Excise duty on petrol, diesel slashed by Rs 10, windfall tax slapped on fuel export

New Delhi, March 27

As global crude oil prices peaked on Friday, the government moved to shield domestic consumers from adverse effects of the surge by slashing excise duty on petrol and diesel by Rs 10 each and slapping windfall tax on the export of fuels. The prices of petrol and diesel remain unchanged in the domestic market.

Dismissing lockdown rumours, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said in Parliament today, "There is a lockdown in Pakistan, not in India. Also, there is no scope of a lockdown in India."

As a cumulative impact of the twin moves by the Finance Ministry, which issued a related notification on excise duty cuts and export tax on fuels, prices of petrol and diesel remain unchanged in the domestic market and there is no price rise despite global crude oil prices soaring from \$70 a barrel to \$122 a barrel — a near 50 per cent increase in a month.

Special additional excise duty on petrol was today reduced from Rs 13 to Rs 3 a litre and on diesel from Rs 10 to nil, with Petroleum Minister Hardeep Puri announcing the government decision to absorb the shock of the global crude oil cost surge.

"Instead of passing the burden to the people, the government has chosen to absorb a loss of Rs 24 per litre on petrol and Rs 30 a litre on diesel on the count of global crude cost escalation," Puri said as the West Asia conflict and disruptions in the Strait of Hormuz played havoc with global oil markets.

Overall, the government will lose Rs 700 crore in revenue over a fortnight due to excise cuts on fuel. From the windfall tax on the export of fuel, the government will get Rs 1,500 crore over the same period.

FM Sitharaman said duties had been imposed on exports of diesel at ₹21.5 per litre and on aviation turbine fuel (ATF) at ₹29.5 per litre to ensure adequate availability of these products for domestic consumption.

The notification by the Department of Revenue withdrew tax rebate and duty exemption benefits on exports of petrol, high-speed diesel and ATF, amending the Central Excise Rules, 2017, with immediate effect.

Notably, the government has carved out a specific exemption for public sector oil companies exporting these three fuels to Nepal, Bhutan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. State-owned oil companies supplying fuel to their four neighbouring countries will continue to operate under the earlier tax regime and will not be hit by the withdrawal of benefits.

Meanwhile, excise cuts and export tax were levied immediately without any transition window to ensure fuel prices do not rise.

Sitharaman, later, told the Rajya Sabha that Brent crude had not dropped below \$100 since March 13.

"Consequently, petrol and diesel prices for consumers have gone up all over the world — by 30 to 50 per cent in Southeast Asian nations, 30 per cent in North America, 20 per cent in Europe, 50 per cent in African countries....But we are carefully managing because the PM's one single guidance is there should be no burden on the citizen," she said.

Explaining the twin moves, the FM said the government had issued a notification cutting petrol excise duty from Rs 13 to 3 per litre and removing the duty on diesel entirely.

Govt introduces 2nd edition of Jan Vishwas Bill in Lok Sabha

New Delhi, March 27

Minister of State for Commerce and Industry Jitin Prasada on Friday introduced the Jan Vishwas (Amendment of Provisions) Bill, a legislation for decriminalising and rationalising offences to further enhance trust-based governance for promoting ease of living and doing business, in the Lok Sabha.

Prasada said the Bill would decriminalise minor offences and implement measures such as revising fines and penalties proportionate to the offence. It proposes to amend 79 Central Acts, administered by 23 ministries.

A total of 784 provisions are being proposed to be amended, out of which 717 provisions are being decriminalised to foster ease of doing business, and 67 provisions are being proposed to facilitate ease of living. He further clarified that no major violations or serious offences were being diluted by the amendment Bill.

The new Bill builds on the Jan Vishwas (Amendment of Provisions) Act, 2023, which had amended 42 laws with similar objectives. It proposes amendments to various laws and aims to decriminalise a range of offences across sectors such as municipal governance, motor vehicle regulation, commodity boards, apprenticeships, and export-related activities. The Bill proposes to remove imprisonment in 57 provisions and fines in 158 provisions. Also, imprisonment is proposed to be reduced in 17 provisions, and imprisonment and fine are proposed to be converted to a penalty in 113 provisions. The Bill converts several fines into penalties, and designates adjudicating officers to levy these penalties.

Have ample fuel, things stable, CMs tell Modi at virtual meet

New Delhi, March 27

Chief Ministers and Lieutenant-Governors of non-poll-bound states and union territories today told Prime Minister Narendra Modi that the fuel situation in their areas was stable and supplies of petrol, diesel and LPG adequate.

"The CMs widely welcomed the decision to reduce excise duty on fuel, noting that it will provide significant relief to citizens amid global uncertainties," an official statement said after PM Modi held a virtual meeting with the CMs and L-Gs to review the essential goods supply status.

The statement added that all CMs reaffirmed commitment to work in close coordination with the Centre to effectively manage the situation. "The CMs also welcomed the decision to increase commercial LPG allocation to states and UTs to 70 per cent of pre-crisis levels, up from 50 per cent," the PMO said.

The meeting came hours after West Bengal CM Mamata Banerjee claimed the Centre might go in for a lockdown amid the West Asia crisis — a remark top government ministers rejected as "false" and one "meant to fear monger".

The PM welcomed excise duty cuts on fuel and said working together as "Team India", the nation will successfully overcome the situation. "The PM stressed that the government's priorities are to maintain economic and trade stability, ensure energy security, safeguard the interests of citizens and strengthen industry and supply chains," the official statement said.



The PM also asked CMs to ensure smooth functioning of supply chains and take strict measures against hoarding and profiteering.

His special focus was on the agriculture sector. "The PM stressed the need for advance planning in the agriculture sector, particularly in monitoring fertiliser storage and distribution. He also called for special attention in border and coastal states to address emerging challenges related to shipping, essential supplies, and maritime operations," the communication said, cautioning against the spread of misinformation and rumours and stressing dissemination of credible information.

India's laudable push in the war against cervical cancer

By launching a nationwide HPV (Human Papillomavirus) vaccination for adolescent girls, India has taken a decisive step in the war against cervical cancer, a largely preventable yet one of the most common causes of cancer deaths in India. The vaccination drive, coupled with increased screening and assured treatment access, can dramatically reduce the suffering caused by the dreaded disease within the span of a generation. Unfortunately, India bears one of the heaviest burdens of cervical cancer globally, reporting nearly 78,000 new cases and over 43,000 deaths annually. It is the second most common cancer among Indian women, after breast cancer, and is caused by the HPV infection of the genital tract. Early age of marriage, multiple pregnancies, tobacco use, and poor genital hygiene are linked to increased chances of infection. Most of these risk factors can be addressed through awareness, screening, and vaccination. The World Health Organisation (WHO) has set a clear elimination target, outlining what is called the "90-70-90" strategy: 90% of girls to be fully vaccinated with HPV vaccine by age 15; 70% of women to be screened with a high-performance test at ages 30 and above, and 90% of women identified with disease to receive appropriate treatment. India's vaccination launch is a crucial step towards achieving these targets. Over 140 countries have implemented vaccination against HPV infections, and global data has confirmed its safety and effectiveness. Total elimination of the disease requires sustained efforts and ensuring widespread coverage of HPV vaccination. India's alarming cervical cancer mortality rate is attributable to the poor screening, lack of early detection, resistance to vaccination and poor hygiene. While urban areas have shown some decline due to factors such as improved hygiene, large rural and underserved populations continue to be present with advanced cervical cancer disease. Against this backdrop, a nationwide vaccination drive could be a game-changer. It would be an effective strategy to target adolescents for vaccination before their exposure to the virus. A time-bound, mission-mode approach can help overcome the inertia that often slows the inclusion of new vaccines into routine immunisation. If implemented effectively, it could shield millions of girls from high-risk HPV strains responsible for the majority of cases. The vaccine, indigenously developed by Pune-based Serum Institute of India (SII), is 97% effective in preventing the disease. While cervical cancer is preventable if detected early and managed effectively, it kills one woman every 8 minutes in the country. The vaccination campaign must prioritise rural districts and underserved communities where screening rates are low, and cancer detection often comes too late. The HPV vaccine has long been available in the private market, and a few States piloted limited public programmes over the past decade. However, cost concerns, logistical hurdles and policy hesitations delayed a universal rollout, leaving coverage fragmented and inequitable.

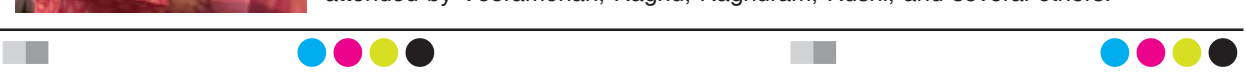

Reviving cotton viability amid shrinkage in area: Experts, policymakers call for urgent action in interstate meet

Alarmed by the steady shrinkage of cotton area across northern states, experts and policymakers called for urgent, coordinated action to revive the crop's viability, while calling upon all stakeholders to work in close coordination to tackle pest pressures and restore cotton's profitability. The concern was voiced at a meeting of the Interstate Consultative and Monitoring Committee on cotton held at Kheti Bhawan, Bathinda, under the chairmanship of Dr Satbir Singh Gosal, Vice-Chancellor, Punjab Agricultural University (PAU), Ludhiana. The meeting that continued till late on Tuesday was attended by representatives from three cotton-growing states: Punjab, Haryana and Rajasthan.

The meeting brought together senior officers and scientists, including the Director of Agriculture, Punjab; PAU's Director of Research; Director of Extension Education; Additional Director of Extension Education; Chief Agriculture Officers from the cotton belt; and experts from the Central Institute for Cotton Research, Sirsa.

PAU V-C Gosal expressed serious concern over the persistent decline in cotton acreage. He linked the trend to mounting biotic and abiotic stresses, notably infestations of pink bollworm, whitefly, and cotton leaf curl virus, coupled with erratic weather patterns. He outlined a clear roadmap for the Kharif 2026 season, stressing timely availability of high-quality, recommended seeds and subsidies on Bt cotton to encourage adoption among farmers. He underlined the importance of assured canal water supply for pre-sowing irrigation, calling it critical for establishing a healthy crop stand. Balanced fertilization, he added, must be promoted to enhance productivity. Dr Gosal urged all stakeholders to work in close coordination to tackle pest pressures and restore cotton's profitability. Dr Gurjeet Singh Brar, Director of Agriculture, Punjab, attributed the decline in acreage to a shift towards paddy, driven by reliable irrigation and recurring pest attacks in cotton. He emphasized timely sowing, deep ploughing, and effective crop residue management as key interventions to improve yields. He also informed that a large-scale awareness campaign is underway across Punjab's cotton-growing districts.



Chief Agriculture Officers from Bathinda, Mansa, Shri Muksar Sahib, Fazilka, Sangrur, Barnala, Faridkot, and Moga shared updates on extension efforts, particularly focusing on off-season management of pink bollworm and whitefly. Dr A S Dhath, PAU's Director of Research, highlighted recent advancements, including the release of the desi cotton variety PBD 88. He outlined updated plant protection strategies and stressed the need to develop cotton plant types suitable for mechanization. He also advocated proper fumigation practices in ginning factories and wider promotion of desi varieties developed by the university.

Dr Makhan Singh Bhullar, PAU's Director of Extension Education, pointed out that the shift of cotton cultivation to lighter soils is affecting both productivity and profitability when compared to paddy. Despite these challenges, he described cotton as integral to the socio-economic fabric of the Malwa region. He suggested intensified field outreach, with immediate focus on cotton stick and weed management. Presenting the current pest scenario, Dr Vijay Kumar, Principal Entomologist, PAU, noted the presence of hibernating larvae and pupae of pink bollworm in cotton stick heaps and ginning factory stocks. He warned that unchecked residues could fuel fresh infestations in the coming season. Dr Rishi Kumar, Head of Central Institute for Cotton Research, offered insights into shifting pest dynamics and charted targeted measures for effective management. He underlined the need for adaptive strategies to address emerging threats.

Tricity residents move Punjab and Haryana HC against Zirakpur bypass tree felling

Raising concerns over the felling of many trees for the proposed construction of a six-lane Zirakpur Bypass, 21 residents from the Tricity have sought the intervention of the Punjab and Haryana High Court. The 19-km project will commence from NH-7 (Chandigarh-Rajpura-Patiala) and terminate at NH-5 (Zirakpur-Parwanoo Road), forming part of the proposed Tri-City Ring Road.

The residents, represented by senior advocate Anand Chhibar, stated in their public interest litigation that "the Rs 1878 crore project will result in the felling of more than 5,000 mature trees including over 2,000 trees from notified forest land in Punjab, more than 2,200 trees from the Panchkula Golf Course, and approximately 1,000 trees from Sector-1A, Panchkula and other green belts". They added: "These trees are predominantly 20-30 years old and constitute established ecological assets performing vital ecosystem services."

According to the petitioners, the Panchkula Golf Course, developed by Haryana Shehri Vikas Pradhikaran over approximately 124 acres since 1988, houses nearly

14,000 mature trees and functions as one of the principal urban green lungs of Panchkula. They argued that compensatory afforestation proposed in Firozpur, Punjab, situated over 240 kilometres away, cannot restore the ecological functionality of mature, region-specific forest and riverine ecosystems in the Tricity urban belt. Mature trees, they said, cannot be substituted by saplings which take decades to attain ecological equivalence and often suffer high mortality.

The petitioners highlighted that as per the India State of Forest Report 2023, Punjab possesses only 3.67% forest and tree cover and Haryana merely 3.65%, both drastically below the national average of 21.71% and far below the 33% benchmark envisaged under the National Forest Policy, 1988. In such a scenario, diversion of additional forest land constitutes ecological regression of alarming magnitude. They pointed out that the tendering process has already advanced and financial bids are imminent. "The tender has already been issued by the NHA and the closing date of the said tender was 20.03.2026. If tree felling commences, the ecological damage will be permanent and irreversible. No subsequent judicial relief or monetary compensation can restore decades-old forest ecosystems," said the petitioners. Seeking intervention, the petitioners urged the High Court to quash or reconsider forest clearances, restrain further tendering and construction activity, direct reconsideration of alternative alignments, and ensure that developmental objectives are pursued strictly in conformity with constitutional mandates, statutory safeguards, and binding environmental jurisprudence. Counsel Anand Chhibar confirmed that the High Court on Wednesday issued notices to the Haryana government, the central government, the union Ministry of Environment and Forest, and HSPV, seeking their response. The matter will now be taken up on April 1.

