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IPL showcases experience and youth

T20 sensation Vaibhav Sooryavanshi — all of 15 — was the brightest star of the 2026 Indian Premier League (IPL), even as the old warhorse Virat Kohli made his presence felt with typical panache. The 37-year-old batting legend powered Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB) to their second successive trophy with a quickfire fifty in the final. Such was Kohli's form and fitness during the two-month-long tournament that his participation in the 2027 ODI World Cup is now within the realm of possibility. Kohli admitted that he needed a change in mindset and a bit of pushing from "super young" players to reinvent his T20 game. This candid acknowledgment offers a glimpse of the healthy competition that is shaping Indian cricket. The just-concluded IPL season showed that cricketers from two generations can complement each other admirably. Kohli remains a dominant force, while players like Sooryavanshi are ensuring that the game continues to evolve.

Sooryavanshi, the Rajasthan Royals prodigy, walked away with most of the awards: Most Valuable Player, Emerging Player of the Season, Super Striker of the Season, Orange Cap winner and Super Sixes of the Season. His fearless batting and remarkable consistency represent the new generation's bold approach to the shortest format of cricket. Yet, what stands out is not merely his talent but his maturity at such a young age. Sooryavanshi's ability to perform under pressure mirrors the very quality that has defined Kohli's success over the years.

The vast pool of talent showcased by the IPL augurs well for India, the reigning T20 world champions. The inclusion of this sport in the 2028 Olympics and the 2030 Commonwealth Games implies that the cricket-crazy nation can expect more laurels in the years to come.

Health Card is the Right of Every Employee“Government Must Clarify Issues Related to Teachers and Employees



“Vacant DEO and MEO Posts Should Be Filled: MLC Malka Komaraiah” Nacharam, Indian Chronicle, June 2:““Teacher MLC Malka Komaraiah demanded that the Telangana Government immediately clarify its policies regarding employee and teacher health security, salaries, pending issues, and the implementation of the Employees Health Care Trust (EHCT), and remove the doubts prevailing among employees and teachers.”“He was the chief guest at a meeting organized by the TPUS Teachers' Union in Nacharam, Hyderabad. Speaking on the occasion, he stated that a Health Card is the right of every employee and that it is unfair to deduct contributions from employees' salaries for its implementation. He urged the government not to impose any additional financial burden on employees and teachers in the name of EHCT and to implement the scheme only after issuing comprehensive guidelines.”“Komaraiah suggested that employee contributions towards the scheme should be collected only after the implementation of the Pay Revision Commission (PRC) and that the government should bear the financial burden until then.”“He also demanded that Health Cards be extended to permanent and temporary teachers and staff working in Model Schools, KGBVs, SSA, URS institutions, Tribal Ashram Schools, and Gurukul institutions. Considering their salary structure, the government should bear their contribution as well, he said.”“The MLC further demanded a written assurance from the government that funds collected under EHCT would be

utilized exclusively for healthcare services and not diverted to other purposes. He expressed concern that delays in implementing CPS matching grants have increased doubts among employees.”“He urged the government to ensure cashless treatment and OP services in all corporate hospitals through a transparent online system. He also called for the release of a list of empanelled hospitals in advance and the provision of dedicated ambulance and toll-free services for medical emergencies.”“Komaraiah requested that the dependent age limit for unmarried youth be increased to 35 years, contributions be reduced for families with fewer beneficiaries, and a fixed contribution system be adopted instead of linking contributions to basic pay.”“He also suggested establishing a dedicated helpline and toll-free number to resolve technical issues faced by employees and teachers and to facilitate regular updating of beneficiary details.”“On the occasion, he demanded that the Congress Government fulfill the promises made to 2003 DSC teachers, release six pending Dearness Allowances (DAs), and immediately announce the PRC Committee report. He also called for the clearance of pending bills and the release of a White Paper on the ₹2,000 crore payments that the government claims to have made.”“Referring to election promises, he urged the government to implement the Old Pension Scheme (OPS) for Telangana employees and teachers. ‘Slap on the face of judiciary’: Allahabad HC slams state officer for ignoring 2022 order

Expressing concern over non-compliance with its order, the Allahabad High Court observed that the moment litigants are permitted to treat judicial directions as optional, “the very foundation of constitutional governance begins to erode”. The observation came while the court was hearing a contempt plea filed by Ghazipur resident Radhey Shyam Yadav, who alleged that despite a 2022 interim order directing payment of his current salary during the pendency of his writ petition, the Deputy Inspector of Schools (DIOS) failed to comply. The present DIOS sought to justify the non-compliance on the ground that a stay-vacation application against the interim order was pending, a contention the court rejected. Taking a strong stance on the non-compliance of the order, a single bench of Justice Kshitij Shailendra observed in its order dated May 19, “The dignity and authority of Constitutional Courts is inseparably connected with public confidence in the justice delivery system. When judicial orders are openly violated without consequence, the common citizen begins to lose faith in the efficacy of law itself.” It added, “... The perception inevitably emerges that court orders are incapable of enforcement and may safely be ignored until the end of endless litigation. Such a situation would indeed amount to making a mockery of the legal system and symbolically placing a slap upon the face of the judiciary.”

Yadav had filed a writ petition in 2017 seeking payment of his salary. On April 18, 2022, the writ court directed the then DIOS to ensure payment. A special appeal challenging the order was later dismissed as withdrawn. During the contempt proceedings, the present DIOS filed an affidavit stating that a stay-vacation application had been filed on behalf of the State on May 12, 2022, and that a listing application had been moved on May 13 this year. On that basis, a request was made to defer further proceedings in the contempt plea until the stay-vacation application was decided. The bench of Justice Shailendra, however, said four years had elapsed since the interim order was passed and

the contempt application has also been pending for the same period.

It said the facts of the present case and nature of the interim order are slightly different as it was directed that the petitioner shall be paid his current salary during pendency of the writ petition. The bench said, “There is nothing on record to indicate that the State ever pressed its stay vacation application since 2022... It is only on May 13, 2026, immediately after this court directed personal appearance of the DIOS in a case of non-compliance within a month from April 9, that a listing application was filed in the writ petition on behalf of the State.”

The stay vacation application has been pending for the last four years and no effort was made to get it listed or argued, it added. Emphasising the importance of compliance with judicial orders, the court observed: “The majesty of law does not survive merely by passing of judicial orders. It survives because such orders command obedience. An order of a Constitutional Court is neither a mere advisory opinion nor a decorative piece of paper to be admired and ignored at convenience. It carries with it the full authority of the Constitution and the solemn mandate of the rule of law.”

“If mere filing of an application were treated as a licence to violate court orders, every contemnor would conveniently avoid compliance by instituting repetitive applications and then taking shelter behind the pendency thereof,” added the court. The bench also stated that the Allahabad High Court is burdened with cases, as “around 400, 500, 600 and sometimes more than 800 cases are listed every day before every judge and sometimes it takes... decades in disposing of the matters”. “People all around may expect such overburdened judges to become ever-working super robots or super computers or super-human beings. If during such pendency, parties are permitted to openly defy operative directions, the administration of justice would descend into chaos and anarchy. The law does not countenance such audacity,” observed the bench. It observed that contempt jurisdiction exists precisely to prevent such collapse of judicial authority. “Constitutional Courts are guardians of legality and their orders cannot be permitted to become dead letters awaiting uncertain fate for years or decades while parties continue to act in brazen violation thereof,” the bench observed. The bench, in its order, stated that the “opposite party is guilty of committing contempt of the order dated April 18, 2022 so as to warrant further proceedings in this matter”. The court listed the hearing for July 8 for framing of charges against the DIOS, directing him to be present in court personally. The court also said it is not inclined to defer proceedings as it is more than satisfied that “mere filing/pendency of the stay vacation application does not ipso facto (by the fact itself) amount to vacation of interim order”.

Doctor found dead in Chandigarh medical college washroom, probe underway

A doctor was found dead in a washroom of the Trauma Centre at Government Medical College and Hospital (GMCH), Sector 32, in Chandigarh. The deceased was identified as Dr Yogesh, a junior resident from the department of internal medicine. The hospital authorities informed the doctor's parents, who are on their way from their hometown, Jalandhar, to Chandigarh. According to preliminary information, the doctor was found dead inside the washroom during duty hours. Hospital authorities alerted the police, who rushed to the spot and initiated an investigation. The body was later shifted for a post-mortem examination. The police are probing the matter from all angles, and the circumstances leading to the death are yet to be established. The incident left his colleagues and staff members in shock, with many gathering outside the Trauma Centre after learning of his death. The police stated that statements from hospital staff and family members will be recorded as part of the investigation. Further details are awaited as the investigation is ongoing.

From specially designed enclosures and modified diets to continuous health check-ups and a regular dose of multivitamins, the Manikdoh Leopard Rescue Centre (MLRC) in Maharashtra has pulled out all the stops for its veteran residents—Vishnu and Guru, two male leopards who have completed a decade at the Junnar facility. Rescued from human-wildlife conflict situations in 2016, the leopards have been under the long-term care of the Maharashtra Forest Department and rescue organisation Wildlife SOS. “Vishnu and Guru’s lives at the centre highlight the importance of long-term rehabilitation for animals affected by conflict,” says Smita Rajhans, Assistant Conservator of Forests, Junnar Forest Division, adding that the forest department’s partnership with Wildlife SOS reflects a shared commitment to addressing human-wildlife conflict through science-based management, rescue, and long-term rehabilitation.

Vishnu arrived from Khamundi village, followed by Guru from Dingore village, both as adult leopards after repeated conflict incidents. Due to their history, returning them to the wild was not considered a viable option, highlighting the increasing pressure on leopard habitats across Maharashtra as forests continue to shrink and human settlements expand. Now approximately 17 years old, Vishnu is known for his strict routines and shy personality. He spends his days running energetically through his enclosure and his nights resting atop his favourite wooden platform. Guru, approximately 16, is far bolder and commanding, often seen patrolling his enclosure, scent-marking and scratching logs, before indulging in his favourite post-meal ritual. “Since their relocation, they have been maintained in a protected facility under continuous care and supervision. With advancing age, their physical condition has gradually declined, and management practices have been adapted accordingly,” Rajhans explains. “Their enclosures are designed with environmental enrichment features such as natural vegetation and shaded areas, and cooling systems, including foggers, are used to mitigate heat stress. Due to age-related dental wear and reduced bite strength, their diet is modified to include softer, easily consumable food items. The animals are also subjected to regular veterinary examinations to monitor their overall health and well-being,”

she adds. Kartick Satyanarayan, co-founder and CEO of Wildlife SOS, says that Vishnu’s and Guru’s journeys reflect the reality of increasing human-leopard conflict across India. “These are animals that could not be returned to the wild, and providing them with long-term care, safety and dignity remains our responsibility,” he adds. Leopards Junnar rescue Maharashtra Guru, approximately 16 years old, is bold and commanding. He is often seen patrolling his enclosure, before indulging in his favourite post-meal ritual.

