BRS, Congress vie for Mahabubabad municipal chairperson post

Mahabubabad: As the main rivals Congress and BRS in Mahabubabad Municipality did not get a clear majority, the independents have become crucial in the selection of the chairperson.

In Mahabubabad Municipality, which has 36 councillor seats, all the parties are far from the magic figure of 19. With this, both these parties have been devising strategies to win the municipality. While the Congress won in 13 wards, the CPI (M) won in three places and with the support of the CPM, its strength reached 16. BRS won 11 seats and CPI won three seats, with their support, BRS’s strength reached 14 seats.

PM Modi inaugurates Brahmaputra bridge, IIM and data centre in Assam

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated a major bridge over the Brahmaputra, unveiled IIM Guwahati and launched a regional data centre in Assam. He also flagged off electric buses, aiming to improve connectivity, education, digital services and public transport

Guwahati, Feb 14 Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday inaugurated several projects in Assam, including a bridge on the Brahmaputra River, an IIM and a data centre for the northeastern region.

The projects, which were rolled out months ahead of Assam Assembly elections, aim to boost connectivity, strengthen digital infrastructure, promote higher education and enhance public transport.

Modi reached the state on a day-long visit to inaugurate an emergency landing facility (ELF) at Moran in Dibrugarh district and launch projects worth over Rs 5,500 crore.

The first project the prime minister inaugurated in the state capital was a six-lane bridge over the Brahmaputra River. He launched the Kumar Bhaskar Varma Setu, built at a cost of around Rs 3,030 crore.

The six-lane extradosed Prestressed Concrete (PSC) bridge will connect Guwahati with North Guwahati and is the first extradosed bridge in the Northeast.



After the inauguration, Modi took a walk on the bridge.

Assam Governor Lakshman Prasad Acharya and Chief Minister Himanta Biswa were present on the occasion.

The bridge will cut travel time between Guwahati and North Guwahati to just seven minutes. Presently, only the Saraighat Bridge in the Jalukbari area connects the two banks of the Brahmaputra in the capital region, with travel time taking around 30 minutes.

Considering the high seismicity of the region, the bridge incorporates base isolation technology using friction pendulum bearings, according to a statement issued by the Prime Minister’s Office.

High-performance stay cables were used to ensure durability and long-term structural performance, it added.

“A Bridge Health Monitoring System (BHMS) has also been incorporated for real-time condition monitoring, early damage detection and improved safety and service life of the extradosed bridge,” the PMO statement said.

Modi had laid the foundation stone for the bridge on February 9, 2019, and construction started on March 1, 2020, by the then Assam chief minister Sarbananda Sonowal.

The initial cost of the bridge was Rs 2,608 crore, which escalated to Rs 3,030 crore, and the project was estimated to be completed within four years. The length of the bridge is 7.75 km, including approach roads and flyovers on both sides of the Brahmaputra, while the actual bridge over the river is 1.24 km long.

The project was implemented by the Assam Public Works Department with consultancy services from Systra Engenharia Consultoria Ltd of Brazil. The contractor for the bridge was S P Singla Construction Pvt Ltd, and the funding agency was the New Development Bank, with 20 per cent of the total project cost borne by the Assam government.

A senior official of the Assam government told PTI that after its formal opening to the public, the bridge

will remain open exclusively for pedestrians till February 28.

Later, at nearby Lachit Ghat, Modi unveiled the Indian Institute of Management Guwahati, inaugurated a high-tech data centre that would cater to the entire Northeast, and flagged off 225 electric buses for four cities, including the Assam capital.

Union Minister of Ports, Shipping and Waterways Sarbananda Sonowal, several state ministers, MPs, MLAs and senior government officials were also present along with the chief minister and governor during the inauguration of these projects.

The PM virtually inaugurated the temporary campus of IIM Guwahati, which is expected to give a major fillip to higher education and management education in the northeastern region.

The main IIM Guwahati project will entail an expenditure of Rs 555 crore. The central government had last year approved the establishment of an IIM in Guwahati. This is the second IIM in the Northeast and the 22nd in the country. The first IIM in the region is in Shillong. “The permanent campus will be developed at Palasbari near Guwahati, while the institute will commence its academic session from a transit campus at Tech City, Bongora. IIM Ahmedabad will monitor the temporary arrangements,” the Assam government official said.

Rahul Gandhi alleges govt cheated farmers in India-US trade deal

Rahul Gandhi accused the government of cheating cotton farmers and textile exporters through the India-US trade deal, claiming it favours Bangladesh and harms domestic sectors. Textile Minister Giriraj Singh rejected the charge, saying India secured a balanced agreement

New Delhi, Feb 14 Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday accused the government of cheating cotton farmers and textile exporters in the country over the India-US interim trade deal and said the agreement is likely to inflict deep damage on both sectors.

He also claimed that the trade deal, which now favours Bangladesh through zero per cent tariffs, will either finish the textile sector or cotton farming or both, and the entire country knows this.

In a post on X, he said the government has neither protected the interests of cotton farmers nor that of textile exporters, as a visionary government would have negotiated a deal that protected both and ensured prosperity for both sectors.

“18 per cent tariff vs 0 per cent. Let me explain how the Prime Minister and his cabinet are spreading confusion on this issue, and how they are cheating India’s cotton farmers and textile exporters through the India-US trade deal,” he said in his post.

Hitting back at Gandhi, Textile Minister Giriraj Singh accused him of spreading “misinformation without understanding the facts”.

“The reality is that India has secured a much better and more balanced trade arrangement with the United States compared to many of our competing countries, a deal designed holistically to support industry growth while safeguarding the interests of our farmers.

“India’s cotton export story is stronger and more diversified than ever,” Singh said, adding that it is not dependent on just one market.

In his post, Gandhi said Bangladesh is being given



zero per cent tariff benefit on garment exports to the US, with the only condition that they import American cotton.

“After the announcement of 18 per cent tariff on Indian garments, when I raised the question in Parliament about the special concession being given to Bangladesh, the reply from a minister of the Modi government was: ‘If we also want the same benefit, we will have to import cotton from America’.

“Why was this fact hidden from the country till now? And what kind of policy is this? Is this really any kind of choice, or is it a trap designed to push us into a ‘well in front, ditch behind’ situation?” he asked.

The Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha said, “If we import American cotton, our own farmers will be ruined. If we do not import it, our textile industry will lag behind and get destroyed.” He claimed that Bangladesh is also giving signals that it may reduce or even stop importing cotton from India.

Shivaratri Effect.. Increased Fruit Prices



“Secunderabad Cantonment, February 14 (Indian Chronicle): “On the occasion of Maha Shivaratri, the prices of fruits, flowers and other fruits suddenly skyrocket. As devotees flock to the markets to buy fruits on the occasion of Shivaratri, traders have increased their prices. In addition, the prices of watermelons are rising sharply as

the crops are not ripening properly. In addition, the city residents are suddenly shocked to see the prices of various types of fruits. It has become a situation where even if you give about a thousand rupees, you will not be able to fill your bag. On the day of Shivaratri, all the devotees who observe fasting for Lord Shiva break their fast with fruits in the evening. Even the poor who have never seen fruits buy fruits during the festival. Due to this, traders have taken advantage of this and increased the prices of all fruits. The prices of mainly apples, lotus, bananas, watermelons, grapes and dates have been increased drastically. On the other hand, the prices of fruits and garlands have also increased drastically. After the abhishekam of Lord Shiva, garlands are offered to Lord Shiva. In this process, devotees buy garlands, due to which their prices have also increased drastically in the markets of the city. With the arrival of Shivaratri, people buy fruits and vegetables, so it is inevitable that devotees buy all kinds of fruits, so the traders increased the prices as they wished and continued selling. Since it is a festival, people buy as much as they can and go home. These prices are likely to increase further on Sunday, said Mallesh, a fruit trader from Mahabubnagar. “The prices of fruits and garlands have increased drastically on the occasion of Mahashivratri. In areas like Bowenpally Market Yard Square, Secunderabad Monda Market,



Balanagar Road, Kansari Bazaar, Old Bowenpally Square, Dubai Gate, Tad Bandh, Balamrai Square, under Patni Metro Station and other places, watermelon is being sold for Rs. 30-40 per kg, black grapes for Rs. 125 per kg, oranges for Rs. 4 per hundred, apples for Rs. 4 per hundred, sapota for Rs. 80 per kg, Maskmelon for

100-150 kilos, dates for 250 grams for Rs. 80. Fruit sales are continuing at carts, footpaths and shops. Fruit trader Srinivas from Ramnagar said that they are selling fruits without expecting much profit. The prices have increased significantly compared to the last week, both traders and buyers said

AI fury batters IT stocks

The disruptive power of artificial intelligence technologies is nothing new. But what happened to the global IT stocks around the world last week mirrored far deeper fears of the industry. A set of new AI tools released by Anthropic, a US-based AI company, sent tremors through America, Europe and Asia, wiping billions of dollars off the software and IT services firms' stock prices as their shares fell sharply. Anthropic, the creator of Claude chatbot, released 11 open-source plugins for its 'Claude Cowork' agent aimed at automating tasks across legal, sales, marketing and data analysis functions. The worry is that these automation tools, which can handle a wide range of customer service tasks, could replace many traditional software and IT outsourcing services. The scale of the meltdown was so massive that some analysts described the market reaction as a "SaaSocalypse," meaning a severe downturn for software-as-a-service (SaaS) companies. The new plugins will lead to automation of tasks such as legal document review, compliance, sales workflows, marketing support and data analysis. Indian IT stocks too came under sustained pressure with their shares plunging by up to 8% and wiping out roughly Rs 2 lakh crore in market value amid fears that automating coding, legal review, sales workflows and other enterprise functions could erode the high-margin application services revenues that account for 40–70% of Indian IT companies' business. Analysts estimate that 9%–12% of industry revenues could be at risk over the next four years as clients pivot to AI-led efficiency over traditional service providers. A key takeaway for the Indian IT sector from Anthropic's disruption is that it should move from traditional outsourcing to becoming AI implementation partners. As Indian enterprises integrate Claude for critical coding workflows, dependency on large vendor teams may decline, squeezing billable hours and margins. Anthropic's advanced AI systems also threaten the entry-level talent pool at Indian IT firms by replacing routine development and testing tasks. However, the doomsday predictions are highly exaggerated. A closer look reveals that the scale of legacy software embedded in global enterprises is of the order of \$20–25 trillion across the US and Europe — with annual technology spending of \$1.2–1.75 trillion. Such installed bases cannot be replaced or automated away overnight by plugging in a new AI tool. Most global enterprises continue to use AI selectively, particularly in research, discovery and limited productivity use cases. Comprehensive AI-led transformation of core operations remains at an early stage.

He further claimed that Vithal’s name did not appear in the final voter list released by the Election Commission, nor in the supplementary inclusion list. He added that no new voter registration process had been conducted in the past 10–15 days.“Under these circumstances, showing Dande Vithal’s name in the voter list now raises serious suspicions and appears to be illegal, Konappa alleged. He demanded a comprehensive inquiry by the District Collector and the Election Commissioner and urged that Vithal should not be allowed to continue as an ex-officio member until the matter is investigated.“The issue has sparked intense discussion in local political circles. Attention is now focused on how the authorities will respond to the allegations.

SEC Issues Circular on Indirect Elections to Urban Local Bodies

““Indian Chronicle (Taj Khan), February 14,““High Court Guidelines to Be Followed in Election of Chairpersons and Mayors”The Telangana State Election Commission (TSEC) has issued a circular regarding the conduct of indirect elections for Ordinary Elections to Municipalities and Municipal Corporations across the State.“The notification, issued under No. 209/TGSEC-ULBs/2026 dated January 27, 2026, outlines procedural clarifications and legal provisions governing the election of Chairpersons and Vice-Chairpersons of Municipalities, as well as Mayors and Deputy Mayors of Municipal Corporations.“The Commission stated that the directions have been issued in accordance with Article 243-ZA read with Article 243-K of the Constitution of India, Section 194 of the Telangana Municipalities Act, 2019, and relevant statutory provisions. The clarification also follows the judgment of the High Court for the State of Telangana in Writ Petition No. 20262 of 2021.“Court Directions on Ex-Officio Membership”As per the High Court’s order, only

specific categories of individuals are eligible to become or be co-opted as ex-officio members of Municipalities:“1. Experts in Municipal Administration – Persons possessing special knowledge or experience in municipal administration may be co-opted; however, they will not have voting rights.“2. Lok Sabha and MLA Members – Members of Parliament (Lok Sabha) and Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs) representing constituencies that fall wholly or partly within the Municipal area.“3. Rajya Sabha and MLC Members – Rajya Sabha Members and Members of the Legislative Council (MLCs) registered as voters within the Municipal area concerned.“4. Constituted Committee Chairpersons – Chairpersons of Committees formed under Clause (5) of Article 243-S of the Constitution, provided they are registered voters within the Municipal area.“The Commission emphasized that the elections must strictly adhere to the constitutional framework and judicial guidelines to ensure transparency and legality in the electoral process.

Women Dominate Kagaznagar Municipal Elections – A Historic Victory

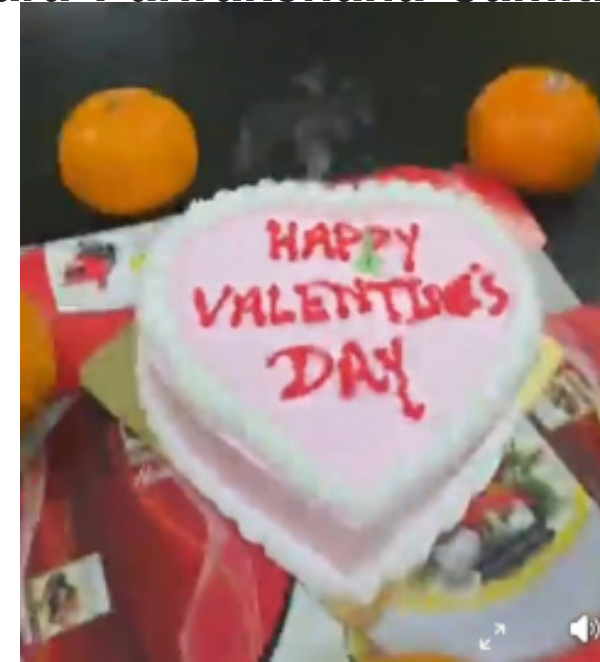

No wages for 8 years: How 172 railway workers at Kharagpur station survived on ‘unfair means’

For more than eight years, from 2001 to 2009, 172 workers selling food to passengers at the Kharagpur Railway Station were pushed into “unfair means” simply to survive. The reason: throughout this entire period, not a single one of them received any wages for their labour. On January 20, 2026, the Calcutta High Court finally provided some relief to these workers, directing that they must be paid wages for a period of 100 months, between April 2001 and July 2009, along with interest. The victory came after a protracted legal battle that stretched across more than two decades, during which the workers were compelled to knock on the doors of courts, tribunals, and labour authorities in their fight for unpaid wages. The workers were helpers and vendors engaged in selling food and refreshments at Kharagpur Railway Station. Their services were used daily to cater to passengers, an activity that generated revenue for the Railways, yet remained unpaid for years. What happened

Ajitesh Pandey, one of the advocates appearing for the petitioners, said, “The problem began after the Railways entered into a profit-sharing agreement with a private contractor, M/s Dynamic International, in 2001. Under this arrangement, the contractor was allowed to sell food at the station and keep 75 per cent of the sales, while the Railways received 25 per cent. The contractor used the labour of these 172 workers to run stalls and trolleys.” He added, “While the Railways and the contractor earned from the catering business, the workers were caught in the middle. When they demanded wages, the contractor claimed the workers were not his employees. The Railways, on the other hand, said the responsibility lay with the contractor. As a result, the workers were left unpaid.” How the workers survived On being asked why the workers continued for eight years without wages, Arvind Pandey, general secretary, Kharagpur Division Railway Thikadar Mazdoor Congress, told The Indian Express, “The main reason was greed. The then catering manager had told the workers they would get permanent jobs just like the railway commission vendors. They were also told that they would be given 10-15 per cent commission for selling food.”