Mumbai Metro mishap: A month on, two victims still hospitalised after parapet collapse

Over a month after the metro parapet collapse in Mulund, two of the three injured remain hospitalised, with one still in intensive care and facing long-term disability, even as an MMRDA probe has squarely blamed the contractor for the incident, citing serious lapses in execution and supervision. Rajkumar Indrajeet Yadav, 45, the rickshaw driver, continues to be in the ICU at Upasani Hospital, while Mahendra Pratap Yadav, 52, has been shifted to a general ward and may be discharged soon, family members said. Both were travelling with a relative, Ramdhan Yadav, who died in the incident. Rajkumar has undergone seven to eight surgeries since the accident, including procedures on his head, abdomen and limbs. "A few days ago, Rajkumar underwent another head surgery as water would continuously leak out of his nose when he sat upright," said Sarvesh Yadav, a relative. "Rajkumar will never be able to live a normal existence again; he will remain 40 to 50% paralysed and dependent on others for the rest of his life."

Family members said the injuries were extensive. "The damage to Rajkumar's left hand and both legs has been such that even after surgery, he cannot move them. Of his entire left hand, he can only move his little finger," Sarvesh added. Mahendra, who suffered injuries to his spine, head and lungs, is recovering but still requires continued care. "Rajkumar has only just started eating. Almost every part of his body was affected," said Shubham Yadav, Mahendra's son. "Mahendra is much better, but we are not sure about his discharge as he still needs proper medical care, which may not be possible at home. At least here,



doctors are available at all times." The accident has also displaced both families, who are now living in a rented room near the hospital. "We have been moving between the hospital and the room every day," Shubham said. Rajkumar's daughter has also dropped out of school, relatives said. The MMRDA, in its submission to the Bombay High Court, said subcontractor Milan Road Buildtech has paid ₹27.59 lakh towards the treatment of the injured. However, a detailed probe report has held the Reliance Infrastructure-Astaldi joint venture responsible, citing unsafe practices and lapses at multiple levels, including the welder, supervisor and site engineer. The report found that a parapet segment became unstable after temporary supports were removed prematurely, pointing to procedural violations rather than any flaw in design or material. Earlier, the MMRDA had also flagged negligence by the contractor and lack of adequate supervision as key factors behind the collapse.

Try accused for culpable homicide not amounting to murder: District court on BMW hit-and-run case

Nearly 10 months after a speeding BMW car allegedly hit a Chandigarh Police constable in Sector 9, a district court has ordered that the accused, Ishaan Shankar, be tried under Section 105 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), which pertains to culpable homicide not amounting to murder. The order was passed on Wednesday by Additional District and Sessions Judge Ashwani Kumar, who framed charges against the accused and disposed of his discharge application. "It is not a simple case of rash and negligent driving punishable under Section 106 of BNS, rather it is a case of culpable homicide not amounting to murder," held the court. The trial in the case is scheduled to commence on July 6.

The incident dates back to May 11, 2025, when two BMW cars were allegedly racing on a road in Sector 9. During the race, one of the vehicles, driven by the accused, struck a cyclist — later identified as Constable Anand of Chandigarh Police — causing him fatal injuries. The victim succumbed before reaching the hospital. During the proceedings of accused's discharge application, the defence argued that the case did not warrant charges under Section 105 (culpable homicide), and instead fell under Section 106 of the BNS, which deals with death caused by negligence in road accidents. The defence counsels argued that in this case during the investigation, the police have not collected such evidence which could show that all the ingredients constituting the offence punishable under Section 105 of BNS are fulfilled. He pointed out that as per application, dated May 13, 2025, filed by the investigating officer, offence under Section 105 of BNS has been added on the basis of site inspection report, mechanical examination report and analysis of CCTV footage. However, mechanical examination report of offending vehicle was prepared on May 15, 2025 whereas CCTV footage was taken in police possession on May 14, 2025. The public prosecutor, however, contended that the applicant-accused had committed accident while racing with another vehicle. He had knowledge that his act would result in an accident and after accident, the applicant fled away. During the investigation, the applicant was found involved in the commission of offence under Section 105 of BNS.

On hearing the arguments, the court held that mechanical report can be prepared after one-two days. CCTV footages may be taken in police possession next day but investigating officer is talking about analysis of CCTV footage before it was taken in police possession. The court noted that on May 11, 2025 about 6.45 pm, two cars of BMW were being driven in a rash and negligent manner and hit one cyclist which dragged the cyclist to a large distance. After leaving the injured at the spot, the driver of the offending vehicle fled away. The injured was got admitted to hospital. The offending vehicle was racing with another



BMW car. "From this fact, it cannot be said that the applicant has no knowledge about the consequence of his act as it was his duty to drive vehicle cautiously. He did not stop the vehicle after the accident and did not help the injured to get his medical treatment, rather he kept dragging the injured for a large distance. It is not a simple case of rash and negligent driving punishable under Section 106 of BNS, rather it is a case of culpable homicide not amounting to murder," noted the court in the order while adding that prima facie evidence on record is sufficient to show that the applicant/accused has committed an offence punishable under Section 105 of BNS, so the applicant be charged under Section 105 of BNS.

Unknown persons booked for killing street dogs in Nizamabad

Nizamabad: Amid allegations of killing around 1,000 stray dogs over the past few months, some unknown persons were booked for allegedly poisoning stray dogs to death in the town on Wednesday.

Nizamabad fourth town police said that a case was registered against unidentified persons under Section 325 of Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) (Mischievous by killing or maiming animal, criminalizing intentional harm, poisoning, or killing of any animal), based on a complaint from Goutham Adulapuram, from Stray Animal Foundation of India based in Karimnagar town.

A foundation statement said around 1,000 stray dogs were killed in Nizamabad municipal corporation over the last 7 months.

"A few individuals, allegedly hired by the corporation along with involvement of local elected representatives, were responsible for these killings. Earlier, some stray dogs were eliminated in August in the town," the statement said.

Chief Minister Siddaramaiah Wednesday defended Karnataka's economic performance, citing a 7.8 per cent growth in Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP), and argued that the proposed debt of Rs 1.32 lakh crore is within the limits prescribed by the Fiscal Responsibility and Budgetary Management Act, noting that state debt doubled every five years. Central government policies also came under fire in his speech, which was interjected by occasional banter between him and the Opposition benches over his power tussle with Deputy CM D K Shivakumar.

The Karnataka Government, he said, was hopeful of presenting a surplus budget for the upcoming fiscal. The Central Government's rationalisation of GST rates in the middle of the fiscal year, in September last year, affected the state's budget estimates prepared in March 2025. While the rationalisation cost the state Rs 10,000 crore in reduced revenue in the 2025-26 fiscal, the Centre has refused to compensate. This, along with pending Jal Jeevan Mission dues of Rs 13,000 crore, impacted the finances, he said. In response, Leader of Opposition R Ashoka said the state had reached a situation where it had to borrow even to finance earlier loans. He said the Opposition was unhappy with the queries it raised regarding the reduction in grants to several development corporations. "To maintain fiscal discipline, the government has employed such tactics. This budget is not pro-people. So, we oppose this budget," he said.

'No cause for concern' As petrol and diesel shortage rumour sparks panic, Karnataka Government issues clarification

The Karnataka Government Wednesday dismissed rumours of an impending fuel shortage after reports of citizens queuing at petrol pumps with bottles, cans, and other containers in some parts of the state. In a release, the under secretary of the Food and Civil Supplies Department

said that such behaviour by consumers was triggered by speculations circulating on social media and certain localities. "The Central Government has clarified that there is ample stock of fuel available at retail outlets across the country. Furthermore, the public is strongly advised against transporting or storing fuel in loose or unsuitable containers, as this poses serious safety risks and fire hazards," the release said. The department also issued directions to petrol pumps that only direct refuelling should be done at retail outlets. "Petrol pumps are strictly prohibited from supplying fuel in bottles, cans, or any other external containers," it said. It noted that existing laws prohibit the storage of fuel in bulk or in unauthorised containers. "The Government assures the public that the fuel supply chain remains robust and that there is no cause for concern," the release said. The panic comes amid restrictions on the sale of LPG cylinders imposed due to the West Asia conflict. The shortage has caused a crisis, especially for hoteliers in Bengaluru and other parts.

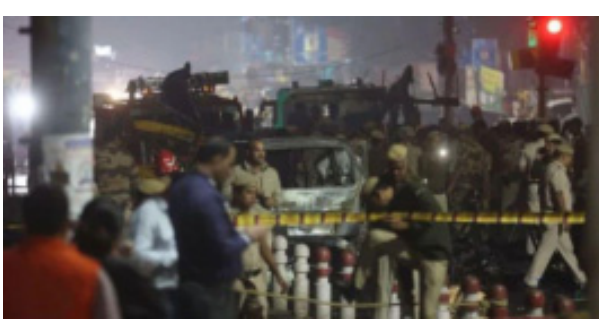
No one involved in drug trade will be spared, even if from AAP: Sisodia

Expert from Jamia Millia Islamia requested to interpret 'radical' literature in Arabic, NIA tells court

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) told a Delhi court that it has requested an expert from Jamia Millia Islamia to interpret "radical" material in Arabic extracted from digital devices of the accused persons in the terror module case related to the blast near Red Fort on November 10 last year. It has also asked the court for 45 more days to conclude the probe. "Judicial custody of the... accused persons is also required to confront /interpret radical material so extracted from their digital devices. In this regard, an expert from Jamia Millia Islamia, Delhi, has been requested to provide an interpretation report after thorough analysis of the radical material as procured, to ascertain the content of the fundamentalist/extremist nature of these literatures & articles, which are in Arabic language, seeking to promote/propagate violent jihad and preparation of bombs through household everyday articles and chemicals," the NIA submitted before the court on March 23.

The central probe agency made multiple arrests in connection with the blast, which left 13 dead and several injured after a Hyundai i20 car exploded near the Lal Qila Metro station. The NIA told the court that its investigation has yielded "multiple new leads" which are required to be proved to unearth the "larger conspiracy" behind the

incident. "During investigation, the NIA has also identified certain WhatsApp groups wherein the arrested accused persons were members... Based on the above technical analysis, legal interception of certain mobile phone numbers, including WhatsApp Legal Interception (VoIP), has been done with the aim of identifying other members ascribing to the radical/jihadi ideology of the terror module and to identify the potential associates and handlers of the arrested accused," the agency submitted before the court. It also said that nine residential premises in Jammu and Kashmir were searched on Monday during which multiple digital devices have been seized, whose technical analysis is pending.

"Approximately 5TB data has been extracted from the digital devices and sent to CERT-in and CFSL, DFSS for scrutiny and the same is still under progress. During scrutiny of the extracted data, incriminating information and facts emerged in the form of videos, voice samples, radical literature, handwritten books etc," the agency said. As per the NIA, the disclosure statements of the accused persons revealed that they were in "contact with certain foreign entities through online platforms and pseudonymous social media accounts". It also told the court that the accused could attempt to influence key witnesses who are being examined if the extension of investigation is not granted. As per the agency, which has arrested over 10 people in the case, all the accused are connected to Umar Nabi, the man who was allegedly in the i20 car which had caused the blast. Officials had confirmed he was driving it after collecting DNA samples of his mother. The NIA, which was handed over the investigation by the Union Home Ministry, is working closely with various state police forces to track and arrest others behind the blast. It is also closely tracking everyone Umar contacted over the last few months. Umar is suspected to be the leader of the "white-collar group" of doctors, part of a terror module that was busted days before the Red Fort explosion.

After SC stay, HCS officers' IAS cadre promotions face setback

In a setback to eight Haryana Civil Services (HCS) officers awaiting promotion to the IAS cadre, the Supreme Court on Wednesday stayed an order of the Punjab and Haryana High Court that had quashed a vigilance chargesheet against them. The chargesheet was filed by the State Vigilance Bureau in June 2023 against the officers and others in connection with alleged irregularities in

the selection of the 2001-batch of the state civil services. The HC ruling had cleared the way for their promotions to the Indian Administrative Services.

Former Haryana minister Karan Singh Dalal, through his son and SC lawyer Deepkaran Dalal, moved a petition to the apex court challenging the February order of the High Court. Alleging collusion between the officers concerned and the Haryana government, Dalal had asserted that the collusion was evident from a legal opinion which had recommended issuance of integrity certificates to the officers — despite the filing of a final report under the Prevention of Corruption Act.

Hearing the petition, a bench of Justice Vikram Nath and Justice Sandeep Mehta said on Wednesday: "...issue notice, returnable within four weeks. In the meantime, the effect and operation of the impugned order (s) passed by the High Court shall remain stayed." Dalal had earlier challenged the selections before the HC in 2002, alleging "favouritism, malpractices and illegalities involved in the entire HCS Executive and Allied Services Examination".

13 dead, 20 injured as private bus collides with truck in Andhra Pradesh's Markapuram

At least 10 people were killed and 20 injured in a bus accident in Markapuram, Andhra Pradesh. At least 10 people were killed and 20 injured in a bus accident in Markapuram, Andhra Pradesh.

At least 13 people were killed and 20 others were injured after a private bus caught fire in the Markapuram district of Andhra Pradesh in the early hours of Thursday. At least 40 people were on board the Harikrishna Travels bus when the accident occurred near the Rayavaram stone

quarry. The bus travelling from Jagtial in Telangana to Vinjamuru in Nellore district collided with a truck that was joining the highway. State Minister for Medical and Health Satya Kumar Yadav expressed deep shock over the accident and said 10 people were confirmed dead. The injured were being treated at various hospitals, Yadav said. The bus was completely gutted, he said, adding that at least 30 passengers had a narrow escape. The minister issued directives to officials to ensure advanced medical care for the injured and to dispatch medical specialists to the location.