Geeta Seshamani, co-founder and secretary of Wildlife SOS, adds that what stands out most, watching Vishnu and Guru over the years, is how they have distinct personalities. “One is so devoted to his routine and the other fearless and confident. Over time, our team has learnt to understand their individual needs and ensure they receive the highest standard of care,” Seshamani observes. As ageing big cats, both leopards now receive specialised geriatric care, including multivitamin supplements, regular veterinary monitoring and assessments for age-related conditions such as joint mobility and dental health. The leopard crisis in the Junnar Forest Division has intensified over the years, with both rescue numbers and human fatalities rising across the Manchar, Otur, Shirur and Junnar ranges. Forest department data in the last six months show that at least 175 leopards were rescued in the division, with the highest concentration in Shirur (75). Meanwhile, there have been 56 fatalities since 2001. Of these, 21 people died in the last two years due to the human-leopard conflict. The Manikdoh Leopard Rescue Centre, which was established by the Maharashtra Forest Department in collaboration with Wildlife SOS to provide long-term care and shelter to leopards orphaned, injured or displaced due to human-wildlife conflict, currently has the capacity to house 90 leopards. According to Rajhans, efforts are underway to expand the facility to accommodate an additional 46 leopards. “Twenty leopards have already been transferred to the Vantara Wildlife Rescue and Conservation Centre in Jamnagar, and another 30 are scheduled to be moved there. We have also received requests from zoos across the country, including those in Bihar and Arunachal Pradesh, and plan to send at least 17 leopards to these facilities. Until these transfers take place, the leopards are being housed in cages at smaller locations,” explains Rajhans.

Seven years, three rejections: How an IPS officer took his fight to quit his job all the way to Supreme Court

After a nearly seven-year-long legal and administrative battle, Maharashtra-cadre IPS officer Abdur Rahman, 53, may finally be able to take voluntary retirement from service (VRS), the Supreme Court set aside a Central government order of 2019 rejecting Rahman’s plea for VRS, which cited pending disciplinary action against him, including over participation in protests against the CAA. The apex court held that the government’s refusal of the IPS officer’s application suffered from “a non-application of mind”. It directed the Union Home Ministry to re-examine Rahman’s VRS notice afresh and pass appropriate orders within three months.

“No government should force an unwilling officer to continue working. Even when I moved applications stating that I did not wish to continue, the state kept manufacturing small issues to drag the matter,” says Rahman, a 1997-batch officer and an IIT-Kanpur graduate in civil engineering. Originally from Bihar, Rahman has served in several senior administrative positions across Maharashtra, including as Assistant Superintendent of Police in Latur, Superintendent of Police in Dhule, Additional Commissioner of Police (Administration) in Pune City, and Inspector General of Police in the Maharashtra State Human Rights Commission.

Rahman, who briefly explored entering politics before deciding against it ahead of the 2024 Lok Sabha elections, believes the Centre’s resistance to his VRS plea stemmed solely from his opposition to the CAA. “It was my anti-CAA statements that made me a target.” However, it is not the first time Rahman filed for VRS. His first application was in 2017, two years after he wasn’t made Special Inspector General of Police and felt he was overlooked. But, soon after, Rahman decided to pursue the matter with the Central Administrative Tribunal (CAT), and withdrew his VRS plea. Then in March 2018, Rahman submitted a second VRS application. The Union Home Ministry rejected it on the ground that he didn’t have Vigilance clearance, citing disciplinary proceedings going back to 2007. These proceedings stemmed from delay in providing RTI information on a FIR registered during Rahman’s tenure as Yavatmal Superintendent of Police. Rahman maintained the information sought had been supplied twice through post, and that failure to communicate this was a clerk’s lapse and not evidence of any misconduct on his part. He also alleged that the ‘major penalty chargesheet’ against him in the matter, in November 2015, was “manufactured” solely to block his promotion to Special Inspector General in 2017. The RTI-related proceedings were eventually closed and Rahman was promoted in 2019.

His third VRS application, submitted on August 1, 2019, was cleared by the Maharashtra government in October

2019. The state government said it had reviewed the complaints pending against him, and added: “... it is seen that chargesheet is not issued in any case & disciplinary proceedings are only contemplated. Also it seems to be (that) no major penalty will be imposed on the Officer.” But, nine days later, the Centre again blocked VRS for Rahman, citing the disciplinary proceedings despite Maharashtra’s go-ahead – over alleged violation of service rules in a family matter, and over a speech delivered by Rahman in March 2019 at the launch of his book ‘Denial and Deprivation: Indian Muslims after the Sachar Committee and Rangnath Mishra Commission Reports’. Even as these matters were pending, Rahman publicly announced his decision to quit government service after the CAA was passed by Parliament in December 2019, calling it “against the basic features of the Constitution”. He also participated in anti-CAA protests leading up to the passage of the Bill.

This led to the third chargesheet against Rahman, in April 2022, pertaining to allegedly unauthorised absence from duty, publishing information related to his VRS application on social media, and participating in protests against the CAA. Rahman first approached the CAT against the denial of VRS, but his plea was rejected in December 2023, with the tribunal citing pending complaints and possible disciplinary proceedings against him. He then moved the High Court, which also dismissed his challenge in July 2024, ruling that the Centre had the final authority to accept or reject VRS applications and that departmental proceedings against him were already under contemplation at the time. Rahman then approached the Supreme Court. In its order asking the Centre to clear his application, the apex court observed that when it rejected VRS for Rahman, there was no formal chargesheet against him, meaning no disciplinary proceedings were actually pending at the time. The Court also said that of the three complaints cited against him, only one was validly under contemplation and that the Centre had failed to properly consider the Maharashtra government’s view that the complaint was unlikely to result in a major penalty. At the same time, the Court said that the authority to accept or reject VRS applications of IPS officers remained with the Centre. Rahman says he doesn’t regret his actions, and intends to continue working on issues concerning the socio-economic condition of Muslims and other marginalised communities. “My emphasis is to create awareness among socially downtrodden groups, including Muslims.” While he is relieved after the Supreme Court order, Rahman adds, he will rejoice only once his VRS is formally approved. “Life was comfortable in service, but at times you realise you can do far more for people outside the system. I am happy with the Supreme Court verdict asking the government to reconsider my VRS application. I would have been happier had the Court directly granted me VRS,” he says.

Thieves sneak into Bengaluru PG, steal 8 phones from sleeping residents

Two unidentified men allegedly walked into a men’s paying guest (PG) accommodation in south Bengaluru early on May 29 and stole eight mobile phones that had been left charging beside sleeping residents, the police said on Monday. The theft was reported at Sai Aradhya Luxury PG for Gents on Kudlu Main Road in Hosapalya, under the Bandepalya police station limits. Investigators said the hostel did not have a security guard on duty at the time of the theft, making it easier for the suspects to enter and leave unnoticed.

According to the complaint filed by Darshan, a cab driver staying at the PG, he returned from work around 11 pm on May 28 and plugged in his two mobile phones for charging before going to sleep. Several other residents in his room and adjoining rooms had also left their phones on charge overnight. “When Darshan woke up around 6 am the next day, both his phones were missing. A check by other residents revealed that eight mobile phones had disappeared from different rooms in the hostel,” said an officer. The police said CCTV footage from the building showed two men entering the premises during the night and moving through the hostel floors before leaving with the stolen devices. “The suspects appear to have targeted phones that were left

charging near the beds. Preliminary investigation suggests they moved from room to room and took advantage of doors that had not been locked from the inside. The residents were asleep, and most of them realised their phones were missing only in the morning. We are analysing CCTV footage and working to identify the accused,” the officer added. A case has been registered at Bandepalya police station under relevant sections of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, and further investigation is underway. The police said such thefts are common in PG accommodations, where residents often leave room doors unlocked to allow roommates or friends returning late at night to enter without disturbing others. “Many residents either keep the doors unlocked or leave spare keys near the entrance, under doormats, or in other easily accessible locations. Thieves often take advantage of these practices,” a senior officer said. The police have advised PG residents to ensure that all occupants of a room have separate keys rather than relying on unlocked doors or shared spare keys. “If two people are sharing a room, both should ideally have a key. Residents should avoid leaving keys near doorsteps or in common hiding spots as these locations are usually the first places checked by offenders. Basic precautions such as locking doors from inside and securing valuables can significantly reduce the risk of theft,” the officer added.

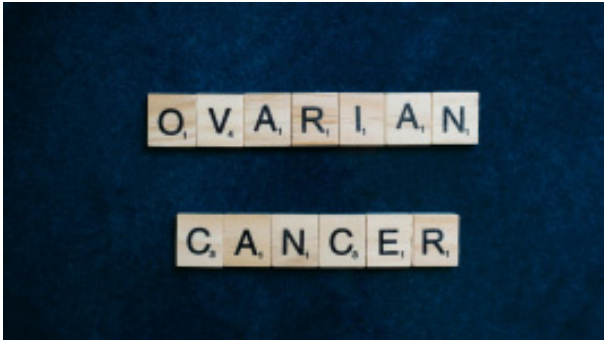
Kapil Lawaniya turned 25 on May 25. But this birthday was more special. This May 25, Kapil appeared for an interview for the position of a scientific officer at the Bhabha Atomic Research Centre (BARC). His family said the interview panel told Kapil that he would receive an offer letter soon. This joy, however, was short-lived. Kapil returned to Delhi, excited about his new role and eagerly waiting for the BARC letter. Five days after his interview, he met some friends at a makeshift eatery in Delhi’s Saidulajab to celebrate his achievement. A short while later, a building next to the eatery collapsed, burying the popular food joint. Kapil was among six people who died in the tragedy. A B.Tech graduate from Bharatpur, Rajasthan, Kapil dreamt of serving the country as a scientist. He was overjoyed after the BARC interview in Mumbai. In Delhi, he lived as a paying guest at Saidulajab and planned to treat his friends.

Minutes before the building collapsed on the evening of May 30, Kapil called his younger sister Ritika and told her he was going out to celebrate with his friends. “He spoke to me around 7.23 pm. He was in his room. At 7.55 pm, he called again and said he was injured and was being taken to the hospital. We could not understand what happened within a few minutes,” Ritika told The Indian Express over the phone, her voice choking.

The panel appeared satisfied with his performance and indicated that he would likely receive an offer letter soon. Immediately after the interview, he called me and his father. We congratulated him. It was also his birthday; he turned 25,” Mukesh said. Kapil’s father, Rajesh Lawaniya, runs a fertiliser business in Bharatpur. “I have lost everything. My son was the hope of our entire family. No one in our family ever came close to becoming a scientist. He told us he had been selected for the post of Scientific Officer. The offer letter would have arrived in a few days,” Rajesh said. “While he was being taken to the hospital, he told me, ‘Papa, meri halat kharab hai, aap log aa jao’ (Papa, my condition is serious, please come). We immediately left for Delhi.” The family said Kapil was first taken to a nearby hospital. “We informed our relatives in Delhi. They rushed to the hospital and found him lying there without proper treatment for more than an hour.” Later, Kapil was referred to Safdarjung Hospital, where he was declared dead on arrival. “We reached the hospital around midnight, and the body was handed over. Is this why we sent our child to Delhi for studies?” he asked. Police have arrested the building’s 71-year-old owner, Karambir Sejwal. Sejwal’s family owns several properties in Saidulajab and has rented them out to businesses and individuals, police said. Structures in this area cannot have more than ground plus three storeys, but two additional floors were being built in the building that fell.

