Misguided Missiles: CM Revanth Reddy Slams PM Modi Over Gold Ban

Hyderabad, May 10

Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy on Monday came down heavily on Prime Minister Narendra Modi for announcing austerity measures including asking for a self-imposed ban on buying gold for one year to overcome the impact of the US-Iran war, stating that it only reflected complete administrative failure at the Centre and chinks in the NDA’s foreign policy.

In an informal chat with mediapersons, the Chief Minister also took strong exception to Modi isolating Muslims and Maoists, which he said was unbecoming of a Prime Minister who was constitutionally obligated to work for welfare of all sections of society. Reacting to the Prime Minister taking a jab at Congress, describing it as MMC (Maoist Muslim League Congress) at his public meeting on Sunday, the Chief Minister wondered if Muslims and Maoists were not part of the diversified Indian society.

“If the BJP believes in annihilation of people differing with its ideology, the Congress, which knows the value of life, having lost its great leaders, has persuaded Maoists and

brought them into the mainstream,” Revanth Reddy pointed out. “It is unfortunate that we have a PM who shows discrimination against a section of citizens of the country,” he added.

On Modi’s charge that the Congress was denying a free hand to the security forces to deal with Maoists, Reddy said he would never agree if a free hand would mean killing Maoists in encounters. Successive Congress governments had formulated policies like land reforms, free housing for the poor, minimum support price, employment guarantee, as part of addressing the concerns raised by Naxalites in pursuit of their ideology which was the uplift of the poor.

Revanth Reddy said because of persuasion of the Telangana government, 818 Maoists, including 22 top leaders, had surrendered along with sophisticated weapons including 58 AK47s rifles, SLRs and rocket launchers. The Prime Minister ought to have appreciated Telangana for achieving something no other state could, he said and reiterated his appeal to former Maoist former general secretary Ganapathi to surrender.

Vijay Calls On Political Leaders In The State

CHENNAI, May 11

Ushering in a refreshingly healthy political culture in the State, newly appointed Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay called on a wide range of senior political leaders, including former Chief Minister M K Stalin, by driving down to their homes where his gesture was reciprocated with a warm welcome and bonhomie by the political rivals and their families.

The Chief Minister’s motorcade started traversing the roads of Chennai after the completion of the swearing in of all the 234 elected MLAs of new Assembly, which Vijay witnessed by sitting through the entire proceedings in the House, before going from one house to another.

Among the top lead-

ers Vijay visited and sought their blessings were Stalin, where he was welcomed by former Deputy Chief Minister Udhayanidhi Stalin, MDMK founder Vaiko, Naam Tamilar Katchi chief coordinator Seeman and PMK leader Anbumani Ramadoss.

The ‘courtesy calls’ made by the new Chief Minister to his political rivals actually began in the Assembly in the morning as he exchanged pleasantries with former chief ministers Edappadi K Palaniswami and O Panneerselvam.

Stalin said that he gave his wishes and some advice to Vijay who had called on him out of political decency. Shawls were exchanged during the meeting at Stalin’s Alwarpet residence, where



Referring to the impending crisis the country would face in the days to come, the Chief Minister reminded that Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi had cautioned the Modi administration against the adverse impact months ago. The arrogance of the present dispensation did not allow broad consultation and availing of expertise of Congress leaders who had earlier dealt with international crisis, Revanth Reddy said. “They (Modi

and ministers) are misguided missiles,” Reddy said.

Asked how the BJP could win elections if the allegations of mishandling of crises were true, Revanth Reddy said misuse of poll machinery was reflected in the recent deletion of lakhs of voters in West Bengal, a lethal weapon that the BJP puts to use. “We could win in the South because the Congress resists such coercive steps,” Revanth Reddy said.

Gadwal Vijay Laxmi Appointed Chairperson of Telangana Women’s Commission

Hyderrabad, May 11

: The Telangana government has appointed former GHMC Mayor Gadwal Vijay Laxmi as the Chairperson of the Telangana Women’s Commission, in a key step aimed at strengthening the institutional framework for the protection of women’s rights in the state.

The appointment was announced through an official order issued on May 11, 2026, by Chief Secretary K. Ramakrishna Rao. Gadwal Vijay Laxmi, who previously served as the Mayor of the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC), will now head the Commission for a five-year term from the date of assuming office.

Along with the Chair-

person, the government has also nominated six members to the Commission under the provisions of the Telangana Women’s Commission Act, 1998. The newly appointed members are Kasaju Sankaramma, Chityala Swetha, Shashikala Yadava Reddy, Sada Laxmi, N. Radha Bai, and Ujma Ashai Shakira.

The appointments were made under Section 5 of the Telangana Women’s Commission Act, 1998. The Commission is entrusted with addressing issues related to women’s welfare and rights, including investigating unfair practices against women, examining complaints involving deprivation of rights, and recommending legislative or policy measures to the state govern-

ment.

The appointment of Gadwal Vijay Laxmi is being viewed as a significant administrative move by the state government. With experience in public administration, law, and journalism, she is expected to bring both political and governance expertise to the role. The move also fills a long-pending leadership vacancy in the Commission, a demand repeatedly raised by women’s rights activists amid growing concerns over women’s safety and gender equality.

The Department for Women, Children, Disabled and Senior Citizens is expected to release detailed terms and conditions related to the appointments in the coming days.

Petrol, Diesel Price Hike Soon? PM’s Fuel Warning Sparks Speculation

New Delhi, May 11

With Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s call for careful use of fuels like petrol, diesel and gas in the country, speculations are rife that petrol and diesel prices may go up further anytime now. As the inter-ministerial discussions are going on in this matter, the government is weighing all options to take a call at the right time, according to the sources.

The buzz of price hike erupted as Modi’s on Sunday appealed to citizens to reduce energy consumption, urging people to use fuels “with great restraint” and suggested measures such as using public transport, carpooling and reviving work-from-home practices to reduce fuel consumption amid the ongoing West Asia conflict. However, the prices of petrol and diesel in Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata, Chennai, Hyderabad, Bangalore and other cities remained unchanged on Monday.

The sources, however, said that state-run fuel retailers may raise petrol and diesel prices in the coming days to offset mounting losses. “The discussions between the finance and petroleum ministries and oil marketing companies (OMCs) are going on a daily basis and

weighing all options about the fuel price hike. The timing and extent of the hike will depend on global crude trends and the government’s approach to balancing fiscal pressures and energy pricing,” the sources said.

As per the sources, fuel prices are expected to witness a hike soon across India as state-owned OMCs have incurred losses of more than Rs 1 lakh crore over the past 10 weeks for shielding consumers from soaring global fuel prices due to the Iran war. “Besides, there is a fear of a surge in the import bill as the global crude prices breached the \$104-per-barrel mark after US President Donald Trump’s response to Iran’s latest proposal, which may trigger the hike of fuel prices in India as well,” the sources said.

“State-owned oil retailers have already informed the government about their loss due to supply disruption following the ongoing Gulf war and anticipate a small rise in fuel prices soon from the central government to offset significant daily losses. So the hike in fuel prices remains inevitable now as the government does not want to soar the import bill cost,” the sources said without giving how much hike

in fuel prices.

India imports over 85 per cent of its crude oil requirements, exceeding 5 million barrels per day. As per the latest government data, India’s crude oil import bill for the financial year 2025-26 (FY26) reached \$134.7 billion, accounting for 17.4 per cent of the country’s total import bill, driven by high global prices and demand.

According to the sources, major OMCs like Indian Oil Corporation (IOC), Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL) and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd (HPCL) are together incurring under-recoveries of Rs 1,600-1,700 crore every day by selling petrol, diesel and cooking gas LPG below cost. “The cumulative under-recovery over the past 10 weeks of conflict in West Asia is estimated to be over Rs 1 lakh crore,” the sources said.

Despite a nearly 50 per cent rise in crude oil prices during the period (Gulf war), petrol and diesel prices have remained unchanged at two-year-old levels of about on average of Rs 94-95 per litre and Rs 87.67 per litre, respectively. But LPG prices, however, were raised by Rs 60 per cylinder in March, but are still below actual cost.

Harish Rao seeks CVC probe into demolition of Kakatiya-era temple

Warangal: BRS deputy floor leader T Harish Rao accused the Congress government of demolishing the historic Shiva temple in Ashok Nagar village of Warangal district in search of hidden treasure under the pretext of school construction. He demanded immediate registration of an FIR, restoration of the temple, and an in-depth investigation by the Central Vigilance Commission (CVC).

Harish Rao visited the ruins of the 800-year-old Kakatiya-era Shiva temple in Ashok Nagar village on Monday and performed special prayers at the demolished site along with local residents. Former Ministers Errabelli Dayakar Rao, former MLAs Peddi Sudarshan Reddy, Shankar Naik, Vinay

Bhaskar, Aroori Ramesh, and former Corporation Chairman Errolla Srinivas accompanied him.

Speaking to the media, Harish Rao alleged that the temple’s sanctum sanctorum, which was built by Kakatiya ruler Ganapati



Deva, was razed between midnight and 1 am. A pit measuring 24 feet deep was dug beneath it under the cover of darkness. “If this were for school construction, why was it done in the dead of night?” he asked, holding Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy re-

sponsible for the entire episode.

He said the district Archaeology Department officer filed a written complaint with the Collector on May 7, stating that the excavation was carried out in search of hidden treasure. Despite the complaint, no FIR was registered, no machinery was seized, and no action was taken. “This points to the involvement of top functionaries in the State government,” he added.

The former Minister questioned how land recorded as endowment land in the Dharani portal during the BRS regime was secretly reclassified as government land in the Bhu Bharati portal after the Congress came to power. He

also questioned why a school originally sanctioned at another location in the same constituency as per the GO was shifted to a site with a standing temple when sufficient alternative land was available nearby.

“A school can be built near a temple. But why demolish the temple itself?” he asked.

Harish Rao demanded immediate registration of an FIR, arrest of those responsible, seizure of machinery, and handover of the site to the Archaeology Department under the 1958 Act, which covers structures over 100 years old. He announced that the BRS would file complaints with the Central Vigilance Commission and State Vigilance Department for an in-depth probe.

The BRSLP deputy leader also targeted alleged large-scale financial irregularities in tenders for 76 Integrated Schools across the State. He alleged that all contracts were awarded at excess rates ranging between 4.86 per cent and 4.99 per cent above the estimated cost, and not a single tender went into the negative. He further alleged that Rs 494 crore of public money was siphoned off through inflated tenders. A retired official was appointed as Chief Engineer to facilitate the process, he claimed.

Responding to Revanth Reddy’s claim that the winning contractors were linked to the BRS, Harish Rao challenged the Chief Minister to cancel the tenders immediately. “I am the one demanding cancel-

Gubernatorial actions under scanner

While the curtains have finally come down on the uncertainty over government formation in Tamil Nadu, providing much relief to the people of the State, the suspenseful drama has brought into focus the questionable role of Governor Rajendra Vishwanath Arleka in the entire episode. There was an unreasonable delay on his part in inviting the leader of the Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK), Joseph Vijay—a popular film star who created history by dismantling the five-decade-long duopoly of the Dravidian parties—to form the government. The TVK emerged as the single largest party in the elections, bagging 108 seats in the 234-member Assembly, but fell ten short of the magic figure required to form the government. The Governor should have, without any hesitation, invited Vijay to form the government and prove the majority on the floor of the House at a later date. The constitutional position in the event of a hung verdict is very clear. Whether the government enjoys the support of the legislature should be decided on the floor of the Assembly, not in the Lok Bhavan. However, the Governor chose to insist on the numbers required to provide a stable government, triggering avoidable delay and unnecessary speculation. The fact that Vijay and his party leaders were made to run to the Lok Bhavan four times in the last few days to meet the Governor to stake claim to form the government shows an appalling lack of respect for constitutional propriety and procedures.