Pandey also said that the workers survived by engaging in “unfair means”. “On July 3, 2012, T B Moitra, Labour Enforcement Officer, Kharagpur, had submitted an enquiry report in which it was mentioned that, suppose 80 puris can be made from a kilogram of flour, then the workers would make 100. If a portion of aloo dam was supposed to have five pieces of potatoes, they would give four or give only 50 ml of tea instead of the mandated 70 ml. By selling the 20 puris or the excess potatoes and tea, the workers managed to survive,” Pandey said. While hearing the case, the Calcutta High Court noted that the Labour Enforcement Officer (Central) had examined the matter and found that both the contractor and the Railway administration were responsible for the abnormal delay in payment. The court also noted that the enquiry report clearly stated that the workers’ claim was genuine. However, despite this finding, the workers still did not receive their dues.

What the enquiry report says The enquiry report, a copy of which is available with The Indian Express, says, “Prior to 2001, the food items at Kharagpur Rly Stn were being sold by the Railway Commission vendors who were directly under the control of the Railways and were receiving commission from the Railway catering department for sale.” After a 1997 Supreme Court order, the commission vendors were regularised into railway service. At Kharagpur Railway Station, 86 such commission vendors worked, and they were permitted to have two assistants each, making the total sub-vendors 172. The enquiry report stated that the workers tried their best to be heard, but the Railway administration and the contractor “probably did not pay any heed to their legitimate demand”. It added that the workers were “put to un-

due risk and stress by their employers who reportedly used to threaten them, indicating withdrawal of their Identity Cards”. What the workers said Over the years, the workers approached multiple authorities, including the Central Administrative Tribunal, labour officials, and the High Court, Pandey said. “Many of their cases were dismissed on technical grounds, such as limitation or jurisdiction, without ever addressing the core issue, that they had worked for years without wages,” Pandey added. Speaking to The Indian Express, Pradip Dey (52), a tea vendor, said, “The catering manager lured us by saying he would get us a permanent job and also get us a commission. But neither did we get the jobs nor were we paid commissions till 2009.”

He added, “We had a tough time making ends meet. While my mother worked as a maid, my father worked as a labourer. With no steady income in sight, I used to ask passengers for some money. Some would give, some would abuse. I feel very ashamed to say this, but I had no other way out.” While the complaint against the then catering manager is consistent among all the workers The Indian Express spoke to, asking for alms to run their families was not the only way out for all of them. 42-year-old Nandadulal Dutta said, “We are supposed to provide 70 ml of tea to passengers, but we gave only 50 ml. By selling whatever we saved, we made some money to help run our families.” Accepting that they had no option but to resort to unfair means, Anil Rana (51), who worked at a food trolley, acknowledged the findings of the enquiry report. “Yes, we did make eight to 10 puris extra out of one kilogram of flour and made the chapatis thinner than usual to sell whatever we could squeeze out,” Rana said. Rana was echoed by Milon Sau, who said that if a food item was meant to be sold at Rs 20, they charged passengers Rs 21. “But whatever we did, we did to run our families,” Sau, who is now in his fifties, said.

Pandey said the then catering manager was Narendra Prasad, who was later removed from service. The Indian Express accessed the termination letter issued to Prasad on March 31, 2011, which said he is a “blot on the system leading not only to the loss of the revenue to the government exchequer but the loss of image of the Railway Administration”. In the letter, undersigned by the Senior Divisional Railway Manager, Kharagpur, Prasad has been mentioned as OS–Gr II under Sr. DCM/KGP. Prasad was removed with “immediate effect as a measure of disciplinary action without any compassionate allowance”. The High Court observed that the workers had been “running from pillar to post” for decades and that their wages for the 2001–2009 period had never been paid. The court rejected the argument that the workers were merely helpers with no employer-employee relationship. It relied on official agreements, identity cards issued to the workers, and admissions by the contractor to conclude that they were contractual labourers working under the Railways as the principal employer. Justice Shampa Dutt (Paul) held that under the Contract Labour (Regulation and Abolition) Act, the contractor was legally responsible for paying wages. The court further ruled that if the contractor fails to do so, the Railways, as the principal employer, must step in and make the payment and later recover the amount from the contractor.

Considering that the workers began receiving monthly payments of ₹4,000 to ₹10,000 only after 2009, the court fixed ₹4,000 per month as the minimum wage payable for the unpaid years. The contractor has been directed to pay the wages with statutory interest within 30 days. The consolidated amount, without interest, comes to ₹6 crore 88 lakh. If the dues are not paid, the Railways must pay the workers and then recover the money from the contractor. The court made it clear that no worker who has put in honest labour can be denied wages, especially for such an extended period. No end to their plight Although the Calcutta High Court order goes in their favour, most of the 172 workers do not have any permanent employment. After the contract with M/s Dynamic International ended, most of the workers were rendered unemployed. Left with little choice and age not on their side, some of them started working as hawkers independently. However, since this is illegal, the railway police often impose fines on them. Sau said, “We don’t have any option left. Even if the police impose fines on us, at this age, finding a different type of employment is nearly impossible. We have a family to look after.” Taking up their cause, Pandey said, “These workers have been engaged in this job for years; where will they go at this age? We demand a respectable life for them. They should be allowed to sell without being fined.”

Double-decker design delaying Sarjapur-Hebbal Red Line proposal for Bengaluru Metro, says BJP MP P C Mohan

A proposed 37-km Red Line of the Bengaluru Metro (Namma Metro) service to connect Sarjapur, on the south eastern fringe of the city, to Hebbal in the north of the city has not received the approval of the Union Cabinet on account of technical issues connected to its construction, according to a BJP MP representing Bengaluru in the Lok Sabha. “Karnataka’s blanket double-decker rule has stalled Centre’s approval for the ₹28,405-crore Hebbal–Sarjapur Metro corridor. MoHUA cautions that full-length road and Metro stretches weaken mass transit gains. BMRC must revisit the design and justify viability to secure approval,” P C Mohan, BJP MP for the Central Bengaluru region, stated on social media on February 11. “A double-decker may be justified at select junctions. But extending it across an entire corridor risks creating parallel infrastructure, encouraging private vehicle use, reducing Metro ridership, and weakening anticipated social benefits, including lower congestion and pollution,” the BJP MP posted on X. The MP has implied in the post that the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs had red-flagged the Karnataka Government proposal to have a rail-cum-road flyover system along the proposed Red Line. Earlier, Mohan had stated that the Phase 3A (Red Line) from Sarjapur to Hebbal is crucial, but at ₹28,405 crore (₹776 crore/km), it is the most expensive project in Namma Metro’s history. “The Centre has rightly sought revisions. BMRC will now reassess and aim to reduce the high estimated costs,” he had posted earlier on social media. The Karnataka Cabinet approved Phase 3A in December 2024, with the Detailed Project Report (DPR) submitted in June 2023. The Union Urban Development Department granted initial approval on October 16, 2024, and the project now awaits final Union Cabinet approval. The proposed Red Line would span 36.59 km, with 22.14 km elevated (17 stations) and 14.45 km underground (11 stations), featuring 28 stations in total. The line connects Sarjapur to Hebbal, passing through key areas such as Carmelaram, Koramangala,



Dairy Circle, and Basaveshwara Circle. It includes five interchange stations: Ibbalur (Blue Line), Agara (Blue Line), Dairy Circle (Pink Line), KR Circle (Purple Line), and Hebbal (Blue Line and Orange Line). Namma Metro Phase 3 Phase 3 of the project, which includes the Orange Line, was approved in August 2024 for Rs 15,611 crore and includes two elevated corridors totaling 44.65 km: Corridor-1 (32.15 km, JP Nagar 4th Phase to Kempapura – Orange Line) and Corridor-2 (12.50 km, Hosahalli to Kadabagere – Grey Line). The construction has begun for this section, which is expected to be operational by 2029. A total of 96.1 km of the Bengaluru Metro is currently operational. The target is a 317 km network around the city. In 2026, the operational length is targeted to increase by 41.01 km from 96.1 km to 137.11 km with the opening of sections of the Pink Line. The Reach 6 Line – from Kalena Agrahara to Tavarekere (Pink Line) – which has an elevated section of 7.50 km with six stations, is planned for opening in May 2026, and a 13.76 km underground section from Dairy Circle to Nagawara (Pink Line) with 12 Stations, is planned for commissioning in December 2026. Phase-2A (Blue Line) from Central Silk Board to Krishnarajapura, having a length of 19.75 km along the Outer Ring Road with 13 elevated stations, is also slated for opening in December 2026.

RTE admissions limited to 1 km radius, documents must be uploaded online

In a significant change to the Right to Education RTE admission process, the Maharashtra school education department has restricted school selection to within one kilometre of a student’s registered residential address, replacing the earlier provision that allowed applicants to choose schools within a three kilometre radius and beyond. Additionally, parents will now have to upload all required documents online at the time of application, instead of submitting them later during admission.

The revised guidelines were issued through a Government Resolution GR dated February 12, even as parents across the state await the commencement of RTE admissions. While the core framework of the admission process remains unchanged, officials said the two key modifications, the reduced distance limit and mandatory online document submission, are aimed at improving trans-

parency and preventing last minute disputes. Under the RTE Act, 25 percent seats in private unaided schools are reserved for children from socioeconomically disadvantaged backgrounds, with the state government reimbursing the schools for the fees.

Director of Primary Education Sharad Gosavi said the changes are based on recommendations of a committee constituted in January 2025 to suggest reforms to the RTE admissions process. Officials said the panel also took public feedback into account. Admissions under the revised process are expected to begin next week. Gosavi said, “The one km restriction will ensure that children are admitted to nearby schools. Whereas with mandatory online submission of all required documents, there will be no room for confusion at the time of admission when a seat is allotted to an applicant. In the past there have been multiple instances when admission is denied by the school, after seat allotment; due to incorrect or insufficient document proofs.” As part of the updated procedure, applicants must upload Aadhaar cards of both the student and parent. If the residential address mentioned in the application differs from the one on the Aadhaar card, parents will be required to submit a valid rental agreement or other proof of current residence. Officials clarified that in case of complaints, the applicant’s address will be verified to rule out fraud. Authorities noted that under the earlier system, some applicants submitted temporary rental agreements in localities close to preferred schools to secure admission, a practice the new verification norms seek to curb.

Divorced women targeted on matrimonial sites; conman arrested in Mumbai

The Navghar Police have arrested a 45-year-old man for allegedly cheating divorced women by befriending them on matrimonial websites, posing as the son of an IPS officer and an NGO worker supporting widows and divorcees. The accused, identified as Viraj Bhosale, allegedly duped several women of lakhs of rupees by making false promises of marriage, government-scheme housing and jobs in the film industry. In the most recent case, Bhosale is accused of cheating a Mulund-based woman of Rs 17.70 lakh. Police have seized his Mercedes car during the investigation. During interrogation, the accused told police that he does not have a permanent residence in Mumbai and has been living out of his car.

According to the police, the complainant, a 42-year-old graphic designer residing in Mulund, got divorced a decade ago. About four years ago, she had created a profile on a matrimonial website and was searching for a life partner. In September last year, she received a marriage proposal request, which she ignored. The same person sent another request in October, which she accepted. The accused allegedly contacted her the next day, introducing himself as Viraj Bhosale, a resident of Pune. He claimed that his father was an IPS officer, his mother a physiotherapist, and that his sister lived in the UK. He further told the complainant that he was the chairman of an NGO, Stree Sutram Foundation, and claimed to have close connections with politicians and other influential figures in Maharashtra.

The victim alleged that Bhosale claimed to manage CSR funds, Nihirbaya funds and several government schemes, through which he provided financial assistance to divorced and widowed women and single mothers. He allegedly promised to help her secure affordable housing in Mumbai through these schemes, asking her to pay an initial amount of Rs 7 lakh. Trusting him, the woman trans-

ferred money from her savings account. Subsequently, the accused allegedly demanded additional sums citing various charges. The victim took a personal loan and eventually transferred a total of Rs 17.70 lakh, either from her savings account or via GPay. The complainant realised she had been cheated after the accused stopped responding to her WhatsApp messages and calls. She then approached the Navghar police station and registered a case on February 3 under sections 318(4), 352 and 351(2) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS). Based on the accused’s mobile phone location, police traced him to Versova and arrested him. He was produced before a court and remanded to police custody till February 15.

During the investigation, police found that Bhosale had allegedly cheated multiple women by making false promises of marriage or by misusing the pretext of government welfare schemes. His modus operandi involved targeting divorced women on matrimonial platforms, gaining their trust and then extracting money or valuables. Several cases have already been registered against him at police stations in Thane, Mumbai and with the Economic Offences Wing (EOW), a police official said. “It appears that the accused had victimised several women and we are requesting the victim to overcome stigma and approach the police. He used many aliases names Yuraj, Rajveer, Viraj, Satish and Virendra” said Bharat Rathod, police sub inspector at the Navghar police station.

Two held with marijuana at Secunderabad railway station

Police said the duo had boarded a train from Bhubaneswar and were waiting in the general waiting hall to hand over the consignment to a contact when they were arrested.

Indian Navy makes history, takes global Maritime Command

Washington: The Indian Navy has assumed command of Combined Task Force 154, marking the first time it is leading the multinational training task force under the Combined Maritime Forces. The change of command ceremony was held on Feb. 11 at the CMF headquarters in Manama, Bahrain. The event was presided over by Vice Admiral Curt A. Renshaw, Commander, CMF, US NAVCENT and US Fifth Fleet.