Mumbai: The rupee appreciated 35 paise to close at 95.25 (provisional) against the US dollar on Monday, registering the third straight session of gain, on optimism that the US and Iran were moving close to a peace deal even though they remained at odds over key issues, including blockades on the Strait of Hormuz. Forex traders said the rupee registered its third straight session of gain after RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra, in a media interaction, said that the central bank will do "whatever is required" to ensure orderly price discovery in the forex market.

How India’s UAE gold trade deal may have made its import bill concerns worse



As the effects of an energy shock from the West Asian crisis, now in its third month, reverberate globally, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday asked citizens to take measures to reduce the consumption of petroleum products and conserve foreign exchange reserves. He suggested reviving COVID-era measures, such as work-from-home arrangements, and avoiding non-essential foreign travel and gold purchases for a year.

The Prime Minister’s caution about gold purchases comes amid heightened risk of weakening macro fundamentals if the crisis drags on. The domestic currency, under pressure since late last year due to weakening foreign investment in the country in the backdrop of steep US tariffs, slipped to a record low of \$95.63 against the US dollar on Tuesday as crude prices remained above \$100 a barrel due to a standstill in traffic via the Strait of Hormuz. Oil prices have surged nearly 50% since before the Iran war. However, this is not the first instance when the citizens have been asked to voluntarily stop gold purchases. In 2013, the then Finance Minister P Chidambaram had made similar appeals, even raising the customs duty on gold imports from 6% to 10% between May and August 2013 in the middle of this rupee turmoil after the ‘taper tantrum’ in the backdrop of the 2008 global financial crisis. The duty on gold is currently at 6%.

Economists point out that India’s heavy reliance on imported gold, close to 750 tonnes every year with negligible export offsets, has repeatedly emerged as a macro-economic concern, especially during external shocks. Since gold accounts for a substantial share of the country’s import bill, any sharp rise in purchases tends to widen the Current Account Deficit (CAD), put pressure on foreign exchange reserves and complicate the management of the rupee and inflation, especially during periods of external uncertainty. Offering concessions to the UAE as part of a trade deal seems to have catalysed a spurt in imports of gold from that country, according to experts. Structural challenges in the gold supply chain

India’s gold import in FY26 had jumped by nearly 25% to \$71.97 billion, compared to \$58 billion in the previous financial year. This was largely due to the value of gold prices, with gold imports in FY26 falling to 721.04 tonnes compared to 757.09 tonnes in the previous financial year, data released by the Commerce and Industry Ministry showed. Gold prices have surged over 40% in the last year, inflating the import bill. A working paper by IIM Ahmedabad titled ‘Strategic Acquisition and Value Addition of Gold Resources for India’ said that with an annual demand of approximately 750 tonnes, India stands as one of the world’s largest gold consumers. However, India’s domestic production capabilities, a mere 1.5 tonnes annually, create one of the country’s most persistent macroeconomic challenges. “Despite these challenges, India’s approach to gold management has remained largely unchanged for decades, focusing primarily on demand-side interventions with limited success. Import duty adjustments have inadvertently fueled smuggling and prompted trade diversions through countries with preferential tariff structures, particularly Least Developed Countries,” the report authored by Sundaravalli Narayanaswami and

Anmaya Agarwal said.

The IIM paper pointed out that the fundamental supply-demand imbalance necessitates massive imports, chiefly as finished bullion (approximately 500 tonnes) and doré (essentially the semi-pure alloy of gold and silver created at mine sites; approximately 250 tonnes), though these proportions remain somewhat fluid. The import structure is heavily skewed toward finished products, significantly limiting domestic value addition opportunities. “Policy initiatives have sometimes exacerbated this challenge, as evidenced by the UAE trade deal agreement that inadvertently incentivised bullion imports over doré by creating a more favourable tariff structure for the former... the deal with the UAE has created unintended consequences by inverting the intended duty differential between bullion and doré,” the report said. Giving concessions to the UAE for importing gold from the country under the deal has inflated the import bill, as India does not source gold from countries that offer prices cheaper than market value and lacks refining capacity. Certain countries, such as Argentina, Peru, and the Dominican Republic, supply gold at below-average import costs. But these countries collectively represent only 15% of India’s total gold imports. “Alternative gold sources show promising development, with imports of gold ores and concentrates increasing (primarily from Colombia, with emerging volumes from Taiwan and Peru) and gold colloidal and compounds growing substantially (with Japan emerging as the dominant supplier),” the paper said.

Several countries, such as Switzerland, that do not produce gold have become gold trading hubs on the back of refining infrastructure. Using world-class London Bullion Market Association (LBMA) refineries, they have transformed low-cost gold doré into high-purity bullion for global distribution. This refining process generates approximately 40% value addition, neutralising trade deficit concerns through substantial high-value exports, the report pointed out. Japan, for instance, has 11 LBMA refineries which recycle roughly 500 tonnes of gold scrap annually to sustain massive export capacities. They exploit “urban mining” by recovering metals from electronic waste, which contains far higher gold concentrations than primary ore, the IIM paper pointed out. India has only one LBMA refinery. While global gold trading hubs have used refining capacity to close vulnerabilities around gold imports, India’s gold refineries remain underutilised and lack the required policy support. A Niti Aayog report released last month found that, unlike established global hubs such as Switzerland and the UAE, which benefit from favourable policy regimes, large-scale operations, and deep integration with international markets, India’s gold-refining ecosystem continues to face multiple bottlenecks. Historically, the duty structure has not sufficiently incentivised refining, with only a narrow differential between doré and refined gold. While a modest advantage existed between 2013 and 2016, subsequent duty rationalisation under GST and post-2021 adjustments shrank margins for refiners, leading to closures. At the same time, capacity remains fragmented, while the number of refineries increased from fewer than five in 2013 to about 33 in ? most remain small operations under 50 tonnes annually, limiting economies of scale,” the Trade Watch Quarterly report said. Global integration is also constrained by limited international accreditation, with only one LBMA-accredited refinery, restricting access to global financial markets and reducing India’s ability to position itself within international supply chains, the report said. “These challenges are compounded by financial and operational constraints, including high working capital requirements, limited access to capital, regulatory complexities, and informal operations. Countries like Switzerland and Hong Kong are top gold exporters, with estimates stating that Switzerland alone refines 70% of the world’s gold, and this position is the result of the top refineries and their role in finance. Similarly, Hong Kong is the primary conduit for gold flows in and out of China, along with being a centre for financial trading in Western markets,” the Niti report said.

The unravelling of a suspected leak in the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test (NEET-UG), 2026, in Rajasthan began with an automated fine print on a WhatsApp message: “Forwarded many times.” When investigators following the trail of a “guess paper” stumbled upon this WhatsApp message, they realised that what they hoped was an isolated leak was much larger in scale.

Officials of the Rajasthan Special Operations Group (SOG), which had been investigating the case before the CBI took charge on Tuesday, said that they found a WhatsApp group named ‘Private Mafia’, where the said paper was being circulated and had members who had paid various amounts, beginning from around Rs 5,000, to join the group. However, despite strict “instructions” from the group administrators not to share the paper, it was circulated far and wide. Officials said that preliminary investigation had indicated that the paper may have leaked from Nashik, Maharashtra. Nashik police officials said they have picked up a medical student, identified as Shubham Khairnar (30), who allegedly managed to obtain the question paper days before the exam and shared it further. Kishor Kale, Deputy Commissioner of Police, Nashik City, said that Shubham’s questioning indicates that he “got the question paper from one of his associates in Pune”. “He received a physical copy of the question paper and transferred it to others as a soft copy,” Kale said, adding that it is being investigated whether this soft copy was the “guess paper” or the actual question paper. “He was a student of Bachelor of Ayurveda, Medicine and Surgery (BAMS) in Bhopal last year and stays in Nashik with his family. We received information from the Rajasthan SOG early Tuesday morning about taking him into custody. We apprehended him and brought him to the crime branch office. As per the preliminary inquiry, he was also a part of the (paper leak) syndicate. We are now transferring him to the CBI,” Kale said. But he insisted that “rumours of paper leaking from Nashik are baseless” and that “the paper wasn’t printed here.” Kirankumar Chauhan, Deputy Commissioner of Police, Nashik, said, “The accused had changed his appearance by cutting his hair, making identification difficult. However, based on technical analysis and police investigation, the Crime Branch team managed to trace and detain him.” Officials suspect he purchased the paper for Rs 10 lakh and later sold it for Rs 15 lakh.

Shubham is alleged to have shared the paper with people in Gurgaon and elsewhere, with copies eventually

reaching Rajasthan, Kerala, Bihar, Uttarakhand, Jammu and Kashmir, and possibly other states. Those who received it included students and career counsellors. One paper, many trails SOG officials also reached Sikar on Tuesday as part of their investigation, putting the spotlight on the district that has recently emerged as an alternative to Kota, especially for NEET coaching. SOG officials said their investigation also indicated that an MBBS student from Rajasthan’s Shekhawati, who is studying in Kerala, allegedly shared the paper with their father, who runs a paying-guest accommodation in Shekhawati, before the examination. This was shared further, spreading the leaked paper. Ajay Pal Lamba, the SOG Inspector General, said that more than 150 candidates, their friends and parents have been questioned so far. The SOG has also submitted a list of 150 students and about 70 parents, who allegedly received the paper, to the CBI. Additionally, two dozen key suspects have been handed over to the CBI, Lamba said. He said that the investigation has revealed that the accused allegedly conspired to sell the genuine question paper as “guess papers”. “Questioning several persons has pointed to an organised group. All these suspicious persons are being questioned by the CBI now. It is wrong to say that Rajasthan is the epicentre; it reached the state via other states. Before Rajasthan, it had reached a person near Gurgaon. It did not originate in Rajasthan,” he claimed, adding that so far, there is no link to gangs in Rajasthan that had earlier been linked to other paper leaks in the state. Before the messages circulating on WhatsApp blew the lid off the lead, sources said that a whistleblower in Rajasthan had approached the local police but did not get a positive response. He then wrote to the National Testing Agency, which verified the complaint, and the Rajasthan SOG eventually initiated a probe. Sources said that the whistleblower himself is now under scrutiny for allegedly receiving and sharing the question paper, and that he may have complained to avoid arrest once the leak became widespread. NTA Director General Abhishek Singh on Tuesday said the whistleblower had said he received a WhatsApp message before the exam in which a few questions matched those in the actual examination. Addressing journalists in Jaipur, Vishal Bansal, Additional Director General of Police, SOG, had earlier said that the “guess paper” had over 400 questions, of which around 120 appeared in the actual examination. “And this guess paper was with students’ weeks before the examination, as far back as a month,” he said, adding that it was being shared “as a .pdf file of about 150 pages with over 400 questions.”

Goa land grab case: ‘How did the dead sign sale deeds?’



Now, as parallel investigations by the SIT and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) continue, the scam has emerged as one of the largest land grabs in the state. At the heart of the investigation are 117 properties spanning nearly 1.5 lakh sqm across North Goa, an area equivalent to 21 football fields.

