## New Year Greetings To The CM, Appeal For The Development Of The District

“Indian Chronicle” kumram bheem, Asifabad District Reporter, Jade Srinivas, January, 03. “Kumram Bheem Asifabad District DCC President Atram Suguna, DCC President Vishwa Prasad, and MLC Dande Vittal extended New Year greetings to Telangana CM Revanth Reddy. Expressing their greetings on behalf of the people of the district, they asked for high priority to be given to the development of the district. Since a large population lives in villages in the district, they appealed to construct roads from mandals to villages.

## Revanth: Won't allow any injustice to TG

Hyderabad, Jan 3 Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy made it clear that Telangana will draw water from Jurla in case the departments concerned failed to give permission to take water from Srisailem back waters for the Palamuru-Rangareddy Lift Irrigation Scheme (PRLIS). “We will see who will obstruct Telangana. God gave an opportunity to me to become CM. I vow to God, I will not allow anyone to do injustice to Telangana,” Revanth said. Giving reply to the short discussion on ‘Krishna river waters’ in the Legislative Assembly on Saturday, the CM said the government thought that it would prepare an action plan after the debate on the Krishna waters. But Opposition leader K Chandrasekhar Rao did not come to the House. It proved that the BRS leaders have a dismissive attitude towards the Assembly discussions. Revanth commented. The CM said the BRS party demanded the government for a debate on the Krishna waters even in the BAC meeting. KCR also said earlier that they would skin the government if they conducted a special Assembly session on Krishna waters. However, KCR did not come to the Assembly, he said. “We thought that KCR has been in politics for 45 years and he may give valuable suggestions. I thought to ask KCR as to why he committed a mis-



take with regard to Krishna waters? Whether it is intentional or due to a misleading suggestion,” the CM said. Revanth Reddy said that Irrigation Minister N Uttam Kumar Reddy gave a detailed power-point presentation on Krishna waters. The dispute is not only between Andhra Pradesh and Telangana but also with Karnataka. “We have to fight for our rights with Karnataka as well,” he said.

The CM said Telangana got 490 TMCs of Krishna waters allocation for 24 projects in the united Andhra Pradesh state.

## Passenger Awareness Programme Conducted by RPF & GRP at Secunderabad Station Ahead of Festivals

## Major Blow to Maoists: 12 Naxals, Including Key Leader Mangdu, Killed in Fierce Sukma Encounter

Taj Khan, Kaghaznagar, January 3 (Indian Chronicle) “Sukma (Chhattisgarh), January 3, 2026:” In a significant victory for security forces, 12 Maoists were neutralised in a fierce gunbattle in the dense forests of Sukma district on Saturday morning, delivering a severe setback to left-wing extremism in the Bastar region. “Acting on precise intelligence about Maoist movement in the Kistaram area, joint teams of the District Reserve Guard (DRG) and Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) launched a search operation. The encounter erupted around 8 am when Maoists opened fire on the advancing forces, leading to intense exchanges that lasted several hours. “Among the slain Maoists was senior leader Mangdu (also referred to as Sachin Mangtu or Mangdu), secretary of the Konta Area Committee and a Divisional Committee Member (DVCM) carrying a substantial government bounty. His elimination is considered a major blow to the CPI (Maoist)



outfit in the region, with police sources indicating that several key commanders linked to previous attacks, including the killing of Konta ASP Akash Rao and a Divisional Committee Member (DVCM) carrying a substantial government bounty. AK-47 rifles, INSAS rifles, explosives, and revolutionary literature. “In a separate operation in neighbouring Bijapur district, two more Maoists were killed, bringing the total toll to 14 across the two encounters. Combing operations continue in surrounding areas amid reports of blood trails, suggesting the

possibility of additional casualties among fleeing Maoists. “This operation marks one of the largest anti-Naxal successes in recent times and aligns with intensified efforts to eradicate Maoism ahead of the central government’s March 2026 deadline. No casualties were reported among security forces.

## Major Setback to CPI (Maoist): 20 Cadres, Including Top Commanders Deva and Raji Reddy, Surrender Before Telangana DGP

“Taj Khan, Kaghaznagar, January 3 (Indian Chronicle) “Hyderabad, January 3, 2026: In a significant blow to the outlawed Communist Party of India (Maoist), 20 underground cadres, including senior commanders Badse Sukka alias Deva (PLGA Battalion Commander and Dankarakanya Special Zonal Committee Member) and Kankanala Raji Reddy alias Venkatesh (Telangana State Committee Member), surrendered before Telangana Director General of Police B. Shivadhar Reddy on Saturday. “The surrendered group handed over a substantial cache of 48 firearms—including AK-47s, INSAS rifles, SLRs, two LMGs, barrel grenade launchers, and advanced weapons such as a US-made Colt rifle and an Israel-made Tavor assault rifle—along with over 2,200 rounds of ammunition and Rs 20.30 lakh in cash. “Describing the development as the “death knell” for the People’s Liberation Guerrilla Army (PLGA) battalion and the near-collapse of the Telangana State Committee, DGP Shivadhar Reddy noted that only one senior functionary now remains underground in the state committee. Deva, carrying a combined bounty of Rs 75 lakh across multiple states, is regarded as a ruthless strategist involved in major attacks, including the 2013 Jhiram Ghati ambush. “The surrender, the largest arms handover



in recent times following intensified operations, entitles the cadres to a total reward of approximately Rs 1.81–1.82 crore under the Centre and state’s rehabilitation policy. Interim relief of Rs 25,000 has already been provided to each. “DGP Reddy reiterated appeals to remaining Maoist cadres to renounce violence and join the mainstream, assuring full protection and support for reintegration. A press conference was held later in the day to provide further details.

## Special thanks to the people's government for fulfilling the dream of owning a home for the poor: - Government Whip MLA Beerla Ailaiah

“(Mandava Srisailem... Yadadri Bhuvanagiri District Bureau... Indian Chronicle... January 3):- Telangana State Government Whip and Alair MLA Beerla Ailaiah, in the 7th Assembly session held on Saturday, expressed his gratitude to this people’s government, Chief Minister Revanth Reddy, and Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy for fulfilling the dream of owning a home for the poor. “He said that in the previous government, former Chief Minister KCR had constructed double-bedroom houses haphazardly in low-lying areas on government lands, and these houses remain unusable to this day. He cited the example of Vangapalli in Yadagirigutta mandal, where the double-bedroom houses built in a low-lying area without proper facilities are now unusable. He also mentioned that former Chief Minister KCR had adopted Vasalamarri village in Turkapalli mandal and promised to develop it, but in the process of laying a road from his farmhouse to Yadagirigutta, about a hundred people in Vasalamarri village lost their homes. He added that under this people’s government, and under the leadership of Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy, 150 houses have been provided to them. He thanked the people’s government for providing approximately 3700 houses in the Alair constituency. He said that in the recently held local body elections, a promise was made to the people to provide new Indiramma houses, and since the Alair constituency has a large population of SCs, STs, and minorities, he requested that another two thousand houses be provided. They requested the minister to provide an opportunity to those who, with joy, started constructing houses on their own land under the Telangana state people’s government’s Indiramma Housing scheme, and completed the construction up to the basement and pillars, but whose construction was halted because the work was not technically captured in photographs. “They also requested that proper investigations be conducted for some poor people who are living in rented houses



but whose reports from officials state that they are living in slab houses, resulting in them not receiving houses, and that Indiramma houses be provided to them. They stated that it was because of the Indiramma Housing scheme and other schemes provided by our people’s government that they were able to win 70% of the Sarpanch positions in the local body elections in the Aleru constituency, and requested that Indiramma houses be given to eligible poor people to fulfill their dream of owning a home.

## Voter Roll Mapping: 70% Target Set in Telangana



“NARRA SRINIVAS REDDY (NSR), Medchal - Malkajgiri Staff Reporter, January 3, (INDIAN CHRONICLE): “As part of the Special Summary Revision of the Electoral Roll, Telangana Chief Electoral Officer Sudarshan Reddy instructed all Assistant Returning Officers (AROs) and Electoral Registration Officers (EROs) to complete at least 70 percent of the voter list mapping process within the stipulated deadline.

Addressing district collectors through a video conference from the Secretariat on Saturday, the Chief Electoral Officer said the voter list prepared since 2002 must be mapped and updated in line with the 2025 electoral roll. He directed officials to set daily targets to ensure speedy progress—30 to 40 entries per day for Booth Level Officers (BLOs), 300 to 400 for supervisors, 3,000 to 4,000 for AEROs, and 30,000 to 40,000 for EROs. He emphasized that BLOs must conduct door-to-door field

verification and personally verify voter details. He also instructed that field-level inspections should be carried out for every polling station during the mapping process to ensure accuracy and transparency. The process should be completed efficiently and without delay, he added.

The Chief Electoral Officer further advised that additional manpower and computer infrastructure may be arranged wherever necessary, including support from political parties, to facilitate smooth implementation. He reviewed the progress of the mapping exercise constituency-wise and interacted with EROs to understand the challenges faced during implementation. Assuring full cooperation, he stated that the Chief Electoral Officer’s office would remain available at all times to provide guidance and assistance.

From Medchal-Malkajgiri district, Additional District Collector Vijayender Reddy participated in the video conference and assured that the district administration would strictly follow the instructions and complete the targets within the prescribed timeframe.

## Opening nuclear power sector

Reforms in the nuclear energy sector have been long overdue. Decades of state monopoly have stymied its growth. Nuclear power, considered a clean, carbon-free source of energy, is crucial if India wants to decarbonise without slowing economic aspirations. The government's ambition to reach 100 GW of nuclear capacity by 2047 cannot be met by public investment alone. Allowing private participation could unlock capital, speed up project execution and bring in operational efficiencies that government entities often struggle to guarantee. Delays and cost overruns have plagued multiple reactor projects. Competition and accountability could help overcome those structural bottlenecks. After a prolonged delay, a new beginning has now been made with Parliament passing the Sustainable Harnessing and Advancement of Nuclear Energy for Transforming India (SHANTI) Bill, 2025, allowing private players to enter the sector. This is a landmark legislation signalling a major shift for a sector which has so far been tightly controlled by the state. The move is also in sync with the efforts to accelerate the expansion of atomic energy as part of India's long-term energy transition. However, the government must address the concerns regarding safety norms, liability and accountability in a privatised nuclear regime. Under the new law, private companies would need to obtain licences to operate nuclear power plants, while foreign firms can participate through partnerships with Indian companies. The new legislation seeks to repeal the Atomic Energy Act, 1962 and the Civil Liability for Nuclear Damage Act, 2010. In doing so, it removes long-standing legal barriers that restricted nuclear power generation and related activities to government-owned entities.

### Why do I seem to get sick as soon as I take time off?

Melbourne: You've been hanging out for a break, getting through the busy last weeks of work or class. You're finally ready to relax. And then tiredness descends, you feel the tickle in your throat, and you realise you're getting sick. Why does this always seem to happen just in time for a holiday or the weekend? Some call this the let-down effect or leisure sickness. But is it real? While you may hear about leisure sickness online and anecdotally, studies on this phenomenon are very limited and often not well designed. So let's take a look at the evidence - and what you can do to stay healthy. Leisure sickness is a term coined by Dutch researchers in a 2002 study. It refers to people who are seldom ill during the working week but get sick relatively often on weekends or holidays. The researchers surveyed 1,893 people and found roughly 3% reported leisure sickness. Symptoms typically included headaches, tiredness, colds and flu, muscle pain and nausea. People were more likely to develop infections on vacation rather than weekends, and symptoms were most common during the first week of their holiday. However, this research relied on people's recall, and memory can be unreliable. The definition of leisure sickness was also vague. For example, one person's idea of "seldom" and "relatively often" may differ from another's. Another 2014 study investigated "let-down headaches" by asking 22 participants who regularly experienced migraines to keep a diary of their stress levels and migraine onset. It might seem counter-intuitive, but reducing stress seemed to trigger the migraine. When they recorded a reduction in stress on one day, they typically developed a migraine within the next 24 hours. If work was the stressor, this could mean a pattern of migraines on their days off. Some evidence suggests strokes are also more common on weekends than weekdays in some groups. There is no clear cause, but the study authors suggested strokes could be triggered by lifestyle changes on weekends. So, what's going on?  
The lack of quality research on leisure sickness means we don't fully understand its potential causes. But there are some theories. People often travel during vacations, and sit in enclosed, crowded spaces such as planes, increasing their exposure to germs. Travel to distant locations can also expose us to strains of germs we're not immune to. On holidays we may also drink more alcohol, which can reduce immune function. And we may be pushing our body to do things we don't normally do, putting stress on it. Another theory is that being busy at work makes us distracted and less likely to pay attention to symptoms. On leave, symptoms such as muscle pain or a headache may become more obvious - and we can't blame it on work. So we may notice sickness more.



But isn't relaxing good for your health?