In the end, it turned out that the test of majority was virtually taken in the precincts of Lok Bhavan as Vijay was accompanied by representatives of the supporting parties during his fourth meeting with the Governor, where he handed over their letters of support. :

PM's Remarks Contrary to Federal Spirit - MLA K.R.Nagaraju



“Vardhannapet / Warangal, May 11 (Indian Chronicle) : Vardhannapet MLA K. R. Nagaraju stated that central funds do not belong to any political party and must be distributed fairly in accordance with constitutional norms. He said that holding public office is a supreme constitutional responsibility that requires treating all citizens equally, and that every word spoken by a person in such a position must reflect national unity, federal principles, and democratic values. “Referring to the recent visit of Narendra Modi to Hyderabad, Nagaraju said the public was left wondering whether the visit was official or political in nature. He expressed surprise at the Prime Minister's participation in the inauguration of a private hospital, his city tour, and the tone of his subsequent public address. He criticized the speech as lacking the dignity, balance, and responsibility expected of a Prime Minister. “Nagaraju further remarked that the comments made in the public meeting, directed at the Telangana Chief Minister, were against the spirit of federalism. He said suggestions that Telangana should align with the Centre and seek cooperation for funds “to develop like Gujarat” were inappropriate. “He emphasized that every state in In-

dia is a constitutionally empowered entity with equal rights, and that central funds are not the property of any political party. He said allocations must be made fairly based on objective criteria such as population, revenue sources, backwardness, and tax contribution. Favoring one state while discriminating against others, he noted, goes against the essence of democracy. He added that the Prime Minister, as the leader of the nation, must rise above political bias and act in a manner that safeguards national integrity. “He also clarified that funds allocated to states are derived from taxpayers' money and do not belong to any organization or individual group. “Citing history, Nagaraju concluded that leaders who acted with arrogance have faded into obscurity, and that in a democracy, the people's verdict is ultimate.

Fire breaks out at residential flat in Jeedimetla

Hyderabad: Fire broke out at a flat in a building at Gajularamaram in Jeedimetla on Monday evening. No casualties were reported in the incident.

Congress seeks measures to streamline paddy procurement

Medipalli Sathyam raises farmers' grievances with Collector.



KARIMNAGAR May 11 (Correspondent): Choppadandi MLA and Karimnagar District Congress Committee president Dr. Medipalli Sathyam on Monday warned that farmers would not accept the practice of 43-kg weightment during paddy procurement and alleged that some rice millers were harassing farmers. Addressing the media after meeting the District Collector during the Prajavani programme at the Collectorate, Mr. Sathyam said the Congress government, under the leadership of Chief Minister Revanth Reddy, had prioritised farmers' welfare since assuming office.

He alleged that during the previous BRS regime, farm-

ers were subjected to irregular weighment practices and deductions during procurement. In contrast, he said, the present government had ensured procurement without deductions or exploitation over the last two years.

Mr. Sathyam attributed the delay in lifting paddy from procurement centres to a shortage of lorries caused by the GPS-based transport policy introduced by the Centre. The MLA demanded the appointment of special officers at every procurement centre and rice mill to monitor operations and address farmers' grievances. Alleging that certain rice millers were creating hurdles despite officials working efficiently, he warned that he was prepared to join farmers in staging dharnas at procurement centres if harassment continued. He said the Collector had assured that a meeting with rice millers would be convened shortly and expressed hope that procurement operations would improve from Tuesday onwards.

Sudarshan Reddy has directed officials to speed up the process of mapping the latest electoral rolls with the 2002 Special Intensive Revision (SIR) voter list as part of the ongoing SIR exercise.“On Monday, the CEO conducted a video conference from Hyderabad with district collectors and concerned officials across the state to review the progress of SIR mapping. Khammam District Collector Divakar T.S. and Additional Collector (Local Bodies) Dr. P. Srija participated in the meeting from the district collectorate.“Speaking on the occasion, Sudarshan Reddy instructed officials to ensure that at least 90 percent of the mapping process is completed in all Assembly constituencies across the state within the next 15 days.“He directed District Election Officers to motivate their teams and accelerate the mapping process. He clarified that the role of political party representatives in the mapping exercise should be limited only to identifying houses and individuals.“The CEO also instructed officials to identify and appoint the required number of data entry operators from all available resources for the SIR process. He stated that once the SIR process begins, daily reviews will be conducted on the distribution and collection of forms.“Officials were asked to take steps to ensure that people are aware of their respective Booth Level Officers (BLOs) and to make sure that no genuine voter loses their voting rights during the process.“To improve the pace of mapping, he suggested conducting



review meetings with political parties every Wednesday.“During the video conference, District Collector Divakar T.S. informed the CEO about the progress of the SIR mapping process in Khammam district. Withdraw mandatory digital birth certificates: Teachers’ front to PSEB

The Punjab School Education Board’s (PSEB) decision to make digital birth certificates mandatory for student registration from the academic session 2026-27, has drawn sharp criticism from the Democratic Teachers’ Front (DTF), which termed the move “unreasonable” and demanded the withdrawal of the same. The education board has launched an online admission portal for Classes VIII, IX, X, XI and XII, requiring schools to complete registration through a digital admission-cum-withdrawal register. Student details including admission number and date must be entered online based on handwritten records. The digitally prepared register must be e-signed and submitted before the prescribed deadline. Entries will not be accepted after the closing date. The teachers’ body state president Vikramdev Singh,

general secretary Mahinder Kauriyanwali and finance secretary Ashwani Awasthi said as per the Board’s instructions, students born in Punjab must provide a “digitalised form” of their birth certificates issued through service centres, with automatic online verification. However, for the students born outside Punjab, certificates will be verified by school heads at their own level before entry into the portal. Calling the provision discriminatory, the leaders of teachers’ front said, “Imposing the condition of a digital birth certificate only on Punjab residents is unjustified. It will render previously issued manual birth certificates ineffective and force parents to run from pillar to post at service centres for digitisation.”

They also said under the Right to Education (RTE) framework, schools are allowed to admit students on the basis of alternative documents if birth proof is unavailable. “Making digital birth certificates mandatory contradicts this flexibility and will create avoidable difficulties for school heads and parents,” they said. The teachers’ body also questioned the need to seek digital birth certificates from students already registered with the Board in Class VIII when they move to higher classes. “This requirement is completely unwarranted.” The Democratic Teachers’ Front demanded that the PSEB continue with the existing system, allowing school heads to verify documents and record date of birth accordingly. They demanded the board to withdraw what it called the “unjustified condition” of mandatory digital birth certificates.

From mountain chill to made-in-India innovation: Startup ‘prints’ warmth into lightweight jackets

Yash Goliya enjoyed travelling but felt weighed down by the thick jackets he had to carry to some of Europe’s scenic and coldest mountains. Regular winter jackets could not be used in any other season. “That’s what made me think that we should have some clothing that we can wear in all seasons. We began to apply our printed technology methods (in which electronics are not assembled from components but deposited like ink on any substrate) to make heated jackets,” says Goliya. There were heated jackets that used stitched conductive thread or bulky carbon fibre, but Goliya discovered that printing conductive ink onto thermoplastic polyurethane produced lighter, minimally stiff jackets that allowed for complex circuitry.

Mumbai-based Goliya, whose startup journey has been honed at Venture Center in Pune, is the founder of Suryudey Plastic Electronics Pvt Ltd, which “treats electronics the way a printer treats ink, depositing it directly onto any surface and in any shape”. One of the company’s technologies is printed heaters, or “ultra-thin resistive heaters that are screen-printed using silver-carbon conductive inks”. The jackets, which will be launched before winter, are a part of the heated wearables segment. Suryudey has made vests, T-shirts and gloves. In its medical devices section, the company has built continuous health monitoring devices featuring printed electrodes and heating and sensing elements on biocompatible substrates. “The printed sensors are practically embedded in the fabric surface, making them comfortable for extended wear,” says Goliya. An attractive section is connected textiles, in which “printed antennas on fabric-compatible substrates enable NFC, Bluetooth, and RFID connectivity directly from the garment”. The tech can be used in industrial heating, defence, automotive and aerospace. “Think of an electronic item, and you picture a hard device in which different parts are firmly soldered or screwed on. We asked ourselves, ‘What if electronics were not rigid?’ The conventional method of fixing electronic parts onto stiff boards is great when building laptops. It would not work for a jacket, a curved medical sensor, or an antenna



that needs to be transparent and conformal,” says Goliya.

After studying electronics and telecommunication at Sardar Patel Institute of Technology in Mumbai, Goliya went to the Technical University of Munich, Germany, to study communication engineering and learnt about printed electronics. “It was like a regular inkjet printer, but one could replace the ink with functional inks and actually print electronics. I thought that was quite revolutionary,” he says. India has a number of large companies making membrane switches for control panels but very few startups and companies working on innovative printed electronic solutions. Suryudey buys the inks, but the entire manufacturing process is in-house. It has applied for a utility patent. A challenge for the company has come in the form of skyrocketing silver prices. Silver is an essential raw material, so Suryudey has responded by redesigning its heated jackets and other products to use as little silver as possible and alternatives, such as copper. “Earlier, we used to get our controller PCBs (printed circuit boards) from China. Now, we are making it and the entire product in-house to have more control and get around issues of freight being disrupted,” he says. Once the jackets are launched and the company gains more traction, Goliya plans to raise funds for expansion and to create more products. After that, maybe he will take a holiday back to the cool slopes without a heavy winter jacket.

‘If Bengal wanted BJP ...’: After TMC’s poll debacle, Mahua Moitra says party respects people’s mandate

If Bengal wanted BJP then Bengal has got BJP. We respect that,” she wrote in a post on X, adding that the party put up a good fight against “unimaginable odds” on an “uneven pitch”. The will of the people is supreme. If Bengal

wanted BJP then Bengal has got BJP. We respect that. We fought the good fight against unimaginable odds on an uneven pitch and for that I am proud of my leader & my party. We will continue to stand & fight for a secular country where...for that I am proud of my leader & my party. We will continue to stand & fight for a secular country where the constitution, not brute majoritarianism, is the last word,” she said.

As the ruling party lost to the BJP on Monday, TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee termed it an “immoral” victory, accusing the saffron brigade of “looting” over 100 seats. Out of the 293 Assembly seats, for which the counting was held on Monday, the BJP won 207 seats, while the TMC could secure only 80. As the Trinamool Congress (TMC) trailed behind the BJP throughout the day in West Bengal, the final nail came as the day ended — party chief and outgoing Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee lost to the BJP’s Suwendu Adhikari by over 15,000 votes in Bhabanipur. Speaking to reporters outside the counting centre, Banerjee said: “BJP looted more than 100 seats. The Election Commission is the BJP’s commission,” she said, adding that she had complained to the chief electoral officer, but no action was taken.