On a Sunday morning in April 2022, a hurried meeting was called at Our Lady of Miracles, a church on a small hillock in Badem village, a close-knit community of 45 houses in Assagao, in North Goa’s Bardez taluka. After Mass, the priest asked the parishioners to settle down. Christina Dias, 53, a lawyer and local resident, then laid bare an elaborate plot that had been quietly unfolding around them. Badem was the target of a criminal conspiracy, she said, one of the many villages across North Goa where vast tracts of land had allegedly been grabbed by real-estate agents in connivance with government officials. But it was what Dias told them next that shook the gathering: the dead had been signing sale deeds in the village for years, and over half of its properties had already changed hands.

As complaints poured in from Calangute, Parra, Anjuna, Pileme, Nerul and other villages in Bardez taluka, on June 15, 2022, the Goa government formed a seven-member Special Investigation Team (SIT), headed by the Superintendent of Police (Crime). According to land deeds, revenue documents and case and court records reviewed by The Indian Express, the land grab was part of a plot allegedly hatched by a group of real-estate brokers who used a trove of 500-year-old Portuguese-era land records to allegedly forge property titles. Now, as parallel investigations by the SIT and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) continue, the scam has emerged as one of the largest land grabs in the state. At the heart of the investigation are 117 properties spanning nearly 1.5 lakh sqm across North Goa, an area equivalent to 21 football fields. The scam was spun through three key loopholes: a largely Catholic population whose members had migrated over generations, leaving homes empty and unguarded; a real-estate boom that sent land prices in villages soaring; and an Archives department with poorly monitored and maintained records. In 2022, constituting an SIT in the state “for the first time ever to investigate matters of illegal land grabbing”, Goa Chief Minister Pramod Sawant said, “This has been happening for the last 20 years and it’s happening more over the last 15-20 years. Some people live abroad. Their properties are being illegally transferred to someone else... Goa, being one of the most sought-after destinations, has been the target of such criminals involved in illegal land grabbing.”

It was in early 2022 that residents in Badem started spotting “outsiders” surveying properties in the village: labourers fencing and clearing land, and contractors “threatening” owners. Speaking to The Indian Express, Dias, the local lawyer, pointed to property 78/2, where, in 2022, bouncers had allegedly set up sheds on a 18,500 sqm plot. Case records show the property was originally owned by Domingos Vincente De Souza and Maria Quitera De Souza. After their deaths, it had passed on to their children. The revenue records, however, told a different story. A sale deed purportedly executed on February 19, 1934, claimed the original owners sold the property to a couple, Antonio Martinho Diniz and Antonia Francisca Pereira. The document showed Domingos to be unmarried at the time. Except, in 1934, Domingos had been married for years. His youngest child Mary was born in June that year. (Express photo by Pavneet Singh Chadha) Another deed claimed the property was sold, bizarrely, to the same couple again in 1951.

Dias also spoke about property 39/6, co-owned by her relative Anacleto Vincent Monteiro. Revenue records, however, reflected a mutation proceeding with a new set of owners. Dias filed an objection and obtained certified copies of the mutation proceedings through RTI. The documents claimed Dias’s relative Monteiro, Miguel Arcanjo de Souza and other co-owners had executed a sale deed on November 26, 1951, in favour of the ancestors of the new owners. But, as Dias pointed out, Miguel had died in April 1951, nearly six months before “signing” the deed. Monteiro was 15 years old in 1951 and only became a co-owner through inventory proceedings in 2000, she said. “It was shocking to learn that my dead relative Miguel returned from his grave to execute this deed of sale,” Dias said. Anacleto Monteiro’s son Ashley, 50, remembers attending the church meeting. “Everyone was concerned. We were told that a set of people were trying to grab our ancestral properties through fraudulent means. The property was bequeathed to my father through inventory proceedings. It was shocking to hear that it had been sold by some third party, based on a forged sale deed. When the sale deed was supposedly executed, some co-owners were dead. How did the dead sign deeds?” he asked. Then, there is the case of “Aframanto or Quinze Adicoes”, a property in Badem spanning 2,942.5 square metres co-owned by Matilda Leopoldina Coutinho on the western portion and Eliterio Anthony Carvalho on the eastern portion. The western portion had been gifted to Matilda’s husband Simon Paul Coutinho by Jose Pedro Coutinho and his wife Maria Anton D’Souza via a deed of gift in 1974. The eastern portion was recorded in the name of Maria Joaqueina Carvalho and Pascoal Carvalho. Yet, a sale deed dated June 25, 1996, claimed the two women — Maria Anton D’Souza and Maria Joaqueina Carvalho — were “married to each other” and had jointly sold the property to one Diago Roberto Rodrigues. Maria Joaqueina Carvalho had died in 1991, five years before the purported transaction.

Advocate Augustus Monteiro, who was helping villagers compile the list of targeted properties, learnt that his own family property in Anjuna was on the radar. A purported sale deed from 1951 showed his wife, mother-in-law and sister-in-law as joint owners of eight properties in Anjuna and that they had ‘sold’ them to one Antonio Pereira. His mother-in-law, Esperenca Oliveira, was 12 years old in 1951 and had been listed in the deed as the daughter of her father-in-law. His wife and sister-in-law were not even born that year.

Tucked in a valley between Anjuna and Siolim, Badem

is a largely Catholic village with old houses bearing Goan balcaos (covered front porches), courtyards and laterite stone walls. Over the years, as many residents migrated abroad, their homes remained vacant. Paddy fields have given way to large villas, driven partly by an urban elite relocating to Goa after the pandemic and the resulting real estate boom.

After the church meeting, Dias asked every resident of the village to check the occupants’ column in Form 1 and XIV (documents with details of property ownership) in the revenue records on the Goa government’s Directorate of Settlement and Land Records website. Her team of eight then began quietly conducting inquiries at the offices of the mamlatdar and sub-registrar. They rushed to the Department of Archives and Archaeology in Panaji and found that more than half of Badem’s properties had allegedly been sold off by ‘dead ancestors’ to fictitious people using forged deeds and fraudulent mutation proceedings. Soon, boards went up across Badem: “Private Property. Not For Sale. Trespassers Will Be Prosecuted.” According to Dias, inquiries at the Department of Archives and Archaeology revealed that records had been tampered with. Pages 13 to 19 in book number 551, volume 328 of 1951, had been inserted and loosely bound with string; they were also shorter than the rest of the pages. An internal inquiry by the Archives department found that two genuine sale deeds had been removed from the register and four fake ones inserted, through which 45 properties had been targeted across Bardez taluka. “The dates of the deeds were not in chronological order, the pages of some deeds were shorter than the other pages in the books. There was a difference in handwriting. The paper quality, the shade of ink were different, there was a mismatch in the signature of the notary,” Dias said. With the scam exposed, the SIT made its first major arrest a week after it was formed in June 2022 — Vikrant Shetty, a 48-year-old real-estate broker. More arrests followed, including of Mohammed Suhail alias Michael, who is named in at least 13 FIRs and identified as the ‘mastermind’, and Rajkumar Maithi. While Suhail is in jail, Shetty and Maithi are out on bail. The ED, meanwhile, initiated a money laundering probe in July 2022, filing a prosecution complaint against 36 accused in 2024 and attaching properties worth over Rs 535 crore. Subsequently, the ED has filed four more prosecution complaints. In a disclosure statement, Suhail, the ED claimed, allegedly admitted to illegally acquiring more than 100 properties in Goa in the names of friends and associates over the last 15 years. Born in Chitradurga, Karnataka, the 49-year-old had dropped out after the third year of a BE programme in Honnavar and worked in his father’s tailoring business before turning to real-estate brokerage. Dismissing the ED’s allegations, Advocate Ritesh Rawal, who is representing Suhail, the main accused, said, “The matter is sub judice. Whether these statements [disclosures] are valid or not, or whether they can be corroborated, is a matter of trial. The ED proceedings are dependent on trial in the predicate offence. If the accused is proved to be innocent in the predicate offence, then there can be no PMLA conviction that can be attracted.”

Advocate Vibhav Amonkar, who has represented Suhail’s co-accused Shetty and Maithi, said, “The material at this juncture is highly insufficient to call anyone a mastermind. The investigation is ongoing and the trial will take its own course.” According to a senior police officer who was part of the SIT, the accused first identified vacant, unattended or dilapidated ancestral properties owned by people with common Goan surnames such as Fernandes, Rodrigues and D’Souza. The gang then allegedly obtained ownership and title information of properties from government offices, websites and the Registo de Agrimensor, a register maintained by Portuguese-era land surveyors. During the Portuguese regime, and for some time after Goa’s liberation in 1961, land deeds of all kinds were registered with notaries under the continental system of registration. In 1963, the powers of registration were transferred to sub-registrars and notary ex-officios under the Law Department, who took over the registers of deeds and wills from the old notaries. These books were subsequently handed over to the Department of Archives and Archaeology, which is today the custodian of archival records. The department holds over 3.2 lakh bound volumes, files and loose manuscripts containing approximately 3 crore folios, with the earliest record dating back to 1498.

Suhail allegedly told the ED that two sorters in the Archives department were paid Rs 15 lakh each to provide documents and pages of notarial books. The sorters would allegedly tear the original pages from the notarial books, and insert the new documents, showing forged sale deeds, in their place.

But the forgery required skill of a rare kind. The notarial deeds were typically in Portuguese and the forged pages, with details of the property changing hands, had to resemble the original script. According to the ED prosecution complaint, Suhail allegedly roped in his nephew Denver D’Souza, who was proficient in Portuguese, to reproduce the script. D’Souza also allegedly translated the Portuguese documents that were then used to draw succession deeds at sub-registrar offices, charging around Rs 15,000 per page. D’Souza is yet to be arrested. According to the ED, the main accused allegedly approached three Goan residents — Royson Rodrigues, Sandric Fernandes and Caetano Fernandes — and collected their personal documents, along with that of their ancestors, to forge succession records and land documents. The fabricated documents allegedly showed that the actual owners had long since sold the properties to the ancestors of the Goan residents. The mastermind then approached the sub-registrar offices at Canacona and Ponda to get succession certificates. Suhail also told investigators that three mamlatdars assisted him and were paid Rs 8 lakh in cash per property mutation. Advocate Anoop Gaoker, who is representing Royson, Sandric and Caetano, said, “The matter is sub judice before the courts.” While the investigation continues, back in Badem, the ordeal is far from over for Ashley Monteiro and other residents. “Though the properties are attached, the names of the original owners are still not reflecting in the revenue records. We are now forced to run from pillar to post to restore ownership and possession of properties which were snatched from us. I lost my father in 2024. He was a heart patient and all this stress took a toll on him,” he said. Across the village, the boards are still up: “Private Property. Not For Sale. Trespassers Will Be Prosecuted.” Target properties: Identify vacant properties, mainly with absentee or foreign-based owners; collect title details from govt offices, surveyor registers/Forge land deeds: Fabricate Portuguese-era sale deeds, showing original owners selling to accused’s ancestors. Bribe Archives department staff to insert fake pages into notarial books, supply certified copiesEstablish inheritance: Use forged deeds to obtain fraudulent succession certificates from sub-registrar offices, impersonating legal heirs of fictional buyersFudge & sell: Bribe local revenue officials to delete original owners’ names from revenue records and substitute the accused’s associates. Execute nominal first sale deed to legalise the title, sell to unsuspecting buyers

SEBI currently mulling changes to deepen debt markets, make it more accessible: Chairman Tuhin Kanta Pandey



The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) is currently exploring a host of measures to deepen the debt markets and improve the market architecture to make it more accessible for the retail audience, Chairman Tuhin Kanta Pandey said on Tuesday. Labeling the corporate bond market as the economy's "second engine" for credit, Pandey said a deeper bond market is essential for financing economic growth. "India's financing model for businesses is still predominantly bank-led. A growing economy needs patient debt capital – for infrastructure, capacity expansion, refinancing, and long-gestation projects. It needs price discovery across tenures and credit profiles. That is why the corporate debt market is central to India's journey of sustained economic growth," said Pandey. He was speaking at CareEdge Ratings' Debt Summit in Mumbai.