HC Gives Punjab leeway, keeps issue on fast track

The Punjab and Haryana High Court has granted limited time to the Punjab government in an ongoing matter concerning delayed elections to the NRI Sabha Punjab, while continuing to treat the issue as urgent amid growing concerns over institutional paralysis. The case, heard on March 20, arises from a petition filed by Sabha member Karan Randhawa, who has sought completion of the election process and publication of the electoral roll of eligible voters.

During the hearing, counsel for State submitted that approval for conducting the elections had been granted by the Chief Minister — also the Chief Patron of the Sabha — on March 16, 2026. The government requested approximately one month to place a formal election schedule on record. The HC, however, stopped short of allowing the full period sought and instead adjourned the matter to April 2, 2026, effectively giving the State a shorter window to respond while keeping the proceedings under the urgent category.

In its order, the court noted that while the election process had earlier been stated to be initiated, a crucial step—the publication of the list of eligible voters—remains pend-

ing. The petition highlights that the absence of an electoral roll has stalled the process, even after the expiry of the President's tenure earlier this year. This marks the second round of litigation on the issue. In an earlier petition disposed of on December 23, 2025, the High Court had recorded the State's position that the election process had already been initiated. The current plea contends that little tangible progress has followed since that assurance.

As per the Sabha's governing rules, elections to the President's post are to be conducted every two years. The tenure of the previous President expired on January 5, 2026, leaving the body without an elected head for over two months. The delay in preparing and publishing the electoral roll has emerged as a key bottleneck.

Alongside the election delay, Randhawa and some members have raised allegations regarding the functioning of the Sabha during the outgoing President's tenure, including non-constitution of the Central Executive Committee, non formation of the Administrative Sub-Committee, not convening of Annual General Meetings (AGMs) and no presentation of financial statements. They have also alleged that a government order dated January 31, 2024, appointing office bearers, was not implemented, and that an RTI application seeking financial details did not receive a response. These allegations form part of the petition but have not been adjudicated upon by the Court. Members have expressed concern that the continued delay may be impacting not just the central body but also district-level units, where elections are required once membership thresholds are met. The NRI Sabha Punjab—established in 1996 and operational since 1998—serves as a representative platform for Non-Resident Indians from the state, with participation limited to registered members through physical voting. With no election schedule announced so far, members have called for early finalisation of the process to restore the functioning of the Sabha and prevent further erosion of its institutional credibility. When contacted, outgoing President Parvinder Kaur she did not respond. The matter is now listed for April 2, 2026, when the State is expected to update the Court on steps taken towards conducting the elections.

As wheat procurement season & gunny bag shortfall go hand in hand, farmers, agents question execution gaps

Punjab is entering a critical phase as it is seeing gunny bag shortage with the wheat procurement season set to begin in April — raising serious questions about the state's preparedness at a time when a bumper crop is expected to flood the mandis. It is estimated that Punjab would require nearly 26 crore gunny bags, considering each bag carries 50 kg of wheat. However, there is an anticipated shortage of around 5 crore (50 million) gunny bags for the upcoming procurement cycle — an alarming gap that could disrupt procurement operations at the peak of arrivals.

The Central government may release approximately Rs 33,000 crore to Rs 34,000 crores to Punjab for wheat procurement, which can make the situation even more concerning. Despite the significant financial allocation, the apparent lack in arranging the basic packaging infrastructure exposes serious gaps in planning and execution. Sources in the Punjab Food and Civil Supplies Department indicate that a DBA tender was floated to address the shortfall. However, the delay in ensuring timely availability of the gunny bags raises concerns about whether corrective measures have come too late. The scale of production also amplifies the concern.

Punjab typically contributes 12 to 13 million tonnes of wheat annually to the Central pool. This year, experts anticipate a bumper harvest, with procurement likely to exceed 13 million tonnes subject to favourable weather and logistics. Such increased volumes will place even greater pressure on the system, making the timely availability of

gunny bags critical. Any disruption at this stage could lead to procurement delays, mandi congestion, and financial distress for farmers. A senior officer, Punjab Food and Civil Supplies Department, said this mismatch between requirement and supply is not merely a statistical concern — it has direct on-ground implications. Without adequate gunny bags, procurement agencies may be forced to slow down lifting operations, leading to congestion in mandis. For farmers, this could mean longer waiting periods, exposure of harvested produce to weather risks, and potential distress.

The crop has been sown across more than 35 lakh hectares this season, with wheat arrivals beginning in early-April and intensifying by mid-April — this leaves no room for administrative or logistical lapses. Prem Goel, Aggarwal & Company and President, Arhtiyas Association Suman, said, "In a system where timing is everything, the question remains — will the administration be able to bridge the gap in time, or will the shortage turn into a full-blown procurement crisis?" Another procurement agent said, "Despite the scale and predictability of the procurement cycle, preparations appear to be lagging. It is learnt that the state has floated tenders for the procurement of gunny bags... execution timelines are tight. Any delay in finalising and supplying these bags could directly impact procurement speed and storage management."

Sources said certain external factors are also aggravating the supply crunch. Reduced availability of raw jute has affected the domestic production of jute bags — all of it partly linked to import disruptions. While authorities maintain that contingency measures are under consideration, stakeholders on the ground remain unconvinced. Commission agents and farmer representatives said such bottlenecks are avoidable, given that wheat procurement in Punjab is an annual and highly structured exercise. "The crop cycle is known, the procurement window is fixed and the requirements are predictable. Yet, every year, some critical gap surfaces at the last minute," said a mandi trader. "If the shortfall is not addressed on priority, Punjab could find itself grappling with avoidable chaos in mandis at the peak of the harvest season — undermining both farmer confidence and the efficiency of the procurement system," said a senior officer in Pungrain, state procurement agency.

What must we do about plastic waste? Fix accountability.

India is not only one of the world's most populous nations, it is also at the epicentre of a rapidly escalating plastic crisis. As per research conducted by the University of Leeds, India generates approximately 10.2 million tonnes of plastic waste each year, more than double that of the next highest-polluting countries. It has implications on our shared environment. At this juncture, it is pertinent to pause and reflect on the drastic transitions of Indian civilisation in the last few decades. From being a nature centred people, who co-existed sustainably with an eco-friendly lifestyle, we have turned into a consumerist society that generates tonnes of waste everyday.

India's cultural memory is rich with sustainable practices: cloth bags in every household, metal tiffin boxes passed through generations, glass bottles that were returned and reused, and earthenware commonly used in daily life. Waste, in the modern sense, barely existed because nothing was designed to be thrown away. Our transition is best reflected through the widespread use of plastic. Multi-layer plastics and single use plastics, once hailed as innovations, gradually displaced traditional, eco-friendly alternatives. Convenience became paramount, and business models optimised around speed, scale, and disposability. What was missing in this reconfiguration was a fundamental truth: the environment does not recognise convenience as a justification.

The numbers are alarming. India burns roughly 5.8 million tonnes (MT) of plastic every year and releases another 3.5 MT into the environment across land, air, and water in the form of debris. Presently, in our consumerist market, almost every item for consumption is packed in multi-layered plastic packaging. The plastic packaged goods increase shelf life, aesthetic value, and most notably profits for conglomerates, while on the other hand the disproportionate waste that gets generated is externalised for collection, processing and disposal to citizens, local governments and informal workers from marginalised communities. These materials are non-biodegradable, persist indefinitely in the environment, and silently infiltrate soil, water bodies, and the food chain in the form of microplastics and nano plastics. Cows routinely die due to plastic ingestion, rivers remain choked with waste, and urban fringes transform into growing mounds of discarded packaging. Unfortunately, the leviathan of plastic pollution moves faster than our regulatory systems can keep pace.

Recognising the scale of the crisis, the Government of India introduced the Plastic Waste Management Rules 2016. These rules strengthened reporting requirements and introduced the foundational concept of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). Later amendments, especially those notified in 2018, 2022, 2024, and 2025, attempted to address gaps related to multi layer plastics, biodegradable plastics, recycled content, penalties, and traceability. Yet the most critical element remains unchanged. Producers, importers, and brand owners must assume primary responsibility for the plastic waste their products generate. However, in practice, the EPR framework faces several challenges. Targets are geo-neutral, allowing obligations in one state to be offset by questionable efforts elsewhere. This complicates monitoring and undermines local accountability. Credit certificates also require strict auditing to ensure they reflect genuine waste collection and recycling rather than mere paperwork. A recent order dated 26.07.2024 of the National Green Tribunal, which issued notices to the

CPCB and MoEFCC after nearly six lakhs fake EPR certificates were uncovered from plastic recycling companies, illustrates the severity of the problem and the need for much stronger verification systems. Despite the presence of a strong legal framework, it only takes a casual walk through any city to witness its limitations. Plastic packaging sprawls across markets, highways, canals, and farmlands, revealing the gulf between regulatory intent and ground reality.

It is against this backdrop that the Punjab Pollution Control Board (PPCB) undertook a comprehensive plastic waste brand audit across the state. The objective was straightforward. The PPCB sought to identify the principal contributors to the plastic waste footprint in Punjab and to create a data backed foundation for accountability and systemic change. The audit revealed what many have long suspected. A relatively small number of large, powerful brands contribute disproportionately to the problem. These are entities with deep financial resources, sophisticated supply chains, and the capacity to influence consumer behaviour at scale. With such capacity comes moral and regulatory responsibility.

The purpose of this exercise is not to create another stack of documents. It is meant to trigger a shift in intent. If companies can invest in market expansion, product design and advertising campaigns featuring top celebrities, they can certainly invest in building effective mechanisms to retrieve plastic waste from consumers. We recognise that the gap is not technological rather ideological. In our aim to move from an externalisation of waste regime, brands are being encouraged to take moral, legal and ecological responsibility for their waste. One of the key directions being strongly encouraged is the development of incentive-based schemes for consumers. For years, waste management has relied excessively on municipal bodies, informal waste sector workers ragpickers, and citizen goodwill. This approach is fundamentally unfair. The burden of cleanup must fall on those who profit from the production and sale of plastic packaging. Deposit return systems, loyalty-based collection incentives, doorstep buyback models, take back kiosks, and digital reward systems are entirely feasible. When brands innovate, markets respond. The same creativity that fuels market growth must now be applied to waste recovery. At its heart, the brand audit is more than a compliance exercise. It is a call to conscience. Plastic pollution is not the inevitable price of development. It is the result of choices made without foresight. The responsibility cannot rest solely with consumers or municipal authorities. In Punjab, the PPCB is nudging investment directly in infrastructure including collection points, material recovery facilities, and modern recycling plants. India's EPR regime has to hold brands genuinely accountable for delivering a cleaner, waste-responsible India and Punjab currently is leading the charge.

A cleric, lawyer, 4 others held under UAPA for 'JeM links', a Ghaziabad village shrouded in silence



A few days after the US and Israel launched their attacks on Iran, with the killing of its Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei, Mohd Javed, a cleric at a mosque in Nahal village of Ghaziabad in Uttar Pradesh, watched and shared videos of speeches made by Khamenei. On March 12, Javed was arrested along with five others. "Where is that a crime? We cannot watch Khamenei's videos? Police told us they found chats on Javed's phone... but all we know is that he used the word talwar (sword). How is that a crime?" says a villager. As per the Ghaziabad Police, however, the crime of the six — all belonging to the entirely Muslim village of Nahal, with a population of 22,500 — is much more serious. They accuse Javed, 45; Mohd Savez, 20; Mohd Junaid, 23; Mohd Fardin, 22; Ikram Ali, 36; and Mohd Fazru, 48, of being in touch with members of the banned Jaish-e-Mohammad and seeking to join it, and of using social media to "spread anti-national content and radicalise others". They claim to have seized mobile phones as evidence.

Barring Ikram, who is a lawyer at district court in Ghaziabad, Junaid, who works as an assistant at the same court and Javed, who is a cleric, all others are in irregular jobs. Masuri gram pradhan Tassawar Ali says Fazru has a small cart in which he transports scraps, Fardin is a labourer and Savez owns a small kirana shop.

At Nahal village, with houses that are badly in need of paint, there is a hush, marked by disbelief. Men stand in clusters, women rush by, and from terraces, half-open windows or from behind iron doors, faces appear only to quickly pull back. Almost no one claims to know any of the six. Savez's brother who does not want to be identified, and who is temporarily running the Zeeshan Kirana store owned by Savez, also brushes away all queries. A neighbour, who lives just 50 metres away, says: "Savez was the last person we thought would be arrested in a case like this and be called a terrorist."

Savez's sister, who also doesn't want to be identified, says three of her brothers, all elder to Savez, are in good

jobs. "One of them is employed with the Indian Air Force, another is an engineer and a third lives in America." Savez was more religiously inclined, stopped studies after Class 10 and hoped to become a maulana, she adds. She says police picked up Savez from his shop around 4.30 pm on March 12. "No one had any idea what he had done. When we asked police, they did not say anything," she says. The arrest of the others followed. Villagers say Ikram was arrested around 10:30 pm on March 12, Fardin was arrested when he came to the police station to enquire about Savez, and Fazru was held after he went to get his phone from police. A cousin of Junaid's says police first arrested his brother and brother-in-law, and put pressure on the family to hand him over. "Junaid's father thought that it was an investigation and he will be free soon, and so sent him." A lawyer who works with Ikram, Mohammad Chand Alam, says he has been practising for over a decade. "When Ikram was arrested, a group of senior lawyers gave a memorandum to the Ghaziabad Police Commissioner saying he was not involved in any anti-national activities," Alam said. The president of the Ghaziabad Bar Association, Bramhadev Tyagi, confirms this, adding that Ikram was among the senior-most lawyers in the district court.