Vice Admiral Tarun Sobti, Deputy Chief of the Naval Staff of the Indian Navy, attended the ceremony. Senior military leaders from member nations were also present. Commodore Milind M. Mokashi, Shaurya Chakra, formally took over as Commander of CTF-154 from the outgoing commander of the Italian Navy. CTF-154 focuses on training and capacity building for member nations of the 47-nation Combined Maritime Forces. The development underscores India's commitment to collaborative maritime security in the Indian Ocean Region and beyond. The task force

was established in May 2023. It is dedicated to enhancing maritime security through multinational training programs across the Middle East and the wider region. The training framework is built around five pillars. These are Maritime Domain Awareness, Law of the Sea, Maritime Interdiction Operations, Maritime Rescue and Assistance, and Leadership Development.

CTF-154 conducts regular Maritime Security Enhancement Training events. It also carries out exercises such as Compass Rose and Northern and Southern Readiness. These programs aim to strengthen partner nations' capabilities against common threats. These include illegal trafficking, piracy and irregular migration. CTF-154 operates alongside other CMF task forces. CTF-150 focuses on maritime security. CTF-151 handles counter-piracy operations. CTF-152 is responsible for maritime security in the Arabian Gulf. CTF-153 oversees maritime security in the Red Sea. India's assumption of command reflects growing trust in its professional expertise and operational experience. It also signals recognition of India's role as a preferred security partner among CMF nations. The Indian Navy said it looks forward to a productive tenure. It plans to deliver high-impact training initiatives. It also aims to reinforce global maritime partnerships for peace, prosperity and security. The Combined Maritime Forces is a multinational naval partnership headquartered in Bahrain. It brings together 47 nations to promote security and stability across key international waters in the Middle East and nearby regions. India has expanded its maritime engagement in recent years. The Indian Navy has increased joint exercises, anti-piracy patrols and humanitarian missions across the Indian Ocean. It has positioned itself as a net security provider in the region, working with partners to secure sea lanes vital for global trade and energy supplies.

BNP claims victory in Bangladesh's election, set to return to power after 20 years

Dhaka: Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) on Friday claimed victory in the crucial general elections, marred by sporadic incidents of violence, to elect a new government to replace the interim administration, which took charge after the fall of the Awami League regime in August 2024. "The Bangladesh Nationalist Party-BNP is set to form the government after victory in the majority of seats," BNP's media cell posted on x. The Election Commission (EC) is yet to make a formal announcement.

According to multiple media reports, EC is expected to declare BNP the winner in the general elections with tallies in predawn hours on Friday, suggesting it got majority seats in parliament. Different media tallies suggested BNP received more than 151 seats in the 300-seat parliament on Thursday's daylong voting, fair enough to form the next government, ending the 18-month rule of Muhammad Yunus-led interim government.

According to an EC spokesperson, the results in several seats are still being processed and are likely to be announced in a few hours. The election is seen as a direct contest between the BNP and its former ally Jamaat-e-Islami, in the absence of ousted premier Sheikh Hasina's now debarred Awami League. The voting for the 13th parliamentary elections was held along with a referendum on the implementation of a complex 84-point reform package, known as the July National Charter. BNP was in power last time between 2001 and 2006 when Jamaat was its crucial partner, with two of its leaders serving as ministers. Jamaat has raised allegations of "abnormal delays" and "result tampering," warning that it would launch a tough movement if the public mandate were "snatched away".

Speaking to reporters at the Election Commission building early morning, Jamaat's assistant secretary general Ahsanul Mahboob Zubair alleged that returning officers were intentionally delaying results to favour a "particular party." The BNP had earlier announced that if it wins the election, then its chairman and former premier Khaleda Zia's son, Tarique Rahman, would be the next prime minister of Bangladesh.



If the party wins, Rahman will be Bangladesh's first male prime minister in 35 years. "We are confident of forming the government by winning more than two-thirds of seats," BNP's central election steering committee spokesman Mahdi Amin told a media briefing in the early hours of Friday. Rahman, who returned to Bangladesh in December last year after over 17 years in self-exile, asked party leaders and activists to offer special prayers across the country after mid-day 'Juma' prayers instead of holding victory rallies. The EC was yet to announce the voter turnout figure. It dismissed allegations of manipulation regarding voters' appearances in polling centres. "There were debates over turnout percentages in past elections as well. Please don't question it now," Chief Election Commissioner AMM Nasur Uddin told a reporter on Thursday evening. He said variations were natural as results from several thousand polling centres arrived at different times. EC Senior Secretary Akhtar Ahmed on Thursday said 47.91 per cent of voters had cast ballots by 2 pm on Thursday at 36,031 of the 42,651 polling centres. More than 2,000 candidates, including a number of independents, were in the fray for 299 of the 300 parliamentary constituencies that went to the polls. A Polling for one seat was postponed due to the death of a candidate. The Election Commission made elaborate security arrangements for the elections, deploying nearly 1 million security personnel — the largest-ever in the country's electoral history.

US prepares to send second aircraft carrier to Middle East

Washington: The world's largest aircraft carrier has been ordered to sail from the Caribbean Sea to the Middle East, a person familiar with the plans said Thursday, as US President Donald Trump considers whether to take possible military action against Iran. The move by the USS Gerald R. Ford, first reported by The New York Times, will

put two carriers and their accompanying warships in the region as Trump increases pressure on Iran to make a deal over its nuclear programme. The person spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss military movements.

The USS Abraham Lincoln aircraft carrier and three guided-missile destroyers arrived in the Middle East more than two weeks ago. It marks a quick turnaround for the USS Ford, which Trump sent from the Mediterranean Sea to the Caribbean last October as the administration build up a huge military presence in the leadup to the surprise raid last month that captured then-Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro. It also appears to be at odds with Trump's national security strategy, which put an emphasis on the Western Hemisphere over other parts of the world. Trump told Axios earlier in the week that he was considering sending a second carrier strike group to the Middle East. The USS Ford set out on deployment in late June 2025, which means the crew will have been deployed for eight months in two weeks time. While it is unclear how long the ship will remain in the Middle East, the move sets the crew up for an usually long deployment.

Bangladeshi voters endorse sweeping democratic reforms in national referendum

Bangladeshi voters have endorsed sweeping democratic reforms in a national referendum, the Election Commission said — a key pillar of Nobel Peace Prize laureate Muhammad Yunus's post-uprising transition agenda. The referendum took place alongside parliamentary elections on Thursday (February 12) that marked the first vote since a 2024 uprising ended Sheikh Hasina's iron-fisted 15-year rule. The lengthy document, known as the "July Charter" after the month when the uprising that toppled Ms. Hasina began, proposes term limits for prime ministers, the creation of an upper house of parliament, stronger presidential powers and greater judicial independence.

It also includes increased representation of women in parliament and the election of the deputy speaker and par-

liamentary committee chairs from the opposition. Mr. Yunus, who took charge as interim leader after what he described as a "completely broken" political system, championed the reform blueprint as essential to preventing a return to authoritarianism. The referendum question noted that approval would make the charter "binding on the parties that win" the election, obliging them to endorse it. However, several parties raised notes of dissent before the vote, and the reforms will still require ratification by the new parliament. The Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) secured a landslide victory in the elections, winning a majority of more than two-thirds of the available seats. Senior BNP leader Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir said the party will implement the parts of the charter it agreed on.

Pakistan hockey team faces embarrassment in Australia over unpaid bills



Karachi: The players of the Pakistan hockey team were forced to spend several hours on the road upon reaching Canberra, as their hotel bookings in the Australian capital were cancelled after the Pakistan Hockey Federation failed to pay the bill due to lack of funds. They are in Australia for the second leg of the FIH Pro League event in Hobart. According to sources close to the team, the players and officials were left with no option but to "roam on the roads" before finding accommodation.

"Apparently the players and officials were booked in a four star hotel in Canberra and were told that the Pakistan Sports Board and Pakistan Hockey Federation had made all upfront payments for their stay in Canberra," a source said on Thursday. "But when they reached Canberra last week, they found no bookings for them at the designated hotel. The team's head coach Tahir Zaman faced problems getting in touch with PSB and PHF officials back home be-

cause of the time difference," he added. "Tahir messaged them about the awkward situation the players were facing and had no place to stay and rest after a long journey from Lahore," the source said.

The incident has been seen as a major source of embarrassment for Pakistan's national sport, with the team struggling to compete against top ranked sides like Australia and Germany in the Hobart leg of the Pro League. The source said that after waiting outside for several hours, the hotel management was eventually convinced and gave the players some rooms. "Because of unavailability of required rooms the players and officials were accommodated in a lesser number of rooms than they were told. As a result two-three players occupied one room and next day they went straight to the ground to play their first match against Australia, which they lost 3-2," the source said.

This is not the first time the Pakistan hockey players have faced such situations in recent past. During the first phase of the FIH Pro League held in Argentina, the players were not paid their daily allowances, putting them in a tight financial situation in a foreign country. The team is without a manager in Canberra after the regular manager, former Olympian Anjum Saeed, was removed by the PHF and not sent with the team this time. Anjum was removed after he was caught smoking on the flight while returning home and got into an altercation with airport security officials who held him back for a day, as the team resumed its onward journey to Dubai and Lahore. Before the team left for Canberra, the PSB had increased the daily allowances to USD 115 for each player. "Some local Pakistani people were contacted in Canberra who came to their rescue at the hotel after players spent time on the roads," the source said.

India overpower Namibia ahead of Pakistan clash

New Delhi: Sanju Samson disappointed again, Ishan Kishan dazzled and his mentor Hardik Pandya entertained, but India's 93-run victory over Namibia here on Thursday was not exactly the box office hit one expected ahead of a tense T20 World Cup face-off against Pakistan. The victory felt less like an assurance and more like the calm before the cricketing tempest with Pakistan lying in wait.

The margin of victory, India's highest in a T20 World Cup, did not depict the entire picture as little-known Namibian captain Gerhard Erasmus came out as a surprise package by taking 4 for 20 in India's final total of 209 for 9, despite Kishan's smashing 24-ball 61 and Pandya's 52 off 28 balls. In reply, the Namibian batting unit struggled against the kind of attack that they hardly get to play, as the innings ended on 116 in 18.2 overs. Varun Chakravathy (3/7 in 2 overs) and Pandya (2/21 in 4 overs) shared the bulk of the spoils and India now need just one more win in their next two games to qualify for the Super Eights.

Why India's batting show, despite a 200-plus score, would be considered below par is because of the Namibian skipper. Erasmus' side-arm action created considerable discomfort for the Indian batters, including Kishan, Pandya and Tilak Varma, as he also bowled from behind the crease at times. The 24 deliveries that Erasmus bowled were certainly an eye opener for the Indian batters as to what they can expect from Pakistan's Usman Tariq, who would pose even more probing questions on a tackler Premadasa track in Colombo. When Namibia batted, they used the long handle to good effect but one always knew that it was just a matter of time before Chakravathy and Axar Patel (2/20) came and demolished them in unison. Earlier, Samson's three-sixes innings was akin to a short-lived Instagram reel but Kishan's batting was a gripping web series, full of drama, action and anticipation. Kishan muscled five sixes and half a dozen boundaries for a 20-ball 50 that set the foundation for a marauding Pandya (52 off 28 balls) to take the team to a total that looked beyond the reach of this Namibian batting line-up.

However, Erasmus gave a fantastic account of him-



self and would certainly keep Pakistan's Tariq interested come Sunday. Erasmus bowled side-arm deliveries in between the stock ball which is round arm. As a variation, he also bowled from behind the crease to shorten the length, as a set Tilak Varma (25) could not reach the pitch of the delivery. It was a flat Kotla deck but Samson (22 off 8 balls) and skipper Suryakumar Yadav, with a run-a-ball 12, missed out on scoring big with the African side making some sort of a comeback with the ball during the middle overs. Surya certainly got the best delivery of the innings from left-arm spinner Bernard Scholtz, who got one to dip and turn as the skipper gave the charge, missed, and was duly stumped.

It was a golden opportunity for Samson to make it count. The three sixes — one down the ground and the other two a product of sinewy wrists — sent the capacity crowd into raptures. But another flick did not have the wings to clear the fielder at cow corner. Samson's knock was full of intent but fell short in effectiveness. The difference between Kishan and Samson over the past one month has been consistency and understanding the value of a second chance. The Namibian pacers did not stand any chance against Kishan and the moment they erred in length, his willow came down like a sledgehammer at tremendous bat speed and the sixes soared into the stands. During the back-10, India's Pandya took charge as his four sixes and four boundaries kept the momentum going, with Shivam Dube (23 off 16 balls) giving him good support in an 81-run stand off just 6.3 overs.

From sociology to journalism: A lesson from André Béteille

The passing of André Béteille, renowned sociologist and public intellectual, reminded me of an exchange I had with him that shaped my approach to journalism in later years. As a Master's student, I had applied for a scholarship at the Centre for Advanced Study in Sociological Research for the academic year 1997-99. Besides the head of the department, Anand Chakravarti, the panel included many other stalwarts, including Professor Béteille. I anticipated questions on thinkers such as Émile Durkheim, Louis Dumont, and Claude Lévi-Strauss. And sure enough, Prof. Béteille asked me about Durkheim's comparative method and urged me to point out what I thought were the shortcomings of that approach. Obituary | André Béteille: A sociologist with rigorous scholarship who laid emphasis on importance of fieldwork thought I was well prepared. I rattled off points I had picked up from commentaries on Durkheim. "And you think Durkheim did not know this? You must always think for yourself and not just rely on what others have said about an issue," he responded. Prof. Virginus Xaxa came to my rescue and I managed to secure the scholarship. That brief exchange stayed with me. Both scholarship and journalism require independent judgment, not borrowed opinions. Prof. Béteille's own academic journey reveals this approach. Born in 1934 to a Bengali mother and a French father, his growing years reflected the confluence of cultures that defines India's pluralism. Starting out as a student of Physics, he moved to Anthropology. After completing an M.Sc. in the subject from

the University of Calcutta, he moved to Delhi.