SEBI is mulling a host of changes to the debt-market architecture to simplify it and make it more accessible. The regulator is currently exploring a pilot to tokenize corporate bonds, which would involve converting traditional corporate bonds into smaller and more accessible digital tokens. "The pilot will test whether tokenization can deliver faster settlement, better traceability, automated servicing, and greater transparency. We must move carefully – but we must remain open to useful innovation," the SEBI chair said. SEBI is also exploring a distinct regulatory classification for debt brokers, which could lower costs, reduce entry barriers, and encourage dedicated intermediaries for the debt market. The regulator is also working to further develop bond exchange-traded funds and derivatives on corporate bond indices, which could help in improving liquidity, allow retail investors with smaller ticket sizes to explore the market, and help institutions hedge against interest-rate risks.

As the war in West Asia has dragged on, market par-

ticipants have increasingly dived into the debt markets in order to hedge against heightened geopolitical risks. Overnight index swaps, a type of interest rate derivative, have particularly helped market participants hedge against interest rate risks as inflationary pressures due to the ongoing war have revved up discussions of potential hikes in interest rates by the central bank in the upcoming months. "There is also a need to review whether debt-only listed entities need the same rigour under LODR regulations as equity-listed companies. We will take up this review in due course," Pandey added. Alongside these, Pandey said the regulator is also looking to run bond market awareness campaigns for retail audiences, work to widen the base of bond issuers, and deepen the municipal bond market. "The way ahead is not one road. It is a network of reforms – market making, municipal bonds, securitization, bond ETFs and derivatives, tokenization, and investor education. Together, these reforms can build a bond market that finances India's growth at scale – with transparency and trust," Pandey said.

However, he also underlined the need for caution while implementing these changes. "SEBI will facilitate market development, support innovation, and simplify where possible. But we will not compromise on investor protection or market integrity. Our goal is not merely a bigger bond market.

Our goal is a better bond market – one that finances growth, supports resilience, protects trust, and serves Viksit Bharat," said Pandey. He also reiterated the potential risks for investors delving into the bond market. "For investors, corporate bonds can offer income and diversification. But they are not risk-free. They carry credit risk, interest-rate risk, and liquidity risk. Growth must therefore be anchored in transparency, suitability, and investor education," he said.

Corporate margins in FY27 may fall by 200 bps due to West Asia crisis: Crisil

The prolonged supply-chain disruptions triggered by the ongoing West Asia conflict are expected to significantly dent corporate profitability this fiscal year, according to a report from rating agency Crisil. Operating profitability of Indian companies could decline by nearly 200 basis points from the pre-conflict estimate of 12%, with some sectors seeing a more pronounced impact, it said. The protracted conflict in West Asia has been goading domestic companies to realign supply chains, navigate pricing issues, manage higher fuel and freight costs and contend with a depreciating rupee, the rating firm said in a report. The decline in profitability reflects the mounting pressure from higher logistics costs, delayed shipments and volatile commodity prices.

"For companies, managing costs and profitability will be a bigger challenge than achieving topline growth. Of the 34 sectors stress-tested, 22 would see operating profitability being culled more than 10% due to higher inventory costs and inability to fully pass on the burden to consumers immediately," said Subodh Rai, Managing Director, Crisil Ratings. With the conflict and disruptions into their third month and the situation still evolving, Crisil conducted a stress test of 34 sectors, which account for 65% of its rated corporate debt. "We have assumed supply-chain disruptions could last for nine months this fiscal (compared with six months in our base case), with crude oil prices averaging \$110 per barrel for this fiscal (versus a base case assumption of \$95)," Crisil said. Crisil said it assessed the impact on sectoral revenue, operating profitability and the resilience provided by balance-sheet strength to determine the impact on credit quality. From a credit-quality perspective, however, Crisil analysis shows India Inc will remain resilient on the back of strong balance sheets, steady domestic demand and government-led capital expenditure, enabling it to navigate profitability pressures stemming from the lingering geopolitical uncertainties. On the other hand, even a partial pass-through can drive up realisations, re-



sulting in a lower impact on revenue growth for most sectors. Further, credit profiles will be cushioned by controlled gearing levels and sustained domestic demand, it said.

"Consequently, we foresee the credit quality of only eight sectors, accounting for 10% of our rated corporate debt, being materially impacted," Rai said. Over the past decade, corporate India's median gearing has halved to 0.5 time as of March 2026, while interest coverage has doubled to over 5 times. Consequently, robust balance-sheets are providing sufficient headroom for India Inc to navigate the profitability pressures emanating from the West Asia conflict, thereby keeping credit profiles resilient. Balance-sheet strength should sustain this fiscal, even as working capital needs inch up, Crisil said. Credit quality has been supported by policy interventions in times of non-linear events such as the Covid-19 pandemic and the tariff tribulations last year. The recently announced Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme (ECLGS) 5.0 is timely in supporting MSMEs – characterised by limited balance-sheet buffers and consequently higher vulnerability to the West Asia conflict – by alleviating credit quality pressures. "Our overall outlook for India Inc's credit quality remains stable but cautious," Crisil said.

Salman Khan doesn't 'touch rotis,' completes protein alongside 'one tablespoon of rice'

Salman Khan, 60, who recently shared a glimpse of his chiselled physique, has now opened up about his meals, saying he completes his protein intake with a tablespoon of rice. "Every day is a cheat day for me. I'd rather spend that extra 20 minutes in the gym or the extra one hour in the gym, but I'll eat what I'll eat. I don't do steamed," he told Variety India on their YouTube channel. The Sultan actor continued, "The amount of protein that I need to eat, I just eat...no matter how tasty the food is...I will take one tablespoon of rice. I don't touch rotis. That's it. And then whatever protein I need, I try to finish it with that one tablespoon of rice."

Salman Khan's statement reflects a reality many fitness-conscious people relate to: sustainability matters more than strict dieting. What stands out is not the cheat meal confession but the portion control and protein-rich eating pattern that he described. "Limiting refined carbohydrates, like large portions of rice or rotis, while focusing on protein can help with fullness, blood sugar stability, and muscle maintenance, especially for active individuals," said Dr Vijay Negalur, HoD diabetology, KIMS Hospitals, Thane. However, what works for a highly active celebrity with intense workout routines may not directly apply to the average person with a sedentary lifestyle, stress, poor sleep, or metabolic issues, he contended.

Is cutting carbs entirely a healthy strategy?

Carbohydrates are often misunderstood. The body still

needs good-quality carbs for energy, gut health, and hormonal balance. "The issue usually lies in the excess quantity and poor-quality carbs—refined flour, sugary foods, oversized portions, and frequent snacking. For people at risk of diabetes or insulin resistance, reducing carb intake can improve glucose control, but eliminating carbs is rarely necessary. In Indian diets, especially, balance is more practical than restriction.

Smaller portions of rice or roti paired with protein, fibre, and healthy fats usually work better long-term than complete avoidance," said Dr Negalur. Can exercise offset indulgences to some extent?

Physical activity does improve insulin sensitivity and helps the body use glucose more effectively. However, there is a common misconception today that intense workouts can completely "cancel out" unhealthy eating patterns. "Nutrition and exercise work together; one cannot fully take the place of the other," said Dr Negalur.

What to note?

The biggest lesson is consistency, not perfection. "Sustainable eating habits, enough protein, portion awareness, regular movement, and enjoying food without guilt are much healthier than constantly cycling between crash diets and binge eating. Celebrity routines can inspire people, but they should not serve as a template without considering individual health needs, age, activity level, and metabolic profile."

First India-bound LNG tanker via Strait of Hormuz arrives in Gujarat

A liquefied natural gas (LNG) tanker that crossed the Strait of Hormuz over the weekend arrived at Gujarat's Dahej on Tuesday, marking the first LNG cargo to reach India from the Persian Gulf in over two-and-a-half months of the strait's effective closure due to the West Asia war, ship tracking data shows. The Liberia-flagged tanker Al Hamra, carrying about 62,000 tonnes of LNG from Abu Dhabi National Oil Company's (ADNOC) Das Island export facility in the Persian Gulf will be discharging its cargo at Petronet LNG's Dahej terminal, the largest LNG import terminal in India. As of 2 pm Tuesday, the tanker was stationed at one of the LNG discharge jetties of the Dahej terminal, according to data and visuals from ship tracking and maritime intelligence firm MarineTraffic.

As per trade sources, the cargo belongs to government-owned gas major GAIL. The tanker is owned and operated by an ADNOC arm—ADNOC Logistics and Services—as per global shipping databases. While the cargo is equivalent to about a day's worth of India's LNG imports, Al Hamra's arrival has built hopes of more LNG supplies coming to India from the Persian Gulf, which lies to the west of the Strait of Hormuz.

Trade sources indicated that Al Hamra was not transmitting its location for days by turning off its transponder. In shipping parlance, this behaviour is referred to as "going dark" and is used by vessels to avoid detection. Many of the vessels that have successfully crossed the Strait of Hormuz since early March have done so by going dark for varying periods, with only a few transmitting their location while passing through the chokepoint. According to commodity market analytics firm Kpler, Al Hamra is one of three LNG tankers that crossed the critical maritime chokepoint over the weekend despite elevated geopolitical risk. The other two tankers—Fuwaairit and Al Rayyan—carried QatarEnergy cargoes bound for Pakistan and China, respectively. In the nearly three months of the West Asia conflict, which began with US-Israeli strikes on Iran, only seven vessels laden with LNG are estimated to have transited the fraught waters of the Strait of Hormuz. While about one-and-a-half dozen liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) and oil tankers have made their way to India from the Persian Gulf since early March, Al Hamra is the first LNG tanker to have arrived from there. New Delhi has been engaged with Tehran to get safe passage for India-bound vessels, particularly energy cargoes. Vessel movements through the Strait of Hormuz—the narrow waterway between Iran and Oman that connects the Persian Gulf with the Gulf of Oman and the Arabian Sea—are all but halted due to the West Asia conflict. The Strait is a major chokepoint for global energy flows, accounting for a fifth of international oil and LNG shipments.