From earning Rs 4,000 as a house help to the Bengal Assembly: Meet BJP MLA Kalita Majhi

Kalita Majhi’s victory stands out as one of the highlights of the BJP’s sweeping win in West Bengal. A domestic help, Kalita, got a second chance when the BJP named her as its candidate in Ausgram in the state’s Purba Bardhaman district. The gamble paid off on Monday when the 37-year-old defeated Trinamool Congress (TMC) candidate Shyama Prasanna Lohar by 12,535 votes. “I am very happy, and I am grateful that Prime Minister Narendra Modi kept faith in me. Today, I can gift him this win,” Kalita said, speaking to The Indian Express over the phone. “My main focus will be to work for the development of the backward classes, and to ensure that proper roads and drinking water reach everyone’s homes. I will also work for the development of the youth and the safety and security of women,” she added. Kalita, who used to work as a domestic help in two houses and earn Rs 4,000 a month, is a resident of Majhpukur Par in Ward No 3 of Guskara Municipality. She stays with her husband, Subrata Majhi, a plumber, and her son, who has appeared for his Class 12 exams. In active politics for more than 10 years now, Kalita’s life changed

when the BJP gave her a ticket to contest the 2021 Assembly elections from Ausgram, which is a part of the Bolpur Lok Sabha constituency and a Scheduled Caste reserved seat. In 2021, TMC candidate Abhedananda Thander won the Ausgram seat with 1,00,392 votes. Kalita came second with 88,577 votes. This time around, Kalita secured 1,07,692 votes. Kalita said that after her name was announced in the first list of BJP candidates, she took a month off from work to focus on campaigning. “The families in the homes where I have worked for so many years are very happy. They blessed me. They always stood by me whenever I needed them; now, they are very happy for me,” she said. Being a domestic help has helped her understand the basic issues of the common man and the sufferings of the poor in her constituency, she said, adding that her focus is to build a hospital to help people in her village, who have to travel to the main Burdwan town to get medical facilities. From encouraging the use of solar panels to generate electricity and infrastructure development to generating employment opportunities, Kalita listed a slew of priorities.

‘Aiming to return with trophy’: After stellar WPL, Chandigarh’s Nandni sets sight on T20 World Cup



As Chandigarh pacer Nandni Sharma reflected on her journey to the selection for the T20 Women’s World Cup team, she showered praises on Union Territory Cricket Association’s (UTCA) for ensuring her development as a pacer and backing her potential. The 24-year-old has also been selected for the one-off Test against England at Lord’s after the World Cup. “I got chances in UTCA and the full backing from the UTCA management including former president Sanjay Tandon as well the coaches and staff. All these performances for Chandigarh helped me to be picked up by Delhi Capitals in the Women’s Premier League (WPL) auction and now selected for the T20 World Cup team as well as for the solitary Test against England. It still feels like a dream,” Sharma said after a UTCA’s felicitation ceremony held at the Sector 16 Stadium on Monday morning.

“I will aim to give my best for the Indian team in the T20 World Cup and hopefully we will return with the

trophy.” The Delhi Capitals pacer had become the second Indian player to take a WPL hat-trick and the first uncapped Indian player to take a five-four in a match against Gujarat Titans in the WPL this year. She finished the tournament with a total of 17 wickets and was the joint highest wicket-taker of the tournament along with Titans’ Sophie Devine.

On Monday, the young pacer was accompanied by her parents Shyam Sundar Sharma and Seema Sharma and siblings Akash Vats and Prerna Sharma. With her father being a spare parts shop owner in the Industrial Area, young Nandni started her cricketing journey at the age of 10 with then Sacred Heart Convent School student before joining the LIC Academy in Sector 26. She initially played for Punjab junior team and made the switch to UTCA after it got affiliation with BCCI. “Her father and brothers have also played cricket. She was pretty adamant at a very young age that she will play cricket and we all supported her dream. She dreamt of playing for Indian one day and this dream will soon be reality for her. It’s all due to her hard work and passion,” her proud mother Seema shared.

UTCA’s Founder-President and Governing Council Member of the WPL, Sanjay Tandon also lauded her achievements. “When Nandni was picked up by Delhi Capitals, it was a proud moment for UTCA. She also became the highest wicket-taker in WPL and was the emerging player of the season. It was a huge motivation for young women cricketers of Chandigarh too,” Tandon said. “As she is set to play for India in the T20 Women’s World Cup, we wish her all the best. UTCA will also start a Chandigarh Women’s Premier League soon and the process of it has already started,” Tandon concluded.

Hours after BJP’s win, TMC alleges arson and attacks across Bengal: ‘Has exposed its true face’

Tensions flared in parts of West Bengal Tuesday as the Trinamool Congress alleged widespread attacks on its offices and workers following the BJP’s win in the Assembly elections, even as the saffron party appealed for calm and denied involvement. According to TMC sources, party offices in areas including Tollygunge, Kasba, Baruipur, Kamarhati and Baranagar, as well as districts such as Howrah and Berhampore, were vandalised.

In Belegghata, a local party office was attacked and block president Pabitra Biswas was allegedly assaulted, while the office of councillor Sushanta Ghosh was also damaged. In the Bijoygarh–Netajinagar area, the election office of former minister Aroop Biswas was ransacked, with visuals showing people kicking broken hoardings. In Jamuria and Siliguri, TMC offices were reportedly set on fire. The party further claimed that its Udaynarayanpur candidate, Samir Panja, was assaulted, and that candidates, including Raj Chakraborty and Trinankur Bhattacharya, were manhandled while leaving counting centres, requiring CAPF escort. Manikta candidate Shreya Pande also alleged that her election agent was attacked. The TMC, in a post on social media, accused the BJP of orchestrating the violence. “The BJP has exposed its true face the moment it came to power. In Jalpaiguri Ward 14, BJP-backed miscreants have unleashed vandalism at our Trinamool Congress party office. This destruction and deliberate attempt to create unrest is the real face of the BJP,” it added. The BJP, however, rejected the allegations, with leader Rahul Sinha suggesting the incidents could be the result of internal rivalries within the TMC. He added that the situation was not comparable to the violence during the 2021 West Bengal Assembly elections and that the police and central forces are now taking prompt action. Amid the volatile situation, the BJP directed its workers to avoid provocation, refrain from celebrations near TMC offices, and maintain peace.

On its official X handle, the BJP said, “Yesterday



marked a moment of freedom for West Bengal—freedom from corruption, scams, political violence, appeasement politics, and injustice. The voice of the people is clear. This decisive mandate stands for development, dignity, and justice. As citizens of West Bengal, it is now our collective responsibility to ensure the state moves forward on a path of progress, leading once again in industry, literature, cinema, and employment, and becoming truly free from political violence.” “We appeal to all political stakeholders across parties to refrain from any form of violence or retaliation. Let us use our energies to build and strengthen our state. Let us work together to shape the West Bengal our forefathers envisioned: a land of freedom, peace, and opportunity for all,” it said. The Election Commission of India (ECI) sought reports from local authorities and warned of strict action against those involved in violence. While no major injuries have been reported, ECI also urged citizens and political workers to use helplines if they feel threatened. In a related development, TMC leader Safiuzzaman Sheikh, alias Habib, was arrested in Murshidabad’s Nowda area on charges of inciting violence. Habib, the nephew of MP Abu Taher Khan, will be produced in court later Tuesday.

Mumbai police form SIT to probe racket supplying fake birth certificates to illegal foreigners



The Mumbai police on Tuesday formed a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to investigate offences of providing fake birth registration certificates to illegal foreign nationals. An officer said that it has come to light that a large number of such birth certificates have been obtained through fraudulent means. The SIT will be headed by the Joint Commissioner of Police (Crime) and will comprise the Additional

Commissioner of Police (Crime), the Additional Commissioner of Police (Special Branch), the Deputy Commissioner of Police (Detection), Crime Branch, and other officers. In a post on X, BJP leader Kirit Somaiya thanked Police Commissioner Deven Bharti for constituting an SIT.

An internal probe report by the BMC recently uncovered violations in the birth and death registration system, and found that nearly 87,000 corrections from 2024 to 2026 were made not in the mandatory registration system but in the old manner. The BMC report recommended suspending a civic official. The Mumbai police registered an FIR in February against two former BMC medical health department officials who allegedly approved birth certificates without verifying the required documentation. No arrests have been made in the case as yet. The Mahayuti government in the state has been promising to take action against illegal Bangladeshi nationals. Last year, the Mumbai police deported over 1,000 of these individuals back to Bangladesh. Earlier this year, a detention centre was established to hold illegal foreign nationals before their deportation.

Kerala Congress win sparks intense CM race

Thiruvananthapuram: After a big win in the Assembly elections and trouncing the Left Front, the Congress party finds itself in the midst of an open contest for the top post, turning a predictable transition into a high-stakes race. In earlier decades, the question of leadership rarely invited prolonged uncertainty.

When stalwarts like K. Karunakaran, A.K. Antony and Oommen Chandy rose to the Chief Minister’s office, the path was largely clear. Karunakaran went on to hold the post four times, Antony thrice, and Chandy twice; each transition was marked more by consensus than contest. That template now appears to have shifted. The Congress party’s emphatic return to power after a decade in the opposition has triggered an intense internal churn, with multiple power centres asserting their claim. What would ordinarily have been a moment of unalloyed celebration has, instead, opened up a complex negotiation over leadership, reflecting both the depth of the party’s bench strength and the competing ambitions within. At the heart of the current flux is the unexpected entry of K.C. Venugopal into the fray. A trusted national-level organiser and a key figure in the party’s central leadership, his name gaining traction has raised eyebrows within the state unit. His candidature introduces a new dynamic, one that goes beyond the traditional state leadership contest and brings the weight of the high command more directly into play. The coming days will be



crucial. A meeting in New Delhi, led by the central leadership on Tuesday, is expected to chart the next steps, including the appointment of observers who will travel to Kerala. Their task will be to gauge the mood among the 63 Congress legislators and to hold consultations with allies, whose support remains vital in shaping a stable government. Unlike in the past, when leadership choices were often settled through quiet consultations, this time the process is unfolding in full public view. Camps are forming, signals are being sent, and the balancing act between seniority, acceptability and political arithmetic is becoming increasingly intricate.

India–Jamaica boost trade, skilled mobility in Kingston talks

Kingston: India and Jamaica agreed to further strengthen trade linkages and explore cooperation for recruitment and mobility of skilled professionals, including healthcare workers and teachers, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said.Addressing a joint press conference here after talks with his Jamaican counterpart Kamina J Smith on Monday, Jaishankar said the discussions were comprehensive, and they reviewed the entire gamut of bilateral ties, identifying new avenues to deepen the partnership.