District Commissioner of Police, Ghaziabad (Rural), Surendra Nath Tiwari calls Savez "self-motivated". "We have recovered his mobile phone and have evidence against him. We are questioning him," Tiwari says, calling Savez and Javed the main accused. On Javed, the DCP adds: "His uncle was wanted in an incident of violence and fled to Pakistan. We have found that Javed has been in touch with him. We are investigating the case further." Javed is the only one among the six who does not live in Nahal any more, having shifted to Masuri, where he is maulana at a mosque. Earlier, Assistant Commissioner of Police, Ghaziabad, Lipi Nagaich said Instagram chats showed Savez was in touch with a Jaish-e-Mohammad member called Hamza. "Hamza shared some videos of the outfit with them, and the six were planning to join it. They also used the Signal application (to ensure secure exchanges)," Nagaich told. Tiwari claims they stumbled upon the six during routine surveillance. "We were informed that some men of Nahal village were involved in anti-national activities. When police began an investigation, the names of the six accused came to light."

They have been booked at Masuri Police Station under Sections of endangering unity, integrity and sovereignty of the country, promoting enmity and criminal conspiracy of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and under the Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA). The pradhan says he has made several visits to the police station to enquire about the men. "We always get into trouble. Even if some people are responsible, all of us are blamed," he adds.

Drug and Socio-Economic Census: Behind Punjab move to count its addicts, policy shift from enforcement to targeted rehabilitation



The Punjab government is set to roll out its first comprehensive Drug and Socio-Economic Census in April, with nearly 28,000 government employees tasked to survey around 65 lakh families across the state. The exercise is expected to be completed within three months. The initiative aims to create a "scientific" strategy to combat the drug menace by collecting household-level data, shifting the focus from enforcement to targeted rehabilitation. The state has allocated Rs 150 crore for the census and related de-addiction efforts. Punjab Finance Minister Harpal Cheema said the census would provide crucial insights into the scale and impact of substance abuse. "The census aims to determine the magnitude of drug abuse, identify specific substances used, and assess the impact on socio-economic factors like employment, poverty, and education levels," he told The Indian Express.

The decision to conduct the census followed a pilot survey in 11 villages, where authorities found that families were willing to share information about drug addiction despite concerns about stigma. A government official said, "We carried out a dipstick test. There were apprehensions that the families may not be forthcoming due to social stigma involved. However, we realised that they are so sick of the menace that they see everyone approaching them as a God-sent opportunity. They want help, no matter who is willing to offer it. Such is the state of affairs."

Cheema said the initiative would only strengthen the government's anti-drug campaign. "We have achieved enormous success with our Yudh Nasheyana Virudh campaign. But we want to identify even the last person hooked to drugs. This will not only help us in tackling the menace

by making it the responsibility of the government to send every addict to a de-addiction centre but also to identify the peddlers supplying to him. This will also help break the nexus of law enforcers with the peddlers, if any," he said. The Panchayats and Rural Development Department has been designated as the nodal agency for the exercise. It will coordinate with other departments to carry out the door-to-door survey. School teachers, including computer instructors, will be deployed as enumerators.

Announced in the Punjab Budget for 2025-26, the census is also expected to contribute to the government's "Badalta Punjab" roadmap. Previous studies, including the Punjab Opioid Dependence Survey and research by the Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education and Research, Chandigarh, had estimated that over 30 lakh people in Punjab use some form of drugs, with higher prevalence in border districts. However, officials say the new census will provide more accurate and updated data. "The upcoming census will provide up-to-date, definitive data to replace these older estimates," an official said, adding that it could also help the state shed its image of "Udta Punjab".

The drug menace is a politically contentious issue in Punjab. In 2012, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi had sparked controversy by claiming that 70 per cent of Punjab's youth were addicted to drugs. Speaking to students at Panjab University in Chandigarh he had said that "seven out of 10 youth in Punjab have drug problems," subsequently blaming the then Shiromani Akali Dal-BJP coalition government for not providing opportunities and failing to tackle the menace. This had invited criticism, with the ruling combine accusing him of defaming Punjab. Presenting the Budget earlier this month, Cheema said preparations for the census were complete. "The necessary groundwork has been completed, including development of the dedicated software platform and comprehensive training of field functionaries to ensure accuracy, transparency and data integrity. Building upon this preparedness, the census will be rolled out from April," he said. Highlighting progress under the state's anti-drug drive, Cheema added, "Over the past year, 36,686 cases have been registered against 52,331 drug traffickers under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, leading to the seizure of more than 33,000 kg of narcotics through intelligence-led operations."

India's carbon emissions in 2025 grew at slowest rate in two decades: CREA analysis



New Delhi: India's carbon dioxide emissions grew in 2025 at the slowest rate in more than two decades, according to an analysis by the Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air (CREA). The analysis also pointed out that emissions in the power sector fell by 3.8 pc as record clean-energy growth combined with weak electricity demand. Also, consumption of imported coal at power plants fell by 20 per cent in 2025.

"India's carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions grew by 0.5 per cent in the second half of 2025 and by just 0.7 per cent in the year as a whole, the slowest rate in more than two decades. "This is a sharp slowdown from the growth of 4-11 per cent in the preceding four years and marks the lowest rate of increase since 2001, excluding the impact of Covid in 2020," said the analysis on India's CO₂ emissions from fossil fuels and cement, based on official data for fuel use, industrial production and power output.

"This is the second in a new series of half-yearly analysis on India's CO₂ emissions from fossil fuels and cement, based on official data for fuel use, industrial production and power output," it added. According to Lauri Myllyvirta, lead analyst at CREA, the analysis shows that India's power sector is poised for a potential inflection point, where clean-energy additions can meet or exceed the growth in electricity demand. If clean energy matches expectations, allowing this inflection point to take place, then coal-fired power output and the associated CO₂ emissions would see sustained falls. "In addition, oil demand is falling in the petrochemical industry and is expected to slow down in the steel and cement sectors. Despite these trends, which could signal a lasting slowdown in emissions, India is planning major expansions in its capacity for coal power, petrochemicals and coal-based steel. "The path of India's CO₂ emissions over the coming years depends on how it resolves these apparent contradictions regarding its future demand for fossil fuels," it said.

The report noted that while India's carbon emissions have been growing rapidly for decades, with annual increases averaging 4.9 pc per year since 1990 and 4-11 per cent during 2021-24, the 0.7 per cent rise in 2025 was the slowest since 2001, excluding the impact of COVID in 2020. The fall in power-sector emissions is particularly notable, given it was the largest driver of emissions increases in 2021-2023, responsible for half of the total growth.

Across the sectors, the reductions and weak growth in fossil-fuel consumption eased India's vulnerability to the recent price and supply disruptions taking place in the wake of the attacks on Iran by the US and Israel, as well as Iran's subsequent retaliation. Notably, India's fossil-fuel imports were disproportionately affected by falling demand overall. Consumption of imported coal at power plants fell by 20 pc in 2025. There were two key reasons why emissions fell in India's power sector in 2025.

First, the country added 47 gigawatts (GW) of solar, 6.3GW of wind, 4.0GW of hydropower and 0.6GW of nuclear power in 2025. "The annual electricity generation from this new capacity, calculated based on the average capacity utilisation of each technology, amounts to 90 terawatt hours (TWh). This is twice as much as the clean generation added in 2024, which in itself was a record," it said. The largest reductions in coal-fired power generation took place in Gujarat, Tamil Nadu and Rajasthan, the three states that also led the buildout of new solar and wind power. "Power demand is expected to pick up again, with Indian credit-rating agency ICRA projecting growth of 5.0-5.5 per cent in the financial year starting in April 2026. These capacity additions would deliver additional annual generation of more than 100TWh, enough to cover demand growth of up to 5.8 per cent. "This means that India's power sector could reach an inflection point this year, where clean-energy growth matches the expected average rise in demand," it said. For oil demand, which slowed from 3.9 per cent growth in 2024 to 0.4 per cent in 2025, the key drivers came in the petrochemical and cement industry, where demand fell.

"Specifically, demand fell for naphtha, petcoke and other oil products. Naphtha is used as chemical industry feedstock, while petcoke is used mainly in cement production. Part of the fall in demand was due to an increase in India's imports of plastics and precursors, which rose by 7 per cent in volume terms, while exports fell. "The increase in imports came almost entirely from China, where the petrochemical industry is expanding, leading to complaints in India of price dumping. Mirroring the shift of plastics production to China, India began exporting large volumes of naphtha to the country," it added.

Nipah virus could turn into something "far more severe", scientists warn



Surveillance, ecological monitoring, and cross-border communication cannot wait for the next outbreak, authors said. The Nipah virus, which was first identified in Malaysia in 1999, is still not a priority in South and Southeast Asia despite its repeated emergence, says a correspondence by scientists published in The Lancet. "The danger of Nipah virus is its persistence, that is, it is periodic, lethal, and preventable," the authors say. They caution that the way South and Southeast Asia respond now, will determine whether Nipah virus remains a regional epidemic or if it "escalates into something far more severe." Recent outbreak responses. The correspondence warns that the recent cases in India (and Bangladesh) are not anomalies but reminders of a virus with recurrent outbreaks, high mortality, frequent infections of health-care workers, and no approved vaccines or treatments.

Most recently, on 26 January 2026, two laboratory-confirmed cases of Nipah virus infection were recorded in West Bengal. The patients were both nurses at a hospital in the North 24 Parganas district and slipped into a coma.

While one had to be placed on mechanical ventilation and died in February, the other nurse was eventually discharged. The Nipah virus infection is a serious but rare zoonotic disease and is transmitted to humans through infected animals such as bats, or food contaminated with saliva, urine, and excreta of infected animals, according to WHO. It can also be transmitted between people through close contact. Even today, there are no licensed medicines or vaccines for Nipah infection, but early supportive care can help survival.

Amplifying the risk of contracting the Nipah virus are deforestation, urban expansion, agricultural intensification, and increase human-bat interactions, says the correspondence. "Fruit bats roost near homes, forage in cultivated areas, and contaminate food and surfaces, creating opportunities for spillover," it added. Pigs, in particular, magnify the risk of disease. While the Nipah virus is well understood and reservoirs have been identified, translating this knowledge into action has been poor, say the authors. "Surveillance is activated too late, research funding is sporadic, and preparedness is episodic."

Much like South Asia, Southeast Asia is susceptible too. Cambodia, Thailand and the Philippines with high populations, growing agriculture, and abundant fruit bats, has conditions similar to south Asia, say the scientists, adding that "Cross-border movement and informal animal trade elevate regional spillover risk." The authors call for One Health strategies -- linking human, animal, and environmental health--along with regular funding, and regional coordination. "Surveillance, ecological monitoring, and cross-border communication cannot wait for the next outbreak," they say. And preparedness cannot be episodic: short-term responses might contain outbreaks but do little to prevent the next occurrence.

India buys first Iran LPG cargo in years after U.S. eases sanctions, sources say

India has bought its first cargo of Iranian liquefied petroleum gas in years after the U.S. temporarily removed sanctions on Tehran's oil and refined fuels, LSG trade flows and three industry sources said. India had shunned energy purchases from Iran in 2019 under pressure from Western sanctions. The tanker was initially bound for China, according to LSEG data. Sanctioned tanker Aurora carrying Iranian LPG is expected to shortly reach the west coast port of Mangalore, the sources said and LSEG data showed.

The South Asian nation has been hit hard by the disruption of energy shipments via the Strait of Hormuz caused by the U.S.-Israeli war with Iran. Three retailers to share LPG cargo

The Iranian LPG cargo will be shared among the three fuel retailers, Indian Oil Corp, Bharat Petroleum Corp, and Hindustan Petroleum Corp. The cargo has been purchased from a trader, and payment will be made in rupees, the sources said, adding India is exploring buying more Iranian LPG cargoes.

Still, an official said he was not aware of Iranian cargoes being bought. "There are no loaded cargoes from Iran, we have not heard of that," said Rajesh Kumar Sinha, special secretary in the federal shipping ministry said Wednesday at a press conference. The three companies and India's oil ministry did not immediately respond to Reuters requests for comments. Most of imported LPG from West Asia. The world's second-largest LPG importer is battling its worst gas crisis in decades with the government cutting supplies for industries to shield households from any shortage of cooking gas.

India consumed 33.15 million metric tons of LPG, or cooking gas, last year, with imports accounting for about 60% of demand. About 90% of those imports came from West Asia. India is gradually moving out of its stranded LPG cargoes from the Strait of Hormuz, with four LPG tankers moved so far--Shivalik, Nanda Devi, Pine Gas, and Jag Vasant. India is also loading LPG onto its empty vessels stranded in the Persian Gulf.

With NavIC setback, India unable to use satellite system for security purposes: experts



With India's navigation satellite system -- Navigation with Indian Constellation (NavIC) -- not fully functional, one of the biggest concerns is that the country will be unable to use it for security and strategic purposes, say experts. A major setback occurred after the last atomic clock on board the Indian Regional Navigational Satellite System-1F (IRNSS-1F) stopped functioning on March 10, leaving only three satellites of the constellation capable of providing position, navigation, and timing services.

At least four satellites with operational atomic clocks are required for the navigation satellite system to function properly. Ananya Ray, a former scientist with the Indian

Space Research Organisation (ISRO), said: "Systems like NavIC have two signals -- an open signal for common people and a restricted military signal that increases accuracy roughly tenfold." Armed forces of countries use the navigation satellite system for logistics, mapping and operational planning, and relying on a foreign navigation satellite system could pose security issues, especially during wars.

"If you are in a war and using someone else's system, they could add errors to the signals or spoof you, making you think you are in the wrong position. Depending on another country's satellites is a dependency out of your control that can prove fatal during war," said Ms. Ray. India began to develop NavIC after the 1999 Kargil War, during which the United States refused to share GPS data. The first-generation satellites for NavIC, known as the Indian Regional Navigational Satellite System (IRNSS) series, were launched between 2013 and 2018.

However, the constellation of satellites soon began to face issues, with the atomic clocks aboard several IRNSS series satellites repeatedly stopping to work. Atomic clocks are the heart of such navigation satellites, as they provide the high-precision timing necessary for the navigation and positioning technology. E.A.S. Sarma, former bureaucrat, said, "Usually, each of these satellites carries three or four atomic clocks for redundancies. So, if one goes bad, then one should be able to switch to the other one. In the case of IRNSS-1F, all of its atomic clocks have stopped working."