Béteille did his doctoral research under the legendary M.N. Srinivas, who had set up the Department of Sociology at the Delhi School of Economics. Prof. Srinivas had given the concept of Sanskritisation to Indian sociology — the process through which castes placed low in the traditional hierarchy seek to move up by adopting the rituals and dietary habits of those above them. Prof. Béteille made caste, often understood in terms of one's hereditary status, a dynamic concept. His book Caste, Class and Power (1965), based on his fieldwork in Sripuram village of Tamil Nadu's Thanjavur district, demonstrated how land ownership, political authority, and economic change reshaped caste relations. It is a classic work in understanding social stratification in the modern Indian context and continues to be a model of how empirical research can illuminate broader theoretical questions. Prof. Béteille was a quintessential old-school professor: he wore a tweed jacket with a matching tie during Delhi winters, bush shirts in summer, and occasionally, a dhoti-kurta in the Bengali style. Walking into the classroom, he would remove his leather-strapped wrist-watch and place it on the table. Then, he would recap what had been taught earlier before continuing from where he had left off. More than any other scholar of his generation, he helped establish sociology as a rigorous, empirically grounded discipline — one that was capable of engaging with India's social complexity without being captive to ideology. His work constantly reminded readers that society could not be reduced to slogans or theories alone; it had to be observed, measured, and understood in its contradictions. His approach was not very different from what a reporter ought to do — go to the field, listen carefully, check facts, and resist the temptation to fit reality into preconceived frameworks. Prof. Béteille took academic writing beyond esoteric circles without ever compromising on meticulous research. And his approach teaches journalists to follow academic rigour in our writings. Reporting is not merely repeating; it is asking one's own questions and testing every claim against evidence. I have to thank my professor for instilling a fundamental principle of journalism in me.

Is a ‘double engine government’ crucial for growth?



Recently, Prime Minister Narendra Modi visited Kerala and Tamil Nadu, scheduled to have Assembly elections soon, and stressed the need for a double-engine government. The term double-engine government refers to having the same political party (in this case, the Bharatiya Janata Party or its allies in the National Democratic Alliance) in power at both the Centre and in a State. Critics of this model include Tamil Nadu Chief Minister M.K. Stalin, who has asked how Opposition-ruled States are doing well without a double-engine government. Is a double-engine government crucial for growth? Louise Tillin and Yamini Aiyar discuss the question in a conversation moderated by Sai Charan. Edited excerpts:

Does the discourse around a double-engine government imply an inherent bias against non-BJP/non-NDA governments in the States?

Louise Tillin: In a literal sense, yes. It suggests that political alignment between the Union and State governments is better for voters than the lack of it. However, this is different from asking whether the Union government actually governs in a way that is biased against non-NDA States. At one level, we see that States that are not ruled by the NDA do not receive special treatment. We saw in last year’s Budget, for instance, that coalition partners of the BJP at the Centre received special fiscal packages that non-NDA States did not receive. But can we say therefore that NDA-ruled States receive other forms of preferential treatment?

We can think about this in fiscal and political terms. A large quantity of Centre-State transfers take place through formulas set by the Finance Commission. And these are not inherently biased against Opposition-ruled States. Even if a number of States currently ruled by Opposition parties contribute more to the Central kitty than they receive in return, that is because of the way fiscal redistribution works in India. So, we can’t say that the Finance Commission is partisan in the way it manages Centre-State transfers. But there is more room for discretion in other types of transfers. Opposition-ruled States complain about delays or non-payment of matching funds for Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS). Because these transfers allow for more discretion, they create more scope for potential partisan bias compared to transfers governed by the Finance Commission. At the same time, all States, regardless of political alignment, are operating within a broader context of increasing fiscal centralisation. The other way to think about this question is politically. States which are politically aligned with the Centre are likely to experience a lower degree of interference by Union agencies.

It is difficult to say that we can detect partisan bias in some of the more rule-bound operations of the Government of India. But there is noise around it, which is politically driven, which suggests that there is partisan bias going on.

Yamini Aiyar: A principal problem with the idea of ‘double engine’ is in its framing. It undermines the core principle of federal accommodation. Federalism allows for multiple political identities to cohere within the framework of the nation state. Thus, a truly federal India, with its diverse identities, is going to have different types of political parties. The idea of ‘double engine’ invokes a challenge to this principle of accommodation. It is presented to voters as a means by which efficiency can be entrenched within Centre-State relations. Constitutionally, India’s federal structure is dependent on cooperation between the Centre and States. What the framework of ‘double engine’ posits is the idea that different political parties across States and the Centre make cooperation harder and therefore require more symmetry. In that sense, it pits efficiency against democracy. So, the idea of ‘double engine’ undermines the fundamental principle of federalism and pits Opposition parties against the political party at the Centre.

It is important to say that even in a world where the framework of ‘double engine’ was not invoked, in moments

of political dominance, national parties have misused their constitutional powers in ways that have politicised the dynamic of Centre-State relations. However, the framing of ‘double engine’ seeks to legitimise this form of political control.

Is the absence of a ‘double engine’ setup hindering the financial autonomy of States, particularly regarding the timely release of Central funds?

Louise Tillin: We have to think about the discourse of ‘double-engine’ government within the wider context of an ideological assault on the idea of federalism in India. Under the weight of a dominant national party, we are seeing the steady erosion of what I would describe as a culture of federal restraint in which the Centre and States mutually respect each other’s spheres of autonomy. But the shrinking of the fiscal autonomy of States is not simply a ‘double engine’ question. All States are seeing their fiscal autonomy shrink for a number of reasons, including the introduction of GST and the introduction of new cesses and surcharges.

Yamini Aiyar: Since 2008-09, at the Accountability Initiative at the Centre for Policy Research, we began tracking the flow of funds for CSS released by the Centre which go into the State treasury and then through layers of administration to the last mile where there is expenditure. We began to notice expenditure units spend a significant part of the financial year awaiting funds, and then rush to spend it before March 31 to show utilisation certificates so that next year’s money gets released. This was largely on account of a complete administrative failure caused by rules and conditionalities imposed on the flow and use of CSS. States have long demanded greater fiscal devolution from the Centre. The 14th Finance Commission pushed for enhanced devolution of the divisible pool of taxes to States, and said CSS conditionalities that make fund flows difficult and create inefficiencies must be addressed. The Modi government dismantled the Planning Commission, claiming that allocation of funds was centralising. It replaced it with NITI Aayog, which established a Chief Ministers’ subcommittee tasked with examining the restructuring of CSS to address inefficiencies in fund flows. But its recommendations were ignored.

Thus India has had a history of administrative failure when it comes to fund flows and these have affected all States. The big shift now is that discretionary channels of CSS are being used, and administrative failures are being leveraged more politically. So we are no longer merely in the arena of administrative failures creating inefficiencies; those inefficiencies are being deployed politically to create deeper problems.

Does the claim that double-engine governments benefit States hold up against the reality of the south, where several States with better socioeconomic indicators are ruled by non-BJP/non-NDA governments?

Louise Tillin: The notion that there is a consistent pattern of what double-engine governance does for economic outcomes or fiscal redistribution is fiction. It is fiction that India can achieve greater efficiency and economic growth by negating its pluralism. The southern States are good examples of that. Tamil Nadu has seen a high pace of economic growth over the last few decades. Why is that the case? It is not only a question of the party in power. Historically, changes in land ownership patterns and political mobilisation around social justice for lower caste communities took place in the south much earlier than in the north. Those have been important preconditions for the economic dynamism we see in the south today. We also have to acknowledge that India has a skewed pattern of development, where industrial development is heavily concentrated in the south. Tamil Nadu’s growth rate is also a result of investments from other parts of India; it is built on the back of internal labour migration from poorer regions, often with exploitative wage levels.

Yamini Aiyar: If you look at patterns of growth in India, there is an aggregate national picture. But a closer look reveals that individual States have followed distinct trajectories of economic growth and human development. These variations reflect their own historical and political path dependencies, many of which predate Independence. Kerala’s growth comes from remittances, which is different from Tamil Nadu’s attempt at trying to hasten its growth via manufacturing. All this points to the fact that deeper federalism plays a role in shaping growth. It is only through a deeper and more effective federalism that we will arrive at a cooperative federal bargain. the past 10 years, India has transformed from being an “order taker” to being the pharma of the world. Santhosh Kumar M., Senior Director – Digital, KBR, Inc., said that while Indian GCCs in the oil and gas sector were getting a seat at the table in decision-making, care must be taken to consider behavioural challenges and people-related aspects while adopting to technologies on a global scale. John Xavier, Tech Editor, The Hindu, moderated the session. He said one of the key takeaways from the conversation was the progress made by nano-GCCs in various specialised fields, even while decoupling from tech and performing completely non-tech core functions of the parent company. Development of potential global leaders was another area where the GCCs had huge scope.

Too few psychologists for India’s mental-health push, says study



A recent study published in the Indian Journal of Clinical Psychology has drawn attention to a critical bottleneck in India’s mental-health workforce: the country has very few registered clinical psychologists, and an even lesser number actively practising at any given time. The study was aimed at examining the gaps between Rehabilitation Council of India’s (RCI’s) officially recognised programmes and the qualification of professionals licensed in the Central Rehabilitation Register (CRR) and assessing implications for workforce standards in India.

A descriptive analysis of CRR data was conducted for “Clinical Psychologist” and “Rehabilitation Psychologist” categories. Information on qualifications, registration status (active or not active), and course types was extracted, organised into tables, and summarised using frequencies and percentages. Amit Kumar Soni of Devi Ahilya University, Indore, who led the analysis, said the figures pointed to deeper governance issues. “The CRR is meant to be the backbone of credential verification and workforce planning. Instead, we see low overall numbers, a significant proportion of professionals marked inactive, and inconsistent documentation linking training qualifications to registration categories,” he said. The report was co-authored by Mohit Kumar from All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Bhopal, who cautioned against relying on policy declarations alone to expand mental-health services. “If institutions are to strengthen counselling and suicide-prevention systems, the supply of qualified and verifiably licensed profes-

sionals must increase. Equally important, the licensing pipeline has to be clean and transparent,” he said.

The analysis that examined entries for “Clinical Psychologist” in the CRR found that only 2,900 of the 3,890 professionals listed were marked as “Active,” while the remaining 990 were shown as “Not Active”. “This means roughly one in four registered clinical psychologists was not practising at the time of the snapshot,” Dr. Soni said. For a country of India’s size, an active pool of about 3,000 clinical psychologists is grossly inadequate to meet demand across hospitals, community services, disability and rehabilitation settings, and educational institutions, he pointed out.

Beyond the numerical shortfall, the report highlighted inconsistencies in how qualifications are recorded in the CRR. Multiple course labels appear under the same licensure categories, suggesting gaps in equivalence rules, handling of legacy nomenclature, and documentation practices. Licensure is the public assurance of competence and accountability; inconsistencies in the register undermine both workforce planning and public trust, the authors said. The findings gain added urgency in the wake of recent Supreme Court directions on student mental health and suicide prevention, which have increased pressure on institutions to establish functional mental-health support systems. Such systems require qualified professionals rather than symbolic compliance. “The CRR snapshot offers a reality check. At a time when mental-health services are expected to scale up rapidly, the register reflects a limited and unevenly managed workforce,” Dr Soni said. The report outlined three immediate priorities: expanding training capacity by increasing seats and strengthening institutions that produce licensable psychologists; standardising qualification mapping and equivalence rules to ensure transparency; and reducing avoidable inactivity through improved renewal systems, reminders and clearer status information. “Mental health care and suicide prevention are demanding tasks. Without enough trained psychologists, and without a regulator ensuring a consistent licensing pipeline, India will struggle to meet what its policies - and its courts - now require,” he added.

B Nagi Reddi – A Son’s Memoir: A legendary producer's legacy through the eyes of a son

In south Indian cinema, a production house once had the power to become an identity. Janaki became Shavukaru Janaki after her debut in Shavukaru (Telugu) under Vijaya Productions; Nirmala became Vijaya Nirmala after Enga Veettu Penn (Tamil). Such was the cinematic significance of the studio B. Nagi Reddi created. His fame came from the unforgettable films he produced and the legacy he left behind. These and many other anecdotes form B. Nagi Reddi: A Son’s Memoir, the English-language portrait by his son Viswam, which reads as both personal remembrance and living history.

Born in Pottipadu, a village in today’s Kadapa district of Andhra Pradesh, B. Nagi Reddi’s journey began far from the arc lights and studios of cinema. Drawn early to India’s freedom movement, he later moved to erstwhile Madras to manage the family business, showing a natural flair for enterprise that took him even as far as Rangoon (Burma). From these scattered geographies, his life gradually converged on Vadapalani, Madras (now Chennai), which became his emotional and professional centre. In time, the area became a hub of the south Indian film industry, shaped by his vision in cinema, publishing, and the institutions he built in healthcare. The 250-page book published by Chennai-based Vijaya Publications reads like a parallel history of south Indian cinema. Moving through the formative decades of Telugu and Tamil cinema, it captures the spirit of what is often called the golden era, tracing the rise of Vijaya Productions and offering a first-hand chronicle of an industry in the making, its visionaries and institutions.

Speaking over the phone from Chennai, B. Viswanatha Reddi, aka Viswam, says B. Nagi Reddi – A Son’s Memoir is not written as a monument, but as a memory. Viswam, editor of the iconic Chandamama, a 15-language children magazine, frames his father not as a titan, but as a gentle, disciplined, and private person. “These were unsung heroes,” he says simply. Men who built industries and livelihoods, yet never believed in self-publicity. If they had worked in Bombay (now Mumbai) or Delhi, he feels, history would have deified them. In the south, they preferred dignity over display. From the grandeur of Patala Bhairavi and the brilliance of Mayabazar to the entertaining social Missamma, his Telugu productions defined the grammar of classical Indian cinema. In Tamil cinema, his collaborations with M.G. Ramachandran remain unmatched in scale and influence, while his partnerships with Sivaji Ganesan and later Rajinikanth bridged generations of stardom.

In Telugu, his films with N.T. Rama Rao and Akkineni



Nageswara Rao became landmarks, while in Hindi cinema, Ram aur Shyam with Dilip Kumar reflected his national reach. Institutionally, his acquisition of Vauhini Studios and its merger with Vijaya Studios created one of the most powerful studio ecosystems in Indian cinema, a space where production, training, craft, and infrastructure came together, forming a lifelong creative and ideological partnership with Chakrapani. That same instinct for institution-building extended beyond cinema into healthcare: through Vijaya Hospital and the Vijaya Health Centres, Nagi Reddi created a medical infrastructure that treated not just the public, but generations of film personalities and celebrities from other fields.

The book also traces the parallel growth of the south Indian film industry and its camaraderie, its ethical competition and its collective spirit. Viswam remembers an era where studios looked out for one another, where producers worried about the welfare of rival producers, and where growth was seen as shared, not hoarded. His father, he says, constantly backed new entrants, believing stagnation was the real enemy of cinema. Yet the memoir is as intimate as it is historical. Viswam writes as a son who once felt hurt that even his own family did not fully know what his father had done. The project took years of gathering voices — colleagues, workers, associates — because he never wanted the story to be told in a single voice. “We never wanted to directly narrate the story. We wanted people who were associated with him to speak.” Viswam’s training at Chandamama shaped the method: no gossip, no exaggeration, no mythology — only chronology, fact, and context. The book does not try to enlarge the stature of Dada Saheb Phalke-awardee B. Nagi Reddi. It shows a man who built studios and hospitals, shaped cinema and publishing, and mentored generations.