“We signed several important agreements and discussed effective implementations of MOUs which have been recently concluded in the fields of digital transformation, cultural exchange, sports and digital payments to ensure tangible outcomes on the ground,” he said. India recognised Jamaica’s growing role as a logistics hub and gateway to the Caribbean for trade and investment, Jaishankar said.“We agreed to further strengthen trade, business and investment linkages, explore cooperation for recruitment and mobility of skilled professionals, including nurses, healthcare workers and teachers,” he said. The two sides also discussed expanding cooperation in defence and security, healthcare, digitisation, agriculture, education and infrastructure, the minister said.Highlighting development cooperation as a key pillar of ties, Jaishankar noted the successful completion of the Improving Rural Livelihoods Project in Kitson Town in March 2026, implemented with Indian assistance of USD 1 million under the India-UN Development Partnership Fund, benefiting over 200 individuals and impacting thousands more.He said India is also discussing the feasibility of establishing an artisan empower-

ment hub in Jamaica and reiterated support for the country's recovery following Hurricane Melissa.

As part of humanitarian assistance, India has supplied relief material, deployed a medical team and is in the process of providing 30 dialysis units. It is also sending 40 fishing boats and 200 GPS units to aid recovery efforts.The ministers reaffirmed close cooperation in multilateral fora and discussed issues such as reformed multilateralism, climate justice and priorities of the Global South.

India appreciated Jamaica’s support for its candidature for a non-permanent seat at the UN Security Council for 2028-29. Both sides strongly condemned terrorism in all its forms and called for early finalisation of the Comprehensive Convention on International Terrorism.Jaishankar also highlighted growing people-to-people ties, noting the popularity of yoga and Ayurveda in Jamaica and the contribution of the Indian diaspora to the country’s development. He announced a contribution of two million Jamaican dollars towards celebrations marking 181 years of the arrival of Indians in Jamaica on India Heritage Day.

According to the website of the High Commission of India in Kingston, Jamaica has an Indian diaspora of around 70,000 people whose forefathers came mostly from Uttar Pradesh and Bihar as indentured labour between 1845 and 1917. Some also came from South India. The diaspora constitutes around 3 per cent of Jamaica’s population and continues to nurture an abiding interest in Indian culture, music, dance and history, serving as a cultural bridge between the two countries. Middle East truce in doubt as US and Iran fight for control of Strait of Hormuz

A fragile truce in the Middle East was under strain on Tuesday after the U.S. and Iran exchanged fire ?in the Gulf as they wrestled for control of the Strait of Hormuz.Iran's parliament speaker, Mohammad Baqer Qalibaf, said in a social media post on Tuesday breaches of the four-week-old ceasefire by ?the United States and its allies had endangered shipping and energy transit through the vital waterway. "We know well that the continuation of the current situation is unbearable for the United States, while we have not even begun yet," he said.The U.S. military said on Monday it destroyed six Iranian small boats, as well as cruise missiles and drones, after President Donald Trump sent the navy to escort stranded tankers through the strait in a campaign he called "Project Freedom".

The narrow waterway, which carries a large share of global supplies of oil, ?fertiliser and other commodities, has been virtually closed since the U.S. and Israel began attacks on Iran on February 28, causing price rises around the world.Several merchant ships in the Gulf reported explosions or fires ?on Monday, and an oil port in the United Arab Emirates, which hosts a large U.S. military base, was set ablaze by Iranian missiles.Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps has ?effectively closed the strait with threats of mines, drones, missiles and fast attack craft, while the United States has responded by blockading Iranian ports.Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araqchi said Monday's events showed there was no military solution to the ?crisis. He said peace talks were progressing with Pakistan's mediation, and warned the U.S. and the UAE against being drawn into a "quagmire."The U.S. military said two U.S. merchant ships made it through the strait, without saying when, with the support ?of Navy guided-missile destroyers.Iran denied any crossings had taken place, though shipping company Maersk

The commander of U.S. forces in the region said his fleet had destroyed six small Iranian boats, which Iran also denied. Iranian media quoted a military commander as saying U.S. forces targeted two small commercial boats, killing five civilians.Iran also said on Monday it had fired on a U.S. warship approaching the strait, forcing it to turn around. Iranian officials later described the ?fire as warning shots.Reuters could not independently verify events in the strait as the two sides issued contradictory statements.South Korea said one of its merchant ships, HMM Namu, suffered an explosion and fire in its engine room while in the ?strait, though no one aboard was hurt. A government spokesperson said it was unclear if the fire was caused by an attack.

Also on Monday, the British maritime security agency UKMTO reported two ships had been hit off the coast of the UAE, and the Emirati ?oil company ADNOC said one of its



empty oil tankers was hit by Iranian drones.UAE OIL PORT ABLAZEIranian authorities released a map of what they said was an expanded maritime area now under Iranian control, stretching beyond the strait to include lengthy sections of the UAE coastline.After a day of reported drone and missile attacks inside the UAE, including one that caused a fire at Fujairah, an important oil port, the UAE said Iranian attacks marked a serious escalation and it reserved the right to respond.The Iranian map included Fujairah and another Emirati port, Khorfakkan, both of which lie on the Gulf of Oman and which the UAE has relied on since the start of the conflict to bypass the blocked strait.If ?Iran were able to enforce control over access to ?those ports it would amount to a near-total maritime ?siege of the Gulf Arab state.Iran's state television said military officials had confirmed they attacked the UAE in response to the "U.S. military's adventurism".UAE presidential adviser Anwar Gargash said on Tuesday Abu Dhabi had received messages of solidarity from regional and other allies, which he said "affirm that Iran is the aggressor, responsible for the escalation of the crisis" in the ?Gulf.

US intelligence indicates limited new damage to Iran's nuclear program, sources say

U.S. intelligence assessments indicate that the time Iran would ?need to build a nuclear weapon has not changed since last summer, when analysts estimated that a U.S.-Israeli attack had pushed back the timeline to up to a year, according to three sources familiar ?with the matter.The assessments of Tehran's nuclear program remain broadly unchanged even after two months of a war that U.S. President Donald Trump launched in part to stop the Islamic Republic from developing a nuclear bomb.

Sign up here.The latest U.S. and Israeli attacks that began on February 28 have focused on conventional military targets, but Israel has hit a number of significant nuclear facilities.

The unchanged timeline suggests that significantly impeding Tehran's nuclear program may require destroying or removing Iran's remaining stockpile of highly enriched uranium, or HEU.The war has stalled since the U.S. and Iran agreed an April 7 ?truce to pursue peace. Tensions remain high as both sides appear deeply divided, and as Iran has choked traffic through the Strait of Hormuz, blocking some 20% of world oil supplies and igniting a global energy crisis.

Secretary ?of Defense Pete Hegseth has said publicly that the U.S. aims to ensure Iran does not obtain a nuclear weapon via ongoing negotiations with Tehran.U.S. intelligence agencies had concluded prior ?to June's 12-day war that Iran likely could produce enough bomb-grade uranium for a weapon and build a bomb in around three to six months, said two of the sources, all of whom requested anonymity to discuss U.S. intelligence.Following the June ?strikes by the U.S. that hit the Natanz, Fordow and Isfahan nuclear complexes, U.S. intelligence estimates pushed that timeline back to about nine months to a year, said the two sources and a person familiar with the assessments.

The attacks destroyed or badly ?damaged the three enrichment plants known to have been operating at the time. But the U.N. nuclear watchdog has been unable to verify the whereabouts of some 440 kilograms of uranium enriched to 60%. It believes that about half was stored in an underground tunnel complex at the Isfahan Nuclear Research Center, but it has been unable to confirm that since inspections were suspended.The International Atomic Energy Agency assesses the total HEU stockpile would be enough for 10 bombs if further enriched.

"While Operation Midnight Hammer obliterated Iran's nuclear facilities, Operation Epic Fury built on this ?success by decimating Iran's defense industrial base that they once leveraged as a protective shield around their pursuit of a nuclear weapon," said White House spokeswoman Olivia Wales, referring to the June operation and the latest

Trump's Germany troop cuts show limits of NATO efforts to keep US on board

European officials have been working on ways to convince Donald Trump to keep the United States in NATO despite severe tensions over the Iran war. But ?his abrupt move to cut U.S. forces in Germany is the latest sign that such efforts have their limits and are far from certain to succeed.

The substance of the ?decision announced on Friday to remove 5,000 troops from Germany did not come as a surprise to NATO officials. European leaders have agreed with the U.S. president that Europeans will take over more responsibility for their own security from U.S. forces.The Reuters Iran Briefing newsletter keeps you informed with the latest developments and analysis of the Iran war. Dropping a plan to deploy long-range U.S. Tomahawk missiles to Germany was more concerning for Berlin. But even that was not a huge shock, as that deal was made by Trump's predecessor, Joe Biden, and U.S. Tomahawk stocks have been depleted by the U.S.-Israeli war against ?Iran.More alarming for European governments was how the move was made — with little prior notification or consultation and with U.S. officials linking it to Trump's displeasure at German Chancellor Friedrich Merz's criticism of ?U.S. conduct of the Iran war.

"What is worrying is not the figure of 5,000 troops, but the political signal from Washington that longstanding, absolutely reliable partnerships no ?longer seem to count for anything and appear to be subject to arbitrary decisions," said Siemtje Moeller, a senior lawmaker from Germany's Social Democrats, who are part of Merz's governing coalition.The move followed accusations by ?Trump that U.S. allies have not been doing enough to support the U.S. in the Iran war and suggestions by him that this meant Washington no longer needs to honour the alliance's Article 5 mutual defence ?clause.Trump also pushed the alliance to the brink by threatening to take Greenland from Denmark, a fellow NATO member. NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte helped to defuse that crisis but the underlying dispute has not been resolved.European diplomats say they

Vice President JD Vance wrote on X on March 2.The unchanging estimate of how long it would take Iran to build such a weapon reflects in part the focus of the latest U.S. and Israeli military campaign, the sources said.

While Israel has struck nuclear-related targets, including a uranium-processing facility in late March, U.S. attacks have concentrated on conventional military capabilities, Iran's leadership and its military-industrial base.The unchanged estimates may also stem from a lack of major nuclear targets that can be readily and safely destroyed following June's military action, according to some analysts.Eric Brewer, a former senior U.S. intelligence ?analyst who led assessments of Iran's nuclear program, said it ?was not surprising that the assessments have not changed ?because recent U.S. strikes have not prioritized nuclear-related targets.

"Iran still possesses all of its nuclear material, as far as we know," said Brewer, vice president of the nuclear materials study program at the Nuclear Threat Initiative arms control think tank. "That material is probably located in deeply buried underground sites where U.S. munitions can't penetrate."In recent weeks, U.S. officials have contemplated dangerous operations which ?would significantly impede Iran's nuclear efforts. Those options include ground raids to retrieve the HEU believed to be stored in the tunnel complex at the Isfahan site.

Iran has repeatedly ?denied seeking nuclear weapons. U.S. intelligence ?agencies and the IAEA say Tehran halted a warhead development effort in 2003, though some experts and Israel contend that it secretly preserved key parts of the program.Precisely evaluating Iran's nuclear capacity is difficult, even for the world's leading intelligence services, say experts.Several U.S. intelligence agencies have independently studied Iran's nuclear program, and while the sources described a broad consensus regarding Iran's capacity to build a nuclear weapon, outlying assessments do occur.