There is a complicated relationship between stress and the immune system. Stress activates the sympathetic nervous system and makes our bodies release hormones such as adrenaline and cortisol. Chronic stress can mean our cortisol levels are sustained at high levels. Over time, this reduces how well our immune cells respond to infection, so we are more likely to get sick if we come into contact with viruses or bacteria. But in the short term, both adrenaline and cortisol can actually enhance how well some parts of the immune system work. This means acute stress can temporarily improve our resistance to infection, which is why we may feel busy and stressed but not fall sick. Cortisol's anti-inflammatory properties can also relieve pain. But when the acute stress stops - for example, when we finally get a chance to rest - there may be a sudden transition. We no longer benefit from the temporary immune boost or cortisol's pain relief. So this is when we might fall sick, and feel symptoms such as headaches and muscle pain.

How can I avoid getting sick?

There's still a lot we don't understand about how or why leisure sickness might happen. But we know staying active, getting enough sleep and eating a healthy, balanced diet - even when you're busy - can help boost your immune system. One Finnish study examined more than 4,000 public employees who were physically inactive. It found those who took up regular exercise, particularly vigorous exercise, were less likely to take sick leave than those who remained inactive. Given the link between chronic stress and multiple chronic diseases, it is also sensible to manage your workplace-related stress. There is good evidence that meditation, mindfulness and relaxation techniques can help reduce stress. There are also steps you can take to reduce the risk of respiratory infections on vacation, so you get to enjoy the whole holiday. Consider keeping up to date with flu and COVID boosters, and taking other precautions, such as wearing an N95 mask on planes and in airports.

## ‘HoD shouldn’t visit Jadavpur University till probe ends’: Bengal Minorities Commission on hijab row after visit

In connection with the recent hijab-related controversy at Jadavpur University, the West Bengal Minorities Commission has recommended that the Head of the Department of English, Saswati Halder, should not visit the campus until the inquiry into the matter is completed. A seven-member team of the Minority Commission visited the university on Tuesday and met Vice-Chancellor Chiranjib Bhattacharjee, Pro Vice-Chancellor Amitava Datta, and Registrar Selim Box Mandal. The panel sought details of the steps taken by the university to prevent “such incidents”.

Commission chairperson Ahmed Hasan Imran told “The university has formed a fact-finding committee. We have asked them to look into the matter as the committee is expected to submit its report within 30 days. Meanwhile, we have also asked the university to inform us about the steps taken during this period.” He added, “We have stated that, in the meantime, the HoD who targeted the girl for

wearing the hijab, and who also asked several irrelevant questions, should not be allowed to enter the university until the investigation is over, as she may influence the investigation.”

According to Imran, the commission also interacted with the student and her parents. “The parents and the girl are very scared and need counselling. We asked the university why counselling was not arranged earlier. The Vice-Chancellor has assured us that the matter will be looked into,” he said. Meanwhile, Vice-Chancellor Chiranjib Bhattacharjee, in a statement, said, “I appeal to all stakeholders of Jadavpur University to reaffirm our shared commitment to inter-faith harmony and the dignity of diversity. Founded on the ideals of learning, reason, and public service, our university has long stood as a meeting ground for cultures, languages, beliefs and ideas. Such plurality is not incidental to our legacy; it is our long-nurtured strength.” The statement further said, “We urge every member of our community to articulate differences through dialogue, empathy, and restraint, and to reject prejudice, provocation and misinformation in all forms. Academic freedom flourishes only in an environment of mutual respect, where disagreement is guided by civility and compassion for each other. Let us ensure that our conduct within and beyond the campus reflects the values we stand for.” Meanwhile, according to sources, the HoD submitted a report on Monday to the Vice-Chancellor and Pro Vice-Chancellor, giving a detailed chronological account of the events of that day. The student had alleged that she was asked to partially remove her hijab by an invigilator during an examination, and was asked irrelevant questions about it, on December 23.

## ‘Don’t think New Year will bring good news, waiting for what SC says’: Sweetie Bibi, her 2 kids lose hope in Bangladesh

As the year draws to a close amid changed ties between India and Bangladesh, hope is thinning for 33-year-old Sweetie Bibi and her two sons, Qurban, 6, and Imran, 12. Confined to a house in Chapainawabganj district of Bangladesh, Sweetie is waiting for a verdict that could decide whether she and her children will ever return to their home in Birbhum, West Bengal. The next hearing in her case is listed before the Supreme Court of India on January 6. A separate hearing is scheduled at a district court in Chapainawabganj on January 11.

“We cannot leave this house. Twenty-four hours a day, we are confined here. We know what is happening in Bangladesh. The situation is not good,” Sweetie told The Indian Express over the phone from Chapainawabganj. “As an Indian, I am scared. My country and Bangladesh are not on good terms now. We are fast losing hope of returning.”

It has been over six months since she, her children, and Danish Sheikh were picked up by Delhi Police and subsequently “pushed back” into Bangladesh after being declared illegal infiltrators. On December 5, Danish Sheikh’s wife Sunali Bibi — who is pregnant — and her son were brought back to India following a flag meeting between the BSF and the Bangladesh Border Guards, acting on a Supreme Court order. The rest of the group, however, remained behind. “I don’t think this New Year will bring good news for us,” Sweetie said. “The next hearing at the Supreme Court is on January 6. We are waiting for that day. Let us see what the highest court says about us.” “Just like Sunali, we were detained in Delhi where I worked as a garbage collector. Like her, we were labelled Bangladeshi citizens and pushed into this country. Like her, we hid in bushes and tried to return, but BSF stopped us,” she said. The group, she recalled, spent seven days on the streets of Dhaka before reaching Chapainawabganj, where they were arrested by Bangladeshi police and jailed under the Passport Act and the Foreigners Act.

“Like her, we spent three months in jail before getting bail here. Me and my sons suffered the same way. But she was brought back, and we are confined in this house,” Sweetie said. The house belongs to one Faruk Sheikh, who was entrusted with their custody by a Bangladeshi court after bail was granted on December 1. Since then, Sweetie and her children have not been allowed to step out. “It has been a long time since we last spoke properly. The fate of my sister and her two children is now in the hands of the



court,” said Amir Khan, Sweetie’s brother.

Mofizul Islam, a Birbhum-based social worker who assisted the families in Bangladesh and has since returned to Bengal, fears the consequences of any adverse order. “I am in touch with her over the phone. What can I say to them? If the Bangladesh court passes a sentence, they may be sent back to jail again,” he said. All documents proving their Indian citizenship have been placed before the court, according to Samirul Islam, chairman of the West Bengal Migrant Welfare Board and Trinamool Congress Rajya Sabha MP. “We are hopeful that the highest court of the country will allow them to be brought back home, just like Sunali. All relevant papers showing that they are residents of Bengal have been submitted,” he said. The chain of events began on June 18, when Sunali Khatun, her husband Danish, their eight-year-old son from Paikar village in Birbhum, and Sweetie Bibi with her two sons from Dhitora village, were picked up by Delhi Police, under the jurisdiction of the K N Katju Marg police station. On June 26, all of them were “pushed back” to Bangladesh after being declared illegal immigrants. On August 21,

Bangladeshi police arrested them in Chapainawabganj and sent them to jail after producing them before a local court. On September 26, a division bench of the Calcutta High Court directed that six members of the two Birbhum families, including Sunali, be brought back to West Bengal within four weeks. On October 3, the senior judicial magistrate of the Chapainawabganj district court declared both families Indian citizens based on Aadhaar cards and West Bengal residential addresses, ordering their “pushback” to India. Yet, months later, Sweetie and her sons remain across the border, waiting.

## Rs 91 lakh haul exposes Lawrence Bishnoi-linked extortion racket in Rajasthan and Punjab

Sri Ganganagar police Thursday claimed to have uncovered a major extortion racket linked to the Lawrence Bishnoi gang, with investigators saying the crackdown led to discovery of an interstate network. Police said that based on intelligence inputs, a team intercepted a car on Sri Vijaynagar Road on the night of December 29, a development that allegedly led to the unearthing of a wide extortion network operating from Jodhpur to Punjab.

Four people — Kuldeep Kumar (50), Aman Kumar (20), Ramswaroop (38) and Manish Bishnoi (AGE) — have been arrested, with police saying two more will be arrested Thursday. Police have also seized Rs 91 lakh in cash. According to an officer, their questioning led to significant revelations, prompting senior police officers from Sri Ganganagar, Hanumangarh, Jodhpur and Bikaner to join the investigation. This is the first time the Rajasthan Police have tracked a money trail back to the Bishnoi gang, Superintendent of Police Amrita Duhan said. “The gang, some of whose members operated from abroad, would threaten businessmen and extorted crores of rupees. Acting on specific inputs, Raisinghnagar police intercepted a vehicle that was owned by a city tailor but driven by the three men, none of whom could give any satisfactory explanation on why they were carrying such a large sum of money. A search of the car led to the recovery of three bags containing Rs 91 lakh,” the officer said. According to police, the money was being sent to Raisinghnagar and further to Punjab, with the three men acting as couriers. As the probe widened, several suspects were rounded up from Punjab and Rajasthan. Meanwhile, as investigators from other police units descended on Raisinghnagar, entry to the police station was restricted. Police said other agencies, including the Income Tax Department, could join the questioning. According to SP Duhan, one of the suspects,



Kuldeep, had claimed that he was on his way to Jodhpur on the instructions of his son Yogesh, who in turn was acting on the directions of a resident of Punjab’s Abohar, Sahil Bishnoi. Yogesh has been detained, and investigators claim that Bishnoi had links with Arzoo Bishnoi, a close aide of Lawrence Bishnoi, whom he had met through his cousin Akshay. According to police, neither Kuldeep nor Yogesh had any criminal antecedents. Meanwhile, Sahil Bishnoi, Akshay Kumar and Arzoo Bishnoi are suspected to be key operatives of the Bishnoi gang, with police saying further raids and seizures are expected over the next few days. Police said this is the first time the Rajasthan Police has traced a money trail of a major organised crime syndicate. “Earlier, gang members were arrested for shootings or threats, but this is the first time the police have successfully reached and disrupted the money trail,” she said. Police said the gang used USDT cryptocurrency to move money through channels in Sri Ganganagar, Hanumangarh and Haryana.

## More Mumbai Metro lines to open in 2026: Mira Bhayandar, Thane to get connectivity finally

In 2025, the highly anticipated Mumbai Metro Aqua Line, which runs from Aarey to Cuffe Parade, was inaugurated. This new line provides the city with an additional public transport option alongside the local railway system, and it is part of a broader network of planned metro lines for Mumbai. A wide range of infrastructure projects is currently underway in Mumbai and the surrounding MMR region. The year 2026 is set to continue this trend, with several lines scheduled to open. Specifically, portions of four lines and an extension are expected to be inaugurated, with two of the openings anticipated in the first month of the year. Other significant projects, including tunnels and bridges such as the Thane-Borivali twin tunnels and the Eastern Freeway, will take a bit longer to complete.

With only four stations, the phase one opening of Line 9 is of tremendous importance. Extending Line 7, which runs from Andheri to Dahisar East, to the suburb of Mira Bhayandar, the four stations, set to open soon, will take it from the Dahisar East end to Kashigao. It will introduce a metro line and network along 4.5 km at the outskirts of Mumbai. Commuters from Mira Bhayandar will have access to both lines that converge at Dahisar East and head towards Andheri. They can use Line 7 to reach the Western Express Highway (WEH) and Line 2A to get to DN Nagar. Additionally, interchanges with Lines 1 and 3 (Aqua Line) will be accessible. A total of 4 of the 13 stations are ready, ending at the Subhash Chandra Bose Stadium in Bhayandar. Checks by the Commissioner of Metro Railway Safety (CMRS) began in December, said an official from the Mumbai Metropolitan Regional Development Authority (MMRDA), and the back-and-forth over the final stamp of approval continues. CMRS evaluations assign points for rectification until an ideal is achieved. An opening initially teased for December has been postponed to January 2026. Although the current code of conduct may delay the grand inauguration of the line, the exact opening date remains uncertain. In the coming months, the MMRDA also hopes to make the remaining portions of the line ready up to the Subhash Chandra Bose Stadium in Bhayandar.

Line 2 B is currently undergoing CMRS testing, and five of its stations are nearly ready for passenger service. However, the section of the line that stretches from Mandale in the far eastern suburbs to Diamond Garden in Chembur may attract fewer passengers due to its limited interconnectivity with other transportation networks. The

currently out-of-order monorail intends to meet the line at Chembur station (tentative name), one stop after Diamond Garden. The only public transport line connected to the 5.3-km stretch will be the Mankhurd railway station on the Harbour line, which will open the network to commuters in the eastern suburbs. When complete, the 23.6-km line will enhance the city’s east-west connectivity. It begins at DN Nagar, then goes into Bandra, then towards Kurla, onto Chembur, and finally to Mankhurd.

The second phase of Line 2B is also expected to begin in mid-2026. The stations to open will be on the other end of the line, linking DN Nagar till Saraswat Nagar in Khar. The line connecting Mumbai to Thane will open to the public in 2026, with two-thirds of it operational. An MMRDA official said the first section of the line in Thane is expected to open by March. This initial 10.5-km stretch will run from Cadbury Junction to Gaimukh. It includes Line 4A, which is a short 2.7-km extension from Kasarvadavali, the current endpoint of Line 4, to Gaimukh.

