saathi in which again I played a drug addict and I was branded one.

Couldn't find success as leading star, played Narad in TV showsMaster Raju couldn't find success as a leading actor and ended up getting positive supporting roles like that of the hero's best friend. He played Salman's friend in Baaghi in 1990. He then played small roles in films like Anari, Balwaan, Saajan Chale Sasural, and Diljale but couldn't become a popular actor. However, Master Raju soon



switched to television and ended up playing the role of Narad in almost 3000 episodes. He portrayed the mythological character in different shows like Jai Hanuman, Navgrah Puran, Darshan Do Bhagwan, Jai Maa Durgaa and Shani Mahima.

Vijay Deverakonda's life update: Juggling two films, training and playing with handsome boy Storm

Mumbai: Actor Vijay Deverakonda has shared a slice of his life, saying he has been consumed by the grind of shooting two demanding films at the same time, which he tags as a first in his career. Vijay took to Instagram, where he shared that work may have taken over his days, but he has still managed to enjoy a few personal joys, including indulging in new gadgets and adding a vintage Rolex to his collection. He went on to introduce his "spiritual, handsome boy," Storm, and said no matter how hectic the schedule gets, he never skips a pooja or training.

Vijay wrote: "Its been a while... Shooting 2 films parallely for the 1st time in my life... both extremely demanding, they have taken up my life... But here are bits from my life recently, got myself some new tech that i am enjoying, my current favourite watch – a beautiful vintage Rolex, my spiritual handsome boy Storm... will not skip any pooja, train to always be prepared for war, my passion for making cool clothes – dropping these uniforms soon...(sic)."Vijay was recently seen in Kingdom, a spy action thriller film written and directed by Gowtam Tinnanuri. It also stars Satyadev and Bhagyashri Borse. It is intended to be the first installment of a planned duology and follows a troubled police officer who is assigned to go undercover on a case that brings him face-to-face with his past demons.

Vijay, who made his debut in 2011 with Nuvvila, was later seen in films such as the coming-of-age drama Yevade Subramanyam. He rose to prominence as a leading film actor by starring in Pelli Choopulu, Arjun Reddy, Mahanati, Geetha Govindam, and Taxiwaala.

In 2019, he launched his own production house, King of the Hill Entertainment, which produced Meeku Maathrame Cheptha and Pushpaka Vimanam. Beyond his film career, the actor has designed his own fashion brand and is the co-owner of the volleyball team.

She also revealed that he asked her to do better during a scene, and he had only seen her as a cameraperson before becoming

During the session, the duo discussed what intimidates them while shooting. After which, Suhasini recalled being on a huge film set with Chiranjeevi. "One thing that intimidates me is the typical film set, the Vijaya Vauhini set. It was scary, because they say silence and everybody goes silent, you don't know what to do. You kind of forget and you become paralysed. I was a cinematographer and I didn't know acting, I learnt it slowly on the job," she shared.short article insert The 64-year-old continued, "I was playing a slightly comical role in a Telugu film. I go and pretend to be a maid inside the hero's house. Six of us were there in the scene, each one of them was talking. I was standing behind the chair, I had no dialogue. Every time somebody said something, I gave a reaction without saying anything."

She revealed that the Godfather actor asked her to act like the main lead, instead of a junior artist. "Suddenly, Chiranjeevi looked at me and asked, 'What are you doing?' I said, 'Acting'. He said, 'You are the heroine of the film, you aren't a junior artist'. Because usually, this is how the junior artists are taught, to react, not stand still. That is what you learn in commercial films."Suhasini Maniratnam also recalled another interesting anecdote with the megastar to explain the acting term 'double take' to the audience. "I was doing my first Telugu film and I was supposed to be doing a rangoli. And then, Chiranjeevi comes and stands, and I gradually look at him and say, 'Oh you are watching me' He saw me as a camera assistant for a previous film. And now, the girl behind the camera was his heroine, he couldn't even digest that. A girl who was putting reflector for him was his heroine, he even says that today," she shared, mentioning how Chiranjeevi couldn't imagine her as his female lead. The actor then boasted a bit about the fact that she is superstar Kamal Haasan's niece and her acting skills shouldn't be taken lightly. "When we were doing the rehearsal, he came and said in my ear, 'You can't suddenly look at me, you have to look at me casually and say something'. I am Kamal Haasan's niece, you forgot that? I grew up with an actor in my house. I did the scene naturally then and he said, 'Donga Pilla', which means thief, he basically meant I know my job. That's a delayed reaction, which is a part of double take," she concluded.