New Delhi: Jaguar Land Rover India on Tuesday announced a sharp reduction in prices of its flagship Range Rover models by up to Rs 75 lakh, as it moves to pass on anticipated benefits from the proposed India-UK free trade agreement to customers. The company said that the price cuts apply to completely built unit (CBU) models imported from the UK, with the biggest revisions seen in the high-end SV portfolio. The Range Rover SV has been repriced from Rs 4.25 crore to Rs 3.5 crore (ex-showroom), while the Range Rover Sport SV now starts at Rs 2.35 crore, down from Rs 2.75 crore. According to the company, the revised pricing reflects changes expected under the new duty structure once the India-UK FTA comes into effect. The new prices are effective immediately, signalling the company's confidence in the agreement's rollout. Commenting on the move, Managing Director Rajan Amba said the company is extending the anticipated benefits of the trade deal to its customers in advance.

Centre ‘not insulated’ from how states react to Strait of Hormuz crisis: Chief Economic Advisor V Anantha Nageswaran



The Indian government is “not insulated” from how states react to the West Asia crisis, Chief Economic Advisor (CEA) V Anantha Nageswaran said, adding that demand for more funds due from fiscally-stretched states at a time of external shock adds to the Centre’s own challenges. Speaking at a seminar on state finances organised by the Institute of Economic Growth on Monday, Nageswaran said any honest assessment of state finances must be against the challenging global backdrop. And while the shocks don’t originate at the state level, that’s where they are absorbed, with stress landing on areas such as food and fuel subsidies, fertiliser allocation, agricultural support, and employment programmes.

“In other words, states are not insulated from what happens in the Strait of Hormuz. And I can also tell you that the sovereign is not insulated by how states respond to the Strait of Hormuz as well, because ultimately the combined fiscal deficit is what feeds into the current account deficit,” the government’s top economist said. While the Centre’s fiscal deficit target of 4.3% of GDP for 2026-27 has come under pressure due to the rising costs from the impact of the war in West Asia, international investors and global ratings agencies look at the combined deficit at the national and state level. Referring to a recent finance ministry analysis of 18 states’ budgets for 2026-27 that found half of them were set to post a revenue deficit, Nageswaran said that when external shocks hit, it is fiscally-constrained states that “press the hardest on the Centre and they do so at the very moment when the Centre itself is going to be facing significant challenges in the current financial year in meeting its fiscal deficit goals”. “The resulting dynamic therefore places stress on the general government fiscal position which is now assessed by global investors as an integrated

whole, not merely as a Union government number... Fiscal indiscipline at the subnational level is no longer a closed, domestic accounting matter. It is visible and it is priced,” the CEA said.

While the government has largely shielded households from the energy shock caused by the war in West Asia, the fiscal arithmetic has become “more complicated and will likely remain so” for much of 2026-27, Nageswaran said on Monday, with fertiliser costs set to be substantially higher, leading to a higher subsidy bill. Saying that India’s public finances is in “very large measure a story of its states”, the CEA said that as the country moves towards a higher income status, the efficiency and quality of resource allocation at the state level will increasingly determine not just the pace of growth but how inclusive and sustainable it is.

In its Monthly Economic Review report for April, released last week, the finance ministry had said of the 18 states whose 2026-27 budgets had been analysed, eight – Odisha, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, Goa, Gujarat, Uttarakhand, Telangana, and Bihar – were expected to post a revenue surplus, with an average fiscal deficit of 2.94%, interest payments amounting to 8.61% of revenue receipts, and outstanding liabilities and capital outlay at 24.24% and 4.08% of their state GDP, respectively. In contrast, nine states – Chhattisgarh, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Haryana, Rajasthan, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Punjab, Himachal Pradesh – with a budgeted revenue deficit in 2026-27 had worse average numbers across the board: a fiscal deficit of 3.44%, interest payments at 16.1% of revenue receipts, and outstanding liabilities and capital outlay at 31.6% and 2.04% of state GDPs, respectively. “But this is where economic analysis ends and political economy begins. The fruits of capital expenditure are probably felt with a time lag. So, there is a time inconsistency problem between who gets to spend and who gets to reap the benefits of it,” Nageswaran said, adding that this problem doesn’t occur with cash transfers that have expanded significantly in recent years. And while targeted cash transfers support consumption, smoother incomes at times of uncertainty, and empower women and marginalised groups, Nageswaran said it is a problem when these recurring and committee expenditures are in lieu of investments and pushes up revenue deficits, which are then financed through borrowings. Over time, this trade-off becomes visible in the form of infrastructure gaps and quality of public services, the CEA said.

Govt not planning any financial support to oil companies for their losses on petrol, diesel, jet fuel

The government has no plan at present to compensate public sector oil marketing companies (OMCs) for their losses on sale of petrol, diesel, and jet fuel below market prices, a senior Petroleum Ministry official said on Monday. The comments come at a time when there is growing speculation over the possibility of an increase in fuel prices, particularly petrol and diesel. Despite the surge in international oil and fuel prices amid the West Asia crisis, retail prices of regular petrol and diesel haven’t been hiked. In the case of ATF, or jet fuel, just about 25% of the price increase was passed on for domestic flights on April 1, although a full pass-through was done for international flights.

Consequently, public sector OMCs—Indian Oil Corporation, Bharat Petroleum Corporation, and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation—are incurring heavy losses on the sale of these fuels, and have been pushing for price hikes, it is learnt. Petrol and diesel prices have not been hiked for over four years now in India. Moreover, the timing of the current global surge in prices, which clashed with assembly elections in some states, made it politically fraught for the prices to be hiked. In the absence of price increases, the OMCs are facing significant financial burden. But the government has no proposal to extend any financial support to the companies. “Currently there is no proposal before the Government of India to support the OMCs (for their losses on fuel sales),” Petroleum Ministry Joint Secretary Sujata Sharma said in response to a question at the inter-ministerial press briefing on the West Asia crisis. She also noted that by not hiking the prices of regular petrol and diesel, the OMCs have been contributing in keeping inflation in check. The OMCs are also incurring heavy under-recoveries on sale of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) to households, even as they have hiked prices of commercial and industrial LPG in line with international prices movements. But unlike petrol, diesel, and jet fuel, the government has over the past few years provided subsidy support to the OMCs for losses on domestic LPG sales, and that cannot be ruled out even this time around, industry officials said. With the recently-held state elections having now concluded, a hike in prices of fuels like petrol, diesel, and the domestic LPG could be in the offing in the coming days or weeks, according to highly placed sources in the government. Throughout March and April, the Petroleum Ministry assured consumers that there was no proposal to hike fuel prices.

On the repeated assurances from the MoPNG that prices won’t be hiked, the official had said that these were political announcements that came in the middle of the state elections, and are definitely a constraint in raising the prices. The effort has been to hold on to the prices for as long as possible, but with no end in sight to the Strait of Hormuz closure, the status quo on prices can’t continue for long. The official didn’t elaborate on the timeline for price revisions. Petrol is currently priced at Rs 94.77 per litre in Delhi, and diesel at Rs 87.67 per litre. Domestic LPG is priced at Rs 913 per 14.2-kg cylinder in the capital. Fuel



prices vary across states due to differences in state levies. On April 23, the Petroleum Ministry had said that the OMCs were incurring losses of around Rs 20 per litre on petrol sales and Rs 100 per litre on diesel sales. On April 1, it had said that the OMCs were incurring an under-recovery of about Rs 380 per 14.2-kg cylinder on LPG sales to households. While having acknowledged that the OMCs are also incurring losses on jet fuel sales for domestic flights, the ministry has so far not shared the extent of their under-recoveries on this fuel.

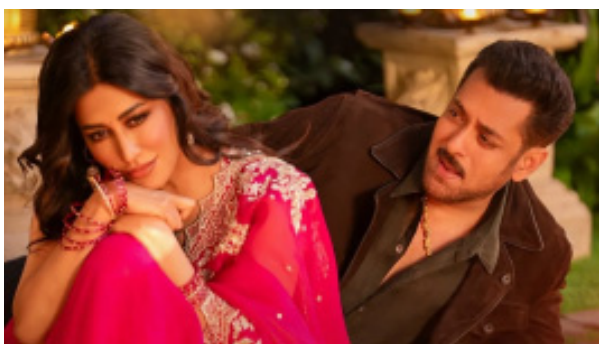
Last month, a few reports, quoting a note by brokerage Kotak Institutional Equities, had talked about the potential hike of Rs 25-28 per litre in petrol and diesel prices once the assembly elections concluded. The final phase of voting was held on April 29. The brokerage had said that the case for a petrol and diesel price hike was strong, but the timing was driven by political considerations. The MoPNG had dismissed such reports. Oil prices have been extremely volatile since the West Asia war began, but the petrol and diesel prices have not been hiked to protect the domestic consumer from this volatility. The Indian crude oil basket, which averaged \$70 per barrel last year, averaged over \$113 in April. While the retail prices of petrol and diesel are deregulated, in practice, the government-owned OMCs—with 90% market share in fuel retail—have kept prices stable in consultation with the government. They incur heavy losses when international oil prices surge, and earn hefty profits when the prices slump. Petrol and diesel prices have been more or less frozen since April 2022. With the effective halt in vessel movements through the Strait of Hormuz—from where one-fifth of global oil and natural gas flows usually transited—global energy supplies have been hit and prices have skyrocketed. India depends heavily on oil and gas imports to meet its energy needs, and fuel prices in the country are linked to global oil and fuel price benchmarks. While India has been in a comfortable position with regard to crude oil, petrol, and diesel availability, it still has to bear the brunt of high prices. In the case of LPG, apart from high prices, supplies to India have been notably hit, forcing the government to ration commercial and industrial LPG sales in order to prioritise supplies to crores of households that depend on LPG.

From a market mix standpoint, rural markets grew a striking 20.25 per cent YoY growth compared to urban at 10.22 per cent. The MCV sub-segment continued its standout run at +27.07 per cent YoY, while LCVs grew 17.76 per cent and HCVs 8.25 per cent — reflecting participatory growth across sub-segments. Looking at the May-June-July period, dealer confidence remains broadly steady, with 50.90 per cent of dealers now expecting growth — marginally firmer than the 49.81 per cent growth expectation recorded in the previous survey for the April-June window. This suggests that the dealer community continues to view the underlying demand pulse as intact even as it factors in the customary seasonal lull that typically sets in between the conclusion of the marriage season and the onset of the festive build-up, said the FADA report.

Indian auto retail industry clocks 13 pc growth in best-ever April

New Delhi: The Indian auto retail industry opened FY27 on an exceptionally strong note, retailing a record 26,11,317 units in April — a 12.94 per cent growth, the Federation of Automobile Dealers Associations (FADA) data showed on Tuesday. Two-wheeler retails continued their robust momentum, reaching 19,16,258 units last month, the best-ever April for this category. The demand engine remained broad-based with urban markets growing 14.07 per cent (on-year) and rural markets growing 12.30 per cent. “With two-wheelers at +13.01 per cent, three-wheelers at +7.19 per cent, passenger vehicles at +12.21 per cent, commercial vehicles at +15.02 per cent, tractors at +23.22 per cent, and construction equipment at -2.25 per cent, five of the six vehicle categories — along with the total industry — registered all-time April records,” said FADA Vice President Sai Giridhar. This clearly underlines that the structural demand momentum which defined the second half of FY26 has car-

Actor Archana Puran Singh, 63, recently mentioned on her son Aaryamann Sethi’s YouTube vlog that she has rejoined her home gym after a long gap. “After 1-1.5 years, I am coming back to the gym. It’s my day 7,” she told Aaryamann, as he added, “It’s my day 3”. Taking a cue from the duo’s exchange, we asked an expert on the significance of starting again. From a clinical perspective, returning to exercise after a long gap is not just about fitness, it is about reconditioning the body, said consultant dietitian and fitness expert Garima Goyal. “After months or years of inactivity, muscle strength declines, joint mobility reduces, and stamina drops. Jumping back too aggressively can increase the risk of injury, which is why a gradual, structured comeback like this becomes crucial,” she said. What makes “day 7” significant is the focus on consistency over intensity. “The first few days of restarting are not about pushing limits but about rebuilding the habit. During this phase, the body is adapting again, neuromuscular coordination improves, and basic endurance begins to return. This is the foundation on which long-term strength and fitness are built,” shared Goyal.