In September 2024, Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis praised the trial runs on this stretch and committed to completing the initial stations by the end of 2025. However, an MMRDA official explained that the design of the stations, featuring a crimped, wavy top, can be executed only by a single vendor and a single machine, which is causing delays. Over the next six months, the goal is to operationalise the next 10 km of the line. This expansion will extend the working stations from Gaimukh in the north to Gandhi Nagar in Vikhroli. The entire line is expected to be fully operational by 2027, ultimately reaching Wadala. A crucial 15.3-km metro line that runs along the Jogeshwari-Vikhroli Link Road (JVLR), the MMRDA aims to get the entire Line 6 operational by mid-2026. The line begins at Swami Samarth Nagar in Andheri West, runs along the east-west corridor in Andheri East, Saki Vihar Road, Powai, and Kanjurmarg, intersects the WEH and EEH, and ends at Vikhroli. The design of the station at Mahakali Caves will be influenced by the caves.

Due to constraints, the line includes several standout features. In many spots, it will be the third level of transport, towering over a flyover and the road below. The tallest line: its highest pillars reach 29.5 metres. Issues with the metro car depot at Kanjurmarg have also necessitated inspection and maintenance provisions along the lines. “As work on the Kanjurmarg depot and the complications around it continue, we are building 8-lane inspection pit lines alongside. A few stations also have pocket lines on the sides, so scheduled maintenance and inspections of the underside of the cars can continue. These will make it possible to open the entire line in 2026, even if frequency will be restricted to every 6 minutes,” said the official. The Maharashtra State Road Development Corporation (MSRDC) plans to complete the ‘missing link’ on the Mumbai-Pune Expressway by March and open it to traffic. Skipping the Lonavala section, the link will cut the Khopoli to Kusaon section to 13.3 km, reducing travel time by 30 minutes. The missing link consists of two tunnels through the hills, two cable-stayed bridges, and a viaduct. Minor works remain, and an MSRDC officer assured that they would be completed by March.

## Punjab Assembly special sessions against BJP-led Centre come under attack from Opposition MLAs, say they’re unable to raise issues of their constituencies

Punjab Assembly special sessions against BJP-led Centre come under attack from Opposition MLAs, say they’re unable to raise issues of their constituencies. Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann speaks during the special session of the Punjab Vidhan Sabha, in Chandigarh, Tuesday. Ever since the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) Government assumed office in Punjab in 2022, it has held special sessions of the Vidhan Sabha largely to attack the BJP-led Centre and its policies. In its latest such exercise, the fifth special session held on December 30, the Assembly adopted a resolution against the Centre’s Viksit Bharat-G Ram G scheme, which dismantled the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MNRREGA).

All five special sessions convened so far have carried confidence motions and resolutions directly criticising the BJP or the Centre. However, the Opposition has trained guns on the AAP Government for organising single-day sessions and not allowing them to raise issues of their constituencies. Leader of the Opposition Pratap Singh Bajwa, BJP state president Sunil Jakhar, and Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) chief Sukhbir Singh Badal have questioned the need to repeatedly bypass regular Assembly sittings in favour of special sessions, especially when the outcomes remain largely symbolic. The first special session, convened in June 2022, saw a confidence motion as AAP alleged that at least 10 AAP MLAs were approached by the BJP under its “Operation Lotus” with an offer of Rs 25 crore to each of them in a bid to topple the six-month-old Punjab government. A subsequent special session was called over the Bhakra Beas Management Board’s (BBMB) decision to release Punjab’s share of water to Haryana. Holding the Centre responsible, Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann accused it of favouring BJP-ruled Haryana at the cost of Punjab’s farmers. The resolution was aimed at positioning the Punjab government as a defender of farmers’ interests while sharpening its confrontation with New Delhi. In September 2025, another special session was convened in the aftermath of floods triggered by heavy rainfall. The role of central agencies, particularly the BBMB, came under scrutiny, with the Assembly adopting a resolution blaming the Centre’s negligence for the losses suffered by Punjab. A separate special session on November 24 marked the 350th martyrdom anniversary of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur. It was held at Sri



Anandpur Sahib instead of the Vidhan Sabha complex, a first for the state.

The December 30 session brought the focus back to employment and welfare. The Assembly unanimously passed a resolution alleging that the Centre was “snatching away the rights of the poor, Dalits and labourers” by phasing out MGNREGA through the VB-G Ram G Act. Mann described the legislation as anti-Dalit and anti-poor. While the Congress and SAD supported the resolution, the BJP dismissed it as an attempt to shield corruption. Congress member Sukhpal Singh Khaira raised it in the House on Tuesday that the special sessions were becoming the order of the day and the legislators were not able to raise the issues faced by their constituencies. The standoff, in the past, had also sharpened Centre-state tensions spilling over into an unprecedented confrontation between the chief minister and former Governor Banwarilal Purohit that eventually reached the Supreme Court. Leader of Opposition Partap Singh Bajwa accused the government of wasting money on special sessions and not organising regular sessions. ## Instagram birthday wish turns fatal: Karnataka man stabbed to death by his ex-girlfriends’s brother, fiancé

A 21-year-old man in Karnataka’s Chikkamagaluru district was allegedly stabbed to death Wednesday for uploading a birthday wish post on Instagram and WhatsApp using the photos of his former girlfriend, whose wedding was scheduled with another man. The police have arrested the woman’s brother, fiancé and two others in the case. The deceased was identified as Manjunath, a resident of the Tarikere taluk in the Chikkamagaluru district. The accused are the woman’s brother Kiran, her fiancé Venu, Appu and Manu, all residents of the Tarikere town. The police said Kiran called Manjunath over the phone to meet him near an underpass road Wednesday night. According to the FIR,

around 7.45 pm, Venu confronted Manjunath for wishing her on social media using her photos and said that if he wanted to marry her, he could approach the family members. Manjunath allegedly told him that he would not marry her. Kiran allegedly attacked Manjunath with a knife for using his sister’s photo and stabbed him multiple times before leaving the place. Manjunath was taken to the Tarikere government hospital and later to Shivamogga for treatment. However, around 12.10 am Thursday, he succumbed to injuries. The police registered a case under sections 352 (intentional insult with the intent to provoke a breach of peace or another offence) and 103 (1) [murder] of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and arrested the accused.

# Out in the cold: Data reveals dearth of homeless shelters in Bengaluru



At 12.40 a.m. on December 26, near K.R. Market in the heart of the city, a small crowd began gathering around a goods vehicle. Four men were distributing blankets. The temperature was 16 degrees Celsius. Beneath the Mysuru Road flyover, several people had taken shelter, wrapping themselves in blankets or gunny bags to protect themselves from the biting cold. A beat police officer stationed there said two homeless people had died under the flyover within just four days.

The Bengaluru City Police data revealed that the city witnessed the deaths of more than 15 homeless people over the last 40 days, who were sleeping on the streets, all registered as Unnatural Death Reports (UDR). Police stations such as Malleshwaram and City Market, areas with major transport hubs, hospitals, and markets, have recorded four deaths each. While there is no confirmed direct connection, Bengaluru police say such deaths generally increase during winter, and this year has seen more, possibly due to the drop in temperature. Notably, December recorded temperatures as low as 13 degrees Celsius in Bengaluru, according to the India Meteorological Department. C. Vamsi Krishna, Joint Commissioner of Police (West), told The Hindu that such deaths occur during winter as well as extreme summer conditions, according to the number of UDRs registered. "Deaths might not be directly connected to the weather, but it may exacerbate existing health conditions, leading to fatalities. These homeless people mostly lack access to warm clothes and other safety gear," he said.

Arvind Kasthuri, Professor in the Department of Community Health at St. John's Medical College, explained that the drop in temperature in Bengaluru is unlikely to cause hypothermia leading to deaths, but it can aggravate underlying health conditions and result in serious situations. "In Bengaluru, falling temperatures, combined with usual factors such as poor air quality and the consumption of low-quality food and water, can prove fatal for people with health issues," he added. However, many NGOs have stepped in this winter, distributing blankets, food packets, and other healthcare essentials, along with individual donors. In areas such as Yeshwantpur and Vidyaranyapura in north Bengaluru, a few police officers and civil defence personnel have also contributed by providing winter essentials and food to the homeless. Under the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NULM), a central scheme, civic bodies are required to create infrastructure and enrol homeless people. However, the erstwhile Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagari Palike (BBMP) and the newly formed corporations have done little. Although shelter homes conduct bi-weekly surveys of homeless people to increase enrolment, NGOs running these homes say there is little support from civic bodies, pointing to scarce fund allocation. On the other hand, many homeless people are reluctant to join shelter homes, which social activist R. Kalemullah attributes to underlying "fear" and a feeling of being in an "open jail". He also pointed to the existence of "social divisions" within shelter homes. Although the State has housing schemes, there is nothing exclusively for homeless people who lack or have lost documents such as Aadhaar cards, leaving gaps in the central scheme.

Battling weather, stink, stray dogs When The Hindu travelled across the city to review the conditions faced by homeless people and how they are coping with plummeting temperatures, most had sought shelter under flyovers, near religious institutions, transport hubs, hospitals, and, dangerously, under old trees. Near K.R. Market, hundreds have taken refuge under the flyover. However, the place itself is uninhabitable. Many sleep in corners of bus stops that stink, often surrounded by leftover food. "They don't move from here, and many have been living here for years because they work at the market in the mornings and sleep under flyovers at night. Many people give them daily essentials, some just to make videos of themselves giving, but it still helps the poor," said Mohammad Shafeeq, an autorickshaw driver. Homeless people, constantly exposed to harsh weather, also face mental health challenges. A police beat officer added that fights sometimes break out under the influence of alcohol. Many quarrel over "their place to sleep" and even over blankets.

Meanwhile, a group arrived in a goods autorickshaw to distribute blankets, prompting several men and women to rush towards it. Mohammad Irfan, a mechanic and president of the Al Qaswa Feed and Care Foundation, said they distribute basic accessories to help people cope with the cold across central and south Bengaluru. "We don't raise funds. We pool a portion of our salaries and buy these essentials for the homeless," he said. Bala said he earns ₹100 to ₹200 a day by helping traders carry vegetable bags at

the market, which he spends on food. "On lucky days, some traders pay ₹50 instead of ₹20. I save that for liquor. I sleep here itself. I don't go anywhere," said Bala, who is originally from Mandya.

As the night progressed, near Vani Vilas Hospital, a few more people had taken shelter near a bus stop, sleeping on the ground. A man from West Bengal, who refused to reveal his name, said, "The bench becomes colder at night, so we sleep on the footpath." When asked why he did not join a shelter home, he replied, "People ask us to move there, but I don't want to go because I am free here. Those who went there told me inmates fight unnecessarily." Mohan (name changed), manager of a shelter home run by an NGO that operates four other such centres across the city, said people who have separated from families or run away from home usually join shelters on their own. "Very rarely do we see homeless people involved in rag-picking or begging joining shelter homes," he added. Human rights activist T. Narasimhamurthy said he had encountered homeless women who feared being pushed into the flesh trade. "They are often traumatised and groped on the streets, yet feel safer in open spaces than in shelter homes," he said.

Around Adugoddi, NIMHANS, Koramangala, Madiwala, and HSR Layout, homeless individuals were mostly found sleeping alone rather than in groups. For those sleeping alone, stray dogs pose a major threat. NGOs running shelter homes said that while ground realities remain unchanged, the BBMP and new corporations have limited themselves to inspections and reprimanding managers. Only 48 shelters instead of 120 under the NULM policy, civic bodies are responsible for ensuring basic infrastructure such as water supply, sanitation, safety, and security for the homeless. This reporter visited four shelter homes, most of which lacked basic facilities such as adequate lighting, proper beds, water, and sanitation.

The policy mandates that each shelter cater to 50 or more people, barring exceptional situations, yet barely any shelter has more than 40 beds. As per policy requirements, Bengaluru should have at least 120 shelters. Currently, there are only 48 shelters: North City Corporation (12), South City Corporation (7), Central City Corporation (16), East City Corporation (6), and West City Corporation (7). The scheme mandates four types of shelters — for men, women, families, and special shelters for the mentally challenged, physically challenged, and recovering patients. Bengaluru has no special shelters. The policy also mandates systematic third-party surveys to assess shelter needs at appropriate locations. Although surveys are conducted, there has been no expansion of shelter homes since 2023, nor any strategic planning. For instance, shelters in Yeshwantpur are always full and need more shelter homes, yet there are only two in the area. In contrast, Mahadevapura and nearby localities have over six shelters, with occupancy rarely exceeding 50%. A GBA official told The Hindu that the Health Department has agreed to provide space in some hospitals to set up shelters, and a few new homes have been commissioned and are expected to become operational soon. "A foundation called Aaladamaru has expressed interest in setting up a special shelter home, and the file has been moved," the official added.

The scheme's mandate goes beyond building shelters, as it requires ensuring that no one is deprived of a safe and secure roof. Agencies running shelters are responsible for identifying homeless persons and persuading them to move into shelters. Despite this, a 2023-24 third-party survey identified 1,329 homeless people. Agencies say they conduct bi-weekly surveys, but many homeless people resist relocation and sometimes even become violent during persuasion attempts. Narasimhamurthy said the civic body must explore alternative solutions in such cases. "They barely consult activists or social workers to brainstorm ideas or implement schemes effectively. There is general negligence," he said.