NavIC tracks 10,400 trains, 40,000 fishing vessels; disaster alerts operational

New Delhi: Real-time train tracking is operational on over 10,400 locomotives and over 40,000 fishing vessels have been equipped with NavIC (Navigation with Indian Constellation) receivers for tracking and emergency alerts, the Parliament was informed on Thursday. Union Minister Dr Jitendra Singh said in a written reply in the Rajya Sabha that the commercial and public utilisation of NavIC has seen significant growth over the past years.

“More than 60 mobile handset models from major global manufacturers support positioning with NavIC. To strengthen the constellation, ISRO is in the process of launching the NVS series (NVS-03, NVS-04, and NVS-05) of second-generation satellites,” the minister informed. He further stated that disaster alerts and personal distress connectivity is provided through GSAT and NavIC/GAGAN systems under Vessel Communication and Support Systems (VCSS) of Department of Fisheries. In addition, search-and-rescue using three satellites under COSPAS-SARSAT programme have been used to save lives during many distress incidents in the Indian service area. Moreover, NavIC one way messaging service broadcasts emergency warnings for cyclones, tsunamis, and high wave alerts directly to NavIC-enabled receivers on boats — in coordination with the Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Services (INCOIS).

Singh said that the system provides potential fishing



zone (PFZ) advisories to help fishermen locate fish aggregations, saving fuel and time, while simultaneously providing International Maritime Boundary alerts to prevent accidental straying into foreign waters. According to an official statement, satellite internet services are emerging as critical solution to bridge India’s digital divide. Programmes like BharatNet and Digital India already leverages use of satellite connectivity in broadband area to expand the reach. The benefit of communication satellites are translated in terms of applications like television broadcasting, DTH television, telecommunication, Very Small Aperture Terminal (VSAT) services, Radio networking, Headend

Hungarian 'Master of the apocalypse' Krasznahorkai wins 2025 Nobel Prize in Literature

won the 2025 Nobel Prize in Literature on Thursday "for his compelling and visionary oeuvre that, in the midst of apocalyptic terror, reaffirms the power of art." Laszlo Krasznahorkai is a great epic writer in the Central European tradition that extends through Kafka to Thomas Bernhard, and is characterised by absurdism and grotesque excess," the Swedish Academy, which awards the prize, said in a statement. The settings of his novels move across central Europe's remote villages and towns, from Hungary to Germany, before skipping to the Far East, where his travels to China and Japan left deep-seated impressions on Krasznahorkai. The American critic Susan Sontag crowned Krasznahorkai contemporary literature's "master of the apocalypse", the Academy said, "a judgement she arrived at after having read the author's second book *Melancholy of Resistance*". The second Hungarian to win the prize, worth 11 million Swedish crowns (\$1.2 million), after Imre Kertész in 2002, Krasznahorkai was born in the small town of Gyula in southeast Hungary, near the Romanian border.

His breakthrough 1985 novel, *Satantango*, is set in a similarly remote rural area and became a literary sensation in Hungary. "The novel portrays, in powerfully suggestive terms, a destitute group of residents on an abandoned collective farm in the Hungarian countryside just before the fall of communism," the Academy said. Across the region, collective farms had been set up when farming land was confiscated at the start of communist rule, and many had become symbols of mismanagement and poverty by the time it ended in 1989. "Everyone in the novel is waiting for a miracle to happen, a hope that is from the very outset punctured by the book's introductory (Franz) Kafka motto: 'In that case, I'll miss the thing by waiting for it,'" the Academy said. *Krasznahorkai* has repeatedly referenced "The Castle" by Kafka as a key influence. "When I am not reading Kafka, I am thinking about Kafka. When I am not thinking about Kafka, I miss thinking about him," he told the *White Review* in 2013. **CRITICALLY ACCLAIMED SCREEN ADAPTATIONS**

Krasznahorkai had a close creative partnership with Hungarian filmmaker Bela Tarr. Several of his works have been adapted into films by Tarr, including "Satantango", which runs to more than seven hours, and "The Werckmeister Harmonies". "When I read (Satantango), I knew it immediately that I must make a film based on it," Tarr told Reuters by phone. "I am very happy... it's hard to say anything right now." Their collaboration has garnered



critical acclaim. In 1993, he received the German Bestenliste Prize for the best literary work of the year for "The Melancholy of Resistance". Krasznahorkai's writing may resonate with readers immersed in news from Russia's war in Ukraine or the Palestinian-Israeli conflict. "We seem to have entered the 21st century in a more hostile and bleak environment than we hoped for at the end of the 20th," said Jason Whittaker, Professor of Communications at the University of Lincoln. "So actually ... some of the bleak and darkly comic elements of books such as *Satantango* actually will resonate with many more readers than previously." Established in the will of Swedish dynamite inventor and businessman Alfred Nobel, the prizes for achievements in literature, science and peace have been awarded since 1901. Past winners of the prize include French poet and essayist Sully Prudhomme, who bagged the first award, American novelist and short story writer William Faulkner in 1949, Britain's World War Two Prime Minister Winston Churchill in 1953, Turkey's Orhan Pamuk in 2006 and Norway's Jon Fosse in 2023. Last year's prize was won by South Korean author Han Kang who became the 18th woman - the first was Swedish author Selma Lagerlof in 1909 - and the first South Korean to receive the award. Over the years, the choices made by the Swedish Academy have drawn as much ire as applause.

In 2016, the award to American singer-songwriter Bob Dylan sparked criticism that his work was not proper literature, while Austrian Peter Handke's prize also drew criticism in 2019. Handke had attended the funeral in 2006 of former Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic, seen by many as responsible for the deaths of thousands of ethnic Albanians who were killed in Kosovo and the displacement of almost 1 million others during a brutal war waged by forces under his control in 1998-99. Prizegivers have also in the past been accused of ignoring some of the giants of literature, including Russia's Lev Nikolayevich Tolstoy, France's Emile Zola and Ireland's James Joyce.

Pope Leo invokes criticism of Trump's policies in first major document

Israel, Hamas agree to 'first phase' of plan to end fighting, release hostages, Trump says

Israel and Hamas have agreed to the “first phase” of his peace plan to pause fighting and release at least some hostages and prisoners, U.S. President Donald Trump said on Wednesday (October 8, 2025) in announcing the outlines of the biggest breakthrough in months in the two-year-old war. “This means that ALL of the Hostages will be released very soon, and Israel will withdraw their Troops to an agreed upon line as the first steps toward a Strong, Durable, and Everlasting Peace,” Mr. Trump wrote on social media. Earlier on Wednesday (October 8), Mr. Trump said that he might travel this weekend to Egypt, where his envoys were in talks to try to seal the ceasefire and hostage-release agreement. “All Parties will be treated fairly!” Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on social media, “With God’s help we will bring them all home.” Mr. Netanyahu and Mr. Trump spoke about the ‘historic achievement’ of reaching the deal, Israeli leader’s office said. Benjamin Netanyahu said he would convene the government on Thursday (October 9) to approve the Gaza ceasefire agreement aimed at bringing home all the Israeli hostages. China honing abilities for a possible future attack, Taiwan defence report warns

TAIPEI, Oct 9 (Reuters) China is increasing military activities near Taiwan and honing its ability to stage a surprise attack, as well as seeking to undermine trust in the government with "hybrid" online warfare tactics, the island's defence ministry said on Thursday. Democratically-governed Taiwan, which China views as its own territory, has faced increased military pressure from Beijing over the past five years, including at least seven rounds of major war games around the island since 2022. "The Chinese communists have adopted routine grey zone harassment tactics, combined with joint combat readiness patrols, targeted military exercises and cognitive warfare, posing a comprehensive threat to us," the defence ministry said in a report released every two years. Grey zone refers to non-combat operations designed to put pressure on Taiwan such as coast guard patrols, damage to under-sea cables and flying balloons. China's coast guard is expanding its activities around Taiwan and may in future take "aggressive containment measures" in concert with the military while rehearsing attack scenarios, the report said. Beijing is also using "hybrid warfare" to weaken people's trust in the government and support for defence spending, and using artificial intelligence tools to weaken Taiwan's cybersecurity and to scan for weak points in critical infrastructure, it added. "Through both conventional and unconventional military actions, it aims to test its capabilities for attacking Taiwan and confronting foreign forces," the ministry said.

China's defence ministry did not respond to a request for comment. China has never renounced the use of force to bring Taiwan under its control. REUTERS/Florence Lo Purchase Licensing Rights, opens new tabChina could also try to suddenly shift drills into active combat mode to catch Taiwan and its international supporters off guard, posing a significant threat to re-



gional peace and security, Taiwan's ministry added. In recent years, China has been extensively using civilian roll-on/roll-off merchant vessels for military transport operations and continues to develop specialised equipment for beach landing operations, the ministry said. The report said China is using a "professional cyber army" to manipulate social media accounts and flood them with misinformation to sow division in Taiwanese society and weaken trust in the government.

Chinese state media outlets and collaborators have also worked to weaken the will to fight, it said. The ministry added China has also been using deepfake technology to make videos and utilising AI to "generate polarising political rhetoric". China considers Taiwan President Lai Ching-te a "separatist". Lai rejects Beijing's sovereignty claims, saying only the island's people can decide their future. Taiwan's government has embarked on a military modernisation programme and pledged to spend 5% of GDP on defence by 2030. The report was released one day before Lai gives his key national day speech. China last year held war games after that same event in what it said was a warning to "separatist acts". China's last formal war games around Taiwan took place in April, though its warplanes and warships operate almost daily in the skies and waters close to the island.

EU's von der Leyen survives no-confidence votes in parliament

EU lawmakers rejected the two motions of censure with 378 members of the 720-strong parliament expressing support for von der Leyen in the first vote and 383 in the second. The Reuters Daily Briefing newsletter provides all the news you need to start your day. Sign up [here](#).

Von der Leyen said in a post on X that she deeply appreciated the support and that her team of commissioners would work closely with the parliament to tackle

Europe's challenges. The results were slightly better for the EU executive chief than in July, when 360 lawmakers voted against a motion brought by mainly far-right lawmakers, although below the 401 votes for von der Leyen's re-election for a second term in July 2024. Although the motions of censure had almost no chance of reaching the two-thirds majority required to unseat von der Leyen, some lawmakers said they could expose more general disquiet over her leadership and destabilise the EU assembly, whose backing is required to pass legislation. Parties outside the mainstream have realised that previously seldom-used censure motions are easy to trigger after the 2024 elections swelled the far right to more than 100 lawmakers,

with only 72 required to back one. Both censure motions criticised von der Leyen for accepting an unbalanced tariff deal with the United States and proposing a trade agreement with South American bloc Mercosur, which critics say threatens farmers and the environment. The U.S. and Mercosur deals will be put to votes in the European Parliament in the coming months, with the outcomes unclear.

India-China flights to resume after five years from October 26

The Centre on Thursday (October 2, 2025) gave the green signal to resume direct flights between India and China after a gap of five years, with IndiGo's flights from Kolkata to the trading hub of Guangzhou set for take-off from October 26. "It has now been agreed that direct air services connecting designated points in India and China can resume by late October 2025, in keeping with the winter season schedule," a statement from the Ministry of External Affairs said, adding that the move will "further facilitate people-to-people contact between India and China, contributing towards the gradual normalisation of bilateral exchanges." The statement was followed by IndiGo announcing daily flights between Guangzhou and Kolkata, adding that the trading city would be connected with New Delhi soon, "subject to regulatory approvals". Tickets for flights between Kolkata and Guangzhou will open for sale from Friday (October 3). Industry sources said Air India too expects to start flights to Shanghai "before the end of the year". In July, the Indian government had announced resumption of tourist visas to Chinese nationals.

Direct flights between India and China have been suspended since March 2020, when India halted all international travel amid the Covid-19 pandemic. While restrictions eased gradually for many countries, flights to China remained suspended due to heightened tensions along the Line of Actual Control. IndiGo's flights start on the first day of the winter schedule that begins on the last Sunday of October. The annual aviation timetable is divided into summer and winter schedules and allows airlines to plan and adjust flights. Summer schedule starts from the last Sunday in March.

On the resumption of flights by Chinese carriers such as Air China, China Eastern Airlines, China Southern Airlines, and Shandong Airlines, sources said there has been a delay in submission of their applications to the government. Air China is learnt to have sought permission to connect Beijing with Delhi and later Mumbai, said one industry veteran. Though all international flights were banned on March 22, 2020, as part of lockdown measures to curb the spread of Covid-19 pandemic, international flights gradually

resumed from the first week of May 2020 through special air bubble arrangements until March 2022, when normal commercial international flights were once again permitted. But direct flights between India and China did not restart because of tensions in the relationship between the two countries following the Galwan Valley clash of June 2020. The disruption had especially impacted small traders. For over five years, travellers needing to move between India and China relied on connecting flights via third-country hubs such as Hong Kong and Singapore, resulting in increased travel time and costs.

The tourism industry welcomed the government's decision. "China is one of the world's largest sources for outbound tourism and has a significant contribution to inbound tourism for India. Resumption of air links between the two countries is welcome, especially as India hasn't yet reached pre-COVID levels of inbound tourists, which used to be at 11.5 million and today lags behind at 9.5 million," said founder-chairman of STIC Travel Group of Companies, Subhash Goyal.

Canadian PM Carney visits Trump as relations between them remain at a low point

Washington: Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney will meet with President Donald Trump in the Oval Office on Tuesday at a time when one of the world's most durable and amicable alliances has been fractured by Trump's trade war and annexation threats.

Carney's second visit to the White House comes ahead of a review next year of the free trade agreement, which is critical to Canada's economy. More than 77 per cent of Canada's exports go to the US. Trump's talk of making Canada the 51st state and his tariffs have Canadians feeling an undeniable sense of betrayal. Relations with Canada's southern neighbour and longtime ally haven't been worse. "We've had ups and downs, but this is the lowest point in relations that I can recall," said Frank McKenna, a former Canadian ambassador to the United States and current deputy chairman of TD Bank. "Canadians aren't being instructed what to do; they are simply voting with their feet," he said. "I talk every day to ordinary citizens who are changing their vacation plans, and I talk to large business owners who are moving reward trips away or executive business trips. There is an outright rebellion." There is fear in Canada over what will happen to the US-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Carney is looking to get some relief on some sector-specific tariffs, but expectations are low.