Another key factor here is muscle memory. “Even after a long break, the body retains a certain level of adaptation from past training. This means that strength and endurance can return faster than expected, provided the routine is consistent and supported with proper nutrition,” described Goyal. Nutrition, in this phase, plays a supportive role. “Ad-



equate protein intake helps in muscle repair, while balanced meals ensure enough energy for workouts without excessive fatigue. Hydration and micronutrients like magnesium and vitamin D also contribute to recovery and muscle function.”

What also stands out is the emotional aspect of her journey. “Restarting after a gap often comes with hesitation, self-doubt, or comparison with past fitness levels. But acknowledging “day 7” shows acceptance of the process rather than chasing perfection. This is a reminder that fitness is not about where you left off. It is about where you choose to begin again,” said Goyal.

Ro-Ry, MI's 6-hitting machines get roaring, as their talisman Rohit Sharma returns

Sunday may have been optional nets, but Rohit Sharma spent an hour honing his batting skills under the evening sun. It was perhaps an indication that he was fit and raring to go, and on Monday, with Mumbai Indians (MI) needing to win to halt their losing streak, he delivered with the bat, much to the delight of the capacity crowd at the venue.

The Wankhede Stadium roared in delight as Rohit Sharma made his way down the stairs and into the middle to bat for the first time in three weeks. Playing as an impact sub, he would have hoped for an easy chase to mark his return, but his bowlers were not as grateful, conceding 228 runs in 20 overs. If there was pressure, it did not show early. It was Ryan Rickelton who took charge. Fresh from a century in the previous home game against SRH, the left-hander started briskly, scoring 15 off his first five balls and immediately putting the bowlers on the back foot. That early burst helped Rohit ease in. LSG needed powerplay wickets to take early control of proceedings, but Rickelton ensured they never settled. He attacked both Mohammed Shami and Mohsin Khan, taking MI to 50 in five overs and setting the tone for the chase.

While Rickelton's early fireworks had ensured that MI were not behind the eight-ball, the anticipation from the capacity crowd about Rohit finding his groove was only rising with each passing over. He finally found his rhythm in the sixth over, taking Avesh Khan for 21 runs, which included two fours and two sixes. It was the kickstart he needed, and it eased the pressure on the South African at the other end. LSG's bowling approach made things easier. They relied largely on pace, using four seamers and just one spinner. Once Rickelton and Rohit got used to the pace of the surface, strokeplay became simpler. There was little varia-

tion to disrupt their rhythm. Rickelton brought up his half-century off 21 balls in the eighth over as MI edged towards the 100-mark. An over later, it was Rohit's turn to reach his fifty with a six over long-on off left-arm spinner M Siddharth.

The pair put MI in the ascendancy at the halfway mark and at 127/0, laid the ideal foundation to chase the score down. The onus was now on Pant to make things happen, but none of his bowlers looked capable of answering their captain's call. The stand was finally broken by Mohsin Khan in the 11th over as Rickelton fell for 83 in 32 balls, after putting on 143 runs, for the first wicket with Rohit. In the last few matches, only one of MI's two opening batsmen had come good. On Monday, when both fired together, MI ran away with the game. Rickelton's dismissal had little effect on Rohit, who remained on the attack against a bowling unit that had lost its bite. He was most severe on Avesh, who was at the receiving end of some sumptuous strokes from his bat, a six over cover-point in the 13th over being the best of the lot. The right-hander took 35 runs off the pacer, which included three fours and three sixes. He looked good for more, but the strategic time-out led to his undoing as Siddharth induced a top edge after the break. His 84 off 44 balls had six fours and seven sixes. The Wankhede crowd that had lost its voice in the previous four home games finally had something to cheer for.

Before Monday's game against MI, Nicholas Pooran had managed just 82 runs in eight matches in IPL 2026. For a batter of his ability, it had been a quiet and frustrating phase in a season where a lot was expected from his bat. On a smaller ground and against a pedigreed yet out-of-form attack, he finally found his moment. Walking into bat in the third over, the left-hander did not take long to make an impact. He launched Will Jacks for a six off the fifth ball he faced, a shot that seemed to free him up. What followed was a clean, confident display of hitting. He focused almost entirely on the leg side, repeatedly targeting the area from long-on to fine leg. The result was an innings with eight sixes, each maximum a blend of crisp timing and raw power. He brought up his first fifty of IPL 2026 in just 16 balls, putting the pressure firmly back on the opposition. Pooran's knock ended in the ninth over, but not before he had blasted his way to 63 off 21 balls and added 94 runs in 34 deliveries for the second wicket with Mitchell Marsh. For LSG, the hope would be that it was the start of bigger things from his bat for the rest of the season. Brief Scores: LSG 228/5 in 20 overs (Nicholas Pooran 64, Mitchell Marsh 44) lost to MI 229/4 in 18.4 overs (Rohit Sharma 84, Ryan Rickelton 83) by six wickets.

KL Rahul reveals message from DC management which has fuelled his IPL 2026 success

KL Rahul seems to have turned a corner with regards to his approach to batting in T20 cricket in the ongoing season of the Indian Premier League (IPL). The Delhi Capitals star has scored 433 runs in nine matches but it is his strike rate of 185.84 that stands out. The highest strike rate that he has finished with in his previous seasons in the IPL is 158.41 in 2018 and Rahul has often been heavily criticised for seemingly failing to keep up with the big-hitting standards of the day in T20 cricket. Rahul, who opens the batting for the Delhi Capitals, said that his changed approach this season is reflective of the way T20 cricket itself has transformed in recent years. "T20 cricket has evolved over the last two or three years, especially in the IPL. You can see patterns in how teams are winning, and recently, teams that win the Powerplay often go on to win the game. A few years ago, games were usually decided between the 14th and 20th overs. The Powerplay was always important, but now it carries even more weight," KL Rahul said in JioStar.

Rahul said that the DC team management told him clearly that they want to maximise the runs they can get in the powerplay, for which he will be given the freedom to go on the attack all the way through. "For me, personally, it's



something I've had to adapt to for the team. This season, the messaging from the team management was very clear. They spoke to me before the IPL and wanted me to bat at the top of the order and play with freedom. Teams are aiming for upwards of 60 in that phase. India and Australia retain top spots in ICC T20I rankings

Hyderabad: India and Australia have retained their positions at the top of the ICC Men's T20I Team Rankings and the ICC Women's T20I Team Rankings, respectively, following the annual updates carried out. The latest rankings, which rate all matches played since May 2025 at 100 per cent and those of the previous two years at 50 per cent, see India's lead over England trimmed from 14 to 13 points in the men's table while Australia's lead over England in the women's rankings has reduced from 18 to 12 points.

India, who retained their title in the ICC Men's T20 World Cup played in India and Sri Lanka this year, are on 275 points, still enjoying a comfortable lead over England (262) and Australia a close third with 258 points in the updated rankings, which see the top seven positions unchanged. New Zealand (247), South Africa (244), Pakistan (240) and the West Indies (233) are the other teams in the top 10 to have retained their positions.

Sri Lanka have dropped six rating points and slipped below Bangladesh to ninth position and are now just one point ahead of Afghanistan while the USA have leapfrogged the Netherlands and Scotland to take 13th position. In other movements in the top 20, Nepal have overtaken the United Arab Emirates to 17th position while Oman have moved past Canada to 19th.

In other notable changes, Italy have gained 11 points and moved from 26th to 23rd, Spain's 12-point gain sees them advance from 30th to 26th, Cyprus have gained 10 points to progress from 64th to 53rd and Eswatini have gained 10 points to move from 74th to 65th.

Dinesh Karthik on why he ranks RCB's IPL win 'right up there' with 2007 T20 World Cup triumph



Just under a year after lifting the IPL title with Royal Challengers Bengaluru, Dinesh Karthik has admitted the win sits right at the top of his career achievements along with winning the 2007 T20 World Cup with India. The 40-year-old also said that he ranks this IPL victory slightly above the won that he had won with the Mumbai Indians in 2013. Speaking about the emotional weight of the triumph, the 40-year-old said the RCB title "just pips" the 2013 win because of the long wait and the connection with the fans.

"A few days ago, somebody asked me what my highlight in a cricketing career was," Karthik said on the RCB Podcast. "Obviously, the World Cup I was part of is right up there, but the RCB win was also right up there." "An MI win as a player was a great one too, but the RCB win just pips it because of the fact that we waited 18 years for it. It's a long wait. We all know how passionate the fans are. You almost feel a sense of yearning and giving back when you finally win," he added. For Karthik, the victory was not just about lifting a trophy, but about delivering for a fanbase that had stayed loyal through nearly two decades of disappointment. "The first one was for the fans. They've been

Dinesh Karthik reveals how Virat Kohli pushed him into RCB coaching role: 'You would probably fit in quite nicely'

Former India wicketkeeper batsman Dinesh Karthik has opened up about how he became the batting coach and mentor at Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB), a year after announcing his retirement from all forms of the game. The 40-year-old spoke about how RCB Director of Cricket Mo Bobat sowed a seed in his mind during IPL 2024 about being involved in the support staff and how encouragement from Virat Kohli sealed the deal.

Karthik was part of RCB's coaching group, which helped win their maiden IPL last season, where they defeated Punjab Kings in the final in Ahmedabad. "It manifested when, as I was finishing in 2024, Mo asked me if I would be keen or interested. I was in the middle of the tournament, and it was a very different IPL season – we had lost six out of seven or seven out of eight games, I don't remember exactly – and we had a mountain to climb. To be fair, nobody gave us a chance." "But I was so invested in that. We were having discussions while I was playing, and I was also speaking to my wife and Mo. Malolan Rangarajan was also giving me a picture of what it could be if I played. He never told me 'do this or do that'. He just showed me how it would look."

"Mo was very confident I would be useful to the team. I trust Mo a lot – I've grown very fond of him and have a very good equation with him. He didn't convince me, but he showed me exactly what it would look like and told me it's a good place to be, considering where I was in my career. I completely trusted him, and I dropped the hat," Karthik said

with us through thick and thin, constantly supporting us. It was said in the dressing room as well – if we cross the line, it's for the fans. That was a very special feeling."