Challenges in running shelter homes "In many centres, beds haven't been replaced for three to four years. Pest control is needed to eliminate bedbugs, but we haven't received funds even for small works, surveys, or logistics for health camps," a shelter home manager said on condition of anonymity. He further said that funds, including salaries for staff, have not been sanctioned to several shelter homes for the past two years. There are also issues with local residents opposing shelter homes. A GBA welfare wing official admitted that funds had not been released for some shelters. "These shelters needed fresh work orders after contracts ended, but they continued operating without them, so bills were not cleared," he said. When asked about the lack of follow-up, the official acknowledged delays from former zonal offices as well. Vulnerability, mental health, and solutions Akshay Hakay Machhindra, DCP, Central Division, said homeless people are highly vulnerable to crimes such as theft and robbery and sometimes even become accused unintentionally.

Homeless people, constantly exposed to harsh weather, also face mental health challenges. "Extreme weather discomfort can increase psychological distress, especially in people with pre-existing anxiety, depression, or trauma-related disorders. Those with poor coping mechanisms are particularly affected," said Suresh Bada Math, Professor of Psychiatry at NIMHANS. While these concerns are serious, solutions lie in civic bodies taking greater interest in and empowering their welfare wings. Narasimhamurthy stressed that Human Rights Commissions exist to address such issues and should take note of poor scheme implementation and ensure accountability. were sent to Jabalpur for further examination, officials said. According to officials from the veterinary department, food poisoning and improper diet have caused the deaths. Teams from the veterinary and forest departments, as well as the wildlife wing, have been monitoring the area for the past four days after being alerted by residents. Veterinarian Dr Manisha Chauhan, who conducted the post-mortems, said symptoms of food poisoning were found in the parrots, with no indicators of bird flu. People often unknowingly feed birds food that proves fatal to their digestive systems, she said. # 200 parrots die of food poisoning in MP's Khargone district

At least 200 parrots have died on the banks of the Narmada River in Madhya Pradesh's Khargone district due to food poisoning, officials said on Friday (January 2, 2026). The carcasses were found in the last four days near an aqueduct bridge on the riverbank in the Badwah area, and a post-mortem report has ruled out bird flu as the cause, they said. Some parrots were alive during rescue operations, but the toxicity of the food was so severe that they died shortly thereafter, District wildlife warden Tony Sharma said. The deaths triggered panic in the area after a suspected bird flu scare, but veterinary examinations found no trace of the infection. Forest department officials have banned feeding near the aqueduct bridge and deployed staff at the site for strict enforcement. Viscera samples from the birds

# Swiss face arduous task of identifying victims of deadly bar fire



Investigators on Friday (January 2, 2026) set about the painful task of identifying the burned bodies of a blaze that engulfed a crowded bar and killed around 40 people at a New Year's Eve party in the upscale Swiss ski resort of Crans-Montana. So severe were the burns that "suffered by the mostly young crowd of revellers in the Le Constellation bar that Swiss officials said it could take days before they name all the victims of the fire that also injured 115, many of them seriously.

Parents of missing youths anxiously issued pleas for news of their loved ones as foreign embassies scrambled to work out if their nationals were among those caught up in one of the worst tragedies to befall modern Switzerland. The first objective is to assign names to all the bodies," Crans-Montana's mayor Nicolas Feraud told a press conference on Thursday evening. This, he said, could take days. Mathias Reynard, head of government of the canton of Valais, said experts were using dental and DNA samples for the task. "All this work needs to be done because the

information is so terrible and sensitive that nothing can be told to the families unless we are 100 percent sure," he said. What caused the blaze was unclear. Swiss authorities said it appeared to be an accident rather than an attack.

Some accounts from survivors and footage broadcast on social media suggested that the ceiling of the bar's basement may have caught fire when sparkling candles got too close. Residents of Crans-Montana, which has the distinction of being not only a popular draw for skiers, but also golfers, were stunned by the inferno. Many knew victims and some said they were lucky not to have been there themselves.

Hundreds of people stood in silence near the scene as they came to pay their respects to the victims on Thursday night. "You thank you're safe here but this can happen anywhere. They were people like us," said Piermarco Pani, an 18-year-old who, like many others in the town, knew the bar well. Dozens of people left flowers or lit candles on a makeshift altar at the top of the road leading to the bar which police had cordoned off. Some cried, others quietly hugged one another. Behind the cordon, the bodies of some victims still lay in the bar, police said, as they pledged to work around the clock to identify everyone who succumbed to the blaze. Kean Sarbach, 17, said he had spoken to four people who escaped from the bar, some with burns, and that they had told him the flames had spread very quickly. Elisa Sousa, 17, said she was meant to be there but ended up spending the evening at a family gathering instead. "And honestly, I'll need thank my mother a hundred times for not letting me go," she said at the vigil for the victims. "Because God knows where I'd be now."

# Indore water contamination: Infant born after 10-year wait dies; family rejects government compensation



A child born after 10 years of fervent prayers and vows died within days due to water contamination that has claimed several lives in Madhya Pradesh's Indore city. An eerie silence prevailed in an alley in the Marathi Mohalla of the Bhagirathpura area, where six-month-old Avyan Sahu lived with his family. A simple act of diluting packaged milk with water cost the baby his life and plunged the Sahu family into unbearable grief.

The family claims it has rejected the government's compensation for the death of the child, who was born after 10 years of prayers and vows. The government has announced an ex gratia of ₹2 lakh each to the families of the deceased persons. Residents have claimed that 15 people died due to the vomiting-diarrhoea outbreak caused by contaminated drinking water in Bhagirathpura over the last year, with Avyan being the youngest among them. The health department, however, has not confirmed this claim and said only four deaths occurred in the outbreak.

# Why does India need climate-resilient agriculture? | Explained

Climate change is real, and for India to continue meeting domestic food demands, agriculture needs to cope with the increasing unpredictability of the weather, declining soil health, and growing air pollution.

What is climate-resilient agriculture?

Climate-resilient agriculture uses a range of biotechnology and complementary technologies to guide farming practices and reduce dependence on chemical inputs, while maintaining or improving productivity. These tools include biofertilizers and biopesticides, and soil-microbiome analyses. Genome-edited crops can be developed to withstand drought, heat, salinity, or pest pressures. In parallel, AI-driven analytics can integrate multiple environmental and agronomic variables to generate locally tailored farming strategies.

Why does India need CRA?

India is an agricultural nation with a rapidly growing population, which places increasing pressure on the need for higher and more reliable farm productivity. Yet around 51% of India's net sown area is rainfed, and this land produces nearly 40% of the country's food, making it especially vulnerable to climate variability. Conventional farming methods alone may not withstand the rising stresses of climate change, for instance, recent modelling suggests that by the end of the century, yields of staple crops like rice could fall by 3-22%, and in worst-case scenarios by more than 30%. Climate-resilient agriculture offers a suite of technologies that can enhance productivity while protecting environmental health. It can also reduce India's reliance on food imports and strengthen the country's strategic autonomy in the food sector.

Where does India stand today?

The impact of climate change on agriculture has been known for a long time. In 2011, the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) launched a flagship network project 'National Innovations in Climate Resilient Agriculture'. For enhancing the resilience and adaptive capacity of farmers to climate variability, location-specific climate resilient technologies such as system of rice intensification, aerobic rice, direct seeding of rice, zero till wheat sowing, cultivation of climate resilient varieties tolerant to extreme weather conditions, in-situ incorporation of rice residues, etc., have been demonstrated under the project in 448 climate-resilient villages. The National Mission for Sustainable Agriculture has been formulated to enhance agricultural productivity, especially in rainfed areas, focusing on integrated farming, water use efficiency, soil health management, and synergising resource conservation. More recently, the BioE3 policy also positioned CRA as a key thematic area for the development of biotechnology-led solu-



tions. India has a strong scientific capacity for CRA, supported by ICAR, DBT, IARI, and a growing private-sector biotechnology ecosystem. Several technologies relevant to CRA are already commercialised, especially biofertilizers, biopesticides, and microbial soil enhancers.

Leading companies such as Biostadt, IFFCO, GSF, NFL, and IPL Biologicals supply bio-inputs that improve soil health and reduce chemical dependence. India also has an expanding digital agriculture sector, with agritech startups offering AI-enabled advisories, precision irrigation, crop-health monitoring, and yield prediction tools.

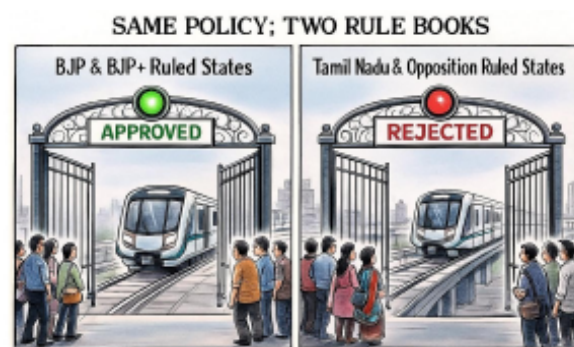
What are other countries doing?

The U.S. integrates CRA into federal policy through the USDA Climate-Smart Agriculture and Forestry (CSAF) initiative, investing billions in climate-smart practices. CRA is embedded in the EU Green Deal and Farm to Fork Strategy, both aiming to reduce chemical inputs and enhance sustainability. China's CRA strategy centres on climate-tolerant crop breeding, large-scale water-saving irrigation, and agricultural digitalisation. Brazil leads in tropical climate-resilient crop development, driven by EMBRAPA's biotechnology research.

What is the way forward?

India faces several risks in scaling CRA, including low adoption among small and marginal farmers due to limited access, awareness, and affordability, and quality inconsistencies in biofertilizers and biopesticides that undermine trust in biological alternatives. The rollout of climate-resilient seeds remains slow, with the adoption of new tools such as gene editing still emerging and uneven distribution across States. Further, the digital divide limits the reach of precision agriculture and AI-based decision tools. These challenges are compounded by ongoing soil degradation, water scarcity, and accelerating climate volatility, which may outpace current adaptation efforts. Fragmented policy coordination further risks slowing progress.

## Metro Rail projects ride into political row



The Union government's rejection of the Metro Rail projects for Coimbatore and Madurai has provided the ground for yet another fierce political battle between the ruling DMK-led front and the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), the ruling party at the Centre. Citing one of the norms stipulated in the 2017 Metro Rail Policy — that a city must have a population of at least 2 million to qualify for a mass transit system such as Metro Rail — the Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, in its November 14, 2025 communication to the Tamil Nadu government, referred to 2011 Census data showing Coimbatore's population at 1.58 million and Madurai's at 1.5 million as the basis for its decision. Returning detailed project reports for the two cities, the Ministry stated that "the Metro projects are cost-intensive and should be planned carefully for long-term sustainability." It suggested other cost-effective urban transport systems, including the Bus Rapid Transit System.

The State government had followed the Union Ministry's guidelines while commissioning feasibility studies for the Mass Rapid Transit System in Coimbatore, Madurai, and three other tier-II cities in Tamil Nadu. Detailed project reports were eventually prepared by Chennai Metro Rail Limited for Madurai and Coimbatore and sent to the Centre, with a recommendation that the project cost be met under a 50:50 equity sharing basis. While completely elevated, two corridors have been proposed for nearly 35 kilometre in the case of Coimbatore; the other city is to have an elevated corridor of 26.5 km and an underground corridor of 5.5 km. Each project was estimated to cost around ₹11,000 crore. When the communication became public on November 18, 2025, it triggered loud protests from the ruling party and its allies. It was left to the BJP and its ally, Tamil Maanila Congress (Moopanar), to defend the move of the Union government, which was said to have come after 21 months. Late evening on Tuesday (November 18, 2025), the DMK's information technology wing, on X, complained of the Centre's discrimination against Tamil Nadu vis-à-vis a couple of cities in north India, for which the approval had been given in the past despite "not fulfilling" the norm of a 2-million population. Senior BJP leader and legislator of Coimbatore (south), Vanathi Srinivasan, rejected the charge of bias against the State and contended that under the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance's reign at the Centre, the State had "received" ₹1.5 lakh crore in rail funds, hardly the sign of any anti-Tamil Nadu agenda. She added that the State could resubmit the project proposal, "using urban agglomeration data, or give special justification — just as Agra Metro was approved for tourism. Similar precedents exist for Bhopal and Patna." The TMC(M)'s chief and former Union Minister G.K. Vasan expressed hope that the projects would take off in the future. On Wednesday morning (November 19, 2025), Chief Minister M.K. Stalin, in a post on X, accused the BJP-led government of using "flimsy grounds" to deny the Metro Rail projects for the "Temple City" Madurai and "South India's Manchester" Coimbatore. The BJP's ally in the State, the AIADMK, known for its strong base in Coimbatore and other western districts of the State, chose not to join the debate directly. However, its general secretary Edappadi K. Palaniswami, in a representation submitted to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who was coincidentally in Coimbatore on Wednesday (November 19, 2025) to attend a farmers' meet, appealed to the Centre to expedite the implementation of the Metro Rail projects. The AIADMK's IT wing reposted a statement issued by the BJP's State unit. The national party had explained that the Centre had "returned" the metro proposals, asking for basic clarifications. A similar process was followed for metro extension projects in Bengaluru, in addition to Agra and Patna, the BJP added. Even though the DMK and BJP find fault with each other over the present fate of the project proposals, they, however, sound optimistic about making the projects a reality. It remains to be seen how they are going to accomplish it, but what is certain is that the Coimbatore and Madurai Metro Rail projects will get featured in election manifestos of all major parties when Tamil Nadu goes to the polls in April-May.