To make matters worse, the space agency had on August 31, 2017 attempted to replace the IRNSS-1A with IRNSS-1H, but the mission failed to insert the satellite into the desired orbit. Subsequently, ISRO began launching the second generation of satellites for NavIC, known as the NVS series. While it successfully placed NVS-01 in the desired orbit in 2023, the 2025 launch of NVS-02 failed. This has delayed the launch of NVS-03, NVS-04, and NVS-05, leaving the NavIC system with only IRNSS 1-B, IRNSS 1-L, and NVS-01, which are currently capable of providing navigation services. Mr. Sarma suggested that ISRO and the government have been distracted by missions such as Gaganyaan and the Axiom Mission 4, which involved Shubhanshu Shukla going to the International Space Station -- the first Indian to do so. "India cannot afford to rely on foreign navigation systems like GPS... Our priority must be strategic application, followed by other purposes, and lastly, political optics," he said.

Iran, U.S. harden their positions as Tehran keeps its grip on Strait of Hormuz



Tehran moved to formalise its control over the crucial Strait of Hormuz while Washington prepared for the arrival of U.S. combat forces in the region that could be used on the ground in the Islamic Republic. Iran is instituting a "de facto toll booth" regime, industry experts say, with some ships paying in Chinese yuan to pass through the strait, where 20% of all traded oil and natural gas is transported in peacetime. Meanwhile, a strike group anchored by the amphibious assault ship USS Tripoli drew closer to the West Asia with some 2,500 Marines. Also, at least 1,000 paratroopers from the 82nd Airborne have been ordered to the region. The troop movements don't guarantee U.S. President Donald Trump will try to use force to compel Iran to open the strait and halt its attacks on Gulf Arab states.

Mr. Trump previously deployed a large force in the Caribbean before the American military captured former Venezuelan leader Nicolás Maduro in January. In the current situation, the U.S. is seen as focused on possibly seizing Iran's oil terminal at Kharg Island or other sites near the strait. U.S. Navy Adm. Brad Cooper, who commands the American military in the region, said his forces have hit more than 10,000 targets since Israel and the U.S. started the war February 28, destroying 92% of Iran's largest ships and more than two-thirds of the country's missile, drone and naval production facilities.

The shipping intelligence firm said vessels have to provide manifests, crew details and their destination to Iran's Guard for sanctions screening, cargo alignment checks that currently prioritises oil over all other commodities, and for what is described as geopolitical vetting.

"While not all ships are paying a direct toll, at least two vessels have and the payment is settled in yuan," Lloyd's List said, referring to China's currency. Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said in an interview on state TV, however, that his government has not engaged in talks to end the war, "and we do not plan on any negotiations".

Mr. Araghchi said the U.S. had tried to send messages to Iran through other nations, "but that is not a conversation nor a negotiation". Press TV, the English-language broadcaster on Iranian state television, said Iran has its own five-point proposal, which includes "sovereignty they'll be the Strait of Hormuz". A wave of Israeli airstrikes hits as Iran fires on Gulf neighbours Israel said it carried out a wave of attacks early on Thursday targeting Iranian infrastructure, and air defences were heard in Tehran, while heavy strikes were also reported around Isfahan, a city some 330 kilometers (205 miles) south of the Iranian capital.

Ifahan is home to a major Iranian air base and other military sites, as well as one of the nuclear sites bombed by the U.S. during the 12-day war between Israel and Iran in June. Since the war began, more than 1,500 people have been killed in Iran, its Health Ministry says. Twenty people have been killed in Israel; two Israeli soldiers have also been killed in Lebanon. At least 13 US military members have been killed. More than a dozen civilians in the occupied West Bank and Gulf Arab states have also died. Nearly 1,100 people have died in Lebanon, authorities said. In Iraq, where Iranian-supported militant groups have entered the conflict, 80 members of the security forces have been killed.

U.S. to deploy 1,000 elite troops to West Asia

Amid the escalating strikes, counterattacks and rising tensions in West Asia, the United States military is preparing to deploy at least 1,000 troops from the 82nd Airborne Division to the region in the coming days, according to people with knowledge of the plans.

The unit is considered the Army's emergency response force and can typically be deployed on short notice.

The force would include a battalion of the 1st Brigade Combat Team as well as Maj. Gen. Brandon Tegtmeier, the division's commander, and the division staff, according to the people who spoke on Tuesday on condition of anonymity. It's the latest addition of American troops to the Iran war effort after U.S. officials recently said thousands of Marines aboard several Navy ships will be heading to the region. Diplomats from various countries said they were working behind the scenes to ferry messages between the warring parties. But there was no let-up in the military activity, with targets in Iran, Israel, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia all coming under fire. The Israeli military said on Wednesday it had completed several waves of airstrikes in Tehran. The semi-official Iranian SNN News Agency said the strikes hit a residential area in the city, with rescuers searching the rubble.

Cybersecurity breaches top risk for India Inc: FICCI-EY survey



New Delhi: About 51 per cent of India Inc rank cybersecurity breaches as the top risk to organisational performance, a survey showed. This is followed closely by changing customer demands and expectations at 49 per cent, while 48 per cent point to geopolitical events as a key risk factor, according to the FICCI-EY 'Risk Survey'. The report draws on inputs from senior leaders across sectors, on factors affecting pricing, supply chains, talent strategies and technology investments, making risk management central to business strategy.

"In a business environment shaped by volatility, the ability to anticipate, absorb and adapt to risk is emerging as a defining capability for sustained growth. The report indicates that organisations are moving away from treating risk as episodic and are instead embedding it into strategic de-

cision-making, governance structures and long-term planning," said Rajeev Sharma, Chair, FICCI Committee on Corporate Security and Disaster Risk Reduction. Technology risk is now tightly linked to operational continuity. The survey shows that 61 per cent of respondents feel that rapid technological change and digital disruption are affecting their competitive position, while an equal proportion (61 per cent) identify cyber-attacks and data breaches as major financial and reputational threats.

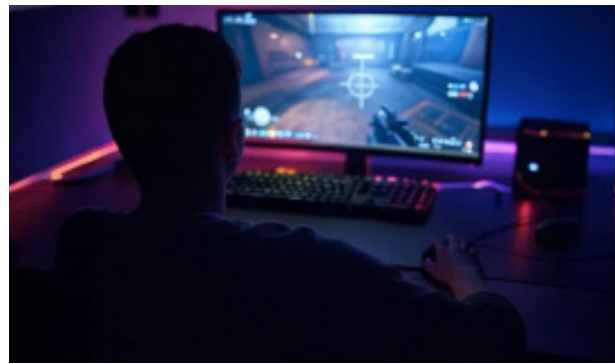
More than half, 57 per cent, report potential data theft and insider fraud as significant risks, and 47 per cent acknowledge difficulty in addressing increasingly sophisticated cyber threats, said the report. Artificial intelligence (AI) is emerging as a dual risk area, where both under-adoption and weak governance are sources of concern. The survey indicates that 60 per cent of respondents believe inadequate adoption of emerging technologies, including AI, can adversely impact operational effectiveness. At the same time, 54 per cent feel AI-related risks, including ethical and governance issues, are not being effectively managed. Sudhakar Rajendran, Risk Consulting Leader, EY India said, "Organisations are navigating a phase where multiple risks are converging rather than occurring in isolation." "Inflation, cyber threats, AI governance, climate exposure and regulatory change are interacting in ways that directly influence India Inc's performance and resilience. Boards are being pushed to strengthen oversight, improve data quality and integrate resilience into core strategy," Rajendran mentioned.

Digital addiction fuelling mental health crisis among youth: Economic Survey

New Delhi: Digital addiction is growing as a significant health problem among children and the youth and is also contributing to the mental health crisis in the country, said the government on Thursday in the Economic Survey 2025-26. The Survey tabled in the Parliament by the Union Minister for Finance and Corporate Affairs, Nirmala Sitharaman, noted that digital addiction is closely linked with the degrading mental health of the youth in the country. "Digital addiction negatively affects academic performance and workplace productivity due to distractions, 'sleep debt', and reduced focus. It also erodes social capital," it said.

Buy vitamins and supplements To address this problem, the CBSE has issued guidelines on safe internet use in schools and school buses. Other measures include the Ministry of Education's Pragyatah framework, which guides digital education planning with attention to screen time, and the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights guidelines on screen time limits and online safety. Further, the Survey also mentioned the high prevalence of social media addiction among those aged 15-24, which is strongly associated with anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, and cyberbullying stress. Other issues plaguing Indian youth include compulsive scrolling, social comparison, and gaming disorders. These are increasingly leading to sleep disruption, aggression, social withdrawal, and depression, with adolescent populations being especially vulnerable. To address this issue, the government has taken multiple measures, the Survey said.

This includes the Tele-MANAS (Tele Mental Health Assistance and Networking Across States), which has



since its launch in October 2022, received over 32 lakh calls; the SHUT (Service for Healthy Use of Technology) Clinic at NIMHANS, Bengaluru, which provides specialised care for excessive and compulsive technology use, focusing on adolescents and young adults; and the Online Gaming (Regulation) Act, 2025, which represents a major step to address digital addiction and financial harm among youth. As digital access cannot be fully restricted, the Survey suggested the establishment of offline youth hubs, particularly in urban slums and rural areas, to provide alternatives to digital spaces; moderated online safe spaces hosted by schools or similar institutions. "Schools play a critical role in shaping digital habits, and hence, they should introduce a Digital Wellness Curriculum covering screen time literacy, cyber safety, and mental health awareness," it said, while calling for a "holistic approach, including physical and mental health, is essential to ensure a resilient future".

India's internet user base crosses 950 million in 2025: IAMAI report

Bengaluru: India's internet user base crossed 950 million in 2025, driven largely by rapid growth in rural connectivity, rising short-video consumption, and increasing adoption of AI, according to a report released by IAMAI on Thursday. The report also revealed that rural India accounts for 57 per cent of India's active internet users, i.e. approximately 548 million active users.

The 'Internet in India Report 2025,' jointly prepared by Internet and Mobile Association of India and KANTAR, which highlights these trends, was released at the India Digital Summit in the presence of Manjula N, Secretary to the Government, Department of Electronics, IT/BT and Science & Technology, Government of Karnataka. According to the report, India now has 958 million Active Internet Users (AIU), marking an approximate 8 per cent year on year growth, reinforcing India's position as one of the world's largest and fastest-evolving digital markets.

It also reveals that 44 per cent of users have engaged with AI enabled features such as voice search, image based search, chatbots, and AI filters. "This growth of internet users continues to be led decisively by rural India, which is now home to approximately 548 million active internet users," the report said. Rural regions now account for over 57 per cent of India's active internet users and are growing at nearly four times the pace of urban India, signalling a structural shift in where and how digital adoption is expanding, it added. The report highlighted that artificial intelligence has reached mass adoption in India, with 44 per cent of users engaging with AI-enabled features such as voice search, image-based search, chatbots, and AI filters. "Usage is highest among younger audiences, with 57 per cent of users aged 15-24 years and 52 per cent of those aged 25-44 years reporting AI usage in the past year," it added.

The report further revealed that short-video consumption has emerged as a key growth driver within this expanding user base. It noted that in 2025, 588 million (61 per cent) internet users consumed short-video content, with rural users marginally outnumbering urban users. Adoption is strongest among younger audiences, cementing their role as a key driver of digital engagement. In the statement, citing the report, IAMAI said that quick commerce is leading a fundamental shift in how Indians shop online, with social commerce close behind, as the e-commerce ecosystem expands beyond traditional online marketplaces. Among urban users, 230 million people (56 per cent of the urban active internet base) shopped online in the past year, with quick commerce and social commerce gaining prominence alongside established marketplaces, it added. IAMAI also noted that multi-device usage is on the rise, with India now having 193 million multi-device internet users, representing 20 per cent of all active internet users, up from 165 million in 2024. "Urban adoption stands at 31 per cent, while rural India is catching up at 12 per cent. Shared device usage continues to be a key enabler of digital access: 18 per cent of internet users go online through someone else's mobile device, and nearly 80 per cent of these users are based in rural areas," the report stated. It also revealed that despite



strong momentum, 38 per cent of India's population—about 579 million people—remains non-active internet users. "However, this proportion has been steadily declining year after year, signalling substantial headroom for the continued expansion of India's digital economy," it said. The 2025 edition of the Internet in India report is based on a sample of nearly 100,000 consumers across more than 400 towns and over 1,000 villages, it added.

Gold, silver surge on weaker dollar and geopolitical tensions

Mumbai: Gold and silver prices surged sharply on Monday due to a weaker US dollar and persistent geopolitical uncertainties.

MCX gold February futures jumped 1.31 per cent to Rs 1,57,484 per 10 grams around 10.45 am on an intraday basis. Meanwhile MCX silver March futures climbed 4.81 per cent to Rs 2,61,900 per kg.

On the MCX, silver prices, earlier in the day, had jumped as much as 6 per cent to its day's high of Rs 2,64,885 per kg before a round of profit booking. The US dollar touched its lowest level since February 4, making greenback-priced metals cheaper for overseas buyers.

Even as Iran's top diplomat called US-Iran nuclear talks a "good start" on Friday, Tehran has reiterated that the country would retain its right to enrich uranium. Experts anticipate that geopolitical tensions may persist for longer, continuing to drive investors to safe-haven assets. Market hopes of further rate cuts by the US Federal Reserve got stronger after San Francisco Fed President Mary Daly called for one or two more interest rate cuts to alleviate weakness in the labour market. US Fed rate cut hopes remain another supporting factor for gold and silver prices, analysts said. "Gold has support at Rs 1,54,000 and Rs 1,51,800 zones while resistance at Rs 1,57,700 and Rs 1,60,000. Silver has support at Rs 2,36,600 and Rs 2,44,000 levels while resistance at Rs 2,55,500 and Rs 2,62,600," an analyst said.

Adequate funding, effective governance and partnership with domestic industry offer a realistic solution to shrug off this dependence on foreign facilities and research data.