He also spoke about the broader journey of the team through the season, which included disruptions and challenges before they eventually found their rhythm. "We went through a lot last year. The country itself went through a bit towards the back end of the tournament, and we had to reassess, regroup and start again in many ways." "It's one thing having momentum on your side, and then there's a sudden break, and you come back. The way we managed to get past a couple of games and play solid cricket – all teams played good cricket – the standard of the IPL is unparalleled right now," Karthik said. Karthik said one of the most powerful images from the night was seeing Virat Kohli overcome with emotion after finally winning the title with RCB – a franchise he has represented for more than a decade. "It was great to see Virat Kohli in tears, the greatness of AB de Villiers and Chris Gayle being there with us, and the likes of Andy Flower and Mo Bobat putting a team together and doing something very special." Looking back at the journey of the coaching group, Karthik also praised head coach Andy Flower and him for choosing the role of becoming RCB's head coach. "I asked Andy where this ranks among his wins. He said the Ashes win for England was special, the 2010 World Cup was phenomenal, but the RCB win is right up there." "He had multiple offers, but he chose RCB because he felt this was a challenge. And yes, it was a challenge. For us to come together as a group, do what we did in the auction, and play a certain brand of cricket – and make fans feel proud that they supported RCB – that it was worth the wait. That feeling is what is most satisfying," the former wicketkeeper-batsman said.

'Don't think money has anything to do with it': Justin Langer throws weight behind 'selfless' Rishabh Pant



Rishabh Pant's returns with the bat continued to lag on Monday even as some of his big-ticket teammates at Lucknow Super Giants finally managed to find some form. The LSG captain fell after scoring 15 in 10 balls as LSG lost by six wickets to Mumbai Indians at the Wankhede Stadium, thus sinking to their sixth consecutive defeat. The innings took Pant's tally for the season to 204 runs at a strike rate of 128.30 and average of 25.50. While this is woefully below par by any standard, it is a continuation of a pattern that was set last season, in which Pant scored 269 runs in 14 matches at a strike rate of 133.17 and average of 24.45. Nearly half of those runs came from his last innings of the season alone, in which he scored an unbeaten 118 in 61 balls.

That innings remains an outlier, with Pant scoring just two half-centuries apart from that in the 23 innings he has played as captain of LSG, since he was bought by the side at the 2025 auction and became the most expensive player of all time. Langer was asked if Pant is still feeling the pressure of being the big ticket buy for LSG. "Honestly, I don't

think the money has anything to do with it; I don't think that has anything to do with it at all. What I do think is that leadership is a tough position, you're carrying lots of pressure, and he knows that," Langer told the media after the loss to MI. "He's carrying a lot of pressure for the team, and he does it, like all of us, with a smile on his face 98% of the time. The other 2% of the time, it's tough. But he's chipping away, he's working hard and, as I say, he's had a match-winning game earlier in the season. We love it when we see him smiling and playing that swashbuckling style of play, and he's not far off," Langer explained. Despite the loss, Langer backed captain Pant, insisting the wicketkeeper-batter was close to rediscovering his best form. "Well, it's funny how we played a practice game here two days ago, and Rishabh, I think he got... I'm not sure the exact final score, maybe 95 off 40 balls or 30 balls or something. "And you're just looking at it again, and you go, 'Oh my gosh, that's Rishabh Pant at his very best.' So, you know, he's a very good player; we know that. We've seen him in Test cricket destroy teams at number five."

Langer hailed Pant's decision to shift to No.5 on the batting order and sending out Nicholas Pooran in his usual No.3 spot. Pooran, who has been enduring an extraordinarily poor season, scored 63 in 21 balls. "And we felt today, with that and the way he played just two days ago after a seven-day break, that might be a good option for the team. He selflessly moved down the order to let Nicky P bat – that was unbelievable." "So yeah, I mean, Rishabh's not far off. As a captain in the IPL, as a coach, you've got to keep fronting up, don't you? That's all you can do. And he'll keep fronting up and hopefully help us get some wins over the next few games," the Australian said. LSG next take on Royal Challengers Bengaluru at home on Thursday.

My focus is on maximising the Powerplay, because that's the demand of the team and of T20 cricket right now," he said. On opening the batting alongside Patum Nissanka, Rahul said:

The Devil Wears Prada comes of age: 20 years later, burning bridges no longer lights the way



Of course, we’ve all rolled our eyes in Miranda Priestly fashion at the reports of why it’s taking so long for David Frankel to come up with a sequel to his 2006 classic workplace dramedy, The Devil Wears Prada — “By all means, move at a glacial pace. You know how that thrills me.” Or strut away in our imaginary blood-red Rockstud Pumps at the cast’s excuse of the makers not being able to crack a script — “Details of your incompetence don’t interest me.” But after watching The Devil Wears Prada 2, I realized why there was wisdom in waiting.

The sequel lacks the relentless verve of the first part, but that’s by design. Because like the memorable characters from the first film, the world of journalism has also come of age. The Devil Wears Prada 2’s head isn’t buried in the sand, but it has its ear kept to the ground. Had it released a decade earlier, it could’ve been another tone-deaf follow-up riding solely on nostalgia. Unlike part 1, it could’ve gotten the biggest of brands knocking on its doors like it did this year. With The Devil Wears Prada 2, neither the makers nor the characters dismiss the ground reality with a “That’s all,” but it questions what Meryl Streep’s Runway editor-in-chief so boastfully declares at the end of the first part — “Everybody wants to be us.” Well, do they? The landscape of journalism has changed drastically in the last 10 years, and more rapidly in the past five years. For them to treat Runway as a place wrapped in its candy-coated fur would’ve been possible — and more tempting — but certainly not true to the times.

Miranda Priestly’s entry scene in the sequel has her strike a pose on the red carpet, only to be whisked away into isolation by her team, alarmed by the news of a scandal coming out. This isn’t 2006, when iPhones are yet to be launched. Or the internet is still a luxury instead of the perennial, perilous alternate reality of today. A scandal isn’t just harmless watercooler talk, but a viral PR disaster with tangible consequences. Miranda can neither just eyeroll her way out of situations nor dump her problems on her hapless subordinates like haute couture coats on messy desks. That’s why for Miranda, her caustic sense of humour is no longer a weapon of choice, but an armour for self-defence. She doesn’t fire shots like a machine gun on the loose, but picks her battles across advertisers, bosses, and subordinates. She goes from “that’s all” to “that’s all?” while negotiating with a luxury advertiser, has horror spelled over her face while travelling economy due to budget cuts enforced by a millennial boss, and contorts her body in unattainable ways to get her coat to the hook. Stomping her feet and dumping the coats on desk is a practice of the past, thanks to HR complaints of workplace harassment against her.

Clearly struggling to get upto speed with the woke police, she’s constantly reprimanded (through cautionary side-eyes and semi-audible clearing of throat) by her first assistant Amari (Simone Ashely) to not endorse inappropriate language and risk cancellation. “What can I not say?,” she

asks, as confused as contemptuous. But all the persistent, polite niggles can’t discourage her from reserving her snarkiest barb for Amari herself, when she doesn’t show up on time — “Has she gotten human trafficked?” — even more brutal and undiplomatic than the casual “has she died?” remark she directed at Emily (Emily Blunt) in the first part.

It’s in fleeting glimpses like these that we see Miranda in all her stinging glory. But her penchant for sarcasm and affinity for stone-cold steeliness are now buried under the burden of powerlessness in a market where even the most influential opinion makers are at the mercy of dwindling revenues and shorter attention spans. In the first part, when she confesses to Andy (Anne Hathaway) the pain of dis-counting her family for her work, she justifies it with aspiration (“everybody wants to be us”). But at the end of the sequel, seated next to her in the car again, Miranda offers a more evolved justification to Andy — “I love working” — with a glint in her eye. Journalism, for Miranda, is no longer about scaling the ladder of power, but it’s come down to protecting her identity from extinction. Similarly, for Andrea, who demonstrated power of a different kind — in walking away from Miranda at the end of the first part — journalism is now about staying in the filth and fixing it. Two decades ago, she could exercise the choice of quitting a job and applying for another. But 2026 comes to her with a lay-off from an anti-establishment newspaper and the rude realization that it’s no longer a singular workplace that’s toxic. It’s the entire ecosystem, infected by issues far larger than ego hassles and wardrobe shaming at work. When she’s roped back into Runway as Features editor, she starts off on a wrong footing with Miranda, who claims she has “not earned” her position. But when Andy goes out of her way to get Miranda that elusive exclusive in the era of rehashes, Miranda rewards her both personally and professionally by securing a bigger budget for her section and inviting her to a high-end weekend getaway. After a change in hands of ownership, Miranda and Andy become unlikely bedfellows and join forces against an army of tech bros and a compromised future. Yes, they’ve to choose between the lesser of the devils, but they get there only through a sustained push for “more thought-out pieces with a POV” instead of glossy fashion dumps.

Miranda gives Andrea the benefit of doubt instead of treating her walkout two decades ago as a sucker punch to her ego. Similarly, Andrea never gives in to the lucrative offer of writing a definitive Miranda Priestly exposé despite their differences. She recognizes Miranda is as much, if not a bigger, victim as herself of the tectonic shift in the economics and consumption of journalism. She could’ve gone the Emily way, switched fields, scaled the corporate ladder, and dated a billionaire to (almost) buy the position she thought she always deserved. Or she could’ve turned on the system that made her what she’s today and made a moolah or two out of the soul-selling book offer. But instead, she chooses not to be “Emily 2”, but Andrea, a self-made journalist with abiding integrity. At its very core, The Devil Wears Prada’s sauciness came from its origin. Lauren Weisberger, a former Vogue employee and assistant to editor-in-chief Anna Wintour, wrote a “definitive” expose on her ex-boss, whom Miranda was reportedly modelled on. What’s more spicy than having two women go at it — whether it’s for the same position or at different rungs of the corporate ladder? But The Devil Wears Prada 2 refuses to go down that familiar, potentially more profitable street. Because it recognizes the market for what it’s become — a bait-feeding mechanism that pits one (woman) against another as part of the corporate power struggle. The sequel wants to dig deeper and demonstrate that there’s power in collaboration. Sure, an Emily can still manifest “May the bridges I burn light my way,” but guess where she ends up? Sharing carbs (and guilt) with the Emily who chose to build those bridges in the dark instead.

‘He is very stubborn’: Surendra Pal reacts to Mukesh Khanna’s refusal to accept Ranveer Singh as Shaktimaan



Even today, Mukesh Khanna continues to remain in the news, largely due to his iconic portrayal of Shaktimaan. More recently, veteran actor Surendra Pal, who has worked with Mukesh Khanna in both Shaktimaan and Mahabharat, spoke about their dynamic and how he came to be cast in the television series. In a conversation with Sidharth Kannan, while speaking about Mukesh Khanna, Surendra said: “My friendship with Mukesh has been very strong, in fact it still is. We have always shared a cordial relationship. I respect him deeply and hold him in very high regard. The role of Bhishma Pitamah that he portrayed was so beautiful that I think nobody else could have done it the way he did. He is a very natural actor and works with great passion.” The veteran actor further recalled that when he heard Mukesh was making Shaktimaan, he approached him and requested a role as the antagonist. He said: “I told him to give me the villain’s role. He said no, only one specific person can do this role. I asked who, and he said Amrish Puri. I said fine, but I knew Amrish Puri would not do it because he was very busy with films. In television, you need a full-time commitment; you cannot work the way you do in films.”