## The myth of the 'normal': what does your lab report really mean?



When the U.S. wrestler and actor Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson was in his prime, his Body Mass Index (BMI) was around 33 kg/m<sup>2</sup>, technically 'obese' by World Health Organization (WHO) standards. Yet no one watching him could call him unhealthy. This paradox is one glimpse of how numbers alone can't be used to define good human health. For many years, the WHO has used universal BMI cut-offs: over 25 kg/m<sup>2</sup> for 'overweight' and 30 kg/m<sup>2</sup> for 'obesity'. But research in Asian populations has revealed that even at lower BMI levels, people developed diabetes and heart disease more often. Recognising these ethnic differences in fat distribution, the WHO revised the 'normal' upper limit for many Asian countries to 23 kg/m<sup>2</sup>. Thus, 'normal' health is not fixed or global but a shifting statistical boundary shaped by population data and biological diversity.

The reference range Every lab report for continuous variables includes a reference range, which is often mistaken to be the normal range. Laboratories use the term 'reference' because the range is statistical, not absolute. This means it's derived from the test results of a large number of individuals. When these values are plotted on a graph, they form a bell-shaped curve, with most results clustering near the average and fewer at the extremes. The reference interval is the central 95% of this distribution, meaning 95 out of 100 healthy people fall within it, while 5% lie outside it. This is why falling outside the reference range doesn't always indicate disease — nor does falling within guarantee good health. It's only a guide, rather than a definitive boundary of normalcy.

Diagnosing disease would be simple if health and illness were cleanly separated, the way India and Sri Lanka are separated by the Park Strait. But biology resembles the Tamil Nadu-Kerala border: fluid and gradual, without a clear point where Tamil-speaking people end and Malayalam-speaking people begin. In the border villages, both languages mingle and one shades into the other. Similarly, no single value separates health from disease with precision. Consider diabetes: when the fasting blood glucose levels of thousands of people are plotted on a graph, the healthy and the diabetic curves merge smoothly. The diagnostic cut-off of 126 mg/dl wasn't a mathematical discovery but a practical compromise; there's no fixed line beyond which a person suddenly becomes diabetic. Clinicians draw a line only for practical purposes, and assume that beyond that limit, the risk of complications such as diabetic retinopathy rise sharply. Put another way, all such medical boundaries balance the two concepts of sensitivity and specificity. A lower threshold would detect all true cases but falsely label many healthy ones, increasing the number of false positives; vice versa for a higher threshold. No test in medicine is 100% sensitive and 100% specific at the same time. Since no test is perfectly accurate, the chosen cut-off reflects medical judgment shaped by a disease's severity, prevalence, and social consequences. For serious yet treatable conditions, clinicians prefer caution and accept more false posi-

tives; for mild or stigmatising ones, they raise the bar to avoid overdiagnosis. Every cut-off in medicine is thus a negotiation and, for that reason, they must be regularly revisited. Mathematics of normalcy

Not all biological measures vary equally. Sodium and potassium can vary within very tight limits because even small deviations from this range can disrupt muscle or nerve function. On the other hand, cholesterol and liver enzymes can vary across a wider range of values: their smaller changes reflect only incidental changes, such as the person's water intake on that day. Hormones are even more dynamic, fluctuating with time of day, age, sex, stress, and nutrition. Interpreting the corresponding numbers on a lab report thus demands more than just numeracy. To do so, a health worker must understand when the sample was collected, how it was tested, and what the patient's clinical picture reveals (or has already revealed).

Every reference range is also determined using a particular mathematical process, and understanding this process can allow health workers to make more informed decisions. Among other things, the distribution of the values of a medical variable is assumed to follow the "68-95-99.7" rule. For instance, if health workers collect blood samples from a number of people and find that the average value is 70 and the standard deviation is 10, the rule says that about 68% of samples score 60-80, about 95% score 50-90, and about 99.7% score 40-100. In other words, the rule helps to visualise how 'spread out' the possible values are and how rare it is for a value to fall far from the mean. The catch here is that not all biological data are symmetrical, that is, fall with equal probability on either side of the mean. For instance, most hormone-related readings are low while a few are extremely high. In such cases, labs select values from the third or the 97th percentiles. For this, they need at least 120 health samples, otherwise their tests won't be reliable.

When we call something "normal," we rarely ask, "normal for whom?"

Laboratory reference ranges are not universal truths but reflect the populations they study. Some parameters, like height, vary widely across gender and ethnicity. A Scandinavian and a South Indian may differ greatly yet both be healthy. People's nutritional and metabolic needs change with age, gender, race, and even occupation. 'Normal' haemoglobin or lipid related values depend on genetics, diet, and the environment. Men have higher red blood cell counts; Africans have lower white cell counts; and Himalayan populations have more haemoglobin. On the other hand, physiological constants such as heart rate or kidney filtration vary little worldwide. As a result, medical interpretation in India demands that we recognise these differences rather than borrow benchmarks wholesale from the West. Unfortunately, for many common laboratory parameters, including haemoglobin, no large, authoritative Indian reference studies exist. As a result, we risk both over diagnosing and underdiagnosing disease. The reference ranges are not natural: they are statistical constructs that people put together by testing others in particular circumstances, with particular assumptions. At the bottom of every lab report is a line written keeping this fact in mind: "Please correlate with clinical findings." To correlate clinically means to bring a number back into the world of people, that is, to listen to a patient's story, examine them, and interpret the number in their full context. For example, a high BMI may signal overweight or, on the positive side, increased muscle mass, which is often the case with athletes. Similarly a borderline thyroid reading may reflect an illness or it could be a normal physiological variation. Ultimately, health workers must go in with a measure of humility that focuses as much on the term "range" as on "reference".

## China's Master Teacher model vs. India's B.Ed.: Why teacher quality depends on better support systems



2012 Justice Verma Commission, which found many colleges were mere "shops." The 2021 UNESCO "No Teacher, No Class" report for India estimated a deficit of over 11 lakh teachers. Government data from 2023-24 reflects this, showing a national teacher vacancy rate of 15.17%. Teacher vacancies are not the biggest problem. Quality is a big concern.

According to UDISE+ (2024-25) data, about 92-93% of India's secondary teachers are "trained," meaning they hold a B.Ed. or equivalent. Yet, the NITI Aayog's School Education Quality Index (SEQI) reveals a massive gap in "Learning Outcomes" across states (e.g., Kerala at 76.6% vs. Uttar Pradesh at 36.4%). This is the core paradox: teachers are qualified on paper but ill-equipped in practice. The B.Ed. teaches theory, but when new graduates face the "shock" of a real classroom, they often fall back on the same rote-learning methods they were taught to avoid. India's training system is failing because its support structure is weak. China's system works because its "middle-tier" is strong, respected, and run by practitioners. Supporting continuous teacher development. But there is an important structural experiment in India. The Delhi government's "Mentor Teacher" program offers a powerful blueprint for how such a system could be designed. Launched in 2016, the program took a cohort of 200 expert, practicing teachers and made them "mentors." Each mentor was tasked with supporting 5-6 schools. This created a "whole system of peer support" designed to be practical. The key takeaway is its design: it replaced a top-down, bureaucratic inspection model with a practitioner-led, peer-mentoring model. It provides a field-tested Indian answer to the "theory-practice gap." And this brings us back to India's new education policy (NEP). The NEP wants to create its own "Master Teachers." It also has the new 4-Year Integrated Teacher Education Program (ITEP), which has already begun its rollout in an initial 57 institutions to replace the B.Ed. The ITEP may be a good start. But the Chinese model shows us that you do not graduate as a master. You become one through years of practice and good mentoring. The path forward is to connect the dots. The new National Mission for Mentoring (NMM), which has a formal implementation "Bluebook" published by the NCTE, should take over the old, broken infrastructure. We should stop the top-down, theory-based workshops. Instead, we should put practitioners in charge, using the Delhi "Mentor Teacher" design as the blueprint. When the new ITEP students go to schools for their internships, they should be assigned as "apprentices" to these certified Master Teachers. China's system shows us the power of an "apprentice" model. India's own Delhi experiment shows us a plausible design. By smartly combining its new policies with this proven, practical structure, India can finally fix its teacher quality crisis and build a generation of masters.

Most education systems in Asia look the same on the surface. They are all about high-stakes exams and intense competition. But a closer look reveals a huge difference in how they create and support their teachers. China and India, the two biggest countries, show this contrast perfectly. China has built a system where expert teachers train their peers. It is a "practice-first" model. These expert teachers are called ming shi, or "Master Teachers." India has a different story. It faces a deep "quality crisis" in how it trains its teachers. The main pathway is through a university degree, the Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.). This model is heavy on theory but often fails in practice. Now, India is launching a huge new National Education Policy (NEP), which includes new ways to train and mentor its teachers. This brings up a big question. As India struggles with its B.Ed. programs, can it learn from the structure of China's "Master Teacher" system? China's model is a case study. It shows that a great teaching force needs a strong support system. It needs a good "middle-tier" that helps teachers grow after they start their jobs. An internal support system China's ming shi system is not some ancient tradition. It is a modern government policy. It creates a formal career path for excellent teachers. It is a clever policy. It gives top teachers a high-status career path that does not require them to quit teaching and become administrators. It also turns these expert teachers into a national resource, a team that can train thousands of others. How do they do it? They use something called a "Master Teacher Studio," or gongzuofang. This is not a physical building. It is a small group, a professional learning club. A Master Teacher leads this group and recruits several "disciple" teachers from nearby schools.

The work in this "studio" is 100% practical. They watch each other's classes, give feedback, and work together to plan better lessons. They research real problems that they face in their own classrooms. This is a formal "mentor-disciple" relationship, and the studio is judged by one thing: did the teachers in the group get better? This creates a powerful drive for real improvement. India's system is different and also crisis-ridden. The pre-service training, the B.Ed. degree, was described as being in a state of "disrepair" by the

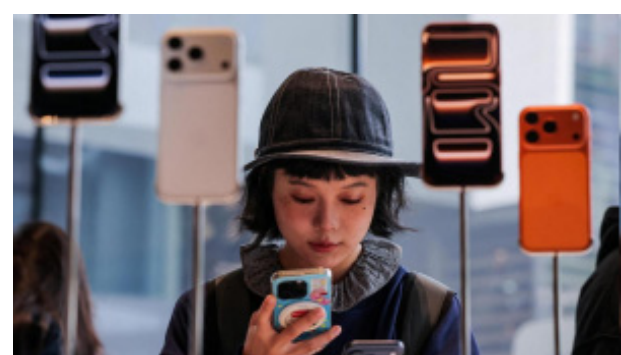
## Between Apple's iPhone 17 series, Samsung Galaxy S25, and Google's Pixel 10 Pro, which one wins the WiFi battle?

In the crowded arena of flagship smartphones, networking performance has quietly become a major battleground. According to new data from Ookla, that compares networking performances of iPhone 17 series and other flagship Android devices, including Pixel 10 Pro, shows just how far networks, silicon and software integration matter. The bottomline is: Apple's strategy of bringing networking hardware in-house is beginning to pay off. At the heart of the iPhone 17 family's performance leap lies the new in-house networking chip, the N1. Previously, Apple's handsets used connectivity chips supplied by Broadcom where Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and other radio functions were outsourced.

With the N1, Apple has made a strategic shift, bringing Wi-Fi 7, Bluetooth 6 and Thread radio support onto a single die under its own control. [On paper the N1 is capped at 160 MHz channel width (while other devices offer up to 320 MHz) but the real-world data tells a more nuanced story.] Ookla's crowdsourced Speedtest Intelligence data shows that the iPhone 17 series has achieved a global median download speed of 329.56 Mbps, while the Pixel 10 Pro-series managed 335.33 Mbps, giving Google's device a narrow edge in median download throughput. However, when one looks at the chip's capabilities in challenging conditions (think for instance, dense residential areas), the iPhone 17 family recorded 56.08 Mbps compared to the Pixel's 53.25 Mbps, suggesting Apple's networking chip boosts resilience in tougher environments.

How does the N1 chip translate into stronger connectivity? The key lies in integration. The N1 unites Wi-Fi 7 (though limited to 160 MHz), Bluetooth 6 and Thread into a single platform, enabling Apple to optimise hardware and software together rather than relying on third-party modules. This shift away from Broadcom means Apple can reduce supply-chain reliance, tune its radios to its own device ecosystem and deliver more consistent performance across environments. Moreover, while the N1 lacks support for full 320 MHz channels, Apple appears to have focused on improving the "floor" of performance by lifting slower speeds more strongly rather than chasing maximums that few users currently experience. That, to put it crudely, translates to clearer WhatsApp calls on a poor network. Practically, the iPhone 17 series tends to hold up better under challenging network conditions, crowded Wi-Fi networks, weaker signal zones or congested bands. The Pixel 10 Pro, on the other hand, edges it at the median in more ideal conditions. For instance, per the Ookla report, in North America, where 6 GHz Wi-Fi and Wi-Fi 7 adoption are relatively higher, the iPhone 17 series posted a median download of 416.14 Mbps and a 90th-percentile download of 976.39 Mbps — both among the highest in the dataset. This is significant given the N1's theoretical limitations in channel width.