The budget has brought some cheer to India's research community, particularly for those involved in astronomy and space research, as it has earmarked ₹13,416.20 crore for the Department of Space for 2026-27. A large chunk of the allocation has been set aside for deep-space exploration and astrophysics, including to build two advanced telescope facilities: the 30-m National Large Optical-Infrared Telescope and the National Large Solar Telescope near Pangong Lake in Ladakh.

Also in focus is the COSMOS-2 planetarium in Amaravati, Andhra Pradesh, to be completed soon, and improving the control systems of the Himalayan Chandra Telescope in Hanle, Ladakh. Currently, only the U.S., China, Japan and the European Union prioritise astronomy research to a high degree and constantly invest large sums to upgrade their terrestrial and space telescopes. So, astronomers have said, the telescope allocations will improve space research capability and science outreach in India. Frontier research However, experts also raised concerns about a significant drop in expenditure, with the actual expense falling short of budgetary estimates. This underutilisation has in the past led to bottlenecks in the planning and executing major projects. "There were several proposed space missions which were finally not supported," Bhaswati Mookerjee, professor and chairperson of the Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics at the Tata Institute of Fundamental Research, Mumbai, said. Dr. Mookerjee added that although this budget "is an extremely positive step for astronomy in India," the importance of following it through couldn't be overstated: "The execution of big projects in India would still require some streamlining of resources with checks and balances." "Only a few large astronomical observatories are capable of frontier research and groundbreaking discoveries worldwide, which means researchers have to compete for observation time. And when funding agencies favour their own national researchers, international scientists' access becomes increasingly restricted, and Indians are no exception.

Relying on overseas facilities To make matters worse, an astrophysicist (who didn't wish to be identified) told this reporter that India's problem is compounded by the attitude of bureaucrats and administrators. "They are close-minded regarding concepts like buying fractional time on large telescopes or missions — measures that are not only essential to foster stronger international collaborations and keep us at the forefront of astronomy research, but also serve as a stop-gap arrangement till we have our own large telescopes," the astrophysicist said. For far too long has the country relied on overseas facilities for high-resolution data and specialised equipment to do space science, including collaborative projects such as radio, optical, and space-based observations. Acquiring strong domestic capabilities

Gujarat exchanges Letter of Intent with Starlink for high-speed internet connectivity

The Gujarat government exchanged a Letter of Intent (LoI) with Starlink for mutual cooperation in high-speed satellite-based internet connectivity in remote, border and underserved areas of the State. The LoI was exchanged with Satellite Communications Private Limited, a subsidiary of Elon Musk's SpaceX, at a ceremony in Gandhinagar in the presence of Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel and Deputy Chief Minister Harsh Sanghavi, an official release said. It took place between State Industries Commissioner P. Swaroop and Head of Starlink India Prabhakar Jayakumar.

The aim is to provide high-speed satellite-based internet connectivity in the State's remote, border, and underserved areas that currently have limited telecom infrastructure, the release said, adding it is part of the Digital Connectivity Mission and other strategic initiatives. "Under the pilot project of this LoI, it is planned to connect Common Service Centres (CSCs), e-Governance facilities, government schools, district disaster management control rooms, ports, and wildlife sanctuary regions. The project aims toward digital inclusion in tribal districts, including Aspirational Districts such as Narmada and Dahod," it said.

With strong connectivity for police outposts, disaster management centres, wildlife monitoring, and agricultural research centres, the implementation of this LoI will enhance security and stability while ensuring reliable digital service delivery, the release informed. "Under this initiative, smart



connectivity will be enabled in state schools for education, and healthcare and telemedicine services will be made easily and rapidly available at Primary Health Centres (PHCs). Moreover, joint training programs will be planned in the future for capacity building of various government agencies, departments, schools, and disaster response teams," it added. The LoI also covers strengthening connectivity in GIDC industrial parks, highway safety systems, maritime and port connectivity, and coastal police operations across the State. A Joint Working Group comprising representatives of the Gujarat government and Starlink will be formed to ensure effective implementation of this LoI, the release said.

Iran's FM Abbas Araghchi strikes hard line on U.S. talks, saying Tehran's power comes from saying 'no'

Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi on ruled out Tehran ever giving up uranium enrichment in its negotiations with Washington, insisting it will not be intimidated by the threat of war with the United States. The Minister, Abbas Araghchi, told a forum in Tehran attended by AFP, that Tehran had little trust in Washington and even doubted that the U.S. side was taking renewed negotiations seriously.

"Why do we insist so much on enrichment and refuse to give it up, even if a war is imposed on us? Because no one has the right to dictate our behaviour," Mr. Araghchi said. "Their military deployment in the region does not scare us," he said, referring to the arrival of an aircraft carrier, the USS Abraham Lincoln, in the Arabian Sea.

The United States and Iran reopened negotiations on Friday (February 6) in Oman for the first time since Israel's 12-day war with the Islamic republic in June of last year. Iran is seeking to have U.S. economic sanctions on the country lifted, in exchange for what Mr. Araghchi said at the forum could be "a series of confidence-building measures concerning the nuclear programme." "Western countries and Israel, thought to be the Middle East's only country with nuclear weapons, say Iran is seeking to acquire a nuclear bomb, which the Islamic republic denies." They fear our atomic bomb, while we are not looking for one. Our atomic bomb is the power to say 'no' to the great powers," Mr. Araghchi

said.

"Peace through strength" Mr. Araghchi's comments came after U.S. lead negotiators Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner visited the aircraft carrier on Saturday, signalling the persistent threat of U.S. military action against Iran. The U.S. military's Central Command (CENTCOM) said the two top officials visited the nuclear-powered vessel. In a social media post, Mr. Witkoff said the aircraft carrier and its strike group was "keeping us safe and upholding President Trump's message of peace through strength". The threat of war continues to hover over the negotiations, even as Mr. Trump called the talks "very good" and Iran's President Masoud Pezeshkian posted on social media that they "constitute a step forward". Following Friday's (February 6) first round in Oman, Mr. Trump signed an executive order calling for the "imposition of tariffs" on countries still doing business with Iran despite U.S. sanctions. The United States also announced new sanctions against numerous shipping entities and vessels, aimed at curbing Iran's oil exports. At the Tehran forum Sunday (February 8, 2026), Mr. Araghchi called into question the United States' commitment to negotiations. "The continuation of certain sanctions and military actions raise doubts about the seriousness and readiness of the other side to conduct genuine negotiations," he said.

Disruption hits chemicals, steel, aluminium, textile, breweries



have increased by 80% on a year-on-year basis," Joshi said.

Roughly 35% of globally traded sulphur originates from West Asia; any disruption tightens sulphuric acid, which then squeezes phosphoric acid, and ultimately hits Diammonium Phosphate (DAP) and Mono Ammonium Phosphate (MAP) fertiliser prices — right into the Kharif sowing window, Joshi said. "This is food-security critical, not just a commodity pricing issue," he said. One of India's largest aluminium producers has halted output of extruded aluminium, a value-added aluminium product, due to a gas shortage in the wake of supply disruptions.

The Aluminium Extrusion Manufacturers Association of India (ALEMA) has also urged the government for urgent relief measures as the industry is grappling with severe LPG and PNG shortages triggered by the escalating West Asia crisis. ALMA represents nearly 250 of India's 450 aluminium extrusion companies — with 90 per cent being MSMEs. According to the association, without intervention, the capital-intensive sector risks defaulting on working capital and term loans. The Brewers Association of India (BAI) said that the rising costs due to the war in West Asia may make beer supplies unviable in some states. The brewing industry in India is currently facing high cost and supply challenges due to the ongoing war and the resultant global energy crisis, BAI said.

"Just in the last 3 weeks, primary inputs have seen sharp inflation. Glass bottle prices have risen by approximately 20%, paper cartons have increased by almost 100%, and the cost of materials such as LDPE, BOPP and adhesives have gone up by 20–25% in prices. Freight and logistics costs have also risen by 10%. The rupee has fallen by almost 3% against the US dollar due to geopolitical tensions, adding to the cost of imports. The collective impact of these increases is estimated to be around 12–15% more in costs for brewers," the association said. Severe shortage of commercial LNG supply has put glass bottle manufacturers also under significant strain, and they too face partial or full shutdown of units. Supplies of glass and cans may be severely strained in the coming months, the association said, adding that the cost increases and inadequate packaging material supplies are likely to affect beer supplies in the upcoming summer season. A stainless steel manufacturer said that the challenge that they are facing is mainly with the seamless pipes and tubes division, where LPG is used. "Also the prices of the gas that we are still getting are also expensive, so the process cost has increased a bit in this period of time," the executive said, adding that they are not affected in the rolling and melting divisions, since they use electric furnaces for it. He said if the war and resulting supply chain disruptions persist, leading to material shortages, prices are likely to rise. "In the long term, prices will definitely increase," he said.

As the energy shock waves from the war in West Asia travels deeper, Indian manufacturers, ranging from steel, aluminium, textiles and even alcoholic beverages, are beginning to report operational disruptions on account of surging freight rates, stuck shipments, gas shortages and payment issues. Much of this originates, either directly or indirectly, from the trade disruption caused due to the closure of the Strait of Hormuz.

The Indian manufacturing sector is grappling with uncertainty due to cargo stuck at different stages of the supply chain, which could raise the cost of operations and even limit production hours. A Mumbai-headquartered leading textile brand told The Indian Express that they were facing a severe shortage of raw materials and were only left with 30 days of stock as the West Asia conflict had delayed their import cargo.

The company executive, who did not wish to be named, said that import consignment of their key raw materials, flax, which they import from Europe, especially Belgium and France, is stuck due to conflict in West Asia and closure of the Strait of Hormuz. "One of our consignments has been stuck up in Jebel Ali for the last 20 days. It reached there on February 28, and until today, we don't have any clue when that consignment will come to India. Another two to three consignments are on the way to the UAE. One is going to Al-Faqan, and another is going to Khalifa," the executive said. While Al-Faqan, located on the eastern side, is unlikely to pose any issues, the shipment heading to Khalifa would have to pass through the Strait of Hormuz and could therefore face disruptions, the executive said, adding that the company could run out of stock for its raw materials if they didn't get the consignments in transit in the next 10 days. Ajay Joshi, a chemical-sector analyst and founder of an eponymous advisory firm for chemical companies, said the West Asia conflict is not just an oil story; it is a raw-material shock that will travel through seventeen different chemical value chains before reaching the Indian consumer. "The industries most acutely at risk are agriculture, construction, and FMCG. For Indian farmers, the most dangerous chain is sulphur (& sulphuric acid). The prices

have increased by 80% on a year-on-year basis," Joshi said.

To further increase PNG adoption and reduce the pressure on LPG demand, the Petroleum and Natural Gas Regulatory Board (PNGRB) on Monday directed CGD entities to prioritise PNG connections for residential schools, colleges, hostels, community kitchens, and anganwadi kitchens, within five days where pipelines are available, Petroleum Ministry Joint Secretary Sujata Sharma said Tuesday. Over 7,500 domestic and commercial PNG connections were issued or activated on Monday alone.

Although natural gas supplies to India have also been hit due to the Strait of Hormuz's closure, the situation is not as concerning as in the case of LPG. The effective closure of the Strait of Hormuz has hit roughly 30% of India's natural gas supplies, as against 54% of the country's LPG flows. Also, in the most vulnerable segment of household consumers, India has a huge LPG consumer base with 33.3 crore domestic connections. Households with PNG connections are far fewer at about 1.5 crore. Sharma said that while the supply of LPG has been affected by the prevailing geopolitical situation, a large number of cargoes have been "lined up" to ensure continued availability of the fuel, but did not provide further details on the number of such cargoes and the LPG volumes they are carrying. India has been making efforts to source LPG from non-West Asia geographies, particularly North America. She added that the fact that commercial LPG allocation has increased from 20% to 50% of requirement, while domestic supplies are being maintained at pre-war levels, goes to show that the supply situation has been improving.

Govt plans to redirect 90 lakh tonne FCI broken rice to ethanol industry from next year: Food Sec

New Delhi: The Centre is set to approach the Cabinet with a proposal to reduce the allocation of broken rice in grains distributed under the public distribution system from 25 per cent to 10 per cent, a move that would free roughly 90 lakh tonne of broken rice annually for the ethanol sector, Food Secretary Sanjeev Chopra said on Tuesday. The move comes as global crude oil prices have jumped around 40 per cent in the past three weeks. Chopra said India's ethanol blending in petrol has already reached 20 per cent, up from just 1.5 per cent in 2013, saving the country over Rs 1.63 lakh crore in foreign exchange and cutting crude imports by 277 lakh metric tonne since 2014. The government is now looking beyond supply and focusing on getting more ethanol into the market, Chopra said, adding that raising the blending limit above 20 per cent, mixing ethanol with diesel, and promoting flex-fuel vehicles are all being actively considered, with decisions expected soon. Speaking at the All India Distillers Association (AIDA) conference here, Chopra said the broken rice proposal would fix a long-standing problem in 2023, a poor sugar harvest and fears over rice production had forced the government to restrict feedstock supply to distilleries, hurting the industry.

10 Indian wetlands for every bird lover's bucket list



India's wetlands are among the most vibrant bird habitats in the world, serving as critical stopovers for migratory species and year-round homes for resident birds. Spread across diverse ecosystems, from coastal lagoons to inland marshes, these wetlands attract birdwatchers eager to witness the spectacular avian diversity they support. Many are also recognised under the global Ramsar Convention on Wetlands for their ecological importance. Here are 10 wetlands in India that offer remarkable birdwatching experiences. One of India's most famous birding destinations, this wetland sanctuary in Bharatpur hosts over 350 species of birds. During winter, migratory birds from Central Asia and Siberia arrive here, including pelicans, cranes, and various duck species. Its network of marshes, woodlands, and grasslands makes it ideal for both amateur and serious birdwatchers.

2. Chilika Lake, Odisha

How to brew the tea?