Surendra added that when he later learned the villain’s role was still available, he went back to Mukesh’s office. “When I found out that the villain’s role in Shaktimaan was still vacant, I went to his office again and said, give me this role. He asked what I would do with it. I told him, first give it to me, then I will show you.” Surendra Pal then described the effort he put into creating the iconic character of Tamraj Kilvish in Shaktimaan: “I started thinking deeply about the character. Mukesh ji suggested that I use a nose extension, and he also said that I had to break away from my

image of Dronacharya. We decided to completely transform it. I wore a curly-haired wig, changed my eyebrows, changed my eyes, and even altered my teeth. It was difficult to paint them and apply gum there. While speaking, I could even taste the colour. I wore long artificial nails. It was all very difficult.” While praising Mukesh Khanna’s performance as Bhishma Pitamah in Mahabharat, Surendra said: “He played the elderly role of Bhishma Pitamah, but added so many variations. He performed it exceptionally well.” He further added: “With Shaktimaan, he broke away from the image of Bhishma Pitamah and added humour to the character. He became a children’s favourite. That only shows the range he has as an actor.” Addressing the long-standing perception of differences or ego issues between them, the actor clarified: “He is a wonderful man and a wonderful actor. I left the role of Kilvish because I used to shoot inside caves where torches were burning, and there was always smoke everywhere. I also had to wear heavy padding to appear fat. It became very hectic because of the heat and I used to sweat a lot. After a point, it was not possible for me to continue. It wasn’t about money; sometimes your health takes a toll. I wanted to look after my health.” He further added: “There was never any ego problem between us. Both our characters were equally significant and still remembered in public memory. And we were both equally dedicated actors. In fact, during work, there were never any ego issues between us.” Surendra Pal also responded to Mukesh Khanna’s recent comments suggesting that Ranveer Singh may not be the ideal choice for the role of Shaktimaan: “He is the best judge; it is his creation. He will naturally want the best for his character, which he treats like his own child even today. That is why he will not compromise. He is very stubborn.” However, he added a differing perspective: “Ranveer Singh is not a bad choice. I really like him, and after watching Dhurandhar, I have become an even bigger fan. I feel he could be ideal for the role. I think Mukesh ji should reconsider and broaden his thinking a little.” Recently, Mukesh Khanna revealed that he is losing crores of rupees by not greenlighting the cast of Shaktimaan, as he does not want a star to portray the iconic superhero. In a chat with Zoom, he said: “It is my loss. I am losing crores of rupees, as Sony is ready to give me crores of rupees. I said, ‘Wait, I don’t want this cast.’ They are adamant, and I am also adamant. They want a star, I don’t want a star. If I am allowed, I would conduct auditions across the country to find who will become Shaktimaan. You will get publicity and also find a boy who is good-looking, simple, and kind. For me, no actor who already has an image can become Shaktimaan.”

‘When will this war end?’: Ameesha Patel stranded at Dubai airport as UAE shuts airspace



Actor Ameesha Patel on Tuesday said her New York-Mumbai flight was diverted due to UAE airspace restrictions, leaving her stranded for hours at the airports in Muscat and Dubai. She attributed the closure to “fresh missile

attacks” launched by Iran. Taking to her X handle, Ameesha wrote, “On my way back to MUMBAI from NEW YORK on Emirates! As we were about to land in DUBAI the airspace closed in UAE due to fresh missile Attacks! We have now been diverted to MUSCAT n are awaiting further updates !! When will this WAR end (folded hands emoticons) !! Praying.”

The actor posted another update after a few hours, along with a photo from inside the Dubai airport. “Been hours n hours at DUBAI airport !! And the wait continues Can’t wait to get home to MUMBAI,” she wrote in the caption. While sharing another picture from the airport lounge, Ameesha wrote, “24 hours from the time we left NYC and still counting hours to reach Mumbai. Endless airport lounge time.” The UAE said Iran launched four cruise missiles during the attack on Monday. According to the defence ministry, three were intercepted by air defence systems, while the fourth fell into the sea. At the same time, a drone strike sparked a fire at the oil facility in Fujairah, a key hub for energy exports.

Bobby Deol was hesitant to do Anurag Kashyap’s Bandar till Dharmendra stepped in: ‘Go take a chance’



Actor Bobby Deol bounced back from his career’s lowest phase in the late 2010s when he took a chance with Prakash Jha’s 2020 MXPlayer crime show Aashram. Playing a corrupt spiritual guru wasn’t even remotely on his mind in the late 1990s and early 2000s, when he ruled the roost as an A-list superstar. In his 2.0 era, Bobby has consolidated his position as the go-to villain in projects like Animal (2023), The Ba****s of Bollywood (2025), and the upcoming films, Alpha and Jana Nayagan. But when Anurag Kashyap reached out to him with the crime thriller Bandar, Bobby thought the film could amount to taking his adventurous streak too far. He was initially hesitant to take up the protagonist’s role of a has-been television star accused of rape by his ex-girlfriend. “Bobby was initially slightly hesitant about whether he would be able to pull off the Bandar role,” a source close to the development tells SCREEN.

So, he went back to his family and took their advice. His family was also surprised, given it’s quite a dark role for a star like Bobby Deol. But it was the biggest star of his family — his late, legendary father Dharmendra — who encouraged Bobby to give his nod. The veteran actor recalled

‘Ladka bewakoof hai’: Sunil Dutt begged police to save Sanjay Dutt in 1993 Mumbai blasts case



Sanjay Dutt, during his younger years, was often seen as the quintessential “spoilt brat.” Born to film legends Nargis Dutt and Sunil Dutt, Sanjay often found himself in the news for the wrong reasons. Over time, his life became embroiled in multiple controversies, including substance abuse, alleged links with the underworld, and his association with the 1993 Bombay blasts. He was accused of illegal possession of arms and later convicted of possessing a 9mm pistol, an AK-56 rifle, hand grenades, and ammunition. Recently, former Mumbai Police Commissioner MN Singh, who led the investigation, revisited the case in an interview with Hussain Zaidi Files’ YouTube channel, offering detailed insights into the probe.

‘Sanjay Dutt spoke to Dawood Ibrahim, got those weapons delivered to his house’ Singh said, “The underworld was involved in getting arms from Pakistan. Sanjay Dutt had spoken to Dawood Ibrahim, met him, and then got those weapons delivered to his house. Abu Salem had come to make the delivery on the instructions of Dawood Ibrahim’s younger brother. So, when we learnt that Sanjay Dutt had accepted the weapons, we were all shocked.”

Sanjay’s father Sunil Dutt was an active politician at the time and had a stellar reputation. Singh said that Sanjay’s involvement shocked them because they couldn’t believe that Sunil’s son would be involved in something nefarious. “We couldn’t believe it—not because we thought Sanjay Dutt couldn’t do something like this, but because of Sunil Dutt. He was a great, decent gentleman. However, when I had so much information about Sanjay Dutt receiving weapons during a period of riots, how could I not act upon it? Should

how he also encountered raised eyebrows when he showed interest in offbeat films back in the 1960s, during his rise as a superstar.

“Dharam ji told him actors can’t be shy. He said, ‘Even I have done non-mainstream roles in Satyakam, Anupama, and Dillagi. Go take a chance,’” adds the source. That did it for Bobby, who immediately gave his nod to the role. He clearly had faith in his father, who did his own share of unconventional films like Hrishikesh Mukherjee’s Anupama (1966) and Satyakam (1969), along with the lesser-known risk, Basu Chatterjee’s 1978 romantic comedy Dillagi, in which he starred opposite his then-future wife Hema Malini. Bobby Deol has looked up to Dharmendra, as was witnessed when he received the Lifetime Achievement Award on behalf of his late father at the Chetak Screen Awards last month. “He worked in this industry for so many years, he saw both good and bad times, but never gave up. Wherever I go and whoever I meet, I receive so much love because my father opened people’s hearts for us — for me, my brother (Sunny Deol), and our family,” said a visibly emotional Bobby.

Last year, the actor told SCREEN upon completing 30 years in the film industry that he’s just getting started. “I’m going to be here for a very long time, probably as long as my dad (Dharmendra). If there’s anyone I’m inspired by, it’s only my father. He’s something else,” said Bobby. Bobby Deol also opened up on Bandar, calling it one of the most unconventional roles he’s done so far. “That was a very different kind of character than what I’ve played in films and shows. Usually, you end up playing very larger-than-life characters. You become so conditioned playing those that it becomes more difficult to change the whole process of how you perform. But Anurag really helped me with that. He brought out the best in me,” Bobby added. Bandar premiered at the Toronto International Film Festival last year, marking a first for Bobby. Co-produced by Zee Studios and Nikhil Dwivedi’s Saffron Magicworks, the film also stars Sanya Malhotra, Saba Azad, Sapna Pabbi, Indrajith Sukumaran, and Joju George, among others. It is slated to release in Indian cinemas on June 5.

I have simply let it go because he is a star? That wasn’t possible.”

Sanjay Dutt confessed, said he took arms for protection. He further added: “Then we summoned him and questioned him. He confessed to his actions. He said, ‘I have taken them, but it was a mistake.’ When asked what prompted him to associate with gangsters, he said, ‘Around the time of the riots, I was receiving threats, so I got them delivered to my home. It was my mistake.’ I then told him, ‘You already have multiple licensed weapons—wasn’t that enough? There was also police security outside your house. Despite all this, you took AK-56 rifles, bullets, and grenades. These are not things one keeps for personal safety.’ After this, he admitted his involvement, and we arrested him.”

Singh also spoke about the pressure he faced during the investigation: “During this time, I was under pressure from several quarters, including Sunil Dutt, who would often meet me and request me to save his son, saying, ‘Ladka bevakoof hai’ (the boy is foolish). I told him it was extremely difficult for me, especially since Sanjay was a public figure and the entire world knew about the case. I could not dismiss the charges. He requested that I not invoke the TADA (Terrorist and Disruptive Activities (Prevention) Act), saying his son was not a terrorist. I agreed that he was not a conventional terrorist, but he had helped terrorists, which is also a serious crime. I also told him that Sanjay Dutt was not the only one against whom action had been taken—many others, including some police officers who helped gangsters, were also charged.” He added: “As an officer, I had to fulfill my duty. In such a case, I cannot help anyone. Many people were unhappy with my actions, but the case against him was strong, and that is why convictions followed. I filed the case under the TADA Act and submitted the charge sheet.” However, Singh raised one concern for public consideration: “Everyone involved—including Abu Salem, Baba Moosa Chauhan, and Haneef Kadawala, who were accused of delivering the weapons—were punished under the TADA Act. My grievance with the court is that those who delivered the weapons were convicted under TADA, but the person who received them was not treated under the same provisions. I have no personal enmity with Sanjay or Sunil Dutt, but one must analyse how this makes sense. I cannot say whether the court was pressured, but the outcome raises questions.” In his autobiography Let Me Say It Now, former Deputy Commissioner of Police Rakesh Maria also described Sanjay Dutt’s interrogation, noting that the actor initially denied involvement before eventually confessing. Maria wrote that during questioning, he told Dutt: “I am asking you like a gentleman; you should answer like one.” He further recounted that several prominent figures