Reports that Air India crash investigation has been finalised are ‘incorrect and speculative’, says probe agency AAIB



Amid speculation in sections of Western media that Indian investigators probing the fatal crash of Air India flight AI 171 are veering towards deliberate action by one of the pilots as the cause of the accident, the Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) said Thursday that reports suggesting that the investigation into the accident has been finalised are “incorrect and speculative”. “The investigation is still in progress. No final conclusions have been reached. The AAIB conducts investigations strictly in accordance with the Aircraft (Investigation of Accidents and Incidents) Rules, 2025, and India’s obligations under ICAO (International Civil Aviation Organization) Annex 13. Aircraft accident investigations are technical, evidence-based processes aimed at determining root causes and enhancing safety,” the investigating agency said Thursday evening in a clarification.

“The Preliminary Report released earlier provided factual information available at that stage. The Final Investigation Report, containing conclusions and safety recommendations, will be published upon completion of the investigation in line with established international norms,” it said, while urging media organisations to “exercise restraint and avoid premature speculation”. “Unverified reporting causes unnecessary public anxiety and undermines the integrity of an ongoing professional investigation,” the AAIB said.

Reports in Western news outlets have been indicating that the probe is purportedly zeroing in on deliberate action by one of the pilots; AAIB and the government have maintained that the probe is underway with all angles being investigated and nothing has been ruled out yet. AAIB’s latest clarification comes close on the heels of a report in Italian newspaper Corriere della Sera, which said that Indian investigators “are preparing to write in their final report that the plane crashed because one of the pilots turned off the two fuel switches”. The report, the newspaper said, is based on inputs from “Western sources”. “In short, there was no

technical defect. But human intervention was ‘almost certainly’ intentional . This is what Corriere learned from two Western sources familiar with the most recent discussions between New Delhi and Washington,” the news report, translated from Italian, said. The preliminary report released by the AAIB a month after the June 12 crash had said that the accident occurred after both engines of the aircraft were starved of fuel as both its engine fuel control switches transitioned from ‘RUN’ to ‘CUTOFF’ position within a second of each other, moments after lift-off. The crash—the worst aviation disaster involving an Indian airline in decades—claimed 260 lives.

The preliminary report mentioned that in the cockpit voice recording, one of the pilots was heard asking the other why he cut off the fuel, to which the other pilot responded saying he did not. There has been speculation on whether the switches were flipped by one of the pilots—inadvertently or otherwise—or whether the transition signal to the system was due to a technical, mechanical or software issue. The AAIB report did not state that either of the pilots physically flipped the switches, just that they transitioned from ‘RUN’ to ‘CUTOFF’. The investigation into the crash is ongoing, with the final probe report expected before the one-year anniversary of the crash.

“It’s currently unclear whether a detailed description of the incident will be provided, nor whether explicit attribution of responsibility will be forthcoming—the commander is the prime suspect. But for the American experts assisting the investigation, this is a welcome breakthrough, after weeks of heated discussions with an Indian side that has so far refused to acknowledge a human role in the tragedy,” the report by the Italian newspaper said. The selective information presented in the report had many believing that it implicitly pointed a finger at the flight crew, particularly the flight’s captain Sumeet Sabharwal, a highly experienced pilot. Pilot suicide theories also started doing rounds, despite the government’s assurances that all aspects and possible causes will be thoroughly examined. Pilot bodies, including the Federation of Indian Pilots (FIP), have raised strong objections to the preliminary report, so have some aviation experts. The FIP and Sumeet Sabharwal’s father Pushkar Raj Sabharwal also filed a writ petition in the Supreme Court, challenging the fairness of the AAIB probe, apart from demanding that the government should initiate a judicial investigation into the crash, instead of relying on the AAIB probe. Aviation safety experts have said that the possibility of catastrophic system failures should be investigated thoroughly.

How gold rally is affecting small jewellers, as big players turn to innovation

India’s jewellery industry has come under pressure as a sharp rise in gold prices has reshaped consumer buying patterns. Gold prices have surged more than 80% over the past year amid geopolitical and tariff-related uncertainty, squeezing margins at a time when jewellery sales volumes are slowing. While big brands are coping through innovation and product diversification, some of these changing trends have left small traders in a lurch. Further, many consumers are opting to move down the purity scale to switch to 18 or even 9 karat variants of the yellow metal, alongside a steady downward trend in gifting.

“If I make a rough guess, at least 75% of the volumes (of gold jewellery) have been hit. In fact, many are making losses,” said Raju Solanki, owner of Zaveri Kapoorchand Lalchand, a jewellery store in Zaveri Bazaar, Mumbai’s famous jewellery market. This has been reflected in the stock prices of listed entities — Kalyan Jewellers India has fallen around 19% since April 2025, when US President Donald Trump first announced reciprocal tariffs on trading partners. Other major listed entities such as PN Gadgil Jewellers, Rajesh Exports, and PC Jewellers have also fallen 6-23% over the period. The more diversified Titan has bucked the trend, rising 35% during the period, while Senco Gold has also risen around 23%, but not before crashing by 53% in the beginning of 2025.

While revenues of these companies have surged, with most listed entities posting robust business updates for the third quarter of the ongoing financial year, industry participants and experts have revealed that all might not be well behind the scenes. The Q3 earnings will provide more clarity on margins, with most listed jewellery entities set to announce their results next week. Gold jewellery volumes, margins take a hitGold jewellery volumes have clearly taken a hit over the past few months, though it is not reflected in their sales figure. A report by the World Gold Council showed that India’s jewellery demand fell 24% year-on-year to 430.5 tonnes in 2025, despite the total value of what was sold surging to a record of \$49 billion.

Smaller jewellers in Zaveri Bazaar indicated a 20-30% squeeze in margins during the gold rally. Margins have been hit across the jewellery retail sector, and demand has been sluggish, various people from the industry said. “Demand has become more selective rather than absent — customers are buying lower gram weight pieces or exchanging old gold instead of fresh purchases. Organised retailers, in particular, have managed the transition better than unorganised players due to stronger inventory management and transparent pricing,” according to Prithviraj Kothari, Managing Director of RiddiSiddhi Bullions and the president of the India Bullion and Jewellers Association. Retailers with deeper pockets have been able to protect margins despite lower volumes. Now, most consumers want to purchase jewellery from big, reputable chains instead of local jewellers as they represent trust during such big-ticket and increasingly occasional purchases. Many are also exchanging old gold in order to buy new jewellery as a means to afford it.

While even the smaller listed players have been able to navigate through the challenging times, it is the small local jewellery shops that have been hit hard. Some smaller jewellers in Mumbai’s Zaveri Bazaar even let go of employees in order to mitigate costs and stay afloat. “Its been a struggle in recent months. We are importing new molds in order to offer newer products, but cash is tight. We have started offering 14 karat jewellery recently as customers want lower-priced products,” said a small jewellery shop owner in the area on the condition of anonymity.

Moreover, the gifting segment — a big revenue driver for jewellery companies — has come to a standstill. “Gold, in fact silver too, has become unaffordable for gifting purposes. Earlier, 80% of our business used to come from the



gifting segment, which has now absolutely evaporated,” said Solanki of Zaveri Kapoorchand Lalchand. Jewellery retailers have increasingly had to innovate and offer more affordable options to compete in this environment. Customers are also turning to lower purity gold to afford it, with retailers now offer jewellery of 9 karat as well. “People now don’t necessarily look if it’s a 9 carat or 18 carat jewellery, as long as it’s gold, it’s fine. What matters is the status symbol (of owning gold),” said Arthi Ramalingam, founder and CEO of online jewellery marketplace Etemz. In this scenario, bigger players have enough resources and funds in order to quickly innovate and launch new products to cater to the shifting consumer trends. These companies not only have a wide range of offerings in the jewellery segment, but also have a diversified product range. For example, Titan’s jewellery segment consists of Tanishq (the flagship premium brand), Mia (affordable and trendy jewellery for young professionals), and Zoya (high-end boutique jewellery). The company also offers watches and eyewear, making it a well-diversified conglomerate that can mitigate stress in a particular segment to a large extent. The same goes for Tata group’s Caratlane and Reliance Industries’ Reliance Jewels, which only deal in the jewellery space but have a wide range of products. Meanwhile, experts said traditional jewellers such as Kalyan Jewellers and PC Jewellers have likely been slow to adapt and innovate, which was reflected in the stock prices. They also have a more limited product range. Unsold inventory & tax burdenThe sluggish demand has led to higher inventories, which has increased the tax burden of these smaller jewellers. Companies are taxed on the basis of the value of unsold inventory. Since inventory has increased, taxes have also been high despite slow sales. “I know people (jewellers) who paid as much taxes as they had earned last year. Even the bigger shops are sweating now,” said Solanki. Jewellery companies are also having to give higher discounts on both the gold and making charges in order to attract customers, which is further squeezing margins. Larger conglomerates such as Titan and Caratlane are better positioned to absorb the impact, while smaller players face significantly greater strain.

Smaller individual shops that have a large share of fixed clients with particular preferences find it difficult to switch to high-margin segments such as studded jewellery which is easier for bigger chains. These clients have paused their jewellery shopping recently, and the high discounts and brand value of jewellery chains have made it difficult for small jewellers to attract new customers. The entire industry seems to be at the cusp of a big transition, with gold prices unlikely to slow down, and things have been more challenging down the value chain. While established players will likely remain stable if the situation persists, it remains to be seen how smaller players will stay afloat and navigate the challenges.

The death of the bad boy trope: How the female gaze is redefining romance in 2026



The viral hype and success of the Canadian television show Heated Rivalry have brought to light the fact that women’s taste in romance has shifted significantly in the last decade or two. Aadishree Dixit, a writer and content strategist, found Heated Rivalry a refreshing and reaffirming watch. “Queer representation is either doomed or sanitised, and watching Shane and Ilya navigate desire that turns into love was beautiful,” she told indianexpress.com.

Nandini Upadhyay did not watch a lot of romantic dramas growing up, but after watching the movie Gehraiyaan, she found herself falling in love with the genre. “Gehraiyaan is one of my favourite Indian movies, possibly one of my favourite movies in general. Although it does depict toxicity, I like it for its in-depth exploration of characterisation and psychology,” the former social media executive at Your Design District (an interior design firm) told indianexpress.com. For her, stories that explore human behaviour, psychology and the complexity of relationships tick all the boxes.

“I think it’s because growing up, we all saw too much ‘fairy tale love’, which can be innocent and even whimsical in Bollywood, so movies like Gehraiyaan and shows like Made In Heaven are refreshing for me,” she said, adding that if the story revolves around ambitious women who focus on their career, it becomes “more relatable” for someone like her. When it comes to the romance genre, Dixit wants more vulnerability and willingness to be represented in media, a lot like Ilya’s character from Rivalry. She wants imperfect characters that grow, change, and do not see change as a threat to their being, like Scott. More women characters are treated respectfully, like Svetlana and Rose. Women who are valued friends to men, not just objects of desire. Indian women want more diverse romance, especially happy queer romance stories, to be put under the spotlight. “Where is our version of Jane Tu Ya Jaane Na? Can someone make it please?” asked the writer and con-

(Source: Instagram/@@bridgertonnetflix) When it comes to straight stories, Dixit is looking for more assertive women who “refuse to settle for the bare minimum and for men who stop complaining, take accountability and do what Mr Darcy (from Jane Austen’s Pride and Prejudice) did — change their ways without feeling entitled to getting the girl”.

For Drishti Anup Khandelwal, 2026 should be a year where romance feels healthy and equal. Stories where love is built on communication, mutual respect, and emotional safety, without losing passion or attraction should take the front seat. Relationships driven by control, jealousy, or emotional suffering are not the vibe anymore, apparently. Instead, women want to see partners who grow together, express their feelings openly, and treat vulnerability as a strength. This shift reflects a desire for romance that feels realistic and supportive, offering positive examples of love for younger audiences growing up with these stories. According to the PR freelancer, these portrayals matter deeply for younger generations. “On-screen romances often become emotional reference points, shaping how love, conflict, and care are understood in real life. When stories centre kindness, communication, and mutual respect, they quietly reset expectations around what healthy love looks like,” she shared.

Culture Analyst Abha Ahad believes Gen Z women are 100% evolving from putting up with low-commitment, casual connections to valuing emotional depth and vulnerability. She attributed this shift to be a counter-narrative to the red-pillled manosphere. According to her, BookTok has definitely evolved from the mysterious macho bad boys to wanting the male leads to be yearners. And so have the average Gen Z women’s expectations from love and partnership. The popularity of the Bridgerton web series is a great example. “When we have the manosphere telling young, impressionable men that women only care about their gym gains and bank balance, women are flooding the internet with memes (for example, the Colin Bridgerton Yearner meme) and theories on what they actually care about. Soft, understanding, loving men who remembers their coffee orders and lose their cool at the mere sight to their paramour,” she shares. Ahad says all the male leads of the show are ‘certified yearners’. “I see this is a response to the increase in non-committal romantic entanglements. In the age of situationships and semi-committal relationships that most often leave us confused and drained, yearners are the dream. Unlike the nonchalance we are quickly normalising, yearners come with a certain sense of fire that makes you seen,” she added. Instead of normalising emotional neglect or control, this new wave of romance offers models rooted in equality and emotional safety. As women increasingly embrace these narratives, they are not just changing what succeeds on screen, they are redefining what love should feel like: fulfilling, expressive, and humane.

Dizziness and drops: Why fasting isn’t safe for all blood pressure patients

High blood pressure is influenced by factors such as body weight, insulin sensitivity, inflammation, diet, physical activity, and stress. In recent years, fasting has been studied for its potential effects on these markers. But does it really support blood pressure control? According to Dr Prateek Kumar, Consultant Physician at Maccuru Hospital, fasting can help—but it isn’t a cure-all.

Does fasting directly lower blood pressure?

“There is scientific evidence showing that fasting can reduce blood pressure, but the effects are largely indirect,” explains Dr Prateek Kumar. He notes that fasting often leads to weight loss, better insulin sensitivity, and lower inflammation—factors that are closely linked to healthier blood pressure levels. Studies have shown modest reductions in both systolic and diastolic blood pressure, particularly in people who are overweight or have early-stage hypertension, he adds. “However, fasting on its own is not a treatment,” Dr Kumar cautions. “Its impact depends on overall diet quality, physical activity, sleep, and stress management.”

Which fasting methods show the most promise?

Not all fasting styles work the same way. According to Dr Kumar, time-restricted eating—where meals are limited to an 8–10-hour daily window—appears to be the most sustainable and effective approach for supporting blood pressure. “This pattern aligns better with our circadian rhythm and improves metabolic health without extreme calorie restriction,” he says. Intermittent fasting methods such as the 5:2 diet or alternate-day fasting have also shown improvements in blood pressure, but results vary among individuals. Longer fasts may temporarily lower blood pressure, but Dr Kumar advises caution. “They are difficult to maintain and come with higher risks, so they’re not suitable



for routine blood pressure management.”

Who should avoid fasting for blood pressure control?