India depends on LNG imports to meet about half of its natural gas requirement, and about 60% of those imports came through the strait, primarily from Qatar and the UAE. The two Gulf countries are major LNG exporters at the global level as well. With hardly any LNG cargoes from the Persian Gulf making their way to India, importers have been scrambling for LNG from alternative geographies amid



a global price surge. India's LNG imports rebounded a bit in April after faltering in March, as importers turned to suppliers that don't depend on the Strait of Hormuz to secure emergency spot cargoes. As a result, while not one LNG cargo reached Indian shores in March from the country's largest supplier Qatar and another major supplier, the UAE, the likes of Oman, Nigeria, Angola, and the United States (US) stepped in to partially bridge the gap.

According to Kpler data, LNG imports in April were 1.95 million tonnes, up from 1.67 million tonnes in March. The country's 2025 average monthly LNG imports stood at 2.08 million tonnes. On a year-on-year basis, April LNG imports were down 9.3% from 2.15 million tonnes in the year-ago period, which reflects that the supply shock was not fully offset and market conditions remained tight. In 2025, the average monthly LNG import volumes from Qatar stood at 0.95 million tonnes, followed by imports from the UAE at 0.27 million tonnes. In March-April, the Strait of Hormuz closure meant that just 0.06 million tonnes came from Qatar and 0.13 from the UAE during the two months. These were cargoes that had transited the strait before the West Asia war broke out. Supplies from Oman, which was the fourth largest supplier of LNG to India in 2025 with an average monthly flow of 0.18 million tonnes, jumped to 1.2 million in March-April, or 0.6 million tonnes a month on average. While Oman is located in West Asia, it has a sizable coastline facing the Arabian Sea and the Gulf of Oman, and doesn't depend on the Strait of Hormuz for the transit of its cargoes. Imports from the US, India's third-largest LNG supplier in 2025, rose to 0.31 million tonnes a month on average in March-April. The average monthly LNG imports from the US in 2025 were at 0.24 million tonnes. Average monthly imports from Nigeria and Angola jumped to 0.41 million tonnes and 0.24 million tonnes in March-April, respectively; the monthly average of imports from the two suppliers in 2025 was 0.14 million tonnes apiece. The month-over-month growth in LNG imports in April over March was likely due to higher gas use in a few sectors, particularly fertilisers. Following the disruption in LNG supplies due to Strait of Hormuz closure, the government had initially reduced gas allocation to the fertiliser sector to 70% of average consumption over the previous six months. It was part of a larger effort to manage natural gas supplies in order to prioritise the most critical sectors.

Why heart is among the most cancer-resistant organs: 'Highly vulnerable to...'

The heart is often viewed through the lens of disease risk — high blood pressure, heart attacks, blocked arteries, or heart failure. But according to cardiologist Dr Dmitry Yaranov, the heart has a surprisingly unusual characteristic: despite its importance and constant workload, it is among the organs least likely to develop cancer. In an Instagram post, Dr Yaranov, who specialises in heart failure, advanced heart failure, heart transplantation, and mechanical circulatory support, highlighted how uncommon primary heart cancers actually are. He stated, "The heart is actually one of the most cancer-resistant organs in the human body. Why? Unlike many tissues in the body, heart muscle cells divide very little after early life." He further explained that primary heart cancer is so rare that many cardiologists may never encounter a genuine case during their entire professional careers. According to Dr Yaranov, one of the key reasons may lie in the way heart cells function differently from those in many other organs. Fewer cell divisions may reduce the opportunities for cancer-causing mutations to occur. He also pointed to the heart's unique environment, noting that its constantly active, high-energy nature appears less favourable for tumour development. "That's why cancers of the lung, colon, breast, and prostate are dramatically more common than cancers that actually start in the heart," he added. However, resistance to cancer does not necessarily translate into complete protection. Dr Yaranov stressed that many of the same habits that raise cancer risk can also significantly affect heart health, including: Highlighting this overlap, he cautioned, "So while the heart may naturally resist cancer better than many organs, it remains highly vulnerable to the way we live. Protecting your heart and lowering cancer risk often starts with the exact same decisions." Why some organs appear naturally more resistant to cancer than others

Dr CM Nagesh, Senior Consultant Cardiologist and Medical Director Cardea Superspeciality Hospital, tells indianexpress.com, "Cancer is essentially a disease of uncontrolled cell growth. The more frequently cells divide, the greater the chance that genetic errors and mutations may occur." "Tissues such as the skin, lungs, and digestive tract are constantly renewing themselves, which means their cells divide more often. That repeated cycle increases the possibility of cancer-causing mutations," he explained. The heart behaves very differently. Its main functional cells, called cardiomyocytes, largely stop dividing soon after birth. "When the heart grows or adapts to stress, it typically does so by enlarging existing cells rather than creating many new ones," he said. Because these cells rarely replicate, the opportunity for DNA-copying errors becomes much smaller, helping explain why primary heart cancers are exceptionally rare. Dr Nagesh also noted that the heart's highly oxygenated environment and constant blood flow may reduce prolonged exposure of its tissues to potentially harmful substances. Symptoms or signs that could potentially indicate a problem involving the heart Although heart tumours are rare, Dr Nagesh said symptoms can develop because growths inside the heart may obstruct blood flow, interfere with electrical activity, or release fragments into the circulation. Position-related shortness of breath: Severe breathlessness that noticeably changes with posture, such as worsening when lying down. Unexplained fainting or dizziness: Sudden episodes without an obvious cause could suggest a temporary disruption of blood flow. New-onset irregular heartbeats or palpitations: Unexpected racing, fluttering, or skipped heartbeats may indicate interference with the heart's electrical system. Stroke-like symptoms or circulation problems: Fragments from certain tumours can travel through the bloodstream and block blood vessels. Persistent general symptoms: Ongoing fatigue, low-



grade fever, unexplained weight loss, or joint pain may occasionally occur because some tumours trigger inflammatory responses. These symptoms are not specific to heart tumours and can be caused by many more common conditions," he noted, "but persistent or unexplained symptoms deserve medical attention."

Dr Nagesh said cardiovascular disease and cancer often share common biological pathways. "One of the biggest connections is chronic inflammation," he explained. Excess visceral fat, poor dietary habits, and inactivity can create a persistent inflammatory state in the body. Over time, this can damage blood vessels, contribute to plaque buildup, and increase cardiovascular risk. The same inflammatory environment may also affect immune function and create conditions that support abnormal cell growth. He added that metabolic changes also play a role. Obesity and poor diet can lead to insulin resistance and higher levels of growth-related hormones such as insulin-like growth factor-1 (IGF-1), which may encourage both vascular changes and abnormal cell survival. Smoking and environmental toxins further increase risk through oxidative stress. "These harmful molecules can damage DNA and blood vessels simultaneously," he said. "The same biological processes that contribute to cancer development can also contribute to heart disease." His broader point: lifestyle habits do not simply increase the risk of one disease at a time — they can alter the body in ways that affect multiple systems simultaneously.

Govt says adequate fuel stocks available amid panic buying in several states

New Delhi: The government is monitoring fuel supplies across the country on a daily basis and taking immediate corrective steps to ensure adequate stocks are available, a senior official said on Monday, citing panic buying at petrol pumps in parts of Gujarat, Maharashtra and Uttar Pradesh.

Sujata Sharma, Joint Secretary in the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas, said the country has enough stocks of petrol, diesel and domestic cooking gas LPG and dryouts at a few pumps was a result of a 20-30 per surge in demand due to a combination of factors, such as increased consumption in agriculture and bulk users tapping petrol pumps for their needs because of the price difference.

Also, private pumps selling petrol and diesel at rates that are at least Rs 5 and Rs 3 per litre higher than PSUs led to a shift to retail outlets of oil marketing companies, resulting in dryouts in some parts.

Sindhu wards off World No 6 Wardani with gritty net play in Singapore



So, nine years after the 30-year-old reached the pinnacle of her ranking at World No 2, in April of 2017, a clamor back into the Top 10s, can be viewed from two different lenses. The flattering way to see it, is her longevity and drive to stay in the mix, even as a generational transition is stuttering towards permanence in women's singles.

Avenging her loss to Indonesian Putri Kusuma Wardini from last year's World Championship, Sindhu defeated the 23-year-old 21-17, 21-18 quite comfortably at the Super 750 Singapore Open. It gives her a second chance to cement her place in Top 10 this year after a brief week in March. Besides seedings leading up to World Championships at home, there's no material edge a Top 10 spot offers. But at this stage of her career, a good seeding at the home event could be make-or-break for Sindhu to avoid top 3 early. These things didn't use to matter to the tall shuttler earlier in her pomp – she could land up at a tournament at any stage and dancy her chances of beating anyone once, when she was at the top herself. But Top 10 scalps matter mightily now. Settling scores, like from the World's last year, where her end-game faltered against Wardini, now assume importance of the sharpening of a knife on the whetstone.

On Tuesday, Sindhu was determined to get her first win over Wardini since 2022. She has twice lost to the upcoming player, now a World No 6. The quality of women's singles Top 10 isn't particularly strong beyond An Se-young, Wang Zhi Yi and Akane Yamaguchi. Chen Yufei, Sindhu and Nozomi Okuhara (who's back to No 12) have needed serious second winds. But Wardini posed a specific needle to Sindhu, given how the losses were more a reflection of Sindhu struggling, than the Indonesian playing extraordinarily. At the Singapore Indoor Stadium, Sindhu set that bit right. The importance of winning this was evident given coach Irwansyah needed to stay put till the very end to ensure Sindhu got this done. Ayush Shetty was playing a drift-dictated match against Victor Lai on the adjoining court, and eventually lost a topsy-turvy match 11-21, 21-14, 21-12 where ridiculous starts of 11-2, 11-3, and 11-5 decided the result, based on how the wind swept the shuttle. On Sindhu's court though, she dictated the tempo and the rallies with precise strategy fed to her. Sindhu's had a reasonably decent net game all her life – you don't win Olympic medals without the net game. But Irwansyah has brought belligerence to her net attack now.

She clearly could hit through Wardani, and pushed the accelerator at perfectly timed break-aways. Ranked No 19, she's been under the radar, and Sindhu will need to parry off any surprises she brings. Victor Lai might not boast of the steeping smash and the shuttle control of his famous namesake Axelsen. But the Canadian has wheels on his feet and shuttle fluency that helps him cross the bird in several ways. When the drift decided that Ayush Shetty would race away to win the opening set, and then Lai would claim the second, it needed the ability to play cross shots with precision to decide the decider.