## 26 e-commerce platforms declare compliance to eliminate dark patterns

New Delhi: In a major step towards protecting consumer interest in the digital marketplace, 26 leading e-commerce platforms have voluntarily submitted self-declaration letters confirming compliance to eliminate dark patterns, the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution, on Thursday.

The compliance with the Guidelines for Prevention and Regulation of Dark Patterns, 2023, marks a significant milestone in India's efforts to curb deceptive online design practices that mislead or manipulate consumers. "The platforms have conducted internal self-audits or third-party audits to identify, assess, and eliminate any presence of dark patterns. All 26 companies have declared that their platforms are free from dark patterns and do not deploy any manipulative user interface designs," the Ministry said.

The compliance demonstrates a strong commitment towards consumer transparency, fair trade practices, and ethical digital ecosystems. The Central Consumer Protection Authority (CCPA) has also appreciated these declara-

tions and termed them "exemplary." It encouraged other companies to adopt similar self-regulation. To strengthen compliance, CCPA issued an Advisory on 5 June 2025, instructing all e-commerce platforms and online service providers to conduct a mandatory self-audit within three months to detect and eliminate dark patterns. The advisory emphasised transparency, explicit consent, clear disclosures, and non-manipulative design. The CCPA strongly urges all other e-commerce platforms, marketplace entities, service providers, and app developers to follow the example set by these companies. Through the National Consumer Helpline (NCH), social media campaigns, informative videos, and outreach programmes, consumers have been educated about identifying dark patterns and reporting them," the Ministry said. "Such complaints are being systematically addressed, and enforcement action is being contemplated wherever necessary," it added. The CCPA has reaffirmed that it is maintaining a close watch on potential violations and will not hesitate to act against errant platforms.





## Parties make last-minute push as campaigning ends

With campaigning for the zila parishad and block samiti elections ending on Friday, political parties in Punjab intensified their last-minute efforts to woo voters ahead of Sunday's polling. A total of 1.36 crore rural voters — about 63.5 per cent of Punjab's total electorate (2.14 crore) as per the 2024 Lok Sabha rolls — are eligible to cast their votes. AAP ministers and MLAs remained focused on comparing the party's performance since 2022 with previous governments, while SAD president Sukhbir Singh Badal continued to emphasise the development works undertaken during former CM Parkash Singh Badal's tenure. BJP's state leadership, including working president Ashwani Sharma, highlighted central schemes, asserting that key funding for Punjab's rural works has come from the Union government. AAP's final-day outreach

On Friday, cabinet ministers Aman Arora and Harbhajan Singh ETO campaigned in the Jandiola Guru area of Amritsar, while Finance Minister Harpal Singh Cheema addressed meetings in his constituency, Dirba. Cheema told voters, "Opponents mocked us when we promised 300 units of free power, but today more than 90 per cent households are getting zero bills. We have given thousands of jobs, and we continue to deliver on our promises."

However, the campaign saw controversy on Thursday after Sangrur MLA Narinder Kaur Bharaj alleged during a rally in Jhaneri village (Bhawanigarh) that an independent candidate — allegedly involved in selling poppy husk and liquor — had earlier sought help from AAP functionaries to evade cases and was now contesting against the party's candidate. "Such people will only engage in hooliganism if elected," she said in her speech. The BJP reacted sharply, sharing her video on its Facebook page with the caption: "MLA admits her people are selling drugs. If the govern-

ment is saving culprits, how can drugs end?" Development grants resurface Villagers in Thui (Nabha block, Patiala) posted a video thanking the Punjab government for releasing Rs 50 lakh each to 149 villages where Guru Tegh Bahadur had visited, and gurdwaras have come up in those places. Though the scheme was announced earlier to mark the 350th martyrdom year of the Guru, the thanksgiving video has been shared by AAP Punjab on its social media handle while the rural poll campaign is going on. Apart from these, sources indicated that many villages are being promised development grants if AAP candidates win by large margins. SAD focuses on Parkash Singh Badal's legacy Sukhbir Singh Badal, campaigning in Gidderbaha on Thursday and in Bathinda and Ferozepur on Friday, reiterated that the "maximum development in Punjab happened under Parkash Singh Badal." He told voters that Badal ended waterlogging in Gidderbaha and launched welfare schemes such as free atta-dal and free power for tubewells. Calling for support to SAD candidates, he said, "Voting en masse for SAD will be a true tribute to Parkash Singh Badal." He also attacked the Congress governments of the past six decades, challenging them to name "one major work" they did for Punjab. BJP highlights illegal mining, central schemes BJP working president and Pathankot MLA Ashwani Sharma campaigned across rural areas of his constituency on Thursday and Friday. He said the BJP was receiving "immense support", adding that illegal mining remained a core issue. Sharma cited posters in parts of Anandpur Sahib — represented by AAP minister Harjot Singh Bains — where locals have demanded action against rampant mining. "The government must answer on real issues," he said. Throughout the campaign, Opposition parties accused the ruling AAP of misusing official machinery. A viral audio clip allegedly involving Patiala SSP Varun Sharma on rural polls also became contentious. Poll details Punjab has 23 zila parishads with 357 constituencies, of which elections will be held in 342. Fifteen candidates — 12 in Tarn Taran and three in Amritsar, all from AAP — have already been elected unopposed. A total of 1,265 candidates are contesting the remaining seats. In the 2,863 constituencies across 154 block samitis, 181 candidates have been elected unopposed: 98 (Tarn Taran), 63 (Amritsar), 17 (Hoshiarpur), 2 (Malerkotla) and 1 (SBS Nagar). Except for one independent in SBS Nagar, all are from AAP. Polling will be held for the remaining 2,682 seats, where 8,314 candidates are in the fray. In total, 196 candidates across both tiers have been elected unopposed, while 9,579 remain in contention.

## Kolkata Metro expansion: Why Railways couldn't take forward the Barrackpore-Kalyani metro corridor

Kolkata Metro Barrackpore Kalyani Metro Corridor Update: In recent years, Kolkata Metro has expanded at a remarkable pace. While the network grew only from 28 km between 1972 and 2014 — a span of 42 years — it added another 17 km from 2014 to 2025, reaching a total of 45 km. However, several metro projects in the 'City of Joy' continue to face delays, largely due to land acquisition challenges. Amid this progress, an interesting question arises: why did the Ministry of Railways — under which Kolkata Metro operates — decide not to move forward with the Barrackpore-Kalyani metro corridor even after completing the survey? ## Haryana rights panel orders stringent action, joint raids on mining and pollution in Bhiwani

The Haryana Human Rights Commission (HHRC) has taken significant action in response to complaints alleging illegal mining, air pollution, and unauthorised operation of industrial units in Khanak village of Bhiwani district. The Commission has directed multiple departments to intensify monitoring and initiate strict enforcement against the deteriorating air quality in the region. The Full Commission — comprising chairperson Justice Lalit Batra and members Kuldeep Jain and Deep Bhatia — has directed the Haryana State Pollution Control Board (HSPCB) and the Bhiwani Mining Department to conduct regular, random inspections across Khanak and surrounding villages.

"The inspections will include mining sites, stone crushers, hot mix plants, and tyre pyrolysis units. The Commission also ordered that the Sarpanch of Khanak and local villagers be made part of these inspection teams to ensure transparency and community involvement. The Commission highlighted the significance of tyre pyrolysis units, which operate by heating old tyres at 350-600°C in the absence of oxygen to extract useful by-products," Commission's spokesperson Dr Puneet Arora said. In compliance with an earlier order dated August 19, HSPCB and the Mining Department submitted detailed reports on November 17. According to these reports, mining activities being carried out by Haryana State Industrial & Infrastructure Development

Corporation (HSIIDC) in Khanak since December 2016 are operating within legal parameters, with no evidence of illegal mining. Joint inspections and continuous monitoring have confirmed adherence to environmental safety measures.

Air quality data recorded between November 5 and 12 shows that although the Khanak region experiences dust-related pollution, Bhiwani city reported even higher AQI levels on most days, often falling into the 'very poor' category. The findings suggest that the pollution issue extends beyond the mining belt and affects the wider district. "The Commission reviewed additional environmental initiatives reported by authorities. Under the GRAP Stage-III guidelines, several units have been temporarily shut down, and their three-phase electricity connections have been disconnected for violations. Two major projects — planting 2,080 saplings along the Tosham-Hisar Road and deploying three truck-mounted anti-smog guns — have been approved at the district level and forwarded for final sanction. Both initiatives will be funded through the Environment Compensation (EC) Fund," Dr Arora added. Officers stated that most stone crushers and all tyre pyrolysis units are either closed or complying with the regulations, he said. Despite official closure directives, the Commission has noted that complaints alleging clandestine operation of tyre pyrolysis plants, stone crushers, and hot mix plants persisted. In response, the HHRC has instructed the deputy commissioner, superintendent of police, regional officer of HSPCB, and sub-divisional magistrate and deputy superintendent of police of Tosham to ensure rigorous enforcement. "Authorities must deploy adequate police force and form joint enforcement teams to conduct surprise raids. Any machinery, vehicles, or materials found operating in violation of closure orders are to be seized immediately," the Commission ordered. "Due to the seriousness of allegations and the findings so far, senior officers from the HSPCB, Mines and Geology Department, district administration, and local monitoring authorities have been directed to submit a comprehensive compliance report. The next hearing is scheduled for February 17, 2026," Dr Arora said.

## BJP to fight 140-150 seats, Sena on 80-90 seats; to contest as Mahayuti

The BJP and the Shiv Sena will contest the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) elections together as alliance partners and have reached an agreement on seat-sharing, state BJP president Ravindra Chavan said on Friday. Highly placed sources in both parties hinted that the BJP is likely to contest 140-150 seats, while the Shiv Sena may field candidates in 80-90 seats. The BMC has a total of 227 seats. Other parties, including the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) and Republican Party of India (Athawale), will be part of the Mahayuti alliance.

"The upcoming local body elections will be contested under the Mahayuti banner," Chavan said, addressing the media in Nagpur. He said the decision was taken at a meeting convened by Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde, minister Chandrashekar Bawankule and himself. An identical decision was taken at the BJP's core committee meeting held separately, he added. The Mahayuti will contest as one for all other major municipal corporation polls, including Thane. "The details regarding the seat-sharing formula will be mutually decided by top state leaders with alliance partners," Chavan said. The development comes after more than a month of acrimonious clashes between the BJP and Eknath Shinde-led Shiv Sena. "Under Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Fadnavis, development remains an integral aspect of governance in Maharashtra. We believe that to push development, we have to collectively contest the polls," Chavan said. The municipal corporation elections, including those



for the BMC, are likely to be held in January 2026, according to Chavan. However, this will depend on how the Other Backward Classes (OBC) reservation matter plays out before the Supreme Court. Unofficially, sources indicated that the BJP and Shiv Sena would show flexibility and strike a consensus through give-and-take. Initially, the BJP had signalled its intent to contest at least 150 seats, while the Shiv Sena was seeking not fewer than 100. It is now believed that the BJP would settle for 140 to 150 seats and the Shiv Sena for 80 to 90 seats. In the 2017 BMC polls, the undivided Shiv Sena led by Uddhav Thackeray and the BJP contested the BMC polls separately. The Shiv Sena won 84 seats, and the BJP 82. Post elections, they formed an alliance in the BMC. For the upcoming BMC polls, the BJP has resolved to wrest control from the Uddhav Thackeray-led Shiv Sena (UBT).

## Why is Mumbai experiencing so many water cuts even as lake levels are at 3-year high

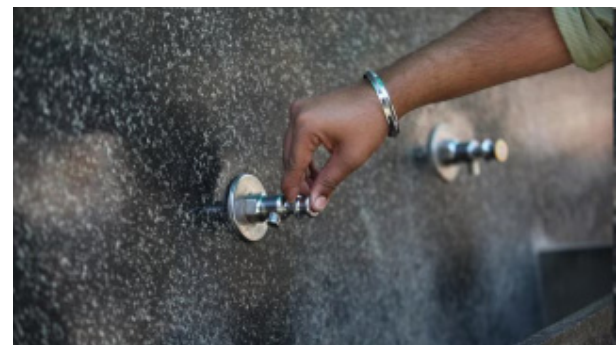

Over the past 10 days, at least three major water cuts have been implemented across Mumbai, starting with an 18-hour disruption affecting Kandivli and Borivali pockets between December 4 and 5. This was followed by a 15 per cent water suspension, which impacted more than half of Mumbai, including 17 wards, from December 8 to December 9. These ongoing water cuts have occurred despite the water stock in the seven lakes supplying water to Mumbai being at a three-year high. As of Friday, December 12, the total stock in these lakes reached 11.99 lakh million litres, or nearly 83 per cent of their total capacity. In comparison, last year, the stock on the same day was 78 per cent, and in 2021, it dropped to 75.11 per cent. Despite the above-average rainfall leading to increased lake levels, Mumbai is experiencing these water cuts, which senior civic officers attribute to ongoing augmentation works. What has caused recent water cuts? According to senior officers from the BMC's hydraulic department, the isolated water cuts have been planned to commission new water channels across several parts of the city.