Fasting is not safe for everyone. Dr Kumar warns that people with uncontrolled hypertension, those on multiple blood pressure medications, individuals with diabetes prone to low blood sugar, pregnant or breastfeeding women, and people with a history of eating disorders should avoid fasting altogether. “In these groups, fasting can increase the risk of dizziness, electrolyte imbalance, or sudden drops in blood pressure,” he explains.

Safer, proven alternatives to manage blood pressureFor those who cannot or should not fast, Dr Kumar recommends evidence-based lifestyle approaches. “Balanced eating patterns like the DASH or Mediterranean diet, reducing salt intake, regular physical activity, stress management, and consistent sleep have far stronger and safer evidence for blood pressure control,” he says. Ultimately, he emphasises consistency over trends. “Fasting can be a helpful tool for some people, but it works best as part of a larger, balanced lifestyle—not as a standalone solution.”

What’s in a name? From rasgulla to champagne, why authenticity matters

The same outrage or scepticism that Indians feel when they read about Turmeric Latte and Chai Latte or Chai Tea and Naan Bread is what I reckon the Italians, the French, or the Mexicans would feel if they looked at shelves of Indian Gruyere and Parmesan and now even Indian Champagne and Tequila in supermarkets and liquor stores.

I am all for innovation and any move that spreads varied tastes and enhanced flavours and cuisines across the world. But what qualifies a bubbly beverage to be called Champagne, or a certain cheese to be called Gruyere or Parmigiano Reggiano? There are geographical qualifications—these products must originate from specific regions, such as grapes from the Champagne region. In the case of Tequila, it can be produced outside Jalisco, but only within specific municipalities in four other Mexican states: Guanajuato, Michoacán, Nayarit, and Tamaulipas. If the alcohol is not made from Blue Weber agave, or is produced outside these specific regions or outside Mexico, it cannot be classified as tequila. Instead, it is called an “agave spirit” or “mezcal”.

This brings us to Geographical Indication (GI) tags, which caught my attention when Odisha applied for a GI certificate for rosogolla. GI status identifies a product as originating from a specific location and guarantees its authenticity and distinctiveness. Odisha claims that the rosogolla was created within its borders as an offering—the khiramohana—to Lord Jagannath. Bengal begs to differ. In 2019, the ‘Odisha Rasagola’ was given a GI tag, but

Bengal could rest easy, as the softer, spongy white rasgulla of the state had already received a separate GI tag in 2017.

Now, the rasgulla isn’t the only delicacy to have received a GI tag. In fact, the recent years have seen a slew of such recognitions. In 2022 and 2023, the Mithila Makhana (Bihar), Tandur Red Gram (Telangana), Raktsey Karpo Apricot (Ladakh), Alibag White Onion (Maharashtra), and Mancurad Mango (Goa) all received GI tags.

Some of the other well-known GI-tagged Indian foods include Darjeeling Tea (West Bengal), Kashmir Saffron (Jammu & Kashmir), Naga King Chili (Nagaland), Bikaneri Bhujia (Rajasthan), Tirupati Laddu (Andhra Pradesh), Dharwad Peda (Karnataka), Goan Bebinca (Goa), Alphonso Mango (Maharashtra), Basmati Rice (Northern regions), the delicious Manipuri Black Rice (Manipur), the almost Halloumi-like Kaladi Cheese (Jammu), and Odisha’s Magji Laddoo. Last year saw a few other Indian sweets receive the GI tag. And it’s no surprise that four of the five are from West Bengal—with its perfect combination of chhena (home-made soft paneer) and jaggery. First on the list is Nolen Gur Sandesh, made with fresh chhena and cooked over a low flame with liquid date palm jaggery (nolen gur) harvested from date palms around Bardhaman, West Bengal. It is the gur or liquid jaggery that lends the sandesh its biscuit colour and caramelly sweetness. The other sweet to make the cut was the Murshidabad Chhanabora, again from West Bengal. Fresh chhena is shaped into small roundels, lightly fried, and soaked in sugar syrup.

Pakistan spinners vs India: Why Ajantha Mendis backs Abrar Ahmed and Saim Ayub at Premadasa

In the practice nets at Premadasa stadium at the T20 World Cup, two ropes lie stretched across the pitch, perfectly aligned with off and leg stump. Between them, a left-handed batsman shuffles—forward, back, across—while Pakistan’s spinners hunt for perfection. The drill is simple: keep the ball within those tramlines until deception becomes instinct, until mystery becomes muscle memory. This is where Abrar Ahmed and Saim Ayub are forging their weapons for Sunday’s showdown against India at the Premadasa. And in a contest historically defined by Pakistan’s pace against Indian batting prowess, this match promises something entirely different—a battle won or lost in the flick of a wrist, the skid of a carrom ball. The OG speaks

Ajantha Mendis remembers. Two decades ago, the Sri Lankan was cricket’s original illusionist, the godfather of mystery carrom-ball spin who bamboozled India with deliveries that seemed to defy physics itself. He took 116 wickets at the Premadasa, turning this very ground into his theatre of deception. When he speaks about the carrom ball—his carrom ball—there’s the quiet authority of a man who once made the world’s best batsmen look foolish. “The carrom ball, particularly when bowled with back-spin, where the revs go back, will ensure the ball skids on here,” Mendis tells The Indian Express, his words carrying the weight of lived experience. “And both Abrar and Saim are similar in this aspect. They rely on back spin. So naturally they will get good help at Premadasa.”

For Mendis, the conditions in Colombo aren’t just favourable—they’re ideal. The dry Premadasa surface transforms the carrom ball from a party trick into a lethal weapon. “When the pitch is dry, the full effect comes into play. You can get the ball to skid on, which opens up two options to take wickets—bowled and LBW. Even a slight variation is enough because in T20s, batsmen commit quickly to their shots. You can’t make late adjustments to a carrom ball unless you pick it.” He pauses, before adding a crucial insight about Pakistan’s duo: “From whatever I’ve seen, they have good control over their variations. In T20s, it’s vital to have variations because you keep the batsman guessing. If you bowl six carrom balls an over, batsmen get used to it. It’s the delivery you should use to surprise batsmen—very few can read the pace off it.” Coming from

the man who once made reading spin look impossible, it’s the ultimate endorsement. The nurtured one

Saim Ayub didn’t choose this path—it chose him. A reluctant part-timer who started with a few tentative leg-breaks, he found inspiration in Afghanistan’s Mujeeb Ur Rahman and added the googly to his repertoire. For years, he was the stand-in during training sessions, the fill-in when frontline spinners needed rest. Then came Ashley Noffke, Pakistan’s bowling coach, with a simple proposition: your explosive batting alone won’t keep your spot. What followed were hours upon hours in the nets. Between series, Noffke would drill discipline into Saim’s bowling, demanding he hit those tramlines with monotonous precision. Control first, variations later. The carrom ball—the most difficult of all—began with tennis balls before graduating to the red cherry. Perfection wasn’t the goal; muscle memory was.

The transformation has been remarkable. Pakistan now trust him with the new ball, deploying him against batsmen intent on explosive starts. In powerplays, he’s delivered 118 dot balls in 28 innings, claimed 14 wickets, and maintained an economy of 8.41—a statistical testament to his evolution from afterthought to weapon. Last year’s Asia Cup provided the blueprint. When Pakistan and India clashed, Saim was a thorn in Indian flesh, his variations so effective that debates still rage in Pakistan about whether the final’s outcome would’ve changed had he bowled one of Haris Rauf’s expensive overs. That tournament propelled him to No. 2 in the all-rounder rankings, ahead of India’s Hardik Pandya. The Natural

Where Saim was nurtured, Abrar Ahmed was born into mystery. Nicknamed “Harry Potter,” his carrom ball isn’t just a delivery—it’s his identity, his calling card. He’s already humbled Shubman Gill, and with his penchant for getting in batsmen’s faces and delivering unique send-offs, he knows how to crawl under the skin. India famously mauled him during the Asia Cup—42 runs in four overs, an education in humility. But great mystery spinners don’t just deceive; they reinvent. Abrar has evolved. Like Mendis advised, he doesn’t overuse the carrom ball anymore. Following Varun Chakaravathy’s example, he’s incorporated side-spin as a rescue option. Now, regardless of when he’s called upon, his strategy is elegant in its simplicity: hit the top half of the bat, float a couple of inviting deliveries, then deliver the sucker punch. Pakistan’s left-arm spinner Mohammad Nawaz has been their most successful tweaker in recent times, but there’s a delicious irony at play. Teams have become so wary of Abrar and Saim that they’ve decided to simply survive their overs without damage and attack Nawaz instead. In trying to avoid one trap, they’ve walked into another. On Sunday, against an India lineup stacked with left-handers, Abrar and Saim pose a particularly thorny problem. Both can turn the ball either way. The scene is set. The ropes are laid. The mystery spinners are ready. And somewhere, perhaps, Ajantha Mendis will be watching—wondering if they’ll create the same magic he once did on this very ground, against this very opponent.

Blessing Muzarabani, the boy who bowled without a shoe, knocked over Australia at T20 World Cup

The first thing you notice about Blessing Muzarabani, 29, is the height. Six foot eight. The second thing, if you’re paying attention, is what Tatenda Taibu saw when he first met the kid at Takashinga Cricket Club in Harare’s Highfield suburb: hunger.

Not the physical kind, though that was there too. The kid was malnourished, like so many from the poorest neighborhoods in Harare. His hunger though was the kind food can’t satisfy. The kind that got satiated on Saturday in Sri Lanka when the 29-year old seamer hassled the Australians with his skiddy pace and bounce to grab a four-for. The short ball into the ribcage took out Josh Inglis and Tim David with the new ball. And he returned at the end to slip in a lovely slower ball to knock down Australia’s highest scorer Matt Renshaw, before taking out the leg stump of Adam Zampa. Game over. He was seven years old when he bowled his first ball. Tagged along with his cousin Taurai to Takashinga. Something clicked. He didn’t have cricket shoes that day. Didn’t have them cleats the next day either. Or the day after that. What’s it like to show up at Harare Sports Club—concrete hot under your bare feet—and watch the other boys arrive with their parents dropping them off in cars?

“It was really tough because sometimes you mingle with the rich kids and poor kids together,” Muzarabani once told the Cricket Monthly. “As a kid, that affects you a huge deal. You see the kind of shoes they wear, and you want them too, but there’s no way I could afford them.” He could have walked away, but he didn’t. “I didn’t care about whether I had shoes, or whether I had a bat. I just focused on going out there and bowling and doing what I loved.

Not opportunity. Just love for a game. For Muzarabani, it had to be enough. Taibu, the diminutive former Zimbabwe wicketkeeper who was convener of selectors, almost dismissed him at first. Too quiet. Too shy, maybe. But for a month, Taibu watched. “Whatever he has gone through in life, he doesn’t want to experience that again,” Taibu once told Cricbuzz. That hunger—there’s that word again—to change his life situation. By 15, he had shot up. Six foot eight out of nowhere. With the height came genuine, frightening pace. The gangly kid from Highfield—the suburb that had already given Zimbabwe Wellington Masakadza, Taibu, Elton Chigumbura.

Then came March 2018. The ODI World Cup Qualifiers. Free entry flooded the grounds in Harare. Green, gold, black, and white everywhere. For two weeks, the nation allowed itself to dream. Muzarabani was magnificent. Four wickets against Afghanistan. The final wicket in a tie against Scotland. Zimbabwe just needed to beat UAE but they fell three runs short that meant the difference between a world cup and going home. “The World Cup qualifiers changed people’s lives,” Muzarabani had said then. “We wanted to, really, but sometimes you don’t get over the line.” He would cross the line soon, but in an unexpected manner. Zimbabwe Cricket’s finances were in tatters. Salaries unpaid. In August 2018, Muzarabani signed a Kolpak deal with Northamptonshire. The backlash came swift. How could he leave? But what’s loyalty when you grew up without shoes?

“The fact that I’m from a financial background that is maybe not typical of many in Zimbabwe gives me a lot of perspective,” he explained to Cricket Monthly. “I knew if I



didn’t do well, I was throwing away a chance at an opportunity that was really helping me in my life.” And so he chose the safety of the Kolpak. Cricket had been his escape from poverty. His wasn’t betrayal, but survival. (AP Photo/Eranga Jayawardena) England was grim at first. A back injury wiped out most of his first season. But at Northampton, West Indian player Jason Holder arrived. Holder saw a kid desperate to improve. They talked. Went for food. Holder taught him about being tall—the advantages, the curses, the physics of extracting pace from that frame. When Brexit ended Kolpak contracts in 2020, Muzarabani came home. Different now. Sharper. He had learnt the art of bowling. “Playing in England really helped me use my variations,” he told in the interview. “You pick up the moments where you need to throw in a yorker or a slower ball. If it works, it works, and if it doesn’t, too bad. It’s just a mentality.” Just a mentality. Maybe when you’ve learned to bowl without shoes, the pressure of bowling against Australia in a World Cup doesn’t register the same way. On a humid afternoon in Sri Lanka, that hunger rose again—pounding in from six-foot-eight, skidding, lifting, refusing to be ignored. Australia’s batting order learned what Taibu had seen all those years ago at Takashinga.

India overpower Namibia ahead of Pakistan clash

New Delhi: Sanju Samson disappointed again, Ishan Kishan dazzled and his mentor Hardik Pandya entertained, but India’s 93-run victory over Namibia here on Thursday was not exactly the box office hit one expected ahead of a tense T20 World Cup face-off against Pakistan.

The victory felt less like an assurance and more like the calm before the cricketing tempest with Pakistan lying in wait. The margin of victory, India’s highest in a T20 World Cup, did not depict the entire picture as little-known Namibian captain Gerhard Erasmus came out as a surprise package by taking 4 for 20 in India’s final total of 209 for 9, despite Kishan’s smashing 24-ball 61 and Pandya’s 52 off 28 balls.

In reply, the Namibian batting unit struggled against the kind of attack that they hardly get to play, as the innings ended on 116 in 18.2 overs. Varun Chakaravathy (3/7 in 2 overs) and Pandya (2/21 in 4 overs) shared the bulk of the spoils and India now need just one more win in their next two games to qualify for the Super Eights. Why India’s batting show, despite a 200-plus score, would be considered below par is because of the Namibian skipper. Erasmus’ side-arm action created considerable discomfort for the Indian batters, including Kishan, Pandya and Tilak Varma, as he also bowled from behind the crease at times.

Why is Sanju Samson failing? Sunil Gavaskar decodes batters’ technique: ‘Goes too deep...’

Sanju Samson got his first opportunity at the World Cup on Thursday when India faced Namibia. The opener looked in scintillating form before flicking one straight to Louren Steenkamp at mid-wicket, who was a tad bit squarer. Since becoming the opener of the Indian side in the T20I format in July 2026, Samson has altered his technique slightly to access more parts of the ground and hit boundaries. However, although it worked well for him early on, his form dipped in the recent series, and former Indian cricketer Sunil Gavaskar points out the same after his 22-run eight-ball innings.