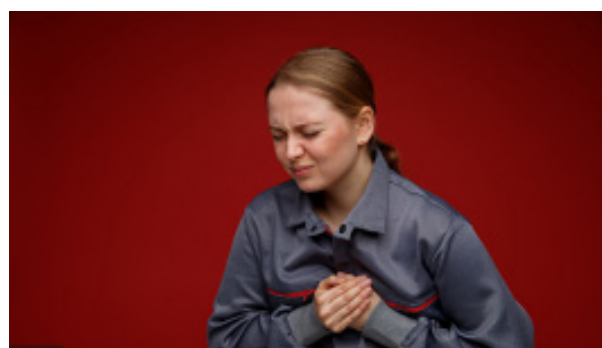

'My heart hurts when I lift my left arm. Is this normal; is it a heart disease?'



Have you ever lifted your left arm and felt a strange pain near your chest, sharp enough to make you pause and wonder if something is wrong with your heart? This worry recently surfaced on Quora, where a user asked whether pain in the "heart area" while raising the left arm could signal heart disease. The query read: "My heart hurts when I lift my left arm. Is this normal? Is it a heart disease?" It's a common concern, especially given how closely we associate left-sided pain with the heart. To better understand this, we spoke to Dr Rahul Gupta, Director — Cardiologist, Gleneagles Hospital, Parel, who says that in many cases, the cause is far less alarming than it seems.

When is it muscle pain—and when is it serious?

"Pain while lifting the left arm is often due to muscle strain, shoulder problems, or nerve compression in the neck," says Dr Gupta. This kind of pain is typically linked to movement—it may feel sharp and localised, and it may worsen when you raise your arm or press the area. He adds, "This type of pain is commonly related to muscle or joint issues, especially if it occurs with movement or specific positions." In such cases, the discomfort is usually not heart-related. However, the nature of the pain matters. If it feels more like pressure or heaviness rather than a sharp twinge, it could indicate something more serious. "If associated with heaviness, breathlessness, or sweating, it could indicate angina and needs urgent cardiac evaluation," he warns. Heart failure associated with heaviness, breathlessness, or sweating, it could indicate angina and needs urgent cardiac evaluation.

In some situations, it may even point to a myocardial infarction. "In some cases, it can be a sign of a myocardial infarction, especially if accompanied by chest pressure, sweating, or breathlessness," Dr Gupta explains. The difference often lies in how the pain behaves. Muscle-related

pain is easier to pinpoint and is triggered by movement. Heart-related pain, on the other hand, tends to feel deeper—like pressure or tightness—and may spread to the left arm, jaw, or back, often along with symptoms like nausea or breathlessness.

Dr Gupta emphasises that certain warning signs should never be ignored. "Severe chest pressure or tightness, pain spreading to the left arm, jaw, or back, along with breathlessness or sweating, needs immediate attention," he says. He also advises seeking urgent care if there is "dizziness, fainting, nausea, or sudden unexplained weakness." While not every pain near the heart signals a serious problem, understanding these differences is crucial. Your body may not always point to the heart—but when it does, recognising it early can be lifesaving.

Gold and silver prices tumble over 4 pc as West Asia tensions ease

Mumbai: Gold and silver prices witnessed a sharp decline on Tuesday, even as hopes of de-escalation in the West Asia conflict weighed on safe-haven demand after the US President announced a temporary pause on potential strikes targeting Iran's energy infrastructure.

On the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX), gold futures (April 2) fell as much as Rs 2,576 or around 2 per cent to hit an intra-day low of Rs 1,36,684 per 10 grams by 10:40 am. The yellow metal was last trading at Rs 1,37,100, down Rs 2,160 or 1.5 per cent.

Silver futures (May 5) also plunged 4.73 per cent, or Rs 10,667, to Rs 2,14,500 per kg during the session. In the global market, COMEX gold was trading at \$4,368.76, down 1.6 per cent, after slipping to an intraday low of \$4,340.

Meanwhile, COMEX silver declined around 4 per cent to \$66.56, after hitting an intraday low of \$66.16.

Precious metals came under pressure after the US President said Washington and Tehran had held "very good and productive conversations" over the past two days, adding that any military action on Iranian power plants and energy infrastructure would be deferred for five days, subject to further discussions.

Shelter facility and backup power generator: FIDE reveals measures at Candidates 2026 venue in case of 'extreme scenarios'

After India's Koneru Humpy withdrew from the Candidates tournament in Cyprus citing fears for her safety while the war in Iran raged on, FIDE, the global governing body of chess, posted a long document concerning the safety concerns of players. In it, FIDE mentioned that in the hypothetical scenario of an attack, the hotel where the players will be staying and playing at, has its own shelter facilities. "Cyprus is a safe country to travel. There is no emergency situation, and the country continues to operate normally," FIDE mentioned in the document. "As a precautionary measure, the hotel is equipped with its own shelter facilities. While such scenarios are purely theoretical, appropriate infrastructure is in place to ensure the safety of all participants and guests."

Talking about the risk of playing in the Candidates, Humpy had told The Indian Express: "At the end of the day, you should be in a position to play the game in a peaceful and good atmosphere. Not surrounded by bomb or missile sirens. I think that should not be the stage for a world-class tournament. You don't need to be desperate to hold events in such environments." While none of the other players have directly spoken about security concerns, American grandmaster Hikaru Nakamura said that there were power cut issues on the Mediterranean island. A: Absolutely. FIDE, in coordination with the Organising Committee, is closely monitoring the situation on an ongoing basis and remains in direct contact with the authorities of Cyprus to ensure preparedness and to mitigate any potential risks.

Q: What happens if the situation changes?

A: FIDE has contingency plans in place, as with any major international event. We remain ready to respond promptly to any changes in circumstances, with the safety and comfort of players, officials, media, and guests as the top priority.

CSK's new opening act: Ruturaj Gaikwad confirms he'll open with Sanju Samson in IPL 2026

Chennai Super Kings will open this season with captain Ruturaj Gaikwad and newcomer Sanju Samson. Gaikwad has revealed before the start of IPL 2026 season. Speaking on the sidelines of the IPL captains' day event, Gaikwad did not get drawn into conversations about the spot where franchise cornerstone MS Dhoni will play. The team also has in its ranks Ayush Mhatre, who recently led the India U19 team to the ICC U19 World Cup title. Mhatre was one of openers CSK tried last season, partnering with Devon Conway or Shaik Rasheed. The New Zealand

opener was released by CSK ahead of the IPL auctions, where he went unsold. Another New Zealand player, Rachin Ravindra, who also opened for CSK in a few games last season was released by the CSK team and ended up at KKR via the auction.

CSK have traditionally relied on a tried-and-tested formula for their opening pair: one foreign player and an Indian player at the top of the order. They have had stalwarts like Matthew Hayden, Faf du Plessis, Mike Hussey—besides Conway and Ravindra—as their openers in the past.

With CSK acquiring Samson in a trade from Rajasthan Royals (with Ravindra Jadeja and Sam Curran headed the other way), it was likely that the man who inspired India to the T20 World Cup with three match-winning knocks would open. But Gaikwad, who usually played in the No 3 position, has also opted to promote himself up the order. "There is pedigree with Gaikwad and Samson. Pedigree means you making quality runs and sustaining that for a period of time. We must not forget that. For me, I would love to see both of them go hammer and tongs at the opening slot," Ravichandran Ashwin had said on his YouTube channel late last year. "Both of them have different strengths. One is a caresser of the ball, while the other guy hits it hard so both of those qualities are there. So I will look at it in that fashion that I have two good openers."

Yuvraj, Virat Kohli, and MS Dhoni couldn't finish. The reason was a delivery. Lasith Malinga kept firing yorkers well outside off stump. Yuvraj kept toe-ending them. Then came Nuwan Kulasekara, who came closest to the modern avatar of that ball. His deliveries skimmed the wide line, especially after he took out Yuvraj with a wide full toss that sank into long-off's palms. He began ping-pong that line to Kohli and Dhoni. Both tried to reach out and drag it to the on-side. Neither could. When they sliced it, a deep backward point and third man ensured there was just a single in it.

The visuals stay with you. Kohli banging his bat into the turf. Dhoni slipping and falling trying to drag a ball from way outside off. Two of the finest finishers in the game defeated not by pace or swing, but by width. It's difficult to say if that was the birth of the well-outside-off yorker. But it was certainly its prime-time debut. A few years later, the delivery began rearing its head in the IPL. From 2021, it took centre stage. Dwayne Bravo made it his own, punctuating his bewilderingly dipping slower balls with these wide yorkers. The rest began to catch up. Bhuvneshwar Kumar had 13 runs to defend in a final over against AB de Villiers. With 12 needed from four and AB on strike, Bhuvneshwar kept firing them wide. The fourth ball, he came straighter — smashed for six. The other three were all wide, all three dot balls.

That same year, Andre Russell made it his signature ball, with a twist — he delivered it from around the stumps. In one memorable over, he tied down Kieron Pollard with it, then eventually got his man, edging after attempting a wild shot, having walked across his stumps. Russell had tried it in earlier seasons, but not with this consistency. The youngsters followed. Kartik Tyagi and Arshdeep Singh, who stopped a rampaging Sanju Samson that year with this delivery. "The field was set, and the plan was to feed him wide yorkers. If we could execute it all six balls," Arshdeep has kept his love affair with that ball since. The sweet irony arrived when Russell, who had almost made the wide yorker his own, found himself thwarted by it. He would keep flinging his bat, but often couldn't put them away. Sometimes a delivery finds its way back to the man who made it famous.

Every April, young cricketers from small towns across India enter the world of IPL — five-star hotels, foreign coaches, franchise millions, parties they would have never imagined. This series tells their stories, in their words, of what that crossing feels like. Pradeep Sangwan remembers the first time he saw his idol Adam Gilchrist in the flesh. It was 2008. He was eighteen. "Everything was a big surprise for us. We were just looking here and there. All were our idols. Jahan dekho sab bade players. It was a dream. It was a big surprise for that generation."

The Delhi left-arm pacer had been picked by Delhi Daredevils — chosen ahead of Virat Kohli. The two had come up together. At the VIKASURI Coaching Centre in West Delhi — the same corner of the capital that produced Kohli — Sangwan had been working on his bowling, knowing Sehwag's weakness for the cut shot and bowling at the crease accordingly. Sehwag noticed, had a word with the state selectors, and Sangwan was in the Ranji side. Seven wickets in two one-dayers was enough. On India's Under-19 tour of Sri Lanka, the two West Delhi boys had batted together — Sangwan contributing a half-century down the order to help India win. Same neighbourhood, same Under-19 squad, same draft. Then the IPL split them — Kohli to Bangalore, Sangwan to Delhi. Kohli himself would later recall the draft moment. "Delhi decided to go for him because they wanted their bowling strengthened and RCB picked me," he said on a podcast. "I remember the day when the draft was happening. The amount that we were picked for, when they revealed, we couldn't believe it. We went absolutely crazy."

The money arrived before anyone knew what to do with it. "Ranji had match fees of 10,000 then and suddenly we saw players getting 40-50 lakh. We didn't know what to do with so much money. Everyone had gone mad," Sangwan says. He and Kohli had just won the Under-19 World Cup together, collecting 16 lakh in prize money. "Virat landed and straight away went to book a Honda Civic. I said go home first but he said, nahi bhai, car lega pehle." Sangwan's team had Sehwag, Gambhir, Dilshan. Shikhar Dhawan sat on the bench. Mithun Manhas, now the BCCI president, didn't get a game for an entire year. "Scooter se seedha Mercedes mil gayi thi. Life changed."

Before a game against Chennai Super Kings, the room was talking about how to bowl to Matthew Hayden. Where

he hits. How far he hits. What he does when you pitch it up. What he does when you pitch it short. "Darr ka mahool tha ekdam." Sangwan's first encounter with Hayden taught him what the meetings couldn't. He bowled to Hayden and went for 13. The next over, Yo Mahesh went for 18 or 22. Sehwag called up Avishkar Salvi. In the first two balls, Hayden hit two sixes. Sangwan ran over. "Bhai, yorker daalo. Coaches have told us, whenever he walks down the track, bowl him full yorker." Salvi looked at him. "He has such a big thigh, I couldn't see the stump."

"I said, okay, tab jaise pheknai hai pheko." Sangwan was laughing on the field when Sehwag caught him. "Why are you laughing? Why are you biting your teeth?" Sehwag was furious. Sangwan told him after the game. Sehwag laughed a lot. Bowling to Hayden felt like facing the alien from Terminator. He would walk fifteen steps down the pitch. The quicker you bowled, the further he hit. Then came the mongoose bat.

"It was Umesh Yadav's debut match. Hayden came out with a small bat. We were thinking, yeh kya laya bhai? Bachpan mein thappi kehte tey. I felt he will get out." Hayden slammed Yadav straight. The ball came back to Sangwan at a crazy height. "He scored 70 and we were thinking, kahan run lagega is bat-sey." Even the umpires were afraid. Players like Hayden and Chris Gayle loved hitting straight. Sehwag once told the umpire: "Bowlers toh marengi hi, but tum bhi mar sakte ho." The umpire stood ten steps back.

But Sangwan could bowl. He had his own way of reading batsmen. In the same innings, he had dismissed Rohit Sharma — spotting a tendency to be late in shifting his weight forward from domestic cricket. A short extra-cover was placed. "Bhai TV pe he dekha tha and now I have to bowl to them. Pressure was at peak. Everyone was talking ke yeh yahan mara hai, wahan mara hai. But any bowler, who is a fan of someone, and suddenly that person stands in front of you — that is the moment you want to stay with your life. No feeling can express that." Sehwag brought Sangwan back in the eleventh over. He bowled Gilchrist with a full delivery. Not sensational. Just right. It did the trick.

Sehwag's captaincy was simple. When Sangwan looked to him for field changes or ideas, the answer was always the same. "Yeh mera kaam thodi hai, soch ke aaya kar." Bowl your plan. Set your field. Don't ask me. Sangwan played for Delhi Daredevils, KKR, Gujarat Lions, Gujarat Titans, and Mumbai Indians. Across those years and those franchises, he learned one thing that separated the players who lasted from the ones who didn't. "What defines a big player and an average player is showing and understanding of the game. Everyone has skill. But players don't need to get carried away seeing their idols. Players do feel low in confidence — but the ones who last find a way to overcome it." He had seen it from the first auction. An eighteen-year-old on a scooter one day, in a Mercedes the next. A teammate booking a Honda Civic before going home. A bowler who couldn't see the stumps past Hayden's thighs. The IPL gave them everything at once — the money, the stars, the pressure, the fear. What it didn't give them was time to understand any of it.