"Several new water tunnels have been laid to replace the century-old water mains supplying water to the city. However, the tunnels cannot be commissioned without the connections. Consequently, several isolated cuts have been planned to make connections to these new channels. For instance, the first water cut was implemented between December 1 and 2 around Chembur area to facilitate connections to the new Amar Mahal tunnel. Later, between December 8 and 9, the removal of an old 100-year-old main from the Tansa channel was carried out," an officer from the civic hydraulic department explained. Regarding the current water suspension in three wards of Mumbai, officials stated that cross-connection work for transferring the water supply from Upper Vaitarna to Vaitarna is underway. "Since we were observing the festive season in the previous months, we had to plan all our water connections in this month to prevent any disruptions. As a result, several water cuts are being implemented in parts of Mumbai," said a BMC officer. "These essential development projects aim to improve and augment the water supply in Mumbai. However, emergency works may also be initiated in response to sudden issues, such as pipe bursts," the officer added.

How will the new connections aid water supply?

Mumbai's water demands are met by seven lakes — Tulsi, Vihar, Bhatsa, Tansa, Upper Vaitarna, Middle Vaitarna, and Modak Sagar. Water from these lakes situated in the



suburbs of Mumbai or neighbouring districts of Thane and Nashik is supplied to the city through a labyrinth network of water conveyance systems. However, most of the water channels were laid decades ago with many laid in the British era. To replace the aging infrastructure, the civic body is undertaking projects to construct new water conveyance tunnels. Unlike the older tunnels, the new ones have larger diameters and can transport greater volumes of water at maximum efficiency.

"Considering the rising water demands of the city, all the new water tunnels are significantly wider than their predecessors to enhance carrying capacity. The primary goal of these projects is to augment and improve the water supply in Mumbai," an officer told The Indian Express. In addition to the ongoing connection works, the BMC is also enhancing several existing water channels. Among the tunnel projects nearing completion are the Amar Mahal to Parel water tunnel in Trombay and a water tunnel linking Ghatkopar to Powai, officers said. The BMC has also planned a new project involving an 8.7 km-long conveyance tunnel that will connect the upcoming sewage treatment plant (STP) at Dharavi with the BMC's water filtration plant at Bhandup.

The need to increase water supply Surrounded by seas, Mumbai relies solely on the monsoon to cater to its potable water demands. During the four months of the monsoon, the catchment areas of the seven lakes, which have a collective capacity of 14.47 lakh million litres, get replenished. Currently, the city's water resources are able to supply only 3,950 MLD daily, as against the actual demand of 4,505 MLD. As the region experiences an increase in heatwave days during the summer, leading to faster evaporation, coupled with population growth and delayed monsoons, the municipal body is struggling to meet Mumbai's water needs.



## Fan experiences, lack of a Test No. 3, political instability – the messes, on and off field, that need cleaning up

I hope the suits who run sports remember this: the game does not breathe in boardrooms, it breathes in the stands. In 2025, two moments laid bare how far fans have slipped down the priority list — both ending in tragedy: a stampede in Bengaluru, then chaos in Kolkata. There were other times when the disregard was less dramatic but just as telling. In Ahmedabad, those trying to catch the India-South Africa T20 action chased water instead. In Delhi, they were lathi-charged for wanting to see Kohli. At the India Open, badminton was watched from broken, filthy chairs. The list is endless. Sport survives because people call in sick at work, spend their last rupee on costly flights and match-day tickets (laying hands on them is another task) and raise their voices from the stands. The least they deserve is drinkable water, clean toilets, sturdy seats and dignity.

No more fiascos With the hosting rights of the 2030 Commonwealth Games in the pocket, and an active bid for the hosting rights of the 2036 Olympics, India is actively trying to place itself as a favourable sporting destination. However, the memories of the last time India hosted a big international event in the form of the 2010 Commonwealth Games remain fresh. A recent incident at the World Para Athletics Championships in New Delhi, where two coaches were bitten by a stray dog led to further embarrassment. The Messi GOAT tour fiasco in Kolkata only added to that, effectively implying that there are visible gaps when it comes to India's management of big-scale events. The 2026 Badminton World Championships are scheduled in August and will be hosted in New Delhi; one can only hope that there is no moment there that turns into another tale of embarrassment.

The 2026 FIFA World Cup will be the biggest till date with 48 teams, but with the Donald Trump administration imposing partial or total travel bans on citizens of several participating countries, there is uncertainty over who would be allowed in, whether they are fans or officials of national football federations. People from Iran and Haiti, two countries that have qualified for the tournament, are banned from entering the United States. Others like Senegal and Ivory Coast face additional travel restrictions. This will be the first World Cup co-hosted by three countries — the US, Canada and Mexico — which don't see eye to eye on all matters. How they and individual US host cities, as well as the federal government, welcome the world would be looked at with interest. A team that had not been beaten at home since

2012 has been whitewashed twice in two years (New Zealand 3-0 in 2024, South Africa 2-0 in 2025) in their backyard. Although there have been sparkling moments when the inexperienced side managed to square the series in England, the disappointing series against South Africa raised questions about the health of Test cricket in the country.

India failed to reach the WTC Final last year and are placed 6th on the table in the current cycle. Four Tests in Sri Lanka and New Zealand, and one at home against Afghanistan, will be plenty to show if India can improve to be as good in whites as they are in blues. For 27 years since 1996, India's premier Test batting greats at No. 4 were guarded with utmost surety by their immediate predecessors. Grafters of assured mind, wrists and feet, the likes of Rahul Dravid and Cheteshwar Pujara, were products of the domestic game that now lies in bits and pieces. Devoid of a dependable system, the Ranji Trophy cannot immediately produce a clone to fill India's great No. 3 void anymore.

Even as the top Test nations grip with the falling standards of the No.3, India seems the least equipped in their transition. They have drafted four men in their last nine games under a new captain, and the most recent home debacle only protracted this specific woe. With a largely dormant first semester ahead, India will have time on their hands to prepare and zero in on a No. 3, but will one resounding name emerge from India's domestic wilderness? This one is less looking forward to, more watch in mild amusement. Nothing screams the confluence of the American political right and a combat sport that caters to that spectrum wholeheartedly more than a bevy of mixed martial art title fights on the lawn of the White House.

The Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC), whose president Dana White campaigned for Donald Trump, will be holding a fight event with some of the best fighters in the world clamouring over each other to be a part of the event under the eyes of the American president. In a year filled to the brim with a FIFA World Cup, a T20 World Cup, a Commonwealth and an Asian Games, as well as multiple World Championships, nothing like a little break from serious sport to watch modern-day gladiators appease their ruling overlords in 2026. When Kedar Jadhav, former India batter, screamed "Ghar ma ghushi ne maris" in Gujarati when his former team Chennai Super Kings beat Gujarat Titans a few years back in the IPL final in Ahmedabad, it brought a smile. Hope floated that the cricket commentary in various regional languages would also take the next step beyond amusement and offer insightful commentary. They — be it Tamil or Bhojpuri — have certainly catered to the people who aren't that comfortable with English or Hindi, but the real letdown has been the English and Hindi commentary over the years. Will 2026 change that? Some of the players who joined the commentary world in the last decade have been more or less disappointing. It's time they move beyond parochialism and mind-numbing cliches. This is not to say that they need to get too serious and 'boring'. A look at Pakistan's A Sports, fronted by Wasim Akram and Waqar Younis, can be a good example of how to marry fun with insight.

## 'Too many World Cups, so it's little bit of an overkill': R Ashwin urges ICC to follow FIFA's pattern to hold marquee event once in 4 years

R Ashwin on too many World Cups 2025 had the Champions Trophy tournament for the men and the ODI World Cup for the women while 2026 will host both the Men's as well as the Women's T20 World Cups. (AP) Ravichandran Ashwin urged the International Cricket Council (ICC) to reconsider their scheduling, saying that nowadays every year has a marquee tournament like a World Cup and a Champions Trophy which are there mainly because of revenue generation. 2025 had the Champions Trophy tournament for the men and the ODI World Cup for the women while 2026 will host both the Men's as well as the Women's T20 World Cups.

"The ODI format has become redundant and to top it, ICC needs to see how they are conducting these World

Cups. Every year, there is an ICC tournament for revenue generation pattern, but look at how FIFA is doing it. There are leagues (EPL, La Liga, Serie A, Bundesliga) happening and they do their World Cup once in every four years. The World Cup has value as it's a marquee tournament. (But in cricket) too many bilaterals, too many formats, too many World Cups, so it's little bit of an overkill," Ashwin said on his YouTube channel 'Ash Ki Baat'.

While many like the legendary Sachin Tendulkar have suggested a split-innings format for one-dayers to revive them, Ashwin said that having just one 50-over event, the World Cup every four years, could also be a possible option. "If you really want to make ODI cricket relevant, then just play these (T20s) leagues and play ODI World Cup once in four years. So when people turn up for events, there will be sense of expectation. (Otherwise) I feel it (ODI cricket) is going towards slow death," he said. Ashwin had also opined that the ODIs might struggle once established stars like Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma retire from it, adding that the format was once amazing that produced a player like Mahendra Singh Dhoni, who knew how to control the innings as required by the game then. "... Dhoni (would) take singles for 10-15 overs before he went berserk at the end. You don't have players like that (Dhoni) anymore. There isn't any requirement to play like that, as you are playing with two new balls and five fielders inside circle," said Ashwin, asserting that modern ODIs are either a 'BashaThon' or a tale of collapse if the wicket happens to be slightly difficult," he said.

## Todd Murphy is hopeful for spinners having a big role in Sydney Test

Australian off-spinner Todd Murphy is hopeful of spinners having a role in the fifth and final Test of the Ashes 2025-26 series at Sydney Cricket Ground. Spin hasn't played much of a role in the ongoing series, with pacers dominating the proceedings right from the Perth Test. The SCG has historically favoured spinners. While England have sidelined their frontline spinner, Shoaib Bashir, in the four Tests so far, Nathan Lyon too has had only a limited role to play for Australia. However, with Lyon out due to injury and the Sydney Cricket Ground being a favoured venue for spin-

ners, Murphy has reasons to believe that he might have a big role to play in his debut home Test. "I don't think going into the series there was ever that planning or idea that spin wouldn't play a role. I think it's sort of just been how it's eventuated. I think it'll evolve from year to year. Next year it could be completely different," said Murphy. Murphy has picked 22 wickets in seven Tests thus far, all of which have come away from home. He also understands that Lyon will always be a first-choice spinner for Australia at home. "(When I made my debut) I probably understood back then it was never going to be linear for me. I was never going to keep my place in the team when Nathan came back and I was always going to have to go back through Shield cricket and keep developing. At that stage I was only 23 so I still felt like I had a long way to go to be at my best. I still feel like I'm trying to discover that as well and continuing to get better. It's been a couple of years there where I've just been working away and trying to find the best version of myself," he said. Speaking about the conditions at SCG, he said: "I think it definitely can spin. We've played on some BBL wickets here where it has taken spin. I've only played a couple of Shield games and don't think it's ever done anything extraordinary out there. I don't think recently it's been massive spin but there's still been a big part of the game that spin played."

## Stuart Broad heaps praise on Josh Tongue: 'Has done himself the world of good being on this Ashes trip'

After a match-winning bowling performance in the fourth Ashes Test in Melbourne that saw host England win their first Test against Australia Down Under after 5468 days, fast bowler Josh Tongue's stocks have gone up. A five-wicket haul in the first innings and two scalps in the second, Tongue was the pick of England's pace attack, which led the way for a win after three humiliating losses.

Having missed out on the first two Tests in Perth and Brisbane, Tongue made a serious impact ever since his

inclusion in the playing XI in the Adelaide Test. A four-wicket haul in the second innings of the Adelaide game, followed by a total of seven wickets in Melbourne, Tongue has 12 wickets in two Tests of the series. Former England fast bowler Stuart Broad said Tongue should have played more Tests in the series, and England missed the trick by not including him in the Gabba Test. While evaluating England's pace bowlers, Broad also said Tongue has done himself a world of good in this tour. "Tongue should have played more. He was the Player of the Match in Melbourne and you look now and think did England miss a trick not playing him, certainly at The Gabba and maybe even at Optus Stadium in the first Test?," Broad said to Sky Sports. "He exposes a full length, has got Steve Smith out three times in Test cricket and twice in county cricket, and bowls with a slightly different angle: wider of the crease, but can move the ball away. He needs protecting in the sense that he is going to bowl bad balls, so you need someone in the bowling attack that will defend and hold an area, but Tongue has done himself the world of good being on this trip," he added. Yet to make his T20I debut, Tongue was included in England's provisional squad for the upcoming ICC 2026 T20 World Cup, set to take place in India. England will lock horn with Australia at Sydney Cricket Ground for the fifth and last Test of the tour. The Test will start on 4 January.