Lai, batchmate of Ayush boasts of that proficiency. Not only can he squeeze energy out of rivals in long rallies, when the court conditions don't permit that, he whizzes around like he's on roller skates, and keeps the shuttle in play. Lai used the crosses cannily to win the third set, as his footspeed and Ayush's contrasting lead feet put the Indian in a corner. With loads to work on his endurance for the third set, Ayush will need to figure a way to stub out Lai, or he could pose a perennial problem. He's quite Viktor-esque in his shrewd tactics. Also joining Sindhu in Round 2 were Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty who made heavy weather of the fast-improving threat of Americans, winning 26-28, 21-15, 21-13. Norway Chess' confessional booth has a new star: Divya Deshmukh



After she's waited a long while for her opponent, reigning women's world champion Ju Wenjun, to make a move, Divya Deshmukh drifts off to the confessional booth. It's her first-ever appearance at the Norway Chess Women's tournament. And Deshmukh has some unfiltered thoughts she wants to share. "I saw that there are some people sleeping while sitting in the first row," she quips with a cheeky grin. "Honestly, I don't blame them. It's what I would have done too." She proceeds to drop another nugget. "I'm actually getting a bit hungry," she says wistfully. "There's a packet of dried mango kept on the table (in the player's lounge). But I am unsure if we can eat it. It might be kept there for promotional causes." An innovation of the Norway Chess tournament, the confessional booth is a special, sound-proof room near the playing hall that players are encouraged to walk into in the middle of their game, and without being asked by anyone, bare their unfiltered thoughts for live broadcast viewers. It's an introverted chess player's worst nightmare. Deshmukh, at the opposite end of the spectrum from being introverted, decides to ace it. So much so that she makes two trips to the confessional before her game against Ju on Monday has even entered the middlegame phase. As it turns out, Deshmukh is the only female player to visit the confessional booth on Monday.

Players like Magnus Carlsen and Hikaru Nakamura (who was here last year) cannot get enough of the confessional booth. The Indians, on the other hand, have traditionally wanted to be nowhere near it. At last year's edition, R

Gukesh, Praggnanandhaa earn hard-fought Armageddon wins in Norway Chess

Oslo: D Gukesh emerged victorious after a bruising, nerve-jangling marathon battle against Vincent Keymer, and R Praggnanandhaa outplayed Alireza Firouzja but world No. 1 Magnus Carlsen suffered a rare opening-round defeat at Norway Chess, which began amid towering bookshelves at the historic Deichman Bjorvika public library here. Thanks to his Armageddon triumph after a draining 144-move slugfest that lasted nearly five hours, Gukesh pocketed 1.5 points, while Keymer settled for one after the classical game had ended in a stalemate.

The marathon encounter saw the Indian world champion visibly rattled in the closing stages, even seeking clarification from the arbiter over the move count as the game drifted towards an inevitable draw despite Keymer being a pawn up. The German, however, remained ice-cool throughout the classical battle, continuing to press on before eventually losing the Armageddon decider. But the tie-break itself ended swiftly, with Gukesh unleashing the decisive 15.Bh6, a move that sealed Keymer's fate.

Praggnanandhaa and American Grandmaster Wesley So produced a hard-fought classical draw in a finely balanced contest before the Indian No. 2 prevailed in the Armageddon tie-break with a sharp attacking display to pocket the extra point. However, the biggest talking point of the day was defending champion Carlsen suffering a rare defeat in classical chess to Firouzja, who claimed all three points. The Frenchman, confined to a wheelchair after recently injuring his ankle at the Superbet Chess Classic Romania and with his foot firmly strapped in a protective "moon shoe", showed remarkable grit and composure to stun home favourite and world No. 1 Carlsen on his own turf.

Carlsen looked in control for large parts of the contest, but crippling time trouble led to a costly blunder that handed the initiative to Firouzja. The French grandmaster capitalised with clinical precision, securing a statement victory over the hometown favourite and surging to the top of the

Vaishali had said that the organisers had to nudge her to give the booth a try. Deshmukh, the youngest player ever to be invited to play in the Norway Chess tournament, needs no such nudges. One of the most candid players on the circuit, the confession booth seems like it was made for a player of Deshmukh's presence. She speaks of why she would hate it if her opponent's 'bishop came out to play'. She throws up some ideas of what she could play, examines them under a microscope, and then discards them to the rubbish bin one by one as horrible ones.

After a while, she shrugs and admits: "I'm yet to find a good move. But hopefully when she plays, I'll miraculously find one." It's like having a grandmaster's brain being examined in real-time under an X-ray. When the time comes to find good moves over the board, she does find them, neutralizing the attack of the reigning women's world champion in a 52-move draw before she wins the Armageddon contest with black pieces. In Armageddon, the player with black pieces only needs a draw to be declared the winner of the contest while their opponent using white pieces has to win. So a draw would have sufficed for Deshmukh. But she won the game by getting a resignation out of Ju after a stunning hop of the knight that would have led to her pocketing Ju's all-powerful queen.

Players like Koneru Humpy and Anna Muzychuk believe that this year's Norway Chess Women tournament features the strongest field ever assembled in a women's chess tournament. The pre-tournament win percentage calculations by noted game theoretician Mehmet Mars Seven gave Deshmukh bleak chances of winning the event. Mars Seven gave the Indian prodigy a 7.3 per cent chance of winning this year's Norway Chess Women, the worst among the six female players. Her opponent in the opening round, as per the same estimate, had a 28.3 per cent chance of winning this year's tournament, the highest chances among anyone else. After her win over Ju, Deshmukh's opponent on Tuesday will be Koneru Humpy, India's first woman to become a grandmaster. The tournament will just get harder. But expect Deshmukh to rely on the confessional as a strategy when things get hairy. "It was very fun (going to the confessional booth). It's a great stress relief especially after you have been playing for so many hours you cannot talk,

In the women's section, the tournament also began with fighting chess and an early upset as Bibisara Assaubayeva scored an impressive classical victory over Indian No. 1 Humpy Koneru. The Kazakh star handled the complications confidently, capitalised on her middlegame chances and converted her advantage with precision to make an excellent start to the tournament.

Defending champion Anna Muzychuk and Zhu Jiner played out a closely fought classical draw before Zhu prevailed in the Armageddon tie-break to secure the extra half point. Reigning women's world champion Ju Wenjun and Divya Deshmukh also shared the honours in classical chess after a tense battle in which the Chinese pressed hard for victory. Divya, however, produced a spirited display in Armageddon to clinch the tie-break win. After the opening round, Bibisara leads the women's standings, while Divya and Zhu are joint second on 1.5 points each. Muzychuk and Wenjun have one point apiece, while Humpy is yet to open her account.

India wins three gold medals at U23 Asian Championships



Hyderabad: India's impressive run continued at the U23 Asian Championships as Mansi Lather, Kajal and Sumit clinched gold medals to headline a dominant showing on the second day of the competition at the Tien Son Sport Center in Da Nang, Vietnam. Mansi put up a dominant display in the 68kg gold medal bout, registering a comprehensive 14-1 win over Uzbekistan's Firuza Esenbaeva. Kajal was equally impressive in the 76kg final, blanking Kyrgyzstan's Aizharkyn Zhanybekova 10-0, while Greco-Roman grappler Sumit secured the 63kg title with a 12-2 victory over Uzbekistan's Ozodbek Khalilboev. Alongside the three gold medals, the Indian contingent also secured two silver and three bronze medals. Sweetie fought hard in her final but narrowly went down 5-7 against Vietnam's Ngoc L Do to settle for the silver medal. Neha also put up a spirited fight in the 59kg title clash before suffering a 9-5 defeat at the hands of Uzbekistan's Laylokhon Sobirova, bringing home India's second silver medal of the day. "Our young

wrestlers have made us exceptionally proud today with their performances on the mat. Winning gold medals and adding several more medals at a prestigious continental event shows the depth, determination and discipline of Indian wrestling. I extend my congratulations to Mansi, Kajal, Sumit, Sweetie, Neha, Ahilya, Neeraj and Rohit for their medals. Their hard work has paid off, and I hope the rest of the team continues this positive momentum in the upcoming bouts," said Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) President Sanjay Singh. Meanwhile, Ahilya S Shinde impressed in her bronze medal playoff, securing a comprehensive 13-2 win over Kyrgyzstan's Arruke Kadyrbek Kyzy. In the Greco-Roman category that carried over from the opening day, Neeraj Patel showcased brilliant technique in his 55kg match, blanking Kazakhstan's Rauan Bekimov 8-0 to comfortably claim the bronze medal. Adding to the tally, Rohit Bura delivered a commanding performance in his 87kg bronze medal bout, defeating Kyrgyzstan's Artykbek Alymbek Uulu with a clinical 9-0 victory to finish on the podium.

Sports Ministry notifies rules for NSB, NST

New Delhi: The Sports Ministry on Tuesday notified the rules of operation for the soon-to-be-formed National Sports Tribunal (NST) and the National Sports Board (NSB), stating that a dedicated portal would be set up for submission of disputes and maintenance of legal records.

In separate notifications addressing the roles of the two bodies, which will be formed under the National Sports Governance Act passed last year, the Sports Ministry reiterated that a search-cum-selection committee is in the process of being formed under the cabinet secretary.

FWICE’s selective outrage: Ban on Ranveer Singh, but no action on 242 editors’ 2023 plea



Hours after the Federation of Western India Cine Employees (FWICE) announced its ban on Ranveer Singh on Monday, Shweta Venkat called out their selective outrage. The editor, best known for films like Gangs of Wasseypur (2012), Newton (2017), and Haseen Dillruba (2021), has claimed that the FWICE has taken swift action against Ranveer, acting on a complaint by Farhan Akhtar and Ritesh Sidhwani’s Excel Entertainment, but is still conveniently sitting on what 242 editors’ joint grievance from three years ago.FWICE sitting on editors’ grievance from 2023

“It has been a while since industry editors have been trying to sort issues like pay slabs, pending dues, and working conditions. We needed a dialogue with the producers,” Shweta tells SCREEN. A few of them got together to meet the FWICE, and were assured of a meeting with the producers body. This was in 2023, but no progress on the same has materialized so far. “There was also a letter sent to them, signed by 242 editors working in the industry, outlining the issues. But there has been no communication or revert post

that meeting,” adds Shweta. She also called the FWICE’s ban on Ranveer “cute” on her Instagram Stories, and asked why no action has been taken yet on their plea from three years ago. “When film editors had come to you for help setting up a dialogue with producers, where was this efficiency? It has been 3 years. Or maybe we weren’t cool enough. Basically producer ya actor bano (become either a producer or an actor),” she wrote. SCREEN also reached out to FWICE President BN Tiwari, but hasn’t received a response yet.

Why has FWICE banned Ranveer Singh?

FWICE issued a non-cooperation directive to all its members, which go up to over 5 lakh, to not work with Ranveer Singh in any capacity until he personally meets them to amicably resolve the issue. This past December, the actor allegedly walked out of Don 3 three weeks before the commencement of the shoot overseas. Excel Entertainment has demanded damages of Rs 45 crore from the actor to indemnify them of all the pre-production costs incurred after he agreed to do the film.The FWICE also claimed that despite sending three periodical reminders every 10 days to him, Ranveer hasn’t appeared before them. His representative argued that the FWICE doesn’t enjoy any jurisdiction over the matter, prompting the film body to take a strong stand against the actor. It also sought the cooperation of producers body to not employ Ranveer in any capacity till the issue is resolved.Ranveer’s team issued a statement in response on Monday evening. “Throughout the recent developments surrounding Don 3, he has consciously chosen to maintain silence, believing that professional discussions and personal equations are best handled with dignity, maturity and mutual respect. While several narratives and speculations have surfaced over time, Ranveer has never considered it necessary to respond publicly or contribute to conjecture. His focus remains firmly on his work and the commitments ahead,” it stated.