Senegal appeal to get Africa Cup of Nations title from Morocco at CAS with no timetable for verdict

Senegal's appeal to be reinstated as Africa Cup of Nations champion was registered Wednesday by sport's highest court, which set no timetable for a likely long process toward a verdict in a heated soccer controversy. The Senegal soccer federation is challenging a surprise ruling last week by the Confederation of African Football (CAF) to strip the title won in a chaotic final on the field in January and award it to host nation Morocco. An appeal to the Court of Arbitration for Sport in Switzerland was promised last week by the Senegalese government, which also called for an international investigation "into suspected corruption" within the African soccer body.

CAS said in a statement that the Senegal federation also asks for extra time to file an appeal brief because CAF has not yet given detailed written reasons to explain its verdict. "At this early stage of proceedings and considering the (Senegal federation) request to suspend deadlines, it is not possible to anticipate a procedural timeline and to indicate when a hearing will be scheduled," the court said. CAF appeal judges took the title from Senegal two months after the final in Rabat as punishment for a 15-minute walkoff by players to protest a penalty being awarded to Morocco in the last minute of regulation time. The referee restarted the game after the Senegal team returned, and the Morocco penalty was then saved. Senegal scored in extra time to



beat the host nation 1-0. The laws of soccer state the referee's decision on the field of play is final.

The CAF judges, however, cited a tournament rule that any team refusing to play "shall be eliminated for good from the current competition." An appeal to CAS can typically take several months to schedule a hearing then weeks or months more to announce a verdict. "We understand that teams and fans are eager to know the final decision," Matthieu Reeb, the CAS director general, said in a statement, "and we will ensure that arbitration proceedings are conducted as swiftly as possible, while respecting the right of all parties to a fair hearing."

Former England captains Atherton, Hussain & Boycott blast ECB over lack of Ashes accountability

The England Cricket Board (ECB) continues to find itself at the receiving end of criticism after handing a clean chit to head coach Brendon McCullum, following a disastrous Ashes series in which England lost 4-1 in emphatic fashion during the five-match Test tour of Australia last summer. ECB chief executive Richard Gould recently confirmed that the positions of captain Ben Stokes, managing director Rob Key, and McCullum are safe following a thorough review conducted by the board. Former England captain Michael Atherton expressed surprise at the decision. He believes fans will find it "extraordinary" that no jobs were lost for the "mistakes" made during the Ashes defeat. "From the perspective of people out there, they will find it extraordinary that there's been no accountability for the mistakes made in the Ashes," Atherton said while speaking to Key on the Sky Sports Cricket podcast. "It's not necessarily bloodlust people want, but I think they want genuine accountability. If there's no change to key personnel, they will argue, 'Well, there is no accountability.' One of the criticisms of the players over that two- or three-year period is that inadequate performance doesn't lead to accountability. It would seem that's the case at the top as well," he added. Another former England captain, Nasser Hussain,

was also displeased with the decision. He said: "You've talked about the learnings, but if I was an England fan sitting there, I would have gone, 'This is your job for before the Ashes, not two months after the Ashes.' Why are you learning now? Why weren't you doing these things? Why weren't all these things put in place? Have you been marking your own homework in the last few months?" McCullum faced stern scrutiny over his position after a disastrous Ashes campaign in Australia. McCullum's case was further undermined by reports of off-field incidents. Following the horrendous Ashes, the ECB launched a review process of the team. Earlier, former England captain and legendary batter Geoffrey Boycott had also criticised Gould and Key, questioning the process behind the conclusion that McCullum would remain in his role. "The worst pre-planned Ashes tour in my lifetime, and nobody is held to account or to blame? In the famous words of John McEnroe: 'You cannot be serious.' The review was done by Richard Gould, the England and Wales Cricket Board chief executive, who has never played county or Test match cricket, and he decided nobody is to blame." "What planet is he on? Is he oblivious to what the majority of former England players and cricket journalists are saying?"

"I want to do Saaranish 2 as an action actor. I spoke to Mahesh Bhatt a month ago. I told him Bhatt saab, 'I really want to do action because I am working on myself'. I do display my body at the risk of being laughed at. I feel very happy about it. I would want my character to save people via action. Like in Taken, so I want to do something like that," he said.

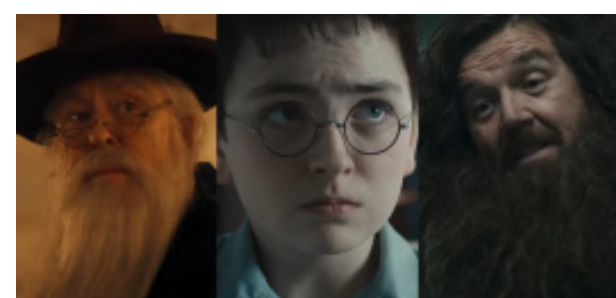
Anupam then recalled how he first started honouring his 'guru' Mahesh Bhatt in his early days and shared, "He gave me my first break so back then I would give him Rs 250 for every film. Now it's Rs 25,000. He says this is the result of inflation. It went from Rs 250 to Rs 500 to Rs 1000 to Rs 5000 and now is Rs 25,000. I just gave him an envelope last week. Now he just holds the envelope and he knows how much is in it. But I really like it. It's more of a ritual than anything else. It's a comedy." Anupam Kher had previously shared that when Mahesh Bhatt decided to recast him in Saaranish, and cast Sanjeev Kumar in his place, he "cursed" the director. In an earlier chat with ANI, he had shared that he had been rehearsing for his part for months



when he got to know, just days prior to the shoot, that he was going to be replaced by Sanjeev Kumar. This news broke Anupam, and he decided to leave the city of Mumbai, with all his belongings. But, before he left, he paid a visit to Mahesh Bhatt.

"I took the cab to his house, and I walked up the stairs. He praised me for taking the news sportingly, but I told him to look out of his window and see the car that was standing there. It had all my belongings, and I told him that before leaving, I wanted to tell him what a fraud he is... I wanted to make final climactic statement, and I told him that as a Brahmin man, I was cursing him," he recalled. Upon seeing his dedication, Bhatt changed his mind and decided to cast Anupam in this role.

Project Hail Mary gets only 9 IMAX shows amid Dhurandhar 2 wave; upset fans ask, 'What kind of greed is this?'



Dhurandhar 2's box office storm has come as a disappointment for some cinephiles, as it has left Ryan Gosling's space drama Project Hail Mary with barely any IMAX presence in India. The film's India release was pushed by a week due to Dhurandhar 2 occupying a majority of screens. Even after the delay, the situation hasn't improved much. Despite being shot specifically for IMAX, Project Hail Mary has secured nine IMAX shows across India till now, with most premium screens still dominated by Dhurandhar 2, which continues its strong theatrical run.

These IMAX shows are spread across key cities, Delhi-NCR, Gurgaon, Mumbai, Pune, and Kolkata. However, bookings are currently open only for the same day, with no availability for the coming days. Ticket prices for these shows range between Rs 500 and Rs 1000. Initially, by late Wednesday night, the film had no IMAX shows listed at all on major ticketing platforms. Some theatres in Kochi and Coimbatore briefly added IMAX screenings, only to remove them later without explanation. By Thursday morning, the number of IMAX shows rose to five and then nine, three in Mumbai, two in Pune, and one each in Kolkata, Delhi, Gurgaon, Noida.

Dhurandhar 2 limits IMAX shows for Project Hail Mary. The reason appears to be purely commercial. Dhurandhar 2 continues its blockbuster run, crossing the Rs 1,000 crore mark worldwide within just a week of its

release, making it the fastest Indian film to achieve the feat. The Aditya Dhar directorial collected Rs 47.7 crore in India on Wednesday taking its domestic total to Rs 744.58 crore, according to trade tracker Sacnilk. Globally, the film has reached Rs 1,006.5 crore. This has prompted exhibitors to prioritise the Hindi film over the Hollywood release. However, the irony hasn't gone unnoticed: a film designed for IMAX is largely unavailable in that format, while a non-IMAX film dominates those very screens. Directed by Phil Lord and Christopher Miller, Project Hail Mary is based on Andy Weir's bestselling novel and stars Ryan Gosling as Ryland Grace, a man who wakes up aboard a spacecraft with no memory of how he got there. The film has been widely praised for its immersive visuals, with many insisting that its true impact can only be felt on large-format screens. Fans have taken to social media to voice their disappointment. Many tagged Sony Pictures India, questioning the lack of IMAX access. One user wrote, "There is no IMAX release for #ProjectHailMary in India. The film is specifically Filmed for IMAX and yet it is not released in its original format. Shame on you PVR! Please take serious action against them bro @IMAX. We Indians deserve to enjoy the Imax version of PHM."

"Won't be watching in a theatre unless it's on IMAX. Sorry, the Indian theatre experience isn't worth it anymore," another user added. A promotional post by PVR Cinemas urging viewers to watch the film on the "biggest screen" drew criticism. "No IMAX screenings available for Project Hail Mary in Delhi, and still you post about it. This is so disappointing," a user commented. Another user wrote, "I'm bored of your failed tactics, release the IMAX tickets now!!" Not a single IMAX show for Project Hail Mary in Bangalore? Not a SINGLE SHOW? Ya'll deserve to go bankrupt. Go to hell," wrote an angry fan. Director Phil Lord on release being postponed in India. Earlier, talking about the film being pushed a week, director Phil Lord described it as a sign of Bollywood's expanding reach. "I don't need to tell you that often, when you look at the top 10 films in the United States, there would be a Bollywood film. Those movies play in American theatres. Most Americans go 'what's that', but there is a big audience for it," he told Hindustan Times. He added, "And it's growing every year. Indian films in America have begun to gain broad cultural relevance, starting with RR, that really spread out beyond just those seeking it out."

misrepresentation intended to provoke and create mischief," he added.

"Let me state this unequivocally: I hold the highest respect for the Sikh community, and every portrayal in the film has been handled with utmost sensitivity, dignity, and responsibility. Any attempt to suggest otherwise through any doctored content is malicious and dishonest. I urge audiences to rely only on official content and watch the film as it is intended, and not fall prey to AI-generated misinformation being circulated with ulterior motives. Such acts will be dealt with firmly," the official statement concluded.

Recently, a Mumbai-based Sikh organisation filed an FIR against Ranveer Singh and the makers of Dhurandhar 2 for allegedly hurting the religious sentiments of the community. The objection was raised after the group claimed that R Madhavan's character, Ajay Sanyal, recited verses from Guru Granth Sahib while smoking in the film.

R Madhavan's clarification. Other than Aditya, R. Madhavan had also shared a clarification on the same through a video message. He had said, "Recently, we came to know that some people were hurt because in one scene of the film, while reciting lines from Guru Gobind Singh ji's Dasam Granth, I was seen smoking a cigarette. I assure you, this is not correct—it is a misunderstanding. Before delivering those lines, Aditya Dhar, who is very mindful about such things, had clearly told me to put out the cigarette. There would be no smoke from my mouth, no smoke visible on screen, and no cigarette in my hand, because this is sacred and pure for us as well." He added, "I properly extinguished the cigarette. If you watch the scene carefully, you will see there is no smoke, no trace of it in the frame, and no sign of a cigarette till the end of the scene. We are aware that we should never hurt anyone's sentiments, even unknowingly."

After a complaint was filed by a Sikh community against the makers of Dhurandhar 2 for hurting religious sentiments, director Aditya Dhar has shared a note clarifying that the image in question is a fabricated AI-generated visual being circulated to "provoke and create mischief." He also warned of strict action against those responsible. The note Aditya shared read as, "I am deeply grateful & indebted for the overwhelming love that Dhurandhar The Revenge has received from audiences across the country and the world. However, it has come to my attention that certain individuals are circulating manipulated visuals by morphing officially released promotional material using artificial intelligence to create false and misleading narratives."

"One such fabricated image falsely depicts the character Hamza/Jaskirat smoking while wearing a turban. This is completely untrue and does not form part of the film or any official material released by us. It is a deliberate act of

After Oscars snub, Dharmendra to be honoured at International Film Festival Delhi; Hema Malini says she 'will be there to receive it'

After expressing her displeasure over the Oscars snubbing late star Dharmendra as they did not pay tribute to him at the ceremony, Hema Malini recently shared that her late husband will be honoured at Delhi's first International Film Festival Delhi (IFFD) 2026. Hema revealed that she will be receiving the award in honour of Dharmendra at the event, which began in Delhi on Wednesday.

Speaking to ANI, she said, "I would like to congratulate Rekha Gupta ji for organising the International Film Festival in Delhi. It is going to be there for 4-5 days. She has also invited many artists. Many artists will be honoured at the festival. They are also paying tribute to Dharam ji... So, I will be there to receive it."

The first International Film Festival Delhi kicked off on Wednesday with a grand opening ceremony at Bharat Mandapam. It was hosted by Arjun Kapoor and Nimrat Kaur and saw many Bollywood actors in attendance, including Vicky Kaushal, Sanya Malhotra, Siddhant Chaturvedi, Anupam Kher, and Lauren Gottlieb. The festival, which started on March 25, will end on March 31.

Earlier, Hema Malini had expressed her disappointment after Dharmendra wasn't included at the Oscars' In Memoriam segment. She told Subhash K Jha, "It is a shame, of course. A shame for them to have overlooked an actor who means so many things to so many people in



many parts of the world. Dharamji was known and recognised everywhere." She added, "He never got too many awards during his lifetime. Why should he care about the Oscars? Both of us were happy to be loved in our country. But awards always eluded him. Even I didn't get any award for my best performances in Lal Patthar and Meera." Dharmendra passed away on November 24, 2025, at the age of 89 in Mumbai. He died at home following a long period of illness.