“Sanju Samson has a technical problem. He goes too deep in the crease and plays that flick shot. You can only hope he times it in the gap, or it goes for a six. He needs to make improvements, especially when he opens against the new ball,” Gavaskar said on Starsports. “Namibia were clever with their field placements. They set a field to get Samson out. But it was good that he hit some nice shots. That must have given him some confidence. If he plays the next match against Pakistan, he needs to spend more time at the crease,” he said.

The out-of-form and low on confidence opener’s nervousness about his place in the side can be seen from his



foot work. Before the bowler releases the ball, his right-foot takes a tiny back-step and the left too follows. The ploy that finishers fall back on to hoodwink and second guess the death-over bowlers are being used by him, the opener. And the results haven’t been great. In an attempt to get that extra microsecond to launch his big shots, or too afraid to go to the front foot, Sanju pre-meditates and takes a step back. Mind too muddled to take the right decision instinctively, he goes to the field with pre-conceived plans. This play might work against lesser bowlers and that also not for too long as it was seen against Namibia’s not-quite-world class bowling department

‘Move away when Usman Tariq pauses’: Ashwin’s advice for Indian batsmen ahead of Pakistan clash

Former Indian spinner R Ashwin has offered a simple piece of advice to the Indian batters who will be facing the unique side-arm action of Pakistan off-spinner Usman Tariq on Sunday in the T20 World Cup. Talking on his his Youtube channel ‘Ash Ki Baat’, Ashwin said, “If he stops before delivering the ball, the batsman has the right to move away. He can say that ‘I thought he is stopping’. That will be an interesting case and a huge headache for the umpire. If I was there I would have done it. One should do everything to win a game within rules. I would simply say I don’t know when he will release the ball and I would step away. If I move away, it is the umpire’s responsibility.”

The 30-year-old Tariq has created quite a stir in the four T20 Internationals he has featured in. He has taken 11 wickets at an economy of less than six runs per over. Apart from all the talk about the events preceding the India-Pakistan clash, Tariq is going to be one of the talking points. Tariq’s unique action has divided the cricket world but Ashwin had earlier supported him. Pakistan are using Tariq sparingly. Ashwin called for real-time competition testing tool to check if his side-arm action falls within the permissible 15 degree limit as per ICC’s rulebook...there is a 15 degree rule under which a bowler needs to keep his el-



bow and straighten it and to judge if a bowler is bowling within that 15 degree mark by the on-field Umpire is impossible. “The only solution to that is having a real time in competition testing tool. The above is a grey area and to accuse someone for utilising the grey area is wrong.” Ashwin explained why he is suggesting the batters to move away as it would add more excitement to the clash. “Imagine the pressure on Usman Tariq in the middle of the match. It would be an incredible joyride. He is the ace up their sleeves, imagine what he becomes if the batsman reacts like that,” he added.

Quick Comment: Not just ‘one bad day’, Australia haven’t really warmed up to T20 cricket

On a sunny Colombo afternoon, Zimbabwe etched a famous moment in their cricket history, one that holds the potential to change the game’s appeal and reach in the country. They thrashed—not scraped or edged—the absolute cricketing royalty in world cricket, Australia. The former world champions are injury-ridden, form-affected, and do not boss the format as much as they do the longer versions. But historically, they are skilled at negotiating bumps and hurdles. Like leopards, the kangaroos don’t change their stripes.

But on Friday, it was their humble African adversaries that exhibited the virtues of belief and resilience. First, they did not psychologically surrender to their more decorated opponents, a team they have beaten only in this format, before their exile and their dark days of mediocrity. Throughout the game, Zimbabwe wielded the ascendancy. Australia’s bowling could be without the holy trinity of Mitchell Starc, Josh Hazlewood and Pat Cummins, but the likes of Ben Dwarshuis, Adam Zampa, and Nathan Ellis are bowlers with reputation. Cameron Green is one of the most expensive IPL purchases ever; among Zimbabweans only Sikandar Raza has ever featured in the league. Apart from

the Bangladesh Premier League, they don’t incite much interest. Yet, they subdued Australia in every department. On a sluggish surface, they showed the know-how to accumulate than blast the runs. The 22-year-old Brian Bennett, one of the bright lights of Zimbabwean batting, compiled a 64 off 56 balls, conquered, to lay the platform for others like Sikandar Raza and Tadiwanse Marumani to accelerate and improvise. With the ball, they probed and harried the batting line-up that included Josh Inglis, Travis Head, Tim David, Marcus Stoinis, and Glenn Maxwell, who could, on their day, win games on their own against stronger nations.

As much as the victory is a timely fillip for Zimbabwean cricket it holds the mirror to Australia cricket’s peculiar relationship with the shortest format. It has won the World Cup once, but they have reached the semifinal or final just thrice in eight instances. The defeat has jeopardised their prospects this edition too. Australia prioritises Ashes, Test cricket and ODI World Cups, the shining stars of its solar system. The T20I World Cups are merely like satellites. Premature exits don’t instigate public outrage or result in the rolling of heads. The pain heals quickly. They are obsessed about the Big Bash Leagues as Indians are to IPL or Pakistanis to PSL. It’s something of a routine side-show with little recall value.

Sukhamano Sukhamann movie review: Mathew Thomas’ film is pure torture



all honesty, there’s nothing worth mentioning in Sukhamano Sukhamann. Although the movie had at its core an intriguing idea — a young man grappling with childhood trauma and PTSD, leading an isolated life, unable to forge any meaningful bonds with the people or world around him, thus never having a sense of belonging anywhere — Arunlal’s writing is extremely shoddy, and it never even scratches the surface of its potential.

At the same time, Sukhamano Sukhamann is also packed with scenes that seem inspired by 2000s Malayalam soap operas, where the actors’ only job is to come stand at their mark in the frame and deliver their lines, and technicians simply have to capture these visuals, adding nothing extra. Worse still, the dialogues here sound as if they were crafted by someone who only recently learned to write in full sentences and is practising for an upcoming exam. At one point, one of Theo’s many ghost relatives, Unnikrishnan (Noby Marcese), tells another, “Such pathetic jokes can’t be found even in Somalia,” after hearing Theo’s attempts at flirting with Charu. While this statement itself is too absurd even as hyperbole, since the Somalia analogy is senseless, one can consider it Arunlal’s subtle, indirect commentary on his own writing, particularly the many so-called jokes in the movie that won’t make anyone laugh, even if tickled. Worse still, although Sukhamano Sukhamann appears to have a novel idea at its centre, it is marred by hackneyed and worn-out conflicts and plot devices that remind one of movies like Kudumba Vishesham (1994), Santhanagopalam (1994), Teja Bhai & Family (2011), and Oru Indian Pranayakadha (2013) far too often. The comedic moments, on the other hand, don’t have the quality of even the mediocre amateur skits found in Malayalam TV comedy reality shows.

It may be a mean thing to say, but Mathew’s performance here seems as if he’s completely lost interest in acting, so he’s not even bothered to try. One could even say that he has completed the whole movie with just three expressions at best, with his dialogue delivery, pointlessly laced with overt innocence, sounding extremely feigned. Although Theo, in principle, had the potential to be explored in depth given his extremely limited interactions with people around, Mathew has failed to add any weight to it. While Devika Sanjay’s performance is serviceable, she is stuck here in a character that very evidently appears to be an extension of Teenamol, her role in her debut movie, Njan Prakashan, almost making one feel like this is the latter’s life would have turned out to be had she lived a few more years. Also, you know a movie is horrible when even a veteran like Jagadish’s performance seems awkward and directionless.

Sukhamano Sukhamann movie review and rating: When the writer of Vettah (2016), Arunlal Ramachandran, makes his directorial debut, one would naturally expect that the movie would be at least worth the time. Although Vettah wasn’t extraordinary, it was still a solid mystery thriller and became yet another feather in the cap of the late renowned director Rajesh Pillai. Its labyrinthine screenplay, which also resembled a large puzzle with too many pieces, was impressive, underscoring Arunlal’s potential. However, Sukhamano Sukhamann, his first attempt at filmmaking, can only be described, in the most civil manner, as an abomination that tests one’s patience to the brink.

Following the deaths of his last known relatives, Theo (Mathew Thomas) has been leading a barren existence in his big, old house, with no friends, acquaintances, or anyone to talk to. What makes matters worse is his childhood trauma. However, his life changes when he stumbles upon the ghost of an elderly man (Spadikam George), who becomes his new relative. Parasakthi gets uncensored OTT release after CBFC imposed 25 cuts in theatres: ‘We heard you all’

Sudha Kongara’s Parasakthi, starring Sivakarthekeyan, Sreeleela and Ravi Mohan, hit theatres on January 10 during the Pongal window. Before its release, the film underwent 25 cuts and modifications mandated by the Central Board of Film Certification (CBFC) and was even referred to the revising committee. Now, the film’s uncensored version has begun streaming on Zee5 from February 12.

Parasakthi’s uncensored version streams on Zee5. Zee5 had initially premiered the censored version of Parasakthi on February 7, prompting viewers to question the number of muted dialogues and altered phrases. Within days, audiences noticed that an uncensored version had quietly been added to the platform. Confirming the update on social media, Zee5 wrote, “We heard you all! Uncensored is finally here!” To highlight the difference, the platform also shared a comparison clip showing a scene that had been muted in theatres, now restored in the streaming version. The 25 cuts ordered by CBFC just two days ahead of its theatrical release, the CBFC directed the makers to implement 25 changes. These included modifying a voiceover referencing language imposition in other countries, replacing the phrase “Thee Paravattum” with “Neethi Paravattum,” and altering certain words such as “Pattu

Nuula.” Several dialogues were muted altogether, including “Sirukki, kodila kaaya vatcha thuni maadhiri, kundila komanaththa, okkaali, kundi, nakki, mayiththukku,” and “Hindi kaththukittu.” Additionally, the line “Hindi en kanavai aliththathu” was changed to “En ore kanavai Hindi thinippu eriththathu.” Scenes involving gunshots affecting a mother and child were removed, while depictions of a village massacre were reduced significantly.

The CBFC further instructed the inclusion of a fiction disclaimer for sequences referencing Postal Money Orders, UPSC examination cancellations, and language requirements in railway recruitment. The duration of this disclaimer was extended for clarity, and an added voiceover increased the film’s runtime by 109 seconds. Sivakarthekeyan later spoke about the last-minute clearance, acknowledging the intense time pressure faced by the team. “The Censor Board operates according to their own regulations and criteria. Our team’s complete focus was on how we could implement the changes they suggested in a way that wouldn’t affect the creativity of the film. We didn’t have time to figure out why they suggested these changes,” he told India Today. Director Sudha Kongara also revealed the frantic timeline the team faced. Speaking to

Man dies at Vijay’s political rally, months after 40 deaths during Karur stampede

Months after more than 40 people lost their lives at Vijay’s TVK rally in Karur, another tragedy struck on Friday at the actor-turned-politician’s political rally in Salem, Tamil Nadu. A 37-year-old fan, identified as Suraj, collapsed during the rally and was declared dead after being taken to hospital. According to ANI, Suraj was a resident of Maharashtra and a huge Vijay fan.

Police officials told the news agency, “During the event, he suddenly collapsed. He was rushed for medical assistance but was declared dead, reportedly due to a heart attack. Further inquiries are being conducted into the incident.” Initial reports had suggested that the death may have been caused by crowd congestion. However, authorities have said an investigation is underway to determine the exact cause. Several videos from the rally have since gone viral on social media. While many fans praised Vijay, other clips showed chaotic scenes. In one video, dozens of bikers were seen following the actor’s convoy as he waved at them and gestured for them to be careful. When Vijay reached the venue, hundreds of supporters reportedly mobbed his car, bringing it to a halt. Police personnel were seen struggling to control the crowd as his security team attempted to shield him. Another video showed traffic coming to a standstill after fans surrounded his vehicle.

The incident comes months after a stampede at Vijay’s Tamilaga Vетtri Kazhagam (TVK) rally in Karur last year claimed over 40 lives and left more than 100 injured. The



tragedy occurred after a massive crowd surged forward to catch a glimpse of the actor. Following that incident, several TVK members were booked under the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) on charges including culpable homicide, attempt to culpable homicide, and endangering life. The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) had also questioned Vijay in connection with the case. Since then, the actor has remained in the headlines — first over the Karur tragedy and later due to a tussle with the censor board over his upcoming film Jana Nayagan, which was initially slated for a January 9 release but is yet to secure a confirmed release date.

Actor Rajpal Yadav, who is currently in Tihar Jail in connection with a long-running cheque bounce case that also names his wife Radha Yadav, had once spoken about the role she has played in his life, calling her his backbone. In the same interview, he also opened up about his first marriage and the loss of his first wife. She has also supported him during the Rs 9 crore cheque bounce case. Talking about how Bollywood is supporting Rajpal, she told PTI, “Everybody has stood by him. The industry has been supportive, a big thank you to everyone who is coming out to help.” Rajpal has received support from Salman Khan, Ajay Devgn, Sonu Sood, Gurmeet Chaudhary, Rao Inderjit Yadav, among many others. “When I got selected as an apprentice in the ordinance clothing factory, it became a big talking point in the village that such a young boy had been recruited there. In those days, once a boy got a job, people felt he should get married. Today, marriage is considered at 25 or 26, but back then boys were married off at 20. My father arranged my marriage. A year later, our daughter was born, and within 15 minutes, my wife passed away. I couldn’t understand what had happened — it felt like I had just met her yesterday and now I was carrying her on my shoulders. Thanks to my family, I never felt that my daughter didn’t have a mother. We are a joint family, my mother and sister-in-law raised her with immense love.”

How he met his second wife Radha in Canada He also spoke about meeting his wife Radha in 2000. “When Jungle

released in 2000 and I started settling down, I met Radha. I had gone to Canada for the shoot of The Hero. We stayed in touch for three years, and in 2003 we got married with the consent of both families, because we both believed marriage is the union of two traditions.” Rajpal said that before committing to the relationship, he was completely transparent with her. “When we became serious about getting married, I told Radha everything about my life. “When my wife first came to the village, I never asked her to wear a saree. Just as I speak with my mother, she speaks with her the same way. She learned the village language. One day I returned home and saw her sitting with her head covered because that’s the custom there. She visits the village during Holi and Diwali and no one can tell that she knows five languages. I had no role in these adjustments.” Speaking about her role in his life, he said, “After my gurus and parents, if anyone has stood by me like a backbone, it is my wife.” “I came to Mumbai with my daughter, and I still don’t know how Radha raised her as her own child. Today she lives in Lucknow, is married and happy.