Ladies First movie review: Gender-flipped workplace comedy with dated ideas

Ladies First movie review: First things first, this comedy drama about a misogynistic corporate honcho being made to navigate sexist treatment and mindset when he finds himself in a set-up that is ruled by women is not new. What adds spark to the remake of the French title, I Am Not an Easy Man, is the presence of Rosamund Pike as Alex Fox, a hardworking and talented executive who is picked as one of the company’s creative directors because it looks good for the optics.Some minutes into the movie, things seem to have turned upside down. Sacha Baron Cohen, who plays Alex’s boss Damien Sachs, finds himself in a parallel alternative world dominated by women. He struggles to adapt to this new world order, where he is objectified and not given opportunities to be heard. Somehow, being a man works as an impediment for him in getting promoted.

As the dude vibe is replaced in the movie with feminine toxicity, which can be equally discriminatory, Cohen grapples to find his place in this comedy. Cohen plays a suave man with perfect biceps and looks dapper. But the Borat actor fails to make the misadventures of a man trapped in women’s world funny. Even when he is trying to entertain a predatory older woman at a high post by dressing up as a fetching cowboy, it does not get the laughs.On the other hand, Pike, who has proven in David Fincher’s Gone Girl and I Care a Lot that she can be inscrutable, puts up an impressive act as his formidable adversary as they fight tooth and nail for the post of CEO. While the performances of this impressive ensemble cast remain compelling, Ladies First could have benefitted from some more lighter moments added to this battle-of-the-sexes drama.The French original was written and directed by



Eléonore Pourriat. This remake should have gone for some fresh approaches to look at how the patriarchal mindset is difficult to dislodge. The answer to this age-old problem can’t lie in making women behave exactly the same way men do. The prevalence of patriarchy or misogyny can’t be countered by creating clones of men. It is also churlish to think that men will have a change of heart when they are subjected to the similar sexist attitude that they are known to dole out.Years after Mel Gibson- and Helen Hunt-starrer What Women Want (2002) was released, such a wishful narrative about fixing gender-based discrimination at workplace should have factored in contemporary realities instead of packaging old wine, or, should we say Guinness (since the lead characters work on its marketing campaign), in a new bottle.

Devoleena Bhattacharjee reacts to Desi Bling’s Tabinda Sanpal normalising infidelity



Karan Kundrra and Tejaswi Prakash’s latest reality show Desi Bling is making headlines for all the wrong reasons. Besides the criticism online over the show’s cringe-worthy moments and Karan-Tejaswi’s over-the-top outfits and dramatic reactions, much of the backlash has been directed at Satish and Tabinda Sanpal. In particular, one of Tabinda’s remarks suggesting that she was okay with infidelity appears to have sparked widespread

When there’s a different girl every time, it’s okay. But if it’s the same girl every time, then you think it’s a problem. If this is Satish’s party, it can’t be without girls.”Soon, social media users began reacting to Tabinda’s statement. An Instagram user wrote, “Wait, so now wives are normalising husbands having girlfriends?” Another user commented, “What kind of shows is Netflix making in 2026? So weird ...Stop normalising this behaviour.” A third user wrote, “The way Binda behaves on the show honestly screams deep-rooted insecurity more than concern.Your entire personality cannot revolve around being someone’s wife and then acting threatened by every confident woman around your husband or around other happy couples.”Another comment read, “So we are normalising this nonsense?” while someone else wrote, “It’s disgusting to even think that women have normalised this.” One netizen said, “Feels deeply sad to see society normalising and Netflix making such absolute BS,” while another commented, “Glorifying infidelity (eyeroll emoji).”Not just netizens, even people from the film and TV industry have discouraged this behavior. Film-maker Lakshmi R Iyer shared a post on Instagram that read, “Saw a clip from a reality show where a wife said she is okay with her husband cheating as long as the woman isn’t repeated. Stop normalizing this bullshit. Stop setting terrible examples in the name of being modern or cool. Being loyal and honest is still attractive, stop letting social media convince you otherwise.” In the caption Lakshmi wrote, “Cheat, just don’t repeat. Imagine how low the standards have fallen for this to sound acceptable on OTT.”

Is Ranveer Singh ban legal? Its impact on his next Pralay, and why Farhan didn’t go to court

“A superstar is not above the law,” declared BN Tiwari, the president of the Federation of Western India Cine Employees (FWICE), while addressing the media in Mumbai on Monday over Ranveer Singh’s unceremonious exit from Farhan Akhtar’s directorial Don 3 this past December. The film body has now asked its 4 lakh-plus members — including technicians and workers — from working with Ranveer until he appears before them personally to resolve the issue. Ranveer is all set to roll out his next, Pralay, in the months to come and the directive can make the process of assembling crew extremely complicated, making it akin to a ban.

Can FWICE really ban Ranveer Singh?

But the question is, does the FWICE really have the legal authority to issue a “non-cooperation directive” to its members and prohibit them from collaborating with Ranveer in any professional capacity? “FWICE is a federation of craft associations, not a statutory regulator. Its authority is consensual and confined to its members,” Sanjay Vasudevan, a media and entertainment lawyer, tells SCREEN. He argues that since Ranveer is not even a member of the FWICE, he “is outside its jurisdiction, and the directive has no binding force against him or third parties”.

Does Ranveer need to engage with the FWICE?

For the same reason, Ranveer isn’t even legally bound to engage with the FWICE for discussions. The film body stated that as per its rules, it sent three periodical reminders to the actor every 10 days, inviting to present his side of the story. But it’s exactly that — an invitation — and by no stretch, any form of summon. “Its invitation is a request, and declining a request from a non-authoritative body attracts no liability. Ranveer is well within his rights to not indulge in the conversations,” argues Vasudevan.“Having said that, it’s always more prudent to engage with the other side. The reality is there are so many competing stakeholders. When indifference seeps in, then there tends to be such a reactive response. Selective, controlled engagement may shorten the dispute, but it’s a commercial choice, and not a legal duty. The ‘no one is above the law’ framing is rhetorical, not legal,” he adds.

Do FWICE members need to cooperate with the film body?

“Essentially, the trade union in question is seeking its members to not cooperate with the person because he’s acted adversely in the interests of not only the producers, but also the workmen working on the film. This doesn’t come as much from legal authority as from a union which has a certain leverage,” explains Vasudevan.He adds that while there are members within the union who can choose not to act in tandem with the union, their repercussions at the most would be rejection of membership from taking an adverse position. “Outside of that, there’s no legal sanctity per se,” asserts Vasudevan. However, he also adds that the FWICE can benefit from reconsideration of such a directive because it’s an “ethical dilemma” for the workers to comply with their union’s ask despite their livelihood depending on working in a film headlined by Ranveer Singh.“Ultimately, all these unions are here to fight the good fight for their workers, but their reactions can’t be disproportionate to the actual harm caused,” states Vasudevan, adding, “Such a directive should be issued in a way that in the event that the workmen, in the event of working with him to earn their livelihood, should not face any ramifications for doing so. They should not be disqualified because the membership offers them certain privileges. That’s something to be sensitive about as well.”

Can the ban impact Ranveer Singh’s next, Pralay?

Ranveer has already committed to his next project, Jai Mehta’s zombie apocalypse thriller Pralay. The film, mounted on a huge budget, is expected to go on floors this year. Would then the producers — Applause Entertainment and Hansal Mehta and Sahil Saigal’s True Story Films — be liable to follow the directive issued by the FWICE? “The risk is operational (technicians and crew declining to service the shoot), not legal. There is no statutory mechanism to penalize producers for engaging the actor,” points out Vasudevan.“The reality with how a union operates is all basis cooperation. If they elect to not cooperate, they can do so legally. But again, the union can be reactive. There could be some ramifications that Applause and True Story Films may also face,” he adds. While the FWICE warned the producers that they may face losses if they go ahead with Ranveer’s projects, Vasudevan claims “the statement is just a warning, not a legal prohibition”. But he also underlines the other side of the coin. “While one has the right, the other may not be under the obligation to work with you. It’s a little bit of a matrix,” adds Vasudevan.



.Why has Farhan Akhtar not gone to court?

The usual remedy, as one has witnessed with similar cases in the past, is when an actor walks out of a project (for instance, Sara Ali Khan in Kedarnath), the producers usually send them a legal notice. However, since Farhan Akhtar-Ritesh Sidhwani-led Excel Entertainment hasn’t taken that route yet, there’s reason to suspect that they may not have a strong case given how their contract with Ranveer was shaped.“Contractually, when Excel and Ranveer entered into an agreement, there might be clauses which excluded the intervention of trade unions and other such bodies. We encourage parties to cooperate with the respective trade unions, but sometimes there’s a caveat that waives the interference of any such union. I anticipate there was such language in the contract, but we’d be able to arrive at that only once the contract is made public,” states Vasudevan.He also hints at the possibility of the absence of an indemnity clause, which is an actor saying they’ll make good of the loss the production house suffered due to a breach. “Now, the problem might be their lack of fortitude from a legal standpoint to envision such a walkout. They might have had loosely defined termination rights,” argued Vasudevan. Excel Entertainment has previously collaborated with Ranveer on two successful projects — Zoya Akhtar’s Dil Dhadakne Do (2015) and Gully Boy (2019) — and had also signed a three-film deal with the actor.“The indemnity provision is sometimes subjected to a cap of liability. Now, if the liability was capped for Ranveer to a certain amount, regardless of what happened, you can’t quite make a claim beyond that,” says Vasudevan, highlighting another contentious clause. “There’s generally an exclusion of indirect damages. Have the parties contracted in way that tried to account for such a situation? If they had not, then they might be on a stickier wicket. And that’s perhaps why they’re not immediately legally enforcing it,” he adds.But he’s confident that despite the possible disadvantage, Excel Entertainment could still go to court. “What a good lawyer would argue is to enforce not just the letter, but the spirit of the contract. That’s the more challenging case to make if the contract reads in any other kind of way,” he argues. “It’s not the first time an actor has walked out of a film. You can see there’s a rhetoric throughout that he was always satisfied with the script. The reason they’re trying to build that narrative to make a case that he’s left the film out of convenience and for frivolous reasons rather than something substantive. Ranveer might make the case there was a cause, but we can’t extrapolate that unless there’s further comment,” adds Vasudevan.

Can Ranveer Singh take FWICE to court?

Speaking of taking to court, even if Excel Entertainment chooses not to go down that path, Vasudevan feels Ranveer has “some remedies” when it comes to the ban imposed by the FWICE. “You have the constitutional right to be able to carry out any trade of your choice, so long as it’s legal. Right now, the film body is more of a toothless tiger. But when it gains teeth to the point where it restricts him to engage with more producers, I’d imagine he’d challenge the union’s directive or at least get them to modify the terms so that his right to work is protected,” says Vasudevan. If he wishes, Ranveer could seek legal remedies under Section 3(3)(b) of the Competition Act, Article 19(1)(g) of the Indian Constitution, and Section 27, Contract Act.

Has there been a precedent like this?

Vasudevan claims that at least in India, there haven’t been precedents as peculiar as these. “The present matter may, for the first time, test the practical scope of federation authority against the formal competition-law framework,” he says, adding, “