## Sabalenka wants rematch of 'Battle of Sexes' showdown vs Kyrgios: 'I love revenge'

World top-ranked women's player Belarus' Aryna Sabalenka said she wants a rematch of her "Battle of the Sexes" exhibition game against Australia's Nick Kyrgios. "I think I would definitely do it again," said Sabalenka ahead of the Brisbane International, her season-opening tournament as the World No. 1 prepares for the Australian Open, which starts from January 18. Sabalenka said she would like to get revenge on Kyrgios after losing 6-3, 6-3 in the "Battle of Sexes" event in Dubai. "I love revenge and I don't like to leave it the way it is." The Battle of Sexes event modified the typical rules of tennis that divided the fans. Sabalenka's side of the court was reduced in size by nine percent in an attempt to restrict Kyrgios' power and speed advantage, while each player only received one serve. Sabalenka also said she would want a full court and two serves this time. "I think for the next match we will come up with a different format. Before the match I didn't realise I would have to adjust and it was a bit tricky for me. I think I would keep the full court but I would take two serves. That would even our level a lot more," she said. "I always say that when you are losing, you are learning and I learned a lot about his game. I would do it again. I need revenge," she added. The



Sabalenka-Kyrgios showdown faced backlash, with some calling it a "money grab" while others said it did little to promote the women's game. But Sabalenka felt that the exhibition tennis game was important. "I think it's really important for tennis to keep it interesting, keep it fresh, keep it new, keep it fun," she said. "I am happy that I was able to challenge him, make him work and make him physically get tired and mentally get tired. I felt really excited to see a man getting tired and going for his full game. It was a really cool experience," added Sabalenka.

## 'Could not walk for two days': Stefanos Tsitsipas reveals why he considered retiring from tennis in 2025

Former Australian Open and French Open finalist Stefanos Tsitsipas has said that he considered retiring from tennis due to a serious back pain in 2025. The 27-year-old said he was left petrified about his future after he could not walk for two days, following his loss at the 2025 US Open. "I would ask, 'Can I play another match without pain?'" I got really scared after the US Open loss (to Germany's Daniel Altmaier). I could not walk for two days. That's when you reconsider the future of your career," the Greek said.

"I'm most excited to see how my actual training responds with regard to my back. My biggest concern was if I could finish a match," he added. Tsitsipas said that his biggest goal for the upcoming year was to ensure he finished matches and did not have to withdraw due to injuries. He also said he wished to win the United Cup for 2026, before the Australian Open. "My biggest win for 2026 would be to not have to worry about finishing matches. It makes great feedback knowing you had a pre-season without pain — I hope it stays that way. I want to deliver for 2026 and the United Cup. I went to actually visit one of the best sports doctors in the world, and he so far is promising to heal me. I'm hoping this stays for 2026." "The thing that I'm most excited about is trying to see my actual training that I've been putting in the last couple of weeks and how it responds in regards also to my back, because my biggest concern has been: can I actually finish a match?" "I put in the work. The most important thing is full belief that I can come back to where I was. I will try everything to do that," he said. Tsitsipas will represent Greece in the United Cup, with the team grouped with Great Britain and Japan, who will have the likes of Emma Raducanu and Naomi Osaka. The tournament will run from January 2-11, ending a week before the start of the Australian Open, which begins on January 18.

"I am not sure about future of ODI after 2027 World Cup. I am a little worried about it. Of course, I am following Vijay Hazare Trophy but the manner in which I followed SMAT, I am finding slightly difficult to follow," Ashwin, India's second highest Test wicket-taker of all time with 537 scalps, said on his YouTube channel 'Ash Ki Baat'.

Ashwin said that he feels Test cricket will continue to have its space even in the age of T20s, but he is not sure if fans want to see too much ODI cricket at the expense of either. "Also, we need to know what audience wants to watch. I feel Test cricket still has space but ODI cricket, I truly feel (it) doesn't have the space," said Ashwin, who also took 156 wickets in 116 ODIs. "Look, Rohit and Virat came back to Vijay Hazare Trophy and people started watching it. We have known that sport is always bigger than individuals but at times these players (Ro-Ko) need to come back to make the game relevant," he observed.

"Vijay Hazare Trophy (national one-dayers), of course, is a domestic competition that not a lot of people follow, but they did (so now) because Virat and Rohit were playing. Even then, what happens when they stop playing ODIs?" he wondered. The lack of ODI cricket is also something that has resulted in Kohli and Rohit playing the Vijay Hazare Trophy, with chief selector Ajit Agarkar stating that the two veteran players may need to play in the domestic 50-over competition earlier in the year due to the bilaterals being played in the format dwindling in recent years. Both Rohit and Kohli retired from Test cricket earlier this year and T20Is after winning the T20 World Cup last year, making the ODI format the only one they are active in.

## Media barricaded at the back, fan clubs in front in Bollywood: Paparazzi say stars have created a 'jhoothi duniya'

There has been a lot of debate around paparazzi culture in the Hindi film industry, especially after Jaya Bachchan's scathing remark against photographers over their behaviour and presence. Recently, Varinder Chawla, a Bollywood paparazzo with over 25 years of experience, spoke about the issue and admitted that while paparazzi have their own contacts, they are often called by PR teams to events to create a crowd. Speaking to Hindi Rush, Varinder said, "Earlier, when I used to work with my father, we used to get invitations for events, and even today we get invitations for events like trailer launches, parties and more. However, when celebrities step out to do interviews, we get a tip-off. However, we don't get tip-offs for their every outing."

He added, "For airport spotting, we have teams active 24/7. This includes the private airport of Mumbai. Our boys have sources from inside the airport who tell them about which celebrity is coming and going. So to say we are called everywhere by the PR is wrong. There is a paparazzi culture, and our boys have even learned the car numbers of actors." "PR teams call photographers to show crowd and to make actors happy" Varinder spoke about how PR teams of actors often call many photographers who are not associated with known paparazzi brands just to show a crowd at venues. "I went to an event recently, and I saw so many photographers there that I asked the PR, 'Who are they?' Because the PR had told me that only limited media was invited. But the PR told me that he needed 60 people at the venue, so he called those photographers and filled the space with them." He added, "Actors have to understand that their PR team isn't just calling the limited four paps but so many others, and they don't even know who they are. Whether they are YouTubers or somebody else, and then they pass bad comments on actors."

Fan club crowd preferred over journalists Talking about how actors prefer fan club crowds over journalists because they like hearing good things about themselves, Varinder said, "In today's time, if there is a trailer launch or any other event, when media is invited, you will see people from the fan clubs at the back. They want shor-sharaba of fan clubs to make the actor happy. Then why are they calling senior



journalists? They don't even let journalists ask questions and the fan clubs just make a lot of noise for the actor and then leave." "SRK's Jawan trailer launch had media barricaded at the back and fan clubs in front

Journalist Hina Kumawat spoke about Shah Rukh Khan-starrer Jawan's trailer launch and how the fan club crowd was placed in front while the media was seated at the back and were not allowed to ask questions. "They had put barricades during the Jawan trailer launch, where the media was placed behind, and none of the journalists were in front. The people from the fan clubs were sitting in the front." Journalist Vickey Lalwani spoke about the paid culture in the Hindi film industry, where even crowds are bought. He said, "This paid culture is here to stay. Earlier I used to think only politicians call people to listen to their lectures, but now even stars call such people and even media houses. During interviews, the 200 people sitting in the audience are all paid. Take any platform, nobody from that 200 crowd of audience will ask discomfoting or tough questions." Heena added, "During the promotion of a film, the makers do a package deal with the PR in which the PR promises to bring 60 media, but what they don't tell the makers is that 40 from that 60 is paid media."

## Akshaye Khanna scolded Mukesh Chhabra when he first proposed Dhurandhar: 'I don't even live in Mumbai'



Dhurandhar boasts a powerhouse ensemble with actors like Akshaye Khanna, Sanjay Dutt, Rakesh Bedi and Arjun Rampal playing pivotal roles, often even overshadowing lead star Ranveer Singh's performance. And then we all jumped on it," Mukesh said.

Mukesh went on to reveal Akshaye Khanna's reaction when he first proposed the film to him. "I honestly hadn't watched Chhaava then. But I called him. Unhone pehle mujhe daanta [He first scolded me]. He said, 'Paagal ho gaya hai kya [Have you gone crazy]?' I asked him to at least hear me out once," he said.

Akshaye Khanna kept smoking while listening to Dhurandhar script. Mukesh shared that after persistent efforts, Akshaye finally agreed to meet him and director Aditya Dhar and even drove himself to their office. "I asked him to come to the office. He said, 'Main toh yahan rehna hi nahi hoon. Bol kahan aana hai (I don't even live here. Tell me where you want to meet me?)'" Recalling the meeting and the moment Akshaye agreed to do the film, Mukesh said, "He came and sat for four hours. He quietly listened. He kept smoking. However, their doubts were finally cleared when Akshaye called and confirmed his willingness to be part of the film. "He called me and said, 'Let's do it, bro,'" Mukesh recalled. He is set to make his Telugu debut as the film Mahakali director Puja Kolluru posted behind-the-scenes photos with the actor from the sets of the film. She posted a selfie with the actor and they both are seen smiling for the camera in the sunny weather. Mahakali is a part of the superhero universe PVCU, which includes films like HanuMan, Jai Hanuman and Adhira. In September, the makers had shared Akshaye's look from the film as Shukracharya.

## TV actor Arjun Bijlani's father-in-law passes away at 73



Actor Arjun Bijlani and his family began the New Year on a sombre note after the sudden passing of his father-in-law, Rakesh Chandra Swami. The tragic news came while Arjun and his wife, Neha Bijlani, were on their New Year vacation in Dubai, prompting the couple to rush back to Mumbai. According to a family member, Rakesh Chandra Swami had been on a ventilator since Monday evening following a medical emergency. Despite medical intervention, he could not survive and passed away on Thursday morn-

ing. He was 73 and is survived by his son Nishank and daughter Neha.

## Ikkis movie review: Agastya Nanda-Dharmendra film is a solid start to 2026, a war film that's deeply anti-war



Ikkis movie review: "Ikkis," responds a young soldier when asked his age by a senior officer, his face thickly smeared by birthday cake. Twenty-one, when you come properly of age. Second Lt Arun Khetarpal did not live to be 22: he fought with his last breath on that climactic December day of the 1971 Indo-Pak war, becoming the youngest Army officer to be awarded a Param Vir Chakra. Rather than just a straight-up war film about a young man's exemplary courage, Ikkis is also an exploration of the harrowing fallout of conflict. And that makes Sriram Raghavan's latest, co-written by him, Arijit Biswas and Pooja Ladha Surti, stand out from the overwhelmingly jingoistic, disturbingly violent features of the past few years.

Yes, soldiers are trained to kill, and dying for their country is part of the job description, but the battlefield in Ikkis, while stained red with human blood, stays away from gratuitous violence. The nobility of men who have spent their lives in the armed forces is a key feature of this film, sometimes going overboard with it. But if you ask me what I'd prefer: watching the feeling of bhaichara amongst a visiting Indian and a group of Pakistanis in the former's old house in a village on the other side of the border, or men taking pleasure in flaying limbs, the choice is a no-brainer. The raring-to-go Arun (Agastya Nanda) is sent off to his first war by his father Retd Brigadier Madan Khetarpal (Dharmendra) and his mother (Suhasini Mulay) in the way fauji families

do: with an encouraging pat on the back, keeping fear in check. The training, under the beady eye of the Lt Colonel (Rahul Dev), experienced Risaldar Sagat Singh (Sikander Kher), along with mate Capt Vijendra Malhotra (Vivaan Shah), is briskly conducted, with Arun learning to love his tank, which he is ordered to take into battle at Basantar, a border village overrun by Pakistani tanks.

The martyred Khetarpal's exploits are well documented in war records, making you wonder how 'real' were the portions that show the budding romance between the fresh-faced soldier and a pretty young lady (Simar Bhatia). The film splices scenes of the battle, with those of Madan's retracing his son's final route, guided by his Pakistani host Brigadier Khwaja Mohammad Naseer (Jaideep Ahlawat), who is nursing a long-held, heartbreaking secret. You may be reminded of a few great American war films — Oliver Stone's trilogy, Steven Spielberg's Saving Private Ryan — in Sriram Raghavan's determined anti-war strain, which runs right through the 142-minute narrative. The spoils can be counted, but no one really wins: the human losses are on 'both sides', and both Madan and Naseer are indelibly marked by that tragic face-off. The back-and-forth between the timelines is distracting, a couple of the cuts calling attention to themselves. And while Dharmendra's presence is poignant, this being his last film — I teared up in a few places, especially when he speaks of the once-unified 'watan' and 'mitti' — he is held back by his halting dialogue delivery, and pace. Nanda's slightly unformed mien works well for his newbie-ness. Bhatia is good as the spirited girlfriend; of the ensemble which constitutes the battalion, Kher leaps out. But this film belongs as much to Ahlawat who, as always, steals every scene in the way he melds long-held regret and resilience, and in the way he goes about making amends. A solid start to 2026, Ikkis is a war film which makes you feel in a way that movies these days are not either able to or want to: the two ISI men who are following the two generals' car are only doing their job, as are the men who go into battle, intent upon saving their countrymen.
